Docs strike work over rape, murder in WB

Doctors at various hospitals across India began their indefinite strike from Monday, halting all elective services scheduled, non-urgent procedures and outpatient services – until a fair investigation into the alleged rape and murder of a Kolkata doctor is concluded and their demands for safe working environment for their fraternity is met.

The trainee medico worked at the State-run RG Kar Medical College Hospital in Kolkata, and her body was found inside the facility's seminar hall on Friday, sparking outrage within the medical community. While pause in elective

services left many patients visiting the OPDs left them high and dry, emergency however, remained care, operational, to address critical patients needs in the hospitals. The nationwide indefinite

strike is been led by the Federation of Resident Associations (FORDA) with the Delhi Medical Association (DMA) also coming out in support of the doctors on strike.

The brutal nature of the crime has intensified calls for justice and has led to the nationwide strike as a mean of expressing solidarity with the victim and demanding systemic changes to ensure the safety of healthcare

The police teams carrying out a detailed investigation have also managed to identify the kingpin of the module as Mohd Lateef alias Haji.

The investigations were launched by the police teams after eliminating three Pakistani terrorists in the Gandoh area of Doda district on June 26, 2024.

SC orders Shambhu border partial opening

The Supreme Court on Monday asked the Punjab Government to persuade the farmers protesting at the Shambhu border since February 13 to remove tractors and trollies from the road, saying "highwavs are not parking space". A bench of Justices Surya Kant and Ujjal Bhuyan directed the police chiefs of both Punjab and Harvana to hold a meeting along with the Superintends of Police of adjoining Patiala and Ambala districts within one week for partial reopening of the highway at the inter-State Shambhu border.

"We are not directing but we are definitely impressing upon the State of Punjab to immediately persuade the farmers to remove their tractors and trollies. Even parking will create problems.

Now, we are seized with the issue and we are keeping it pending till some respectable, amicable and fair and just solution of all the problems are found," the bench told the Punjab Government.

Underscoring that farmers or the agricultural community don't face difficulty of any kind, the bench said, "After all, we are also concerned. Both the States are concerned and everybody is concerned about it.'

The DGPs of Punjab and Haryana and SPs of Patiala and Ambala along with Deputy Commissioners of both the districts are to meet within one week and lay down the modalities for partial opening of highway, initially for the purpose of ambulances, senior citizens, girl students, women, essential services and daily commuters of nearby areas," the court said.

Elephant population on the rise in Odisha

While 1,976 jumbos were found in 2017, the number has risen to 2,098 in 2024

As World Elephant Day was observed on Monday, good news for Odisha was that the State's elephant population is on the rise.

PCCF Wildlife Susanta Nanda is leading the Team Wildlife for protection of wildlife in general and elephants, in particular in the forests of the State

ne pioneer

A special programme was organised here at the Nandankanan Zoological Park to celebrate the day with the elephants residing there.

Odisha is home to 2,098 elephants, as per the latest elephant census report released recently. The estimation was conducted during the month of May this year.

A total of 2,098 elephants including 313 adult tuskers, 13 adult makhna, 748 adult female, 148 sub-adult male, 282 sub-adult female, 209 juvenile



and 385 calves were there in 48 forest divisions across 28 districts of the State.

During the last elephant census conducted in 2017, there were 1,976 jumbos

which comprise 212 adult tuskers, 10 adult makhna, 816 adult cow, 122 sub-adult male, 276 sub-adult female, 38 of unknown sex, 203 juvenile and

A significant increase in the number is reported in a few like Angul, divisions Dhenkanal, Athagarh, Baripada, Chandaka, Khurda, Bonai and Keonjhar forest divisions. A significant change in movement pattern of elephants was also noticed in Angul, Rourkela and Baripada circles.

There has been a substantial increase in the population of tuskers to the extent of 40 percent during the last seven years. This has resulted in a healthy ratio of adult male to females and also a significant entire population, PCCF Nanda said.

Due to the positive environment, elephants from Jharkhand and West Bengal are also moving towards

A total of 584 elephants were counted in three elephant reserves which is about 28 percent of the total elephant population of the State.

Odisha now has a large, well established elephant population with a stable age distribution with a growth rate of around 3 percent, official sources informed.

One dies, 7 critical

Incident reminds of govt's palm trees plantation plan

A woman died and seven other persons were critically injured when lightning struck amid heavy rains near Gop's Balighai in Puri district early on Monday. The deceased was identified as Kunti Bhoi (45).

The incident took place while they were planting saplings in a field. Some Bol Bam devotees were also present at the spot. They were rescued by villagers and rushed to the District Headquarters Hospital, where Kunti died during treatment.

In February, the government had informed about 1,472 lightning deaths in the State in the last five years.

Most lightning-related fatalities were reported from Mayurbhanj, Keonjhar, Baleswar, Bhadrak, Ganjam,

Cuttack, Dhenkanal, Sundargarh, Koraput and Nabarangpur districts.

Odisha is one of India's worst-affected States by lightning strikes during the premonsoon and monsoon peri-

A study by researchers of three universities and the Climate Resilient Observing-Systems Promotion Council (CROPC) has revealed that Odisha is among four States with highest lightning-related fatalities. Odisha, Madhya Pradesh, Uttar Pradesh and Maharashtra accounted for 55 per cent of the deaths in the last five decades.

SAMBALPUR $oldsymbol{A}$ noble service of feeding the needy in the evening so that no person sleeps hungry has been started by three Muslim men of Sambalpur. The initiative is known as Roti Bank, a wing of Khidmat Social Organisation at Peer Baba Chowk in the city. The initiative started on the occasion of Gandhi Jayanti in October 2023 and has been serving dinner to the poor and homeless people from 6.30 pm to 8.30

The needy people roaming on the city's streets reach the Roti Bank at 6.30 pm. A queue of people is found under the new bridge at Peer Baba Chowk. The meal of rice, dal, chapati, vegetarian curry, pickles and sometimes papad and sweets is served to the underprivileged.

There are eight people working for the smooth functioning of Roti Bank. Three of

them are working on a paid basis and the remaining are providing voluntary services.

As the initiative caught the attention of people, supporters later joined and provided wheat, rice and also funds voluntarily. Sometimes, people bear the cost of free meals at the Roti Bank on their birth-

Alim Kamdar, founder member of Roti Bank, said, "It was started by Farooque,

Guddu and me; later many joined the service. We began with 35 meals last year; and now, more people have started coming; more than 80 meals are served. We will start a mobile service in a month. Sometimes, we are informed about hungry passengers in the rail-

way station at night; we send meals for them.' S Farooque from Khidmat said, "We have been happily serving the needy people with

without fail. I feel overjoyed seeing a smile on their faces. We are planning to reach out to the needy on vehicles and provide them a meal for their dinner. Not everyone can come here; so, a mobile service will benefit many who are unable to come." He added that it was not

possible to continue the service without public support. A survey is on to find out the needy people in various parts of Sambalpur so that we can provide them food from the Roti Bank. There are many senior citizens in the city without a family or a person to cook; the Roti Bank will provide them meals.

Kumara Sika, a homeless person, said, "I have been eating here since the last two months. They give chapati, dal and curry. Sometimes, we get paneer also. I don't have money to buy food; they are providing it free of cost. May God bless these people!"



IIT BBS researchers study rainfall prediction accuracy

In climate change scenarios, there is a rapid rise in the intensity and frequency of heavy rainfall events over the Indian region. These heavy rainfall events (HREs) have significant consequences and have a profound impact on the society.

However, accurate rainfall prediction with adequate leadtime is an immense challenge for the current state-of-the art dynamical models. State-ofthe-art traditional numerical weather prediction (NWP) models and their ensembles, while useful, often struggle



such events due to the intricate topography and varied climate patterns.

To overcome these limitations, for the first time, the IIT Bhubaneswar has developed a hybrid technology integrating the output from the Weather Research and Forecasting (WRF) model into a deep learning (DL) model to enhance prediction accuracy par-

ticularly with an aim to improve prediction of heavy rainfall events with an adequate lead time. The studies were carried out over the complex terrain of Assam (highly vulnerable to severe flooding) during June 2023 and over the State of Odisha where heavy rainfall events are highly dynamic in nature due to the landfall of multiple intense rain bearing monsoon low-

pressure systems. In Assam, the hybrid model displays prediction accuracy that is nearly double that of traditional ensemble models at a district level with a lead time up to 96 hours, showcasing its remarkable performance.

To demonstrate the robustness of the aforementioned technology for real time situations over complex terrain of Assam, in another groundbreaking study, researchers from the IIT Bhubaneswar have demonstrated a significant leap in accurately predicting heavy rainfall events over the region in real time, using deep learning techniques.





ICG strengthens surveillance to foil illegal Bangladeshi migration via sea

Considering the recent political events in the Bangladesh and emerging situation, Indian Coast Guard (ICG) has aptly positioned operational units for robust surveillance in the region and to foil any attempts of illegal migration through sea routes, officials said here on Monday. Giving details, they said surface surveillance has been enhanced along the Indo-Bangladesh International Maritime Boundary Line or IMBL by Offshore Patrol Vessels (OPVs) and Fast Patrol Vessels (FPVs). Layered surface surveillance has been instituted by additional FPVs. All units at sea have been advised to monitor/Board all fishing boats and undertake positive identification of Indian Fishermen. Sea Air coordinated aerial sur-

veillance has been augmented along IMBL by Coast Guard Aircraft especially during dawn dusk hours to track scooting contacts, if any. Additional assets are also kept on standby at Paradip and Haldia for immediate deployment/ response, if any subversive activity is reported. Electronic surveillance has been promptly maintained for all close coast transferring contacts and interrogated. Necessary coordination has been maintained with agencies and stakeholders to prevent any ingress through possible infiltration/ landing

SC rejects plea against cancellation of UGC **NET** examination

The Supreme Court on Monday refused to entertain a fresh plea filed by some examinees challenging the Government's decision to cancel the UGC-NET examination following alleged question paper leak, saying that entertaining it at this stage will create "chaos".

A bench comprising Chief Justice DY Chandrachud and Justices JB Pardiwala and Manoj Misra said the Government is conducting the exam afresh on August 21 and the students, who are around nine lakh, must have some kind of "certainty now". "The Supreme Court stepping now will have a serious effect and there will be chaos all over," the CJI said while declining to entertain the plea filed by Praveen Dabas and others. The bench said the exam was held on June 18 and was cancelled a day after that.

"Entertaining the plea at the present stage would only add to uncertainty and add to utter chaos," the CJI said, adding the Central Government must be "doubly cautious after the NEET-UG fiasco and thus it was cancelled. Let this process



Earlier, the top court had dismissed a PIL on the issue, saying it was filed by a lawyer and not by aggrieved candidates. 'Why are you (lawyer) coming? Let the students come here themselves," the CJI had told the lawyer, adding "while declining the above PIL, we express nothing on merits". The bench had asked advocate Ujjawal Gaur, who has filed the



Indian researchers create xerogel for blood clot relief

Indian researchers have devel-Loped a porous composite xerogel dressing incorporating Silica Nanoparticles and calcium, that can help blood clot rapidly and provide relief for uncontrolled hemorrhage. The composite showed significant improvement in rate of blood clotting in comparison to commercial dressing, said scientists from Agharkar Research Institute (ARI) Pune, an autonomous institute of Department of Science and Technology (DST) under the Union Ministry of Science and

ing military or surgical operations. More than 40 per cent of trauma deaths are due to severe loss of blood. Gauze, a commonly used first aid material or the natural defences of the human body operating through reduction in blood flow to the injury site, platelet plug formation by fibrin activation and activation of blood clotting pathways are inadequate to halt severe hemorrhage. Therefore, improved hemostatic materials are urgently

required to reduce blood loss-The scientists said that the

highly porous spongy xerogel hemostatic dressing supplemented with substances bind to a receptor inside a cell (agonists) like silica nanoparticles (SiNPs) and calcium. They studied composite material and found that it increased the

blood clotting index by 13-fold in comparison to commercial dressing clotting capacity.

The well-characterised xerogel showed presence of multiple pores of around 30 µm size that contributed to the high absorbance capacity of the dressing. The supplements improved the clotting capacity and resulted in quick absorbance of blood.

"Platelets are an important component of blood and contribute to the blood clotting process

Several factors like change in platelet shape, secretion of calcium, and activation of receptors on platelet surface play a role in the intricate pathway of blood clotting. "The xerogel hemostatic dressing showed enhanced platelet aggregation due to the development of

Preserving natural habitats for elephants helps reduce human-elephant conflict: Karnataka CM

 $P^{\rm reserving}_{\rm habitats}\ {\rm for}\ {\rm the}\ {\rm natural}_{\rm labitats}$ will reduce the humanelephant conflicts that we are witnessing at an alarmingly high rate, said Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah on Monday.

He was speaking after inaugurating an international conference that coincides with World Elephant Day. The two-day conference on human-elephant conflict management, which aims to tackle the increased humanelephant conflicts, was

organised by the Karnataka Forest department.

The conference will see forest department officials from knowledge with academic researchers and civil society organisations to bring about evidence-based inclusive approaches to human-elephant conflict solutions.

India sharing

the inaugural event, Siddaramaiah said Karnataka in particular is susceptible to increased human-elephant conflicts as the state has the highest elephant population with 6,395 elephants, which makes approximately 25 per cent of the nation's total elephant population. "With Karnataka's significant

elephant population comes human-elephant conflict. In the last 10 years, the state reported over 2,500 incidents of human-elephant conflicts, resulting in over 350 human fatalities and substantial crop losses," said the CM.

According to him, conference is a critical platform where to exchange ideas, explore scientific solutions, and international collaboration to address the problem.



"As climate change raises temperatures and changes rainfall patterns, resources become even more scarce and elephants get pushed into new areas, including communal lands. Humans face their own challenges as they must move deeper into elephant territory to collect water or firewood," said Siddaramaiah. Therefore, he said this is a challenge with significant ecological, social, and economic implications. In that context, he said the international conference presents an invaluable opportunity to learn from

innovative scientific solutions, discuss sustainable approaches to fostering coexistence humans between elephants. "I am confident that the

delegates distinguished present here will contribute insights and recommendations to pave the way for a harmonious coexistence between humans and elephants," he added. Khandre, Eshwar Karnataka's Forest, Ecology & Environment Minister who was also present for the inaugural session on Monday, reiterated that the conference is an attempt towards developing mechanism to address the pressing issue of humanelephant conflict. 'When the idea of the



Capital of monsoon misery

Thee national capital grapples with waterlogging and a host of issues that accompany the rains

S Eliot wrote, "April is the cruelest month..." in his famous poem *The Waste Land*. He was, of course, speaking of a different context and place, but one might wonder if he would have felt the same had he experienced Delhi in August. This year has brought a good monsoon, but for Delhiites, heavy downpours rarely bring good news. They must brace themselves for waterlogging, traffic snarls, a host of diseases, unclean water, power failures, and what have you. Streets turned into rivers, traffic reached a standstill, and daily life was thrown into disarray. The scene is all too familiar, a recurring nightmare that haunts the city every monsoon. But why does Delhi, with its sprawling infrastructure and resources, continue to grapple with such chaos year after year? More importantly, what can be done to mitigate this annual misery? Heavy rainfall over the past 24 hours has left several key areas in Delhi, including Connaught Place, Minto Road, and the Ring Road, severely waterlogged. Commuters faced long hours in traf-



water entering homes and causing significant damage to property and belongings. Unfortunately, it's an annual ritual: heavy monsoon showers overwhelm the infrastructure, bringing the city to a standstill. The blame game ensues, followed by knee-jerk responses and funds allocated for improvements. Yet, by the next year, those efforts are washed away, leaving the city again

at the mercy of the weather gods. It is not rocket science to find the root cause of the problem and even fix it. Surely, the authorities would know that but the execution plan is missing. Despite being a metropolitan hub, Delhi's drainage system is outdated and poorly maintained. Besides, rapid and often haphazard urban development has led to the encroachment of natural water bodies and green spaces. These areas, which once absorbed excess rainwater, have been replaced by concrete structures, exacerbating the problem of water runoff. There is an urgent need to remove those encroachments and upgrade the drainage system. But unfortunately, urban planning in Delhi often happens in silos, with little coordination between different departments. This lack of an integrated approach has led to a situation where roads are built without adequate drainage. Delhi needs a multifaceted approach that addresses both the immediate challenges and long-term vulnerabilities: Utilising smart city technologies, such as real-time monitoring of drainage systems and predictive weather modelling, can help in better preparedness and response to heavy rains. While heavy rains are a natural phenomenon, the resulting waterlogging and disruption are largely man-made problems. To tackle this issue, concrete measures and decisive actions must be taken immediately.

Progress depends on retentiveness




Today, as political discord echoes through our democracy, I find myself reflecting on those dark days of Emergency and the enduring wounds inflicted on our nation's soul

t was only in 1956 that I got some idea of how the Constitution of India was framed, and who were the major personalities that constituted the historic Constituent Assembly. The teacher who introduced me to it was a great admirer of Mahatma Gandhi and adored Pandit Nehru and Neta Ji Subhash Chandra Bose. The library had a copy of the constitution of India having the signatures of all of the members of the Constituent Assembly and also images representing Indian cul-ture and heritage. We learnt the Preamble by heart. teacher-created interest amongst students interested in dramatics, and after hectic preparation of a couple of weeks, a mock Constituent Assembly was enacted in the presence of a huge gathering.

This young teacher was also confident that the ancient Indian culture now be resurrected, and the entire world would know how advanced Indians were in 'thought and deed'! In 1975, I read the constitution in all seriousness, and witnessed how it was being mercilessly mutilated! After nearly five decades, as one peruses the print and electronic media, one witnesses a slugfest between the union government and the opposition, it makes one reflect on the emergency days, and one just can't avoid reflecting on the 18 months of democratic darkness that shattered the lives of millions of the people. It ruined the credibility of Indian democracy internationally.

No apology could erase the wound inflicted on the constitution and the humiliation of the stalwarts who created the constitution of India. Was it not a shameless humiliation inflicted on Baba Sahib Bhim Rao Ambedkar? He had repeatedly opposed the inclusion of the term 'secular in the Preamble of the Constitution. How could any active and alert citizen forget the fact that the 44th Constitution Amendment Act was passed by a Parliament that was in its arbitrarily-extended sixth year? Practically all of the opposition stalwarts were in jail! Today, any voice that says 'I want my

Is it necessary to 'fight facts' to negate the truth? What we witness all around us in the world of the current-day average politicians was envisioned by Śri Aurobindo in his lifetime: "The modern politician in my part of the world does

not represent the soul of a

people or its aspirations.

What he does usually represent is all the average pettiness, selfishness, egoism, selfdeception that is about him and these he represents well enough as well as a great deal of mental incompetence and moral conventionality, timidity and pretence". All of these attributes have grown up in gigantic proportions in our times. The only way out is the sincere acceptance of diversity of every imaginable hue, and revert back to the great

dialogical tradition. The adults and elders must realize what the young of India are getting from them in the years of their growing

nce a most demanding course among youngsters, English literature studies has seen a significant decline in the past decade. In many colleges in India seats of B.Literature remain vacant despite its huge potential in this digital age. The policymakers and academicians should brainstorm the reasons and come out with concentre plans to overcome this dilemma. humanities Emerging fields like data science, artificial intelligence, and digital marketing are gaining popularity among students due to their perceived relevance and lucrative opportunities. This view is compounded by a lack of clear and well-promoted career pathways specifically tied to English studies. Many



English literature programs may have curricula that have not been updated to reflect contemporary literary trends and regional and global issues. The stress on Shakespearean and other literary works doesn't get connected to present-day society. Shakespearean plays and other classical works were written in very different historical and cultural contexts. The social norms, political

cerns of ancient times may

seem foreign to modern read-This historical gap can make it hard for students to see how the themes and issues of these works relate to their own lives. A focus on classic literature without integrating contemporary and diverse voices may alienate students

who are more interested in

modern and global literary trends. The rise of digital media and alternative forms of entertainment, such as social media, video games, and streaming platforms, has altered reading habits. Students may be less inclined to engage with traditional literature due to these competing interests. Though science education reformation forms part of national policies, literature education rarely finds its place in national policies, though NEP stresses the need to undertake literary studies.

To make literature more relatable and engaging, integrate a diverse range of texts. Include contemporary works from different cultures, genres, and perspectives. For instance, introducing novels, short stories, and poetry from emerging voices around the world, alongside regional literature, can provide students with a broader view of the literary landscape.

Academicians should link literature with other fields such as history, psychology, sociology, and environmental studies. For instance, studying dystopian novels alongside discussions of climate science and environmental issues can provide students with a deeper understanding of both the literature and the real-world issues it reflects. Thrust should be given to include components that prepare students for the job market, such as resume writing, interview skills, and networkopportunities. Connecting literature studies with science and other relevant fields will enhance career prospects. In the age of bots, literature students should

even be taught the fundamentals of computer programming. Revitalising the literary syllabus necessitates a deliberate strategy that incorporates current issues, embraces digital and multimedia resources, fosters interdisciplinary linkages, and emphasises practical skills. Educational institu-

tions can establish a literary program that is relevant and exciting for 21st-century students by using a variety of texts, utilising technology, and regularly updating the curriculum.

As the world watches, the implications of this power shift resonate far beyond Dhaka's borders; the once peaceful country has plunged into anarchy


outh Asia's youngest nation has been thrust into a new era following a four-day power vacuum, decisively crossing a point of no return. A new messiah has emerged to rule over 171 million people, arriving from Paris in a full-circle moment. Had Hasina remained in power, he would have been sentenced to life for corruption on the very day Hasina fled the country she had ruled for over 15 years. Nobel laureate Muhammad Yunus has assumed the role of head of the interim government. A 14-member interim government including a Hindu psychiatrist and a Buddhist human rights activist led by Prof. Yunus

Alarmingly, most of these members are heads of Western-funded NGOs, exposing the true manipulators behind the scenes. It was a nightmare for them to run their NGOs during Hasina's tenure, with many facing harassment, intimidation, and even imprisonment. Now, they have set their yardstick. Nobel laureate Prof. Yunus, who has received the Congressional Gold Medal and the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian honours in the United States, illustrates the adage that, as Americans say, there's no such thing as a free lunch. The coming months will reveal how Dhaka's political shifts will reverberate across borders. Nearly 300 people have been killed in the post-Hasina period, with rampant looting, attacks on minorities and intimidation of state intiminorities, and intimidation of state institutions. Images show disturbing violence, including the burning of Hindu temples. The riots go beyond protests against the Awami League, revealing deeper conflicts. Unfortunately, Delhi policymakers may have underestimated this sentiment and placed undue

It was a bloodbath, and the incidents that unfolded suggest it was a well-planned political scheme, executed promptly to overthrow Hasina—a time-tested leader, though surrounded by controversies. The humiliating destruction of Bangabandhu's statue starkly echoes the fall of Saddam Hussein's statue in Baghdad.

Sheikh Mujibur Rahman, known as Bangabandhu, laid the foundation of Bangladesh with his political ideology and dedication during the struggle for indepen dence. Despite overcoming initial challenges, fear has once again taken hold in the country. The chaotic situation exemplifies a state of total anarchy. This is not revolution; revolutions are meant to ANARCHY. THIS IS improve the lives of people, not to indulge in bloodlust against unarmed citizens with opposing political viewpoints or religious beliefs. However, given the nation's violent history even before its inception, it seems to be passing through yet another despicable period.

Is this merely a student uprising, or is someone manipulating them behind the scenes to exploit the situation? When the LIVES OF PEOPLE, political intelligentsia abstains from protests, reducing them to mere emotional outbursts, it fosters an environment ripe for the creation of new, equally monstrous situations. This cycle will inevitably doom us to repeat the same failures. The harrowing video of an unemployed youth wearing a black t-shirt being shot by a policeman only deepened the unrest. Hasina bears blood on her hands; whether direct-

ly or through those who ordered lethal force against protesters, accountability is imperative. Thanks to India, Hasina narrowly escaped a fate akin to Muammar Gaddafi's. In the January elections, she set a trap with her abuse of power and legislative misogyny, even denying medical treatment to opponents. Her opponents seized on the quota issue as the tipping point. Although she addressed it, she failed to recognise it was merely a façade. Her inability to understand that 15 years is too long for any democracy to be managed alone highlights a grim historical lesson. However, history teaches us a valuable lesson: despite Ferdinand Marcos' ousting, his family's influence persisted, and in 2021, his son made a notable comeback in the Philippines. That's the nature of politics. Consequently, whoever comes to power next will face a challenging situation.

The manipulations behind these shocking events, which unfolded within a month while the Prime Minister was in China, may be revealed in the future, much like how America tried to obscure the genocide in Bangladesh (then East Pakistan) during the early 60s, with Henry Kissinger maintaining a political alliance with General Yahya Khan of Pakistan as a secret route to engage with China.

Commenting on the situation, Secretary of State Antony Blinken, reflecting his country's global ambitions, urged the Bangladeshi people to ensure that 'any decisions made by the interim government need to respect democratic principles, uphold the rule of law, and reflect the will of the people.'

This statement came shortly after the arrival of F-16 fighter jets in Ukraine, continued arms supplies to Israel, and the brutal killing of

Black woman Sonya Massey by law enforcement in her own homejust a few examples that highlight the contradictions in America's respect for the rule of law and international norms. Ironically, many have started comparing the situation in Bangladesh with Sri Lanka. However, there are significant differences between the unprecedented exit of the Bangladeshi Prime Minister this week and the relinquishment of power by President Gotabaya Rajapaksa in Sri Lanka two years ago. One key factor was India's attitude, which was drastically different in these cases.

Reliable sources with knowledge of the events in Sri Lanka have asserted that India believed Gotabaya Rajapaksa should not resign but should stay in power. This stance resulted in no airlift facilities being provided for a safe exit, forcing the then-President to flee to the Maldives in an over-50year-old Air Force plane.

In contrast, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina of Bangladesh received swift support from India. Second, Gotabaya Rajapaksa came to power through free and fair elections with a significant majority, whereas Sheikh Hasina was reelected after a series of repressions against opposition political parties. Her handling of the elections reflected growing public displeasure. Winning over regional powers and maintaining their support certainly made her powerful and influential.

Her development projects offered to India, China, Russia, and Japan highlighted bold decisions in her foreign policy. She effectively balanced both India and China, showcasing her capability more effectively than any other South Asian leader in contemporary political history. However, a common trait between these two leaders is their stance on China. Despite unprecedented pressure from the West, both leaders continued to work harmoniously with China. For instance, when Mike Pompeo, then Secretary of State and former CIA Director, criticised China during his visit to Colombo, President Rajapaksa directly told him that "the opinion held by America against China in Sri Lanka is factually wrong." Since then, Rajapaksa's politics began to crumble, pointing to the decisions he made and the protests that followed.

Similarly, after successfully concluding a visit to India right after Modi's re-election, Hasina flew to China to initiate more Chinesefunded development projects. By then, her fate at home was already sealed.In this context, Elon Musk's recent comment on Venezuela is apt: 'We will coup whoever we want! Deal with it. Amidst the social media spectacle dominated by profit-driven motives and emotionally manipulative politics, the unemployed youth who ignited change in Bangladesh may soon face this harsh reality. Western ambitions in unstable countries often focus on destruction and manipulation through proxies rather than genuine improvements in livelihoods. The new interim government may well understand this realpolitik. With Hasina's downfall, the direction of the interim government's foreign polcy and its approach towards the Global South, including BRICS, remains uncertain. While it may be premature to fully assess this interim arrangement, the situation poses a significant challenge for India, China, and Asia as a whole. (The writer is a journalist and

Russians urged to flee Ukraine's cross-border attack

n official in the Kursk bor-An official in the Russia on der region of Russia on Monday urged more residents to evacuate due to the "very tense situation" in the area, where Russian forces are still scrambling to respond to a surprise Ukrainian attack after almost a week of fierce fighting. Russia's emergency authorities say more than 76,000 people have fled their homes in areas of Kursk, where Ukrainian troops and armour poured across the border on August 6, reportedly driving as deep as 30 kilometers (19 miles) into Russia and sowing alarm.

Ukrainian forces swiftly rolled into the town of Sudzha about 10 kilometers (6 miles) over the border after launching the attack. They reportedly still hold the western part of the town, which is the site of an important natural gas transit

The Ukrainian operation is taking place under tight secrecy, and its goals - especially whether Kyiv's forces aim to hold territory or are staging a stunning maneuver that caught the Kremlin's forces unawares counters Russia's unrelenting effort in recent months to punch through Ukrainian defences at selected points along the front line in eastern

Russia has seen previous incursions into its territory during the nearly 2 1/2-year war, but the foray into the Kursk region marked the largest attack on its soil since World War II, embarrassing President Vladimir Putin and constituting a milestone in the hostilities.

The advance has delivered a blow to Putin's efforts to pretend that life in Russia has largely remained unaffected by the war. State propaganda has tried to play down the attack, emphasizing the authorities' efforts to help residents of the region and seeking to distract attention from the military's failure to prepare for the attack and quickly repel it.

Retired Gen. Andrei Gurulev, a member of the lower house of the Russian parliament, criticised the military for failing to



properly protect the border. He noted that while the military has set up minefields in the border region, it has failed to deploy enough troops to block

enemy raids. Regrettably, the group of forces protecting the border didn't have its own intelligence assets," he said on his messaging app channel. "No one likes

to see the truth in reports, everybody just wants to hear that all is good.'

Putin: Attempt to stop Moscow's offensive

Pentagon moves submarine to Middle East

Major wildfire rages out of control on fringes of Greek capital

A major forest fire was raging out of control on the northern fringes of the Greek capital Monday, triggering numerous evacuation orders for Athens suburbs and outlying areas as strong winds hampered the efforts of hundreds of firefighters and dozens of water-dropping

The blaze that began Sunday afternoon was racing through pine forests left tinder-dry by repeated heat waves this summer. June and July of this year were the hottest months ever recorded in Greece, which also recorded its warmest winter ever.

Authorities were faced with "an exceptionally dangerous fire, which we have been fighting for more than 20 hours under dramatic circumstances," Climate

Crisis and Civil Protection Minister Vassilis Kikilias said mid-morning Monday. The fire was burning mainly on two separate fronts, with some parts in particularly difficult to reach areas on a mountain northeast of Athens, Kikilias said.

The fire department said 685 firefighters, backed by 27 teams specially trained to tackle wildfires and including more than 80 armed forces personnel, were battling the flames. More than 190 vehicles were deployed, while 17 water-dropping planes and 16 helicopters were providing aerial support. A children's hospital, a military hospital, two monasteries and a children's home were evacuated early Monday, while more than two dozen emergency push alerts were sent to cellphones in the area. Several homes were burned, although the exact number was not immediately clear. More evacuation orders were issued for suburbs of the capital as strong winds continued unabated. Fire Department spokesperson Col.

Vassileios Vathrakogiannis said authorities had been faced with more than 40 flareups of the blaze since the early hours of Monday in areas where the flames had somewhat abated.

Three Athens hospitals were put on heightened alert to treat any potential injuries. Paramedics and ambulances provided treatment to two firefighters — one for light burns and the other for breathing problems — while 13 civilians were also treated for breathing problems from the thick smoke, Vathrakogiannis Greece's coast guard ordered all

ferries going to and from the

nearby port of Rafina, which serves mainly the Cycladic islands and Crete, to be diverted to the port of Lavrion due to the fire. Authorities in nearby suburbs opened at least one sports hall and were providing rooms in hotels for evacuees, while yet more suburbs were put on stand-

The police department said 380 police officers with 77 vehicles, 36 motorcycles, three buses and four vans were assisting in the evacuations, and by mid-morning had helped move more than 250 people away from the path of the flames. Bangladesh interim government's Home Affairs Adviser Brigadier General (retd) M Sakhawat Hussain on Monday asked protesters to surrender by August 19 all illegal and unauthorised firearms, including the rifles looted from law enforcers during the recent violence, according to a media

Hussain said that if those arms were not returned to nearby police stations, then the authorities would undertake a search and if anyone is found in possession of unauthorised weapons, charges would be lodged against them, The Daily Star newspaper

Hussain was talking to reporters at the Combined Military Hospital here after visiting the paramilitary Bangladesh Ansar members who suffered injuries during the mass protest that led to the ouster of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina.

Hasina resigned and fled to India last week leaving the country in turmoil following deadly protests against her government over a controversial quota

Hussain said that around 500 people. including students, were killed and several thousand others were injured during the protest.

"A youth was seen in the video taking away a 7.62 mm rifle. That means the rifle was not returned. If you did not hand over (out of fear), hand over the firearms through anyone else," he said. Hussain said they would investigate to identify the youth in civilian clothes who opened fire at Ansar members. However, he toned down yesterday's comments about shutting down media outlets if they publish or broadcast false or misleading news.

"I said it out of anger. It is not my job," he said. "I never support shutting down any media."

Last Thursday, Nobel laureate Muhammad Yunus took oath as the head of an interim government replacing Hasina. A 16-member council of advisers was announced to assist Yunus in running the state's affairs.

 $B^{\text{usinesses in Bangladesh are}}_{\text{facing a liquidity crunch as}}$ the central bank has capped the withdrawal of cash from banks at Tk 2 lakh amidst uncertainty in the country following the fall of the Sheikh Hasin-led government, a media report said on Monday. The Bangladesh Bank set a cash

withdrawal limit of Tk 2 lakh (Rs 1.42 lakh approximately) per account on Saturday, increasing it from the Tk 1 lakh announced earlier.

The central bank decided this due to security concerns as police are yet to return to work fully, following the clashes between police and students during the widespread protests against Hasina's Awami League-led government over a

Interim Finance and Planning Adviser Salehuddin Ahmed on Sunday also said that the limit on cash withdrawals was required given the current sit-

Businesses, especially those mainly dealing with cash transactions, said they would be in a tough situation if the cash crisis lingers and restrictions remain next week, The Daily Star newspaper reported.

Ahmed, a former governor of Bangladesh Bank has said that the top priority of Bangladesh's interim government is to bring the economy back on track and restore the people's trust in the

Talking to reporters on Saturday for the first time after assuming office, Ahmed said the government's priority is to restore the trust of common people in the banks while resuming the operations of the central bank.

Business owners said their operations have halted since the second half of July when the widespread protests erupted. Abu Bakar Siddique, an oil

wholesaler in one of the largest kitchen markets in Dhaka, Karwan Bazar, said his bank would not allow more than Tk 1 lakh to be withdrawn. "This is a big problem. As a

result, the normal pace of business is being disrupted," the report quoted him as saying. He said most business transactions are being conducted through bank-to-bank transfers or real-time gross settlements. Taslim Shahriar, deputy general manager of a major commodity importer and processor, "We have to pay in cash too, but

now, transactions are only taking place through bank-tobank transfers and cheques. The sooner this problem is resolved, the better for us," Shahriar said. A senior official of another

major commodity importer and processor said, "As such, I am unable to pay the full salaries to those who are daily wage earners. I told the workers to wait this week as there is no way I can manage cash

Asserting that daily wage earners are facing a very difficult situation, the official said, "It's inhumane for them. If this situation persists for long, it will be very difficult to conduct

However, he said it will not substantially hinder activities if it lasts a short time.



"Complying with the orders of the Supreme Court of Pakistan, a detailed court of inquiry was undertaken by Pakistan Army, to ascertain correctness of complaints in Top City Case made against Lt Gen Faiz Hameed (Retd)," the Inter-Services Public Relations (ISPR) - the media wing of the army- said in a state-

"Consequently, appropriate disciplinary action has been initiated against Lt Gen Faiz Hameed (Retd.), under provisions of the Pakistan Army Act," it said. "In addition, multiple instances

of violation of the Pakistan

Army Act post-retirement have also been established. The process of Field General Court Martial has been initiated and Lt Gen Faiz Hameed (Retd) has been taken into military custody," it added.

Lt Gen (retd.) Hameed was considered extremely powerful when he headed the spy agency from 2019 to 2021.

He was appointed to the coveted post when then ISI chief and current Army chief Lt Gen Asim Munir was prematurely removed from the post. It was reported then that then prime minister Imran Khan was not happy with Munir. Later, the army decided to

replace Hameed, a move vehemently opposed by Imran Khan and it is believed that it was the beginning of souring of his ties with the powerful military. The Top City case made headlines when on November 8,

owner of Top City, filed a petition in the Supreme Court in which he accused Hameed of misusing his authority.

He stated in the petition that on May 12, 2017, at the behest of Gen Hameed, ISI officials raided the top city office and his house and seized valuables, including gold, diamonds and money. He also stated that Sardar Najaf, the brother of Hameed, also contacted him to resolve the issue later. The petition also claimed that Gen Hameed later personally met him to resolve the issue. He alleged that the ISI officials extorted Rs 4 crore cash from him. A three-judge bench of the Supreme Court, which included Chief Justice of Pakistan Justice Qazi Faiz Isa, Justice Attar Minullah and Justice Aminuddin, heard the case and decided to send it to the

Major domestic appliances market sees 18% value-based growth in first half of 2024, says report

The market of major domestic appliances saw an 18 per cent value-based growth in the first half of 2024, helped by a strong demand for essential household items, according to a report from GfK. The growth in MDA (major domestic appliances) market was led by Key categories such as airconditioners and refrigerators, which reported a growth of 30 per cent and 7 per cent, respectively.

"This growth is 3X of growth in 2023 over the previous year," said the report from GfK, which is now an NIQ Company, a leading global market and intelligence firm.

The small domestic appliances market recorded a 29 per cent increase in value, reflecting heightened consumer interest convenience products, according to the

The report also added that customers are now looking for feature-rich and premium

products, which is fuelling the value growth in the appliance segment. Now washing machines with capacities of 9kg or above have recorded an "impressive growth rate of 30 per cent", which is driven by consumers seeking enhanced performance and innovative features.

Similarly, the air-conditioner segment is benefiting from similar trends, where demand for energy-efficient and highperformance models has grown by 59 per cent in the split inverter and 5-star segments. "Cooling appliances (refrigerator) have seen an 11 per cent increase in the sideby-side, French door, and 3/4 door segments," it said.

The report also suggests that despite such gains, the relatively low penetration of these products presents significant opportunities for industry expansion.

The smartphone and mobile phones segment had a 6 per cent reduction in volume, it was offset by a substantial 10 per cent increase in overall

Gold rises 200, silver rallies `1,000 per kilogram

Gold prices rose by Rs 200 to Rs 72,350 per 10 grams while silver prices rallied by Rs 1,000 per kg in the local mar-ket here on Monday amid firm global trends.



If the U.S. Goes another direction, there's a few potential candidates. Assistant Kara Lawson, who won gold as a player in 2008 and also guided the inaugural 3x3 U.S. Team in 2021 to first place could be on the list. A trio of WNBA coaches experience with USA Curt Miller, Basketball: Stephanie White and Tanisha Wright also could be considered.

A dark horse could be Las Vegas Aces coach Becky Hammon. She hasn't been involved with USA Basketball at all yet and played for Russia in the 2008 Olympics. Yet no WNBA coach has been more successful the last few years than Hammon, who has led the Aces to back-to-back WNBA championships. With the Aces' core of Wilson,

Kelsey Plum, Chelsea Gray and Jackie Young potentially back in 2028, Hammon would certainly endorsement.



Indian shuttlers sign off Paris Games on dismal note

m ndia}$ became so used to a badminton medal from the Olympics in the last 12 years that Paris 2024 seems nothing short of a disaster.

Lakshya Sen emerged as a notable bright spot with a fourth-place finish, but the badminton team, including medal contenders such as PV Sindhu and Satwiksairaj Rankireddy and Chirag Shetty, returned emptyhanded from the Olympics for the first time in over a decade. The hopes of a medal were not mispiacea, Sinanu was there again eyeing a hat-trick of medals, the ever-tenacious HS Prannoy (men's singles) had finally made it to his debut Olympics, and Ashwini Ponnappa and Tanisha Crasto (women's doubles) seemed in

decent form. As for Lakshya and Satwik-Chirag, they were seen as potential podium finishers even before the first match was

During the Paris cycle, badminton received considerable support too, including 13 national camps and 81 foreign exposure trips, funded under the Target Olympic Podium Scheme

The Sports Authority of India's (SAI) Mission Olympic Cell allocated Rs 72.03 crore, the second-largest funding among the nearly Rs 470 crore spent Índia's Olympic preparations

disciplines. significant Despite the investment, the results in Paris fell short of expectations, highlighting the unpredictable nature of Olympic competition and also the mental aspect of playing at such an event.

Nothing demonstrated it more than Lakshya's implosion first in the semifinals against Viktor Axelsen and then in the bronze olay-off against Lee Zii Jia of Chinese Taipei.

Sindhu, who had received Rs 3.13 crore in support, was unable to progress beyond the pre-quarterfinals, missing the chance to become the first Indian to win three Olympic

"I am a little disappointed as he could not finish it. I am disappointed that we could not wın one medai in badminton. The government, SAI, and TOPS have done their bit. It is high time some of the players also need to take some responsibility," Lakshya's coach and former All England

champion Prakash Padukone. The unexpected defeat of former world number one Satwik and Chirag was the most shocking of all and added to the dismay, as they were gold-medal The government had backed

the players extensively, including Rs 26.60 lakh and Rs 9.33 lakh sanctioned for Sindhu and Lakshya's training in Germany and France, respectively. Sindhu, a silver and bronze winner from the past two editions, had a 12member support team in Saarbrucken during her training ahead of the Games but she failed to overcome He

Bingjiao of China. Satwik and Chirag had won two titles in four BWF World Tour finals this year and numerous medals in major events such as 2023 Asian Games, 2022 Commonwealth Games and the 2023 Asia Championships.

The government spent a total of Rs 5.62 crores on the celebrated Indian duo for the Paris cycle but they were upset by Malaysia's Aaron Chia and Soh Wooi Yik in the quarterfinals, prompting their Danish coach Mathias Boe to quit coaching.

Prannoy, a bronze-medallist at 2023 World Championships and Asian Games, received Rs 1.8 crore for training but was hindered by Chikungunya ahead of the Games, leading to a loss in the

e-quarterfinals Ashwini and Tanisha, who received Rs 1.5 crore each in support, exited the tournament after failing to win any match

in the group stage.
Despite the setbacks, Lakshya demonstrated resilience and skill, finishing fourth -- a notable achievement for an Indian male shuttler.

His victories over Indonesia's Jonatan Christie and Chinese Taipei's Chou Tien Chen were commendable, though his losses to eventual champion Axelsen and Zii Jia from comfortable positions exposed

some major frailties. As one looks ahead to the Los Angeles Games in 2028, it remains to be seen whether the 29-year-old Sindhu can

maintain her fitness. However, there is optimism Satwik-Chirag and Lakshya will leverage their Paris experience.

With emerging talents like Priyanshu Rajawat and Treesa Gopichand Jolly-Gayatri poised to make an impact, India's badminton prospects remain promising for the next

From Paris to Los Angeles: How city preparing for 2028 Olympics

Tt's Los Angeles' turn for the torch. ■Mayor Karen Bass accepted the Olympic flag at the Paris closing ceremony Sunday, before handing it off to a key representative of LA's local business - Tom Cruise - who in a prerecorded trek via motorcycle, plane and parachute kicked off the countdown to 2028. The city will become the third in the world to host the games three times as it adds to the storied years of 1932 and 1984. Here's a look forward and back in time at the Olympics in LA. LA'S OLYMPIC TRILOGY: Los

Angeles got the 2028 games as a consolation prize when Paris was picked for 2024.

Back in 1932, LA hosted its first Olympics. The city was the only bidder for the games at a time marred by the Great Depression and the absence of several nations. Yet memorable sport moments came from athletes including American athlete Babe Didrikson Zaharias, who won golds in the new women's events of javelin and hurdles. Financial and cultural success gave 1984 a reputation as the "good" Olympics" which made seemingly every major world city want their own. Emphasizing both the modern and the classical with a hand from Hollywood,

the games opened with decathlon champion Rafer Johnson lighting the torch, a guy in a jetpack descending into the Memorial Coliseum and theme music by "Star Wars" maestro John Williams. With Eastern Bloc countries boycotting, the U.S. Dominated. Carl

Lewis and Mary Lou Retton are among the athletes who became household names. A young Michael Jordan led the men's basketball team to gold. The games renewed, for a while, the

global reputation of a city that had been erceived to be in decline.

"We want our games to be a modern games, youthful, full of the optimism that Southern California brings to the world and the globe," Janet Evans, fourtime Olympic gold medalist in swimming and chief athlete officer for the LA 2028 organizing committee, told The Associated Press in Paris.

"It's a no-build games," Evans said. After Paris' innovative opening ceremony on the Seine River, LA plans to open with a traditional, stadiumbased approach at SoFi Stadium in neighboring Inglewood that also incorporates the century-old Memorial

Coliseum in Los Angeles itself. Home to two NFL teams, SoFi has hosted a Super Bowl and several Taylor Swift concerts since opening in 2020. It will become what organizers say is the largest Olympic swimming venue ever. Its opening ceremony role means swimming will come after track and field for the first time since 1972.

Intuit Dome, the soon-to-open Inglewood home of the NBA's Clippers, would be the games' newest major venue and is the planned home for Olympic basketball. The Lakers' downtown Crypto.Com Arena will host gymnastics.

The toxicity of swimming in the Seine became a serious issue in Paris. That could put renewed focus on the Long Beach area waterfront when it hosts marathon swimming and triathlon races. Its cleanliness history is mixed but its ocean waters got consistently high marks in a 2023 analysis by

Lyles feared bronchitis after positive COVID test, but now pushes through with new career goals

sthma didn't stop Noah Lyles Afrom taking on the 200 meter at the Paris Olympics, even after testing positive for COVID-19. Despite fears of bronchitis and

conflicting reports about his fever, Lyles won a bronze medal just two days after his positive test. He was concerned more about the virus' severe symptoms than his temperature, which his coach Lance Brauman claimed rose to

"Anytime I've had COVID, it's never been about the temperatures. It's always been about the body aches, the chills, the headaches and the cold," Lyles told The Associated Press on Sunday. He spoke during an interview about his new Visa campaign involving his mother, Keisha Caine Bishop, who narrated a 30-second reel with her son.

Lyles said his temperature reached no higher than 99 degrees. The only reason he would have pulled out is if the symptoms of bronchitis had become worse.

Then asthma joining in on that and making it even worst, that was our worst fear," he said. "We were in the medical bay underneath the track. Their biggest concern was me getting bronchitis because we didn't want something to get infected and the asthma really starts to take form. We really

had to jump on top of that." Lyles added: "If that was the case, I probably would have had to get a trip to the hospital, for sure." During the Paris Olympics, the 27year-old Lyles has had a whirlwind experience. He became the world's fastest man in the 100 meters before his decision to race in the 200. He faced some criticism about his participating in the race and possibly infecting others, but the U.S. Olympic and Paralympic Committee had no issues with Lyles competing. Lyle has embraced becoming

somewhat of an anti-hero. He's used to hearing the criticism about him being overly confident, but he notes that many don't understand his journey toward improving his self worth. Along with asthma, Lyles said he

dealt with dyslexia, anxiety, depression and attention deficit hyperactivity disorder. "Those are all prime bullying targets right there," he said. "I was

getting bullied in school. It was

very hard, and I was already not

doing well because I'm not a going through that. Going through the school system, it made me feel

like I was stupid. I felt like none of traditional learner. It was very hard my gifts I have now were worth anything.

Lyles pushed through the skeptics,

to accommodate some of the top players, so that they get a feel of the red-ball cricket ahead of the (Test) series against Bangladesh," a source close to the development told PTI. India are slated to play two Test matches against Bangladesh - from September 19 at Chennai and from September 27 at Kanpur.

While it is up to Rohit and Kohli to play in the event, some other prominent players such as Ravindra Jadeja, Áxar Patel, KL Rahul, Shubman Gill, Shreyas Iyer Kuldeep Yadav etc are expected to be available for this tournament fully or

Graham Thorpe took his own life after battling with depression and anxiety, reveals wife

Former England cricketer Graham Thorpe took his own life after a struggle with depression and anxiety fuelled by his failing health in the last two years, his wife Amanda has

The 55-year-old passed away on August 5. Thorpe's demise was announced by the England and Wales Cricket Board and now his wife has revealed in an interview to former England captain Michael Atherton that he had a long mental and physical battle with himself before he took his own life.

"Despite having a wife and two daughters whom he loved and tho loved him, he did not get better," Thorpe's wife was quoted as saying by 'The Times'. "He was so unwell in recent

times and he really did believe that we would be better off without him and we are devastated that he acted on that and took

A ceremony was held before the start of a match between the Farnham Cricket Club and the Chipstead Cricket Club last Saturday in memory of Thorpe, which was attended by his wife and their daughters Kitty (22) and Emma (19).

"For the past couple of years, Graham had been suffering from major depression and anxiety. This led him to make a serious attempt on his life in May 2022, which resulted in a prolonged stay in an intensive care



His wife revealed that despite his work assignments, Thorpe continued to suffer.

"Despite glimpses of hope and of the old Graham, he continued to suffer from depression and anxiety, which at times got very severe. We supported him as a family and he tried many, many treatments but unfortunately none of them really seemed to work," she said.

The report added that the family is now considering starting a foundation in his name. Thorpe's daughter Kitty said he

was "not the same person" after a point and that he "could not see a way out". "He had loved life and he loved

us but he just couldn't see a way out. It was heartbreaking to see how withdrawn he had become," "It was strange to see this per-

son trapped in the body of Dad. That's why we've been so happy that the many reflections have been about his life before this illness took over.

I am glad that's how everyone does remember him, rightly so, as the complete character he

High hopes, disappointing show: Indian boxers come a cropper at Paris

The Indian boxing contingent, I that featured two reigning world champions in Nikhat Zareen and Lovlina Borgohain, entered the Olympics hoping for an unprecedented medal haul, only to crumble under pressure, leaving behind a trail of disappointment in a medal-less cam-

Boxing became a medal hope for India after Vijender Singh's historic bronze at the 2008 Beijing Games. MC Mary Kom added a women's bronze to it in 2012. Although the 2016 Rio Games saw the boxers return without a medal, Borgohain clinched a bronze at the Tokyo Olympics to revitalise the sport.

Expectations were high from Paris and observers of the game felt at least one, if not two medals, could be expected from the six boxers who qualified.

Two-time world champion Zareen (50kg), Borgohan (75kg), and 2023 world championship bronze-medallist Nishant Dev (71kg) were all seen as strong podium contenders. **POOR SHOW:** But when it came to actual competition, the Indians never seemed to have the momentum needed to go deep into the tournament. With the exception of Nishant,

who was denied a podium finish after a contentious result in his quarterfinal, the rest struggled with Borgohan and Zareen unable to overcome formidable opponents, and Amit Panghal (51kg) failing to match his previous form.

Borgohain, Panghal and Nishant needed just two wins to secure

Although Borgohain and Zareen were handed challenging draws, with both encountering formidable opponents in their second rounds. However, given that they entered as reigning world champions, the two were expected to overcome such challenges or, at the very least, put up a resilient fight.

However, they succumbed rather meekly to their Chinese

Zareen, who was considered a potential gold medallist, was markedly off-colour in the second round and later revealed that she had been taking some extreme measures to stay inside the prescribed weight limit, that left her exhausted for actual competition. She opened her campaign with

a scrappy win and then lost to Wu Yu in the second round. Borgohain once again fell to old foe Li Qian, who seems to have the Indian's number, having defeated her in three of their four meetings.

Among the men,. Panghal looked a pale shadow of his sharp and aggressive self against Zambia's Patrick Chinyemba, who lost in the very next round. Jaismine Lamboria, who came in after dropping down to 57kg weight class from her more comfortbale 60kg division, expectedly lost to Tokyo Olympics silver-medallist Nesthy Petecio.

Nevertheless, Preeti Pawar (54kg) delivered a commendable performance in her bout against reigning world silver-medallist Yeni Marcela Arias. GOVERNMENT FUNDING:
