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Modi reaffirms India's role as Vishwa Bandhu

Prime Minister Narendra Modi on Saturday said India has become a food surplus country and is also working to provide solutions for global food and nutritional security. Inaugurating the 32nd International Conference of Agricultural Economists (ICAE) at the National Agricultural Science Centre (NASC) Complex in the national Capital, which is being organised in India after 65 years, Modi said, "now India is a food surplus country," he said, adding that the country is the number one producer of milk, pulses and spices across the world. Also, the country has become the second-largest producer of foodgrains, fruits, vegetables, cotton, sugar and tea. "There was a time when India's food security was a concern for the world. Now, India is working to provide solutions for global food security and global nutritional security," he said at the conference, attended by about 1,000 delegates from around 70 countries. Therefore, Modi said, India's experience is valuable for discussions on food system transformation and will benefit the global south. The Prime Minister reiterated India's commitment to global welfare as a 'Vishwa Bandhu'.

He highlighted various mantras put forward by India on various fora, including 'One Earth, One Family and One Future', 'Mission Life' and 'One Earth One Health'. He underlined India's approach of not viewing the health of humans, plants and animals in silos. "Challenges before sustainable agriculture and food systems can only be

tackled under the holistic approach of One Earth, One Family and One Future," he said. Modi emphasised the importance of the agriculture sector in the Indian economy and highlighted the work done by his government in the last 10 years for the growth of the farm sector in a sustainable manner. "Agriculture is at the centre of India's

economic policies," he said. In Indian agriculture, 90 per cent of farmers own very little land, and these small farmers are the biggest strength of India's food security, Modi said. He pointed out that a similar situation is prevalent in several developing countries in Asia, making India's model applicable. The Prime Minister also said India has provided 1,900 new climate-resilient varieties of crops in the last 10 years. India is promoting chemical-free natural farming, he added. He also said the country is moving towards achieving the 20 per cent ethanol blending target petrol. The conference will highlight India's proactive approach to global agricultural challenges and showcase the nation's advancements in agricultural research and policy. The Prime Minister also acknowledged the seriousness of the nutrition challenge, along with water scarcity and climate change. He presented Anna, Millet, as a solution given the superfood's quality of minimum water and maximum production. Modi expressed India's willingness to share millet basket with the world. In his speech, he also talked about how India is leveraging digital technology in the agriculture sector.

Ripple effect of Israel, Iran tension in Delhi

Even as tension flares up in West Asia, the Delhi Police has reviewed the security of the Israeli Embassy and Chabad House following alerts from the intelligence agencies in the wake of the killing of a Hamas leader in Tehran. A multi-layered security has already been put in place with several CCTV cameras installed around both the structures. According to a senior officer, more personnel may be deployed, if required. On July 31, Hamas leader Ismail Haniyeh and his bodyguard were killed in an airstrike that hit a residence where Haniyeh was staying in Tehran as a guest. According to sources, senior officers of the Delhi Police force have held a meeting to plan a massive security net around the two Israeli buildings in the national Capital. This came after the Delhi Police debunked rumours of an "explosion" at

the Embassy, calling it a hoax. The police said on X that it was a fake alert before deleting the post. Meanwhile, the Indian Embassy in Israel on Friday issued an advisory for the Indian nationals living in the country to stay vigilant and "adhere to safety protocols". "In view of the prevailing situation in the region, all Indian nationals in Israel are advised to stay vigilant and adhere to the safety protocols as advised by the local authorities. Please exercise caution, avoid unnecessary travel within the country and stay close to safety shelters," the Embassy of India in Israel posted on X. Air India has already cancelled its flight to Tel Aviv in the wake of escalating tensions in West Asia. In the past three years, two low-intensity blasts have taken place near Israeli Embassy in the national Capital. No one was injured in the both attacks. Security around the Israeli Embassy was upped after a war between Israel and Hamas broke out last year. In December last year, a low-intensity blast was heard near the Israel Embassy in the high-security Lutyens' zone, triggering concern among the Indian security and intelligence agencies and prompting them to carry out an extensive search in the area. During this operation, a letter addressed to the Israeli Ambassador was recovered at the spot. Following the back-to-back assassinations of Haniyeh in Tehran early on Wednesday and top Hezbollah commander Fuad Shukur in Beirut the evening before, international diplomats have scrambled to head off a full-fledged regional war after Iran and its regional proxies vowed to retaliate.



Fresh trouble in Manipur

Shots were fired and an abandoned house was torched in Manipur's Jiribam, triggering fresh tensions within a day of the Meitei and Hmar communities reaching an agreement to make efforts to restore normalcy in the district, officials said on Saturday. An abandoned house in Lalpani village was torched by armed men on Friday night, they said. "It is an isolated settlement consisting of a few Meitei houses, and most of those were abandoned after violence broke out in the district. Miscreants, who are yet to be identified, took advantage of security lapses in the area to commit the arson," an official said. The armed men also fired several rounds of shells and gunshots, targeting the village, he said. Security forces were rushed to the area following the incident, he added. Representatives of the Meitei and Hmar communities reached an agreement in a meeting held at a CRPF facility in adjoining Assam's Cachar on Thursday. The meeting was moderated by Jiribam district administration, Assam Rifles and CRPF personnel. Representatives of the Thadou, Paite and Mizo communities of the district were also present in the meeting.

Narco-terror links cost J&K Govt staffers' job

The Jammu and Kashmir Government on Saturday dismissed six employees, including five constables of the Jammu and Kashmir police and one teacher of the Education Department for terror links and involvement in illegal and anti-national activities. According to a statement issued by the Department of Information and Public Relations, J&K Government, the activities of all these employees had come to the notice of law enforcement and intelligence agencies, as they found them deeply involved in activities prejudicial to the interests of the State. So far fourteen employees have been dismissed from their services since June 2024. Four employees, including two

police constables, one school teacher and one lineman of the Jal Shakti Department were dismissed from their services on July 24, and four others were dismissed on June 8. In November 2023, while addressing a gathering in New Delhi, Lieutenant Governor Manoj Sinha claimed that approximately 55 Government employees and workers have been dismissed for promoting terrorism. This action will continue until such individuals who have facilitated terrorism are dealt with, he said. The Lieutenant Governor invoked Article 311(2)(c) of the Constitution to sack the six employees after a thorough investigation revealed their links with a narco-terror network run by Pakistan's Inter-Services Intelligence (ISI) and terror outfits operating from Pakistani soil.

Sharing details, the spokesman of the DIPR, J&K, in a statement said, one of the dismissed selection grade constables identified as Saif Din son of Quasim Din resident of Shigani Bhallesa District Doda A/P Javid Nagar, Bali Charana Naki Tawi, Jammu, was a notorious drug peddler, a habitual offender and a mastermind for distribution of narco terror funding. He is a deeply motivated and committed drug peddler as well as a Over Ground Worker for the terrorists of a proscribed terrorist organisations like Hizbul Mujahideen. He had established drug channels which are being used by anti-national agencies/ elements to smuggle weapons, and narcotics and to facilitate infiltration of terrorists in J&K, he said. The spokesman said, Farooq Ahmad Sheikh, Head Constable in Police Department son of Ab Aziz Sheikh resident of Ibkoote Tangdar, District Kupwara, along with two other employees namely Khalid Hussain Shah and Rahmat Shah (both working as Constables in J&K police) received huge consignment of narcotics from drug smugglers across the LoC from Pakistan occupied J&K.

Over 10K stranded pilgrims rescued from Kedarnath

The operation to rescue pilgrims stranded along a rain-ravaged trek route to the Himalayan Kedarnath shrine in Uttarakhand entered its third day on Sunday. More than 10,500 people have been evacuated, some airlifted by air force helicopters. Officials said around 1,300 pilgrims are stranded in Kedarnath, Bhimbali and Gaurikund, and are safe. Personnel of the State Disaster Response Force (SDRF), the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF) and police are engaged in the rescue operation. The Indian Air Force's Chinook and MI17 helicopters airlifted some pilgrims from the area on Friday.

Rudraprayag Superintendent of Police (SP) Vishakha Ashok Bhadane dismissed rumours of a large number of people missing following a cloudburst near the trek-route. "Almost all reported individuals have reached home," the official said and appealed to the public not to believe rumours. She said, "Many people may not be able to contact their families due to poor network and bad weather." The pilgrim, who died in a landslide near Tharu camp at Lincholi on Friday, was identified as Shubham Saharyap. He was a resident of Saharanpur in Uttar Pradesh, District Disaster Management Officer Nandan Singh Rajwar said.

Kejriwal Govt took most Cabinet decisions sans discussion: Document

In an unusual practice, the Arvind Kejriwal Government has taken majority of the Cabinet decisions by "circulation" in the past three years. This means no discussion has taken place among the Ministers and officers concerned of the Delhi Government and Cabinet agenda dictated from the top. Even the Chief Secretary and concern Heads of Departments were not kept in the loop during the Cabinet discussion. The document accessed by The Pioneer shows the numbers of decisions taken by the Cabinet through circulation were 15 in 2024 (as on July 31, 2024) and only six were in physical modes. Similarly, the number of decisions taken through circulation in 2022 are 17 out of 21 and in the year 2023 this number rose to 29 circulation and only a meager five are through deliberations and physical mode. The Cabinet decisions taken through circulation in 2024 include Delhi Solar Energy Policy, 2023, Budget Session of Delhi Legislative



Assembly, approval of the Delhi-Ghaziabad-Meerut Corridor of Regional Rapid Transit System (RRTS), proposal for implementation of Business Blasters Scheme (seniors) for GNCTD Universities and it is, proposal for approval of additional project cost due to enhanced compensation of land in Delhi Mass Rapid Transit System (DMRTS) Phase-I & II and its release thereof. "Cabinet meetings (Council of Ministers) are central to governance. In the meetings,

deliberation takes place at length and views of every Minister are ascertained along with the presentation by the department. "The Department concerned pilots the proposal through the proper presentation before the Cabinet and thereafter it is deliberated upon and discussed before giving the final decision by the Cabinet," the document said. Notably, the Government approves agenda or proposal through circulation only in an emergency situation.

Inspiring tales of human valour emerge from heart of Wayanad

In the midst of a tragedy of Wayanad's scale, many heart-warming tales of bravery and humanitarian deeds involving high personal risks have come to light as the jumbo efforts to rescue the survivors, if any, of the catastrophic landslides continued on the fifth day. In one instance, while the Indian Air Force played Good Samaritan in saving the lives of two youths from Malappuram district who had reached Soojippara in Wayanad district as part of a rescue team, the fire brigade saved a third youth from the inaccessible rocky terrains in the region on Saturday. The trio had lost their way

on Friday while searching for those trapped in Tuesday's landslides. They spent the whole night atop the rocky hills as they found it difficult to move in the slippery and slushy area. Two of them suffered minor fractures in the fall and they themselves got trapped in the rocky terrain. The police and other State agencies found the going tough and the IAF team was summoned to save the youths. While the helicopter piloted by the IAF crew had to do dangerous manoeuvring to air-lift two of the youths from the treacherous terrain, the third one was saved by the fire brigade using specially made coir.

All the three have been hospitalised as they had suffered minor fractures and exhaustion. In yet another daring rescue operation, officials of the Forest Department saved six members of a family (including four children and their father and mother) who were trapped in a rocky cave atop the Wayanad hills. The family, having lost their dwelling in Tuesday's landslide at Mundakkai, had managed to reach the cave and huddled together amid heavy rain. Officials led by Kalpetta Range Forest Officer K Hashis rescued the tribal family which included four kids aged between one and four. The rescue mission

took four and a half hours one way. "The family is from the Paniya community of Wayanad, and had been stranded in a cave atop a hill overlooking a deep gorge," said Hashis after the family members were brought to a relief camp. Hashis said they had found the mother and a four-year-old child wandering around to find food for her other children and their father who were stranded in the cave. The rescue team of the forest officials has shifted most of the members of the tribal communities in Wayanad to safer places. Hashis said the tribal community survived on forest products and generally avoided interactions with

others. "However, it seems like, due to the landslide and the heavy rain, they were unable to procure any food," he said. The road to be taken to reach the cave where the tribal survivors were trapped was literally a steep slope, very difficult to traverse, especially amidst heavy rainfall. The officers had to tie ropes to trees and rocks to climb, a very risky exercise indeed as they said. He added, "The children were tired, and we fed them with whatever we had carried. Later, after much persuasion, their father agreed to come with us, and we tied the children to our bodies and started our trek back."

GDMC to relocate TB and chest Dept to ground floor

The Government Doon Medical College (GDMC) hospital administration is planning to relocate the tuberculosis (TB) and chest department from the third floor to the ground floor of the OPD building. Informing about this, the medical superintendent of GDMC, Dr Anurag Aggarwal said that following an inspection by a team from Delhi, a decision has been made regarding this move, including the establishment of a separate registration counter for tuberculosis patients. Further, there has been a longstanding intention in the hospital administration to relocate the TB and chest department. Considering this, the hospital administration has planned to soon present this proposal before the newly-appointed principal of GDMC Dr Geeta Jain, he added.

Aggarwal further explained that the initiative to relocate the department will require time for proper implementation, primarily due to the limited space availability at the OPD building. He addressed the insufficiency of space at the OPD building, particularly on the ground floor. Further, the relocation of the TB & chest



department to the ground floor will involve a considerable amount of time as the current departments on the ground floor will also need to be shifted. Aggarwal emphasised that the primary objective behind relocating the TB & chest department aligns with the guidelines stipulating that this department should be situated on the ground floor of the hospital. This strategic placement aims to prevent the spread of the airborne disease by TB patients throughout the hospital, as they traverse staircases or utilise lifts. Additionally, Aggarwal informed that five to seven tuberculosis patients regularly attend the OPD for treatment. He underscored

that tuberculosis primarily affects impoverished individuals residing in slums, attributing the prevalence of the disease to overcrowding and lack of awareness.

Aggarwal emphasised that individuals should not consider tuberculosis a taboo and should promptly seek medical attention. Regarding the symptoms of tuberculosis, he added that individuals with the disease may experience symptoms such as chest mucus, cough, bleeding and fever. Therefore, whenever an individual experiences these symptoms, it is crucial to contact a doctor immediately to prevent the condition from worsening.

Prices of vegetables in Doon affected by Kanwad Yatra and monsoon

The Kanwad Yatra formally ended on Friday, but that and the monsoon season have contributed to the escalation in vegetable prices in Dehradun. Many vegetable vendors have voiced their apprehension over the rapid price surge of vegetables within a brief period. Regarding this, senior inspector of the Agriculture Produce Market Committee (APMC) Ajay Dabral pointed out that limitations in transportation facilities during the Kanwad Yatra and ongoing monsoon have caused a rise in the prices of vegetables by about 10 to 15 per cent. Vegetable vendor Mukul Dev stated that vegetable prices in Dehradun have risen by an average of 10 per cent within a short span. He added that previously, Tauri was being sold at Rs 40 per kilogramme, but now its price has escalated to Rs 60 per kilogramme. Similarly, prices of other vegetables have also gone up. He attributed the reduced vegetable supply during the ongoing monsoon season as the reason behind the increased vegetable prices. "Customers have directly attributed the rise in vegetable prices to the vendors like us. The recent surge in

prices is actually a result of the ongoing monsoon season. Even I had to purchase vegetables in bulk from the market at higher rates," another vegetable vendor Amir Sheikh said. He further added that the soaring prices of vegetables have indirectly impacted the purchasing power of customers. Dabral told this correspondent that the prices of vegetables have indeed risen in recent days. The ongoing monsoon season, combined with the Kanwad Yatra, are identified as the main factors leading to this price rise. He said that the vegetables primarily come from Delhi, Haridwar, Saharanpur and other locations, whose routes were significantly impacted by the Kanwad Yatra. Consequently, the vegetable supply has been affected, further worsened by transportation disruptions caused by the monsoon season. Although the Kanwad Yatra officially concluded on Friday, individuals are expected to continue visiting Haridwar until August 12, resulting in diverted routes and affecting vegetable supply. It is anticipated that vegetable prices will normalise by August 15 in light of these circumstances.

Doctors recommend precautions while wearing lenses

Unnecessary and improper use of coloured or contact lenses can lead to corneal damage and various other eye conditions, doctors here said. They said this following a recent report highlighting a celebrity who experienced corneal damage while wearing a lens during work. Considering this, city doctors here have advised individuals to wear contact lenses only after confirming on the proper precautions and care. Senior eye specialist at the Government Doon Medical College (GDMC) hospital, Dr Sushil Ojha said that many individuals opt to wear coloured and contact lenses for aesthetic reasons. He emphasised that while wearing lenses is not inherently harmful to the eyes, improper usage can pose risks. Ojha differentiated between cosmetic coloured lenses, used to temporarily change eye color and contact lenses tailored to correct vision. He added that incorrect usage or lack of precautions may result in corneal damage, blurred vision, burning sensations, allergies and other complications. He stressed the importance of taking necessary precautions when wearing lenses, such as handling them with clean hands, avoiding dusty environments, using the proper solution for cleaning and storing them in solution when not in use. Additionally, he advised sports players to refrain from wearing contact lenses while engaging in sports activities. Eye specialist Dr Amit Singh emphasised the importance of educating individuals on properly caring for their lenses while wearing them. He noted instances where beauticians in parlours have adorned brides with lenses without proper guidance from eye doctors. Singh highlighted the necessity for individuals wearing lenses to seek advice from professionals regarding lens care and precautions to prevent corneal damage and potential blindness. He stressed the importance of wearing lenses for minimal hours, taking breaks and adhering to the prescribed timeline. Further, he advised against wearing lenses for extended periods. Singh also recommended that individuals refrain from wearing contact lenses while sleeping and advised wearing sunglasses over the lenses when outside, especially in windy conditions. He also emphasised the importance of consulting an eye specialist before choosing any type of lenses, whether they are coloured or contact lenses.

AI in academia: Transforming teaching and learning

The advent of various Artificial Intelligence (AI) tools has brought changes in various sectors with the education sector being one of them. tools, leading to a decline in actual learning. Another university faculty member Navneesh Bharadwaj said that AI is a trendsetter in academics. All learners and educators can get immersive content for education with the help of AI. Meanwhile, youths find AI very useful as it makes their work easier and faster. College student Sakshi Thapa said, "AI is useful because it makes our work easier and faster. It saves us time and doesn't waste our entire day. You just need to input the information and you get the complete answer in a better format. But the problem is that AI has made our minds useless and has reduced our thinking capacity."

At least 17 dead since Wednesday, all stranded persons rescued, claims Govt

At least 17 persons have died in various parts of the State due to heavy rains and landslides on Wednesday night. More than 6,000 persons have been rescued using Indian Air Force (IAF) helicopters and manually since disaster struck. According to the State Emergency Operations Centre (SEOC), two IAF choppers were involved in rescuing stranded pilgrims. The national highway to Rudrapur is open for traffic till Kund. The bridge path to Kedarnath is blocked by landslide at Lincholi while two temporary bridges are damaged by landslide at Rambada. In Uttarkashi district, the national highways to Gangotri and Yamunotri are open though six rural motor roads are blocked in the district. One State highway and three rural motor roads are blocked in Nainital district while three main district roads and four rural motor roads are

Education Dept to appoint 2,906 primary teachers in Govt schools

CM to hand over appointment letters to new teachers on August 14

The Education department will soon make appointments on 2,906 posts of primary teachers. Chief minister Pushkar Singh Dhama will hand over appointment letters to some candidates in a programme organised at his residence on August 14. Prior to this programme, schools will be allocated to these teachers in counselling sessions organised in all the districts on August 10. Education minister Dhan Singh Rawat said that the State government is committed to provide quality education to the students at the primary level. He said that soon appointment of new primary teachers will be made in the schools.

The minister said that appointment letters to some candidates will be handed over by the CM on August 14. He said that district level programmes will also be organised in which local MPs, MLAs, public representatives and officers of the department will give appointment letters to the newly appointed primary teachers. Rawat said that all the district education officers (DEO) have been directed to hold counselling sessions of the eligible candidates. He added that all the DEOs should also ensure that all the eligible candidates are informed about the counselling and the doc-

uments they are required to carry in these sessions. Rawat said that all the districts have been directed to ensure uniformity and transparency in the process of counselling.

Rawat said that in the first phase 2,906 teachers will be appointed in the primary schools of the State. Appointment of 298 teachers will be done in Pauri, 446 in Chamoli, 182 in Rudrapur, 315 in Tehri, 211 in Uttarkashi, 41 in Dehradun, 184 in Haridwar, 190 in Nainital, 142 in Almora, 187 in Bageshwar, 75 in Champawat, 326 in Pithoragarh and 309 in Udham Singh Nagar district. The minister exuded confidence that the appointment of these teachers will change the face of primary education in the State.

AIIMS Rishikesh conducts first full-fledged cadaveric organ donation

Brain dead Sachin's family donated the body following the facility's appeal

The All India Institute of Medical Science (AIIMS) Rishikesh stated to have successfully conducted its maiden full-fledged cadaveric organ donation. This is the first of its kind organ donation initiative in Uttarakhand, too. The medical superintendent of AIIMS Rishikesh Dr Sanjeev Kumar Mittal said that they had appealed to the family members of 25-year-old Sachin (a Kanwadiya, resident of Mahendragarh, Haryana)- he was declared brain dead after being brought there following

a road accident in Roorkee- to donate his organs and they agreed. "Sachin's donated organs have given a new life to three people admitted in two hospitals. While the kidney and pancreas were transplanted to one patient admitted in PGI Chandigarh, the kidney and liver were transplanted to two patients admitted in Institute of Liver and Biliary Sciences (ILBS) in Delhi. Besides, both the corneas removed from Sachin's body have been kept safe in the eye bank and will soon be trans-

planted in the eyes of those who need them," he added. He further said that a green corridor had been made from AIIMS Rishikesh to Dehradun airport with the help of the district administration for transporting various organs to hospitals in Chandigarh and Delhi within the medically stipulated timeline. While thanking the young man's family for the donation gesture, the AIIMS administration said that Sachin's body had been respectfully sent to his residence in Haryana on Thursday. Hailing

the successful initiative, the executive director, AIIMS Rishikesh, Dr Meenu Singh said that AIIMS Rishikesh had not just achieved a milestone in the field of advanced medical technology but it also showcased what human service with the cooperation of the administration could have done to save lives. "Sachin has donated life to many and AIIMS Rishikesh will gratefully remember Sachin and his large-hearted family members forever," she added.

UKAPMB PRESENTS RS 1 CRORE IN CHEQUE TO CM PUSHKAR SINGH DHAMI UNDER DISASTER RELIEF FUND

SC Dalit sub-quota verdict may help BJP boost outreach

The BJP may not have taken a categorical stand at the national level on the Supreme court's landmark decision allowing States to create sub-categorisation within the SCs and STs, but several of its leaders are of the view that the verdict can help the party boost its outreach to the more disadvantaged sections of Dalits.

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has assiduously cultivated the numerically-weaker Scheduled Castes (SCs) in many States, such as Uttar Pradesh, Telangana and Karnataka, over the years, and the apex court's verdict may allow the party to promise these communities with their most coveted wish -- their fair share in Government jobs and schemes, they said.

The erosion of Dalit votes that hit the BJP in the recent Lok Sabha polls has sent its brain trust to the drawing board, as the party looks to reinvigorate its outreach to the community after the opposition's allegation that the Narendra Modi



Government wanted to change the Constitution found some traction in the election. However, a section of the party is of the view that it should tread cautiously on an issue rife with political uncertainty and assess the overall mood within the Scheduled Castes and Tribes before outlining its position.

"Most parties, be it the BJP or the Congress or many regional parties, have refrained from taking a categorical stand. It is because the reaction from within these communities is itself divided. There are divided views within even a party, depending on who you speak to," a party leader said.

What has made things tricky for the BJP is the stand of its ally,

Lok Janshakti Party (Ram Vilas), against the verdict, apparently driven by the fact that its support base of Paswans in Bihar is unhappy with the idea of dividing the Dalit quota along caste lines. LJP President and Union Minister Chirag Paswan has been a staunch BJP ally.

The Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD), the principal opposition party in Bihar, has also come out against any move to fix a sub-quota for different SC communities. However, several BJP leaders, especially in different States where the party has long sympathised with the more disadvantaged among the Dalit castes, have welcomed the Supreme court judgment. Tamil Nadu BJP

President K Annamalai noted in a post on X that the Centre, in its affidavit to the court, had favoured the sub-categorisation. He said the verdict will ensure that the Madiga community receives its due, a reference to the more disadvantaged Dalits who live mostly in Andhra Pradesh and Telangana but are also present in other southern States.

BJP MP Brij Lal, who comes from the Dalit community, had also welcomed the verdict, saying it addresses the disparity within the SCs. Economically and numerically stronger Dalit groups, like Malas in Telangana or Jatavs in Uttar Pradesh, are not considered to be pro-BJP. The Centre formed a high-level committee in January to examine the administrative steps that can be taken to safeguard the interests of SC groups like the Madigas.

The panel has been tasked with recommending ways to ensure a fair allocation of benefits for the most disadvantaged communities within the SCs, which have been cornered by comparatively affluent and influential groups.

CJI highlights Lok Adalat's role in dispute settlement

People get "so fed up" with the matters of courts that they just want a settlement, Chief Justice of India DY Chandrachud said on Saturday while highlighting the role of Lok Adalats as alternative dispute redressal mechanisms. Lok Adalats are forums where disputes and cases pending in courts or at pre-litigation stage are settled or compromised amicably. No appeal against the mutually accepted settlement can be filed.

"Log itna trast ho jate hain court ke mamlon se wo koi bhil settlement chahte hain...Bas court se dur kara dijiye (People are so fed up with the matters of the court that they just want a settlement). This process is the punishment and that is a cause of concern for all of us as judges," Chandrachud said at the commemoration of the special Lok Adalat week at the Supreme court.

The CJI said he got tremendous support and cooperation from everyone including the Bar and the Bench in setting up of Lok Adalat at every stage.



Chandrachud said when the panels for the Lok Adalat were constituted, it was ensured that every panel would consist of two judges and two members of the Bar.

"The purpose behind doing this was to give ownership to the advocates over the institution because this is not an institution which is only run by the judges, and this is not the institution of the judges, by the judges," he said.

"There is so much that we learn from each other. We learnt from the advocates about how much command they have over little procedural issues," the CJI said.

Chandrachud said he genuinely felt that the Supreme court may be located in Delhi but it is not the Supreme court of India, he said. "Since I took over as the CJI, we have made efforts to bring officers from all over the country in the Registry. They bring great amount of inclusion and diversity," he said.

The CJI said the special Lok Adalat began with seven benches initially as "we were sceptical if we would be successful".

"By Thursday we had 13 benches and there was so much work," he said. "Purpose of Lok Adalat has been to take justice to the homes of people and ensure people that we are constant presence in their lives," Chandrachud said.

The week-long special Lok Adalat, celebrating 75 years of the Supreme court, began with the aim to "facilitate amicable settlements of suitable pending cases", in matters that have "elements of settlement".

The top court held the special Lok Adalat till August 3 in an effort to reduce the pendency of cases.



Coast Guard achieves significant milestone

SSB DG to hold additional charge of BSF

Sashastra Seema Bal (SSB) director general (DG) Daljit Singh Chawdhary will hold the additional charge of the Border Security Force (BSF) following the premature repatriation of incumbent Nitin Agrawal, a Government order said Saturday.

Agrawal, a 1989-batch Indian Police Service (IPS) officer of the Kerala cadre, was removed as the BSF DG on Friday by an order of the Appointments Committee of the Cabinet (ACC). Headed by the Prime Minister. A Union home Ministry order issued on Saturday said Chawdhary, a 1990-batch IPS officer of the Uttar Pradesh cadre, will hold the additional charge of the post of BSF DG "till the appointment of a regular incumbent or until further orders, whichever is earlier."



Chawdhary is the DG of the Sashastra Seema Bal (SSB), the force that guards India's frontiers with Nepal and Bhutan. The ACC on Friday ordered similar premature and immediate repatriation of Agrawal's deputy and Special DG (west), Yogesh Bahadur Khurania, to his parent cadre of Odisha.

The Government's decision to remove the two top BSF officers comes against the backdrop of the Jammu region, along the India-Pakistan international border, witnessing a spate of terror attacks leading to killing of number of army and security personnel as well as civilians.

Urban areas rapidly becoming dengue hotbeds: Data

Urban areas are rapidly becoming dengue hotbeds due to climate-induced higher temperatures, erratic rainfall leading to waterlogging, population concentration, and rapid construction.

Inadequate solid waste management and improper water storage practices further exacerbate the problem, contributing to a higher density of the Aedes mosquito, which spreads dengue.

Data speaks. In 2022, a total of 2.33 lakh cases and 303 deaths and in 2023 a total of 2.89 lakh cases and 485 deaths due to Dengue were reported. The urban areas have been contributing 55-58 per cent of the total cases for the last few years, however in 2023 it increased to around 68 per cent.

The highest number of cases have been reported from Karnataka, Kerala, Tamil Nadu, and Maharashtra.

Union Health Secretary Apurva Chandra sounded alarm recently at a meeting saying that with the onset of the monsoon and dengue cases nearly 50 per cent higher than at the same time last year, there was need for a joint action plan with the Urban Development Ministry. "This collaborative effort aims to address the rising dengue cases in urban areas through enhanced surveillance, increased public awareness, and effective vector control measures," he said.

The Secretary said that dengue cases have been increasing over the past four years, year after year.

Although dengue cases generally peak in October, this year's trend shows that, as of July 31, 2024, the number of cases is already almost 50 per cent higher than at the same time last year, he said, indicating that dengue is fast emerging, outbreak-prone, and mosquito-borne viral fever.



However, Chandra asserted that there was no need to panic as "while the number of cases has been rising over the past four years, the Dengue Case Fatality Rate has decreased from 3.3 per cent in 1996 to 0.17 per cent in 2023 due to focused, timely and collaborative efforts."

Chandra was chairing a high-level inter-ministerial meeting (conducted in hybrid mode) to review the dengue situation in nine high-burden states and assess the preparedness of the public health system for the

prevention, containment, and management of dengue, given the onset of the monsoon and the rise in dengue cases.

He highlighted the need for pre-emptive steps and public health measures ahead of the monsoon season, when dengue cases typically peak around August, September, October, and November.

Chandra advised the States to be prepared with effective hospital management of the dengue patients. The Secretary also advised for identification of the hot spots, increased vec-

tor surveillance, geotagging of the cases for taking preventive actions etc. He stated, "We need to ensure the availability of platelets and hospital resources in the health departments to bring down the fatality rate."

He assured all support to the states in combating dengue and encouraged the states to submit their proposals to the Ministry regarding the support they require.

The meeting, held recently included participation from the Ministry of Housing and Urban Affairs (MoHUA) as well as Secretaries and high-level officials from the nine states of Delhi, Gujarat, Karnataka, Maharashtra, Rajasthan, Tamil Nadu, Telangana, Uttar Pradesh, and West Bengal.

Total of 18 municipal corporations including Ahmedabad, Bengaluru, Chennai, Delhi, Hyderabad, and Mumbai virtually participated in the meeting.



Submarine INS Shalki arrives in Colombo

Underlining close defence ties between the two countries, Indian Navy's submarine INS Shalki is in Colombo, Sri Lanka on a two day visit (02 - 04 August). The submarine was accorded a ceremonial reception by the Sri Lanka Navy on Friday, Navy said here on Saturday.

During the visit, the Commanding Officer is scheduled to call on the Commander of the Western Naval Area Rear Admiral WDCU Kumarasinghe, followed by visit and briefing of Sri Lanka Navy personnel onboard. Personnel from High Commission of India in Sri Lanka and Sri Lanka Defence Forces are also scheduled to visit the submarine.

INS Shalki is a Shishumar class diesel-electric submarine, commissioned into the Indian Navy in 1992. This is the first ever submarine to be built in India. Earlier, Kalvari class submarines INS Karanj and INS Vagir had visited Colombo in February 2024 and June 2023 (to celebrate International Day of Yoga).

India set example for world by evacuating students from war-hit Ukraine: Kovind

India set an example for the world by evacuating its students from Ukraine and it could happen after Prime Minister Narendra Modi negotiated with both Russia and Ukraine for a 24-hour ceasefire, former President Ram Nath Kovind said on Saturday.

Delivering the fifth Dr Rajaram Jaipuria Memorial Lecture here, the former President said India is on the path of being a 'vishwaguru' or global leader and called upon the youth to contribute to it. He also gave several examples of how India proved itself to be a global leader, including the recent Nari Shakti Vandan Adhinyam for giving reservation to women in legislature.

Talking about the Russia-Ukraine war, the former President said everyone expected it to be over in a month or two, which is why several Indian students got stuck in the war-struck Ukraine. "When six-eight months passed, the situation became such that it was difficult to survive. The concern of parents of the students was acknowledged by the Government. I am deliberately giving this example, I was in Rashtrapati Bhawan at that time," Kovind said. "I asked why so many Indian students go to Ukraine. I was told medical education is cheap there. Our students got stuck, if something would have happened to them, the Government would have been held responsible. Though it was not the Government's responsibility, parents sent them there, but the Government would have been blamed," he added.

Asserting "our Government set an example", Kovind said they played the role of a global



leader and talked to both nations, Russia and Ukraine, to have a ceasefire for 24 hours. "Both are big nations. Would they have agreed if any other country would have intervened? No," he said. "Our Prime Minister talked to both Russia and Ukraine, and thank god both agreed. For 24 hours, war was paused," Kovind claimed.

He also said the students from other countries like the US, Pakistan and China were also stuck, but their Governments could not evacuate them. "Their leaders were also told to follow the example of India, but they refused. They told the parents you did not ask us before sending the students..." he said. "This is global leadership and India is being recognised as a global leader as of today," he said. Kovind also said that the idea of Vishwaguru does not mean there will be a global Government headed by India. "There used to be a concept of universal Government - it is not that India will become the Head of State and there would be a world capital in India. Countries will remain the same, but our recognition of global leadership will take us to the top," he said. Kovind said the Indian Government has taken a lot of steps to empower the Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes, Backward Classes and women.

Closure of weather advisory offices for farmers slammed

The Congress on Saturday alleged that 199 district agro-meteorological units, which provided farmers at the block-level free-of-cost weather advisory services, were shut down as the NITI Aayog "misrepresented" their role to justify the decision. Congress general secretary in-charge communications Jairam Ramesh shared a media report on social media which claimed that the farm weather advisory offices were shut in March this year as the NITI Aayog "misrepresented" their role and sought privatisation.

"The India Meteorological Department shut down 199 district agro-meteorological units (DAMUs). These agromet units provided all farmers at the block-level free-of-cost weather advisory services, and crucial information related to sowing,



use of fertilisers, harvesting and storing crops," he said. Experts suggest that while the budget outlay for these units every year was around Rs 45 crore, the benefit was around Rs 15,000 crore, Ramesh pointed out.

The shutdown was opposed by Union Minister Nitin Gadkari, and by several key stakeholders, including the Gujarat-based Association of Agrometeorologists, he claimed. "RTI documents now reveal that it was the NITI Aayog that suggested that district agromet services be privatised and monetised. In fact, the Aayog misrepresented their role to justify this decision,

arguing that the agromet units be shut down because data was now automated," he said. "This is untrue - agromet staff customised central forecasts for local use and tailored data for other advisories, such as those related to the use of fertilisers," Ramesh said in his social media post.

"The Aayog's deception and its lack of courage in standing up to the Government when faced with the Government's poor decision-making is illustrative of its role over the last ten years as a mere drumbeater and cheerleader for the non-biological PM," Ramesh said, slamming the public policy think-tank.

Army hospital wins laurels for work in organ transplant

The army's Western Command Hospital on Saturday received a national recognition for its contribution to the field of organ transplantation.

It has been awarded the title of 'Best Emerging National Transplant Retrieval Hospital' by the National Organ and Tissue Transplant Organisation (NOTTO), a senior official said. The Command Hospital of the Army's Western Command (CHWC) is located at Chandimandir in Haryana.

The award was presented by Union Minister of State for Health and Family Welfare Anupriya Patel to the hospital's organ transplant team during the 14th Indian Organ Donation Day function held here on Saturday, the Army said. The CHWC stood out among nearly 300 such hospitals across the nation, demon-



strating excellence in organ donation and retrieval practices, it said.

The introduction of organ donation and retrieval within the armed forces began in the late 2000s, with CHWC launching its programme in 2014.

"Since then, the hospital has successfully performed 75 organ transplant procedures. The CHWC has also achieved several significant milestones for military hospitals in the country like harvesting pancreas from a brain-dead person and retrieving the organs from a cardiac-dead person," the Army said.

Call for finding solutions to mushrooming coaching centres

India needs a comprehensive policy solution to mushrooming of coaching institutes, the Congress said on Saturday and called for a revision of syllabi, more resources for all exam-takers and investments in the quality of education.

Congress general secretary in-charge communications Jairam Ramesh said data provided by the Department of Higher Education to the Rajya Sabha shows that GST collections from coaching institutes have risen rapidly between 2019 and 2024, from Rs 2,241 crore to Rs 5,517 crore.

This represents an astonishing 146-per cent rise in Goods and Services Tax (GST) collections,

some part of which may be attributable to better enforcement, but it also likely comes from the growing market size, he said.

"Worryingly, the GST collections of Rs 5,517 crore in FY24, collected at a rate of 18 per cent, suggests a market of Rs 30,653 crore for coaching institutes annually.

This is an extremely worrying figure, since it corresponds to about two-thirds of the Union Budget's allocation for higher education in FY24," Ramesh said in a social media post. GST figures are likely underestimating the market for coaching institutes, which is notorious for its poor regulation, the Congress leader added.

"India needs a comprehensive policy solution to this mush-



rooming of coaching institutes syllabi need to be revised, and brought in line with school curriculum, more resources need to be made available for all exam-takers, and investments must be made in the quality of education," he said.

His remarks came amid a focus on coaching institutes following the death of three civil service aspirants after the basement of such an institute in Delhi's Old Rajinder Nagar area was flooded due to rains. Ramesh also posted on social

media a written answer on coaching institutes given by Minister of State in the Education Ministry Sukanta Mazumdar in Parliament last week, in which he said keeping in view the growth in the number of unregulated private coaching centres in the country in the absence of any laid-down policy or regulation, the Ministry has circulated the Guidelines for Regulation of Coaching Centre among the States and Union territories on January 16 for consideration by way of an appropriate legal framework.

Education being on the Concurrent list, the States and Union territories need to take further action by way of an appropriate legal framework, Mazumdar said.

MASKED ASSAILANTS RANSACK VENEZUELA OPPOSITION'S HEADQUARTERS

Half a dozen masked assailants ransacked the headquarters of Venezuela's opposition Friday in an escalation of violence against President Nicolás Maduro's opponents after several countries called for proof of his claim he had won the disputed presidential election. Assailants broke down doors and hauled away valuable documents and equipment in the raid around 3 am, opposition leader María Corina Machado's party said. Images published by Machado's party on social media show several walls covered in black spray paint. The raid follows threats by top officials, including Maduro, to arrest Machado, who has gone into hiding while still urging Venezuelans and the international community to challenge Sunday's election results. The Biden administration has thrown its support firmly behind the opposition, recognising candidate Edmundo González as the victor and discrediting the National Electoral Council's official results. González was

tapped in April as a last-minute stand-in for Machado, who has been barred from running for political office for 15 years. The US announcement late Thursday followed calls from multiple governments, including Maduro's close regional allies, for Venezuela's electoral authorities to release precinct-level vote counts, as it has done during previous elections. On Friday, Uruguay recognised González as the winner. The electoral body declared Maduro the winner Monday, but the main opposition coalition revealed hours later that it had collected copies of more than 80% of the country's 30,000 voting tallies - printouts from the electronic voting machines - and that they show González prevailed by a more than 2-to-1 margin. "Given the overwhelming evidence, it is clear to the United States and, most importantly, to the Venezuelan people that Edmundo González Urrutia won the most votes in Venezuela's July 28 presidential election," US Secretary of State Antony Blinken said in a statement. Maduro responded with a quick admonishment: "The United States needs to keep its

nose out of Venezuela!" González, whose location is also unknown, posted a message on X Friday thanking the US "for recognizing the will of the Venezuelan people reflected in our electoral victory and for supporting the process of restoring democratic norms in Venezuela." On Friday, Venezuelan electoral authorities gave an updated vote count, but not the precinct-level tallies demanded. National Electoral Council President Elvis Amoroso said that with 96.9% of tally sheets counted, Maduro's margin of victory was more than 8 percentage points over González: 52% to 43.2%. He attributed the delay in updating results to "massive attacks" on the "technological infrastructure." Blinken's announcement came amid a flurry of diplomatic efforts by Brazil, Colombia and Mexico to convince their fellow leftist to allow an impartial audit of the vote. On Thursday, the governments of the three countries issued a joint statement calling on Venezuela's electoral authorities "to move forward expeditiously and publicly release" detailed voting data.



But it's unclear what leverage the countries have over Maduro, who has shown little desire to rethink his entrenched position. On Friday, Vyacheslav Volodin, speaker of the lower house of Russian parliament, emphasized that Russian election monitors have witnessed Maduro winning a legitimate victory. He accused the US of fomenting tensions in the country. "Washington is playing by its rules, which are aimed at maintaining its

hegemony and expanding its influence," Volodin said. "It doesn't accept any other outcome but the victory of the candidate it backs." Although no ally or anyone in the armed forces has yet to break with Maduro over the contested elections, he faces huge obstacles righting Venezuela's economy without the legitimacy that can only come from a credible election result. Venezuela sits atop the world's largest proven crude reserves

and once boasted Latin America's most advanced economy, but it entered into a free fall marked by 130,000% hyperinflation and widespread shortages after Maduro took the helm in 2013. More than 7.7 million Venezuelans have fled the country since 2014, the largest exodus in Latin America's recent history. US oil sanctions have only deepened the misery and the Biden administration - which had been easing those restrictions - is now likely to

ramp them up again unless Maduro agrees to some sort of transition. "He's counting on being able to wait this out and people will get tired of demonstrating," said Cynthia Arnson, a distinguished fellow at the Wilson Center, a Washington think tank. "The problem is, the country is in a death spiral and there's no chance the economy will be able to recover without the legitimacy that comes from a fair election." Thousands of opposition supporters took to the streets Monday after the National Electoral Council declared Maduro the winner of the election. The government said it arrested hundreds of protesters and Venezuela-based human rights organisation Foro Penal said 11 people were killed. Machado and González addressed a huge rally of their supporters in the capital, Caracas, on Tuesday, but they have not been seen in public since. Later that day, the president of the National Assembly, Jorge Rodríguez, called for their arrest, describing them as criminals and fascists. On Wednesday, Maduro asked

Venezuela's highest court to conduct an audit of the election, but that request drew almost immediate criticism from foreign observers who said the court - which like most institutions is controlled by the government - lacks the independence to perform a credible review. On Thursday, Venezuela's Supreme Tribunal of Justice agreed to conduct the audit and ordered Maduro, González and the eight other candidates who participated in the presidential election to appear before the justices Friday. A spokesman for González said he did not know if the candidate planned to attend. In an op-ed published Thursday in the Wall Street Journal, Machado said she is "hiding, fearing for my life, my freedom, and that of my fellow countrymen." She reasserted that the opposition has physical evidence that Maduro lost the election and urged the international community to intervene. "We have voted Mr Maduro out," she wrote. "Now it is up to the international community to decide whether to tolerate a demonstrably illegitimate government."



Hunter Biden set to be sentenced on gun charges in November

Hunter Biden is set to be sentenced on felony firearms charges in November under an order signed by a judge on Friday. The president's son could face up to 25 years in prison at sentencing set for November 13 in Wilmington, Delaware, but as a first-time offender he is likely to get far less time or avoid prison entirely. Hunter Biden is also facing another trial on tax charges in California set to begin in September. He's charged in that case with failing to pay USD 1.4 million in taxes. President Joe Biden, who dropped his reelection bid last month, has said he will not use his presidential powers to pardon his son or lessen his sentence. Hunter Biden was convicted of three felonies after lying on a federal form to purchase the gun by saying he wasn't a drug user in 2018, a period when he has acknowledged struggling with addiction. US District Judge Maryellen Noreika, who was nominated to the bench by former

Republican President Donald Trump, will decide how much time, if any, Hunter Biden serves behind bars at the sentencing scheduled to fall shortly after Election Day. He was supposed to plead guilty to misdemeanour tax offenses and avoid prosecution in the gun case if he stayed out of trouble for two years in a deal with prosecutors last year. However, the agreement fell apart after Noreika questioned unusual aspects of the proposed agreement, and the lawyers could not resolve the matter. Hunter Biden is also pushing for dismissal of both the tax and gun cases against him, citing a ruling in Florida that threw out a separate prosecution of Trump after his attorneys argued the Justice Department special counsel in the case was improperly appointed. Hunter Biden is also being prosecuted by a special counsel appointed by Attorney General Merrick Garland. A representative for his legal team did not immediately respond to a message seeking comment on the sentencing.

Two Israeli airstrikes in the northern West Bank killed nine Palestinian militants on Saturday, Israel's army said, as violence flared again in the Israeli-occupied territory with tensions high over the war in Gaza. The Israeli army said its forces first struck a vehicle in a rural area northwest of the city of Tulkarem in early morning, killing the five occupants. The army said they were on their way to carry out an attack. The Palestinian Health Ministry said the men's bodies were taken to a nearby hospital. Hamas later identified all five as militants with the group, including a local commander. According to an Associated Press journalist and witnesses, the blast took place along a road connecting the Palestinian villages of Zeita and Qaffin. "We came to the site and found a young man martyred here on the street and half of his face was missing," said Taiser Abdullah, a Zeita resident who said he had been going to work when he heard the strike nearby. The official Palestinian news agency Wafa said four of the bodies were "burned and charred beyond recognition".

Israel's army says airstrikes in northern West Bank kill 9 Palestinian militants

Later Saturday, Israel's military said it killed four other Palestinian militants in the Tulkarem area shortly after they opened fire on Israeli troops operating in the area. No further information was immediately available. Over 590 Palestinians have been killed by Israeli fire in the West Bank since the Israel-Hamas war began in Gaza in October, according to the Palestinian Health Ministry. Most have been killed during Israeli raids and violent protests, but the dead also include bystanders and Palestinians killed in attacks by Jewish settlers. The northern West Bank has seen some of the territory's worst violence over the past 10 months. Tulkarem, with its two refugee camps, has become one of the main flashpoints and is regularly raided by Israeli forces. Palestinian militant groups, including Hamas and Palestinian Islamic Jihad, are active in the city. The strike came days after the assassinations of Hamas leader Ismail Haniyeh in Tehran early Wednesday and top Hezbollah commander



Fouad Shukr in Beirut the evening before. The escalation threatens to plunge the region into a full-fledged regional war. Iran and its proxies, including Hezbollah in Lebanon, vowed to retaliate against Israel, which said it killed Shukr but has not confirmed or denied its role in the killing of

region. The previous day, President Joe Biden said he had urged Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu to seize the chance for a cease-fire with Hamas, adding that Haniyeh's killing had "not helped" efforts to negotiate an end to the war. Netanyahu has vowed to destroy Hamas' military and governing capabilities. At least 39,550 Palestinians have been killed in Gaza in the nearly 10 months since Hamas' brutal Oct 7 attack on Israel triggered their latest war. That's according to Gaza's Health Ministry, which does not differentiate between civilians and combatants in its count. Israel has accused Hamas of embedding in the civilian population and putting it at risk. Most of Gaza's population of about 2.3 million is displaced, many people multiple times, as Israel's military returns to areas where it says Hamas militants have regrouped. Health services and sanitation have largely collapsed across the territory as hunger grows.

Ukraine has taken delivery of a second Turkish-built navy corvette, officials said, although they did not say specifically how the warships might be used in the war against Russia. Ukraine's first lady, Olena Zelenska, attended the launching ceremony of the Ada-class corvette during a visit to Turkey, the Ukrainian presidency announced on its website. The corvette Ukraine already had was currently undergoing sea trials. Turkish Ada-class ships are typically able to strike planes, other ships and submarines. Ukraine, which has coastlines on the Black Sea and the smaller Sea of Azov, had a small navy at the time of Russia's February 2022 full-scale invasion. But it has developed deadly

uncrewed sea drones that have severely limited Moscow's Black Sea naval capability. The Ukrainian presidency said the corvettes would help protect the country's interests in the Black and Azov seas "but also, in particular, in the Mediterranean Sea and the Atlantic Ocean." "So now the second corvette has been launched," Ukrainian Navy spokesman Dmytro Pletenchuk told The Associated Press. "The next step is to equip it with the appropriate weapons systems and train the second crew." He said a new crew of 100 men would be trained to



work on the ship. International law forbids the passage of warships through Turkey's busy Bosphorus Strait, which links the Mediterranean and Black seas, during times of war. However, the presidency's statement didn't say where exactly the Turkish shipyard was located, meaning it could be on the northern side of the strait, with a direct route to Ukraine. Ukraine ordered the two Turkish corvettes under an agreement signed in 2020, the presidency said. Ukrainian authorities last month adopted a Maritime Security Strategy that aims to rebuild its naval capability. It is also getting help with that from Western partners. The maritime capability coalition, headed by the United Kingdom and Norway, was established last December.

Mourners bury Hamas chief Haniyeh in Qatar as more escalation looms over Middle East

Thousands of mourners converged around the flag-draped coffin of Hamas' slain political chief, Ismail Haniyeh, in the emirate of Qatar on Friday as the fallout surged from his death in an alleged Israeli attack. The funeral ceremony in Doha, Qatar's capital, attended by members of Gaza's militant Hamas and Islamic Jihad groups, as well as Qatari and Iranian officials, was subdued. But across the Muslim world - from Jordan and Morocco to Yemen and Somalia - angry crowds waving Palestinian flags rushed out of mosques after Friday prayers, chanting for revenge. "Let Friday be a day of rage to denounce the assassination," said Izzat al-Risheq, a senior Hamas official. Haniyeh had lived in Qatar, along with other senior members of Hamas's political leadership. Following the back-to-back assassinations of Haniyeh in Tehran early on Wednesday and top

Hezbollah commander Fuad Shukr in Beirut the evening before, international diplomats have scrambled to head off a full-fledged regional war. Iran and its regional proxies vowed to retaliate. Major airlines canceled flights to Tel Aviv, Israel and Beirut, Lebanon. France on Friday beefed up security for Jewish communities nationwide. Poland warned its citizens against travelling to the Mideast. Pakistan and Turkey lowered their flags to half-staff, prompting Israel to summon Turkey's deputy ambassador for a "stern reprimand". Turkey's foreign ministry spokesperson Oncu Keceli shot back that Israel "cannot achieve peace by killing the negotiators" - a reference to Haniyeh's role in the cease-fire talks - as hundreds of Turks gathered at the historic Hagia Sophia to pay tribute to the slain Hamas leader as his funeral service got underway in Doha. "We are sure that his blood will bring out victory, dignity and liberation," senior Hamas official



Khalil al-Hayya, seen as a possible successor to Haniyeh, said from the Doha mosque where Haniyeh's coffin was displayed beside that of his bodyguard who was also killed in the attack in Tehran. Israel has not confirmed or denied its role in the targeted killing of Haniyeh. On Thursday, Israel announced that it killed the shadowy leader of Hamas' military

wing, Mohammed Deif, in a July airstrike. Hamas had previously claimed Deif survived last month's targeted airstrike in the besieged Gaza Strip, where the deadly pattern of Israeli airstrikes and skirmishes continued this week, with 15 Palestinians killed when a Gaza City school was hit on Thursday. At least 39,480 Palestinians have

been killed in Gaza in the nearly 10 months since Hamas' brutal Oct 7 attack on Israel triggered the latest Israel-Hamas war. Palestinian health authorities providing the casualty tolls do not differentiate between civilians and combatants. Tensions were also running high on Israel's northern border days after Israel claimed responsibility for killing Shukr, the Hezbollah commander. On Friday, Hezbollah claimed a series of rocket and artillery attacks on Israel, causing a fire but no casualties in an evacuated Israeli town. Israel claimed its warplanes struck two Hezbollah militants in southern Lebanon who it said had fired the volley of rockets. The exchange was more of the same tit-for-tat that have flared along the Lebanese-Israeli border throughout the Israel-Hamas war. But Israelis and Lebanese were bracing for more after Hezbollah leader Hassan Nasrallah on Thursday declared that the Shukr's assassination in the southern suburbs of Beirut had pushed the war into a "new phase".

From contested Jerusalem, Sheikh Ikrima Sabri, the imam of the holy Al-Aqsa Mosque, mentioned "the martyr Ismail Haniyeh" in his weekly sermon to the thousands of Palestinian worshippers who had come to Friday prayers. "We ask God Almighty to have mercy on him and to grant him a place in His spacious gardens," the imam said, adding that the Palestinians in Jerusalem were mourning the late Hamas leader. Sheikh Sabri was promptly arrested. The Israeli police said they were interrogating him on charges of incitement to violence. "My policy towards instigators is clear - zero tolerance," far-right Israeli National Security Minister Itamar Ben-Gvir posted on X. Across the region, vows by Iran's supreme leader, Ayatollah Ali Khamenei, that Israel would pay the price for killing Haniyeh on Iranian soil quickly led to calls for intense diplomacy to prevent further escalation. Late on Thursday, President Joe Biden urged Israeli Prime Minister

Benjamin Netanyahu to seize the chance for a cease-fire and "move on it now." Netanyahu has sought to portray the recent striking of Hamas leaders as bringing Israel closer to a deal that would free the remaining Israeli hostages held in Gaza. Their distraught families rallied Thursday in Tel Aviv to mark the bitter milestone of 300 days of their captivity. Tor Wennesland, the UN special coordinator for the Mideast peace process, said he was racing to work with Lebanon, Qatar, Egypt and other powers to "prevent a spillover of the conflict". UK Defence Secretary John Healey and Foreign Secretary David Lammy visited Israel on Friday "to push for an immediate cease-fire and drive de-escalation in the Middle East" while Israeli Defence Minister Yoav Gallant said he spoke with his American counterpart, US Defence Secretary Lloyd Austin. "The unprecedented security cooperation between Israel and the United States against Iran and its proxies is critical," Gallant said.

Next round of India-Asean trade agreement review talks soon

The next round of talks for the ongoing review meeting of the India-Asean free trade agreement in goods will be held in November, an official statement said on Saturday.

The third round of the negotiations was concluded on August 1 in Jakarta, Indonesia.

Eight sub-committees have been constituted under the India-Asean Free Trade Agreement Joint Committee for undertaking negotiations on different areas related to the review of the pact.

"The next meeting of the AITIGA (Asean-India Trade in Goods Agreement) Joint Committee will be held in India from 19-22 November 2024," the Commerce Ministry said.

The AITIGA was signed in 2009.

In September 2022, both sides tasked the AITIGA Joint Committee to undertake the review to make the agreement more trade-facilitative and mutually beneficial.

During the third round of



negotiations in Jakarta, Indonesia, all eight Sub-Committees dealing with national treatment and market access, rules of origin, standards, technical regulations, customs procedures and trade facilitation held substantive discussions.

"The review of AITIGA, signed in 2009, will help create further opportunities for businesses on both sides to enhance the level of India-Asean trade," the ministry said.

ASEAN is an important trade partner of India with about 11 per cent share in India's global

trade.

India's exports to the 10-nation bloc ASEAN were USD 41.2 billion in 2023-24, while imports aggregated at USD 80 billion in the last fiscal.

Both sides are aiming to conclude the review in 2025.

The review of the AITIGA was a long-standing demand of Indian businesses.

India is asking for a review of the agreement to eliminate barriers and misuse of the trade pact.

Asean members include Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand, and Vietnam.

Finance Ministry asks insurers to speedily disburse claim amount to victims of Wayanad landslide

The finance ministry on Saturday asked public sector insurance companies including Life Insurance Corporation of India (LIC) to speedily disburse the claim amount to landslide victims and their families in Wayanad and other districts of Kerala.

The insurance companies have initiated efforts for reaching out to their policyholders through various channels (local newspapers, social media, company websites, sms, etc) to provide the contact details for assistance in the districts of Wayanad, Palakkad, Kozhikode, Malappuram, and Thrissur, where a significant number of claims are being reported, the finance ministry said in a post on X.

"In view of the unfortunate landslide incident and heavy rains in Kerala, the government has mandated the Public Sector Insurance companies (PSICs), including LIC, National Insurance Corporation, New India Assurance, Oriental Insurance, and United India Insurance to extend all possible support to the victims



of the calamity so that the insurance claims can be expeditiously processed and paid," it said.

LIC has been asked to speedily disburse the claim amount in respect of the policyholders under the PM Jeevan Jyoti Bima Yojana, it said. The documentation required for processing of claims has been relaxed comprehensively to ensure speedy dispersal of the claim amount, it said.

It further said, the General Insurance Council will coordinate with the insurance companies to ensure that claims are processed and paid expeditiously and will host a portal for all insurers to report claim status daily.

The central government and finance ministry remain committed to supporting the victims of this calamity and ensuring they receive the necessary assistance without delay and trouble, it added.

Atmanirbhar should not degenerate into inefficient import substitution: Ex-RBI chief

Due to supply disruptions caused by the Russian-Ukrainian war, many countries started thinking about being self-sufficient with respect to 'critical imports' and India needs to ensure that "Atmanirbhar" should not degenerate into inefficient 'import substitution', former RBI Governor C Rangarajan said on Saturday.

Addressing the 14th convocation of the ICFEI Foundation For Higher Education, he said India's development strategy should be multidimensional and growth may be stimulated by raising investment rate, emphasising agriculture, manufacturing and services, absorbing new technologies and promoting a mix of sectors that are employment friendly.

"Any import substitution must look at cost. Expensive, import substitution is not to the advantage of anybody. What we need to do is efficient import



substitution. Atmanirbhar should not degenerate into the old style import substitution. I think that is contrary to what is good for our country," he said.

Jobless growth is certainly a matter of concern. But job creation without growth is equally bad even as the new technologies can not be ignored, the former Chairman of the Prime Minister's Economic Advisory Council said.

"Job creation is going to be the toughest challenge ahead not only in India but the world over," he said.

Based on some

assumptions about the future exchange rate of rupee and domestic inflation, India needs to have an average annual real rate of growth of six to seven per cent to achieve over USD 13,000 per capita income by 2024.

According to him, though, India need not belittle what it has achieved, there is an inescapable need to strengthen higher education in terms of quality and effectiveness.

The three dimensions of the reform of higher education are access, equity and quality, Rangarajan opined.

FICCI CASCADE organises awareness rally about illicit trade, impact on economy

FICCI Committee Against Smuggling and Counterfeiting Destroying the Economy (CASCADE) on Saturday organised an awareness rally against illicit trade and smuggling of counterfeit products that have a negative impact on India's economy.

According to the 2022 FICCI CASCADE study, there has been a significant rise in the illicit trade market across critical industries such as FMCG-packaged foods, FMCG-household and personal goods, alcoholic beverages and tobacco products.

The rise in size of illicit trade market can be gauged from the fact that in the 2010-2020 period, the FMCG packaged foods segment in particular witnessed an alarming rise of nearly 600 per cent when the market grew from Rs 20,378 crore in 2010 to Rs 1,42,284 crore in 2020, FICCI CASCADE said in a statement.

Flagging off the auto rally for awareness, Praveen Khandelwal, Member of Parliament, said, smuggling has a crippling effect on our economy and many illicit



players use funding from those sources to boost terror funding.

"I also request FICCI to conduct awareness drives of this nature in every state and I will exhort the retailer community to participate wholeheartedly in these initiatives. I will also engage in discussion with the FICCI CASCADE team to see how we can move towards eradicating this menace," he said.

Smuggling activities not only have a debilitating impact on the economy in the form of job losses and revenue leakages, but they also have implications on national safety and security, FICCI CASCADE Chairman Anil Rajput said.

"Sometimes, illicit players use smuggling as a route to enter Indian markets, we should ensure that smuggled goods do not infiltrate our markets," Rajput said.

Classic Legends to open 200 Jawa-Yezdi showrooms every year

this expansion reflects our dedication to giving our patrons the best experience possible from the time they enter our store until they ride out on their brand-new motorcycle. We are optimistic that this facility will help us add many more enthusiasts to the clan."

To a query, he said, "Right now our average age of a customer is between 21 and 32 years old. 80 per cent of our customers or bulk of our customers are in this age group. Our Jawa 42, Jawa 42 Bobber, Jawa 350 are doing very well (in the market). The Adventure is a steady seller. Roadster is a big seller for us," Joshi said the company was working on electric vehicles

and it would be introduced into the domestic market when the charging infrastructure was ready.

Elaborating, he said, "I sell you a motorcycle, which can do 300 kms (as per charging of a battery). But again it will take 5-6 hours to charge the battery. Because the fast charging network is not available. I will put a fast charger in the bike but if it cannot be supported, it will take higher than two hours to charge. You need charging infrastructure, higher voltages (to charge the vehicle battery)."

On the launch of the BSA range of motorcycles, he said, "BSA Company is launching BSA motorcycles in India.

Currently one model will be launched. Like it launched BSA motorcycles across the world. It is expected to launch on August 15," he said.

In 2016, Mahindra and Mahindra Ltd acquired the British two-wheeler major BSA Company for about Rs 28 crore.

Joshi said in the five and half year of operations in the Indian market, two years were impacted due to COVID-19 outbreak and the company was just a three and half year old firm.

"Maybe, we are the youngest in the country or in the world. In 3.5 years, we have put out 8-9 products, 3-4 engine platforms, and so many other product platforms. I do not think there is any other company that works as quickly as we do," he said.

The company on the occasion of new dealer outlet, also showcased the upgraded Yezdi Adventure offered at Rs 2.09 lakh (ex-showroom).

"With the newly launched Yezdi Adventure, we are disrupting the category with the perfect trinity of bold design, advanced features and unbeatable performance," Joshi said.

With India emerging as the hub of Global Capability Centres, a report on Saturday revealed that 78 per cent professionals expect the GCC sector to become a catalyst for creating jobs, particularly benefiting temporary workforce in the country.

A majority of 78 per cent foresee GCCs as catalysts for creating new job opportunities, particularly benefiting gig workers and the temporary workforce in India, said a report by HR Services and Workforce Solutions provider Genius Consultants.

This optimism about job creation reflects a positive outlook on GCCs' potential to diversify and expand employment avenues in the evolving job market, the survey stated.

The report on GCCs and their potential impact on the Indian industrial market is based on an analysis of inputs from 1,033 professionals.

Almost all the respondents agreed on the pivotal role that GCCs play in advancing the adoption of cutting-edge technologies such as Artificial Intelligence (AI), cloud computing, and Internet of Things (IoT), said the report.

This consensus underscores GCCs' significant



contribution to enhancing India's technological landscape and fostering innovation across various sectors, it added.

The report also said that an overwhelming 94 per cent of respondents believed that GCCs will positively influence and enhance India's overall economic output.

This sentiment underscores the perceived role of GCCs in stimulating economic growth through increased investments, technology transfer, and job opportunities, it added.

However, a small fraction (3 per cent) holds a contrasting view.

Among those participated in the survey, 84 per cent expressed confidence that the establishment of GCCs by multinational corporations in India will lead to improved job availability and increased opportunities for local professionals.

This sentiment reflects the belief that GCCs not only bring advanced technological capabilities but also contribute positively to the local job market by creating diverse employment opportunities, the report noted.

"The findings of our report underscore the growing recognition of GCC as pivotal to enhancing organizational agility and competitiveness in a globalised economy. With a majority of respondents acknowledging the strategic benefits of GCCs, it is clear that these centres are poised to play a transformative role in shaping the future of India's industrial landscape," Genius Consultants CMD R P Yadav told PTI.

Organisations that capitalise on this trend stand to gain a significant advantage in terms of operational efficiency, innovation, and market responsiveness, he added.

SBI profit rises 4 per cent in April-June on higher provisions, lower core income growth

State Bank of India (SBI) on Saturday reported a 4.25 per cent growth in its consolidated net profit in April-June quarter at Rs 19,325 crore, held back by a rise in loan loss provisions and lower growth in core income.

On a standalone basis, the profit growth was much slower at almost flat pace of 0.89 per cent during the quarter at Rs 17,035 crore.

SBI chairman Dinesh Kumar Khara, whose over four years stint at the helm will be ending soon, said the first quarter is generally slow and there were "distractions" which limited the growth. He said the bank is confident of growth picking up in the remainder of the fiscal year, and achieving his aspiration of the largest lender reporting a net profit of Rs 1 lakh crore in FY25.

The core net interest income grew 5.71 per cent to Rs 41,125 crore on the back of a 15 per cent advances growth and the domestic net interest margin narrowing by 0.12 per cent to 3.35 per cent.

The other income declined to Rs 11,162 crore in the latest first quarter from the Rs 12,063 crore recorded in the year-ago period, and the fall was attributed by Khara to the change in regulation that led to the reclassification of investment book.

Khara declined to comment



on the impact of the RBI's draft norms on liquidity coverage ratio, but pointed out that the critical number for the bank stands at 129 per cent whereas it has a comfort level of taking it down till 110 per cent. The deposit growth came at 8 per cent, and Khara said the bank will be able to fund the credit growth target of 15 per cent even if the deposit growth is sustained at the same level. However, he added that the bank would want to increase the deposit growth to 10 per cent.

He, however, made it clear that the bank will not want to compromise on NIMs in the process and hinted that more hikes in deposit rates are not in the offing. It will target to keep the NIMs in the 3.2-3.4 per cent range, the chairman said.

Khara explained that the bank has been able to manage with a lower deposit growth because it had put its accretions in the past into investment book

which is now being deployed for advances.

Corporate loans grew by over 15 per cent during the quarter, while retail -- the mainstay in the last few years -- was slower at less than 14 per cent. Khara said within corporates, it is the mid market segment which grew 20 per cent where the bank sees maximum opportunity.

Large corporates have many alternatives like the bond markets to go to, Khara said, adding that the current corporate loan pipeline stands at Rs 4.62 lakh crore.

On the asset quality front, the bank witnessed fresh slippages of Rs 7,900 crore, with a major Rs 3,000 crore of it coming from personal and home loans.

Khara said a few states' inability to pay employee salaries on time led to slippages of Rs 1,600 crore but was quick to add that the amount has been recovered as

the salaries came in.

The gross non-performing assets ratio improved to 2.21 per cent during the quarter as against 2.24 per cent in March.

The loan loss provisions jumped 70 per cent to Rs 4,580 crore, which included Rs 2,488 crore for the ageing assets, Khara said, asserting that there is no challenge on the asset quality front and he does not expect the quantum of money being set aside going up under his successor C S Shetty.

Khara said the RBI's increase in risk weights on assets led to a calibration on the personal loans front, but stressed that there is no adverse impact on the quality of the book and the GNPA's continue to be under 1 per cent.

The bank has formed a dedicated 500-member team of relationships managers to improve the current account deposits by engaging with private sector clients, including family offices and trusts as well, Khara said.

"We were known as a corporate lender for a long time, now we have oriented ourselves to be a corporate banker," he added.

It has also revamped the wealth management business by putting together a 2,000-member team of specialist relationship managers, he said, stressing that the benefits it will accrue will ensure that the cost to income ratio does not get impacted.

DEEPIKA FAILS TO DECODE OLYMPIC PUZZLE

INDIA'S ARCHERY CAMPAIGN ENDS

Deepika Kumari placed herself in an advantageous position against Korea's Suhyeon Nam by winning two of the first three sets but shot a horrible 7 with the second arrow of the fourth set to throw away a great opportunity as India's archery campaign folded at the Paris Olympics here Saturday. Deepika had begun the day well with a 6-4 win over Germany's Michelle Kroppen but lost by the same margin to Nam, who had won the women's team gold on Friday. Teenager Bhajan Kaur was eliminated earlier in the day after losing her pre-quarterfinal match to Indonesia's Diananda Choirunisa in a shoot-off. Competing in her fourth Olympics, Deepika yet again

left the big stage empty-handed. However, there was no hope around her this time, following disappointments in London, Rio and Tokyo editions. The fourth place finish by Ankita Bhakat and Dhiraj Bommadevara in the mixed team event was India's best performance in archery in Paris. Leading 4-2, Deepika aced a 10 to start the fourth set but fell into the red zone with a seven after the Korean shot a 10 and a nine. Nam did not make any mistake on her final shot, making a 10 to force a decider. In the fifth set, the Korean began with a 10 and Deepika followed with a nine. Nam managed a 9 and 10 on the following shots but Deepika got only two 9s to lose the quarterfinal 4-6.

Even in the second set, which she lost, Deepika had fluffed the second shot, managing a poor 6. "It is disappointing. I don't know how and why I keep losing at the Olympic Games. Maybe the atmosphere gets to me. It's the weight of own expectations," Deepika said after her defeat, admitting it was her best chance to do well. "Those were bad two shots and I feel like I have gifted her the match." Coach Purmina Mahato explained that after taking the anchor position, the archers need to release early to stand a better chance of scoring well. "Ideally, you should have your shot within 5-7 seconds of taking anchor position. If you hold, all kinds of thoughts start coming to your mind. She held that shot long (6 in second set) and the second time (7 in

fourth set) she released it early due to pressure," said Mahato. The coach said India needs a consistent supply of archers but does not think that it's time for Deepika to quit. "She must continue. People do well, win medals in this sport, even when they age." Meanwhile, the 18-year-old Bhajan did well to stretch her Indonesian rival to a shoot-off but fluffed the first shot by managing an eight when she needed a 10 to secure her passage into the last eight. "Certainly I was lacking in something, that's why I lost. I will work on that when I go back home," Bhajan said after her 1/8 elimination round match. Asked if she felt the nerves going into the shoot-off, she said, "Wo toh poore match mein hi rehta hai (nervousness remains throughout)," she said

with a chuckle. "I was not thinking of shooting a 10, I was just focussed on following the process," she said. "I have learnt a lot from this campaign," she added but could not explain what, and again let out a smile. After disappointing results in other team events, the mixed team of Ankita Bhakat and Dhiraj Bommadevara was on Friday in line to win a bronze but finished fourth. Coach Mahato said she had told the archers not to think about the results and just stay focussed on shooting. "We told them, do not think about win or loss, just shoot. It's 90 percent mind game. You have to be mentally strong. "Bhajan fought well but missed that last shot. We were actually assured that she will do well."

Heartbreak for shooter Manu

The sensational Manu Bhaker's dream of a grand treble went up in smoke after she lost the tie-shoot for bronze medal to Hungarian Veronika Major by the narrowest of margins in the women's 25m sports pistol event at the Olympic Games here on Saturday. In a high-quality final, Bhaker gave it her all and was placed No.1 among eight shooters for a brief period, but she could not maintain her consistency and eventually finished fourth. Nonetheless, the 22-year-old will return home with her twin bronze-medal feat in women's 10m air pistol and mixed team 10m air pistol partnering Sarabjot Singh. The affable Indian shot 28 in the final to be tied at third place along with Veronika after the eighth series of five shots. She missed two of the five shots to aggregate three points, while Veronika drilled in four bullets into the target to clinch the third spot, leaving Bhaker to pack up the kit and leave her firing station. Expectations were really high from Bhaker to bring home a hat-trick of medals given her awe-inspiring form. She stood up to the challenge even after slipping to sixth position early in the final. Bhaker conceded at the end of the contest that she was nervous, and no matter how hard she tried to remain calm, she couldn't. "I got like really nervous about it, but again, I was trying my best to keep calm and to just try to do my best. But that was not enough," Bhaker said after the event. The first series was a disaster in



which Bhaker missed three out of five targets, but gradually she cut down on the errors and bounced back in the second and third series, shooting two consecutive 'fours' to take her points tally to 10 going into the elimination round. The elimination round was topsy-turvy to say the least. Bhaker's chances waxed and waned until she took the top spot for a brief period in the seventh series (fourth elimination round). However, South Korea's Jin Yang wrested back the top spot immediately even as Bhaker slipped to tied third with a rank bad three misses in the eighth round, which saw her slump from second spot to joint third with Veronika on 28 points. The shoot-off was nerve-jangling for both the markswomen and Bhaker had three clear shots out of five on target, while Veronika had

four. The ace shooter said that she will take a lot of positives from the fourth-place finish and come back stronger in the Los Angeles Games in 2028. "It (Olympics) turned out to be very good for me, but well, there's always a next time so I'm already looking forward to the next one (in LA)," she said. "I'm glad that I got two medals, but right now, I'm not very... Well, fourth place is not a very good place," said Bhaker with tears in her eyes. Her finish just outside the medal bracket once again brought back memories of fourth-place finishes of Indian shooters in the quadrennial showpiece. She joined the likes of Joydeep Karmakar (men's 50m rifle prone, 2012 London), Abhinav Bindra (men's 10m air rifle, 2016 Rio) and Arjun Babuta (10m air rifle, 2024 Paris Olympics), among others.



Lakshya aims to dial up 'Sen-mode' against Super Dane Axelsen in semis

India's Lakshya Sen will need to play out of his skin to keep his maiden gold medal hopes alive when he takes on the reigning Olympic champion Viktor Axelsen in the men's singles semifinals at the Paris Games here on Sunday. Making his Olympics debut, Sen created history on Friday after becoming the first Indian individual male shuttler to reach the last four of the showpiece with a 19-21 21-15 21-12 win over Chinese Taipei's Chou Tien Chen in an intense quarterfinal match. The Indian will have yet another uphill task at hand when he takes on Axelsen, the baby-faced badminton giant, who has terrorised his opponents in the last few years. The 30-year-old from Odense, Denmark, has won the Tokyo gold and Rio bronze, two world championship titles in 2017 and 2022, a Thomas Cup triumph in 2016 and multiple BWF world tour and Superseries titles to experience a dominating run as world No. 1 from December 2021 to June 2024. Sen, a 2021 World championships

medallist, has lost seven times to the super Dane, who faced defeat just once against the Indian at the 2022 German Open. The 22-year-old, however, has shown little to no respect for the past records against his higher-ranked opponents so far as he plotted the downfall of world number 4 Jonatan Christie in the group stage and Chou, ranked 11, in the quarters. Axelsen has looked a tad subdued this season with just one title at the Malaysia Masters. The Dane also suffered an ankle injury in early June during the Singapore Open and was forced to withdraw from the Indonesia Open. Sen, on the other hand, hasn't looked fitter in his career. He has been rock solid in his defence as he covered the court well and played at a high pace. His ability to produce winners at will has held him in good stead. The 1.94m-tall Dane has an all-rounded game and is known to rain down brutal smashes from a great height. Axelsen, who received a bye in the pre-quarterfinals, had just

one real challenge in the quarterfinals but he got past former world champion Loh Kean Yew of Singapore without much ado. In their eight meetings, only two matches have gone to three games, including the contest in Muelheim an der Ruhr. After seeing off the speedy and consistent Chou in a gruelling three-gamer on Friday, Sen will be now backing himself to prevail if it goes the distance against the Dane. Axelsen had robbed him of All England glory two years back when he beat him in the final. Then there were those twin losses in the 2021 BWF World Tour Finals and Sen will be itching to return the favour at the world's biggest stage. A semifinalist gets two chances to return with a medal. A win will keep Sen on course for Indian badminton's maiden Olympic gold, while a loss will give him a shot at the bronze medal in the play-offs. "There's lot more work to do. Now, the real test starts," Sen had said after his quarterfinals. For Sen, who wears "Sky is the limit" tattoo on his neck, only the gold can quench his hunger.

Denied spot in Paris by Dutch Olympic committee, Weber leads Portland Classic

Denied a spot in Paris because the Dutch Olympic committee didn't think she was good enough to contend, Dewi Weber shot a 10-under 62 to take the second-round lead in the Portland Classic. Weber qualified for the Olympics under International Golf Federation standards, but was left out because of the country's separate standards for all sports to meet a realistic chance of a top-eight finish. "We're two rounds in, so we'll see how this all unfolds and if I can really make a statement," Weber said. "Of course it's in the back of my mind because it's the week before the Olympics. It was something that I was looking forward to... "It sucks, but all we can do is like try to prove why those standards were so silly, and I

really hope to do that on Sunday." Playing only her second LPGA Tour event of the year, Weber had nine birdies in an 11-hole stretch in her afternoon round at Columbia Edgewater, making seven birdies in a row on Nos. 5-11. She closed with a birdie on the par-4 18th for a two-shot lead over first-round leader Polly Mack and past champion Andrea Lee. "Very easy, very relaxing, not really putting my pressure on myself," Weber said. "Just like roll that ball as well as I can and see what happens." The 28-year-old former Miami player also had seven straight birdies Thursday in an opening 66. She the final eight holes Thursday and the first 13 Friday in 16 under - and was 16 under overall for 36 holes in pursuit of her first LPGA Tour title. "I did a really good job both



days of just going shot for shot, which I know is such a cliché but I've never been able to really do that," said Weber, who has four top-seven finishes in 11 starts this year on the Epson Tour. Defending champion Chanettee Wannasaen shot a 70 to get to 6 under.

Siniakova and Machac win gold but keep relationship status top secret

Katerina Siniakova and Tomas Machac hugged and kissed each other when they won the 2024 Olympics mixed doubles tennis gold medal for the Czech Republic on Friday night, then laughed about keeping their relationship status "top secret." Siniakova and Machac defeated Wang Xinyu and Zhang Zhizhen 6-2, 5-7, 10-8 in a match tiebreaker in the final. Olympics doubles uses a first-to-10, win-by-two tiebreaker instead of a standard third set. Social media has been speculating about where things stand romantically between the new champions, who apparently have been a couple but might no longer be. Machac rolled his eyes when a reporter at the post-victory news conference brought up the topic by asking: "Are you still together?"

"That's our personal life, so you don't need to know that," Siniakova said with a chuckle. "We like when you are confused." Machac chimed in to add: "This is top secret." Siniakova now owns the only two Summer Games tennis titles for her country. She teamed with Barbora Krejickova to win the women's doubles gold at the Tokyo Games three years ago. Siniakova is a doubles specialist who has won a total of nine Grand Slam trophies. The first seven came alongside Krejickova. Since they stopped playing together, Siniakova teamed with Coco Gauff to win the French Open title this June - at Roland Garros, the same site being used for tennis during these Olympics - and with Taylor Townsend to win Wimbledon in July. "I showed myself that I can play well with anyone," Siniakova said, "and I should be more proud of myself."



The mixed doubles bronze went to Gabriela Dabrowski and Felix Auger-Aliassime of Canada, who beat Demi Schuurs and Wesley Koolhof of the Netherlands 6-3, 7-6 (2). Machac's two best results in men's doubles at Slam events came with Zhang as his partner this year. They are good pals and reached the Australian Open semi-

finals in January, then the quarterfinals at the French Open. "Friendship's totally broken," Zhang joked. "He destroyed my Olympic Games." He and Wang leave Paris with a silver medal. Another player from China, Zheng Qinwen, will play in the women's singles gold medal match on Saturday against Donna Vekic of Croatia. Chinese tennis "is getting better," Zhang said. As for what advice the more-experienced and more-successful Siniakova offered Machac ahead of Friday's final, he offered a kidding response, saying she told him: "Ace on the line and winner on the line." Siniakova made clear that her view actually is: "With a team, you are two, so it's really helpful when you communicate and you help each other." Sounds like perfect words of wisdom for a doubles pair.

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Canadian teen McIntosh bringing home impressive haul of medals

Summer McIntosh is really Shaded for a golden birthday. The Canadian swim star turns 18 on Aug. 18, and she has already learned so much about the world - including just how heavy an Olympic medal is. "The first night when I put the silver on my neck I was actually in shock how heavy it was," she said, "because no other medal has been that heavy before." McIntosh is getting a feel for those weighty medallions now

- and has already collected quite a haul for the suitcase going home. A silver in the 400-meter freestyle, and golds in the 400 individual medley and 200 butterfly. Oh, and you bet she's planning on adding another in the 200 IM on Saturday night. Even if she was second fastest out of the semifinals Friday night, finishing in 2 minutes, 8.30 seconds, behind American Alex Walsh's 2:07.45. It's those races when she's not in her tip-top form "I think I learn the most from," she said. McIntosh added she had only

completed in the 200 IM previously in international competition at a Commonwealth Games. McIntosh won the 200 butterfly Thursday night to add a second gold to her total after her 400 IM victory Monday. When McIntosh won the 0.3 fly in an Olympic-record 2:03.03, her mother and 1984 swimming Olympian Jill Horstead jumped for joy and pumped her fist from the stands. This one meant so much to McIntosh because it used to be her mom's signature



race. "So sharing that moment with her was pretty cool," McIntosh said. "I know she's just so proud of me along with the rest of my family." Still, there's no time for much nostalgia. Not yet anyway. She insists her routine is pretty basic when it comes to taking care of herself between races. No word puzzles or reading to clear her mind. A little bit of music is more her style. "It's a lot more simple than probably people think behind the scenes," she said. "All I'm doing is eating and sleeping

other than when I'm not swimming, so just keep it simple and try to rest my brain as much as I do my body. That's kind of what works best for me to prepare for my following races." Canadian teammate Kylie Masse, who won a bronze in the 200 backstroke Friday, is in awe of not only McIntosh's remarkable poise on the world stage but also the ability to quickly switch gears from one event to the next. "It's incredible. For the number of events she swims, it's really impressive," Masse

said. "For me, I had a full day off in between of just training, but to be able to not come here, race, go through the whole process, but for her she's had quite a number of back-to-backs and a 200 at night and a 200 in the morning. It can be really taxing on your body and your mind. So it's really important to turn off, like she said." McIntosh might not have the screaming French fans willing her on for every pull and kick like beloved Léon Marchand, yet she still feels plenty of love from Maple Leaf-waving fans

throughout La Defense Arena. "Being able to represent Canada, it's such an honor," she said. McIntosh might leave Paris with a medal in every individual event she swims and the Maple Leaf draped around her. "It's pretty surreal, I'm not reflecting on it too much right now," she said. "Yeah, while it's been a pretty amazing Olympics for me, but yeah I'm not done yet. I'll have lots of time to celebrate after, but right now I'm just keeping it simple."

India look to find a way past Lankan spinners, slow pitch in second ODI

Measures to battle a sluggish pitch and an assortment of Sri Lankan slow bowlers will feature high on India's strategy list for the second ODI to be played here on Sunday. Chasing a manageable 231, India were comfortably placed at 130 for three in the first ODI on Friday before losing their way against Lankan spinners, who showed enough pluck to bowl out the visitors for 230 to earn a tie.

Once they survived the Rohit Sharma onslaught upfront, Lanka executed their plans well against the Indian batters, who are not the cleverest performers on rank turners, while not many are though. The home side employed their army of twerkers against Virat Kohli, KL Rahul and Shreyas Iyer, the meat of Indian top and middle-order, with a telling amount of success. The trio was not uncomfortable but was unable to break free either against some well-directed moves of the Lankans, who were precise in their calculations. Kohli was tied up by Duni

Wellalage, the left-arm spinner, and leg-spinner Wanindu Hasaranga as the 29 balls that the Indian batter faced out of a total of 32 were by the spinners. Hasaranga eventually nicked him off, while seeing the comfort of Shreyas against spinners, Lankan skipper Charith Asalanka pressed pacer Asitha Fernando into service. Fernando repaid the faith in him with the wicket of Shreyas with a peach, also the only Indian wicket to have fallen to a quick. Rahul, another excellent player of spin, too was snuffed by Hasaranga. But stuttering in one match offers too small a footprint to go after some of the accomplished names, but the Indians will be eager to bat long and rotate strike, which is the key to nullifying spinners on such decks. Sri Lankans Pathum Nissanka and Wellalage showed that en route to their fifties despite a flurry of wickets at the other end, while dealing with Kuldeep Yadav, Axar Patel and Washington Sundar effectively. The four Indian spinners,



including Shubman Gill, leaked 126 in 30 overs for four wickets, while their Lankan counterparts' figures stood at -167 in 37.5 overs for nine wickets. So, the Indians will want to minimise the damage without compromising on their run-making ways. Bowling coach Sairaj Bahutule said as much. "We did bat well in patches, and we could have had some partnerships that would have taken us (home) with less wickets going. We tried our best to get into partnerships," said Bahutule after the first match. One option India can mull is to bring in either Rishabh Pant or Riyan Parag as both are extremely good at countering spinners and can upset their rhythm playing some of those unorthodox shots. Wellalage did that to perfection while scooping and reverse sweeping Washington Sundar and Axar. Additionally, Parag comes in with the bundle offer of being an off-spinner and leg-spinner at the same time. But it remains to be seen whether the Indian team management will make a change after just one match, which has not been their trait for a while now. From Sri Lanka's perspective, they will enter the second match of the three-match series with a better frame of mind after shackling a much superior and vastly experienced opponent. Indian top-order batters will be given ample opportunities to bowl: Bowling coach Bahutule

Bowling coach Sairaj Bahutule indicated that India will continue to give bowling opportunities to their top-order batters as it can work as a "surprise element" to the opposition. Shubman Gill was given a chance to roll his arm against Sri Lanka in the first ODI, which ended in a tie here on Friday, and Bahutule said it will be the way forward even though the opener gave away 14 runs in his lone over. "I think our batters are good bowlers as well, to be honest. You know their primary skill is batting, so at times, they don't focus much on their bowling. But they have the skills," said Bahutule in the post-match press meet. In contrast, Lankan skipper and their premier batter Charith Asalanka bowled 8.5 overs and walked away with returns of three for 30, including the wickets of Shivam Dube and Arshdeep Singh in two successive balls, helping his side to snatch a tie. Bahutule used the example of Suryakumar Yadav and Rinku Singh bowling in the T20Is against Sri Lanka to validate his point. "You might have seen in the T20Is...Rinku and Surya contributed with the ball. So, an opportunity was given to Shubman here. It's going to be an all-rounder's game in the coming days. So, if one or two (batsmen) from the top-order can bowl it will definitely help the team, of course, depending on pitch conditions and situations. Also, it will be a surprise element to the opposition, if a batter can bowl. So, moving ahead there will be ample



opportunities for batters to bowl," he explained. Bahutule said the visitors could have tried to forge better partnerships after starting from the blocks in a blazing fashion. "To have a tie in ODI is always exciting. Yeah, we should have got that one run and finished off the match. Nevertheless, I thought we bowled really well. We did bat well in patches, and we could have had few partnerships that would have taken us (home) with less wickets going," he said. Bahutule admitted that the Lankan spinners used the nature of the pitch to the hilt. "I think the nature of the pitch and the way they bowled...Hasaranga and Asalanka executed their skills very well. We tried our best to get into the partnerships, and Shivam (Dube) also batted well and contributed. But yes, we could have put in that one extra effort of scoring that single run." The former India leg-spinner said the team should have capitalised on the start given by skipper Rohit Sharma, who made a rollicking 58 off 47

balls. It helped India reach 75 in 12.4 overs before the rot set in. "The start given by Rohit was fantastic, and at one stage it looked like we wouldn't lose too many wickets. It (the way Rohit batted) was important when the ball was hard and coming onto the bat. I think it was his first ODI innings after the (50-over) World Cup. "It didn't look like there was a break. He takes on the responsibility, sets the tone against any opposition, any pace attack. He is very positive in his intent." Bahutule rued the fact that Sri Lanka managed to add a few extra runs after being reduced to 142 for six. "They had a partnership after we got them down to 160 for six, maybe we could have got them for 15-20 runs less. But overall, I think the bowlers did well. Arshdeep and Siraj began well and Shivam bowled well on a wicket which was slightly helpful to the spinners. "I think spinners - Washi, Axar and Kuldeep - contributed well. To restrict them to 230 was, I think, a good effort," he added.

My coaching days end here: Boe bows out after Chirag-Satwik fail to win Olympic medal

Mathias Boe, the coach of Chirag Shetty and Satwiksairaj Rankireddy, on Saturday announced his retirement from coaching following the ace Indian badminton pair's exit from the ongoing Paris Olympics. Satwik and Chirag were considered India's biggest medal hope at the Olympics but the Indian duo lost to Malaysia's Aaron Chia and Soh Wooi Yik, the Tokyo bronze medallists, in the men's doubles quarterfinals 21-13, 14-21, 16-21 here on Thursday. Boe, a silver medal winner in the London Olympics, had joined Chirag and Satwik as their coach ahead of the Tokyo Olympics.

"For me, my coaching days ends here, I'm not going to continue in India or anywhere else, for now at least. I have spent too much time in a badminton hall and it's also pretty stressful to be a coach, I'm a tired old man," the 44-year-old from Denmark wrote on his Instagram account. Under Boe's guidance, Satwik and Chirag had claimed a bronze medal at the 2022 world championships and a gold at the 2022 Commonwealth Games in Birmingham. The duo went on to win the Asian Games gold, the Asian Championships title and also achieved the feat of becoming the first Indian badminton doubles team to become world No 1.



The Indian pair additionally won BWF World Tour titles, including the Indonesia Open Super 1000 and Korea super 500 in 2023 and the French Open super 750 and Thailand Super 500 this year, besides reaching three more finals. Their sensational run ahead of

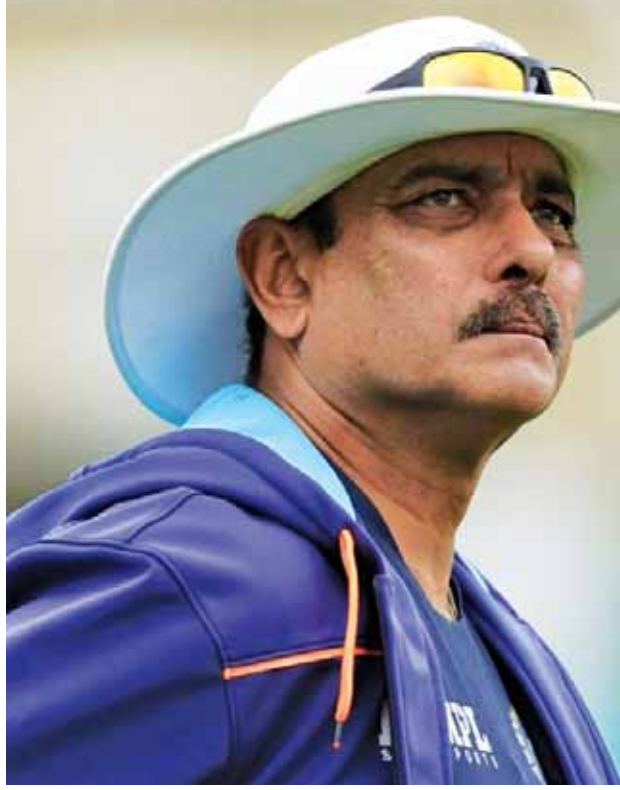
the Olympics made Satwik and Chirag hot favourites for the coveted title but the duo couldn't go the distance at Paris, and Boe consoled them. "I know the feeling all too well myself. Pushing yourself to the limit every day, to be in the best shape of your life, and then things doesn't go as you would have hoped for. "I know you guys are gutted. I know how much you wanted to bring a medal back to India, but this time it wasn't meant to be," Boe said. Boe, however, said he is leaving the position as a satisfied man despite his wards failing to return from Paris with a medal. "You have everything to be proud of, how hard you have worked in this Olympics camp, battling injuries, even taken injections to reduce the pain, that is dedication, that is passion and that is a lot of Heart," he wrote. "You have won so much over the past years and you are going to win so much more in the future."

Bumrah can make ball obey his command: Ravi Shastri

Former India head coach Ravi Shastri stopped just short of calling pacer Jasprit Bumrah a magician with the ball and said his standout moments in the T20 World Cup in the Americas were India managing to thwart Pakistan's charge in the group stage and Rohit Sharma's side pulling the rabbit out of the hat in the final against South Africa. India managed to defend a paltry 119 in their Group A clash against the arch-rivals, winning the contest by six runs with Bumrah changing the momentum of the game by getting rid of the dangerous Mohammad Rizwan to send Pakistan into a free fall when they were chugging along nicely at 80/3. Bumrah then bowled a game-changing spell against the Proteas in the final at Barbados, conceding just four runs in the 16th over before getting rid of the dangerous power-hitter Marco Jansen to take the fight out of the rivals in the chase of 176. "He (Bumrah) just showed the world what it takes...And you know, it's not often in your career when you have a ball in

your hand and you say, 'do this and the ball does that,'" Shastri said in the ICC Review. "I think the India-Pakistan (match) because India were made to fight there and realise what the right combination should be going forward in the tournament. That and then of course the (T20 World Cup) final, those final five overs," said Shastri. Rohit unleashed Bumrah in the death overs on the well-set Rizwan and the wicket shifted the momentum back to India. "I'd say one was Jasprit (Bumrah) getting Mohammad Rizwan. Extremely crucial, because that could have tilted the balance of the game. And it happened on the first ball of a new spell," he added. Shastri said his other favourite moment was Bumrah sending back Jansen. "Brought back into the attack and then getting it to reverse and sneak through bat and pad (of Marco Jansen), I thought that was a very, very important wicket at that time," Shastri recalled. Jansen was the sixth Protea wicket to fall in the 18th over with the South Africans requiring 21 runs for victory off 15 balls. Before that all-rounder Hardik



Pandya removed Heinrich Klaasen in the 17th over, caught by wicketkeeper Rishabh Pant. "Hardik (Pandya) had done

the main damage by taking Klaasen (in the previous over) but I thought back-to-back, that over and that wicket was extremely important."

Bumrah was adjudged 'Player of the Tournament' for his 15 wickets at an average of 8.26 and Shastri compared the 30-year-old to former greats like



the late Shane Warne, Wasim Akram and Waqar Younis. "Very few have done it (change the flow of the game). I thought Wasim (Akram) and

Waqar (Younis) had it in their prime when they played white-ball cricket. Shane Warne had it where he could literally tell the ball, go there, pitch there, hit leg stump," Shastri said. "People who are on top of the game have that ability. I think Bumrah had that in this World Cup," he added. He was all praise for Suryakumar Yadav's stunning catch on the boundary to send back David Miller and reduced the Proteas to 161/7 with just five deliveries remaining in the final. "I think that (catch) was a game changer because you know what David (Miller) can do," Shastri said. "Another big shot (from Miller), and then, you know, the game's in the balance. So, I thought the timing couldn't have been better." Shastri said he was amazed by Pant's resoluteness to return to top-notch cricket after a near-fatal car crash, which left him out of the game for more than a year. "He did his job with the bat, but it was his keeping that really surprised everyone. For someone to recover that quickly and then move the way he did. "He hardly missed anything, albeit he must have felt the pressure as the tournament got on because it's not easy to come back and do all the stuff he did," Shastri added.

Khelif taking Olympic boxing ring after days of gender outcry

Algerian boxer Imane Khelif takes to the ring at the Paris Olympics again Saturday following days of sharp scrutiny and online abuse as misconceptions about her gender have exploded into a larger clash about identity in sports. Khelif meets Anna Luca Hamori of Hungary, whose boxing association planned to contest the matchup with the International Olympic Committee but still let the fight go ahead, in a quarterfinal in the women's 66-kilogram quarterfinals. If Khelif wins, the veteran amateur will secure the seventh Olympic boxing medal in Algeria's history, its first since 2000 and the nation's first ever in women's boxing. Khelif won her opening bout Thursday when opponent Angela Carini of Italy tearfully abandoned

the fight after just 46 seconds. The unusual ending became a sharp wedge to drive into an already prominent divide over gender identity and regulations in sports, drawing comments from the likes of former U.S. President Donald Trump, "Harry Potter" writer J.K. Rowling and others falsely claiming Khelif was a man or transgender. At a Paris Games that has championed inclusion and seen other outcry over an opening ceremony performance featuring drag queens, LGBTQ+ groups say the hateful comments could pose dangers to their community and female athletes. IOC President Thomas Bach on Saturday defended Khelif and fellow boxer Lin Yu-ting of Taiwan. Khelif and Lin were disqualified in the middle of last year's world championships by the International

Boxing Association, the now-banned former governing body of Olympic boxing, after what it claimed were failed eligibility tests for the women's competition. Both had competed in IBA events for several years without problems, and the Russian-dominated body — which has faced years of clashes with the IOC over judging scandals, leadership decisions and financial issues — has refused to provide any information about the tests, underscoring its lack of transparency in nearly every aspect of its dealings, particularly in recent years. "Let's be very clear here: We are talking about women's boxing," Bach said Saturday. "We have two boxers who are born as a woman, who have been raised a woman, who have a passport as a woman, and who have competed for many years as women. And this is the clear definition of a

woman. There was never any doubt about them being a woman." The IBA, which received the unprecedented punishment of being banned from Olympic participation in 2019 following years of conflict with the IOC, disqualified Khelif last year for what it said were elevated levels of testosterone. The IBA, which is led by an acquaintance of Russian President Vladimir Putin, has not released more details on the tests, calling the process confidential. "What we see now is that some want to own the definition of who is a woman," Bach added. "And there I can only invite them to come up with a scientific-based new definition of who is a woman, and how can somebody being born, raised, competed and having a passport as a woman cannot be considered a woman?"

OVERCOMING HIV STIGMA YOUTH BREAKING BARRIERS

In the face of deep-seated stigma and discrimination, young people living with HIV in Goa, are finding hope and resilience through the Human Touch Foundation. **SHOBHA SHUKLA** explores their personal journeys and examines the collective efforts that are transforming their lives and challenging societal norms

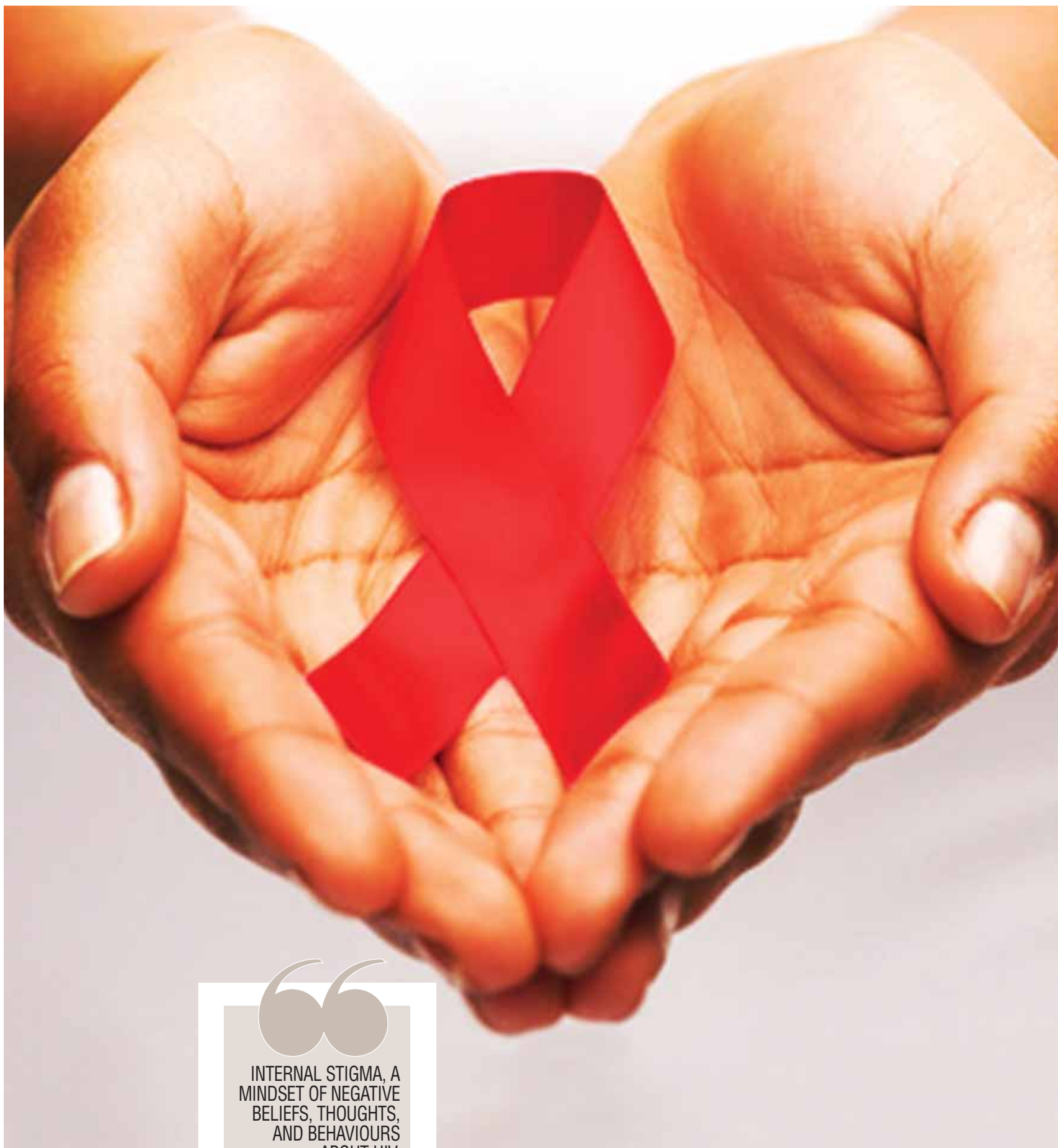

Living with HIV often comes with a heavy burden of internal and external stigma. For many young people, this fear of discrimination can be paralyzing, affecting their ability to live normal lives. HIV-related misconceptions remain a significant barrier for those living with the virus, impacting their mental health, relationships, and opportunities in life. However, through the dedicated support of the Human Touch Foundation, these youths are not only overcoming their fears but also becoming advocates for change in their communities.

THE WEIGHT OF STIGMA

A young person living with HIV shared, "As a young person living with HIV, I had self-stigmatised myself due to the fear of discrimination... fear of discrimination if I dare disclose my HIV positive status to others... this fear had stopped me from living life like a normal person." This sentiment, echoed by many, underscores the profound impact of internal stigma. Internal stigma, a mindset of negative beliefs, thoughts, and behaviours about HIV, manifests as shame, guilt, feelings of contamination, reduced self-efficacy, self-loathing, low self-esteem, and self-rejection. "Internal stigma happens when we internalise external stigma and judgements and believe that they are true. Internal stigma also happens in the absence of external stigma and discrimination," explained Nadine Ferris France, CEO of Beyond Stigma. A youth shared his trauma, "I and my youth peers have confronted HIV-related stigma and discrimination in schools, workplaces, and societal levels. Sometimes, it is the teachers who were not cooperating or discriminating against them. The fear of disclosure – which means sharing our HIV positive status with family members, friends or others in society – the fear of being discriminated, is faced by many... the fear if we would be thrown out of the house or will our friends unfriend us..." The Human Touch Foundation, based in Goa, India, is dedicated to supporting young people living with HIV. The organization provides a comprehensive range of services including mental health counselling, nutritional support, educational and vocational training, and medical assistance. By fostering a supportive community and empowering youth-led initiatives, the foundation addresses stigma and discrimination at multiple levels. Their efforts ensure that those living with HIV can lead healthier, more fulfilling lives while advocating for broader societal change. A young girl living with HIV



shared how the Human Touch Foundation helped her overcome her fears of stigma and discrimination: "From my childhood I have been touched by Human Touch Foundation which helped me overcome my fears of stigma and discrimination related to disclosure – and helped me in various ways." She added, "As I am living with HIV, I faced a lot of stigma and discrimination from my own family as well as from society. People in the society told the family to not let me come out otherwise I will spread the virus to their children. I even faced it in my relationship with one guy. I knew him for one year and had shared everything with him but still he blamed me that I got infected because I have been sleeping with others." Despite these challenges, she found a supportive community within the Human Touch Foundation, which provides a range of services including nutritional counselling, mental

health support, and job opportunities.

PERSONAL TRIUMPHS AND COLLECTIVE SUPPORT

Another young person recounted their journey: "I got to know my HIV status at the age of 13. I was with my relatives because I had lost my parents. That is when I first felt being stigmatised and discriminated against by my own family. For example, I was told not to use the common family nail cutter because if any blood comes out while cutting my nails then it can put others at risk. Or sometimes there were separate utensils for eating food. It used to hurt me." Finding support through the Human Touch Foundation, this individual connected with peers facing similar challenges and received guidance from Peter Borges, the foundation's CEO. "Peter Sir helped me a lot from the very beginning. He helped me with my documents too. We used to

have residential camps back then too, with adolescents living with HIV. I learnt a lot from these camps. Doctors were involved in these camps where we learnt a lot about HIV and how can we overcome problems we face."

THE POWER OF YOUTH LEADERSHIP

The Human Touch Foundation emphasizes the importance of youth-led initiatives in the HIV response. "Youth are the best equipped to lead the response to HIV," said a young intern at the foundation. Sandhya Chavan, Lead for Adolescent Health and Wellbeing, highlighted the comprehensive support provided: "We at Human Touch Foundation provide a range of youth-led services, such as mental health counselling, psychosocial support, help them avail a range of social protection schemes, nutritional packages, medical help, or treatment adherence support, among others." Masooma Sheikh, a

counselling psychologist at the foundation, stressed the need for proper mental health services in HIV care centres and a holistic approach to support young people living with HIV.

A BEACON OF HOPE AND RESILIENCE

As the Human Touch Foundation celebrates its 15th anniversary, its impact is evident in the lives it has touched. Peter Borges reflected on the journey: "Human Touch always had something different to offer when it came to support system or ecosystem which surrounded HIV care and support. For example, young people themselves speaking at different conferences including AIDS 2024 is so important. Lately, the realisation has grown over us about the importance of resilience: we must focus more on building the resilience of the young people. Issues like relationships or livelihoods cannot be missed while young counsellors themselves provide

mental health services." The foundation continues to address various needs, including relationships, sexual and reproductive health, substance abuse, TB and HIV co-infection, and child sexual abuse. Their commitment to non-institutional care and resilience-building for families and communities remains steadfast. The Human Touch Foundation has also been instrumental in initiating viral load monitoring in Goa and ensuring the uninterrupted supply of antiretroviral therapy during the COVID-19 pandemic. They offer free vocational training for young people with HIV, helping them build skills and secure employment. Dr. Kashyap Bandodkar, a volunteer with the foundation, emphasized the importance of humane and holistic care: "Usually patients appear as a 'number or statistic' in a report. But experiences (like Human Touch) tell us the life story behind those numbers or statistics. This help us – doctors – provide better care because I believe that humane and holistic care is so key." The Human Touch Foundation's journey and the stories of those it supports underscore the importance of tackling HIV-related stigma and discrimination through empathy, education, and comprehensive support. Their work serves as a beacon of hope and a model for other organizations worldwide. Internal stigma, which manifests as self-loathing and low self-esteem, often results from the external judgments and prejudices of society. Organizations like the Human Touch Foundation are making remarkable strides in addressing these issues. By providing comprehensive support services, fostering youth-led initiatives, and promoting resilience, the foundation is helping to dismantle the barriers that stigma creates. Their work emphasizes the importance of empathy, understanding, and community in overcoming the challenges faced by people living with HIV. However, the fight against stigma requires collective effort. It is crucial that society as a whole becomes more informed and compassionate towards those affected by HIV. We must reject discriminatory attitudes and instead offer support and acceptance. By doing so, we can create an environment where individuals living with HIV can thrive without fear of prejudice. Only through such a unified approach can we hope to eradicate the stigma associated with HIV and ensure that everyone has the opportunity to live a healthy, fulfilling life. A RECIPE FOR DISASTER IGNORED WARNINGS AND THE PERILS OF UNSUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT

Despite advice in 2020 to relocate 4000 families from landslide-prone areas, Kerala proceeded with a mega hydro-electric project nearby. Incessant rains led to devastating landslides, highlighting the urgent need for sustainable development and better disaster management

The flooding and landslides in Kerala since 1991 had reportedly claimed several human lives, till the state witnessed the worst disaster of its kind at Mundakkai, Wayanad in the wee hours of 30th July. In 2020 State Disaster Management Authority advised relocation of 4000 families from landslide-prone areas that included Mundakkai. State did not heed the warning and on the contrary, has proposed a mega hydro-electric project involving an underground tunnel barely two km from the site of the current horror.

Incessant rains of 572 mm in 48 hours have led to two major landslides, one at 2.00 am at Mundakkal followed by another at 4.00 am at Chooralmala towns trapping hundreds of families. The debris further covered Vellarmala GVH school. The landslide also washed away the bridge connecting Chooralmala town with Mundakkai & Attarmala. So far 126 people have been found killed, 196 injured and more than a hundred missing or marooned in swathes of slush, mud and misery triggered by continuous and heavy rainfalls for two days. Dead bodies have also been found at Pothukal village that were carried by flowing water for 20 km in the Chalayar River. High Tension lines and transformers of the Mekkadi electrical section have also been damaged and resuming power in the area has been a challenge. Landslides washing away the bridge have posed further challenges for relief and rescue operations, though all state and central agencies are putting up their might to remove debris, find survivors, treat the injured and move the people to safer locations and camps. Rescuers are crossing the river in spate with the help of the ropeways but mist, bad weather and unstable terrain are making it more difficult. Army has rushed to set up Bailey Bridge to the site, which has been moved on the road from Chennai.



This deluge affected adjoining areas of Karnataka and left the Kapila River in the Mysuru district in spate, after 80,0000 cusecs of water were let out of the Kabini dam, severely affecting the traffic between Karnataka and Kerala. Kodagu roads were also flooded and many persons stuck were rescued. Landslides also occurred repeatedly on the Shiradi Ghats section of NH 75 connecting Bengaluru and Mangalore holding the traffic for several hours and eventually re-routing them via Kodagu and Sampaji Ghats. A few weeks earlier a landslide had occurred near Ankola, Uttar Kannada district along the newly widened National Highway burying moving vehicles underneath that claimed a dozen human lives, and many others went missing. Next to the Himalayas, the

Western Ghats have the most fragile ecosystem and despite the disasters striking frequently, we have not mended our ways and continued to engage in unsustainable activities in the name of development. The entire Ghats section from Gujarat to Kerala once had luxuriant tree/forest cover that provided the source and the catchment of several east-flowing and west-flowing rivers – a key lifeline for everyone in peninsular India. With the changes in land use patterns, the integrity of the catchment of the rivers is compromised, resulting in many of the streams and rivers becoming seasonal. People who have enjoyed the perennial flow of water in the streams in the past have now been suffering for their basic needs for drinking, agriculture and plantations.

Western Ghats comprise undulating terrain and diverting lands comprising tree growth for cultivation of tea, coconut, banana, coffee, spices etc is never sustainable. Kerala has lost its natural forests at a very fast pace and individuals, public and private agencies have grown plantations for quick cash. Some areas are also encroached. Proponents of such projects argue that destroying forests and growing bananas, tea, cashew coconut etc provide employment and help in GDP growth. This perception is highly misplaced. Such projects are not evaluated on a long-term basis. There are hardly any methods to work out an economic valuation of forests destroyed in the process. When a heavy downpour occurs for days, it causes landslides, landslips, destroys houses, roads bridges etc. To rebuild the

infrastructure we need to further spend money. The infrastructure destroyed in 2018 and 2019 in the Kerala flood disaster was rebuilt by spending more than 50,000 crores rupees. If the true environmental cost is considered, none of the plantation projects of growing tea etc would be viable. Labourers of tea gardens as well as banana and coconut gardens must be re-skilled and their services can be utilized for manufacturing etc. 2018 floods in Kodagu Karnataka, a district adjoining Wayanad, also played havoc with the life of the people. I have discussed the reasons for flooding and landslides in this region, in my book, "Changing Land Uses – Shrinking Streams and Carbon Sinks". Like Wayanad, Kodagu is again a hilly district covering an area of nearly 4200 sq km. However only 1750 sq km was reserved as forests and

Protected Areas, leaving another 1000 sq km occupied by habitation and agriculture; the remaining 1450 sq km had still quite a luxuriant tree cover until the 1980s. These were wooded areas under the control of the Revenue Department of the state, and the tree felling in such areas was regulated by the Karnataka (Preservation) of Trees Act, where forest officers were empowered to grant/ deny permission for the removal of trees. There is evidence on record to suggest that some officers had connived with the timber merchants and granted permission to remove tens of thousands of trees every year. This has resulted in compromising the ecological security of the region leading to frequent disasters of the type we are experiencing. The only solution that comes to everyone's mind is to stop

destroying the natural forests and making any changes in land use. There is a proposal to tag the Western Ghats as Eco sensitive area, but both governments of Kerala and Karnataka have yet not come on board. Unless they mend their ways the disasters would keep on striking more frequently and would be more destructive. Finally, let the column also deal with the reasons why there are heavy downpours for days in this warming world. The world at present including India is faced with heat waves, wildfires and heavy downpours leading to flooding. The uncontrollable wildfires in Canada, California and other parts of Western world are the consequences of global warming. Leh in India, which is located 3 km above the mean Sea level has the airfield at the highest altitude in the country and has been registering 32 degree Celsius temperature for some days in the last week of July. Due to such unusual temperatures, the air at this altitude gets rarefied and engines cannot develop the thrust required for takeoff. For the first time, all flights to and from Leh have remained suspended for these days.

High downpours are functions of higher rate of evaporation from Sea surfaces. As the Sea surfaces warm, evaporation increases leading to excessive moisture-laden clouds in the atmosphere. Once the conditions are favourable, it leads to heavy downpours. It can have very dangerous consequences in urban centres, as we have recently seen the drowning of three students in the basement of Rau coaching centre, Rajendranagar Delhi. The Civic Agencies must re-model the stormwater drains to take the load of 100 mm of rain per hour. These drains were originally designed for 25 mm of rain per hour. Building bylaws should also change; Basements should have only huge sumps and Parking space for vehicles and nothing else.

withcraft and executed in brutal witch hunts. These women were often healers, midwives or other powerful figures in their communities targeted for their knowledge and independence. The fear of witches and the persecution of women accused of witchcraft spread to colonial countries like India where women were often accused of witchcraft and subjected to violence and even death. Even today, women in some parts of India are killed in the name of witch hunts accentuating the lasting impact of this harmful stereotype. This concept of the witch reflects society's discomfort with powerful women and is a reminder of the importance of challenging stereotypes and celebrating women's autonomy and strength.

Further, the portrayal of the evil stepmother in fairytales not only vilifies women in positions of authority but also perpetuates a harmful narrative of competition and division among women. By pitting a woman against another woman, society creates a "divide and rule" policy where women are encouraged to fight among themselves rather than unite for their common rights and goals. This stereotype undermines the credibility of women in leadership roles by painting them as inherently



dangerous and untrustworthy. It diminishes the achievements of women by suggesting that their success comes at the expense of others developing a culture of suspicion and mistrust among women. helpless victims in need of rescue by a male saviour. This narrative diminishes women's agency by suggesting that they are incapable of taking care of themselves and solving their problems. It also underpins the idea that a woman's ultimate goal in life is to find a man to rescue and protect her. In Cinderella, the titular character is rescued from her life of servitude by Prince Charming who saves her from her oppressive stepfamily and offers her a life of luxury and love. Similarly, Rapunzel is locked

away in a tower by a wicked witch until she is rescued by a prince who climbs up her hair. Sleeping Beauty is cursed to sleep for a hundred years until she is awakened by true love's kiss. These stories send a harmful message to audiences particularly young girls by implying that women are incomplete without a man to rescue them. They fail to acknowledge women's strength and ability to overcome challenges on their own. By perpetuating this trope, these stories emphasize outdated gender

roles and limit the potential of women to be seen as capable and independent individuals.

Hence, it is time to challenge these harmful tropes and create new narratives that empower young girls and women and celebrate their diversity and strength. Instead of portraying women as either wicked witches, evil stepmothers or helpless damsels, fairytales must depict women as complex, multifaceted individuals with agency and autonomy. By telling stories that reflect the diverse experiences and identities of women, we can create a more inclusive and empowering narrative for future generations. One must realise that the witch, evil stepmother and damsel in distress tropes in old fairy tales are not harmless storytelling devices; they are powerful tools that shape our perceptions of women and their place in society. By examining these tropes through a feminist lens, we can begin to challenge and dismantle the stereotypes they perpetuate paving the way for a more inclusive and empowering narrative for women everywhere. It is time to tell new stories to our kids; stories that empower and inspire women to embrace their true selves and rewrite their destinies.

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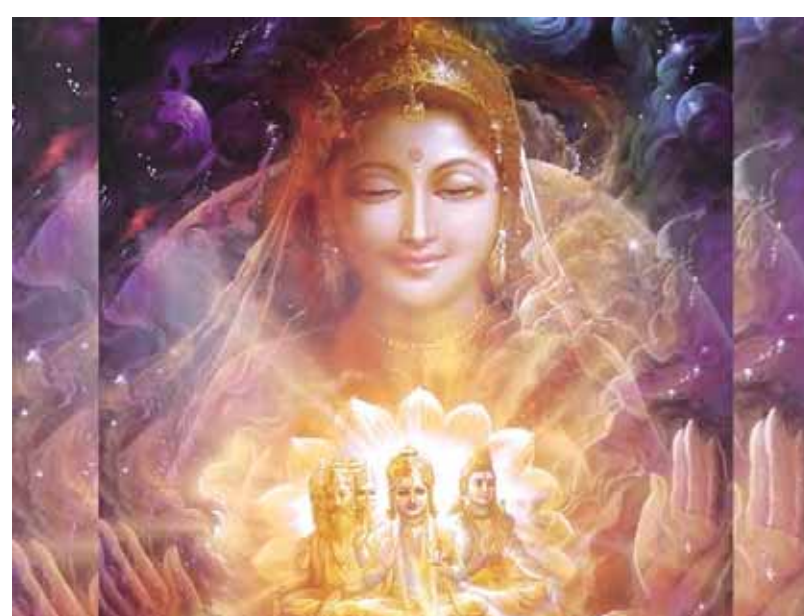

Revealing and Veiling dimensions of Shakti trinity

Picking up threads from the previous issue, it's time to look at a few other dimensions of the Shakti -trinity. Inherent in Sata is the 'revealing principle'. We have already discussed that when Tamasa engages with the seeds of creation stirred up by Rajas element, it leads to creation. The creation, however gains stability and thereby form existence with name when aided by Sata element. Once the form existence is in place, the eternal element of Consciousness finds a platform to manifest. The radiance inherent in Consciousness Element brings into light (in cognitive domain), the form-existence designated with a name and form. Tamasa, its counterpart, is marked with 'veiling nature', as it does all the processing in hiding. It is something like a plant bearing seed, which has to necessarily go into hiding in the dark realms of mother earth's womb for a specified period, for it to draw succour from the earth mass. Following which, the seed first sprouts, and then grows into a fruit bearing tree. Evidently, the tree-form remains veiled in the seed; but once manifest, the particular seed

creating it would not be in sight. Similarly, at the primal-source, which is supposedly self-revealed, the fine print of manifest world remains veiled in seed-form. But once the world becomes manifest, the root on which life cycle is premised gets veiled, as it goes out of reckoning in human being's perceptible domain. It is for this very reason that in Indian context, darkness is not perceived as negative. For, it remains just one phase of nature's creation process. So, veiling and unveiling aspects are just two faces of nature's creation cycle. But then a look at the way seed-tree-seed cycle runs, an intriguing question arises in mind, especially in view of the fact that seed goes out of sight once it transforms into a plant. Would it mean that the primal source would also lose its presence once the manifest world comes to light? Looking at the seed-tree cycle analogy, it may appear so. But then, it needs to be appreciated that the manifest ephemeral world has to be rooted somewhere in some inexhaustible eternal reality. Otherwise, it will not be able to draw succour necessary to



continue recycling again and again. But for which, the manifest world would not have sustained so long. Here, it also needs to be appreciated that the Primal-Source is infinite,

inexhaustible and an outflowing eternal reality, beyond the bounds of time, space, and causality. It is only a finite thing that may lose its presence, once transformed into another form.

A look at the emergence and disappearance of tidal waves in the sea may throw further light. When the sea is in fury, tidal waves envelope the sea. The sea goes out of our sight. Once the tidal waves settle down after doing their round for a while, it comes out that only the surface water had temporarily gone into fury. The main sea body was there in its place. Even in tidal wave state, it remains a part of the main sea body itself. So, whereas existence of the tidal wave can be measured in time frame, the main sea body remains beyond its limit. Similarly, the disorder just at the surface level of the primal source is enough to manifest the world we live in. But the primal source would remain very much in place, and therefore, is beyond the limitation of time. Again, when the manifest world finally disintegrates, it gets back to its primal source, the way main sea body takes back the tidal waves into its womb. So, the primal source happens to be an eternal reality beyond the binds of time. The revealing, veiling, and activating aspects of Sata, Tamasa, and Rajasa

have psychological imperatives on human minds as well, in so far as their individual character is concerned. As already discussed above, with body-mind organism getting revealed, the root of life gets veiled. That clouds human perceptible and comprehensible abilities in five different ways. Since these limitations arise as a sequel to the design parameters underlying the making of a being, they are there by birth. We may call them as elemental limitations. Kashmir Shaivism calls this as being under the spell of Maya(delusion). The human limitations are viewed in the backdrop of the primal source believed to be enjoying singular ownership of the whole manifest world and thereby carrying a sense of fullness; being omniscient; being beyond limitation of time and space as wells as laws of causation.
