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'KCR, KTR avoiding caste survey calls'

The BRS is drawing flak for its top leaders' apparent reluctance to attend the ongoing caste survey in Telangana. Sources revealed that at the Nandi Nagar residence, where BRS bigwigs KCR and KTR stay, survey officials reportedly did not receive a response. Sources said that they were not allowed in.

The CM, Revanth Reddy, set a deadline of November 30 to complete the caste survey. On Saturday, MIM Chief Asaduddin Owaisi par-

ticipated in the caste survey and gave details. While BRS MLC Kavitha participated in the survey, Congress leaders asked why prominent figures like ex-CM K. Chandrasekhar Rao and KT Rama Rao (KTR) have not disclosed their caste details.

"What's there to hide about caste? If they respect the legislative process, they should participate. Now, with KTR gone for a holiday, his reluctance is even more clear," remarked a Congress candidate.

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SHARING OF RIVER WATERS

'Prepare report on TG's losses'

Chief Minister Revanth Reddy has directed officials to ensure that Telangana gets its rightful share of water from the Krishna and Godavari rivers.

Emphasising the need to safeguard the state's interests, he asked Irrigation Department officials and legal experts to present strong arguments before the Brijesh Kumar Tribunal. He also stressed the importance of preparing evidence, records and government orders to substantiate Telangana's claims.

He also ordered the preparation of comprehensive reports on



Telangana's losses after its formation, including GOs, memos, DPRs and tribunal rulings from the United Andhra Pradesh period, to strengthen the state's case on all forums.

Addressing a review meeting with Irrigation Minister Uttam Kumar Reddy and irrigation officials, he spoke about the state's irrigation scene, disputes over the

Krishna and Godavari waters and the strategies the government would adopt. The meeting focused on ensuring that the state's rightful water allocation is upheld under the Andhra Pradesh Reorganisation Act. The tribunal is tasked with finalising water shares and allocations project-wise for both states.

Officials briefed the Chief Minister that while the tribunal has collected evidence and opinions from the states, formal hearings are yet to begin. Telangana's arguments will play a crucial role in the final decision, officials noted.

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NEW NOTIFICATION FOR ACQUIRING LAND IN LAGACHARLA & POLEPALLY

The Telangana Government issued a notification for acquiring land for the multi-purpose Industrial Park in the Dudyala mandal of Vikarabad district. The government issued a primary notification on Saturday to acquire 110.32 acres in Lagacharla village and 71.39 acres in Polepally village. As stated a few days ago by Chief Minister Revanth Reddy the government is planning to establish an Industrial Park and not a Pharma City in Dudyala mandal.

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Burra elevated as Special Chief Secretary

The Telangana Government has re-designated B. Venkatesham, IAS (TG: 1995), as Special Chief Secretary to the Government, Education Department.



While serving as Principal Secretary in the same department, Venkatesham's promotion reflects the administration's exigencies and its focus on the education sector.

According to the government order issued by Chief Secretary Santhi Kumari, Venkatesham will continue to draw pay and allowances in the Above Super Time Scale (HAG) of IAS. The move is expected to enhance the department's efficiency and drive critical educational initiatives across the state.

FIR against MRO, others in Bhoodan scam

An FIR has been registered against officials, including an MRO, in connection with irregularities involving Bhoodan land transactions in the Kandukur Mandal of Rachakonda. The case, booked under Sections 166, 167, 420, and 34 read with 120 (b) IPC, pertains to fraudulent transactions and misappropriations of lands in Thimmapur village.

The investigation, initiated following a complaint by the current Tahsildar Gopal, revealed illegalities in the transfer and allocation of Bhoodan lands. The lands involved have survey numbers 6, 129, 130, 147, 161, 167, 197, 444, 453, 454, 455, 573, 574, and 575, which were unlawfully alienated without adhering to prescribed procedures. The accused named in the FIR are Sripragada Jyothi, former Tahsildar, Thammali Sridhar, former Naib Tahsildar, the then SRO of Maheshwaram, executives of fraudulent transactions and

claimants of these lands, whose identities are being verified as part of the investigation. The ED had submitted to the Telangana DGP to file cases under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act. While ED recommended filing a case against IAS officer Amoy Kumar too, currently an FIR has been registered against Jyothi.

The complaint alleges that these individuals colluded to manipulate Dharani records, fabricate documents and issue fraudulent pattas, enabling unauthorized transactions. These actions caused significant losses to the state and deprived legitimate beneficiaries of their rights over the lands. The fraudulent transactions were facilitated by forging entries in the Bhoodan Yagna Board register. The records show unauthorized sales and transfers of Bhoodan lands intended for redistribution to landless individuals. The irregularities include the issuance of false classification certificates, illegal registration of deeds and manipulation of official records.

Govt to address grievances of employees

The Telangana government has issued a series of orders addressing employee grievances regarding cadre transfers under various circumstances, as per the recommendations of a Cabinet Sub-Committee. These orders include guidelines for mutual, spousal and medical-based cadre transfers, ensuring administrative efficiency and addressing employee

concerns. As per GO Ms. No: 245, dated November 29, 2024, employees seeking mutual transfers within the same department and post can now apply through an online portal between December 1, 2024, and February 1, 2025. The transfer process mandates that applicants forego their seniority and lien in their existing cadre. The order strictly bars transfers for suspended employees and those facing dis-

ciplinary proceedings. Addressing long-pending requests, the GO Ms. No: 243, dated November 29, 2024, allows spousal transfers under Para 23 of GO Ms. No: 317, dated December 6, 2021.

The government emphasized accommodating spouses in the same cadre as far as possible, subject to the availability of vacancies.

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BJP plans public meet on Dec 6

The BJP is planning to organise a public meeting on December 6 to expose the Congress Government's failures, Telangana BJP President G. Kishan Reddy said on Saturday. He said that no section is happy with the government as the Congress Government had failed to implement its assurances given to the people during elections. He said that Union Home Minister Amit Shah or BJP President JP Nadda would attend the meeting and that it would be held at the Saroor Nagar Stadium depending on its availability.

PASSPORTS SUSPENDED IN PHONE TAPPING CASE

The Centre has reportedly suspended the passports of the main suspects in the phone tapping case, Prabhakar Rao and Shravan Rao, after police recommendations.

Both individuals are under investigation for their alleged involvement in controversial cases. Prabhakar has reportedly filed a petition with the Union Home Ministry in Delhi, challenging the suspension of his passport. Meanwhile, the police have allegedly once again recommended that the Centre permanently revoke the passports of both accused. In a parallel effort, authorities are working with Interpol to issue a Red Corner Notice to bring the accused back to India. Attempts are underway to extradite Prabhakar Rao to Hyderabad, while Shravan Rao has approached the court seeking bail, claiming no involvement in the case.

Adding a new twist, Prabhakar Rao has filed a petition requesting recognition as a political refugee.

The Phone Tapping case was registered on March 10 at the Panjagutta Police Station.

Govt recovers 48 acres of temple land from encroachers

■ SOLAR POWER PROJECT ON 252 ACRES OF UNUSED TEMPLE LAND

The Congress Government has prioritised enhancing basic facilities for devotees in all Telangana temples. Over the past year, numerous initiatives have been successfully implemented, says the Endowments Department.

A major event was the Sammakka-Saralamma Jatra, regarded as Telangana's Kumbh Mela, held from February 21, 2024,

to February 24, 2024. The state allocated Rs 110 crore for the event, ensuring smooth proceedings for millions of pilgrims. Similarly, the Bonalu festival was celebrated with grandeur, emphasising Telangana's traditions. The government allotted Rs 20 crore for festivities in major temples in Hyderabad, Secunderabad and other districts, marking an increase from the previous year's expenditure. The

‘Psycho Ram’ vs ‘Chitti Naidu’: TDP still key to TG politics

The Telugu Desam Party (TDP) may have been marginalized in Telangana's politics in terms of its representation in the state legislature and local bodies. But the party continues to provide ammunition for political barbs traded by the ruling Congress party and the opposition Bharat Rashtira Samithi.

TG Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy's recent jab at BRS working president KT Rama Rao, dubbing him as 'Psycho Ram', sparked a buzz among Congress supporters. The nickname, which immediately gained traction, was a throwback to TDP's recent election campaign during which AP's ex-CM YS Jagan Mohan Reddy was labelled 'Psycho Jagan'. The parallel is hard to miss, given the import of the psychological term. Interestingly, KTR did not hold back his punches. He taunted Revanth as 'Chitti Naidu', reminding him of his tutelage under AP Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu and his political baptism in TDP yet again. Looks like Telangana's political arena can never be bereft of the influence of 'Andhra' masala, even if the party in question is largely confined to AP.

KTR's take on media mirrors Rahul's style

Bharat Rashtira Samithi working president KT Rama Rao, known for his sharp wit during public spats, seems to have taken a leaf out of All India Congress Committee leader Rahul Gandhi's play-book when it comes to handling the media. Rahul has no qualms about accusing media outlets of being aligned with the Bharatiya Janata Party so much so that he critiqued it as "media versus the people". KTR appears to be walking a similar path. For, KTR does enjoy significant media coverage, be it his statements or public utterances, though his party is no longer in power. Yet, for buttressing the "us versus them" narrative, the media has been cast as the villain. The irony here is hard to miss. If the media were truly taking sides, would they also publish stories that hurt the government or question its actions? "If you are not with me, you are against me", seems to be their specious logic. This explains why they blame a media house, but do not hesitate to cite articles published by it to drive home their PoV whenever the situation permits. True-blue journalism goes beyond certificates of appreciation from netas.

BRS barred from CM Revanth Reddy's family celebration

Revealing small cracks in the NDA coalition government in Andhra Pradesh, the transport of fly ash from the Rayalaseema Thermal Power Plant (RTPP) has become a flashpoint now. Telugu Desam Party leader JC Prabhakar Reddy and Bharatiya Janata Party MLA P Adinarayana Reddy are virtually fighting it out in the open, claiming exclusive rights over the lucrative activity. Their showdown has resulted in blockades and use of strong-arm tactics, apart from stalling operations at RTPP for nearly a week now. Heavy deployment of police in the border areas of Kadapa and Anantapur districts has helped keep matters under control as of now. JC Prabhakar Reddy's trucks en route to Tadipatri were barred from loading fly ash by Adinarayana Reddy's supporters, who insist they will have a say in activities under the Jammalamadugu constituency. JC's faction has accused the BJP of resorting to tactics of intimidation. Although Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu has spoken to both the warring leaders, tensions persist.

16.75 cr saplings planted this year, meeting 84% goal: Forest Dept

Man throws liquid on Kejriwal during rally

In a security scare, a man splashed some liquid on Arvind Kejriwal during his 'padayatra' in south Delhi's Malviya Nagar on Saturday, with AAP claiming that it was spirit and the "attacker" wanted to set the party supremo afire. While police said water was thrown at Kejriwal during the public event that was organised without their permission, the BJP strongly refuted Chief Minister Atishi's accusation that the accused was a worker of the saffron party.

AAP lashed out at the BJP-led Centre for the incident and



said this is the third "attack" on Kejriwal in the last 35 days. According to the police, the accused, identified as Ashok Jha, a serving bus marshal at

Delhi Transport Corporation's Khanpur Depot, has been detained. "Further examination of the person is in progress to find out the reasons behind this act," a statement from the Delhi Police stated. Sources claimed that Jha (41), during interrogation, said that he was frustrated as he was not getting his salary for the past six months.

Jha claimed that during the formation of AAP, he gave a donation to the party, but was upset with its "fake promises", the sources said. The AAP national convener was holding the padayatra in the Savitri Nagar area that falls under the Greater Kailash assembly seg-

ment. Police said that around 5.50 pm Kejriwal was shaking hands with some followers standing behind a cordon when Jha attempted to throw water on him. He was immediately caught as the police staff were nearby, they said. Kejriwal and the security personnel accompanying him were later seen wiping their faces.

Proper police deployment, both in plain clothes along with rope party for crowd control and in uniform, was made, the statement said. At a press conference, Delhi minister Saurabh Bharadwaj alleged that the man held for attacking Kejriwal had a matchbox in his hand.

This decision aims to reduce personal hardships and foster family welfare. Departments have been directed to complete the transfer process by December 31, 2024. The GO Ms: No: 244, dated November 29, 2024, focuses on employees requesting cadre transfers based on medical and related grounds. This includes critical illnesses like cancer, kidney or liver transplants and disabilities above 70 per cent, among others. The government mandated a case-by-case examination of these requests, prioritising genuine cases while ensuring administrative balance. This exercise is also set for completion by December 31, 2024. Chief Secretary Santhi Kumari emphasized that these measures aim to resolve long-standing grievances while maintaining efficiency.

Highlighting Telangana's share in the Krishna basin, Revanth pointed out that 70 per cent of it is in Telangana, whereas Andhra Pradesh has just 30 per cent. He directed officials to argue for Telangana's share of 70 per cent of the 1,005 TMCs of Krishna waters as per international water-sharing principles. The Chief Minister also said that Andhra Pradesh diverts 80 TMCs of Godavari water into the Krishna Delta through the Polavaram Project.

In return, Telangana is entitled to 45 TMCs from upstream Nagarjuna Sagar, which should be utilised through planned irrigation projects, he noted. The Chief Minister questioned the relevance of the KRMB and GRMB decisions when the tribunals' water-sharing process remains incomplete. He advised

officials to argue in the Supreme Court that the boards should not interfere until the tribunal delivers its verdict. The meeting also discussed Andhra Pradesh's alleged over use of Krishna waters. Officials explained the need for scientific monitoring using telemetry systems and estimated its cost at around Rs 12 crore.

Revanth suggested that Telangana would bear the initial costs and recover its share from Andhra Pradesh later. He emphasised recording water usage from all projects like Srisailem, Pothireddypadu, Bana-kacharla head regulator, Telugu Ganga, KC Canal, Handri Neeva, Galeru Nagari and Velugodu projects. The CM asked officials to speed up permissions for the Sitarama and Sammakka barrage projects and complete all works to provide water to the full ayacut.

BJP plans...

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Participating in a workshop conducted at the state BJP office on Saturday, Kishan said the Congress government had assured that it would fill two lakh vacancies in government service. However, the Congress admin has not issued any notifications regarding that so far, he added.

Moreover, the Congress government is falsely claiming that they had filled vacancies hiding the fact that the BRS admin had notified them and had conducted exams to fill them. Kishan said that new blood is joining the party and a new leadership is coming up from the village level to the national level. New committees would be appointed so that they can provide good leadership, he said.

‘61% city lakes already encroached, the rest could disappear in 15 years’

HYDRAA Commissioner AV Ranganath emphasised the critical role of water resources in sustaining biodiversity and vowed to focus extensively on preserving and restoring lakes in Hyderabad.

Speaking at the national conference on urban biodiversity organized by the National Biodiversity Authority and the International Council for Local Environmental Initiatives, Ranganath highlighted the organisation's dedication to safeguarding water bodies and ensuring ecological balance.

Ranganath outlined HYDRAA's primary responsibilities, which include protecting lakes from encroachments, restoring their buffer zones, and enhancing green cover around these vital ecosystems. He stressed that preserving these resources not only benefits the environment but also secures a healthy future for upcoming generations. HYDRAA's plans to set up a dedicated police station to address complaints and take swift action against encroachments have been widely appreciated.

Highlighting challenges, the

commissioner noted that 61 per cent of Hyderabad's lakes have already been encroached upon. Without robust intervention, the remaining 39 per cent of water bodies risk disappearing within 15 years.

Using the collaboration of multiple government departments, including GHMC, HMDA, and the Irrigation Department, HYDRAA is meticulously mapping lakes and

surrounding lands to prepare a comprehensive database.

Ranganath also stressed the legal backing for these efforts, citing clear court directives against constructions in Full Tank Levels (FTLs) and buffer zones. HYDRAA has been proactive in implementing these directives, with recent actions preventing encroachments in areas such as Lotus Pond in Jubilee Hills.

Jump in pneumonia cases as temperature dips

As temperatures continue to drop and cold winds sweep across the State, there has been a significant rise in pneumonia cases among children, with Niloufer Hospital in Hyderabad seeing an influx of young patients.

The ongoing cold spell, which has brought temperatures in some areas of Telangana to below 8°C, is posing particular risks to children and the elderly.

With the harsh winter sea-

son affecting vulnerable groups, Niloufer Hospital has reported over 200 pneumonia cases so far.

On a daily basis, the outpatient department screens approximately 30-40 patients for pneumonia, with the numbers spiking to 60 on Mondays, Tuesdays, and Wednesdays, according to hospital authorities.

Some of the children have required ventilator support due to the severity of their condition. The pneumonia bacteria and viruses, which

cause infections in the lungs, are particularly dangerous for children aged 0-5 years and elderly individuals over 65. At the hospital, many patients have been diagnosed with respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), streptococcus, influenza, and other forms of pneumonia, say medical officers.

To help prevent pneumonia, Niloufer Hospital's medical staff recommends that children be exclusively breastfed for at least the first six months of life. They also urge parents to be vigilant about

symptoms such as high fever, difficulty breathing, wheezing, and a bluish discoloration of the skin, which can indicate a serious respiratory issue, and to seek immediate medical attention if these symptoms appear.

In addition, the hospital advises people to stay warm by wearing appropriate clothing that covers the entire body, and to eat freshly prepared food and drink boiled water to avoid further health complications during the cold weather.

Need to regulate deepfake technology stressed

Data Science Summit held at the Indian School of Business (ISB) on Saturday discussed the urgent need for action against the rising threat of deepfake technology.

At the summit, experts raised concerns about the misuse of artificial intelligence (AI) to create deepfakes, emphasising its potential to disrupt elections, spread misinformation and harm individuals through scams and personal attacks.

Major Vineet Kumar of the Cyber Peace Foundation highlighted a surge in cybercrimes involving deepfake technology, citing cases where fake audio and video were used for extortion and disinformation. IPS officer Ajay Kumar Yadav noted that deepfakes, once isolated incidents, have become widespread threats affecting elections and public trust.

Experts also proposed a multi-pronged approach, urging social media platforms to develop detection tools, gov-

ernments to enhance media literacy, and the establishment of stricter legal penalties. Collaboration between academia, government, and industry was deemed essential.

Meanwhile, prof Manish Gangwar stressed the need for ethical and technological safeguards, while the Misinformation Combat Alliance introduced a WhatsApp-based reporting system to empower citizens.

Though deepfakes have some positive uses, experts agreed that their risks far outweigh the benefits, calling for stronger regulations and public awareness.

Journalist and fact-check trainer Sudhakar Reddy Udamula repeated his call for social media platforms like Facebook, Instagram, and YouTube to develop in-built algorithms to detect and block deepfake content.

SCR sets up 7 mechanised laundries in city

PNS ■ HYDERABAD

The South Central Railway (SCR) has set up mechanised laundries at seven locations, including the Secunderabad departmental laundry (2 tons/day capacity) and the Kacheguda BOOT laundry (12 tons/day capacity), to provide clean linen for passengers, supplementing outsourced services.

Currently, all AC coaches in 116 trains, including special trains, are supplied with clean bedrolls daily. This includes an average of 38,000 woolen blankets and 1,52,000 bedrolls.



The SCR stated that white bedsheets are washed after single use, while woolen blankets are washed monthly. Previously washed every three months in 2010, blankets now undergo washing twice a month when capacity permits, or at least once monthly. This increased frequency has reduced blanket lifespan from four years to two.

SCR also announced a new 48-ton BOOT laundry for the Secunderabad, Kacheguda, or Hyderabad. Under the BOOT scheme, firms build, operate, and later transfer the laundry to the Railways after the contract ends.

PROLIFICITY, THY NAME IS NAGASURI VENUGOPAL

5 killed as bus plunges into gorge

Five people were killed and 15 others injured as a bus plunged into a 150-ft-deep gorge near the West Bengal-Sikkim border on Saturday afternoon, police said. The accident happened between Andheri and Atal Setu, about 1 km from the Rangpo border, around 3 pm. The bus, heading to Gangtok from Siliguri, veered off the NH-10 and crashed-landed on the bank of the Teesta river, they said. The identities of the deceased and the injured were being ascertained, police said, adding that there was a woman among those dead. The injured persons were taken to a health centre in Rangpo for treatment, they said. Police said that the number of deaths is likely to go up as many injured passengers were very critical. Among the passengers on the bus when the accident happened were some tourists, they said.



UP govt to invite all CMs for Maha Kumbh 2025

The Uttar Pradesh government would send ministers to invite governors and chief ministers across the nation to Prayagraj for Maha Kumbh 2025 in January. This was decided at a meeting of ministers convened by Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath at his Lok Bhavan office in Lucknow. "It has been decided that UP ministers would visit all the states and invite governors and chief ministers to Kumbh. The itinerary of ministers is being prepared," a senior UP minister told PTI after the meeting. When asked if opposition leaders would also be approached, he said, "Why not? We will seek an audience with all CMs, including those from opposition states and invite them." On November 22, the UP cabinet headed by Adityanath approved a proposal to hold roadshows and events in India and abroad to promote the Maha Kumbh that UP government officials said would draw devotees in record numbers from across the globe. The roadshows would be led by ministers who would also use the occasion to meet governors and CMs of the states they visit on the occasion, a minister said.



Many countries stopped using EVMs: Medha Patkar

Amid a debate on the EVM credibility re-started by some Opposition parties after the debacle in Maharashtra Assembly polls, rights activist Medha Patkar on Saturday said many countries have stopped using them. Congress chief Mallikarjun Kharge recently suggested that ballot papers be reintroduced in the election mechanism. "I am not an expert on EVMs but it is true that many countries have stopped using them. Experiments show that certain systems can be changed with a mere electric connection," Patkar told reporters in Chhatrapati Sambhaji Nagar city. She was conferred the honorary D.Litt by the Mahatma Gandhi Mission University. Patkar said the code of conduct for polls cannot be implemented impartially if the Election Commission has links with any political party. The activist said the monthly financial assistance of Rs 1,500 being given to women who come from poor families under the Maharashtra government's 'Mazi Ladki Bahin' scheme won't resolve their problems.

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Saturday urged women to come forward and take benefits of central schemes to make them more capable and empowered. India and Italy are strong maritime nations: Sonowal

Invites Italy to collaborate with heritage museum

Union Shipping, Ports and Waterways Minister Sarbananda Sonowal on Saturday asked Italian museums to collaborate with India for the upcoming National Maritime Heritage Complex (NMHC) in Gujarat's Lothal.

Speaking during a seminar on blue economy and space held on the sidelines of 93-year-old Italian ship Amerigo Vespucci's call on Mumbai port, Sonowal said India is building the largest museum devoted to maritime heritage at Lothal, a site of the Indus Valley civilisation.

The Union Cabinet had recently given the nod for the NMHC, which is estimated to cost over Rs 3,500 crore, as per some reports.

Sonowal said as early as 4,000 BC, Indian ships went to neighbouring countries with produce such as spices, textiles, and arts and crafts. Indian ships had a reputa-



tion of being sturdy and were manned by expert seamen, he said. The Union minister said that Italian travellers including the 13th century Venetian merchant Marco Polo have documented Indian ships to be highly sophisticated, much larger, durable and versatile than other vessels.

The dockyard at Lothal is over 5,000 years old and given its importance, India is building the NMHC there, Sonowal said. "I would invite globally

renowned Italian museums to collaborate in our endeavour," he said. The minister called India and Italy as strategic partners, and also affirmed his commitment to take forward the agenda set out by prime ministers of both the countries recently.

India and Italy are ancient civilisations with a rich cultural heritage, the minister said, adding that Italian cities were important trading posts on the ancient spice route.

The country's scientific and economic heritage spans millennia and as far back as the Rigveda period, that is between 3,300 to 1,900 BC, "Indian civilisation laid the foundation for advancement in diverse scientific domain", he said.

Without elaborating, he also told reporters that India and Italy held "informal" talks on Saturday. He said on the upcoming India-Middle East-Europe-Economic Corridor, Italy has made some wish and added that India will take the necessary steps on this aspect and even called it as the country's responsibility.

Both India and Italy are strong maritime nations having advanced space programmes, Sonowal said, stressing that ecology and economic aspirations have to go hand in hand.

"From the enormity of the ocean to the infinite vastness of space, the potential and benefit of India-Italy partnership is immense," he said.

‘Manipur not like Mizoram’

We joined India with defined boundaries: CM

A day after the Manipur government urged Mizoram CM Lalduhoma to demonstrate "better statesmanship" by being a "good neighbour" rather than fueling hatred through "unwarranted comments", Chief Minister N Biren Singh on Saturday said Manipur is not like Mizoram, "which was once just a district in Assam".

Speaking at a function for construction of infrastructure to relocate the Assam Rifles from the premises of the historic Langthabal Old Palace, Singh said, "Manipur is not like Mizoram. We have a written history of 2,000 years. Manipur merged with the Union of India as a single entity in 1949. Our boundaries were not newly created but we joined with the Union with intact boundaries."

The Manipur CM's reaction came in the backdrop of a recent interview given by Lalduhoma to a national daily



in which he said Singh was a liability for the state, its people and the BJP, and even President's Rule is preferable compared to his administration.

"Assam Rifles is here to serve the nation. They are not our enemies. We all are Indian citizens. The gap can be bridged through interactions between commanders, CSOs, and intellectuals. Our common enemy is located in foreign territories, not within. The paramilitary force can deal with insurgents or unlawful activities as they see fit, but not everyone is an insurgent," the

CM said.

"People ask, 'What is the Chief Minister doing?' Can the CM go and engage in firing? The CM makes policy plans—how to identify illegal immigrants, how to cancel the Free Movement Regime, and how to implement the NRC. We will never rest until we have clearly safeguarded the entire land of Manipur and its indigenous people," Singh asserted.

The CM asserted that the conflict since May 3 last year is not due to corruption by the government but because of measures taken to protect the original inhabitants of the land and address the distorted histories of the state. "Naturally, those who once thrived on the drug trade will be upset with the government and against me," he added.

Singh also thanked Union Home Minister Amit Shah and Assam Rifles authorities for agreeing to relocate their camp from Langthabal Old Palace.

Cyclone Fengal induced rains cause heavy inundation in TN

Hospitals and houses were inundated in Chennai and its neighbourhoods on Saturday following Cyclone Fengal induced heavy downpour, as civic authorities said clearing works were on in a 'war-footing'.

Barriades and umbrellas were swept away by gusty winds and road users scurried for cover as rains poured, with cyclone Fengal inching closer to the shoreline on Saturday, leaving many areas in and around Chennai under water.

Curiously, a lot of people, especially young men and women, frolicked at beaches, and strangely, visitors could be spotted at the Mamallapuram world heritage site too, despite the government warning people against going near beaches, in view of the high tides. Wind speed was pretty high in coastline areas such as Marakkanam in Villupuram district.

Rainwater entered the premises of two state-run hospitals at Chromepet, a gener-



al hospital and a facility for thoracic medicine, both of which are located side by side and frequented by people.

Pondy govt issues heavy rain alert

‘Can’t afford this kind of spectacle in mother of democracy’

Criticising the disruption of proceedings in the Rajya Sabha, Vice President Jagdeep Dhankhar on Saturday said that this "kind of spectacle" could not be afforded in the "mother of democracy".

Dhankhar, the chairman of the Rajya Sabha, made the statement while addressing a special session of the Arunachal Pradesh assembly.

"I express my deep pain, entering into the fourth quarter of the adoption of the Indian Constitution, we could not work for a single moment in Rajya Sabha, my head is in shame. We cannot afford this kind of spectacle in a country



that is the mother of democracy, the largest democracy. How can we go against the spirit of the Constitution? How can we afford to walk out of our obligations?" he said. "I'm happy to know your assembly is otherwise.

It's a shining example, a beacon of hope," he added.

Dhankhar said political parties have to understand that ultimately the interest of all converges in the prosperity of a nation. "We cannot, under any situa-

tion, keep any interest above our national interest," he said.

Like the previous three sittings of the ongoing Winter Session, the Rajya Sabha could not take up scheduled business on Friday and the proceedings were adjourned within minutes of the assembly amid protests by opposition MPs, demanding discussions on corruption allegations against the Adani Group, violence in Uttar Pradesh's Sambhal, and the situation in Manipur. The vice president said the country's growth rate makes him proud "because no country comes close to India".

"It's fine that India is the fifth largest global economy. It's an accomplishment.

TMC protests against Waqf Amendment Bill

Kolkata, Nov 30 (PTI) The TMC Minority Cell held a rally in Kolkata on Sunday to protest the Waqf Amendment Bill, which its leaders alleged was aimed at seizing properties of Muslims.

Addressing the rally, TMC MP Kalyan Banerjee claimed that the BJP-led government at the Centre does not respect the Constitution as it was moving forward on the matter without any discussion with the states. Banerjee, who is a member of the Joint Parliamentary Committee (JPC) on the Waqf Amendment Bill, alleged that the federal structure of the country was under threat because of this "authoritarian" attitude of the BJP.

"The Preamble of the Constitution is the eye of the



nation. The BJP government is not following the ideals of the Preamble," he said. Among the other speakers at the rally, held in Rani Rashmoni Road, were state Urban Development Minister Firhad Hakim and Murarai MLA Mosarraf Hossain. Hossain claimed that the Waqf Amendment Bill was part of a conspiracy to seize the properties of Muslims, and polarising the society for narrow political gains. "Today's meeting testifies that the BJP will not succeed in its game-plan," he said.

Women should come forward, take benefits of schemes:FM

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman on Saturday urged women to come forward and take benefits of central schemes to make them more capable and empowered. She was speaking at a credit outreach programme held in Madhubani, where loans to the tune of Rs 1,121 crore were provided to 50,294 beneficiaries by various banks. "Our Prime Minister Narendra Modi ji says there should be a 'Lakshmi Didi' in every village of the country... and for this, banks have launched several schemes for providing financial assistance to women.



"Women are being given financial assistance and training through every Self Help Group (SHG) in Bihar. I urge women to become a part of the schemes launched by the central government... so that they can become more capable and empowered," Sitharaman said.

She also said women would play an important role in achieving the goal of a developed India by 2047.

"Our PM believes that India's development should be led by women. The focus of the NDA government is clear... The poor, women, youths and farmers are the top four priorities of the government. The PM gives the example of Bihar and says that other states should also follow the same path of development and growth," the finance minister said.

Sitharaman also distributed copies of the Constitution in Maithili and Sanskrit languages to people during the programme.

Delhi’s air quality remains ‘very poor’

Delhi's air quality remained in the "very poor" category for the seventh consecutive day on Saturday with an Air Quality Index (AQI) of 346, officials said. The city's air quality is likely to remain in the "very poor" category for the next three days due to unfavourable weather conditions, they added.

Delhi's 24-hour average AQI was recorded at 346 at 4 pm on Saturday, marking a slight rise from 331 recorded on Friday, according to the Central Pollution Control Board (CPCB). Out of the 38 monitoring stations across the national capital, only

Shadipur recorded AQI in the "severe" category, while 34 stations recorded "very poor" AQI, according to the Sameer app that provides hourly

updates of national AQI published by the CPCB. An AQI between zero and 50 is considered "good", 51 and 100 "satisfactory", 101 and 200

"moderate", 201 and 300 "poor", 301 and 400 "very poor", and 401 and 500 "severe". According to the Air Quality Early Warning

System for Delhi, the AQI is likely to be in the "very poor" category for the next three days. PM2.5 was the primary pollutant in Delhi, with levels recorded at 153 µg/m³ at 3 pm on Saturday. These fine particles pose significant health risks as they can penetrate deep into the lungs and enter the bloodstream. Vehicular emissions, as reported by the Centre's Decision Support System (DSS) for Air Quality Management, are typically updated daily at noon.

However, on Saturday, the data available on the website until 4 pm reflected only Friday's estimated contribution, which accounted for 21.6 per cent of Delhi's pollution.

The Signature *Lemon, Chocolate & Coffee Petit Four* were as indulgent as they were unique, leaving a sweetness that felt like a parting gift.

Zanotta's charm lies not only in its food but in how every aspect of the experience is curated to perfection. Chef Liberatore's collaboration was a reminder of why Michelin stars matter, not for their prestige, but for the heart and soul they demand from a chef. Whether you're a vegetarian, a seafood enthusiast or simply someone looking to experience an unforgettable meal, *Zanotta* delivers on every front. It's not just a meal; it's a memory, a moment and a masterpiece rolled into one. For me, it was proof that fine dining isn't just about eating, it's about truly living.

MICHELIN MAGIC ON A PLATE

Imagine indulging in a meal where every bite feels like a discovery where flavours, textures and creativity come together in perfect plate. That's exactly what you can expect at *Zanotta*, where Michelin-starred Chef Alessandro Liberatore's culinary genius takes fine dining to a whole new level, says **SAKSHI PRIYA**

For anyone who considers themselves a foodie, there's an unmistakable thrill in the promise of a Michelin-starred experience. It's not just about eating; it's about savouring stories told through food, each dish a chapter of creativity, tradition, and mastery. As a vegetarian, I've often found myself navigating the labyrinth of fine dining, where plant-based options can sometimes feel like an afterthought. But my recent visit to *Zanotta* at *The Leela Ambience*, for a unique collaboration with Villa Cora's two-Michelin-Key Chef Alessandro Liberatore, turned all my expectations on their head.

Picture this: a sparkling Gurugram skyline, soft live music and the kind of atmosphere that makes you lean in just a little closer to hear the clink of glasses and the hum of conversation. That's the setting at *Zanotta*, perched elegantly on the sixth floor. *The Leela Ambience Gurugram Hotel & Residences* proudly presented this iconic pop-up featuring VillaCorà, the prestigious two-Michelin-Key hotel from Florence. The stage was perfectly set for a menu promising innovation, comfort, and the finest ingredients, all tied together with a ribbon of Italian finesse. It began with what could only be described as edible art: a

Deconstructed Bruschetta, forget the standard fare of toasted bread and diced tomatoes; this was a vivid celebration of marinated cherry tomatoes, bursting with flavour and delicately balanced with a drizzle of herbaceous olive oil. It was light, refreshing and a reminder that sometimes, the simplest ingredients hold the most potential. The next dish, *Millefeuille Aubergine*, was a revelation. A delicate layering of eggplant, tomato coulis, buffalo mozzarella and basil pesto transformed the humble aubergine into something extraordinary. Each bite was an orchestra of smoky, creamy and tangy notes that remained long after the plate

was cleared. It felt like comfort food, but with the refinement you expect from an Italian maestro. Then came the *Potatoes Gnocchi*, a dish that, quite frankly, stole the show. The *gnocchi* were soft, pillowy, and bathed in a luxurious cacio e pepe sauce. But what set it apart was the addition of sour vegetable brunoise, which

provided a sharp, tangy contrast to the creamy richness. It was bold yet understated, the kind of dish that makes you pause and appreciate the skill behind it. And then, the pièce de résistance: *Tomato Tarte Tatin*. If there's a dish that can truly redefine your perception of vegetarian food, this was it. Caramelised tomatoes, their

natural sweetness amplified, rested atop a perfectly flaky pastry. The balance between the sweet and savoury flavours was brilliantly done, showcasing Chef Liberatore's ability to surprise and delight. For non-vegetarians, the feedback I heard was just as glowing. The *Red Prawn Risotto* was singled out as a showstopper, cooked to

crowned with tangy goat cheese crumble and aromatic rocket pesto, perfectly paired with the rich notes of *Fratelli Sette* wine. *Fusilli Citrus* was served with *Fratelli Sette* wine with lime scented fusilli cooked in beetroot extract and garnished with raw marinated scallops. The main course showcased a togetherness of flavours, led by the *Sunlit Chicken Rhapsody* with Chicken supreme with butternut squash and *Medley Feast*, a culinary masterpiece perfectly paired with *Fratelli J'Noon Red* wine. The addition with the same wine glasses was *Bitter Bliss* with roasted baby gem, caper fruits, pine nuts and beurre blanc sauce, making the plate look like a painted canvas.

The *Summer* symphony had *Summer Ode* with exotic fruits soup-bathed yogurt pearls on vanilla sable. The overall experience of the dessert was a unique one blended with music. There were cards explaining how the desserts explain the personalities of the people. The experience at *Sorrento* was more than just a meal; it was an unforgettable journey through the heart of Italian gastronomy, curated by Chef Mattia Bianchi's masterful touch. Each dish was a testament to his ability to merge tradition with innovation, creating a dining spectacle that celebrated the art of food. COORG: WHERE COFFEE CULTURE MEETS ASPIRATIONAL AVOCADOS



Coorg's lush landscapes are evolving, with century-old coffee plantations now sharing space with thriving rows of avocado trees, writes **GYANESHWAR DAYAL**

As I pack my bags in Delhi the AQI is reading staggering 430, the smog has dawned on the city and there is heaviness in the air, eyes burning, breathing is an effort to be undertaken. The touchdown in Kempegowda International Airport Bengaluru is smooth the temperature is almost at par with Delhi but air is breathable. The five hours journey to Coorg is tiring but relaxing scenery changes from rocky to green to lush green, on the way you get to see the Gabbar Singh's den, the place where Sholay film was shot some 40 years back. On the way we have elephant family waiting for us by the roadside and snake crosses the road as drives pushes the brakes. Yes, all of us have right to live, even snakes!

It is night already and the day is done without much fuss as we retire in 140-year-old property a British bungalow now a tata property -Taneerhulla in ama coffee trail. The morning view from the window is fascinating, Delhi smog has given way to Coorg fog, and AQI has dropped to 43! I take a deep breath, as if to store this purity and carry it back home.

Coorg, or Kodagu as it is known in Kannad is nestled in the heart of the Western Ghats, has a fascinating history shaped by its strategic location, natural resources, and the allure of its spices. This region has been a magnet for traders, rulers, and explorers, each drawn by its bounty and beauty.

The history of Coorg dates back to ancient times, with its mention in early Indian texts like the Sangam literature. The region was originally home to indigenous tribes like the Kodavas, who developed a rich culture centered around nature and agriculture. Kodavas are known for their martial traditions, unique customs, and close-knit community life, which continue to define Coorg's identity today. Over centuries, Coorg saw the rise and fall of several South Indian dynasties, including the Cholas, Gangas, Hoysalas, and Kadambas. These rulers left their imprint through temples and forts, which stand as silent witnesses to the region's historical significance.

Under British influence, the Kodavas were granted special privileges, including exemption from the Arms Act, which allowed them to retain their traditional firearms—a legacy still continues. The Western Ghats, a UNESCO World Heritage Site, are among the most biodiverse regions on the planet. Stretching over 1,600 kilometers from Gujarat to Kerala, these ancient mountains are home to an astonishing

variety of flora and fauna. In Coorg, the Western Ghats reveal their most enchanting side. Dense forests, gurgling streams, and cascading waterfalls dominate the landscape, making it a paradise for nature enthusiasts. The forests host an incredible range of plant species, from ancient trees to medicinal herbs. They are especially known for sandalwood, teak, and bamboo. The Western Ghats are a haven for wildlife, including tigers, elephants, gaur, and numerous endemic species like the Lion-tailed Macaque and Malabar Civet. NCLAT allows IL&FS to sell subsidiary IPRWL

Insolvency appellate tribunal NCLAT has given a go-ahead to debt-ridden IL&FS group for the sale of its subsidiary IL&FS Paradip Refinery Water Ltd (IPRWL) to a successful bidder.

According to reports, this may enable IL&FS to repay a debt of around Rs 1,000 crore. IPRWL was set up to meet water requirement of the 15 MTPA Paradip Refinery Project developed by IOC in Odisha.

IL&FS, which is paring its debt through asset resolution, has not received consent from IOCL for sale of its stake in IPRWL.

It had approached the National Company Law Appellate Tribunal (NCLAT), which is supervising the process, to direct IOCL to either acquire 100 per cent shareholding in IPRWL at a fair valuation or grant its consent as per the terms of the BOOT agreement and the RFP so as to enable IL&FS to sell it.

However, IOCL through its counsel submitted that the BOOT (Build, Own, Operate,

and Transfer) agreement with IL&FS was till 2039 and it cannot be divested before the said period.

Rejecting this, NCLAT said: "IOCL having not given consent for 100 per cent of the acquisition of the shareholding, we are of the view that IL&FS has to be permitted to proceed to give it to the successful bidder as per the process contemplated under the resolution framework."

However, NCLAT in its order also made it clear that the successful entity should be one who is eligible as per the terms of the BOOT agreement and has relevant technical know-how to carry on the project. "We thus accept the prayer of the appellant to proceed for giving it to the successful bidder as per the terms of the BOOT agreement and the RFP as per the process contemplated under the resolution framework to its eligible entity," said NCLAT in its order dated November 22.

IL&FS group has paid Rs 38,082 crore to its creditors as of September 30, 2024, according to the latest status report affidavit filed by the debt-ridden firm before NCLAT.

No bribes paid to secure contracts: Adani Group CFO

Maintaining that no bribes were given to government officials to secure contracts, Adani Group's chief financial officer Jageshinder Singh on Friday said that he would definitely come to know if any large amount was paid.

"We know for sure, 100 per cent, that nothing of this sort happened. Because if you are paying that much amount of cash to someone, I would certainly know," the CFO told reporters here on the sidelines of a Trust Group event.

He said the allegations made in the US against Group chairman Gautam Adani and others including his nephew Sagar Adani is a case of "unique use of prosecutorial authority" and also made it clear that it is not an attack on the group.

The individuals named in the allegations will respond and contest the charges at the proper forum, he added.

The fundamental stance of the group is that when it comes to announced investment and growth plans, capital is tied up, hinting that it will

continue with all the projects.

He said no bank has contacted the group seeking a review following the allegations made in the US earlier this month, and added that everybody is willing to give the group whatever it needs to build the infrastructure.

"...fundamentally, our banking partners, they understand we don't need their money. Precisely because we don't need it, its available to us," he said.

The group withdrew an ongoing bond sale pending the clearance of the allegations,

and added that it will go ahead with a planned private bond placement. There were no issues pending otherwise, and the next is anyways supposed to be coming after the FY25 results are out, he said.

At present, the Group has sufficient ability to repay 30 months of debt obligations, he said, adding that at no point does it go below 12 months.

Roughly about USD 3 billion of debt is coming up for repayment over the next 12 months, he said, exuding confidence that most of the banks will refinance it.

On November 26, given the immediate liquidity constraints, the Executive Board of KTM AG has decided to file an application for the initiation of judicial restructuring proceedings with self-administration over the assets



Mobility AG/KTM AG that is run out of Austria," the company said.

These developments are impacting the export volumes from Austria, India and China to its key markets in the US and Europe, it said.

"...the KTM business that is run out of India (domestic, select export markets) for which products are co-developed by KTM & Bajaj and manufactured and sold by Bajaj Auto continues to operate in the normal course during this period," the company added.

Bajaj Auto through its wholly-owned subsidiary in Netherlands Bajaj Auto International Holdings BV (BAIHVB) holds a 49.9 per cent stake in its associate -- Pierer Bajaj AG (PBAG) in Austria.

A VOICE THAT HEALS



KAILASH KHER'S journey from humble beginnings to Padma Shri is truly inspiring. Through his music, he has touched millions, sharing the struggles and moments that shaped his path and the deep connection he holds with his fans, says **SAKSHI PRIYA**

“जो टूट कर बना, जिसे मौत ने जाना,
वो क्या टूटे, वो और क्या मारे”
(What was broken and revived,
what death tried to take away,
how could it be broken again?)

These words, spoken with quiet strength, hold the raw truth of Kailash Kher's life. A life that, much like the music he creates, has been a journey of hardship, healing and everything in between. He has faced loss, endured difficult times and seen some of the darkest days. Yet, his songs are always filled with hope. This is what makes him not just a singer, but a storyteller of the human experience, a poet of strength. His music isn't just sound; it's a conversation with the soul. A conversation that comes from the heart of Kailash Kher, a man whose very being is felt in every note he sings.

When he speaks about his journey, you can almost hear the weight of each experience in his voice, as if every word he shares is filled with emotion, shaped by years of struggle and success. In December 2016, a moment that would forever change his life arrived, though it took another few months for the reality to sink in. By April 2017, it was confirmed, he was to receive the Padma Shri, one of India's highest civilian awards. The news was a whirlwind of emotions, not just for him, but for his family. “I first told my sister,” he recalls with a soft smile. “It was a moment of joy because, in Delhi, we had suffered a lot. We left our homes, lived like orphans and went through many different experiences. We saw the world changing, relationships changing and people's attitudes changing, all of these shifts happened at a young age.”

His journey from hardship to honour is one of resilience. He talks about his childhood in Delhi, a city that seemed to change before his very eyes, as people, relationships and even attitudes shifted. Yet, despite the hardships, Delhi, in all its complexity, gave him the opportunity to realise his dreams. The recognition came not just for his music but for the spirit with which he has approached life. From a young age, music was more than just a

passion, it was his way of being. “As a child of 4 or 5, I was already curious about music, but I didn't sing the popular songs of the time,” he shares. Instead, he gravitated toward unique sounds that defied the norm. “I didn't sing filmi songs, ghazals, bhajans or qawwalis. I didn't sing what was already there. People were curious, what does this child sing and how?” It was this originality that later led to the birth of Kailash, a name that would become synonymous with spiritual and soul-stirring music.

As his career grew, his live performances became a way for him to connect deeply with his audience. “In Kota, Rajasthan, a girl came to one of my shows with a blade, saying she would harm herself if she didn't get to meet me. She was a devotee and my music was more than entertainment to her, it was her lifeline,” he remembers. “When I found out, I asked her to drop the blade, and she did. It was one of those moments that reminded me of the emotional power music holds. It's not just about melodies; it's about healing.” Every song he writes, sings and composes holds a piece of his soul. “When I sing, it's a reflection of my own emotions. But once it's out there, it becomes part of someone else's story too,” he explains. His music resonates with listeners in a way that breaks through language and culture, offering a universal connection.

Despite his success in Bollywood, he differentiates the impact of film music from his non-film compositions. “Film audiences are looking for light entertainment but non-film music carries deeper emotions,” he says. “Non-film music touches the soul, while film music is more fleeting. Each platform has its unique audience and I enjoy the challenge of catering to different frequencies.” But no career comes without its challenges and his own journey wasn't without rejection. He remembers the time when his song “Allah Ke Bande” was initially dismissed. “At the time, I didn't understand the film industry very well. They told me it was a film song but it didn't have the usual budget. I had doubts. But when the song became a hit, the same people who rejected it came asking for collaboration. That song did become a turning point in my career and it was

a lesson that sometimes the smallest beginnings lead to the biggest breakthroughs.” Reflecting on his career, he is humble about his influence. “People often ask me which of my songs defines me. It's difficult to choose. Life is so full of shifting emotions. Each song represents a different phase. Take ‘Piya Ghar Aavenge,’ for example, it's about the anticipation of a reunion. Or ‘Teri Deewani,’ which is about the intensity of love. And then there's ‘Saiyyan,’ a song about surrendering to something greater than yourself. Each one reflects a part of my journey but none can define it entirely.” As for the impact of his music, he says that whether he is performing in India or abroad, the connection is the same. “Wherever I go, people connect with my music because it speaks to their hearts. Whether in the US or India, our indian audience understands the joy of life. But in Delhi,” he adds with a mischievous grin, “there's a certain energy here, a special ‘dhamaal’ that is unmatched.” He may not have imagined this journey when he first started singing as a child, but today, his music has touched the hearts of millions. It is the story of a boy who didn't follow the conventional path, a boy who sang from his heart and whose voice continues to resonate with the world. The Padma Shri award is just one chapter in his extraordinary journey, a journey that continues to inspire and uplift. Kher's journey is a beautiful reminder of the power of music to connect us to something deeper within ourselves.

Kailash Kher doesn't just make music; he shares pieces of his own story, inviting us all to reflect on our own. Every track, Kher insists, is a piece of his soul. “They're not just songs,” he says. “They're my prayers, my truths. And once they're out in the world, they take on lives of their own.” Much like the lyrics of Piya Ghar Aavenge, “आज मेरे पिया घर आवेंगे, हे-री, सखी, मंगल गाओ री, धरती-अंबर सजाओ री, उतरेगी आज मेरे प्यो की सवारी”, they speak of waiting, of anticipation, of the quiet joy that comes from knowing something beautiful is about to happen. Waiting isn't always celebrated, but his music shows us that there is beauty in the moments in between. The stillness and hope that accompany the wait remind us that sometimes the most profound moments in life aren't the arrivals, but the journeys we take while waiting. In his own way, Kailash Kher teaches us that there is an art to waiting. It's in those moments of anticipation when we hold our breath and trust that what we're waiting for will be worth it. Just like the joy in the song, the waiting itself is part of the magic, making the reunion all the more meaningful when it finally arrives.

FROM THE MAN HIMSELF

What one piece of advice to your younger self, the Kailash Kher just starting out, what would it be and why?

I would say, “You have never slept for 12 years, nor eaten properly. How did you survive without eating and sleeping? Eat a little, sleep a little and embrace life fully. Be human.” I lived like this, living many lives within one birth.

Is there any collaboration or project you have been wanting to do but haven't had the chance yet?

I have no desires or plans. I am a man with no plan and I cherish that state of being. My only “want” is that I have no wants and my only “desire” is to have no desires. I believe life flows best when you're not tied down by endless aspirations. Instead, I would advise others to focus on taking care of themselves first physically, mentally and spiritually, before chasing desires.

What message will you give to the younger generation who are coming into music?

I don't give advice often because I believe when you give something valuable, it should be respected. Because when you give something that holds value, it is respected. If you give it for free, it is not. If someone truly wants it, they will take it. If they don't want it, they won't. That's why I believe one should stay true to themselves, neither giving nor taking. If someone insists and asks me for advice, my advice would be this: “Never give advice to anyone. Neither give nor take. Just stay within yourself, and truly be true to yourself.”

Who do you think would be the right person to portray your entire journey, from childhood to the present, in a film?

I don't look at it from that perspective and that's why I never have. Most people aren't fully honest in their work. In creativity, too, many people repeat the same things in the name of “new.” They claim to be creating something very unique, but it's already been done. Everyone's life and story are unique and to capture that uniqueness, you need a creator who's equally different. It's possible that someone who's never done it before, or even if they have, can bring something fresh to it because they understand the nuances of art and craft. If they can get it right, then it will have that newness and originality.

CHILL, GRILL, THRILL AT CHILI'S!

REVIEW

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Step into Chili's at Nexity, Hyderabad and you're instantly transported to a vibrant food haven. The ambiance strikes a fine balance between lively and laid-back, a modern interpretation of a Tex-Mex cantina. The warm, earthy tones of the décor, the rustic wooden accents and the subtle pops of colour reminiscent of a fiesta make it a visual delight. The upbeat yet cozy atmosphere is punctuated by the clinking of plates and the hum of happy diners. Add to that the faint sizzle from the open kitchen and you know you're in for a culinary adventure. Let's talk about the star of the menu, the Fresh Mex Rice Bowl, a dish that seems to embody Chili's in a single plate. The first thing you notice is how beautifully it's plated, a riot of colours that could rival a summer garden. At its heart is a bed of fragrant rice, warm and slightly smoky. Then come the toppings: crisp field greens, sweet corn and black bean salsa and house-made pico de gallo that bursts with freshness in every bite.

My version featured crispy broccoli, fried to golden perfection, making a strong case for veggies as the heroes of Tex-Mex cuisine. If you're feeling adventurous (and indulgent), add avocado slices, they elevate the dish to something borderline divine. Pickled vegetables add a punchy tang, perfectly complementing the creamy, garlicky sauce drizzled generously over the dish. The vibrant pico and fresh greens keep it light, but the cottage cheese steals the show with its hearty, melt-in-your-mouth texture. I feel what we don't recognise is that the person who pushes us to do something that we've never done before is also changing because they're actually asking for what they want for the very first time. I think that is what drew me to my character in *Khwaabon Ka Jhamela* because yes, there's this taboo around marriage. There's a taboo that you can't tell your family, or your friends that sex is bad in a relationship. Then I get to play that character, who says no because my

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For comic book creator Josh Blaylock, the past isn't just a place to revisit; it's a treasure trove waiting to be reimagined. Known for bringing iconic 1980s franchises like *G.I. Joe* back into the cultural spotlight, he has a keen understanding of the power of nostalgia. "Originally, the huge resurgence of the 1980s was simply due to the fact that it had not been done yet," he explains. "My company was the first (in comics) to bring back such a brand from the 1980s and everyone was now an adult, in their 20s and they wanted to see it come back the way they remembered it—in their head, not in reality—and a little more edgy." The appeal wasn't just in the characters or stories but in the era itself. "It was the first time that a generation had grown up with this huge amalgamation of cartoons, comics, toys, lunch boxes, pajamas, McDonald's Happy Meals and so much other collectible merchandise," says Josh. "The older generation did not understand how powerful this nostalgia would be." Today, the allure of 1980s culture endures, driven by an older fan base and younger audiences alike. While Generation X continues to embrace the era that defined their childhoods, he believes younger fans are drawn to its pre-internet charm. "I can't help but think there is a romanticization about it in part because it is as close as we will ever get to modern society before the internet changed everything." Beyond reviving past favourites, his original creation, *Mercy Sparx*, is poised to leap from the comic pages to the big screen with MGM. The character—a devil-girl working for Heaven to hunt rogue angels—comes with her own set of challenges in adaptation. "One of the core elements of the *Mercy Sparx* story is that she herself does not evolve," he notes. "Whenever she is given the chance to move forward, she sabotages her own success." Still, he insists that certain aspects of the character

must remain intact. "It's important that they keep the main 'hook' of the story—a devil that works for *Heaven*. She must also be a counterculture, genuinely reluctant character who is forced into the job against her will and has a snarky attitude about the whole thing." Maintaining her punk-rock roots and subcultural aesthetic poses another challenge. "There are very specific nuances, like her style and the comic books' influences from certain music subculture aesthetics—punk, goth, metal, etc.—that are hard to keep in sync with film elements, but I do my best to exert influence where I can."

With one foot in the past and another in bold new worlds, his creative journey proves that great stories—whether nostalgic or original—never truly go out of style.

For him, the comic book medium is more than just a vehicle for entertainment—it's a powerful tool for education, reflection, and cultural dialogue. From addressing historical tragedies to exploring the future of technology, his diverse body of work showcases the versatility of comics to tackle complex topics with nuance and impact.

In his graphic novel *Operation Nemesis*, he delves into the Armenian Genocide through the lens of Soghomon Tehlirian, the man who assassinated Talaat Pasha, the architect of the genocide. "I was approached by two Armenian cousins who wanted this story told from an outsider's perspective," he

shares. The project, marking the 100th anniversary of the genocide, proved both an emotional and rewarding endeavor.

To accurately portray the events, he immersed himself in research, including a treasure trove of early 20th-century New York Times articles chronicling the genocide and its aftermath. "The critical moment was when I found the actual court hearing from the German court system," he says. This document, alongside interviews with historians and accounts from Tehlirian's family, revealed a narrative of tragedy, espionage, and justice. "It all combines to make an incredible tale of tragedy, triumphs, espionage, and drama," he reflects.

With Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez and the Freshman Force, he tackled the polarised world of modern politics through a mix of satire and tribute. "The key is to embrace different styles and perspectives from several creators," he explains. The result was a time capsule of the political zeitgeist, designed to entertain and educate while capturing the essence of a transformative moment in U.S. history. "Should

someone read it twenty, or even fifty years later, it would represent a true snapshot of that era," he adds.

His fascination with Bitcoin led to the creation of *The Bitcoin Comic Handbook*, a project that simplifies complex concepts of cryptocurrency through visual storytelling. "Comics allow you to communicate visuals and words in a way that no other medium does," he says. Part comic, part illustrated prose, the book demystifies Bitcoin beyond its financial implications, earning accolades from the tech community.

For him, comics remain his go-to medium for exploring passions, whether historical, political, or technological. "It's in my DNA," he says. "When I get passionate about something, I need an outlet and 'Comics are something all their own,'" he says. And under Blaylock's deft hand, they continue to expand their boundaries, proving that no topic is too heavy—or too complex—for this unique art form.

He is celebrated for his work across diverse genres, balancing crafting immersive fictional worlds and

Conversely, creating fictional worlds means defining their rules and letting characters flourish within them. "People love to create lore, but the hard part is crafting living, breathing characters that connect emotionally with readers," he says. A relatable character serves as a guide, making even the most fantastical stories accessible.

Reflecting on the role of comics in today's world, Baylock wishes the medium had greater cultural influence, especially beyond superhero narratives. "Comics are the source of so much entertainment, but many don't realise how much of what they consume started in comics," he says. Beyond entertainment, comics have proven effective educational tools, even adopted by the military to explain complex concepts.

As a pioneer in self-publishing with Devil's Due Comics, Baylock offers practical advice for aspiring creators. His forthcoming guide, *Breaking Into Comics: No More Rules*, emphasises the importance of simply starting. "No one is waiting to give you permission to call yourself a comic book

creator," he asserts. While early attempts may fail, they offer invaluable lessons that fuel growth. He highlights the enduring power of direct audience connections, particularly in an age of AI-assisted art. Having witnessed the industry's transformation, Baylock acknowledges significant progress in diversity. "When I started, comic cons were over 90% male, and most characters were white," he recalls. The rise of manga in the early 2000s marked a turning point, bringing in younger, more diverse readers and creators.

Today, conventions often attract a female-majority audience and indie comics continue to expand storytelling horizons. "The melting pot is growing," he says. Baylock is optimistic about the medium's future, fuelled by a new generation of readers and creators inspired by manga and innovative storytelling.

From delving into historical narratives to imagining alternate ancient worlds, his work highlights the limitless potential of comics. As the medium evolves, he remains a passionate advocate for its ability to entertain, educate and connect with audiences on a deeply human level.

For him, the path to becoming a comic creator seemed inevitable. "I was born wanting to draw and write stories," he shares, recalling how even as a toddler, he was constantly sketching. Early encounters with influential comics cemented his passion, beginning with his discovery of *G.I. Joe*. "The first issue I found in a store blew my mind; it felt so grown-up and became the first series I collected monthly."

Key moments followed rapidly: the debut of the 1989 *Batman* movie introduced him to *The Dark Knight Returns* and *The Killing Joke*. "I had no business reading those at 12, but fortunately, my mom didn't know," he jokes. The realisation that the Teenage Mutant Ninja Turtles started as an edgy, indie comic further expanded his perspective, leading him to the black-and-white indie scene. With the formation of Image Comics, he was "all in on comics all day, every day."

His enthusiasm hasn't waned. "I'm still constantly influenced and excited by new comics and art—it never stops."

When I did my first ad, I was in fourth grade. At a gathering, my mother's friend saw something in me. They contacted my mother right away with coordinators and together we were able to get my pictures clicked. I had a complete portfolio made! I looked amazing! I was a tomboy and because I was so into this at the time, I was there for every ad that came out. At that age, I was just having fun and didn't know how to pose. I had started off really carefree. My debut in films occurred when I had a chance to meet the film's director, while she was casting actors for *Kanda Naal Mudhal*. I had previously collaborated with her on a documentary. I don't want whatever I do to come across as a publicity stunt. After becoming an actress, I took a long time to come to terms with the fact that controversies will likely occur on a daily basis. Until I receive a bountiful offer, I still won't do any special songs—certainly not in Telugu, but perhaps in another language. I still stick to my statement. After *Saana Kashtam*, I refused a lot of special songs! I just need to give credit for one amazing song and that was with Chiranjeevi garu. What could be greater than this? In my opinion, he is the biggest star in the south! Next, I can change my mind if it involves Mahesh Babu (giggles). I've always worked with the Mega family; so, we're extremely close.

NENJAM MARAPPATHILLAI WAS MEANT TO BE HER LAST FILM!

Under Selvaraghavan's direction, I recall acting in *Nenjam Marappathillai*. I wasn't in the finest of mental state when I did the film! I had made the decision that it would be my final movie. But that didn't work out and I was dealing with a lot of personal problems. Destiny had bigger plans for me. I felt a lot more confident after doing the film.



EVARU CAST & CREW BECAME 'HER PEOPLE'

The *Evaru* movie is one of my favourite shooting moments. On that set, the closeness with the creative team was unthinkable! We were more than just actors on that set; we used to have a lot of conversations and private talks. I was really ill throughout the movie and they all made sure I was given the greatest care possible. It was out of sheer humanity, not because I was the actress. They all transcended the idea that we are merely here to work! I formed some lifelong, extremely close relationships during that movie. They became my people.

NO COMPROMISE ON VALUES!

I was informed that I would need to reside in Mumbai and go to meetings when I had first expressed interest in working in the north. In the south, we don't do that. Although you network, you don't actually meet people. In the south, there is no such thing as a casting agent; managers and PROs are all that exist! The marketplaces in the south have now been penetrated by talent management firms. When it comes to Hindi, it's much more competitive. I don't think I'm the type of person who would sell oneself for a job. I am unable to go lobby for anything. However, I then realised that I wouldn't receive it if I didn't do this. I came to terms with the fact that many people felt I wasn't as aggressive as my colleagues. It simply seemed so rushed. Now that I have a team that advocates for me, I come down to just try out and I am thrilled with them.

BREAK FROM RELATIONSHIPS

Having a strong sense of independence, I would not listen to anyone. He needs to look after me and be safe. I am a serial dater who has had a lot of relationships throughout my life, but I am currently taking a sabbatical. I am so direct that I have had parents of ex-boyfriends question me about things I say. I can't lie, though. For me, love would include two things. Although I am not sure how to define love, if I were to give it any criteria, it would be having an unconditional understanding of one another and being open to each other's development. A date would be ideal anywhere outside. It only needs to be something my partner and I would like doing together; it doesn't need to be romantic. I must admit that before working on the movie, I had never met Ajith sir. After we finished filming, everyone got to meet him. No one I have seen has the charm and charisma that he does. He took great care to ensure that the movie was released in a proper manner.

HOSTING GIG AT GACHIBOWLI STADIUM

Another favourite memory is co-hosting with Shirish and Navdeep. We worked on rehearsals and I had the opportunity to collaborate with the Telugu-speaking scripting team because the event was being held at Hyderabad's Gachibowli Stadium and I was hosting the Telugu portion of it. I also wore a really nice dress. I believe Gabrielle McGu. I'm not entirely sure who designed it, but it resembled a net dress and the Telugu journalists gave me a lot of flak for it. I wanted to step up my fashion game since they always treated me like this sweet girl.
