## Plane bursts into flames

**179 people perish in South Korea**

A passenger plane skidded off a runway at a South Korean airport Sunday, slammed into a concrete fence and burst into flames after its front landing gear apparently failed to deploy. All but two of the 181 people on board died in one of the country's worst aviation disasters. The Jeju Air plane crashed while landing in the town of Muan, about 290 kilometres south of Seoul. The Transport Ministry said the plane was a 15-year-old Boeing 737-800 jet that had arrived from Bangkok and that the crash happened at 9:03 am.

A total of 179 people — 85 women, 84 men and 10 others whose genders weren't immediately identifiable — died in the fire, the South Korean fire agency said. Emergency workers pulled two people, both crew members, to safety. Health officials said they are conscious and not in life-threatening condition. Among the 177 bodies so far found, officials have so far identified 88 of them, the fire agency said. The passengers were predominantly South Korean, as well as two Thai nationals. Thailand's Foreign Ministry said its embassy in Seoul received confirmation from South Korean authorities that the two Thai

passengers were among the fatalities. The fire agency deployed 32 fire trucks and several helicopters to contain the blaze. About 1,570 firefighters, police officers, soldiers and other officials were also sent to the site, according to the fire

agency and transport ministry. Footage of the crash aired by South Korean television channels showed the plane skidding across the airstrip at high speed. **Continued on Page 2**



## No headway on Rythu Bharosa

Cabinet panel fails to arrive at consensus on guidelines

The Cabinet Sub-Committee on the Rythu Bharosa Scheme has not yet arrived at a consensus on Rythu Bharosa guidelines.

It is learnt that the Committee will meet again and that the members of the Cabinet Sub-Committee had

heated arguments on whether to give Rythu Bharosa sops to taxpayers.

It is learnt that the Cabinet Sub-Committee analysed the proposed Rythu Bharosa conditions and its political impact.

It is learnt that a member of the Cabinet Sub-Committee objected to the condition not to give Rythu Bharosa to taxpayers saying that

there are lakhs of taxpayers in the SCCL belt which covers the former districts of Khammam, Karimnagar and Adilabad and that it will damage the interests of the Congress if such conditions are imposed.

It is learnt that the Cabinet Sub-Committee arrived at a consensus only on one proposed condition, that is, Rythu Bharosa should be given to cultivated lands.

However, the Committee asked officials to prepare reports on the basis of information collected from across the state in the past and submit it to the Cabinet Sub-Committee.

The Cabinet Sub-Committee discussed several issues on Sunday at the Secretariat. The Committee discussed the guidelines to identify farmers eligible for the Rythu Bharosa scheme. The Cabinet Sub-Committee will submit its recommendations to the Cabinet after meeting once again.

The Committee discussed the way the scheme was being implemented from the time it was launched. It also discussed the opinions of farmers collected from across the state when the Committee members toured the state. They also discussed the information the officials collected, it is learnt.

## 'Harish wanted SIT probe into ORR lease to fix KTR & KCR'

Roads and Buildings (R&B) Minister Komatireddy Venkat Reddy said that BRS MLA T. Harish Rao had asked the government to appoint a Special Investigation Team (SIT) to probe the alleged irregularities in the Outer Ring Road (ORR) lease tenders only to fix former Chief Minister K. Chandrasekhar Rao and his son KT Rama Rao.

Addressing the media on Sunday, he said that Harish had made the demand only to fix his uncle and cousin. The Chief Minister accepted Harish's demand and



ordered the constitution of a SIT to probe the ORR lease scam, he added.

Venkat made it clear the SIT will probe the alleged irregularities in granting the ORR lease and the law will take its own course.

Targeting KTR, Venkat said that thieves involved in the Formula-E-Car Racing were found and that the thieves behind granting ORR lease tenders would also be detected one day.

He said that the Regional Ring Road (RRR) is a turquoise necklace around Hyderabad city and that it got Central permission in 2017. However, it could not be completed as the BRS Government was in deep slumber.

Venkat said that he had met the Union Minister of Road Transport and National Highways, Nitin Gadkari, and had ensured that the tender process for RRR North was launched. He said the RRR road will cover 50 per cent of Telangana and the RRR will play a key role in the development of Hyderabad.

**Demands govt to pay students' fees before Sankranti**

Union Minister of State for Home Affairs Bandi Sanjay Kumar demanded that the state government should pay students' fee reimbursement arrears before Sankranti.

He issued an ultimatum stating that if this is not done, massive protests will be launched after Sankranti under the leadership of Kishan Reddy. He also demanded the immediate fulfilment of the promise to fill two lakh posts in government service.

He said that the Congress failed to fulfil any of the promises it made in its 'Youth Declaration'. They didn't even honour their commitment

to pay an unemployment allowance of Rs 4,000. The government owes

Vijayanand felicitated candidates who had secured government jobs after undergoing training at the 'Deen Dayal Coaching Centre', on Sunday at his MP's camp office in Karimnagar. The coaching centre was established by Sanjay.

## Countdown begins for ISRO's space docking experiment

The countdown for ISRO's Space Docking Experiment onboard a PSLV rocket on Monday that would be a key milestone in India's space programme, commenced on Sunday evening, the space agency said. A cost-effective technology demonstrator mission for in-space docking, it would make India join an elite list featuring China, Russia and the US.

ISRO has scheduled the lift-off of the PSLV-C60 rocket, at 9.58 pm from the first launch pad at this spaceport here on December 30 and it would carry SpaDeX with two spacecraft as the primary payloads along with 24 secondary payloads.

"PSLV-C60/SpaDeX Mission Launch countdown commenced at 9 pm" on Sunday, an ISRO official told PTI. The in-space docking technology would be essential for taking up

India's ambitions in space including sending human to the Moon, bringing samples from there, and also building and operating India's own space station- Bharatiya Antariksh

Station. The docking technology would also be utilised when multiple rocket launches are planned to achieve common mission objectives.

ISRO said the two spacecraft in the PSLV rocket-- Spacecraft A (SDX01) and Spacecraft B (SDX02) would be placed in an orbit that would keep them 5 km apart from each other. Later, scientists at ISRO headquarters would try to bring them closer up to 3 metre which would subsequently lead them for merging together at an altitude of about 470km above Earth. The process is expected to take place about 10-14 days after the scheduled lift-off on Monday, ISRO officials said.

In the SpaDeX mission, Spacecraft A carries a High Resolution Camera, while Spacecraft B has Miniature Multispectral Payload and a Radiation Monitor Payload. These payloads would provide high resolution images, natural resource monitoring, vegetation studies among others.

Politics makes strange bedfellows. The wedding of a top cop's son, apart from being a family affair in the company of near and dear, became an unintended networking hub for Bharatiya Janata Party and Congress leaders. A little birdie tells us that amidst the celebrations; a Union Minister and a prominent Telangana Minister were found engaged deeply in a conversation. While the details of their predictably juicy exchange remain a matter of conjecture, onlookers within their earshot could not help speculate the probabilities. A little bird told us that it looked intense-like they weren't just talking about the wedding menu. Could this be a rare moment of camaraderie, or was it political chess being played under the canopy of festivity? Only time will tell!

## KTR'S FORMULA E CASE TWIST SENDS BABUS SCRAMBLING FOR COVER

The latest twist to the Formula E case has sent shockwaves through bureaucratic corridors, with Arvind Kumar's ordeal leaving a lasting impact. Bureaucrats, normally habituated to follow verbal directives, are now insistent on obtaining written orders from their political bosses, wary as they are now of being caught in the political crossfire at any time in the future if not now. Former minister KT Rama Rao, who had once declared 'Ask me' on matters relating to the probe, thus endorsing his camaraderie with officials, took an unexpected stance while filing his counter affidavit. He pinned the blame squarely on departments for procedural lapses. He contended that any procedural irregularities in the execution of the agreement were the responsibility of the officers concerned. Despite his political finesse, even KTR admitted in court that ministers don't handle procedures—a statement that has further unsettled the bureaucracy. What had started with MAUD Secretary Arvind Kumar and the Chief Engineer being under scrutiny has now spread to include other officers, notably from finance. "When blame starts flying, it doesn't stop at one department," an insider quipped. The political drama may dominate headlines, but within government offices, the atmosphere these days is one of extreme caution and deep-seated distrust.

## AVINASH MOHANTY BREAKS MOULD AND LETS ACTIONS SPEAK LOUDER

At a time when publicity-hungry cops never miss an opportunity to pose with recoveries of booties after busting gangs of property offenders or bull-doing modified bike silencers as if they went beyond their call of duty; Avinash Mohanty, the youngest Police Commissioner, is rewriting the rule-book, and it is not going unnoticed. Steering clear of the spotlight, Mohanty gets his team's Deputy Commissioners to hold press conferences - in stark contrast to the ways of his predecessors who basked in media glare. "At the Commissioner level, my job is to empower my team," Mohanty told this correspondent, after the Annual Press Meet. "It has been nearly two years, but how many press meetings have you actually seen me in?" While deigning to attend the annual pressers, Mohanty has extended his minimalist style to the annual reports. Last year, he ditched the hefty booklets for a single sheet encapsulating vital statistics. This year, he pared it down further: pure data, no frills. What if other Commissioners proudly display office headshots? "Why waste space with photos when journalists need the facts?" a senior officer under his command quipped. Clearly, Mohanty is on a mission to let the numbers do the talking. His quiet revolution has started making waves.

## RANGANATH KEEPS THE IPS TRADITION ALIVE AT HYDRABAD

# Kavitha must withdraw comment saying Centre filing cases to intimidate BRS leaders: Raghunandan

The BJP's Medak MP, M. Raghunandan Rao, asked BRS MLC Kavitha to withdraw her comment that the Centre is filing cases to intimidate BRS leaders.

Extending solidarity to agitating Samagra Shiksha contract employees at Sangareddy on Sunday, Raghunandan asked Kavitha to explain what connection the BJP and Prime Minister Modi have with the case filed against BRS MLA KT Rama Rao.

The case filed against KTR

is for sending funds from the exchequer to foreign countries for the Formula E-Car Racing event without getting the permission of the Election Commission, the RBI and the Centre, he said.

Reacting to the allegations of Kavitha against the Centre made at Nizamabad on Sunday, he said that BRS leaders are shedding crocodile tears for BCs. He asked Kavitha to reveal what connection she has with BCs. "Why did Kavitha speak for the BCs when the BRS was in power for 10 years?" he asked.

Raghunandan pointed out that the BRS government was supposed to give 10 minister posts to BCs. However, it gave only two or three Minister posts to BCs and Kavitha never spoke about that, he said.

Describing the BRS as a dead snake, Raghunandan demanded that the BRS should give its party president post or the BRSLP leader post to a BC if it is sincere.

"Why didn't Kavitha speak about the BC census when the BRS was in power and why is she speaking about that now," he said.

# No safety for public under Congress rule: Harish

Heinous crimes like the murder of retired bank man-

ager Ganga Reddy and his wife in Amberpet (4 months ago) and BRS leader Sridhar Reddy (6 months ago) remain unsolved. No arrests, no justice. Over 163 major crimes are unresolved, and financial frauds worth ₹10 crore have not been solved. Telangana's crime detection rate of 31% is now worse than Bihar's 39%.

The golden period for solving crimes—the first week after the incident—is being wasted. Victims and families are left without justice while criminals roam free. Police inaction is alarming. Despite the expertise of the Telangana Police, governance failure under CM @revanth annu-la who handles the Home Ministry, is evident. Law and order have deteriorated. Instead of addressing public safety and justice, the Congress is busy politicking."

Apart from this significant mission, scientists would also conduct the PSLV Orbital Experimental Module-4 (POEM-4) in which 24 payloads--14 from ISRO and 10 from industry and academia, would be placed in the desired orbits one after the other over a 90 minute period after the lift-off.

The life of the payloads in the fourth stage would be about three to four months. The vehicle for the PSLV-C60 mission used here would be the 18th Core-Alone variant. This would be ISRO's last mission in 2024 and the PSLV-C60 is the first vehicle to be integrated upto the fourth stage at the PSLV Integration Facility that has been established here.

"College managements are incurring losses and are on the verge of closure. They are pressuring students to pay fees. Students are caught between the government and managements. apparently with its landing gear still closed, overrunning the runway and colliding head-on with a concrete wall on the outskirts of the facility, triggering an explosion. Other local TV stations aired footage showing thick plumes of black smoke billowing from the plane, which was engulfed in flames. Lee Jeong-hyeon, chief of the Muan fire station, told a televised briefing that the plane was completely destroyed, with only the tail assembly remaining recognisable among the wreckage. Lee said that workers were looking into various possibilities about what caused the crash, including whether the aircraft was struck by birds, Lee said.

Transport Ministry officials later said their early assessment of communication records show the airport control tower issued a bird strike warning to the plane shortly before it intended to land and gave its pilot permission to land in a different area. The pilot sent out a distress signal shortly before the plane overshot the end of the runway and skidded

across a buffer zone before hitting the wall, the officials said.

Senior Transport Ministry official Joo Jong-wan said workers have retrieved the flight data and cockpit voice recorders of the plane's black box, which will be examined by government experts investigating the cause of the crash and fire. He said it may take months for investigators to complete their probe. The runway at the Muan airport will be closed until January 1, the ministry said. Thailand's prime minister, Paetongtarn Shinawatra, expressed deep condolences to the families of those affected by the accident in a post on social platform X. Paetongtarn said she ordered the Ministry of Foreign Affairs to provide assistance immediately.

Kerati Kijmanawat, the director of Airports of Thailand, confirmed in a statement that Jeju Air flight 7C 2216 departed from Suvarnabhumi Airport with no reports of abnormal conditions with the aircraft or on the runway.

# Koneru Humpy creates history

## Grabs historic women's Rapid chess world title

Grandmaster Koneru Humpy capped a wonderful year for Indian chess, defeating Irene Sukandar of Indonesia to emerge the FIDE Women's World Rapid Chess champion here on Sunday.

Humpy had won the event back in 2019 at Georgia and the Indian No. 1 is only the second player after China's Ju Wenjun to clinch the title more than once. Humpy's achievement laced a sensational year for the chess fraternity after D Gukesh defeated China's Ding Liren to emerge champion in the classical format World Championship recently in Singapore.

In September, India had also won its first-ever gold medals in Open and Women's categories in the Chess Olympiad in Budapest. The Indian, who started the tournament here with a first-round defeat,

was the lone winner in the 11th and final round, helping her to top the tables with 8.5 points, half a point clear of six others including compatriot D Harika. "I'm very excited and happy. In fact, I expected it to be a very tough day, like some sort of tie-break. But when I finished the game, the arbitrator told me (about winning), and it was a tense moment for me," said Humpy, who began with black pieces, after her victory.

"So, this is quite unexpected because the whole year I have been struggling and I had very bad tournaments where I just

ended up in last place. So, this came as a surprise," she added.

Ju Wenjun of China finished second as the tie-break was resolved while Kateryna Lagno of Russia ended third. Harika, who had eight points, had to be content with a fifth-place finish. Humpy credited her family for the success. "I think it was possible because of the support from my family. My husband and my parents... they support me a lot. My parents look after my daughter when I travel. "It's not easy to become a World Champion at 37. It's quite difficult when you get older to keep that motivation and stay sharp when required. I'm glad that I made it," she said.

The seasoned player said she was motivated to do well after her first round defeat, which saw her eventually slipping to 2.5 points after four rounds.

"I started with a loss. I was 2.5/4, then on the second day I won four games," she added.

Humpy said her victory will now prompt other Indians to take up chess. "I think it's high time for India. We also have Gukesh as world champion and now I got the second world title in the rapid event. So, I think this will motivate a lot of youngsters to take up chess professionally," she noted.

Meanwhile in the open section, young 18-year-old Russian Grandmaster Volodar Murzin won the gold medal ahead of a star studded field showing tremendous nerves.

Watch for signs like mood swings, withdrawal, or secrecy. The most important was to identify and deal with cyber bullying. Ask children to keep records and save screenshots or messages as evidence of bullying.

For kids the settings of Youtube kids was explained as screen time is increasing due to the content on original Youtube.

There is also different section on how parents can have control on their children's games applications to limit the timings.

## National BC Welfare Association demands increase in reservations

The National BC Welfare Association has demanded that the government increase reservations for Backward Classes (BCs) in Panchayati Raj institutions from 20% to 42%, as promised in the Congress manifesto. At a state-level meeting chaired by Nila Venkatesh, representatives from 30 BC unions, 39 caste unions, employees and student unions participated.

In the meeting on Sunday, president R Krishnaiah emphasised the need for urgent action, citing the manifesto's promise to increase reservations for sarpanchs, MPTC, ZPTC and ward members to 42%. He warned of potential legal challenges if reservations are delayed until after a caste census. Krishnaiah urged Parliament to amend the Constitution, questioning why

similar urgency shown for upper caste reservations cannot be extended to BCs, who make up 50% of the population.

Recalling history, Krishnaiah highlighted that former chief ministers NT Rama Rao and Vijayabhaskar Reddy raised BC reservations, but the Supreme Court later reduced them to 22%. Since then, protests have been held,

pushing for a caste census and higher reservations. The meeting adopted key resolutions, such as to increase BC reservations in local elections to 42%. Remove the creamy layer in education and job reservations. Form 40 more caste-based corporations. Provide 50% political reservations for BCs. Establish a separate ministry for BCs and special

development schemes. Grant BC employees reservations in promotions. Increase job and education reservations from 27% to 56%. Extend post-matric scholarships and fee reimbursement. Mandate SC/ST/BC reservations in the private sector.

The association urged immediate action, warning of protests if demands are unmet.



### CHILDREN SUFFER FROM THROAT INFECTIONS

## 100 families suffer from health issues due to waste burning at Gayathri Colony

Increased waste burning at Gayathri Colony dump yard is causing severe health issues for 100 families, according to residents in Muthangi village, Patancheru mandal.

Waste from the village and nearby areas has been dumped into potholes, which over time have become large piles of plastic and sewage waste. To reduce the foul odor and make space for more garbage, the waste is frequently set on fire. Over the past six months, this has caused children to suffer from throat infections and other health problems.

The 100 families in Gayathri Colony must use the 100-foot dump yard road to reach the main road. While passing, they experience foul odours, thick smoke and harmful gases from burning plastic. The

waste burning, which is occasional, has now become a 24/7 problem, is filling the surroundings with toxic smoke and worsening air quality.

Despite complaints to the Tellapur Municipal Commissioner, no action has been taken. Residents worry about serious long-term health effects, including skin diseases and cancer. Many of the families have already become habituated to the stench, garbage and pollution, but the continuous burning poses a grave risk to their well-being.

The residents urge the Tellapur Municipal Commissioner to act and find a new dumping site to stop further harm to their health and environment. The colony families state that they are suffering from worsening health problems daily, leading to serious complications.



## Air Force Academy conducts training for 54 NCC cadets

## IMD predicts foggy conditions in Telangana

## Overall crime in TG witnesses increase of 22.53%, says DGP

### CYBERCRIMES SAW A STAGGERING INCREASE OF 43.33 PER CENT

Overall crime in Telangana has witnessed a rise with an increase of 22.53 per cent from 1,38,312 cases in 2023 to 1,69,477 cases in 2024 with an increase of 31,165 cases, according to the annual report released by Director General of Police (DGP) Dr Jitender on Sunday in Hyderabad.

"The State has been largely calm as situation has been brought to control in the year 2024. There has been lot of concentration on convictions and seizures. The three Commissionerates, along with Narcotic Drugs Wing, have worked very well. In all, 85 extremists were arrested

in Telangana and activities of Naxals remained largely under check," said Dr Jitender. The conviction rate remains decreased to 35.63 per cent against 2023 with 36.85 per cent.

Cybercrimes saw a staggering increase of 43.33 per cent, while incidents of murder, rape, cheating, robbery and burglary also rose significantly across the State. Every month, Wednesday to be the awareness day on Cyber crimes, especially digital arrest. Rape cases in Telangana increased by 28.94 per cent in 2024, with 2,945 cases reported compared to 2,284 in 2023. Among them 82 per cent of victims were under 18 years of age.

On the increase number of suicides of police constables and sub-inspectors, the DGP said that every person has a different problem. Telangana Police Annual Report said that teenage relationships are becoming an increasing area of concern. The Police arrested accused in 940 cases within eight hours, marking a 15 per cent improvement over 2023- (812) cases. SC/ST cases increased by 20.34 per cent in 2024 compared to the previous year, with 2,257 cases reported in 2024 against 1,877 cases in 2023. 1,950 NDPS cases were registered; drugs worth Rs 142.95 crore seized, reflecting strong action on narcotics.

### GHMC invites tenders for road-sweeping machines at ₹12 cr for six months

PNS ■ HYDERABAD

With the road maintenance contract of several agencies, appointed by the GHMC, is coming to an end in two months, the civic body is going to maintain the roads all by itself for about six months hiring road-sweeping machines. Therefore, it invited tenders zone wise and is prepared to spend Rs 12 crore towards the hire charges of these machines for the maintenance of the roads under the Comprehensive Road Maintenance Programme (CRMP).

The move attracted criticism in the wake of allegations that the sweeping machines hired by the civic body earlier are out of order and hence gathering dust. Experts suggest deployment of more sanitation workers in place of the road-sweeping machines.

The GHMC earlier entrusted maintenance of 811.9 km of roads, including those in the city, to the private agencies spending Rs 400 crore per annum for the purpose. The agreement is that to pay Rs 2,000 crore to the agencies over a period of five years. Thus, the GHMC expenditure for maintenance of roads per km boil down to Rs 50 lakh.

Besides cleaning the roads, the agencies are also allowed to develop roads and maintain the foot-paths also. The five-year tenure is going to end very soon, leading to the agencies move out of the contract.

## Farmers worry as cotton prices dip

The price of cotton, known as 'white gold,' is declining, causing concern among farmers. Farmers are worried that they will face severe losses and are demanding an increase in prices. Due to the international demand for Adilabad cotton, the area under cultivation in the district has been increasing every year. This year, cotton was cultivated on 4,20,000 acres. Officials estimate that the district will produce around 42 lakh quintals of cotton.

Since October 25 this year, cotton procurement has begun in the district through 31 ginning mills under private and Cotton Corporation of India (CCI) management. CCI is purchasing cotton with 8 per cent to 12 per cent moisture at a support price of Rs 7,521 per quintal.

However, deductions in price made by CCI in the name of moisture content, the farmers are paid only Rs 6,800 per quintal, leading to significant losses. On the other hand, when farmers approached private traders, they faced additional cuts.

In the wake of the CCI reducing price in the name of higher moisture content, farmers received only Rs 6,800 per quintal, leading to significant losses for them. Meanwhile, as farmers turned to private traders, the latter took advantage of the situation by reduc-

ing the prices drastically, purchasing cotton at Rs 6,500 per quintal.

As a result, farmers have suffered substantial losses. So far, about 30 per cent of the cotton in the district has been purchased through CCI and private traders. However, farmers who were drying their cotton in the hope of higher prices expected support

prices to be offered. But with CCI lowering the price by Rs 50 per quintal, the farmers are now facing uncertainty. Farmers, who had stored their cotton at home, are now left with bad news as the prices have fallen further.

Farmers who had already sold their cotton are frustrated by the quality-based price cuts, which

resulted in major losses. The recent price reduction by CCI has further fueled their anger. Farmers who had hoped to sell their stored cotton at higher prices now face even greater losses due to the price drop, leading to distress and concern.

Given the heavy investments already made, farmers are worried

that with the CCI price reductions, they may be pushed into financial ruin. They are urging the government to step in and prevent further price reductions, asking for action to increase the prices and provide support to help the farmers. They are demanding minimum support prices to be provided to save them from the crisis.

## Tragedy: 2 constables die by suicide in Medak, Siddipet

In two separate tragic incidents, two constables took their own lives, with one of them having poisoned his wife and children before he ended his life. While the family members of the constables survived and were hospitalised, the constable died.

The tragic incident came close on the heels of a sub-inspector of police and constable, besides computer operators, who died by suicide after jumping into a tank in Kamareddy district a few days ago. Earlier, one more sub-inspector shot himself dead with his service revolver in Mulugu district.

In the first incident, head constable Sai Kumar, aged 52, was found hanging from a tree on the premises of the Kulcharam police station in Medak on Sunday morning. The tragedy left the personnel at the Kulcharam station in a state of shock. Sai Kumar's body was shifted to the government hospital in Medak for a post-mortem examination.

In the second incident, a Telangana Special Police (TGSP) constable Pandari Balakrishna committed suicide by hanging after feed-

ing his wife and children rat poisoned water and milk respectively at Kalakunta in Siddipet district. Neighbours promptly took Balakrishna's wife and their children, Yaswanth (11) and Ashrith (9), to the government hospital in Siddipet, where their condition is reported to be stable.

Balakrishna hailed from Siddipet, was serving in the 17th battalion in Siricilla. The motive behind his drastic action remains unclear and the Siddipet police are currently investigating the matter.

Two burnt alive in road accident in Uttar Pradesh

Two people were burnt alive following a collision between two trucks in Hamirpur district of Uttar Pradesh, police said on Sunday. The incident occurred around 8:30 pm on Saturday, on National Highway 34 in the Sumerpur area, Circle Officer Rajesh Kamal said. "Two trucks were involved in the accident. One truck caught fire following the collision, leading to the deaths of the driver and his assistant. Their identities are yet to be established," the officer told PTI. The occupants of the other truck fled the scene and search is underway to locate them. We have not received any complaint in the matter yet. We are trying to contact the owners of both trucks," he added. The police said a fire brigade was called to the site and rescue and relief measures were initiated. Some locals at the scene were reportedly seen capturing pictures and videos of the incident, they said. One of the video clips of the incident which surfaced on social media allegedly shows the assistant attempting to open the truck door to escape, while his body was almost entirely engulfed in flames.

U.P's Panchayati Raj Minister Om Prakash Rajbhar on Saturday said that Lord Hanuman was born in the Rajbhar caste. Only Hanuman ji, who was born in the Rajbhar caste, was the only one to have the courage to do it. Hanuman ji brought Ram and Laxman ji out of Patal Puri." He made the remarks after the 'bhoomi puja' for the construction of the statue of Maharaja Suheldev at the main gate of Vasudeva village in the Chitbaragaon area of Ballia. Targeting opposition parties in the state, the SBSP chief said.



Delhi records low of 13 deg C, dense fog likely

Delhi recorded a maximum temperature of 18 degrees Celsius, two degrees below normal, according to the India Meteorological Department. The minimum temperature stood at 13 degrees Celsius on Sunday, six notches above the season's average for this time of the month. The weather department has predicted very dense fog on Monday, with the maximum and minimum temperatures expected to settle around 18 and 6 degrees Celsius, respectively. The 24-hour Air Quality Index (AQI) was recorded at 225 in the 'poor' category at 4 pm on Sunday. On Saturday, the city's AQI was in the 'moderate' category. Out of 28 monitoring stations, Anand Vihar, Sirifort, and Vivek Vihar reported AQI levels in the 'very poor' category, with readings exceeding 300. The remaining stations recorded AQI levels in the 'moderate' and 'poor' categories, as per the Sameer App. An AQI between 0 and 50 is classified as 'good,' 51 to 100 as 'satisfactory,' 101 to 200 as 'moderate,' 201 to 300 as 'poor,' 301 to 400 as 'very poor,' and 401 to 500 as 'severe.'

Illegal immigrants from Bangladesh deported

At least seven illegal immigrants were deported from south Delhi, police said on Sunday. Deputy Commissioner of Police (south) Ankit Chauhan said on Saturday a team apprehended seven nationals of Bangladesh, including five women, near the Arjanagarh Metro Station in Fatehpur Beri area. He said raids were conducted in slums, labour camps, and unauthorised colonies, leading to the capture of the illegal immigrants. The detained individuals were identified as Mohammad Umor Faruk (33), Riyav Miyan (20) and five women, all hailing from Bangladesh, he added. During interrogation they revealed that they had illegally crossed the border and were residing in Rajeev Nagar in Gurgaon. Verification of their mobile phones and documents confirmed their Bangladeshi citizenship, said the DCP. They were handed over to the Foreigners Regional Registration Office (FRRO) following completion of necessary documentation, he said.

'Stay vigilant against enemies'

RAJNATH SAYS INDIA NOT 'LUCKY' ON SECURITY FRONT

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh on Sunday termed India a "not very lucky" nation on the security front and urged soldiers to keep a sharp eye on internal and external foes who he said are always active.

"Your dedication to work inspires me. I can say that the most appealing thing is your devotion towards work and sense of responsibility. It is

inspiring to all of us," Singh said. Earlier, Singh along with the Chief of Army Staff General Upendra Dwivedi paid floral tributes at the memorial of Dr B R Ambedkar at Mhow. The memorial of Ambedkar, the chief architect of India's Constitution, has been built at his birthplace in the Kali Paltan area of Mhow cantonment.



Kejriwal accuses BJP of manipulating electoral roll

AAP chief Arvind Kejriwal on Sunday accused the BJP of trying to manipulate voter list in the run-up to the Delhi Assembly elections.

Speaking at a press conference alongside Rajya Sabha MP Raghav Chadha and Delhi Chief Minister Atishi, Kejriwal claimed the BJP was trying to win elections through "unfair means" after failing to present strong candidates or issues. "BJP has already lost the elections. They don't have a chief ministerial face or even proper candidates. They only aim to win through manipulation, but we won't let them succeed," he said.

The former Delhi chief minister alleged that the BJP had filed 11,000 voter deletion applications in one constituency alone, but the move was halted at the Chief Election Commissioner's intervention. "We exposed this and thankfully it was stopped," he said.

Kejriwal said that a large-scale operation began on December 15, with 5,000 voter deletion applications and 7,500 addition requests filed so far in his New Delhi Assembly constituency. He claimed that this could alter 12 per cent of the constituency's votes. The total number of voters in the constituency, he said, is 1,06,873, as per the voter list published on October 29 after the summary revision, which was conducted between August 20 and October 20. "Operation Lotus has now reached my constituency. They are attempting to manipulate the electoral rolls to change the election outcome," Kejriwal alleged.

"This kind of manipulation undermines democracy. We appeal to the Election Commission to continue its strict monitoring to prevent such malpractice," he said.

India to host first WAVES Summit in February: PM

MANMOHAN MEMORIAL

Congress accuses Centre of having "hidden agenda"

The Congress on Sunday alleged that union government could not identify a designated space for performing the last rites of former PM Manmohan Singh, where a memorial could be built later, as it intervened in the matter with a "hidden agenda."

It has long been the practice to set up a memorial at the same place where the last rites are performed. However, the BJP-led Union government mishandled the issue and worsened the situation, the party alleged. Speaking to reporters here, AICC General Secretary K C Venugopal said that not only the Congress party but also the Shiromani Akali Dal had harshly criticised the Union government on the matter.

"A designated space was not found for Manmohan Singh's last rites and memorial because the central government intervened in the matter with a specific hidden agenda," he alleged. The Congress leader also wanted a discussion on the "brutal approach



and lapses on the part of the Centre. "It should be explained why the government is showing such disrespect to a great leader who rose to the post of Prime Minister from the Sikh community," Venugopal said.

He also accused the Centre of "failing to consult" the Congress party or Manmohan Singh's family members regarding the arrangements. "Seats were not even arranged for the closest relatives," Venugopal claimed, adding that the central government had "tarnished the late Prime Minister's reputation by not making the necessary arrangements for his last rites".

Akhilesh pitches for ballot voting

Samajwadi Party (SP) president Akhilesh Yadav has called for elections to be conducted using ballot papers, citing a lack of trust in electronic voting machines (EVMs).

The former Uttar Pradesh chief minister said this at a press conference at the SP headquarters here on Sunday, alongside Rahul Kumar Kamboj, an Indian-origin member of Parliament in Germany. At the press conference, Kamboj highlighted the benefits of Germany's ballot-paper voting system. "In Germany, voting is still conducted using

ballot papers. It is an important system because any discrepancies can be addressed with a recount," he explained.

We aim to facilitate cultural exchanges and I invite everyone to participate in the upcoming cultural festivals in Germany. Visa issues will no longer be a hurdle," he said.

Kamboj also spoke of building a bridge between opportunities in Europe and their implementation in India, specifically in Uttar Pradesh. "If we can identify the opportunities available in Germany and Europe, and bring them to places like Lucknow, it will open new avenues. That is my mission," he added.

Welcoming Kamboj, Yadav expressed enthusiasm for strengthening ties. "Your visit has created an opportunity to deepen the relationship between our regions, which will benefit the people of this state and country," he said.

PM INTERNSHIP SCHEME

6.21 lakh applications for 1.27 lakh opportunities

About 6.21 lakh applications have been received for 1.27 lakh opportunities under the Prime Minister's Internship Scheme and the selection process is continuing, the government said on Sunday.

The scheme, announced in the 2024 Union Budget, aims to provide internship opportunities to 1 crore youth in top-500 companies over five years.

A pilot project of the scheme, started on October 3, aims to provide 1.25 lakh internship opportunities during 2024-25.

In a release on Sunday, the

corporate affairs ministry said approximately 6.21 lakh applications have been received against 1.27 lakh internship opportunities. "The selection process for internship is ongoing." Partner companies have posted about 1.27 lakh internship opportunities on the internship scheme portal.

About 4.87 lakh individuals have completed their KYC and registered themselves on the portal, the release said.

Under the scheme, interns will be provided a monthly financial assistance of Rs 5,000 for 12 months and a one-time grant of Rs 6,000.

While mentioning about

various initiatives taken this year, the ministry said the framework governing cost record and audit will be amended after considering stakeholders' comments and recommendations of the ministry-appointed committee.

From financial year 2023-24, the ministry has issued regular advisories to companies on adhering to the prescribed timelines for filing cost audit reports.

"This initiative has led to a 14 per cent increase in the timely submission of cost audit reports during 2023-24 compared to the previous year," the release added.

## Shifting stance

Trump's support for H-1B visas marks a major shift, offering relief to US companies and Indian tech workers alike

Politicians seldom walk their talk and do not mind taking u-turns even if it means reversing their own previous positions. Donald Trump the US President elect is the latest example. Trump has expressed his support for the H-1B visa program, which facilitates the entry of skilled foreign workers into the United States. This development comes as a marked departure from his earlier stance during his first presidential term, where he labeled the program 'very bad' and 'unfair' to American workers. Trump's latest remarks not only align him with tech magnate Elon Musk but also have significant implications for Indian professionals and US companies. The controversy surrounding the H-1B program reignited when Musk took to social media to vociferously defend the program against criticisms from immigration hardliners. Musk's electric vehicle company, Tesla, alone secured 724 H-1B visas this year, underscoring his vested interest in maintaining the program. Trump echoed Musk's sentiments in an interview, stating, "I've always liked the visas. I have used it many times. It's a great program."



This admission not only signals a softening of his earlier rhetoric but also a pragmatic acknowledgment of the program's benefits to the US economy. Indian IT professionals stand to benefit immensely from Trump's change in stance. Historically, Indians have been the largest beneficiaries of the H-1B visa program, occupying a lion's share of the annual quota. Trump's endorsement could reassure prospective applicants and existing visa holders about the continuity of the program, which has often been a lifeline for skilled workers seeking opportunities in the United States. The move

also counters recent fears of stringent immigration policies that could hinder their aspirations. The US technology sector, which has long relied on the H-1B visa program to address skill shortages, is likely to welcome Trump's shift. Companies like Google, Microsoft, and Tesla have consistently advocated for the continuation of the program, citing a lack of homegrown talent to meet the industry's demands. Musk's pointed critique of American culture's celebration of mediocrity over excellence highlights the role of foreign talent in driving innovation and maintaining the US's competitive edge globally. Trump's stance, however, has drawn ire from far-right activists and prominent figures within his own party. Critics, including Steve Bannon and Nikki Haley, argue that prioritising foreign workers undermines American labour and exacerbates domestic unemployment. Trump's endorsement of the H-1B visa program reflects a pragmatic shift rather than an ideological reversal. Recognising the indispensable role of skilled immigrants in the US economy, his administration's move signals a commitment to fostering economic growth and maintaining technological leadership. For Indian professionals, it offers renewed hope, and for US tech companies, it ensures access to the global talent pool they rely on to innovate and thrive.

## The paradox of happiness: Why we fear what we seek

As much as we strive for everlasting joy, we often find ourselves wary of its fleeting nature, hesitating to fully embrace it

If there is one thing that we relentlessly pursue in life—the only thing we put all our pennies on in this big worldly gamble—it is happiness. The ultimate goal that we all crave is everlasting bliss. What charades and circuses we play to attain the state of eternal joy! While this rigmarole governs our everyday thoughts and actions, another element sneaks in as soon as we reach our dream: Fear—the fear of losing the happiness that we know is ephemeral. Come to think of it, much as we covet it, happiness frightens us. It also makes us wary of revealing our joys, and we often hide good things to avoid getting jinxed. Why do we fear happiness? Why do we think every moment of joy comes at a price? The fear of happiness is a paradox embedded in the human psyche. It's almost as if we've been conditioned to believe that joy is too fragile to last, that it carries an expiry date we cannot predict. This belief turns happiness into a double-edged sword: on one side, it is the elation we strive for; on the other, it is the dread of its inevitable end.



Where does this fear originate? Perhaps it stems from a deep-seated awareness of life's impermanence. We've all seen moments of bliss snatched away by unexpected turns of fate. A child's innocent laughter may be followed by tears, a promotion at work may bring unforeseen stress, and a long-anticipated celebration may be marred by tragedy. These experiences condition us to approach happiness with caution, to brace ourselves for the fall even as we revel in the peak. This trepidation finds cultural expressions, too. Superstitions like "knock on wood" or "touch iron" are more than quaint habits; they are safeguards against the perceived fragility of joy. Similarly, the kaala teeka or talisman traditions reflect a universal belief that happiness attracts envy and, by extension,

misfortune. We place such conditions maybe because happiness, unlike sorrow, feels fleeting and illusory. Pain lingers and forces us to adapt, but happiness feels transient, like a butterfly—beautiful, delicate, and always ready to flit away. Is it fair to treat happiness as a precarious treasure? By fearing it, do we not dilute its essence and sabotage our ability to experience it fully? Modern life has made this paradox even more pronounced. With social media encouraging us to share our highs, celebrating joy has become a public event. On one hand, we feel validated by likes and comments; on the other, the exposure amplifies our unease. Will the digital applause somehow disrupt the balance of our good fortune? These questions linger, even as we hit the "share" button with a smile. eign, even undesired. The fear of losing it becomes a defence mechanism, a way of preparing ourselves for the inevitable end of happy times. It is important to recognise that happiness, like all emotions, is inherently fleeting. Accepting its impermanence allows us to savour it without clinging or dreading its end. Happiness deserves the same grace. Vulnerability is the price of true happiness, and the courage to embrace it, however briefly, is what makes life rich. Sharing our joy—whether with loved ones or the world—is not an invitation to misfortune but an act of trust in the abundance of good things. Let's challenge the belief that happiness comes at a cost. Life's highs and lows are inevitable, but they are not always sequential. A moment of joy does not necessitate a subsequent sorrow. Joy, in its purest form, deserves to be embraced—without caution, without apology, and most importantly, without fear. It's all easier said than done, I admit. # Reaching for the stars, ruining the earth

In 2024, a year of rising conflicts and environmental crises, the race for space supremacy highlights a paradox: we look to the stars while neglecting our planet

That was a harrowing near-miss. Trump endured an assassination attempt, and the ensuing spectacle was nothing short of fantastical. As he emerged, emboldened and defiant, a self-proclaimed martyr rallying Americans to "fight...fight...fight," the undercurrent of turmoil in the U.S. political sphere became irrefutable. Following the attack, responsibility was squarely placed on the Secret Service, prompting the resignation of its chief, Kimberly Cheatle. However, the pivotal question is not about security oversights but rather the significance of his survival.

The fact that Trump has now emerged from such an ordeal only solidifies his centrality in American political discourse. His rhetoric will escalate to unprecedented levels of provocation, further inflaming a deeply divided nation. As January 20 nears and he ascends to the presidency as the 47th leader, we must confront an uncomfortable truth: America is on the precipice of a more ominous epoch. This is not merely about one man's political endurance—it is about the disintegration of American society itself, driven to the brink by longstanding forces in motion. On the broader geopolitical stage, 2024 has been a year of unsettling reconfigurations.

In Asia, China's dominance over Taiwan is undeniable, with global consensus growing that Beijing's ambitions will not yield to Western opposition. For years, the U.S. has provoked China through military deployments and arms to Taiwan. Yet, China's psychological and economic warfare has shifted the global balance of power, eroding America's influence in the Pacific. Despite this, the U.S. persists, its foreign policy increasingly marked by desperation and entrenched arrogance. Meanwhile, the war in Ukraine, now in its third year, serves as a painful reminder of the West's misguided strategy of intervention. NATO's resolve is deteriorating, and support for Kyiv is dwindling in many Western capitals as the economic cost of the war becomes more pronounced. Public disillusionment with the conflict is palpable, yet the U.S. continues to allocate resources to a war with no clear resolution in sight.

The arms industry flourishes, and NATO's failure to pursue a diplomatic resolution leaves a bitter aftertaste, as Russia, empowered by internal European divisions, presses its advantage. In 2024 alone, the global arms trade reached a staggering \$632 billion, with much of that revenue enriching manufacturers who profit from relentless destruction. The grim reality is that war has evolved into a lucrative enterprise, sustaining the military-industrial complex while civilians bear the cost.

A similar dynamic is unfolding in West Asia, where Israel's military actions against Palestine and Lebanon have extended into Syria by year's end, driven by a voracious expansionist agenda, all under the protective mantle of U.S. support. The missile exchanges between Iran and Israel risk escalating into full-scale warfare, with no resolution in sight. Yet, the West remains obsessively focused on preserving its hegemonic power, blatantly disregarding the mounting humanitarian catastrophes. In parallel, the Arab world exposes its deep-seated fragmen-

tation, driven by centuries-old dogmas and self-serving political agendas, all of which continue to wreak havoc on the lives of millions of Muslims.

The situation in South Asia mirrors this instability. With the reelection of Narendra Modi and the BJP, India is significantly expanding its global influence, even as internal crises—such as communal violence in the Northeast and Kashmir—continue to intensify, with the government blaming its negligence. India is poised to become the world's third-largest economy within five years, yet rising tensions with the United States present an opportunity to reassess the true nature of America's 'Asia Pivot.' As tensions escalate in Pakistan and neighbouring Afghanistan, the region teeters on the brink of broader conflict. Political instability in Bangladesh, exacerbated by alleged U.S.-sponsored people's protests that ousted Sheikh Hasina, and fragile politics in Nepal, which increasingly aligns with China, further fuel the growing unease.

Sri Lanka and the Maldives, after years of political turmoil, have found a degree of stability by year's end. Sri Lanka, in particular, has experienced a remarkable political shift, with a single party securing a supermajority in parliament, now populated by a wave of inexperienced young politicians.

While the Maldives continues to navigate its political challenges, South Asia—often dismissed as a 'dead regional idea'—remains a crucial player in global geopolitics. Meanwhile, in 2024, Africa boldly rejects colonial influence, with nations like Niger, Burkina Faso, Senegal, and Chad expelling French forces and reclaiming sovereignty. Yet, the continent's vast resources fuel a neocolonial

scramble, exposing deep-rooted corruption and divisive leadership. Despite efforts to break free, Africa remains trapped by external exploitation and the greed of its elites, hindering true autonomy and progress. At the same time, the relentless march of artificial intelligence in 2024 highlights a more subtle threat: the obliteration of labour. Entire industries, from retail to finance, have been disrupted by automation, leaving millions of workers displaced. In the U.S., unemployment rates hovered around 4.5% in 2024, but these statistics scarcely reflect the many individuals who have been relegated to underemployment or excluded from the labour market entirely. Meanwhile, global projections suggest that job displacement due to automation will increase by up to 30% over the next decade. While the technocrats celebrate AI's progress, millions are left behind. Simultaneously, the integration of AI into military systems raises the frightening possibility of autonomous warfare, where human lives are subject to the whims of algorithms.

In 2024, climate change worsened, but leaders offered only empty words. The COP29 collapse highlighted the wealthiest nations' evasion of responsibility, leaving the vulnerable to suffer while the crisis, fueled by inequality and unchecked industrialisation, deepened. By 2024, over 700 million people worldwide were living in extreme poverty, with hunger rates climbing sharply due to both the economic pressures of conflict and climate-related calamities. For many, securing enough food to survive has become an increasingly insurmountable struggle. In space, the race for hegemony reached new heights, as the U.S.,

China, and private corporations competed for supremacy in the cosmos.

Yet, one must question: why are such vast resources being allocated to space exploration when the world's most pressing issues remain unaddressed? The billions being invested in Mars colonisation could be better used to address the problems on Earth, yet the Western obsession with space reflects a deeper sense of hubris.

Humanity looks to the stars but fails to confront the crises that are unfolding on its soil. The year 2024 will be remembered as one that exposed the profound contradictions of our age. The Western world is at war with itself, consumed by political divisions, economic inequality, and an incapacity to respond to the genuine challenges of our time. The rise of populism, authoritarianism, and unchecked technological advancement portends a future in which the divide between the rich and the poor widens, and the planet teeters on the brink of environmental collapse. In this environment, the struggle for survival will no longer be merely political—it will be existential.

We are increasingly forfeiting our collective responsibility, continuing to vie for better accommodations in a sinking vessel, fully aware that we are all doomed to submerge. As we enter 2025, may we dare to confront the tumult of our times with the audacity to question everything, forging a future that challenges the very forces seeking to dominate us. Wishing you a year of purpose and unity.

EEPC India bats for 'faceless' GST audit system

The Engineering Export Promotion Council (EEPC), India on Sunday proposed the introduction of a "faceless" GST audit system to boost ease of doing business in the country. The apex engineering exports promotion body's proposal comes following the successful implementation of "faceless assessment" by the Income Tax department. "The faceless GST audit system, by using technology and ensuring anonymity, will reduce compliance costs. A faceless system will streamline procedures allowing MSMEs to focus on growth and innovation," said Pankaj Chadha, chairman of EEPC India. The proposal is a part of EEPC India's Budget 2025 recommendation. By introducing a "faceless" GST audit system, India can further improve its ranking in the Ease of Doing Business index, making it a more attractive destination for foreign investors, it said. It also proposed that Reverse Charge Mechanism (RCM) related liabilities should be eligible for the 'Amnesty Scheme' to address challenges faced by exporters, who may be unaware of foreign bank charges and foreign business services.



India's exports to Australia up 64.4 pc

India's exports to its trade agreement partner Australia rose 64.4 per cent year-on-year to USD 643.7 million in November on account of healthy growth in sectors such as textiles, chemicals and agricultural products, according to the commerce ministry data. However, the country's merchandise exports recorded a decline of 5.21 per cent year-on-year to USD 5.56 billion during April-November 2024-25, the preliminary data showed. India and Australia implemented an interim trade pact -- Economic Cooperation and Trade Agreement (ECTA) -- on December 29, 2022 and are now in negotiations to widen the scope of the pact and make it a Comprehensive Economic Cooperation Agreement (CECA). On the completion of two years of ECTA, Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal said the agreement has brought with it increased market access for Indian exporters, expanded opportunities for MSMEs and farmers, and generated several employment avenues. It has also enabled growth in exports by 14 per cent in 2023-24; notable boost in IT/ITeS, business and travel services; and port-study work and work holiday visas, he said in a post on social media platform.



Reliance's Jamnagar 'super' refinery completes 25 yrs

Twenty-five years ago, on December 28, 1999, Reliance launched its first refinery at Jamnagar, Gujarat. The refinery overnight turned India from a fuel deficit nation to a self-sufficient one and later into a surplus, exporting gasoline and gasoil to Europe and the US. Today, Jamnagar has become the world's refining hub - an engineering marvel that is India's pride. When Reliance Industries Ltd, India's most valuable company, first spoke of building an oil refinery to process and convert crude oil pumped out of ground and from below seabed, into fuels like petrol (gasoline) and diesel (gasoil), majority of the experts had said that it would be impossible for an Indian company to set up the world's largest grassroots refinery in three years. But Reliance achieved that in a world-record time of just 33 months, notwithstanding lack of infrastructure and a severe cyclone that had hit Jamnagar then, sources aware of the matter said. More importantly, the 27 million tonnes a year (560,000 barrels per day) capacity unit was built at nearly 40 per cent lesser cost (per tonne) in comparison to contemporary refineries in Asia.

Govt cancels auction of 11 critical mineral blocks

The government has cancelled the auction of 11 critical mineral blocks in the fourth round due to poor response.

While no bids were received for four blocks, the remaining seven mines got less than three technically qualified bidders, according to the annulment notice.

The four blocks which include tungsten and glauconite, are located in the states of Chhattisgarh and Arunachal Pradesh.

"Since there were nil bids received...the auction process for four mineral blocks stands annulled," the notice said.

Critical minerals, such as cobalt, copper, lithium, nickel and rare earths, play crucial roles in the production of clean energy technologies, ranging from wind turbines to electric vehicles.

"Since there were less than three technically qualified bidders...the auction process of these seven mineral blocks stands annulled," the notice said.

The government had earlier cancelled the auction of three critical mineral blocks in

the third round, 14 blocks in the second round, and 14 in the first tranche of critical minerals as the response was lukewarm. The government had earlier said that 24 critical and strategic mineral blocks have been sold in four rounds of auction.

"Out of 48 blocks put to e-auction, 24 have been successfully auctioned, including four mining lease (ML) and 20 composite licenses (CL) blocks," the mines ministry had said.

India is all set to launch a Critical Mineral Mission in the upcoming year to secure vital resources for green energy and

technology. The initiative involves government, industry, and research collaboration, focusing on acquiring overseas assets like lithium and cobalt, particularly in Australia, and boosting domestic mining through auctions and roadshows.

With a series of high-profile roadshows abroad along with plans to acquire critical mineral assets in Australia, India is set to woo international investors and make its mark on the global mining map.

The countries are now racing in a bid to secure these vital resources, which include lithi-

um and cobalt, through a complex web of policies and alliances, realising that critical minerals are the new lifeblood of the 21st-century economy.

According to an estimate by the World Bank, by 2050, the production of minerals, including lithium and cobalt, will need to increase by nearly 500 per cent in a bid to meet the growing demand for clean energy technologies.

At the same time, the International Energy Agency foresees that the rise in electric vehicles and battery storage will speed up the demand for these minerals at least 30 times by 2040.

'High employee attrition in private banks pose operational risk'

Employee attrition in private sector banks has witnessed an increase to about 25 per cent and this high turnover rate poses significant operational risk, according to the latest Report on Trend and Progress of Banking in India 2023-24.

Employee attrition rates are high across select private sector banks and small finance banks (SFBs), the report, which was released by the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) said.

The total number of employees of private banks surpassed that of public sector banks (PSBs) during 2023-24, but their attrition has increased sharply over the last three years, with average attrition rate of around 25 per cent, it said.

"High attrition and employee turnover rate pose significant operational risks, including disruption in customer services, besides leading to loss of institutional knowledge and increased recruitment costs. In various interactions with banks, the Reserve Bank has stressed that reducing attrition is not just a human resource function but a strategic imper-



ative," it said.

Banks need to implement strategies like improved onboarding processes, providing extensive training and career development opportunities, mentorship programmes, competitive benefits, and a supportive workplace culture to build long-term employee engagement, it said.

In view of several irregularities observed in grant of loans against gold ornaments and jewellery, including top-up loans, the Reserve Bank advised supervised entities to comprehensively review their policies, processes and practices on gold loans to identify gaps and initiate appropriate remedial measures in a time-bound manner. Supervised entities were advised to closely monitor their gold loan portfolios and ensure adequate controls over outsourced activities and third-party service providers, it said.

BUDGET 2025-26 CII calls for cut in excise duty on fuel to stir demand

Industry body CII in its budget suggestions for 2025-26 has recommended lowering the excise duty on fuel to boost consumption, especially at the lower income level, arguing that fuel prices significantly drive inflation. The budget could also consider reducing marginal tax rates for personal income up to Rs 20 lakh per annum. This would help trigger the virtuous cycle of consumption, higher growth and higher tax revenue, said CII. Asserting that the gap between the highest marginal rate for individuals at 42.74 per cent and the normal Corporate Tax Rate at 25.17 per cent, is high, it said, inflation has reduced the buying power of lower and middle-income earners.

"The central excise duty alone accounts for approximately 21 per cent of the retail price for petrol and 18 per cent for diesel. Since May 2022, these duties have not been adjusted in line



with the approximately 40 per cent decrease in global crude prices. Lowering excise duty on fuel would help reduce overall inflation and increase disposable incomes," the industry body said. Chandrajit Banerjee, Director General, CII, said domestic consumption has been critical to India's growth story, but inflationary pressures have somewhat eroded the purchasing power of consumers.

"Government interventions could focus on enhancing disposable incomes and stimulating spending to sustain economic momentum. Persistent food inflationary pressures particularly impinge upon low-income rural households who allocate larger share to food in their consumption basket," he added.

Markets to end 2024 with positive returns despite roller coaster ride

Dalal Street had a roller coaster ride in 2024 from shattering record after record to facing heavy correction off-late but equity markets still rewarded investors with positive returns, driven by a surge in domestic fund flows and a resilient macro landscape.

The first half of the year saw robust corporate earnings, a surge in domestic flows, and a resilient macro landscape, driving the Nifty to an all-time high of 26,277.35 in September 2024, according to Motilal Oswal Wealth Management.

"In the last two months, the market has corrected from its all-time high. This correction marked the third major decline since the COVID-19 pandemic in 2020, with unprecedented selling by Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) due to a combination of domestic and global factors," it said in a note.

As of December 27, the BSE



benchmark Sensex has gained 6,458.81 points or 8.94 per cent while the NSE Nifty climbed 2,082 points or 9.58 per cent. The year was marked by significant events, with the Indian general elections and the US Presidential polls taking centre stage.

Equity markets also grappled with two major geopolitical turmoil -- the Israel-Iran conflict and the ongoing Russia-Ukraine war.

"2024, was a year of tug of war between the bulls & bears

mentals theories which eventually invited corrections in the markets from the top," Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP Research, Research Analyst, Mehta Equities Ltd, said.

The BSE benchmark Sensex hit its record peak of 85,978.25 on September 27 this year, and the NSE Nifty also reached the lifetime high of 26,277.35 on the same day.

"2024 marked the ninth consecutive year of gains for the Indian equity market. Despite a challenging final quarter, the market delivered strong returns for the year, with midcap and smallcap stocks outperforming and rewarding investors handsomely.

"However, benchmark indices like the Nifty and Sensex lagged behind their global counterparts, particularly the US markets. This underperformance was largely driven by persistent and aggressive selling by FIIs," Santosh Meena, Head of Research, Swastika Investmart Ltd, said.

Foodgrain output set to scale new peak as farm sector eyes 4 pc growth

India is poised to achieve new heights in foodgrain production in 2025, driven by favourable monsoon, though significant challenges persist in pulses and oilseeds production as the country's agricultural sector shows signs of robust recovery.

The Agriculture Ministry's initial projections paint an optimistic picture, with kharif (summer) foodgrain production estimated at a record 164.7 million tonnes for the 2024-25 crop year ending June 2025.

Winter crop planting has maintained steady progress, with wheat sown across 29.31 million hectares as of mid-December 2024, while total rabi (winter) crops cover 55.88 million hectares.

"We had a good kharif crop because of normal rainfall," Agriculture Secretary Devesh Chaturvedi told PTI.

"Overall, the crop prospect for the whole year looks promising," he added, though cautioning against potential heat



waves in February-March that could affect the winter wheat harvest.

The agricultural sector is projected to bounce back strongly, with growth projections of 3.5-4 per cent in 2024-25, up from 1.4 per cent in the previous fiscal year.

Agri-economist S Mahendra Dev attributes this improvement to "good monsoon and rise in rural demand".

This growth comes despite localised floods and droughts affecting crops in parts of Maharashtra, Uttar Pradesh, and Rajasthan. Climate change-induced weather anomalies have particularly impacted

onion and tomato yields in certain regions.

However, the path ahead isn't without hurdles.

To address the persistent challenge of self-sufficiency in pulses and oilseeds, the government will roll out the National Mission on Edible Oils - Oilseeds (NMEO-Oilseeds) in 2025, backed by a substantial budget of Rs 10,103 crore. The initiative aims to reduce import dependency through targeted interventions and increased support prices.

The horticulture sector has shown remarkable progress, with record production of fruits and vegetables. The success is attributed to improved farming practices and technology adoption under various government schemes.

The sector is witnessing increased technological adoption, with drones and AI-driven tools gaining traction. "These innovations offer immense potential to enhance productivity," said Ashish Dobhal, CEO of UPL Sustainable AgriSolutions.

Markets to track FII trading, macroeco data, global trends: Analysts

Macroeconomic data announcements, trading activity of foreign investors and global trends will guide equity market movement this week, which would also mark the beginning of the new calendar year and month, analysts said.

Movement of rupee, which registered the steepest fall in almost two years to hit its lifetime intra-day low on Friday, will also be tracked by investors.

"Persistent FIIs (Foreign Institutional Investors) selling has been a source of pressure on Indian markets, and their stance in the new year could shape near-term trends. Meanwhile, monthly auto sales data will also be closely watched. As the Q3 earnings season approaches, corporate quarterly updates will begin trickling in, setting the stage for market expectations," Santosh Meena, Head of Research, Swastika Investmart Ltd, said.

On the international front, key economic indicators like

manufacturing PMI data from China and the US, along with US jobless claims, will play a crucial role, Meena said.

However, the dollar index and US bond yields remain the most critical factors influencing the direction of global markets, he added.

Auto stocks will also remain in the limelight this week amid monthly sales data announcement.

"As we step into the new calendar year and month, auto sales data will be closely monitored for initial market cues. In the absence of any significant events, attention is likely to shift toward FII flows and currency movement, especially as the rupee continues to weaken against the US dollar. These factors could play a crucial role in shaping market direction in the near term," Ajit Mishra -- SVP, Research, Religare Broking Ltd, said.

Last week, the BSE benchmark climbed 657.48 points, or 0.84 per cent, and the Nifty went up 225.9 points, or 0.95 per cent.

India to boost power generation, transmission infra

India will set up more coal-fired and hydro-power plants and ramp up transmission infrastructure to achieve round-the-clock 'Power for All' in 2025, besides meeting rising demand fueled by economic expansion.

To meet the growing energy demand, the government has devised a major plan for power generation capacity addition and the expansion of transmission infrastructure.

According to Minister of State for Power Shripad Yesso Naik, India can definitely achieve '24x7' power for all with all the efforts

in the ministry under the leadership of Prime Minister Narendra Modi. "We can do it. In 2025, we will be almost there to have 24x7 power for all in the country," Naik said.

He also said that the government is ready to support the expansion plan of the power sector in view of rising demand.

According to government estimates, peak power demand is expected to touch 270 GW in the summer season in 2025, up from the record high of 250 GW in May 2024 and 243 GW in September 2023. The peak power demand is estimated to reach a level of 446 GW by 2035.



The Ministry of Power along with states, has planned about 80 GW by 2031-32. Besides about 14 GW of hydro projects and 6,050 MW Pumped Storage Projects (PSP) are under construction. About 24.22 GW of

hydroelectric projects and 50,76GW MW of PSP are under various stages of planning and are targeted to be completed by 2031-32.

About 7,300 MW of Nuclear Capacity is under construction and 7,000 MW is under various stages of planning and approval. Besides, the government will also add about 300 GW of renewable energy capacity to have 500 GW of non-fossil fuel-based power generation by 2030.

To evacuate electricity from the additional power generation capacity, the government has planned an investment of Rs 9.16 lakh crore to ramp up transmission infrastructure by 2032 to meet the rising demand for electricity.

Chairman, CII National Power Committee, and Managing Director, Adani Energy Solutions Anil Sardana said, "With significant strides in renewable energy integration, grid modernisation, and an unwavering commitment to carbon reduction, the sector has taken a giant leap towards meeting both domestic and global energy demands."



## 'Doctors aren't just lifesavers; they're human too'

**A**mir Ali is a name that resonates with versatility and passion in the entertainment industry. With a career spanning from television to different other mediums, Amir has proven time and again that he is more than just an actor—he is a storyteller who brings his characters to life with unmatched depth and authenticity. Known for his compelling performances in both drama and comedy, his work has captivated audiences across a variety of genres.

His latest project, the medical drama *Doctors*, marks a new chapter in his career, where he plays Dr. Dhaval, a complex character navigating the highs and lows of the medical world. The show takes a unique approach to the lives of doctors, offering a glimpse into their personal struggles and the toll their demanding profession takes on them. With his dedication, emotional depth and eye for meaningful roles, he continues to solidify his place as one of the most exciting and respected actors in the industry. In an exclusive conversation with *The Pioneer*, the *FLR* actor opens up about his experience working on this project, his thoughts on the character of Dr. Dhaval and the challenges of portraying such a complex role.

When asked about his initial feelings before embarking on a new project, Ali admits that a sense of jitteriness is always part of the process. "Whenever I start a project, I'm always jittery. That's the only thing I'm jittery about—the project itself," he shared. "I'm very particular, very concerned about the little things. There's always this self-doubt, wondering whether I should do it or not."

But once I'm sure about the project, I surrender completely to it, and then I stop questioning things." His methodical approach was evident when he first met the team behind *Doctors*. "When I met producer Sidharth Malhotra the producer and director Sahil, I was gauging everyone. I needed to understand the script," he said. "It was pretty visible on my face, the uncertainty, but I could feel that there was something special about this project. The way they were planning it, it was unlike any other series I had seen before. This wasn't just about an incident happening in a doctor's life; it was about their lives, what they go through on a personal and professional level."

Amir explained how *Doctors* sets itself apart from other medical dramas. "There are shows made about doctors, but most of them are incident-based. This one is different. Yes, there are medical aspects, but it's much more about the emotions and experiences of the doctors. We take doctors for granted, considering them lifesavers, but their job is often thankless. They're expected to be available 24/7. If they don't pick up the phone at 3 in the morning, we blame them," the *Faraaz* fame pointed out. "But the show also acknowledges that they can make mistakes and get tired. It shows them as real people who deal with complex emotions, which is something I found very beautiful about the script."

Regarding the show's overall tone, he praised the subtle approach taken by the makers. "What I loved about the show is that it's not preachy. It presents the right kind of information, but it doesn't hit you over the head with it. It feels authentic and true to the lives of doctors, without trying to lecture the audience."

As the conversation shifted to the release of the trailer and the audience's response, *The Trial* actor expressed his excitement. "The trailer gives you a glimpse of the show, but trust me, the show is so much better. I was blown away when I saw parts of it. I had high expectations, but it turned out even better than I imagined. The look, the feel, everything about it is top-notch. People have even compared it

to international shows, which is a huge compliment. It's thrilling and gives that kind of vibe."

Amir plays Dr. Dhaval, a doctor with a complex past. While he couldn't reveal too much about his character, he shared a little about what makes him unique. "Dr. Dhaval is a man who's been through a lot in life—anger, betrayal, but also peace. He's a very layered character and that's what drew me to him. He's complicated, and that's what makes him interesting. When you watch the show, you'll understand why he's such a complex guy."

Discussing the challenges of portraying such a character, he shared that it was not an easy role. "This show was difficult for a number of reasons," he admitted. "We had workshops on what to do and what not to do and that really helped us get into character. The director's style was very particular; we did many takes from different angles, which was exhausting. But once you see the final product, you'll understand why it was necessary to get the mood just right."

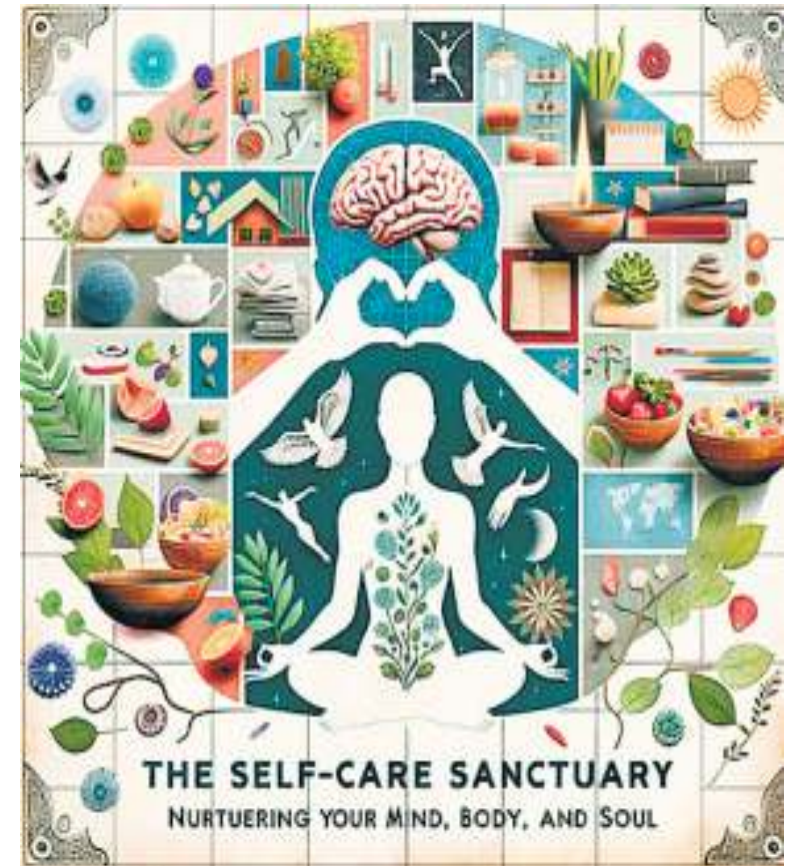
Another challenge was mastering the technical language and the medical procedures. "We had to learn a lot of technical terms and some of them were quite complex. We also had to be trained on how to wear surgical gloves, handle medical instruments, and wear the gear a surgeon wears. It was all very precise, and we had two doctors—Dr. Agni and Dr. Jeev—on set to guide us. They made sure we did everything correctly, from how to move to how to pronounce the medical terms properly."

When asked about memorable moments from the shoot, Amir reflected on the intensity of the surgical scenes. "There were some surreal moments. We used silicone models for surgeries, and they were so realistic. When you're doing a neurosurgery scene, it feels so real that it honestly makes you nervous. You're trying to get everything right and it's a lot to take in."

The conversation then turned to his admiration for OTT projects, which he had expressed in a previous interview. "I've always loved the freedom and boldness that OTT platforms offer. There's a lot of great content out there and *Doctors* is one of those projects that stands out. It's thrilling, emotional, and realistic. It's exciting to be part of such a great show. I'm happy to be working with amazing makers and I think the audience will really appreciate this one."

Looking ahead, Amir teased some exciting future projects but was unable to share details. "I'm working on something interesting, but I can't talk about it right now," he said with a smile. "I'm bound by confidentiality, but it's something I'm really looking forward to."

As Amir continues to take on new roles and challenges, one thing is clear: *Doctors* is a project he is incredibly proud of. # CONTROVERSIES THAT OVERSHADOWED TELUGU CINEMA'S SUCCESS

The year 2024 has been a tumultuous one for the Telugu film industry, with several high-profile controversies making headlines. Despite the industry witnessing some huge hits, the controversies ultimately overshadowed the successes. The year started with a controversy between Mahesh Babu's *Guntur Kaaram* and Prashanth Varma's *Hanuman*. The year has seen many big controversies that shook not only the Telugu Cinema, but the entire Nation. Here are some of the controversies that dogged the industry.

## T'wood's newcomers spark into sensations

Like every year, 2024 also saw many imported actresses make their debut in Tollywood. Some prominent names include Bhagyashree Borse, Jahnvi Kapoor, Rukmini Vasanth and Nayan Sarika. While some of them achieved blockbuster success, others faced flops. Despite the setbacks, some of these actresses continue to sign new projects.



### GUNTUR KAARAM VS HANUMAN

Mahesh Babu and director Trivikram joined forces for their third film, *Guntur Kaaram*, released on January 12, 2024. On the same day, Prashanth Varma's *Hanuman* also released, but a controversy surrounding theatre allocations marred



the occasion. The *Hanuman* makers had made an agreement with some exhibitors, but those exhibitors failed to honor the agreement and instead screened Mahesh Babu's film. The *Hanuman* team officially complained to the Telugu Film Producers Council about the exhibitors' failure to honor their agreements. Interestingly, Mahesh Babu's film received negative reviews, while *Hanuman* premiered to positive reviews and eventually became a huge blockbuster in Telugu and other languages. Teja Sajja, an upcoming actor, became a star with this film and director Prashanth Varma became the most sought-after director following the film's massive success.

### RAJ TARUN VS LAVANYA

Actor Raj Tarun was embroiled in a personal controversy that made headlines for several weeks. Lavanya, his alleged wife, accused Raj Tarun of cheating on her. She claimed that the two had been in a live-in relationship for nearly 11 years and that their families were aware of their marriage.



Lavanya also accused Raj Tarun's co-star, Malvi Malhotra, of being the reason for their separation.

Lavanya alleged that Raj Tarun had forced her to undergo an abortion. Later, police filed a case against Raj Tarun, who obtained anticipatory bail. He accused Lavanya of being a drug addict, and both parties made headlines during this time. Malvi Malhotra had acted opposite Raj Tarun in the film *Tiragabada Saami*. Interestingly, Raj Tarun's films, including *Purushottamudu*, *Tiragabada Saami* and *Bhale Unnade*, released during this controversy, failed to achieve success.

### RGV IN ANOTHER CONTROVERSY

Director Ram Gopal Varma is in the news for allegedly hiding to avoid arrest by the Andhra Pradesh police. The police issued notices for some of his posts about AP Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu and his son Nara Lokesh, as well as Deputy CM Pawan Kalyan. A police case was registered against RGV in various places in Andhra Pradesh, citing that his posts were defamatory and indecent. The AP police visited RGV's Hyderabad office to question him, but he was not present. He filed for anticipatory bail and reportedly went underground. However, after two days, RGV emerged, stating that he had not hidden anywhere and was available at his office.



### MANCHU FAMILY WEB SERIES

In 2023, Manchu Manoj posted a video accusing his elder brother, Vishnu, of assaulting his associate. However, Vishnu later posted the video, hinting that it was part of a reality show like *Keeping Up with the Kardashians*. The Manchu family remained silent for a while but later openly accused each other. This year, Manoj filed a case against his father, senior actor Manchu Mohan Babu, claiming that his life was in danger. In another case, Mohan Babu filed a complaint that his younger son and daughter-in-law were forcefully taking his house. While the Manchu family drama unfolded, veteran actor Mohan Babu assaulted a journalist who came to his house to cover the news. Mohan Babu later apologised, but the journalist's ear was damaged, and he filed a complaint against Mohan Babu, which is still pending. Mohan Babu released audio files explaining his version of events, but Manoj filed another case, alleging that his brother Vishnu removed power and put sugar in generators. Until then, the men in the Manchu family were in the news, but suddenly, Mohan Babu's wife and Manoj's mother, Nirmala Devi, complained to the police that Vishnu was a good person who had celebrated her birthday and did not harm anyone. There are media reports that Mohan Babu has gone into hiding, and his whereabouts are unknown. The case is still pending.

### KONDA SUREKHA VS AKKINENI FAMILY

Telangana Minister Konda Surekha made shocking comments about Akkineni Nagarjuna and Samantha, Naga Chaitanya's divorce. The minister alleged that Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) president K.T. Rama Rao was responsible for Naga Chaitanya and Samantha's divorce. She made a shocking allegation that KTR had asked Nagarjuna to send Samantha to him to leave N-Convention. The minister added that this had caused significant disturbance to the Akkineni family, leading to the couple's divorce. The entire film industry came out in support of Nagarjuna, condemning Minister Surekha's comments on social media. Nagarjuna also condemned the minister's comments and filed a defamation case against her. Nagarjuna sent a strong message, stating that it was inappropriate to involve oneself in the personal lives of film stars who stay away from politics to attack political opponents. Samantha also strongly condemned the minister's comments, and later, the minister apologized to Samantha. This incident shook the entire nation and made headlines nationwide.



### JANI MASTER ARRESTED, OUT ON BAIL

Popular choreographer Shaik Jani Basha, known as Jani Master, was arrested in Goa by the Telangana police. A sexual assault case was registered against him by a woman choreographer who had worked with Jani Master on several films. The Narsingi police booked him under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences (POCSO) Act. The victim alleged that Jani Master had harassed and sexually assaulted her over the past six years. Jani Master was later granted bail and the case is currently in court. This episode shook not only the Telugu film industry but the entire nation. A few choreographers came out in support of Jani Master.



### NAYANTHARA VS DHANUSH

Nayanthara and Dhanush, popular actors in Telugu and Tamil films, are embroiled in a feud over the documentary film *Nayanthara: Beyond the Fairytale*. A documentary about Nayanthara was streamed on a private OTT channel, and she requested actor Dhanush for a No Objection Certificate (NOC) to use some visuals from the film *Aanum Rowdy Dhaan*. Nayanthara acted in the film, which was directed by her husband Vignesh, and they met for the first time during the film's production. Dhanush, the film's producer, rejected her request. The documentary was released with a few seconds of visuals from the film, prompting Dhanush to send a legal notice to Nayanthara for using the visuals without his permission. Nayanthara responded by calling Dhanush a tyrant and criticizing him, stating that his actions reflected poorly on his character. She wrote a three-page letter and posted it on her Instagram, criticizing Dhanush for not giving permission as she and her team worked two years on this documentary and to obtain NOC. Both these actors were on loggerheads and they made headlines for a few days.



### JANHVI KAPOOR'S DOUBLE HIT

Sridevi and Boney Kapoor's daughter Jahnvi Kapoor is a popular Bollywood actress who made her Telugu debut opposite Jr NTR in 'Devara', directed by Koratala Siva. Although her screen presence was limited, her songs became extremely popular on the internet and YouTube channels. Despite mixed reviews, the film was declared a blockbuster, marking a successful Telugu debut for Jahnvi Kapoor. The film's sequel is awaited, and the makers claim that Jahnvi's role will be stronger in the second part.



### BHAGYASHREE SHINES BRIGHT IN AN OTHERWISE DULL FILM

Another Hindi actress Bhagyashree Borse made her debut with *Mr Bachchan* opposite Ravi Teja. She actually did a Hindi film *Yaariyaan 2* and director Harish Shankar impressed her and roped in her for his Telugu film. The film was a big disaster at the box-office, but Bhagyashree is an instant hit. Big production house Peoples Media Factory produced this 'Mr Bachchan' and the producer later admitted that the film was a mistake. Though the film is not commercially viable, Bhagyashree is getting big projects in Telugu. She paired opposite Vijay Deverakonda in an upcoming film and also Dulquer Salman in another film.



### RUKMINI VASANTH DOUBLE HIT

This Kannada actress became an insKannada actress Rukmini Vasanth became an instant hit in Kannada cinema with films like *Sapta Saagaradaache Elio - Side A and Side B*. Before her Telugu debut, she was supposed to debut in *Appudo Ippudo Eppudo* opposite Nikhil Siddhartha, directed by Sudhir Varma. However, the film was released this year after a delay. Unfortunately, her debut Telugu film was a box-office disaster. Nevertheless, Rukmini Vasanth remains a hit in Kannada cinema.



### NAYAN SARIKA MAKES IT BIG

Hyderabad girl Nayan Sarika made her debut with *Gam Gam Ganesha* opposite Anand Deverakonda. Although the film underperformed at the box-office, she secured two more projects, both of which were commercial hits. She played a village girl in *Aay*, produced by Niharika Konidela, which became an instant hit. Nayan then acted opposite Kiran Abbavaram in *KA*, which was a super hit. Despite her debut film's failure, Nayan's career is thriving in Telugu, with multiple projects in the pipeline.



There are many other actresses like Bhumika Shetty debut with *Sharathulu Vartistiyahi*, Yasha Shivakumar with *Yeh Daruvey*, Samyuktha Viswanathan in *Chaari 111* opposite Vennela Kishore, Pankhuri Gidwani opposite Navdeep in *Love Mouli*, Athira Raji played female lead in *Krishnamma* opposite Satya Dev made their debut in Telugu. Tamil actress Prety Mukundan made her debut in *Om Bheem Bush*, but the film didn't do well. Sri Lella made her debut opposite Nara Rohit in *Prathinidhi 2* and interestingly later she engaged with the same actor in real life. The film is a disaster at the box-office.



### SANDHYA THEATRE STAMPEDE

The Sandhya theatre stampede incident rocked not only the Telugu film industry but also made national headlines. Allu Arjun and director Sukumar's combination film *Pushpa 2: The Rule* was released on December 5 and the makers started premieres on December 4 night. Allu Arjun, along with his family members, went to Sandhya Theatre to watch his film, but a large crowd gathered to see him, resulting in a stampede-like situation. A 35-year-old woman lost her life and her son was admitted to the Intensive Care Unit. The police filed a case against the theatre owners, actors, and producers of the film. The police responded to the incident two days later. This issue rocked the entire Telugu film industry and made national headlines. The police arrested Allu Arjun in connection with the case, and the Nampally court remanded him to custody for two weeks. Later, the Telangana High Court granted him bail, but due to delays in receiving the bail papers, Allu Arjun had to spend a night in jail before being released the next morning. The entire film industry rallied around Allu Arjun, offering support. Many actors, producers and directors consoled him, stating that they stood by him. Some actors responded to his arrest on social media. Later, Allu Arjun held a media conference, stating that some individuals were attempting to tarnish his reputation. He emphasized that the incident was unfortunate and not his fault. However, the police released a video of the entire Sandhya Theatre episode the next day, showing Allu Arjun entering and leaving the theatre.

# Wanted to prove critics wrong for doubting my Test credentials: Reddy

Nitish Reddy wanted to confute his critics and the naysayers who doubted his ability to excel in Test format, and the gritty century at the iconic MCG was his way of conveying that he belongs to the highest level of cricket. A few former players, including a former chairman of selectors, were sceptical about Reddy's elevation as a Test player but with 293 runs in six innings and a batting average of 58-plus, he has answered them back in a befitting manner. Reddy's 114 formed the cornerstone of India's first Test innings score of 369 and attracted a lot of attention on the young batter. Did you ever feel that you will be highest scorer in this

team? "Some people doubted me, like a youngster who played IPL, can't perform in such a big series. I know a lot of people did talk like that," Reddy said, sharing his frustration after the end of fourth day's play. "I just want to make them feel wrong about what they have said about me and that's what I am doing, I want people to know that I am here to give my 100 percent for Indian team," the 21-year-old said and his plain speaking was as aggressive as his purposeful batting. Asked how he looks at the past one month during which his life changed, he was quick to reply: "I guess for you guys, it is like one or two months. For me, it's like, I can see my past two to three years. How hard I've been



working on my batting and bowling." A lot of people don't know that Reddy had hired side-arm throwdown experts before the start of 2024 IPL and practised against them with speed of deliveries cranking up to 145 clicks from around 18 yards. "After the first IPL season, I realised what I have to improve my batting and I came up with a plan. When I got the off-season, I worked a lot on my batting and that's what is giving results now. It's not about the one month and two months, I have done the work from last two-three years to be here." The sacrifices made by his family is well documented and the Australian media was also keen to know about the man behind the player and

the role of his father Mutyalu. "To be honest, my father had 25 years of service in central government and when I was a nobody, and hadn't played a state-level game, the first person who believed in me was my father," he was a touch emotional. "He believed in me and he resigned from his job for me. He would take me to the ground, gym, always he wanted to be with me. He made a lot of sacrifices. If I have to tell about him, time won't be sufficient but I am so grateful to have a father like him." "I helped my team in a difficult situation where we can fight back strongly. So that was a special century for me and for my father as well." Talk about Virat Kohli, the man he looked up to when he decided to pursue the game,

and he said it was a surreal moment to see his idol give him a standing ovation. "I have been watching Virat from my childhood. He is my idol and now finally I have played with him. When he scored a hundred in Perth, I was at the non-striker's end. I felt so happy. "Now, I scored a century, he appreciated me. He came to me and said that 'you really played well, you got the team back in the game'. I always dreamt about that moment and finally when he talked with me, that's the best moment for me," he said as his face beamed. Asked about the chase on the final day, Reddy said: "First we have to take their last wicket. We will come back strongly and rectify our mistakes from the first innings."

## Naomi Osaka says she won't 'hang around' in tennis if the results don't come

Four-time Grand Slam champion Naomi Osaka says she won't "hang around" in tennis if her results fail to match her high expectations. The 27-year-old Japanese player will play her first match since she suffered a back injury in the China Open in October at the ASB tennis classic in Auckland on Monday. Osaka told a pre-tournament news conference in Auckland on Sunday she was "humbled" by her form in 2024 in which she picked up her professional career after an almost 15 month break for the birth of her first child. She ended the season ranked 58. "I don't think I'm the type of player that would hang around," Osaka told reporters. "I have a lot of respect for all the players on tour, but the point of my life that I'm at right now, if I'm not above a certain ranking, I don't see myself playing for a while. "I'd rather spend time with my daughter if I'm not where I think I should be and where I feel like I can be." Osaka had a 22-17 win-loss singles record in 2024, reaching the quarterfinals at Doha and at s-Hertogenbosch in the Netherlands. "I think 2024 humbled me, but



I also feel like I grew a lot," she said. "I worked way harder than I've ever worked before. So in that, I guess it was very painful to not get the results I wanted, but I feel like I'm growing and learning and I am really excited for this year (2025). "I played really good matches. People still talk to me about my Iga (Swiatek) match at the French Open (lost 7-6 1-6 7-5). So I'm glad that I was able to give people memories as well. "Even though I got injured in Beijing, which was my last tournament, I feel pretty optimistic about how that match would have turned out (against Coco Gauff) and I am excited to play on hardcourt again." Osaka won the Australian

Open in 2019 and 2021 and the US Open in 2018 and 2020. She says she still has a deep love for tennis, despite recent injury setbacks. "I've been playing tennis since I was three, and a huge part of that I owe to my parents, but I never really saw my life doing anything else," she said. "Then, when I sat there and had the opportunity to do other things, I realized that I'd rather be playing tennis. "So it was kind of one of those realization moments where you feel like you thought you were forced to do something, but in actuality you very much truly loved it. Osaka will play Lina Glushko of Israel in the first round of the ASB Classic.

## Djokovic says players have 'been kept in the dark' on Sinner, Swiatek doping breaches

On the eve of his return to the court, Novak Djokovic has weighed in on tennis' high-profile doping cases and criticised what he perceives as double standards in the sport. The former world No. 1, who is chasing a record 25th Grand Slam title at next month's Australian Open, expressed his frustration Sunday at being "kept in the dark" regarding top-ranked Jannik Sinner's doping case. Djokovic is the top seed in the Brisbane International this week, making his first appearance at the event since 2009. He will also team up with Australia's Nick Kyrgios in doubles, with the duo headlining Monday's action. Off the court, Djokovic lent his voice Sunday to Kyrgios's strong criticisms made a day earlier, speaking out at length about the ongoing doping case involving current world No.1 Jannik Sinner. "I'm not questioning whether (Sinner) took the banned substance intentionally or not," Djokovic said at a press conference Sunday in Brisbane. "We've had plenty of players in the past and currently under suspension for not even testing positive to banned substances. "Some players with lower rankings waiting for their case to be



resolved for over a year. I've been really frustrated ... To see we've been kept in the dark for at least five months (on the Sinner case)." The International Tennis Integrity Agency (ITIA) charged both Sinner and former women's world No.1 Iga Swiatek with anti-doping breaches earlier in the year. Sinner tested positive twice for an anabolic steroid in March but avoided a ban after the ITIA ruled he was not at fault. The World Anti-Doping Agency has appealed the decision. Swiatek accepted a one-month suspension in November after testing positive for the banned substance trimetazidine. The Serbian further criticised the lack of transparency from tennis authorities regarding doping breaches. "The ATP hasn't really talked in depth about it. Why have they kept that case away from the

public? We see Simona Halep's case on the WTA Tour, now Iga Swiatek's case," Djokovic said. "It's not a good image for our sport. I'm just questioning the way the system works and why certain players aren't treated the same as others. Maybe some ranking reasons are behind it, or some players have more financial backing and stronger legal teams to tackle these cases." Despite his frustrations, Djokovic remains focused on the season ahead. After undergoing knee surgery earlier this year, he returned to reach the Wimbledon final but skipped the end-of-year ATP Finals, where Sinner capped a dominant season with his eighth title. Djokovic is looking to extend his legacy at Melbourne Park, where he has claimed 10 Australian Open titles, and has brought on former rival Andy Murray as his coach for the tournament. "It's strange for me to share all these kinds of insights about how I feel on the court, some of the secrets of what I'm going through, what I'm thinking about, how I see my game, with somebody who has been one of my top rivals," Djokovic said. "But I'm so glad and very thankful that he has accepted to work with me, and in Australia ... he's very meticulous, dedicated, and professional."

## Ashi clinches maiden women's 3P national title

Local shooter Ashi Chouksey overcame a strong field, that had the likes of Olympians Anjum Moudgil and Shriyanka Sadangi, to clinch her maiden national title in the 50m rifle 3-position event here on Sunday. Ashi shot a superb 466.7, a full 3.1 points clear of two-time Olympian Anjum at her home range, the MP State Academy, during the 67th National Shooting Championship. Upcoming shooter Sakshi Sunil Padekar of Maharashtra won the bronze with an effort of 451.3. She then went on to win a silver medal in the junior women's 3P as well to round-off a successful day. Ashi, who has been in great form over the past two years and was also a part of the Paris Olympic Games trials, extended her run of good form with a solid 590 in qualifications, to get into the eight-woman match-up in third place. Bhakti Bhaskar Khamkar of Maharashtra topped the qualification field with a blazing 592, while Anjum qualified second, her effort of 590 containing more hits to the inner-10 ring than Ashi. Sakshi took the sixth spot,



while another Olympian Shriyanka Sadangi qualified seventh. In the final, however, Ashi was in a different league altogether opening up a 2.3 points gap over Anjum at the end of the first 'Kneeling' position round. She maintained the lead after the 15 shots in the second 'Prone' position also. The lead increased to 2.9 after 10-shots of the last 'Standing' position and despite a few high 9s after that, the result was never in doubt. In junior women's 3P, Karnataka's Anoushka H Thokur shot 460.5 in the final to upstage Sakshi, who settled for silver on 456.3. Haryana's Nishchal, an ISSF World Cup silver medalist last year, shot 443.9 to settle for bronze.

## South Africa collapses to 116-8 against Pakistan

South Africa collapsed to 116-8 against Pakistan as fast bowler Mohammad Abbas ran riot on Day 4 of the first Test with the tourists closing in on their first Test win in South Africa in 18 years on Sunday. Abbas grabbed 6-43 on his return to Test cricket after more than three years and South Africa still needed 32 runs at lunch to seal a place in next year's World Test Championship final. Tailenders Kagiso Rabada, unbeaten on 10, and Marco Jansen with 5 not out were fighting a grim battle for the home team against the relentless Abbas.



Captain Temba Bavuma's controversial dismissal punctuated a South Africa collapse as it lost four wickets for just three runs with Abbas grabbing three

off his six balls. Bavuma, who made 40, surprisingly didn't request a television review when replays suggested that Abbas' ball had brushed the

batter's pocket and didn't make contact with the inside edge of the bat but the South African skipper walked back to the dressing room. Abbas bowled an unchanged marathon spell of 13 overs, but had to wait until Aiden Markram (37) and Bavuma saw off the testing first hour. Resuming at a wobbly 27-3, with still 121 runs needed for victory, Bavuma and Markram showed plenty of patience against Abbas' probing line and length before the fast bowler finally got the breakthrough after the first drinks break. Abbas was rewarded for his brilliant seam bowling when he beat the outside edge of Markram's bat and knocked

back the off stump. Bavuma survived a couple of close chances when he successfully overturned an on-field lbw decision against him early in the day and Naseem Shah couldn't hold onto a sharp catch at fine leg as he overstepped the boundary cushion while grabbing the ball over his head. South Africa had controlled the game at 96-4 before Bavuma's dismissal saw Abbas finding the outside edges of David Bedingham (14) and Corbin Bosch's (0) bat off successive deliveries and in between Kyle Verreyne dragged Naseem Shah's delivery back onto his stumps to give Pakistan a chance for victory.

## Women's coach Alexandersson announces 23-member squad for Maldives friendlies

## Roar by MCG crowd after Reddy's hundred is something I never heard: CA CEO Hockley

The collective roar of Indian fans after Nitish Kumar Reddy's maiden hundred is something that he has never heard at the MCG, and Cricket Australia's outgoing CEO Nick Hockley said on Sunday that it validated the decision to add a Test to the Border-Gavaskar Trophy. The CA's decision to increase the number of Tests for the Border-Gavaskar Trophy from four to five has proved to be a masterstroke as crowd attendance and viewership records are set to surpass the hallowed Ashes. "I want to say thank you to everyone who turned up, the atmosphere last night when Nitish Kumar Reddy scored his hundred, the roar of the crowd was nothing that I have ever heard," Hockley told PTI in an exclusive interaction. The record total attendance (over five days) for a Boxing Day Test till date is 271,865 against England back in 2013 and the fourth Test involving

India has already witnessed a footfall of 255,462 spectators. With two more days left, CA is expecting the attendance to go well past 300,000. Hockley couldn't be more thrilled. "Absolutely thrilled with the number of fans that have come round from all over India. It's been an absolutely incredible atmosphere as we got over a quarter million people over the gates and that's too on days one, two and three," Hockley said. "This Border-Gavaskar Trophy has had the biggest Boxing Day crowd ever passing the Ashes and the series is so delicately poised now, it is living up to every hype." Hockley, who has had a good working relationship with the BCCI, said it was a no-brainer that the four-Test series between India and Australia transformed into a five-match rubber, considering its massive following. "I think it speaks about the relations between India and Australia and fans are always excited to see these two teams.



The five-Test series is what the fans deserve, players deserve. This series is likely to be alive going into Sydney. "We haven't had a full fifth day as we have had some unfinished business. I thank and am very grateful to the BCCI to have agreed to play a five-Test series. Hope it continues for the rest of the time." Days 1, 2 and 3 in Sydney all but sold out. There is forecast of rain during the New Year's Test in Sydney but even then the Indian diaspora will throng to the grounds with very limited tickets still left for the first three days. "Sydney will be very, very full. I think there are only very few tickets left for days one, two and three. We encourage people to quickly get their tickets if they want to come on Day 4. "There is a wonderful community from India in Sydney and we expect a similar atmosphere like MCG," he noted. Excited about prospects of

We are hopeful and excited about the prospects of cricket being part of Brisbane 2032." "It is exciting times for cricket and the Olympics. We want more people who get to see our great game. T20 cricket for men and women is incredible entertainment and it has been the starting point of our discussion as to how we can help to grow the game globally," Hockley concluded.
