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War of words follows Manmohan's farewell

A political row has erupted between the Bharatiya Janata Party-led Centre and Congress-led Opposition parties over a memorial for the former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh who was cremated with full State honours on Saturday in the presence of top dignitaries from India and abroad.

While the Home Ministry claimed to assure the late PM's family in a communication for a memorial in due course, the Congress, Samajwadi Party (SP) and Bahujan Samaj Party (BSP) demanded that the last rites should have been performed at a designated place where the Manmohan Singh's memorial could have been developed. Singh, 92, died on the night of December 26.

Simultaneously former President late Pranab Mukherjee's daughter Sharmistha too cried foul on the part of the grand old party which failed to honour the rights of Mukherjee who spent his entire life serving the Congress.

The Congress alleged that the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) was "deliberately insulting" the first Sikh PM of the country by not designating a place for his funeral and memorial. While Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge urged Prime Minister Narendra Modi to have Singh's funeral at a place where his memorial can be built, SP chief Akhilesh Yadav and BSP president Mayawati

urged the Central government to avoid any political controversy over the funeral and memorial of former prime minister Manmohan Singh. Demands for giving Singh a Bharat Ratna, the highest civilian award, were also raised during the last ritual procession of Manmohan Singh.

"The tradition of honouring the country's former Prime Ministers must be upheld. There is no need for politics on this issue nor should there be any. Dr. Manmohan Singh's memorial should be constructed at Rajghat. The BJP should refrain from presenting an inappropriate example of its narrow-minded thinking. History will never forgive them for this negative approach," he said.

BSP president Mayawati said the wishes of Singh's family should be respected. "The Central government should ensure that the funeral and memorial of Dr Manmohan Singh, the country's first Sikh prime minister, are conducted at a location preferred by his family. No politics should be done on this matter and the government must honour the sentiments of Singh's family and the Sikh community."

Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) also criticised the BJP for not allocating space within the Rajghat complex for the last rites of former prime minister Manmohan Singh and said that it "reflects poorly on India globally". AAP called on the BJP to clarify its stance and demanded an apology to Singh's family and the Sikh

nation mourns the demise of Dr. Manmohan Singh.

"Congress party is busy turning this moment of grief into an opportunity to fulfill their political agenda. Gandhi family has neither honored nor delivered justice to any leader of the nation, even if they were from the Congress party. The nation will never forget or forgive the historic sins of the principle-less Congress party," Nadda said in a statement.

Former Rajasthan chief minister Ashok Gehlot accused the NDA government of creating an "unnecessary controversy" over the cremation and memorial of former Prime Minister Manmohan Singh. He added that the Government of India is conducting the cremation of a respected personality at Nigambodh Ghat instead of at any special place.

Gehlot recalled after the death of former Vice

President Bhairon Singh Shekhawat the Congress led Rajasthan government immediately allotted a special place for his last rites and a memorial in Jaipur and similarly after the death of Bal Thackeray in Maharashtra in 2012, the Congress government allotted a special place in Mumbai's Shivaji Park for his last rites.

Before the mortal remains of Singh were consigned to flames, the security forces gave a 21-gun salute to the former PM. Sikh priests and Singh's family members recited verses from the Gurbani before performing his last rites.

Singh's wife Gursharan Kaur and one of their daughters also laid a wreath on his body. The three daughters of Singh, Upinder Singh, Daman Kaur and Amrit Kaur, along with other relatives were present. Singh's funeral pyre was lit by his eldest daughter Upinder Singh at the Nigambodh Ghat

amid the chanting of religious hymns.

The last rites were performed in the presence of President Droupadi Murmu, Vice President Jagdeep Dhankhar and Prime Minister Narendra Modi, as also top leaders of the Congress party including Mallikarjun Kharge, Sonia Gandhi and Rahul Gandhi. King of Bhutan Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck and Mauritius Foreign Minister Dhananjay Ramful were among the foreign dignitaries who paid tributes to Singh, who served as the PM from 2004 to 2014.

Defence Minister Rajnath Singh, Home Minister Amit Shah and Lok Sabha Speaker Om Birla also paid their last tributes to the former prime minister and laid wreaths on his mortal remains. Chief of Defence Staff General Anil Chauhan and chiefs of the tri-services also laid wreaths. Several chief ministers also attended the last rites.

"Manmohan Singh, a global icon and India's only Sikh Prime Minister, was denied even 1,000 square yards of land for his cremation and memorial at Rajghat. Almost all former Prime Ministers were cremated there, but the BJP government refused this basic courtesy to Singh," said AAP National Convener Arvind Kejriwal. AAP Rajya Sabha MP Sanjay Singh accused the BJP of disrespecting the Sikh community and questioned the rationale behind the decision.

In a statement, the Ministry of Home Affairs assured that a place would be allocated for Singh's memorial and that his family and Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge

had been informed. BJP President and Union Minister JP Nadda attacked Congress and the Gandhi family for getting into petty politics when the entire

Delhi LG orders high-level inquiry into AAP's ₹2,100 dole for women

In a move that may once again rattle Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) convener Arvind Kejriwal, and his party ahead of the upcoming assembly polls, Delhi Lieutenant Governor Vinai Kumar Saxena ordered a high-level inquiry into the AAP led Delhi government's proposed Mukhyamantri Mahila Samman Yojana in which AAP's poll promise of Rs 2,100 to women if elected. The Lieutenant Governor also ordered that the Chief Secretary of the Delhi Government may bring the matter to the knowledge of the Election Commission of India (ECI) through the chief electoral office given that such canvassing is happening ahead of the election.

Saxena also issued instructions to investigate the alleged presence of intelligence officials from Punjab outside Dikshit's residence with the objective of "intimidating" him and the alleged transfer of cash, in crores, from various parts of Punjab to Delhi with the Delhi Assembly elections around the corner. The Lieutenant Governor's order came in the wake of a representation from a former East Delhi Congress MP and the party's proposed opponent against former Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal from the New Delhi Assembly constituency, Sandeep Dikshit, who made serious allegations against the AAP-led Delhi government and Kejriwal.

"This has reference to representation dated 25.12.2024 received from Sh. Sandeep Dikshit... he has alleged that the Chief Minister of Delhi and Sh Arvind Kejriwal have been announcing that Delhi Government is going to give every female in Delhi (above the age of 18 years) an amount of Rs 1000 per month... If AAP is elected back in the 2025 Vidhan Sabha elections, they will raise the amount to Rs 2100..."

The communication from the LG's Principal Secretary to Chief Secretary Dharmendra and Delhi Police Commissioner Sanjay Arora stated.

The communiqué read, "Hon'ble Lieutenant Governor has desired the Chief Secretary



to get an inquiry conducted through Divisional Commissioner in the matter of collection of personal details and forms by non-government people."

"Accordingly, Further, Commissioner of Police may direct the field officers to take action as per law against the person who is breaching the privacy of gullible citizens by collecting their personal details in garb of giving benefits. DCPs may be advised to take action against private individuals organizing camps for fraudulent enrolment of Government Schemes," the Lieutenant Governor's office said.

Meanwhile, the AAP, in response, has alleged that the inquiry came not from the Delhi Lieutenant Governor but from the "office" of BJP leader Amit Shah. Addressing a press conference, AAP convener Arvind Kejriwal also rubbished an order by LG for enquiry into collection of details of women through registration under the scheme as "fake," saying the monetary promise was a poll announcement.


"We announced Rs 2,100 per month to all eligible women in Delhi under Mahila Samman Yojna and free treatment of the senior citizens under Sanjeevani Yojna, after forming a government in Delhi. What are they going to enquire?" Kejriwal said. The AAP national convener alleged that the BJP was trying the government's schemes just so that it could have a chance at defeating it in the February election. The party claimed that more than 22 lakh women were already registered for the

scheme.


The Lieutenant Governor's secretariat stated the Lieutenant Governor has noted that the Women and Child department, Delhi government has already clarified that it will launch a digital portal for collection of forms as and when scheme is notified. The department has further advised people not to fill forms being given by an unauthorised person. Additionally, the Lieutenant Governor's office has directed the Police Commissioner to direct the field officers to take action as per law against the persons who are breaching the privacy of gullible citizens by collecting their personal details in garb of giving benefits.

The Deputy Commissioner of Police (DCP)s may be advised to take action against private individuals organising camps for fraudulent enrolment of government schemes. The Women and Child Development Department earlier this week published a public notice in newspapers saying it would launch a digital portal for the collection of forms as and when the scheme is notified. The department advised people not to fill out forms handed to them by unauthorised persons.

In regard to Dikshit's allegations that the AAP government in Punjab was "transferring cash (in crores) from various locations in Punjab to Delhi", Saxena requested DGP Punjab and the governments of Haryana and Rajasthan to be vigilant about "private cars from Punjab with Punjab Police escorts" being sent to Delhi through their states.

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Garhwa DC holds aspirational district's meeting

In the aspirational blocks, he also highlighted the need to focus on low-performing indicators regarding ANC registration, institutional deliveries, low birth-weight babies, diabetes and hypertension, vaccinations, nutrition, among other topics.

The Civil Surgeon, Dr Ashok Kumar, representing the health department, was also present. He reiterated the need to focus on ANC registration for pregnant women, full vaccinations for children, institutional deliveries, sex ratios, malnutrition, and the functioning of MTC centres as pri-

ority areas.

The Block Education Extension Officer from the education department informed that essential facilities like drinking water, electrification, and toilets have been ensured in schools along with smooth teaching and learning processes. Instructions were also given to ensure student attendance and distribution of textbooks and bicycles among children, along with working on other important indicators.

Present at the meeting were Additional Development Commissioner Pashupatinath Mishra, Civil Surgeon Dr Ashok Kumar, District Agriculture Officer Shiv Shankar Prasad, Block Development Officer Manjhiyaon, BEEO Garhwa Rambha Chaubey, Health Department DPM Sujit Kumar Munda, officials from NITI Aayog and Piramal Foundation, among others.

MMC's Green zone incurs public criticism

The Green Zone being built by Medininagar Municipal Corporation in Daltonganj is being decried by the denizens of the town. While the residents are not against the greenery, they believe the flank of the road has been shrunk for shrubs and plants.

The upcoming Green Zone (GZ), being built at the cost of little over Rs 65 lakh on the Women's College Road is attracting public criticism. Its design is being scrutinised by the public more feverishly than the christening of it as Green Zone.

At some places the GZ is only one and half feet away from the main road and thus it is dangerous to both pedestrian and vehicular traffic.

M K Prasad, a resident of Daltonganj said "None of us is against the GZ. But its design is ill crafted. Road safety has been thrown to the wind." "How can you have plants right across the



road barely less than 2 feet away?" quipped Srivastav. Again for the GZ a five decade old tube well has been uprooted. Residents of Daltonganj react most vehemently when any water source here is destroyed or uprooted as the town reels under acute crisis of drinking water every summer.

Commissioner of the Medininagar Municipal Corporation Md Jawed Hussain Said, "There is a full length space for the pedestrians. As regards some of its structures lying too close to the road, it is 1.5 feet to 2 feet away and hence it doesn't cause any hazard."

He further said, "The tube well was malfunctioning. It will be replaced by a water kiosk that the corporation will set up here which will be providing water round the clock all free." "GZ is no fanciful idea nor any borrowed or superimposed one. Citizens need such a space for lush green. So it is being raised here," he added.

151 Jan Aushadhi Centres to come up by Jan 26

Cooking garlic, onions at high heat may be harmful to your heart: Study

Cooking garlic and onions in vegetable oil at high temperatures can generate trans-fatty acids (TFA) and can prove to be detrimental to heart health, claims a study by Japanese researchers.

TFAs are harmful fats that can accumulate along artery walls, restricting blood flow and increasing the risk of heart attacks.

While TFAs are commonly present in processed foods, evidence suggests that they can also be created at home during cooking. Studies indicate that unsaturated fatty acids (UFAs), usually considered beneficial, can undergo trans-isomerisation -- a molecular reconfiguration that transforms them into TFAs when heated at 150 degrees Celsius or higher.

To explore, researchers from Meijo University



assessed the role of isothiocyanates and polysulfides -- sulphur-containing compounds found in vegetables like garlic, leeks, onions, scallions, and shallots -- in promoting the trans-isomerisation of vegetable UFAs during cooking.

The team first evaluated the effects of sulphur compounds on triacylglycerols (TAGs) in a model system using reagents. Then they tested garlic, onion,

leek, cabbage, horseradish, broccoli sprouts, and vegetable oils like soybean and olive oils to simulate actual cooking processes.

The results, published online in the journal Food Research International, showed that sulphur compounds significantly promote heat-induced trans-isomerisation of UFAs in vegetable oils. This occurs especially when cooking temperatures are above 140 degrees Celsius.

Further, the team also assessed the role of antioxidants such as alpha-tocopherol in reducing the isomerisation of UFAs in triglycerides like triolein and trilinolein.

While the addition of antioxidants significantly reduced the promotion of UFA's isomerisation by isothiocyanates, they did little to inhibit the promotion of isomerisation by polysulfides.

"This explains that cooking polysulfide-rich vegetables such as garlic and onions in vegetable oil at high temperatures can generate TFAs. The study demonstrates that garlic and onions significantly promote the trans-isomerisation of UFAs," said the team led by Dr Masaki Honda at Meijo University.

On the other hand, the release of TFAs under normal cooking conditions is minimal.

"Cooking with ingredients rich in natural sulphur compounds may increase the risk of TFA intake," the researchers said.

According to the World Health Organization (WHO), TFAs are responsible for over 278,000 annual deaths worldwide. The global health body recommends that TFA consumption should be limited to less than 1% of daily energy intake.

Elephant found dead in Korba

Union Ministers Ashwini Vaishnav, CR Patil, Chirag Paswan, K Ram Mohan Naidu and Jayant Chaudhary, alongside three Chief Ministers -- Devendra Fadnavis, Chandrababu Naidu and Revant Reddy, will join hundreds of Government and business leaders from across the globe in Swiss ski resort town Davos next month for the World Economic Forum Annual Meeting 2025. Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister Naidu will also be joined by his son and senior minister in his state Nara Lokesh, while Karnataka's Deputy Chief Minister DK Shivakumar, Tamil Nadu Minister TRB Rajaa and Uttar Pradesh Minister Suresh Khanna will also be there for the five-day annual congregation of the world's rich and powerful, starting January 20, 2025. Actor Bhumi Pednekar,

known for films like Dum Laga Ke Haisha, Toilet: Ek Prem Katha, Shubh Mangal Saavdhan, Pati Patni Aur Woh, Badhai Do and Saand Ki Aankh, would also be there. Besides over 50 Presidents and Prime Ministers from across the world, top officials of international organisations like the United Nations, IMF, World Bank, Interpol, NATO, European Central Bank and WTO are also expected to be in Davos for the WEF Annual Meeting 2025. Senior ministers from Pakistan and Bangladesh, including Bangladesh Government's Chief Adviser and head of the interim government Muhammad Yunus would also be present. Vaishnav, Minister for Railways, Information & Broadcasting and Electronics & IT, had also attended the last WEF annual meeting, alongside Smriti Irani and Hardeep Singh Puri from the Union Council of Ministers.

This time, Vaishnav will be joined by Jal Shakti Minister Patil, Food Processing Industries Minister Paswan, Civil Aviation Minister Naidu and Minister of State for Skill Development and Education Chaudhary. Prime Minister Narendra Modi has also attended the meeting in the past, but there is no official word so far about his participation in the high-profile summit, for which the main theme this time will be 'collaboration for the intelligent age'. Expected to be attended by nearly 50 heads of state and governments from across the world, the annual meeting would take place against the backdrop of a change of regime in the US and various geopolitical and macroeconomic issues, including the Ukraine war and continuing West Asia crisis. Both Modi and Donald Trump attended the WEF Annual Meeting in 2018 for the first time as India's Prime



Minister and the US President, respectively. While Modi became Prime Minister of India for the third consecutive term earlier this year, Trump is set to assume office for the second time on January 20, and his return is expected to be among the key topics of discussion at Davos. Maharashtra Chief Minister Fadnavis and Andhra Pradesh

Chief Minister Naidu have been to Davos multiple times, while Telangana Chief Minister Reddy attended the WEF Annual Meeting in January 2024 as well. Besides Government leaders and civil society members, the Indian presence would comprise top executives of business conglomerates like Reliance, Tata, Adani, Birla, Bharti,

Mahindra, Godrej, Jindal, Bajaj and Vedanta groups. Besides Mukesh Ambani and Gautam Adani, the next-generation leaders from their groups are also expected to be present, while technology leaders, including Salil Parekh of Infosys, Rishad Premji of Wipro, as also Sumant Sinha of ReNew, Vijay Shekhar Sharma of Paytm and Adar Poonawalla of Serum Institute are expected in the Swiss Alpine resort town. Geneva-based WEF, which describes itself as an international organisation for public-private cooperation, will convene leaders from government, business and civil society as well as scientific and cultural thinkers for its 55th annual meeting under the theme of 'Collaboration for the Intelligent Age'. According to the WEF, the meeting will serve as a trusted global platform for dialogue and cooperation, bring together a diverse community

of stakeholders, seek to connect the dots in an era of complexity and be firmly future-oriented -- both in terms of insights and solutions. Several sessions are expected to be attended by Indian leaders, including one on 'India's Economic Blueprint'. As one of the world's fastest-growing major economies, India has been growing at over 8 per cent, and this growth has been buoyed by a focus on promoting local innovation and startups in technology and manufacturing, representing a departure from traditional export-oriented models. The leaders would deliberate how India has capitalised on this new blueprint and to what extent it can continue to drive global growth. According to the WEF, the annual meeting will take place at a time when geo-economic fragmentation, geopolitical polarisation and divisions over values continue to impact countries and communities across the world. At the same time, exponential innovation and deployment around whole sets of inter-connected technologies -- from AI and quantum to energy tech, biotech and health tech -- offer an unprecedented opportunity to increase productivity and hence, standards of living. Reviving and reimagining growth is critical to building stronger and more resilient economies, and the meeting would seek to discuss how to avoid an Age of Fragmentation and instead work together on a can-do, people-centred agenda for an Intelligent Age. The global leaders would also deliberate on how to reinvent the muscle of collaborative innovation to get out of the current low-growth, high-debt world economy and address common challenges from climate change to the ethical use of AI.

PM CARES fund contributions fall to ₹912 crore in FY 23

The total voluntary contribution to the PM CARES Fund fell to Rs 912 crore in the fiscal year 2022-23, its lowest since the public charitable trust was created in March 2020 following the COVID-19 outbreak. A study of the audited statements of the Prime Minister's Citizen Assistance and Relief in Emergency Situations (PM CARES) Fund website shows that the voluntary contribution peaked at Rs 7,184 crore in 2020-21 and then fell to Rs 1,938 crore in 2021-22, before declining further in 2022-23 as the Covid threat receded after 2021. The fiscal 2022-23 is the last year for which the statement is available on the website.



Foreign contribution has seen a sharper decline, registering a high of Rs 495 crore in 2020-21, before falling to Rs 40 crore and Rs 2.57 crore in the next two years. The total expenditure in 2022-23 was around Rs 439 crore, with Rs 346 crore of it used by the "PM Cares for Children", a government

initiative to support children who lost both of their parents, legal guardians or surviving parents to the Covid pandemic. An amount of nearly Rs 92 crore was spent on the procurement of oxygen concentrators, according to the statement. The Narendra Modi government had set up the

PM CARES Fund with the primary objective of dealing with any kind of emergency or distress situation, like the one posed by the Covid pandemic, and to provide relief to the affected. It was registered as a public charitable trust. The prime minister is the ex-officio chairman of the body and the fund consists entirely of voluntary contributions and does not get any budgetary support. The fund has been used over the years to boost emergency care, including for setting up oxygen plants and purchasing ventilators in hospitals run by the central and state governments as part of the larger exercise to meet the challenges posed by the pandemic. In 2021-22, an amount of Rs 1,703 crore was spent on

operational capabilities, refine their combat skills and strengthen their coordination to operate together in challenging situations. This edition of the exercise follows successful visits by Army chief General Upendra Dwiwedi to Nepal, and the visit by General Ashok Raj Sigdel, Chief of the Army Staff of Nepali Army to India.

Mauritius announces flying flag at half-mast as mark of respect to Manmohan Singh

Mauritius has announced that its national flag will fly at half-mast at all government offices and institutions till sunset on Saturday as a mark of respect to India's former prime minister Manmohan Singh. Bhutan's national flag was flown at half-mast across the country, its embassies and consulates abroad, according to the Royal Bhutan government as a mark of respect to the departed. In a note, Mauritius Prime Minister Navin Ramgoolam's office also urged the private sector to fly the flags at half-mast. Mauritius Foreign Minister Dhananjay Ramful travelled to Delhi and paid respects to the former prime minister. "Following the passing away of Dr Manmohan Singh,

former Prime Minister of the Republic of India, the public is hereby informed that the Mauritius Flag will be flown at half-mast on all government buildings until sunset today Saturday, the day of his funeral," the Mauritius prime minister's office said. "An appeal is also made to the private sector for all flags to be flown at half-mast," it said in the note. Singh, who served as the prime minister from 2004 to 2014 and widely known as the architect of India's economic reforms, died on Thursday night. He was 92. India's relations with several key countries, including Mauritius, saw significant upswing during Singh's prime ministership. Singh's last rites were held with full state honours on Saturday at the Nigambodh Ghat cremation ground in Delhi. President Droupadi

Murmu, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and King of Bhutan Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck were among those who attended Singh's funeral. Bhutan's King Jigme Khesar Namgyel Wangchuck attended the funeral of former prime minister Manmohan Singh, a day after leading the Himalayan nation in offering prayers for the Indian leader at a Buddhist monastery in Thimphu. Separate prayer ceremonies were held for the former Indian prime minister at all 20 Dzongkhags or districts of Bhutan, according to the Bhutan government. Bhutan's national flag was flown at half-mast across the country and at its embassies, and consulates abroad, according to the Royal Bhutan government. A thousand butter lamps were lit at the ceremony held in



Thimphu's Kuenrey of Tashichhodzong that was led by the King. The prayer was attended by Prime Minister Tshering Tobgay, Indian ambassador Sudhakar Dalela, several members of the Royal family and senior officials of the Bhutanese government. "As a mark of respect to the

late former prime minister and in solidarity with the government and people of India, all national flags across the country and at Bhutan's embassies, missions, and consulates abroad are being flown at half-mast," the Bhutanese government said in a social media post on Friday. India's relations with several key countries including Bhutan saw significant upswing during Singh's prime ministership. India and Bhutan enjoy strong bonds of friendship based on goodwill, trust and mutually beneficial cooperation. The basic framework of India-Bhutan relations is the "Treaty of Friendship and Cooperation" signed in 1949. It was renewed in February 2007 when Singh was the prime minister. The cooperation in the hydro-power sector is one of the cornerstones of the relations. The ongoing cooperation between India and Bhutan in the hydro-power sector is covered under the 2006 bilateral agreement for cooperation and its Protocol signed in 2009. The pact and the protocol were inked during Singh's

tenure as the prime minister. Meanwhile, Abed Elrazeg Abu Jazer, the charge d'affaires of the Palestine embassy in India, on Friday paid his last respects to the former prime minister and appreciated his support to Palestine. Jazer said Singh played a key role in Palestine getting land for its embassy in Delhi. "We have a history of relationships. He (Singh) met Yasser Arafat in 1991 when he was finance minister, he met (State of Palestine) President Mahmoud Abbas several times throughout his tenure," the diplomat told reporters outside the Congress headquarters where he paid tribute to the former prime minister on behalf of Palestine. He also laid a wreath on behalf of the president of the State of Palestine. "We had good relations with

him (Singh). He met our president several times during his tenure. He also provided land for establishing the Palestinian embassy in Delhi, gave support to build the embassy, and also inaugurated it in 2012," Jazer said. "We appreciate his support to Palestine, we are remembering his contributions. We stand with the Indian people to show our respect for the leader," he added. Abbas visited New Delhi several times during the United Progressive Alliance (UPA) government. In a speech before the UN General Assembly in September 2011, Singh had said India supported "the Palestinian people's struggle for a sovereign, independent, viable and united State of Palestine with East Jerusalem as its capital".

As individuals age, singlehood may also bring economic, emotional challenges: Study

Although marriage or long-term relationships are often seen as the norm, remaining single for life is becoming an increasingly common choice. While singlehood can provide independence and freedom, a new study reveals that it may also bring economic and emotional challenges, particularly as individuals' age and become more dependent on others for support. Published in the journal Psychological Science, the study highlights the lower life satisfaction and distinct personality traits of lifelong singles compared to their partnered peers. "When there are differences, they might be especially important in elderly people who face more health issues and financial issues," said Julia Stern, one of the lead authors and a senior researcher at the University of Bremen in Germany. "They need more help, and



the help is usually the partner." The study used a survey of more than 77,000 Europeans over the age of 50 and was the first of its kind to look across cultures and at people who had been single their entire lives. Stern and colleagues compared single people and partnered individuals on life satisfaction ratings and the Big Five personality traits (openness to experience, conscientiousness, extraversion, agreeableness, and neuroticism). The findings revealed that, in

addition to lower life satisfaction scores, lifelong singles are less extraverted, less conscientious, and less open to experience, compared to partnered people. Although this study cannot definitively decipher if personality differences are due to selection, people with certain personality types may be more likely to start relationships, or socialization, long-term relationships could change personalities, the evidence points to the former. Stern

said that changes to personality from being in a relationship are small and temporary. For instance, although an extraverted person beginning a new relationship may be keen to stay in with their partner, eventually their extraversion comes back. But she warned that the results are average effects and not necessarily descriptive of everyone; of course, there are single extraverts and introverts in committed relationships. For singles, living in a society where marriage is the expectation may affect their life satisfaction. For instance, in countries with higher marriage rates (such as southern European countries), singlehood resulted in even lower life satisfaction scores, but the effects were small. Stern suggested developing new kinds of programs to prevent loneliness that take these personality traits into consideration and help older singles meet like-minded people.

CBI searches premises of Assistant Director of ED in Shimla

The CBI has searched the premises of an Assistant Director of the ED in Shimla, who managed to give a slip to the agency during a trap operation on Sunday and escaped, officials said. The Assistant Director of the Enforcement Directorate (ED) posted at Shimla and his brother Vikas Deep, a senior manager in the Punjab National Bank in Delhi, had allegedly gone to Chandigarh to receive bribe money from a businessman, who is facing a case lodged under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), they said. The businessman filed a complaint with the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) about alleged extortion, based on which the Chandigarh unit of the agency planned the trap operation where the complainant was asked to give a bribe of Rs 55 lakh in cash to the officer with CBI sleuths keeping an eye, the officials said. It was planned that the



CBI would nab the accused after the bribe was allegedly received by him, they said. The ED officer, who is on deputation from the Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC), got alerted during the operation and allegedly fled the spot with the cash, the officials said. The agency has been trying to locate him for six days. It has even launched technical surveillance to pin-point his location but to no avail. So far, cash amounting to around Rs 1 crore, including the bribe amount, has been recovered, they added. The

Principal Secretary to PM condoles Manmohan Singh's passing

In his condolences on passing away of former Prime Minister Dr. Manmohan Singh, Principal Secretary to PM Dr PK Mishra on Friday said the country has lost a very distinguished leader, an eminent economist and a great human being. "My memories of Dr. Manmohan Singh dates back to the time when he was teaching at the Delhi School of Economics and I was in my M.A. first year. Seeing him among the stalwart professors in that era was reassuring for a student like me, having come from Sambalpur district in Odisha. Those were the days when very eminent professors such as Amartya Sen, Mrinal Datta Chaudhuri, A.M. Khuroo, K.N. As the nation bid adieu to former prime minister Manmohan Singh in New Delhi on Saturday, two tribals in a remote Odisha district, who were honoured by him in 2012 for biodiversity conservation, recalled with tears cherished memories with the beloved leader. Railla Muduli, a resident of Boliguda village and Chandra Pradhani of Nuaguda, said words were not enough to express their grief over the demise of Singh. The former PM passed away on Thursday night at Delhi's All India Institute of Medical Sciences due to age-related medical complications. He was 92. Muduli and Pradhani had received Certificates of Recognition for their contribution to biodiversity

conservation from Singh during the 99th Indian Science Congress held at Bhubaneswar 12 years ago. "Sir smiled at me as I received the award and motivated us to continue our efforts in preserving biodiversity. His words will remain an inspiration for years to come," he said. "I wish I had more opportunities to meet him," Pradhani said. Prasant Parida, director of the M S Swaminathan Research Foundation in Jeypore, said Koraput was recognised as a Globally Important Agricultural Heritage System (GIAHS) by the Food and Agriculture Organisation (FAO) in 2012. Denial of fireworks permission sparks row at Thrissur Temples, shrine managements cry foul

The district administration's denial of permission for the fireworks display during 'Vela Ezunnallippu', a traditional ritual, at the famed Paramekkavu and Thiruvambady temples here has sparked a row with the shrine managements viewing it as a "test dose" to destroy the iconic Thrissur Pooram. The Additional District Magistrate (ADM) here on Friday issued an order denying permission for the fireworks display in connection with the annual ritual citing the new amendment to the union government's Explosive Rules and based on reports of various state government departments in accordance with that. The Vela Ezunnallippu ritual and the related fireworks display of the two temples are scheduled in January first week. In the order, the district administration stated that there is no physical circumstance to carry out the fireworks display in the area and it may pose a threat to the life and property of the public. The opinion of concerned investigating officers that the fireworks should not be allowed taking into account the safety of public life has also been considered, said the order. The order was issued on the request for permission to conduct fireworks display submitted by Thiruvambady Devaswom. Meanwhile, the order denying permission to the

fireworks display citing the central explosive rule guidelines drew sharp reactions from the temple managements. K Girish Kumar, Secretary, Thiruvambady Devaswom, vehemently criticised the move and said permission for the fireworks display is being denied citing technical reasons and urged political leaders and ministers from the district to raise their voice against it. "The Vela Ezunnallippu and its related fireworks are held on the same Swaraj Round where the Thrissur Pooram is conducted annually. The present move is a test dose to destroy the iconic Pooram," he told reporters here. Rejecting the reasons for denying permission for the fireworks display, he said the school, hospital, petrol pump and other such institutions have been there in the area for years and the rituals were held there without any issues in the past. The fireworks display is to be conducted in the midnight after taking all necessary precautions and so it won't pose any security issues as claimed in the order, the Devaswom Secretary further said. Without naming anyone, he further alleged that there were attempts to block the parading of jumbos and the apex court granted permission for the same recently. Now-a-days, the temple authorities are forced to approach the court for each and everything to protect the traditional rituals, he added.

Patna district administration offers to facilitate meeting between BPSC and protesting candidates over exam cancellation demand

The Patna district administration on Saturday said it has made an offer to the candidates, demanding cancellation of the Bihar Public Service Commission (BPSC) examination held on December 13, to facilitate a meeting with it so that they could put forth their grievances. The candidates, seeking cancellation of the 70th Integrated Combined Competitive Examination (CCE), 2024, under the BPSC over allegations of question paper leak have been protesting for more than a week. The protestors would be required to nominate five of

their representatives for talks after which the BPSC would take a decision "within a reasonable time", Patna District Magistrate (DM) Chandrasekhar Singh said. "The district administration has offered the protesting

aspirants to give a list of the representatives (all of them examinees) so that we can facilitate their meeting with the BPSC authorities over the issue," the DM told PTI on Saturday. "They can apprise the

commission's officials of their grievances in the meeting. The district administration also assures the protesting aspirants that the commission would take appropriate decisions or a stand within a reasonable time," Singh said. The commission is an independent body and it is free to make decisions on its own, he said. The BPSC had decided to cancel the preliminary examination held at Babu Pariksha Parisar centre only due to disruption created by a group of unruly aspirants. The re-examination will be held on January 4 at some other centre in the city. The protestors have been

sitting on dharna at Gardani Bagh for several days. They contend that cancellation should be ordered across the board since re-examination for just one centre would go against the principle of "level playing field". Meanwhile, the Patna Police have issued notices to certain people, associated with coaching institutes, and sought clarification over allegedly instigating the protesting aspirants and delivering provocative speeches while addressing students at Gardani Bagh, the dedicated site for organising protests in the city. "Yes, notices have been served to them by the Patna Police in this regard.

Cyber fraudsters target Mahakumbh mela, police crackdown on fake booking websites

In a growing trend of cyber fraud targeting the Maha Kumbh Mela, several fake websites promising hotel, tent, and cottage bookings have come to light, prompting the police to launch an intensive crackdown. On Friday, the cyber police registered cases against four such fraudulent websites and subsequently shut them down. Deputy Inspector of Cyber Cell Vinod Kumar Yadav stated that cybercriminals were exploiting the faith and enthusiasm of devotees by



creating fake platforms offering premium services, including accommodations

and special VIP bathing arrangements. "These websites are deceiving pilgrims and extorting significant sums of money under the guise of bookings," he said, urging people to remain vigilant. This marks the fifth case registered against fake websites since November 18, when the cyber police began targeting such fraudulent activities. A dedicated team is now investigating the domains of these sites to identify their operators. Emails have been sent to hosting services to uncover the registrants and locations from where these sites are

being managed. The four websites identified and acted upon are: *https://mahakumbhfestival.com/ *https://mahakumbhcottagesreservation.org/ *https://jainmandiranddharamshala.in/ *https://mahakumbhcottagesreservation.org/ The cyber police confirmed that FIRs have been filed, and efforts are underway to track down the fraudsters. "Once the domain details are received, we will expedite the arrest of those behind this scam," Yadav added.

The Maha Kumbh Mela, a globally renowned religious gathering, attracts millions of pilgrims. With this influx, cybercriminals see an opportunity to exploit unsuspecting devotees. The police have advised pilgrims to verify booking platforms thoroughly and rely only on official websites for reservations. Authorities are also urging citizens to report suspicious websites or activities immediately, reinforcing the message that collective vigilance is the key to preventing such frauds.

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ED raids Chhattisgarh Cong MLA Kawasi Lakhma, son in money laundering case linked to liquor scam

The Enforcement Directorate on Saturday conducted raids at the premises of Chhattisgarh Congress MLA and former excise minister Kawasi Lakhma, his son and some others as part of a money laundering investigation linked to an alleged liquor scam in the state, official sources said. They said a total of seven premises - including Lakhma's residence in Raipur and his son Harish Lakhma's premises in Sukma district apart from that of some linked persons - are being searched under the provisions of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA). The Chhattisgarh Congress alleged the raids were part of a conspiracy by the BJP to harass the opposition party's leaders ahead of urban body and panchayat polls. Lakhma, 71, is a six-time MLA from Korta assembly seat and served as excise minister in the previous Congress government. Harish Lakhma is stated to be a

panchayat president in his district. The ED sources said they are investigating allegations made by some "key accused" that Lakhma was paid about Rs 2 crore per month between 2020-2022 when he held the excise portfolio. According to the agency, the alleged liquor scam was orchestrated between 2019-22 under the then chief minister Bhupesh Baghel-led Congress government. "The Chhattisgarh liquor scam resulted in massive loss to the state exchequer and filled the pockets of the beneficiaries of the liquor syndicate with more than Rs 2,100 crore illegal proceeds of crime," the agency had claimed earlier. Chhattisgarh Congress communication wing president Sushil Anand Shukla told PTI that central agencies are being misused as urban body and panchayat elections are expected to be held in the state. This is a conspiracy by the BJP to harass Congress leaders, he said.

Gutsy Reddy's maiden ton keeps India afloat

Nitish Reddy, an unknown entity in red ball cricket before the start of Border-Gavaskar series, virtually bailed India out with his dogged maiden Test century here on Saturday, severely denting Australia's hopes of winning the Boxing Day contest.

Reddy's unbeaten 105 took India to 358 for nine, still 116 runs short of Australia's first innings score of 474 as rain brought an early end to the third day's play.

With the flat MCG deck not offering much to the bowlers, saving the Test match shouldn't be a big deal for India. Reddy, easily India's 'find of the series', played a pivotal role in visitors' fightback.

Reddy's combative spirit and the invaluable 127-run stand he shared with Washington Sundar (50 off 162 balls) proved to be the turning point for the hosts.

Reddy's innings was termed as one of greatest Test knocks by the legendary Sunil Gavaskar given the situation as India were in a precarious

position after Rishab Pant's dismissal courtesy a rash shot had left India tottering at 191 for six.

The young Andhra batter could have been stranded on 99 when Jasprit Bumrah got dismissed, leaving Reddy with last-man in Mohammed Siraj, who walked in to another round of boos and faced three deliveries from home skipper Pat Cummins.

Both Reddy and his father Muthyala's expressions changed with each ball but Siraj survived to allow Reddy savour the moment he must have dreamt a thousand times.

A picture-perfect straight drive off Scott Boland was the moment of the series for India as Reddy balanced his helmet with the bat and took a knee, expressing his gratitude towards the Indian dug-out which gave him a standing ovation.

The 21-year-old struck the 'Pushpa' pose after completing his fifty and the 'Salaar' pose to celebrate the century.

A decade back, when his father Muthyala left a secured job to open a micro-



finance (lending) business and incurred losses, the Reddy family was advised not to give wings to young Reddy's cricketing dreams but they were unrelenting.

Sitting in the stands near the boundary, Reddy's father broke down when his son achieved the milestone.

As Indian fans clicked selfies with him it must have reminded of the day when his son received the best U-16 cricketer award from the BCCI in 2017, and an impressive Reddy was seen clicking selfie with his idol Virat Kohli and his wife Anushka Sharma while leaving the hotel premises.

Reddy's batting was based on stable core, playing the ball late and only going for the drive when the ball was pitched up. He wasn't defending unnecessarily and 10 fours and a six was a testimony to that.

If the morning was more about Rishabh Pant's inexplicable shot selection, the afternoon session belonged to Reddy, whose attacking game put the pressure right back on Australia.

There were plenty of boundaries and a six off Nathan Lyon but none more gorgeous than the off-drive off Cummins. Reddy has been by far India's most consistent batter in the series and the maiden Test century couldn't have come at a more opportune time and that too at an iconic venue.

Washington, at the other end, grew in confidence and trusted his defence apart from punishing the loose deliveries. It did help that the drop-in surface at the MCG has got better for batting as the match progressed.

The second new ball did very little for Australian bowlers and the Indian duo ran very well between the wickets. With Mitchell Starc's back acting up a little, the two batters looked to reduce the deficit further.

In the morning it was all about Pant's shot selection that hurt India.

The third day's MCG track is perhaps the best to bat on with green grass making way for a brownish tinge and an old Kookaburra hardly doing anything.

Had Pant stuck around,

there was no way he wouldn't have scored big. Pant did start well and got a few boundaries but then the urge to play the falling lap pull over long-leg brought about his dismissal.

When he tried it for the first time off Scott Boland, who came round the wicket, Pant was hit in the naval area and seemed to be in pain.

He got up but didn't realise that Cummins had placed one fielder at deep fine-leg and one at deep third man for both the conventional and reverse lap shot.

Without learning his lessons or caring about success percentage, Pant tried a similar shot but the extra bounce meant that the top edge flew to third man for a regulation catch.

"If there was a word called 'worstest', then this was one such shot," former India skipper Sunil Gavaskar said on air.

But Reddy showed steely resolve as he started with a punchy off-drive off Lyon and also jumped down the track to loft him over for a straight six during a splendid recovery act.

Nitish Reddy: Story of sacrifices made by middle class family

Nitish Reddy loves his tattoos like most 21-year-olds do, and one on his ankle is a picture of 'Achilles' Heel'. He considers it a reminder of all the difficulties that his family has endured in the last 10 years to power his cricketing dream.

For Reddy, becoming a cricketer was both a choice and a compulsion. He wanted to do something for his parents, who gave their tears and sweat to fuel his India dream.

The middle-class family gambled with its finances to allow Reddy soar high. The risks taken and losses suffered will not bother them now.

"Getting into the Indian team is a proud feeling but it is only 50 percent of the dream. It will be fulfilled if I can wear that jersey and win matches for my country," an emotional Reddy had told PTI in June this year.

"I want to see respect for my father in the eyes of those who once tore him to shreds for believing in my talent."

The maiden Test ton

celebration in 'Salaar' style was a tribute to his father Muthyala, who watched his son rescue India from the stand behind team's dug-out.

The journey was not just Reddy's but also of his father's sacrifices and belief that his son was special.

As a 12 year-old, Reddy overheard his relatives cursing his father for losing money in his micro-financing business after taking a voluntary retirement from service (VRS) from Hindustan Zinc.

He took the decision to avoid getting transferred to Udaipur since he knew the city did not have the facilities and coaching to help his son excel as a cricketer.

He invested the payout of Rs 20 lakh to start his business. However, his friends, who took loan from him never returned the amount, resulting in massive losses.

"I could hear those discussions and even as a 12-year old. I understood everything. It was a promise I made to myself that only one thing can redeem my



dad's prestige — an India call-up," Reddy had told back then.

It was the time when he could just afford one bat a year (one good seasoned English willow cost around 15,000 back then. It is close to 50k now for international players).

"I can't tell you how happy I am," Muthyala said, struggling to express his emotions, standing outside the MCG after his son's rescue act.

"Virat sir has told him to work hard," he said.

A few years back, Reddy was adjudged the best U-16 cricketer by the BCCI and

he attended the Annual Awards Function in Bengaluru.

The entire Indian team was in attendance and the 14-year-old was desperate for a selfie with Kohli and his wife Anushka, who were waiting near the elevator of the hotel.

Kohli was in a hurry but obliged and it became a memorable moment for young Reddy. Now getting applauded for his effort by his idol is an unforgettable memory for him.

Reddy's family also can't thank enough former Andhra Cricket Association's head MSK

Prasad for enrolling him in its state-of-the-art academy in Visakhapatnam.

"Initially, he was placed in our U-14 academy, located far from his hometown. However, his parents encouraged him to pursue his dreams, and he steadily progressed through our academies. Nitish eventually earned a spot in India's U-19 team, showcasing his skill and determination," Prasad recently told PTI.

In 2023, Reddy secured spot in India's Emerging Asia Cup team but was dropped after playing a few games. The squad had players like Yash Dhull, Nishant Sindhu, who are far away from national reckoning.

There are certain events that change the course of one's career and that Emerging Asia Cup made him realise that to make a mark at the international level, he needed to think out of the box. "I started spending more time at the nets and also hired a few side arm specialists (throwdown) available in Vizag and practised for a month."

"They were all hurling the

ball at 145 clicks and initially I found it hard. And then by the end of the month got adjusted. That practice went a long way when I played IPL this season where I could hit sixes," he had said.

His SRH skipper Pat Cummins might be smiling quietly and thinking aloud as to why he told Reddy that he has the potential to play for India and develop into a good all-rounder.

India head coach Gautam Gambhir also deserves credit for putting his foot down for having Reddy Down Under after watching his exploits in a T20 series against Bangladesh.

It was a leap of faith and Reddy is now the 'find of the series' for India. On the Christmas Day, when everyone was fretting about India's combination, Sanjay Manjrekar had questioned, "Will Leaving Reddy out give India a better balance?" On Saturday, one of Reddy's sponsors, a popular sports equipment and apparel brand quote tweeted Manjrekar with the cricketer's pic urged the cricket pundit to keep quiet.

Nick Kyrgios heavily criticizes Sinner, Swiatek for doping-related issues

Just days away from his return to tennis at the Brisbane International, Nick Kyrgios hasn't minced his words in referring to doping-related charges against Jannik Sinner and Iga Swiatek, labelling breaches of the sport's anti-doping program as "disgusting for our sport."

The International Tennis Integrity Agency (ITIA) levelled charges against world No.1 Sinner and former world No.1 Iga Swiatek. Sinner tested positive twice for an anabolic steroid in March, but avoided a ban because the ITIA determined he was not to blame.

Swiatek also accepted a one-month suspension in November after testing positive for the banned substance trimetazidine.

"Two world No.1s both getting done for doping is disgusting for our sport. It's a horrible look," Kyrgios said at his Brisbane International



press conference on Saturday. "Tennis integrity right now, and everyone knows it but no one wants to speak about it, it's awful."

Kyrgios, 29, has not played tournament tennis since June 2023 due to wrist and knee injuries. He was asked about his motivations for speaking out on the Sinner and Swiatek situations.

"Someone like me ... I would never even in my entire life ever try and dope in this sport," he said. "Especially going through an injury like I went through, obviously there are things out there that could speed up healing, help me get back to prime level, help my recovery."

Carlsen disqualified from top chess meet for violating dress code

Five-time world champion Magnus Carlsen was first fined and then disqualified from the World Rapid and Blitz Chess Championship here for his refusal to comply with the FIDE's dress code after turning up in jeans here. Defending champion Carlsen was fined USD 200 for wearing jeans, which are "explicitly prohibited" under tournament regulations and when he refused the request to change his attire right after the eighth round by chief arbiter Alex Holowczak, he was disqualified.

He was not paired for Round 9 of the Rapid championship, taking place at Wall Street. One of the game's greatest players, the Norwegian ace had agreed to follow the dress from the next day but was not ready to do it immediately, resulting in his disqualification.

"I would rather be at someplace with better weather," was how Carlsen summed up his disqualification from the championship in which he has won in the last two editions.

In a statement, the game's global governing body FIDE emphasised that the dress code rules are well-communicated to all participants and designed to ensure professionalism.

"The dress code regulations are drafted by members of the FIDE Athletes Commission, which is composed of professional players and experts. These rules have been in place for years and are well-known to all participants and are communicated to



them ahead of each event," FIDE said in the statement, posted on X.

"FIDE has also ensured that the players' accommodation is within a short walking distance from the playing venue, making adherence to the rules more convenient." It added, "Today, Mr. Magnus Carlsen breached the dress code by wearing jeans, which are explicitly prohibited under long-standing regulations for this event. The Chief Arbiter informed Mr. Carlsen of the breach, issued a USD 200 fine, and requested that he change his attire."

"Unfortunately, Mr. Carlsen declined, and as a result, he was not paired for round nine. This decision was made impartially and applies equally to all players."

Earlier, Russian Grandmaster Ian Nepomniachtchi was also penalised for a similar violation but he complied by changing his attire, allowing him to continue in the event. Meanwhile, "upset" with the turn of events, Carlsen said he won't participate in the Blitz section of the championship as he is "pretty tired" of FIDE's dress code policies.

"I am pretty tired of FIDE, so I want no more of this. I don't

want anything to do with them. I am sorry to everyone at home, maybe it's a stupid principle, but I don't think it's any fun," Carlsen told Norwegian broadcasting channel NRK.

"I said I don't want to bother changing now, but I can change until tomorrow, that's fine. But they didn't want to compromise. I've reached a point where I am pretty upset with FIDE, so I didn't want to either. Then that's how it goes," he added.

The Carlsen dress code fiasco is being seen as a signal to the chess world about his keenness to develop the faster version of the game that he considers as a "real skill" as well as his personal interest about developing the "freestyle chess" for which he recently raised USD 12 million.

Freestyle chess, as he prefers to call it, is the version of the game wherein chess pieces can be shuffled in any order. This was an idea propagated by the great Bobby Fischer.

"This is a war with FIDE (the game's apex body)," said Norwegian sports broadcaster Kaja Snare before adding that this is the end of an era for world chess.

Chhetri farewell signals end of an era in forgettable year for Indian football

Indian football found itself in the throes of despair throughout 2024 with the senior men's team failing to register a single win in a year when the long-serving Sunil Chhetri finally decided to hang up his boots internationally after 19 years of yeoman service.

The familiar sight of the diminutive No. 11 running into the box, deftly chipping the ball into the back of the net, bringing out his trademark 'namaste' celebration, and looking skywards with his fingers pointing to the heavens will forever be etched in the hearts of Indian football fans.

With his record 151 appearances and 94 goals for India, Chhetri became synonymous with the sport in the country, inspiring millions while leading the team with distinction. The talisman's retirement, at 39, marked a poignant end in a year of more lows than highs with the men's national team facing transitional challenges and failing to notch a single win across 12 months for the first time in a decade.

"You don't wish to stop playing for the country. But one day you have to, and you will be fine. Finally, I reached this decision. And I think I made the right decision," an emotional Chhetri had said after his decision to retire.

India's FIFA World Cup qualifier against Kuwait was his last appearance for the country.

On June 6, in his final match at Salt Lake Stadium, 58,921 fans gathered to bid farewell



to the legend but the game ended in a goalless draw, much to the disappointment of his supporters.

It was a night heavy with emotion, as Indian football lost its torchbearer, the unifying figure who had carried the sport on his shoulders for nearly two decades. The national team has never been the same since his retirement.

World Cup Qualifiers debacle

The disappointing exit from the second round of FIFA World Cup Qualifiers was followed by the acrimonious sacking of head coach Igor Stimac, a year before his contract expired.

Stimac initially demanded USD 920,000 (Rs 7.72 crore) as compensation and approached the game's governing body FIFA after rejecting the All India Football Federation's (AIFF) offer of first three, then five, and finally 10 months' salary as settlement.

The matter escalated before both parties reached an

and Mumbai City FC continued their dominance with the two teams winning the Shield and ISL title respectively.

There was, however, also a setback for Mohun Bagan who were considered 'withdrawn' from the AFC Champions League 2 after refusing to travel to Iran for their match against Tractor SC on October 2, citing security concerns amid political unrest in that part of the world.

The Asian Football Confederation (AFC) cancelled all of Mohun Bagan's matches in the competition, considering them null and void. This followed the club's goalless draw against Ravshan Kulob in their opening Group A match at Salt Lake Stadium.

The year proved to be a historic one for Odisha FC who secured a spot in the AFC Women's Champions League Group Stage after topping their preliminary stage group with two wins, including a 4-1 victory over Lion City Sailors and a 2-1 win against Etihad Club.

There was also a tug of war between bitter rivals Mohun Bagan and East Bengal over one of the finest centrebacks Anwar Ali, leading to legal battles over his contract.

Controversy off the field The sport also had its share of off-the-field controversies with some questioning AIFF president Kalyan Chaubey's leadership following the termination of Nilanjan Bhattacharjee, the head of the national federation's legal body.

Chaubey faced allegations of mishandling tender processes

and using AIFF funds for personal expenses from the ousted Bhattacharjee.

Former India captain Bhaichung Bhutia also called for Chaubey's resignation citing 'issues' with AIFF's administration.

If that was not enough, the federation found itself embroiled in a new controversy over its handling of the broadcasting rights for the I-League 2024-25 season.

After initially entering into a deal with Sony for the coverage of matches, the AIFF abruptly switched to Shraci Sports, an inexperienced entity. The move led to sponsor concerns, with club owners threatening to withdraw teams if proper broadcasting arrangements aren't made.

The AIFF, though, denied any wrongdoing. Future tense

The Indian team is currently in a transition phase, with head coach Marquez experimenting with various combinations and giving opportunities to a group of promising youngsters to identify the next No. 10.

However, the team remains unsettled, with the veteran duo of Gurpreet Singh Sandhu and Sandesh Jhingan carrying significant responsibility at the back.

Following a challenging year, Marquez faces the task of steering India to a third consecutive AFC Asian Cup qualification. The Blue Tigers are placed in a competitive Group C and will face Hong Kong, Singapore, and Bangladesh after beginning their campaign on March 25 next year.

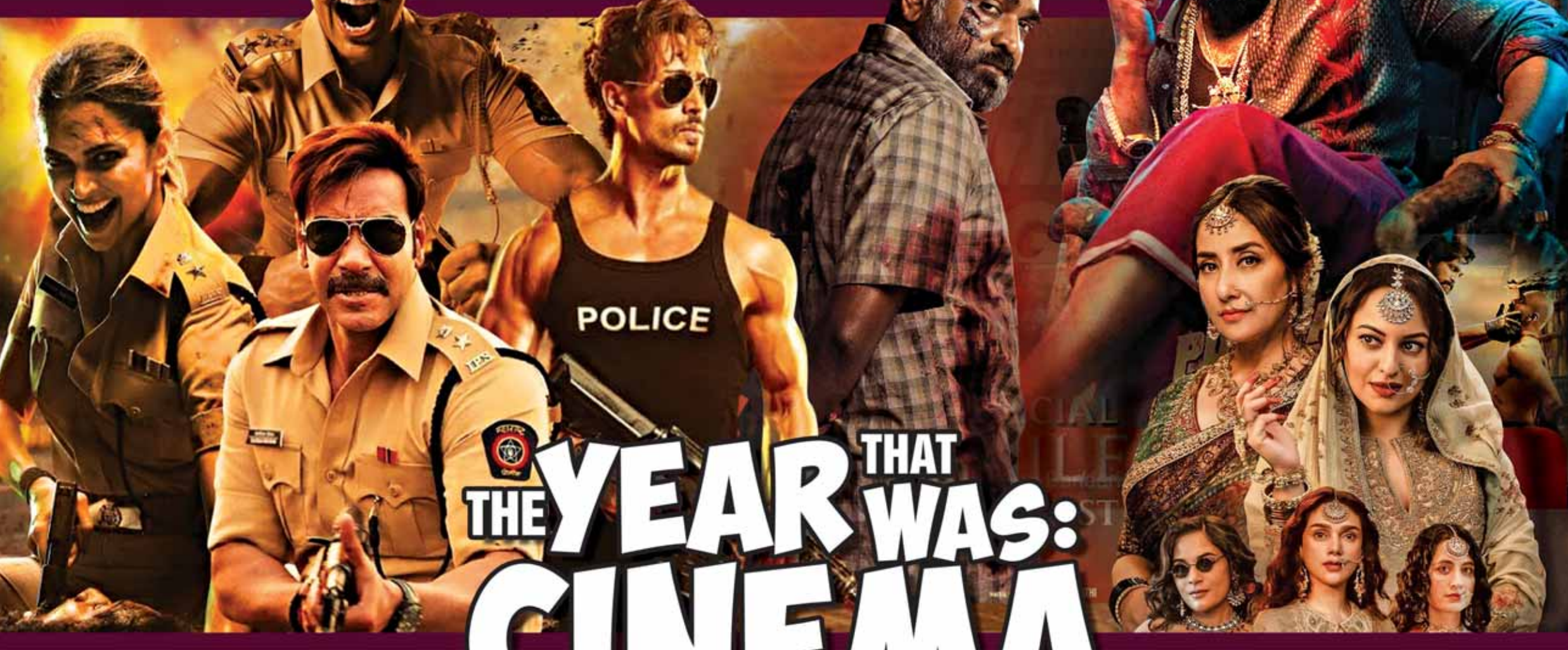

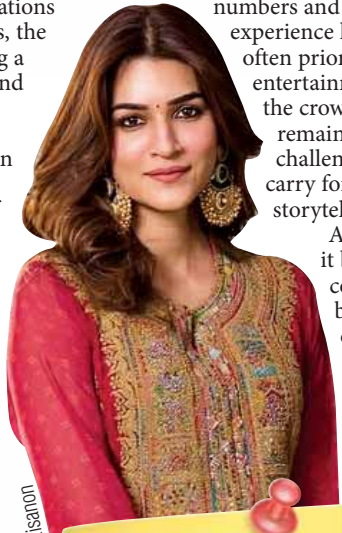

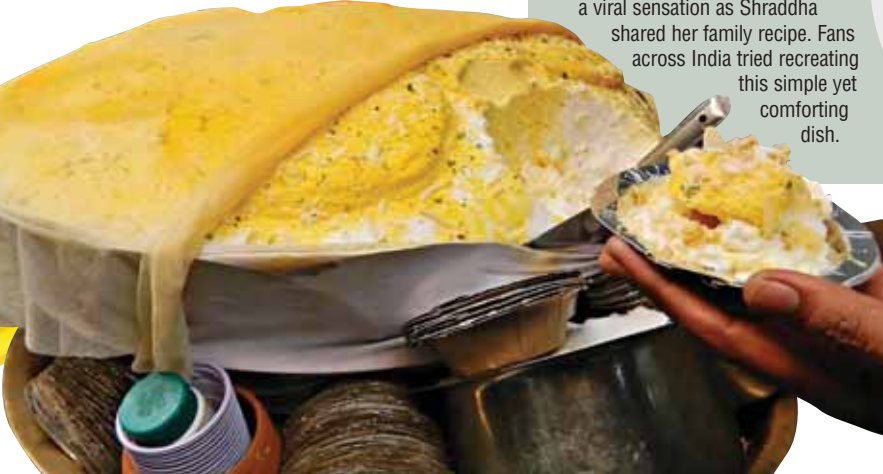

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The Significance of Khar Maas



Khar Maas, a revered period in the Vedic calendar, begins on December 15, 2024, when the Sun enters Sagittarius and concludes on January 14, 2025, with its transition into Capricorn, marking the celebration of Makar Sankranti. This month holds a unique spiritual essence, encouraging individuals to focus on inner growth, devotion, and alignment with divine energies. The origin of Khar Maas is rooted in an ancient story. It is said that the Sun God, Suryadev, drives his chariot, pulled by seven celestial horses, to maintain the cosmic cycle of day and night. One day, the horses, thirsty and weary, sought a break to drink water. To allow this, Suryadev temporarily replaced them with donkeys. The slower pace of the donkeys extended the journey to thirty days, giving rise to what we now call Khar Maas, as "Khar" means donkey in Sanskrit. This period is observed as a sacred time for reflection and devotion. However, traditions discourage undertaking new ventures or life events with long-term implications during this month. Weddings, engagements, housewarming ceremonies, groundbreaking rituals, and the establishment of new businesses are avoided. Instead, individuals are encouraged to turn their focus inward, prioritising spiritual practices over material pursuits.

Khar Maas is an ideal time for self-purification and strengthening one's connection to higher energies. Devotees often engage in tapasya (austerities), perform fire rituals (hawans), embark on pilgrimages, and undertake charitable acts. These activities are believed to cleanse the soul, resolve karmic imbalances, and invite divine blessings.

During Khar Maas, fasting is another common spiritual practice observed by many. Fasting is believed to purify the body and mind, allowing individuals to detach from material desires and focus on spiritual upliftment. Consuming sattvic food-pure, vegetarian meals devoid of onion and garlic-is encouraged during this time to maintain a calm and

In the evenings, lighting a ghee diya near Goddess Tulsi is believed to attract positivity, prosperity, and divine protection. Khar Maas serves as a reminder of the cyclical nature of life, urging us to embrace moments of pause and reflection. This sacred period helps prepare individuals for new beginnings and auspicious endeavours that can commence after Makar Sankranti.
