

Terrorists encountered in Kashmir; one jawan martyred

A jawan of the Indian Army on Saturday was martyred during an encounter with a group of heavily armed terrorists in the South Kashmir district of Kulgam. Till the time of filing the

report, the security forces were engaged with the terrorists at two locations in the valley.

According to a spokesman of the Jammu and Kashmir police, the first gunfight took place in Modergam village of the south Kashmir district after security forces launched a cordon and search operation there following specific inputs about the presence of terrorists.

The terrorists opened fire at the security forces and an encounter broke out. The officials said a soldier of

"They (foreign terrorists) are not in big numbers and we are fully determined to defeat them, like we have done in the past, with the help of other forces and cooperation of the public," he said.

The DGP said the foreign mercenaries do not belong to anyone and they also do not fall in the ambit of law.

They are involved in mass killings, taking sheep without paying money and their aim is to create fear and force the public into submission and create disturbance. But it cannot be achieved because the people are with us and we will fight them out," the DGP said. Bhole Baba breaks silence

Following the stampede at Phis "satsang" in Uttar Pradesh's Hathras a few days ago, which resulted in the death of 121 people earlier this week, Bhole Baba, the former constable-turnedgodman, self-styled expressed his sorrow over the incident. He said he is "deeply saddened" by the loss of lives, conveying his condolences and sympathy to the grieving families. "May God give us the strength to bear this pain.

Please keep faith in the Government and the administration. I have faith that anyone who created the chaos would not be spared. Through my lawyer AP Singh, I have requested the members of the committee to stand with the bereaved families and the injured and help them throughout their lives," said Bhole Baba in a video statement.

Narendra Modi's third tenure as Prime Minister is all set to present its eleventh annual Budget consecutively and with this Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, serving her second consecutive term as Finance Minister, will become first Finance Minister to present seven consecutive Union Budgets, surpassing Morarji Desai, who presented six consecutive annual Budget of the Government of India. Interestingly the Budget will also be the first one in the new Parliament which was inaugurated last September during which the historic Women Reservation Bill was

President Droupadi Murmu on Saturday approved the proposal for summoning of both Houses of Parliament for the Budget Session, 2024 from July 22, to August 12 and the Union Budget 2024-25 will be presented in Lok Sabha on July 23. This will be the first Budget presented by the Government led by Prime Minister Narendra Modi's NDA third term.

The toll in this year's flood was 52 and 12 others lost their lives due to landslides and storms. The Brahmaputra river is flowing above the danger mark at Nimatighat, Guwahati, Goalpara and Dhubri. Its tributaries Burhi Dihing at Chenimari, Dikhou at Sivasagar, Disang at Nanglamuraghat, Dhansiri at Numaligarh, Jia Bharali at NT Road crossing, and Kopili at Kampur and Dharamtul are also flowing above the danger levels. Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma held a meeting with officials after returning from the severely affected Dibrugarh district and reviewed the flood situation in the State.

Assam's famed Kaziranga National Park (KNP) has claimed the lives of 114 wild animals while 95 others have been rescued till Saturday, an official said.

The animal mortality in the KNP has increased from 77 till Friday. The dead animals include four rhinos and 94 hog deer due to drowning in the KNP and 11 others during treatment.

Malda mangoes multiply

 $F_{decades}^{or} \ \, \text{perhaps Indians} \\ are getting to taste their own$ mangoes — sweet, fleshy, soft and smooth. Malda aam or Malda mango to be specific. The reason: Slumped export market owing to low yield, yet high price. The upshot: Crops are experiencing a bumper sale in the domestic outlets so to say.

Says Afroz Bhai an orchard owner in Old Malda, "Not on many occasions you have a high quality product with a sluggish export... This year the export market has slumped because of high

quality and low quantity... the price fetched abroad is not as remunerative as the market would expect and so we are forced to sell it indoors."

This year the Malda mango that you get for ₹80-₹120 in Kolkata is being sold at ₹100-₹150 per kilogram in Delhi, the Bengal Horticulture department officials said. The wholesale prices surged by about 50-60 per cent due to low yield and high quality. "We expected higher price

abroad when we were booking customers from England or Dubai... they showed interest then but owing to higher price they backtracked and then the mango route was diverted to



internal markets," said Roop Kanjilal a mango expert and a whole-seller of fruits, adding how this year the customers in Delhi played a "compensatory role" insofar as mango market is concerned. "About 17 tonnes of mango

was sold alone in the Delhi Mango festival... and though other varieties like Himsagar, Lakshman Bhog were in demand Langra for its high quality yield sold hugely," said a member of West Bengal Coordination Exporters' Committee.

Malda is a historical medieval town where the Malda mango originated perhaps during the time of the Nawabs of Bengal one of whom loved the aroma of the fruit so much that he got a row of several varieties like Madhukulkuli and Begam Khas planted in his backyard apparently to please and enamour his queens in sleep.



Nahariya Road towards Awadh Crossing, also known as Barabirwa Crossing in Alambagh, becomes a bustling hive of activity in the morning itself. This crucial morning itself. This crucial junction, connecting Para, Amausi, Alambagh, and Cantonment, is one of the busiest crossings in the city, witnessing heavy traffic from three directions. three directions. Commuters often report wait-

Commuters often report wait-ing times exceeding 15 minutes during peak hours. The cross-ing is plagued by traffic snarls during office hours (10-11 am and 5-7 pm) and again at 10 pm when heavy vehicles tra-

Traffic department, the situation remains challenging. The construction of a flyover at Shaheed Path has alleviated some traffic heading to the airport, but the influx of vehicles from the Lucknow-Agra Expressway continues to exacerbate congestion.

There is potential for further improvement. An underpass has been proposed, but it is still in the planning stages.

Commuters recount their daily struggles at the crossing. A UPMRC (Uttar Pradesh Metro Corporation) official described the difficulty in reaching the Transport Nagar Depot. "Waiting at the signal for near-

ning. Navigating through hap-hazardly parked autos and tempos adds another ten minutes," he said.

Brijesh Dubey, a regular com-muter on the Lucknow-Agra Expressway, echoed these sentiments. "It often takes two cycles of green lights to get through the crossing. Those coming from Purvanchal and Delhi have no alternative route, which adds to the congestion," he noted.

A traffic official at the crossing identified autos and tempos as the primary culprits behind the traffic jams.

"We've recently managed to streamline their movement. We've established a queue system, keeping them 50 metres away from the crossing on the Para and Cantonment sides. We still need to address the other two sides," he said.

The official also mentioned other measures taken, such as narrowing the one-way lane from the airport to the Para side to free up the main road. However, a nearby temple remains a significant bottleneck. "Post 9 pm, buses from Kisan Path are often parked on Para Road. While we don't issue challans, we ask them to move, typically into interior lanes or near the canal. Heavy vehicles also use the crossing between 11 pm and 6 am when

explained. Encroachments on the Alambagh side, particularly in front of Awadh Hospital, contribute to traffic woes.

"This area also sees a high con-centration of autos and tempos, causing severe snarls. We need

the Lucknow Municipal Corporation to step in," he said. Deputy Commissioner of Police (Traffic) Kamlesh Dixit emphasised the importance of Barabirwa Crossing. "It handles the highest traffic volume in the city, with movement from all directions. During office hours, the traffic is heavy, but it gen-erally flows smoothly otherwise," he stated.

He highlighted frequent VIP movements and ambulances as additional factors. "The solution lies in optimising the use of Kisan Path, which is hindered by the lack of a ramp. Once functional, it will divert traffic to other districts, reducing congestion at this crossing," he said.

Reforms to the existing bylaws were finalized after careful consideration of the ground reality and economic growth potential, with the Foundation for Economic Development, a Delhi-based not-for-profit organisation, pro-viding analytical support," he said.

Youth killed; wife, her lover arrested

PNS (PNS): A 26-year-old man was allegedly battered to death in Gangotrinagar, located in the Naini police station area. His body was discovered by the roadside a short distance from his house on Saturday. According to sources, he had been taken away on a bike by some individuals the previous day. The police claimed to have quick-

ly solved the case, claiming that the wife and her lover were responsible for the murder. Harishchandra, son of Jagdish Kumar and a resident of Pahadipur Vivia in Shahjahanpur district, lived in a rented room in Naini with his wife and brother-in-law. Late on Friday night, he was allegedly taken away on a bike by some individuals and he did

not return home. The next morning, his body was found on the roadside near his house, bearing severe head injuries. His head and face had been seemingly crushed with bricks and stones. The police were alerted by passersby and arrived at the scene, recovering Harishchandra's mobile phone. Two youths suspected of

involvement in the abduction were detained by the police, and during interrogation, the case was worked out, the

police claimed. Naini Inspector Yash Pal Singh stated that the police swiftly solved the murder case. He disclosed that Harishchandra's wife Manju had conspired with her 19-year-old lover to commit the crime.

LAWYERS PROTEST NEW CRIMINAL LAWS

Payagraj (PNS): The All-India Lawyers Union staged a protest and raised slogans against the new criminal laws. The advocates termed the laws antipublic, arguing their imple-mentation will lead to increased police harassment and arbitrary actions, making it difficult for the general public to obtain quick justice. They criticised several provisions of the new

laws, particularly Section 173 Subsection 3 of Bharatiya Nagarik Suraksha Sanhita, 2023, which allows the police to hold a written complaint for 14 days for preliminary investigation before registering an FIR. Although this applies to crimes punishable by seven years or less, the lawyers believe it will create a negative perception among the backward, poor, and illiterate public towards the police and law enforcement.

Varanasi (PNS): The prevention and density of mosquito larvae is being reduced in the district by anti-larva spraying and fogging. A new tech-nology has also been invented for the prevention and control of mosquito larvae on the initiative of Chief Development Officer Himanshu Nagpal. After the successful pilot study of mosquito larvae control through oil ball technique, it will be used in the identified hot spot areas of the city and rural areas.

These oil balls will be put in vacant plots and pits filled with water, where there is a high possibility of mosquito larvae. Women of a selfhelp group (SHG) have a special contribution in this initiative.

District Malaria Officer Sharat Chand Pandey said that on the initiative and direction of CDO, a 15 to 20 day pilot study was conducted last month, which showed positive results. This study was conducted in the waterlogged vacant plots, drains and pits of Kashipuram Colony of Seer Govardhan area, and it was completely successful in the vacant plots and pits. This oil ball is being prepared by the self-helr group Maa Laxmi Mahila Samuh of Patirajpur village under Pindra block to increase their employment generation. In 'oil ball method', small balls are made by tying sawdust in a cloth bundle and these are dipped in unused engine oil. This ball is put in stagnant water, due to which the oil layer spreads slowly on the surface of the water, as a result of which mosquito larvae do not get the proper amount of oxygen and die. In the experimental study conducted in the waterlogged areas of Kashipuram Colony, oil ball was used as a larva killer.

Training for administrative staff organised at BHU

"With over four decades of experience as a distinguished chartered accountant, Singh guided 88 participants through practical knowledge and skills essential for effective public procurement," Soni remarked.

Established on December 5, 2023, under the leadership of Prof Sujit Kumar Dubey as coordinator, the SDC continues to play a pivotal role in organising targeted train-ing programmes. This session on the public procurement system was part of a series aimed at fostering professional development among BHU's administrative staff.

The statement said both the leaders recalled the historic relations between the India and the UK and reaffirmed their commitment to further deepen advance and the Comprehensive Strategic Partnership between the countries. Appreciating the positive contributions of the Indian community in the social, economic and political development of the UK, they agreed to continue to promote the close people-to-people ties.

Modi also extended an invitation to Starmer for an early visit to India as the two leaders agreed to remain in touch, the statement said.

Demand for NEET-UG retest, SC-monitored paper leak probe echo

The Congress on Saturday demanded that the medical entrance examination NEET-UG be conducted again and all "paper leak scams" thoroughly investigated under the Supreme Court's supervision.

Amid the growing clamour for the cancellation of the controversy-ridden NEET-UG 2024 over alleged malprac-tices, the Centre and the National Testing Agency National Testing Agency (NTA) told the apex court on Friday that scrapping it with-out any proof of large-scale breach of confidentiality would be counterproductive as it could "seriously jeopardise" lakhs of honest candidates. The NTA, which conducts the

National Eligibility-cum-Entrance Test-Undergraduate (NEET-UG) for admissions to MBBS, BDS, AYUSH and other related courses, and the Union education ministry have been at the centre of media debates and protests by students and political parties over alleged large-scale malpractices ranging from ques-tion paper leaks to imperson-



ation in the test held on May 5. In a social media post in Hindi, Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge said the Modi government has told the Supreme Court that no paper has been leaked in NEET-UG. "This blatant lie is being told to lakhs of youths. Their future is being ruined," Kharge said.

The Congress leader pointed out that the education ministry has said that "there have been irregularities or cheating only at a few places" but this is "misleading". The BJP-RSS has promoted the "education mafia" by taking control of the entire education system, he claimed. "Be it NCERT books or leakage in exams, the Modi government is bent on destroying our educa-tion system," Kharge alleged.

Counselling for NEET-UG likely by end of this month

nitially planned for the first week of July, the counselling for controversy-ridden National Eligibility cum Entrance Test-Undergraduate (NEET-UG), 2024 is now anticipated to commence by the end of this month, according to highly placed sources in the Union Health Ministry.

However, the date is yet to be officially notified by the coun-selling authorities, causing anxiety among students awaiting admission. The issuance of permission letters to certain medical colleges is ongoing, with expectations of additional seats being included in the process. On Friday the Centre and the

National Testing Agency (NTA) had told the Supreme Court that scrapping it with-out any proof of large-scale breach of confidentiality would be counterproductive as it could "seriously jeopardise" lakhs of honest candidates.

As the case is still in the court, there is not much clarity on the counseling issue. However, the sources said the process of issuing permission letters to some medical col-



leges was still underway and additional seats were likely to be added.

"The date of counselling will be announced once the exercise gets over to ensure seats of the new colleges can be taken up in the first round itself," the source said.

The apex court last month refused to defer the counselling process. It was hearing a petition seeking a direction to pause the process for two days. The NTA, which con-

IMA seeks deletion of section from new law to prevent criminal prosecution of doctors

 $T_{\rm Association \ (IMA) \ has}^{\rm he \ Indian \ Medical}$ written to Prime Minister Narendra Modi, stressing the need for proper implementation of protective provisions for doctors in cases of alleged medical negligence, as per the Bharatiya Nyaya Sanhita (BNS)

The IMA emphasised that doctors typically do not have criminal intent when treating patients. Therefore, their actions should not attract criminal prosecution under Section 106.1 of the BNS, which cur-

rently allows for criminal The IMA also requested that investigating officers invoke Section 26 of the BNS, which charges against doctors in cases of alleged negligence.

recognises that doctors fall outside the purview of criminal law for actions taken during patient treatment unless there is evidence of reckless-ness. They argued that cases should be referred to expert committees for opinion in rare instances of recklessness.

Dr RV Asokan, IMA President, advocated for the deletion of Section 106.1 to prevent the unjust criminal prosecution of doctors. He asserts that without criminal intent, doctors should only be held accountable under civil law. The letter also highlighted the

increasing violence against doctors and hospitals, describing it as a "national shame" and an

epidemic that creates an atmosphere of fear and mistrust in healthcare facilities. "The government should introduce a central law to protect doctors from such violence as existing state laws have been ineffective in securing convictions," said the letter.

Acknowledging the govern-ment's past efforts to protect doctors, including the amendment of the Epidemic Diseases Act during the COVID-19 pandemic, which shielded healthcare professionals from violence, the doctor's body has called for further legislative action to ensure comprehensive protection for medical practitioners.

In a bustling urban area of Mumbai, 10-year-old Reshu was found begging on the streets during school hours. Upon investigation, it was discovered that Reshu was brought to Mumbai from a rural village in Bihar by a local trafficker promising her par-ents a better life for their daughter. Instead, she was forced to beg on the streets under threat of violence and withheld food if she didn't meet daily quotas set by her handler.

Fatima Begum, a widow and mother of three, from a rural village in Uttar Pradesh took up begging following her hus-band's sudden demise due to illness, with no formal education or vocational skills, she made the difficult decision to migrate to Renguluru in search of work. Faced with mounting debts and the pressure to provide food and shelter for her children, Fatima resorted to begging on the streets of the Silicon city.

The mango earned a new appellation Langra after travelling to Varanasi in the hands of a lame sadhu who got it planted somewhere near the Kashi Vishwanath Temple and subsequently directed a priest to offer two fruits every day to Lord Vishwanath. Subsequently as the Kashi Naresh or the king of Kashi got the wind of it he pestered the Sadhu to lend him some seeds to and subsequently the Langra (Malda) Mango which earned its name from the lame (langra) sadhu spread all over the country, particularly northern India giving a run for its money to the likes of local Dusseri and Chausa varieties.

Besides, Malda Mango has one more use. The Aam Shotto or Aam Papad as it is called in northern India is a popular way to preserve sweet ripe mangoes which are pureed and cooked in a kadai till they thicken. Then it is dried in the hot sun of Bhado (post monsoon) season to obtain a sweet dish which is also used to prepare chutneys. "Not only the fruit Malda has been a big market for Aam Shotto ... each orchard owner earned in crores ... but for the past several years perhaps due to the climate change the yield is suffering in quantity ... this time it was no different," said

Gulabuddin another orchard owner from Adina in Malda. This year production fell by 60 per cent on account of hot weather, untimely rains and almost no westerly. The output was 2.2 lakh tonnes as compared to 3.79 lakh tonnes in 2023, sources in the horticulture department said adding "had it not been the desi customers who paid a good price the mango market would have perished this year round."

Another fruit merchant from Malda refusing to share his name -because he himself comes from a political party --- said, "we have been repeatedly begging for setting up fruit processing industries in Malda and Murshidabad ... the ones that were being planned by Buddhadeb Bhattacharjee when he was the Chief Minister ... but nothing has been done ... we hope the Government will take into account the element of climate change and the economic future of the region to come up with new plans."

Bhole Baba breaks silence

While emphasising uniform procedure, it also asked the Union government about the policy it has formulated for the distribution of sanitary napkins to female school students nationally.

During the hearing, the Centre informed the apex court that a draft national policy for the distribution of sanitary napkins

free of cost to school-going girls has been formulated and sent to stakeholders to elicit their com-

The top court earlier warned the states, which had not submitted their response to the Centre on formulating a uniform national policy on menstrual hygiene for girls studying in schools, that it would take recourse to the "coercive arm of the law" if they failed to do so. On April 10, the apex court appointed the secretary of the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare (MOHFW) as the nodal officer to coordinate with states and UTs and collect relevant data for formulating a national policy.

It noted that MoHFW, the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Jal Shakti have

The court also ordered all states and UTs to submit their menstrual hygiene management strategies and plans that are being executed with the help of funds provided by the Centre or through their own resources to the Mission Steering Group of the National Health Mission within four weeks.

The apex court said the states and UTs shall also indicate to the Mission Steering Group of the National Health Mission the appropriate ratio of female toilets for residential and non-residential schools in their respec-

tive territories. It asked all states and UTs to also indicate the steps which have been taken to provide lowcost sanitary pads and vending machines in schools and their appropriate disposal.

The plea filed by Congress leader Thakur has said adolescent females from poor backgrounds between the ages of 11 and 18 years face serious difficulties in receiving education, a constitutional right under Article 21A of the Constitution. These are adolescent females who are not equipped with and are also not educated by their parents about menstruation and menstrual hygiene," the petition said.

Reformist Pezeshkian wins Iran's presidential runoff poll

 $R^{eformist\,\,candidate\,\,Masoud}_{Pezeshkian\,\,won\,\,Iran's}$ runoff presidential election Saturday, besting hard-liner Saeed Jalili by promising to reach out to the West and ease enforcement on the country's mandatory headscarf law after years of sanctions and protests squeezing the Islamic Republic. Pezeshkian promised no radical changes to Iran's Shiite theocracy in his campaign and long has held Supreme Leader Ayatollah Ali Khamenei as the final arbiter of all matters of state in the country. But even Pezeshkian's modest aims will be challenged by an Iranian government still largely held by hard-liners, the ongoing Israel-Hamas war in the Gaza Strip, and Western fears over Tehran enriching uranium to nearweapons-grade levels.

A vote count offered by authorities put Pezeshkian as the winner with 16.3 million votes to Jalili's 13.5 million in Friday's election. Overall, Iran's Interior Ministry said 30 million people voted in an election held without internationally recog-

nized monitors.

Supporters of Pezeshkian, a heart surgeon and longtime lawmaker, entered the streets of Tehran and other cities before dawn to celebrate as his lead grew over Jalili, a hard-line former nuclear negotiator.

Dear people of Iran, the elections are over and this is just the beginning of our coopera-tion," Pezeshkian wrote on the social platform X, still banned in Iran. "The difficult path ahead will not be smooth except with your companionship, empathy and trust. I extend my hand to you and I swear on my honor that I will not leave you alone on this path. Do not leave me alone." Pezeshkian's win still sees Iran at a delicate moment, with tensions high in the Mideast over the Israel-Hamas war, Iran's advancing nuclear program, and a looming election in the United States that could put any chance of a detente between Tehran and Washington at risk. Pezeshkian's victory also wasn't a rout of Jalili, meaning he'll

have to carefully navigate Iran's internal politics as the doctor

ever direct attack on Israel over the war in Gaza, while militia groups that Tehran arms in the region — such as the Lebanese Hezbollah and Yemen's Houthi rebels — are engaged in the fighting and have escalated their attacks.

Iran is also enriching uranium at near weapons-grade levels and maintains a stockpile large enough to build several nuclear weapons, should it choose to do so. And while Khamenei remains the final decisionmaker on matters of state, whichever man ends up winning the presidency could bend the country's foreign policy toward either confrontation or collaboration with the West. The campaign also repeatedly

touched on what would happen if former President Donald Trump, who unilaterally withdrew America from the Iran nuclear deal in 2018, won the November election. Iran has held indirect talks with President Joe Biden's administration, though there's been no clear movement back toward constraining Tehran's nuclear program for the lifting of economic sanctions.

Russian strikes leave thousands in north Ukraine sans power, water AP KYIV

Russian strikes overnight left over 100,000 households without power in northern Ukraine and cut off the water supply to a regional capital, Ukrainian authorities reported Saturday, while civilian casual-ties rose sharply in the country's embattled east.

The northern Sumy region, which borders Russia, was plunged into dark after Russian strikes late Friday damaged energy infrastructure, the Ukrainian Energy Ministry said. Hours later, the Ukrainian public broadcaster reported that Russian drones hit the provincial capital, also called Sumy, cutting off water by hitting power lines that feed its system of pumps.

Russian state agency RIA cited a local pro-Kremlin "underground" leader as saying that Moscow's forces overnight hit a plant producing rocket ammunition in the city, which had a pre-war population of over 256,000. The report didn't specify what weapon was used, and the claim could not be independently verified. Explosions rocked the city during an air raid warning early Saturday, accord-ing to Ukrainian media reports. In the Donetsk region in the east, Russian shelling on Friday and overnight killed 11 civilians and wounded 43, local Gov. Vadym Filashkin reported on Saturday. Five people died in the town of Selydove southeast of Pokrovsk, the eastern city that has emerged as a front-line hotspot. The Ukrainian General Staff on Saturday morning said that Ukrainian and Russian forces clashed 45 times near Pokrovsk over the previous day. According to Filashkin, three more people died in Chasiv Yar, the strategically located town in Donetsk that has been reduced to rubble under a monthlong Russian assault.

A Ukrainian military spokesperson on Thursday told the AP that Ukrainian forces had retreated from a neighbourhood on the outskirts of Chasiv Yar. The town's elevated location gives it strategic importance, and military analysts say its fall would put nearby cities in jeopardy. It could also compromise critical Ukrainian supply routes and bring Russia closer to its stated aim of seizing the entire Donetsk region.

According to the Ukrainian General Staff, Russian forces on Friday and overnight launched six rocket strikes and 55 airstrikes across Ukraine, and used more than 70 "glide bombs" - retrofitted Soviet-era weapons that have wrought devastation in the country in recent weeks.

Hamas clears the way for a possible cease-fire after dropping key demand

Hamas has given initial approval for a US-backed proposal for a phased cease-fire deal in Gaza, dropping a key demand that Israel give an up demand that Israel give an upfront commitment for a complete end to the war, a Hamas and an Egyptian official said Saturday.

The apparent compromise by the militant group — which controlled Gaza before triggering the war with an October 7 attack on Israel — could help deliver the first pause in fight-ing since last November and set the stage for further talks on ending a devastating nine-month war. But all sides cautioned that a deal is still not

guaranteed. The two officials, who spoke on conditions of anonymity to discuss the ongoing negotiations, said Washington's phased deal will first include a "full and complete" six-week cease-fire that would see the release of a number of hostages, including women, the elderly and the wounded, in exchange for the release of hundreds of Palestinian prisoners. During these 42 days, Israeli forces would also withdraw from cease-fire talks have stumbled

in northern Gaza, the pair said.

Over that period, Hamas, Israel and the mediators would also negotiate the terms of the second phase that could see the release of the remaining male hostages, both civilians and soldiers, the officials said. In return, Israel would free additional Palestinian prisoners and detainees. The third phase would see the return of any remaining hostages, including bodies of dead captives, and the start of a yearslong reconstruction project.

Hamas still wants "written guarantees" from mediators that Israel will continue to negotiate a permanent ceasefire deal once the first phase goes into effect, the two officials said.

Imran's party postpones Islamabad rally after cancellation of NOC

Jailed former prime minister Imran Khan's Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf (PTI) on Saturday postponed its rally in the suburbs of Islamabad after revocation of its permission by the authorities, citing security concerns. The party was set to organise its power show at Tarnol at 6 pm for which it had secured a no-objection cer-tificate (NOC) from the Islamabad deputy commissioner.

However, the city administration on Friday cancelled the permission saying that the NOC issued by the deputy commissioner was reviewed afresh in the wake of security concerns. An official press release said the chief commissioner decided to cancel the

certificate issued for the polit-ical gathering in view of the current security situation, the advent of Muharram, security concerns and reports of law enforcement agencies. Initially, the PTI leadership had threatened to go ahead with the rally despite the cancellation of permission. PTI leader Omar Ayub Khan told reporters late last night that his party would go ahead with the planned meeting "come what may". However, there was a change of stance and today Omar accom-

panied by PTI chief Gohar Khan said at a press conference that the planned rally had been postponed until after the Muharram.

God willing [...] we will hold it after Ashura through a legal process," Omar said, adding that the PTI would not sit after

Renowned sports medicine Expert Dr Dinshaw Pardiwala on Sunday said that all the Indian athletes participating in the Paris Olympics, including ace javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra, were "fit enough" to perform on the big stage when the quadrennial showpiece gets underway on July 26.

Pardiwala, the chief medical officer (CMO) of the nearly 120-strong Indian contingent for the Paris Games, added that his 13-member team will render the best possible medical assistance to the contingent in the areas of injury management, sports nutrition, mental conditioning, sports massage, recovery and

sleep. "All the athletes that are going All the athletes that are going for the Olympics are fit right now. Some athletes will have minor niggles here and there. I am not going to be discussing any specific injuries to any athlete that they've had in the past, but all of them who are there are there because they are going to be capable and they're gonna be fit enough to perform," he said. Pardiwala has treated some of the top athletes, including India wicketkeeper-batter Rishabh Pant, who suffered serious injuries during a car crash, and Tokyo Games silver medallist

weightlifter Mirabai Chanu. Indian Olympic The Association, Sports Ministry and the Sports Authority of India have brought together a team of top medical experts, headed by Pardiwala, to give the best rest and recovery facilities to the athletes as they bid to better the seven-medal haul at the Tokyo Olympics.

This is the first time the Indian athletes will have a recovery room and а preparational rehabilitation room to make them game

ready," said Pardiwala. In the past, athletes had to visit a common polyclinic for approximately 10,000 competitors to avail physiotherapy and recovery services, and getting slots was time consuming. But this time around, the 13-member medical team will take care of those aspects as well so that the athletes only focus on their events and "not waste time" thinking about rest and recoverv

"It will be open 24x7. We've also got a sleep therapist on board because, over the years, one of the concerns has been inadequate sleep for rest and recovery. Time zones are different, the pressures and anxiety is there. So, to ensure athletes don't land up with Paris Olympics not promoting inadequate sleep, we've got a air-conditioning

sleep therapist on board who will address all these concerns," he said. "We've already started sleep

therapy sessions and we are also going to have some sleep pods for helping our athletes on the sleep aspect," he said. Several athletes have personal physios, mental trainers and nutritionists, and Pardiwala said for those who cannot take their support staff to Paris, his team had already coordinated with them and will help them in every possible way.

"Ever since the sports science team was announced, the first thing we have done is start knowing our athletes in three different aspects -- sports medicine, sports nutrition and mental conditioning. We have visited national camps, competitions etc to know their needs better." With warm weather expected during the Games and the

Sable, Jena up against world class field in Paris League in tune-up to Olympics

T^{op} Indian steeplechaser 3000m Avinash Sable and javelin thrower Kishore Jena will hope to fine tune their Olympics preparations in the Paris leg of the prestigious Diamond League one-day meeting series on Sunday.

Reigning Olympic and world champion javelin thrower Neeraj Chopra has opted out of the Paris DL apparently due to adductor niggle that has been troubling him for the past couple of months.

Both Sable and Jena have not been in the best of forms and have not competed in too many events ahead of the Paris Games but they would be looking to get acclimatised to the conditions of the city which will host the Olympics. Athletics competitions in the Olympics begin on August 1. The 29-year-old Sable has competed in just two 3000m steeplechase events, one at the Portland Track Festival in the USA, where he has been training, and the other at the National Inter-State Championships in Panchkula, Haryana last week. He had clocked 8:21.85 at

Portland and 8:31.75 in Panchkula, while he has a personal best of 8:11.20.

After winning gold at the National Inter-State Championships, Sable had vowed to make amends for mistakes he committed in the last few years and deliver a memorable show at the Paris Olympics with a different approach.

"I committed mistakes in the last two years. I had gone with good fitness in the two world championships (2022 and 2023) but could not do well at both. I want to make amends, hope that this Olympics will be my best," said the reigning

Asian Games gold medallist. On Sunday, he will be up against Kenyan Abraham Kibiwot, the 2023 World bronze Championships medallist and gold winner at the 2022 Commonwealth Games where Sable had won a silver.

Another Kenyan, Simon Kiprop Koech, the 2023 Diamond League champion, will also be a top-three contender on Sunday in the absence of reigning Olympic champion Soufiane El Bakkali of Morocco and Lamecha Girma of Ethiopia.

In five Diamond League appearances so far in his career, Sable's best show has been a fifth-place finish. Jena has also had a forgettable season so far with efforts of 76.31m in Doha Diamond League and 75.49m in the Federation Cup before an 80.84m throw to win a bronze at the National Inter-State Championships.

He has a personal best of 87.54m which he did while winning a silver in the Hangzhou Asian Games in 2023.

Jena, who will be competing in his second Diamond League on Sunday after Doha, had revealed that he was coping with a minor left ankle pain, which he felt after the Federation Cup (May 15-19) in Bhubaneswar.

'The pain has reduced and it's almost all right now," he had said in Panchkula last week. He will be up against the likes of Tokyo Olympics silver medallist and 2023 Diamond League champion Jakub Vadlejch of Czech Republic, former world champion Anderson Peters of Grenada and reigning Commonwealth Games medallist and 2023 World Championships silver winner Arshad Nadeem of

Pakistan.

Ronaldo's 20-year career in the Euros included the title in 2016 - when Portugal beat France in the final - and it remains to be seen if the five-time world player of the year will continue



playing for his country through to the 2026 World Cup, when he will be aged 41.

"Everything is too raw," said Portugal coach Roberto Martinez, when asked if that was Ronaldo's last game for his country. "We are suffering a defeat as a team - there are no individual decisions at this point.'

The victory ended the recent heartbreak of Mbappé and France in shootouts, having lost in them at their last two major tournaments - in the last 16 at the Euros in 2021 and in the 2022 World Cup final.

Before that, the French were also defeated on spot kicks by Italy in the 2006 World Cup final so it had been 26

Merino's last-gasp goal sends Spain to Euro 2024 semis after dramatic extra-time win over Germany

Spain and its fans celebrated as if they'd won the European Championship.

After eliminating tournament host Germany in a thrilling quarterfinal, Luis de la Fuente's team has a great chance to lift the trophy in Berlin next week. Spain snatched a 2-1 win in extra time on Friday thanks to substitute Mikel Merino's

header in the 119th minute. Merino celebrated by running around the corner flag, mimicking his father Miguel Merino's celebration after he scored in the same stadium for Osasuna in the UEFA Cup

against Stuttgart in 1991. "I knew that there was very little time left and that it was

one of the last attacks we would have," Merino said. "I didn't believe that it had gone in until a couple of seconds later. When you get 30 slaps on your back it sinks in real quick.

"I am very happy for me and the entire team. It all comes down to one moment (the goal), but there is so much work behind it, all the training, the hope, the faith, and the belief in ourselves."

Extra time came only after Florian Wirtz's equalizer in the last minute of regulation.



Dani Olmo, who set up Merino's winner, netted the opener early in the second half. All three goals came from substitutes.

There was a blistering pace from the start with crunching tackles and end-to-end action. Kroos was lucky not to be booked for a mistimed challenge that upended Spain midfielder Pedri. Another hefty challenge moments later forced Pedri to leave injured and in tears. He was replaced

by Olmo in the eighth minute, the fastest replacement in Euros history.

"Pedri is in pain. It deserved a red card," De la Fuente said. He added it was too early to know if the young Barcelona midfielder would recover by Tuesday.

From the resulting free kick, Lamine Yamal almost became the youngest ever goal-scorer at the tournament but the 16year-old's effort flashed past the right post.

he Ganga River, also known as the Ganges, is the longest river in India with the most populated basin, the home to 600 million people. Originating from the Gangotri glacier in Uttarakhand, it embarks on a journey of 2,525 kilometers, meandering through five states -

Uttarakhand, Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Jharkhand, and West Bengal before it merges with the Bay of Bengal. It nourishes a variety of life forms, provides livelihoods to people, and contributes to country's economy, trade, and commerce. The Ganga basin, spanning an area of 10.16 lakh square kilometers, contributes around 40% of the country's GDP. As per Hindu mythology, the river is believed to have descended from heaven when King Bhagiratha performed intense austerities for the river to descend to Earth. Considering river's immense force, Lord Shiva received the celestial river in his matted locks releasing it in a controlled flow. The Ganga is revered as a goddess; its journey symbolizes purity, life, and redemption; and its water is believed to wash away sins and facilitate Moksha, the liberation from the cycle of life and death. The Ganga itself, however, is under severe threat today.

GANGA NEEDS CLEANSING

Rapid growth in human population and unchecked development have scarred the sacred river Ganga. Coupled with inflow of massive amount of pollutants, the river's natural ability to cleanse itself is compromised, say **BKP SINHA** and **DR ARVIND K JHA**



need for community participation that takes care of the needs of all stakeholders. The concept of Rejuvenation defined as 'restoring a living entity to a previously agreed state of health and wellness' is most relevant in the context of the Ganga. Given the definition of Ganga by the MWRRDGJ, it's high time that the rejuvenation approach for Ganga targets the entire riverscape in an integrated manner while drawing and utilizing funds from all concerned departments. All the tributaries require treatment to ensure they remain clean and flowing and contribute to the flow of the Ganga. In order to foster larger community engagement in the rejuvenation mission, catchment areas of tributaries can be named after revered personalities or temples at their origin, followed by the suffix 'Namami Gange Van'. For instance, the catchment of Ramganga, originating from the Doodhatoli ranges of Pauri in Uttarakhand, could be named 'Veer Chandra Singh Gadwali: Namami Gange Van. Similarly, as the Ghagra river converges with the Ganga after the confluence of Mahakali (Sharda) at Tanakpur housing the Purnagiri temple, the catchment could be named 'Purnagiri: Namami Gange Van'. Likewise, the catchments of Gomati in Pilibhit could be named Vashishtha, that of Sai river meeting Gomti in Parsai village (Hardoi) as Adi-Ganga, that of Saryu and lower Ghagra as Ram, and those of Gandak, Kosi, and Budhi Gandak as Valmiki, Kausika, and Champakaranya respectively. The origin of Ganga's tributary, the Sone River at Amarkantak could bear the name Sone, the catchment of Punpun river originating in Jharkhand as Punpun, and the Namami Gange Van of Damodar, Mayurakshi, Ajay, Bansloi, and Ghumani could respectively be prefixed with the names Sarhul, Trikut, Ajay, Venu, and Rajmahal. Restoration of suitable forest cover, construction of water conservation structures, keeping river beds encroachment-free. evention of water diversi and curbing exploitative livelihood systems near the banks shall have to be prioritized in these areas as in the main stream of the Ganga. The overarching strategy for rejuvenation must combine pollution prevention through stricter regulations and rigorous implementation in order to transform Ganga's biological profile making it 'NIRMAL' and the restoration of status of its stream to 'AVIRAL'. In 2017, the Uttarakhand High Court declared the rivers Ganga and Yamuna as 'legal persons' with all corresponding rights of a living person. Considering it together with the concepts of spiritual ecology and earth stewardship, one should come up with innovative strategies in the Indian context. Standing on its banks, one is left with a profound sense of awe and a lingering question—what will the next chapter in the Ganga's story be? The narratives connected with religious, mythical, political, historical, and the emergent ecological aspects sketch collectively a nuanced and multifaceted complex image of this emblematic river. Once considered the purest of all rivers, it has become one of the most polluted in the world. Today the Ganga flows with the stories of Gods but has the scars of development. It's high time we reciprocate to the Ganga what it has generously provided us for centuries - survival and sustenance. With obstruction and diversion of its flow coupled with inflow of massive amount of pollutants from industrial, human, and agricultural sources, its natural ability to cleanse itself is compromised. The polluted water in the changed flow regime poses serious threat to humans and river's own biodiversity alike. While the future of 140 fish species and 90 amphibian species is threatened, Gharial and endangered Ganges River dolphin respectively are classified by IUCN as critically endangered and endangered. Severity of the issue that impacts the life, health and livelihoods of people and even undermines the cultural and spiritual significance of the Ganga deserves to be realized in its entirety and tackled with promptitude. Efforts have been made to clean

and preserve the Ganga. During the late 1980s the Ganga Action Plan was implemented. This initiative led primarily to

the construction of wastewater treatment facilities at selected places in addition to the closure of a number of polluting industrial plants along the river. In 2008, the Ganga was declared as the national river of India. Subsequently, in 2014, the Government of India initiated the Namami Gange project that aimed to rejuvenate and protect the Ganga River by addressing pollution sources and promoting sustainable practices for improving its biological richness. The National Mission for Clean Ganga (NMCG), popularly known as the Namami Gange Mission, was billed as a "scientific programme" by the Indian government that aimed to clean the river using advanced technologies at a project cost of INR 20,000 crores with the dual objectives of effective abatement of pollution and conservation and rejuvenation of the Ganga

River.

EFFORTS HAVE BEEN MADE TO CLEAN AND PRESERVE THE GANGA. DURING THE LATE 1980S THE GANGA ACTION PLAN WAS **IMPLEMENTED. THIS** INITIATIVE LED PRIMARILY TO THE CONSTRUCTION OF WASTEWATER TREATMENT FACILITIES AT SELECTED PLACES IN ADDITION TO THE CLOSURE OF A NUMBER OF POLLUTING INDUSTRIAL PLANTS ALONG THE RIVER. IN 2008, THE GANGA WAS DECLARED AS THE NATIONAL **RIVER OF INDIA**

The Ministry of Water Resources, River Development, and Ganga Rejuvenation (MWRRDGJ) issued a notification on 7th October 2016, defining the River Ganga to include the entire length of six head-streams in the State of Uttarakhand, namely, Rivers Alakananda, Dhauli Ganga, Nandakini, Pinder, Mandakini and Bhagirathi, as well as the main stem of the river up to Ganga Sagar, including all its tributaries up to Ganga Sagar. The establishment of sewage treatment plants and sewerage networks with a primary focus on bioremediation figured predominantly in the Namami Gange project and accounted for about 80 percent of the overall project outlay. On the conservation and rejuvenation front, the Detailed Project Report (DPR) prepared in 2016 by Forest Research Institute, IĆFRE, Dehra Dun had a projected outlay of Rs. 2,293.73 crores. Investments were planned to begin from 2016-17 itself. The five-year plan considers riparian corridors, nature of channel morphology, and the dynamics

along the Ganga has been identified for planning, assessment, and implementation of measures that include activities like reforestation or afforestation, managing vegetation to prevent soil erosion, and creating buffer zones to protect the river from pollutants. Further, the Wildlife Institute of India prepared the 'Biodiversity Conservation and Ganga Rejuvenation' plan with focus on development of local level 'Ganga Prahari' volunteers for playing a crucial role in conserving the ecological integrity of the Ganga and reducing the direct dependency of locals on the river. The projects of the Central Inland Fisheries Research Institute (CIFRI) and the Uttar Pradesh State Forest Department targeted science-based aquatic species restoration. The website of Namami Gange contains information on the progress of implementation till 2020 only. The recent audit report of the project by the Comptroller and Auditor General of India, however, has noted deficiencies on various fronts viz. planning, financial management implementation and monitoring, and delays in achievement of milestones under the programme.

delineated as 'Ganga riverscape'

current scenario warrants improvement not only on the above aspects but also introduction of innovative and effective approach. In this context, one can draw inspiration from an ancient text by Sage Kashyapa on agriculture. He outlined five principles for water resources development. The first principle, Udhgamsthana, suggests that conservation should commence at the river's source. This includes construction of temples for protection, management of upper catchments, and redirecting streams and rivulets to enrich river's source. The second principle, Nyunatam Gati-avarodh, advocates for minimal disruption to the natural flows of water and air to maintain the hydrological cycle. The third principle, Golden Mean or Suvarna Madhya, emphasizes that water structures should prioritize "appropriateness" over "maximum" capacity indicating sustainable and responsible use of water resources. The fourth principle acknowledges the interdependence of natural resources like land, water, forest, and fauna suggesting integration of sacred groves, tanks, and bunds at key points to distribute water usage. The fifth and final principle, Sahabagh, Swabhava, and Sanskara, emphasizes the




