Suspense + emotion = Maha potboiler

When everything appeared to be hunky-dory in the run-up to the formation of a new government in Maharashtra, things suddenly turned topsy-turvy in the state capital on Friday as Shiv Sena leader and caretaker Chief Minister Eknath Shinde, on his return from New Delhi, headed straight to his native place in Satara district, prompting the Bharatiya Janata Party-led MahaYuti to cancel a crucial meeting of its three leaders called to decide on the contours of the new government. On a day when the political situation became fluid resulting in the unexplained delay in the government formation in the state, the ruling BJP, which heads the MahaYuti that scored a landslide victory in the just-concluded Maharashtra Assembly, found itself in a limbo not knowing how to deal with Shinde and also with the emerging scenario within the party over the chief ministerial choice. Shinde, who had sprung a

nasty surprise on the then Uddhav Thackeray-led Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) by splitting the Shiv Sena and teaming up with the BJP to form a new government in the State in June 2022, set the cat among the pigeons by heading to his native village amid the efforts by the MahaYuti to form a new government in the State. Though it was not officially known as to what transpired at the joint meeting of the MahaYuti leaders, Fadnavis of the BJP, Shinde of the Shiv Sena (ES) and Ajit Pawar of the Nationalist Congress Party (NCP-AP) that Union Home Minister Amit Shah had convened at his New Delhi residence to formalise details of the government formation in the state, Mumbai experienced political tremors sparking speculations of all kind. While there was no official word as to why Shinde cancelled all his appointments after his return from the National Capital and left for his native village Dare in Satara district in western Maharashtra, it was also confirmed that he would take

up the post of deputy chief minister's in the new government. However, informed sources within the BJP said that Shinde was not averse to accepting the DCM's post provided the BJP gave him the all-important State Home Ministry, a portfolio that Fadnavis held in the previous MahaYuti government. Knowing Shinde's 'nuisance' value, the BJP is not ready to give the Home portfolio to the Shiv Sena (ES) president. "Maybe, the reason behind Shinde's sudden departure to his native place is to express his sulks over the denial of Home and a few other crucial portfolios in the State Cabinet," a senior Shinde Sena leader said. The swearing-ceremony of the MahaYuti government, which in the normal course was to take on December 2 (Monday) is understood to have been postponed to December 5, because of the sudden turbulence within the MahaYuti - caused by Shinde's sulks over denial of the Chief Minister's post and leadership issues that have surfaced within the BJP.

Meanwhile, the delay in the election of BJP's Legislature Party (BJPLP) leader has surprised many within the State political circles. In the normal course, Devendra Fadnavis, who was all along touted as the front-runner for the chief minister's post, should have been elected as the BJPLP leader by now. Though six days have passed since it led the MahaYuti to a historic victory in the polls, the BJPLP meeting has not taken place yet. Sources in the BJP attributed the delay to the holding of BJPLP meeting to the delay in the arrival of party's central observers in Mumbai. They said that the observers were arriving in Mumbai on Sunday. The delay has sparked speculation in the State political circles whether the JP Nadda-led party would spring a surprise like the one it did recently in Madhya Pradesh where it anointed Mohan Yadav, a leader from the Yadav OBC community, as the chief minister of that state in place of Shivraj Chauhan, more than two weeks after the Assembly poll outcome there.

Judicial Commission to probe Sambhal violence

In a swift response to the recent violence in Sambhal, the Uttar Pradesh government has constituted a three-member judicial commission to investigate the incident. The decision was made on Thursday night, hours before the issue came up for in the Supreme Court.

The commission will be chaired by retired High Court Judge DK Arora, with retired IAS officer Amit Mohan and retired IPS officer Arvind Kumar Jain serving as members. The team has been tasked with examining whether the violence was premeditated or a spontaneous occurrence. The inquiry will also delve into the role of individuals or groups suspected of instigating the unrest. In addition, the commission will scrutinise the actions taken by the police and local administration during and after the incident. The judicial panel has been directed to submit its findings within two months from the date of the notification, and will seek to uncover the reasons behind the violence. Should an extension to this period be required, it will need approval from the state government. Alongside identifying the causes of the violence, the commission will provide recommendations to prevent such incidents from recurring in the future. In a notification issued on November 28, the Governor highlighted the importance of a thorough and transparent investigation into the matter. This will ensure the public's trust in the judicial process and serve the greater interest of justice.

SC halts proceedings in Jama Masjid case, Chandausi survey

The Supreme Court on Friday directed a Sambhal trial court to halt proceedings in the case over the Mughal-era Shahi Jama Masjid and its survey at Chandausi and asked the petitioner Masjid committee to approach Allahabad High Court. The Bench comprising Chief Justice Sanjiv Khanna and Justice Sanjay Kumar emphasised the importance of maintaining peace in the Sambhal district and instructed that the report prepared by the court commissioner following the mosque survey be sealed and not opened until further orders, while directing the Uttar Pradesh Government to maintain peace and harmony in the violence-hit town. The Bench further directed the petition filed by the Shahi Jama Masjid Committee against the trial court's survey order be listed before the Allahabad High

Court within three working days. "We feel that the petitioner (mosque committee) must challenge the order dated November 19, 2024 in an appropriate forum. In the meantime, peace and harmony must be maintained. The Additional Solicitor General (KM Natraj appearing for the State Government) assures the same. We also observe that in case any revision petition /miscellaneous petition is preferred, the same would be listed within a period of three working days," the CJI wrote in the order. The order noted that the matter was fixed before the trial court on January 8, 2025 and said, "We hope and trust the trial court will not proceed with the matter till the matter is listed before the High Court. We clarify we have not expressed any opinion on the merits of the matter. We are not disposing of the present special leave petition. Re-list (it) in the week commencing January 6."

Delhi school gets hoax bomb threat

Panic gripped students and parents of a private school in Delhi's Rohini, a day after a low intensity blast occurred in an area located within one kilometre of the school, as it received a bomb threat via email on Friday morning. While the threat later turned out to be a hoax after a search was initiated on the school campus, the psychological impact on the public was visible as the area has been gripped in bomb blasts for over a month. Following the threat in Venkateshwar Global School in Rohini, school authorities sprung into action while informing the parents for early dispersal of the students and requested them to pick up their wards by 11 am. While some were sent in school buses, parents of the others rushed to pick their children, who waited anxiously in a designated area. A mother, Rati Awasthi, whose 12-year-old daughter studies in class VII, expressed her concerns regarding the safety of her children in light of the recent blasts in the city. "We are deeply concerned about the current situation in the city. How can we feel confident about our children's safety?" she questioned, adding that just a day before, a bomb blast occurred in Prashant Vihar, barely 1 kilometre away from the school, and today, the school itself has received a bomb threat.

Delhi... it is time to count your trees

To check felling of trees in the National Capital, the Supreme Court (SC) on Friday highlighted the need for a census of trees and said it wanted to create an authority to supervise the work carried out by the tree officer. The Supreme Court also mulled conducting a tree census in 10,400 square-kilometre area of the Taj Trapezium Zone (TTZ) in Uttar Pradesh and developing a mechanism to keep a vigil on illegal tree felling. A Bench of Justices Abhay S Oka and Augustine George Masih said the issue over the strict implementation of the provisions of the Delhi Preservation of Trees Act, 1994, required immediate attention. "Apart from tree census, that order we are going to pass, we also want to create an authority. That authority will verify whether the tree officer has done a proper job. Somebody has to supervise the permission granted," the Bench said. The Bench was hearing an application seeking to restrain the Delhi government from allowing felling of trees without the supreme court's permission. The first tree census in Delhi was conducted in December 2023. The Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) identified 2.50 lakh trees in 12 zones. The provisions of the 1994 Act, which provide for



preservation of trees in the NCT of Delhi, deals with the establishment and duties of the tree authority and appointment of a tree officer. During the hearing, the Bench asked the lawyers appearing in the matter to give suggestions on the basis of which the authority should be constituted. It observed that not only individual experts were required, but an institution had to be involved in this process also. "We always believe that in environment matters, harsh orders are warranted," the Bench noted. The Bench remarked that the lawyers appearing before it in matters related to preservation of environment and protection of trees were very cooperative and they have always taken a fair stand before the court. "We are grateful. Your lordships are doing it for our better future, our children's better future," Additional

Solicitor General Aishwarya Bhati said. The court termed as very important the issue concerning strict implementation of the provisions of the 1994 Act. "To enable the counsel appearing for the parties to address us on the issue, we direct that the petition shall be listed on December 18," it said. One of the lawyers appearing in the matter referred to the notifications issued by the Delhi government in the past exempting any area or any species of trees from the provisions of the 1994 Act. "This power, for the interim, has to be curtailed. They cannot keep on issuing notifications under Section 29 (of the Act)," he said. Section 29 of the Act pertains to power of the government for exemption. While one lawyer boasted of there being a "lot of awareness" among people, another lamented the ground situation saying it was "as bad as it was" before claiming two trees had been felled inside the Supreme Court premises. The advocate said complaints on the tree helpline of the forest department elicited no response. "You place that complaint on record," the Bench said. On the tree census in Taj Trapezium Zone (TTZ), the Bench said apart from the tree census in the TTZ it wanted to develop the institutional mechanism.

Yamuna Vatika, a green dream for a grey city

Yamuna Vatika is an expansive green space spread across 450 acres of meticulously designed flower fields, flowering trees and gardens being developed by Delhi Development Authority (DDA) on the river floodplains, soon to be the largest of its kind in the city. It will help in mitigating pollution to an extent, and provide green lungs to Delhi. This initiative for greening Delhi, expected to be opened to the public in the next three weeks, has been helmed by Lieutenant Governor Vinai Kumar Saxena, who has already steered green marvels like Baansera, Asita East,

Vaishnavi, Vasudev Ghat and the revitalised Roshanara Bagh and Nursery. Designed as a multi-activity green space, Yamuna Vatika will serve as a haven for nature lovers, families and fitness enthusiasts alike. The project is part of the restoration scheme of Yamuna floodplains and witnessed the plantation of 500 chinar and 500 cherry blossom saplings. The project will have a garden, jogging and cycling tracks, eco-friendly temporary structures for eateries, a bio-retention zone and a wetland with a viewing deck, among others. The flower fields at Yamuna Vatika will feature a triple-layered floral design, setting a



new benchmark in urban landscaping. With its vibrant hues and serene ambiance, this initiative aims to become the city's first dedicated 'Field of Flowers', adding to the ecological and aesthetic appeal of Delhi. Nearly 8,000 indigenous trees, including Gulmohar,



Amaltaas, Chinara and exotic species such as Cherry Blossom saplings, along with 10,000 bamboo have already been planted, contributing to the floodplains ecological rejuvenation. These vibrant trees will not only enhance the city's green cover but also offer a spectacular visual treat



to visitors at Yamuna Vatika. It also features four large water bodies, strategically integrated into its design to support water conservation as also holding water during flooding. In a bid to restore the ecology of the Yamuna floodplains and give breathable green

space to the people of East Delhi, the DDA has inaugurated the Asita East project near Laxmi Nagar. Asita East project is spread over 197 hectares of land, of which 90 hectares are with DDA and the remaining falls under the jurisdiction of the UP irrigation department. Vikas Marg forms the southern edge, Pushta Road, the eastern edge, and the Yamuna flows towards its west. The 90 hectares of land under the DDA, located adjacent to Vikas Marg, has been inaugurated and opened to people. 'Vaishnavi' park at Ashok Vihar-II is an area spread over 10 acres, developed by the DDA to promote urban

green spaces. There were tonnes of waste lying at the spot, and the locals were fed up with the poor condition of this place. The park features a diverse array of native and medicinal plants, along with walkways, waterbodies, fountains and lights to give an aesthetic look to the place. The LG's other project is Vasudev Ghat, located along the western bank of the Yamuna between Yamuna Ghat and Nigam Bodh Ghat. The ghat - the first in the city to be built by the DDA - was previously inaccessible due to a steep slope, was littered with garbage, and had 1.5-foot-deep silt deposits from the July floods of last year.

Minor girl raped in moving ambulance at Mauganj

A 16-year-old minor girl was raped in a moving Janani Express ambulance in Mauganj, accused raped the victim on November 22 in Hanumana police station area. The minor filed a complaint against 4 people on November 25. These include the maternal uncle, his daughter, son-in-law and the ambulance driver. On November 27, the brother-in-law and the ambulance driver were arrested. Meanwhile, the search for the maternal uncle and his daughter is on. According to the police, on November 22, Janani Express driver Pandit received a call to pick up a patient from Lasa village in Hanumana police station area. When Pandit left with the ambulance, his friend Rajesh Kewat and his

wife Manju Kewat also accompanied him. Manju's maternal home is in Lasa village itself. The victim stated in the complaint that on the evening of November 22, uncle Ramayan Kewat's younger daughter Manju came to me and asked me to come to her house. I went with her. An ambulance was parked there. Uncle Ramayan Kewat, his elder daughter Manisha, son-in-law Rajesh and driver Pandit were sitting in it. Manju said that she wanted to visit her sister Manisha's sister-in-law's house. I agreed. Manju and I sat in the back seat of the ambulance while brother-in-law Rajesh and uncle Ramayan sat in the front near driver Pandit. After reaching a little distance, Manju got down from the ambulance saying that she wanted to get water. Brother-

in-law Rajesh came and sat next to me. The driver took the ambulance towards the hill. Rajesh raped me thrice during the night. At around 5 in the morning, all three left me near the house and went away. When I told my mother about this, she asked me to keep quiet for fear of public shame. I mustered courage and went to the police station on 25 November and filed an FIR. Hanumana police station in-charge Anil Kakde said that a case has been registered on the complaint of the victim and Rajesh Kewat and ambulance driver Pandit have been arrested. Ramayan and Manju are being searched for. Additional Superintendent of Police Anurag Pandey said, "The ambulance used in the incident has been seized while the probe is on.

Elderly couple digitally arrested for 48 hours, cheated of Rs 10.5L

Another case of digital arrest by cyber thugs was reported at Regal Paradise Colony of the state capital where an elderly doctor couple was held hostage for 48 hours through video calls. Permission had to be taken even to go to the washroom. The accused, claiming to be a CBI officer, threatened to implicate the couple in a money laundering case and said that the bank account had been misused. The scared woman also transferred Rs 10.50 lakh through NEFT to the accused's account on Thursday. The complaint of the case reached Bhopal Police on Friday. Then the couple was rescued. During this, there was a heated argument between the fake CBI officer and the real

police on a video call. The accused told the police not to interfere in our work. Ragini Mishra (65) and her husband Maheshchandra Mishra (67) live in flat number 708 located on the seventh floor of Regal Paradise Phase-2. Both are doctors and were posted in Kanpur earlier. They have been living in Bhopal for the last four years. Ragini told the police that she had gone out for a morning walk in the colony on Wednesday morning and when she returned she got a call. The caller introduced himself as a CBI officer. He said that your personal bank account is being used for money laundering. Rs 427 crore has come into it illegally. A Korean airlines company has made several transactions in this account. The accused were in police uni-

form, CBI banners were put up. When I said that I did not have an account in the bank, he told me that your Aadhaar card has been used to open the account. Other accounts have also been opened with this. All are being used for illegal activities and when I clarified, the accused talked to me on a video call. He was in a police uniform and the background was like an officer's room. Banners with CBI written on them were also visible. He said that you look like a good woman. You will be defamed in newspapers and media. We will investigate the matter. The accused assured the victim that the case will be investigated. If you are innocent, you will not be arrested. If you cooperate in the investigation, we will help further. They were told that they will have to

remain under online surveillance. They were asked to return home. Later, the victim's house was watched using 360 degree cameras. They were asked to stay in a room. Where they locked themselves. When the husband returned, he was informed about the matter. The husband spoke to the accused. They also engaged him in conversation and asked him to cooperate in the investigation. After this, the husband and wife were kept in digital captivity and monitored 24 hours a day. Permission had to be taken even to go to the washroom. They were rebuked for being away even for a few minutes. They were not allowed to attend anyone's call. Thus the couple remained hostage from 8 am on Wednesday to 2 pm on Friday.

Additionally, a brainstorming session was held where participants shared their ideas and discussed ways to enhance the use of 3D printing. This workshop is the beginning of a series of training programs organized by AIIMS Bhopal's 3D Computational Modeling Lab. These sessions aim to teach clinicians and researchers the proper use of 3D technology. The series will begin with basic topics and gradually progress to more advanced techniques. The 3D Computational Modeling Lab, established in July 2024, demonstrates AIIMS Bhopal's commitment to promoting innovation in healthcare and the medical field. Regular workshops and collaborative sessions will be held in the future to maximize the benefits of this technology. Faculty members from various medical departments of AIIMS Bhopal participated in this workshop, where they discussed improvements in patient care, research, and medical education through 3D modeling and printing.

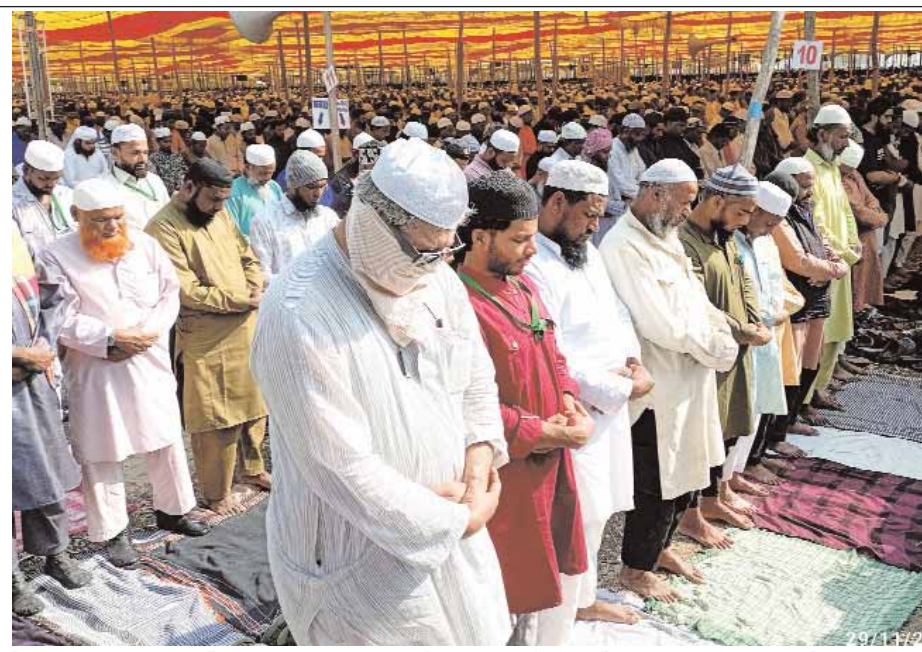
Heart patient from Kareli shifted to Hyderabad hospital in emergency

30 injured at torch rally after fire rages out of control at Khandwa

Elephant electrocuted at Mukundpur Safari

Bhopal: An elephant died due to electrocution near Mukundpur Safari on the margins of Maihar and Shahdol districts in Madhya Pradesh on Friday morning. This is the 12th unnatural elephant death reported from the state in the last month. The adolescent elephant was part of a herd that had entered the state from neighbouring Chhattisgarh about a week ago. The wild mammals were reportedly making their way towards Bandhavgarh Tiger Reserve (BTR) from the Sanjay Tiger Reserve when tragedy struck. "There is movement of elephants in Shahdol district. Last Thursday night, the people of the area chased away the ele-

phants by bursting crackers, due to which they came towards Majhatolwa Kuan village in Ramnagar. All the elephants left, but one elephant got separated from them and was roaming the village alone," forest ranger Digvijay Singh said. "An 11kV electric line was passing over the field in Majhatolwa village, a border village between the two districts. The elephant's trunk came into contact with the electric line, and it died on the spot. The dead elephant was spotted by villager Santosh Dwivedi on Friday morning. He informed the forest officials and police," he added. Dwivedi said that villagers' complaints against the dangerous electricity lines passing over the fields had fallen on deaf ears.

Karnataka CM meets PM Modi, demands assistance

Karnataka Chief Minister Siddaramaiah on Friday met Prime Minister Narendra Modi, requesting rectification in short term farm loan limit, Rs 10,000 cr in financial support and urgent clearances for the Mekedatu Balancing Reservoir and Kalasa Bandhura projects.

In the meeting in Parliament complex, Siddaramaiah pressed for several key interventions focusing on critical areas, including agriculture, water resources and urban infrastructure.

Deputy Chief Minister and Irrigation Minister D K Shivakumar, Energy Minister K J George and Urban Development Minister Byrathi Suresh accompanied the CM for the meeting.

The chief minister highlighted that NABARD has drastically cut the Short Term Agricultural Credit Limit for Karnataka



both awaiting approvals from the Jal Shakti and Environment Ministries.

Highlighting Bengaluru's status as a tech hub and top GDP contributor, the state requested special assistance for urban and public transportation. Additionally, Karnataka sought Rs 10,000 cr to develop infrastructure in 13 emerging city corporations.

On fiscal allocation, the CM complained of receiving an unfavourable deal from the 15th Finance Commission, which reduced its tax share by 1 per cent.

Siddaramaiah urged the government to provide compensation grants and ensure future finance commissions do not penalise states with significant tax contributions.

The Karnataka chief minister also met Congress leader Priyanka Gandhi Vadra and congratulated her on being elected as an MP from Wayanad.

He requested Rs 5,300 crore for the Upper Bhadra Project, which promises to irrigate central Karnataka's drought-prone farmlands. The project has been pending since the 2023-24 Union Budget.

He also pushed for clearances of two critical water projects - the Mekedatu Balancing Reservoir on the Kaveri river and the Kalasa Bandhura project on the Mahadayi river --

been held in Guwahati (Assam), Rann of Kachchh (Gujarat), Hyderabad (Telangana), Tekanpur (Gwalior, Madhya Pradesh), Statue of Unity (Kevadiya, Gujarat), Pune (Maharashtra), Lucknow (Uttar Pradesh), New Delhi and Jaipur (Rajasthan), with its latest edition being held in the Odisha capital.

Modi, the statement said, has always demonstrated a deep interest in the DGP Conference. It said, "The

prime minister not only listens attentively to all contributions but also fosters an environment of open and informal discussions, allowing for the emergence of new ideas.

This year, some unique features have also been added to the conference. The entire day is being effectively utilised starting from Yoga session, business session, break-out sessions and thematic dining tables.

"This will also provide senior police officials with a valuable opportunity to present their perspectives and suggestions to Modi on critical policing and internal security matters that impact the country, it said.

The conference will also be attended by Union Home Minister Amit Shah, Principal Secretary to PM P K Mishra, National Security Adviser (NSA) Ajit Doval, DGP of states and UTs and chiefs of central police organisations among others.

VHP announces two-day protest against 'atrocities' on religious minorities in Bangladesh

Bangladesh's minority Hindus, which constitute only about eight per cent of the 170 million population, have faced over 200 attacks in 50-odd districts since the fall of Sheikh Hasina's Awami League government on August five.

Congress takes Maharashtra poll complaints to EC

The Congress on Friday raised with the Election Commission "serious and grave inconsistencies" which it said were being revealed in the data relating to the polling and counting processes for the recently concluded Maharashtra Assembly polls and sought an in-person hearing to present relevant evidence.

In a memorandum to the poll panel, AICC Maharashtra in-charge Ramesh Chennithala, Maharashtra Congress chief Nana Patole and AICC general secretary Mukul Wasnik said "these glaring inconsistencies" which strike at the very root of a transparent, free and fair electoral system are not based on any biased motives or far-fetched presumptions but have been extracted from the information made publicly available by the Commission.

Sharing the memorandum on social media, Congress gener-



al secretary in-charge communications Jairam Ramesh said the leaders have raised serious issues which are being discussed in the public domain.

They have asked the Election Commission (EC) for an in-person hearing to present the relevant evidence and raise constituency-wise issues as well, he said.

In their memorandum, the Congress leaders said, "In fact, questions relating to Maharashtra's voter data have also been raised by a former

Chief Election Commissioner, hence we are bringing the same to the attention of this Commission."

They flagged two issues of arbitrary deletion of voters and subsequent addition of over 10,000 voters in each constituency from the final voter lists as well as inexplicable increase in voting percentages from five per cent to the final voter percentage declared by the Commission at 11:30 pm on the day of polling on November 20.

"In the days leading up to the

polling day, the Indian National Congress (INC) and its allies received several on ground-level reports about different means being adopted by the ruling regime to commit large-scale electoral fraud across the Assembly Constituencies in Maharashtra," the memorandum said.

The Congress leaders said these included instances of arbitrary deletion of voters from the voter list and consequent insertion of roughly 10,000 voters per constituency across Maharashtra.

"With this exercise of unchecked and arbitrary deletion and consequent insertion of voters, the state of Maharashtra witnessed an unprecedented increase of an estimated 47 lakh voters being added to the electoral roll from between July 2024 - November 2024," the memorandum said.

It is significant to note that out of the 50 Assembly constituencies where there was an average increase of 50,000 voters, the ruling regime and its

allies secured victory from 47 of these constituencies, the leaders argued.

"These data points on a prima facie reading, demonstrates that -- there has been a significant and inexplicable increase in the number of registered voters across the state of Maharashtra; and there has been an exercise of deletion and addition of names in voters lists; all of which have conventionally worked to the advantage of the incumbent government," the memorandum said.

"This issue was duly raised by the Maha Vikas Aghadi (MVA) alliance on October 19 before this Commission, he said.

"However, no cogent action was taken by this Commission on the Representation dated 19.10.2024 submitted by the MVA Alliance in this regard," the memorandum said.

They urged the Commission to immediately undertake a thorough investigation and prepare a detailed report on the addition and deletion of voters in Maharashtra.

Interim Govt responsible for protecting minorities in Bangladesh: MEA

External affairs minister S Jaishankar on Friday said the Muhammad Yunus-led interim government is responsible for protecting Bangladesh citizens, including its minorities.

He made this assertion in a statement in response to a question in the Lok Sabha about violence against minorities, including Hindus, in Bangladesh.

Jaishankar said the government has seen several reports of incidents of violence against Hindus and other minorities since August 2024, when Sheikh Hasina was forced to flee Bangladesh.

He added that reports of attacks on temples and puja mandaps also emerged during the recent Durga Puja festival in Bangladesh.

"Government have taken a

serious note of these incidents and shared its concerns with the Government of Bangladesh," Jaishankar said in his reply.

The minister also said that the High Commission of India in Dhaka continues to monitor the situation related to the minorities in Bangladesh closely.

"The primary responsibility for the protection of life and liberty of all citizens of Bangladesh, including minorities, rests with the Government of Bangladesh," he pointed out.

This statement comes amid protests and unrest in Bangladesh over the arrest of former priest of the International Society for Krishna Consciousness (ISKCON) Bangladesh Chinmoy Krishna Das on sedition charges. Das is accused of hoisting a saffron flag above the Bangladesh



national flag during a rally in October.

Several political leaders in India, including those in the opposition, have voiced concern over the arrest of Chinmoy Krishna Das and issued an appeal to the Indian government to intervene in the matter.

Former Bangladesh prime minister Sheikh Hasina also backed Hindu monk, Chinmoy Krishna Das, saying he was "unjustly arrested" and must immediately be released.

Hasina has also called upon the Bangladesh government to protect religious and ethnic minorities that have braved violence since her ouster from power in August.

Meanwhile, India on Friday said the interim government in Bangladesh must live up to its responsibility of protecting all minorities as it expressed serious concern over the "surge" of extremist rhetoric and increasing incidents of violence in the neighbouring country.

Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal said India has consistently and strongly raised with the Bangladeshi government the threats and "targeted attacks" on Hindus and other minorities.

"Our position on the matter is clear -- the interim government must live up to its responsibility of protecting all minorities," he said.

Jaiswal was replying to a question on the situation at his weekly media briefing.

"We are concerned at the surge of extremist rhetoric, increasing incidents of violence and provocation. These developments cannot be dismissed only as media exaggeration," he said.

"We once again call upon Bangladesh to take all steps for the protection of minorities," he added.

On the arrest of Hindu monk Chinmoy Krishna Das by Bangladeshi authorities, Jaiswal said India has noted that the legal process in the case is underway.

"As far as cases against individuals are concerned, we have noted that legal processes are underway," he said.

"We expect that these processes will deal with the case in a just, fair and transparent manner, ensuring full respect for the legal rights of all concerned," he added.

Health Ministry declares snakebite cases as 'notifiable disease'

Amid the ongoing public health concerns raised by snakebites across the States, the Union Ministry of Health has declared snakebite cases and fatalities as a "notifiable disease" in India.

According to Ministry data, approximately 50,000 deaths occur annually in India due to an estimated 3-4 million snakebites. This accounts for half of all global snakebite-related fatalities, although many cases remain significantly underreported.



"Snakebites pose a serious public health threat, leading to mortality, morbidity, and long-term disabilities in some instances. Certain groups, such as farmers and tribal populations, face a higher risk," stated Union Health Secretary Punya Salila Srivastava in a letter to the Health Secretaries of all states and Union Territories (UTs), said sources.

The letter urges all health facilities, both public and private (including medical colleges), to report all suspected and confirmed snakebite cases and fatalities in a standardized format.

The common krait, Indian cobra, Russell's viper, and saw-scaled viper are responsible for about 90 percent of snakebites in India. Although polyvalent anti-snake venom (ASV) - effective against these four species - works in 80 percent of cases, a shortage of trained healthcare personnel and proper facilities for snakebite treatment remains a significant concern.

Moreover, the lack of comprehensive data on the incidence, morbidity, mortality, and socio-economic impact, and treatment patterns exacerbates the issue, the secretary said, added the sources.

Health experts have repeat-

edly called for a national policy to address snakebite management and prevent snakebite envenomation (SBE), or death due to snakebite. A research team, including experts from the Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR), has proposed several measures, while Ministry officials are working on a blueprint for a national program to curb snakebite incidents in India.

According to a recent national mortality survey, India witnessed 1.2 million snakebite deaths (averaging 58,000 annually) between 2000 and 2019 - an increase of around 8,000 deaths per year compared to previous estimates (2001-2003).

Snakebites disproportionately affect children living in poor rural areas.

The World Health Organization (WHO) has recently included snakebites in its list of Neglected Tropical Diseases and launched a comprehensive Strategy for the Prevention and Control of Snakebite Envenoming.

There is also a need to establish a dedicated snakebite clinical research cum training centre (SCRTC) and ensure that treatment is at the PHC level itself. SBE should be included in the

medical graduation (MBBS) curriculum and also during the internship of MBBS doctors, as per various studies.

In March, the Health Ministry introduced the National Action Plan for the Prevention and Control of Snakebite Envenoming (NAPSE) to address this pressing issue.

The plan aims to "reduce snakebite-related deaths by 50 percent by 2030," Srivastava said.

The action plan outlines strategic components, as well as the roles and responsibilities of stakeholders involved in snakebite management, control, and prevention. A central goal of NAPSE is to enhance surveillance of snakebite cases and fatalities across the country. Srivastava emphasized the importance of establishing a "robust surveillance system" to accurately monitor snakebite incidents and deaths, which will provide critical data to guide future interventions and assess their effectiveness.

By improving surveillance, stakeholders will gain a better understanding of the true burden, high-risk areas, and contributing factors to snakebite deaths, ultimately leading to better clinical management and prevention strategies, Srivastava added.

Doctor-population ratio is 1:811 in India: Nadda informs LS

The doctor-population ratio is 1:811 in the country which is better than the WHO standard of 1:1000, Union Health Minister J P Nadda informed the Lok Sabha on Friday.

As per information provided by the National Medical Commission (NMC), there are 13,86,145 allopathic doctors registered with the State Medical Councils and the National Medical Commission (NMC) as on November, 2024, he said.

"Assuming 80 per cent availability of registered allopathic doctors and around 6.14 lakh AYUSH doctors, the doctor-population ratio in the country is around 1:811 which is better than the WHO standard of 1:1000," Nadda said.

The government has increased



the number of medical colleges and subsequently increased MBBS seats, he said.

The minister said there is an increase of 102 per cent in the medical colleges from 387 before 2014 to 780 as of now. Further, there is an increase of 130 per cent in MBBS seats from 51,348 before 2014 to 1,18,137 as of now and an increase of 135 per cent in PG seats from 31,185 before 2014 to 73,157 as of now, he added.

Listing the measures/steps taken by the government to

increase the doctor/medical professional in the country, Nadda said the Centrally Sponsored Scheme for establishment of new medical colleges by upgrading district/referral hospital under which 131 new medical colleges are already functional out of 157 approved medical colleges which includes 23 medical colleges in Rajasthan.

Under upgradation of government medical colleges by construction of Super Specialty Blocks of Pradhan Mantri Swasthya Suraksha Yojana (PSSSY) scheme, a total of 75 projects have been approved, of which 69 projects are complete, the minister informed.

Under the Central Sector Scheme for setting up of new AIIMS, 22 AIIMS have been approved, said Nadda said, adding undergraduate courses have started in 19 of these.

Nearly 42 petitions filed in SC, various HCs on EVMs: Govt tells LS

Nearly 42 petitions have been filed in the Supreme Court and various high courts questioning the electronic voting machines (EVMs), with the higher judiciary repeatedly holding that the machines are credible, reliable and tamper-proof, the government said in Lok Sabha on Friday.

Responding to a question on safeguards to prevent tampering or hacking of the machines, Law Minister Arjun Ram Meghwal said according to the Election Commission (EC), EVM is a standalone machine with no radio frequency communication capability, hence it cannot communicate through wireless, bluetooth and Wi-Fi.

"The machine is electronically protected to prevent any tampering or manipulation. It



incorporates several technical security features such as one time programmable chip, unauthorised access detect module, advance encryption techniques, strong mutual authentication capability," the minister said in a written reply.

After the Haryana assembly polls, Congress had questioned the reliability of the EVMs and had claimed that different levels of charging in the EVM battery gave different results.

The EC had rejected the complaint, saying the Congress was raising "smoke of generic doubt" poll after poll.

Adjournment notices being used to disrupt proceedings: RS Chairperson

Rajya Sabha Chairperson Jagdeep Dhankhar on Friday said adjournment notices under Rule 267 of the House are being weaponised as a mechanism of disruption before adjourning the proceedings till Monday amid Opposition parties protest over corruption allegations against the Adani Group, and other issues. Like in the previous sittings of the ongoing Winter Session, the House could not take up scheduled business on Friday as well and proceedings were adjourned within minutes of the assembly. Opposition MPs started the protest soon after the chairperson announced that he had received their 17 notices for suspension of scheduled business and take up issues related to corruption allegations against the Adani Group, violence in Uttar Pradesh's Sambhal, and Manipur.

"...These issues have been raised repeatedly during the week with the result that we have already lost three working days. The days that should have been committed by us for public cause," Dhankhar said. The chairman said the loss of time, opportunity and question hour has given enormous setbacks to the people at large. "Now, I find honourable members and I call upon you for deep reflection. Rule 267 is being weaponised as a mechanism of disruption and disruption from our normal working. There are very senior members," he said. The statement led to further protests, with some opposition members raising slogans against Prime Minister Narendra Modi and the Adani Group. Expressing deep anguish, Dhankhar said, "Our actions are not people-centric. They are to absolute public distaste, we are getting into irrelevance, people are ridiculing us, we

have virtually become a laughing stock." Pramod Tiwari, Ranjeet Ranjan, and Vivek Tankha were among the Congress party MPs who had given notices for taking up discussion on the alleged corruption and wrongdoings against the Adani Group. John Brittas and AA Rahim of the CPI(M) were among the Rajya Sabha members who

sought discussion on the recent violence in Sambhal. Sanjay Singh of the AAP had given a notice to take up the issue of "rising" crime in the national capital, while his party colleague Raghav Chadha wanted a discussion on the alleged atrocities against Hindus in Bangladesh and the arrest of Hindu spiritual leader Chinmoy Krishna Das.

Punjab MPs protest slow paddy procurement in state

Congress MPs from Punjab on Friday staged a protest in the Parliament complex against alleged delay in paddy procurement and fertiliser shortage, and demanded that the government compensate the farmers who were forced to sell their produce below the minimum support price (MSP). Congress MP from Ludhiana and the party's Punjab chief Amrinder Singh Raja Warring blamed the BJP-led Union government and the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) government in Punjab for the situation. "MPs from Punjab raised their voice for the farmers of Punjab, the situation they are facing. They even spent the night at Mandi on Diwali, and were forced to sell below the MSP," Warring told reporters

outside Parliament. "The central government should form a committee and probe those who bought crops below the MSP. Farmers should get the price as per the MSP," he said. Congress MP from Fatehgarh Sahib, Amar Singh said farmers were forced to sell their crops 8-10 per cent below the MSP. "This is the first time that paddy procurement is not being done properly. Farmers of Punjab had to wait for over a month, and were forced to sell it 8-10 per cent less than the MSP. "The government should compensate farmers, and make arrangements so that it is not repeated in the future," he said. Dharamvira Gandhi, the Congress MP from Patiala, added that the government should also announce a loan waiver for farmers of north

India. "The state and central governments have not taken steps to resolve issues faced by farmers in Punjab... the stores were not emptied, there is a labour problem which was not resolved, truckers' issues were not resolved, no processes were completed, and farmers were forced to spend days waiting to sell their produce, and were eventually forced to sell it at a lower price. "Loan waiver should be given to farmers of north India," he added. The MPs also staged a protest in the Parliament complex, displaying placards with slogans like "farmers in Punjab are not getting DAP fertiliser", "crop is being procured below MSP", and "worst procurement in 25 years". The MPs raised slogans against the Union and Punjab governments.

UK museum to return to Tamil Nadu idol bought in 1967

The Ashmolean Museum at Oxford University, London, which purchased the Thirumangai Alwar bronze idol in 1967, has agreed to return the idol to Tamil Nadu after the state Idol Wing CID submitted evidence of the idol's trafficking from an ancient temple in Thanjavur district, the police said on Friday. In its recent communication to the Tamil Nadu Idol Wing CID police, the Oxford University has expressed its "commitment to repatriate" the idol said to be worth crores of rupees back to India, due to the wing's efforts, a release here said. "They have also promised to cover all costs associated with transferring the idol from London to India, ensuring that it can be returned to the temple for worship. This marks a significant step in the efforts to return stolen idols to their rightful places of origin," the release said. Efforts were on to bring this idol to Tamil Nadu within a month's time. Director General of Police Shankar Jwal, appreciated the exceptional work done by the Idol Wing CID in successfully



identifying and proving the provenance of the Thirumangai Alwar bronze idol and facilitating its repatriation process, the release added. The Oxford University's representative reviewed the evidence and testimonies provided by Deputy Superintendent of Police Chandrasekaran, which convincingly established the true origin of the Thirumangai Alwar bronze

idol. This led the representative to submit a detailed report to the University. After careful consideration, the Council of the University of Oxford accepted that the idol had been illegally removed from Sri Soundaraja Perumal temple. In addition to this success, the Idol Wing CID was continuing its sincere efforts to bring back the remaining three idols: Kaalinga Nartha Krishna, Vishnu, and Sridevi, that were also stolen along with Thirumangai Alwar idol from Sri Soundaraja Perumal temple in Kumbakonam, and are currently in museums in the United States. "The CID is working diligently to follow a similar process to ensure that these idols are repatriated to their rightful place, the Sri Soundaraja Perumal Temple in Kumbakonam, where they can once again be used for worship," the release further said. In 2020, the wing registered a case based on specific information regarding the theft of four valuable idols from the Soundararaja Perumal temple in Thanjavur district, between 1957 and 1967. These idols were

illegally sold by unknown idol traffickers and smuggled abroad. Through sustained efforts, the wing traced the smuggled idols to various museums abroad. The Thirumangai Alwar idol was found to have been purchased by the Ashmolean Museum at Oxford University, London, in 1967. Investigation revealed that, at present, only replicas of these four idols were used for worship at the Sri Soundaraja Perumal temple, while the original idols remain in foreign museums. The investigating officers, under the guidance of IGP, Idol Wing CID, R Dhinakaran, and the direct supervision of Superintendent of Police, Idol Wing CID, R Sivakumar, have meticulously collected all scientific evidences regarding the provenance of the four stolen idols. "The officers compiled convincing and indisputable evidence and have sent it to the relevant authorities in the countries where these idols are currently located. This evidence is crucial in demonstrating the true origin of the idols, which had been smuggled abroad," the release stated.

90 medicines found below standard quality in October

The Central Drugs Standard Control Organisation found 56 drug samples tested in the central drug laboratories in October as not of standard quality--Not of Standard Quality (NSQ). Besides, the Union health ministry said on Friday, three drug samples picked by the Bihar Drugs Control Authority in October have been identified as spurious. They were manufactured by unauthorised and unknown manufacturers, using brand name owned by another company. "An investigation has been initiated into the matter," the ministry stated. "This action of identifying NSQ and spurious medicines is taken on regular basis in collaboration with state regulators to ensure that these drugs are identified and removed from the market," it stated. Identification of drug samples as NSQ is done based on failure of the drug sample in one or the other specified quality parameters. "The failure is specific to the drug products of the batch tested by the government laboratory and it does not warrant any concerns on the other drug products available in the market," the ministry clarified, 90 drug samples tested in October found not of standard quality, 34 drug samples tested by state drug regulators have also been identified as NSQ.

Jaipur, Raipur stadium have no NOC for ground water extraction

The National Green Tribunal (NGT) was recently informed that the international cricket stadia in Jaipur and Raipur did not apply for no-objection certificates to extract groundwater despite repeated reminders. The Central Ground Water Authority's (CGWA) report therefore requested the tribunal to pass a suitable order, underscoring even the district magistrates concerned did not initiate any action against them. In May, the tribunal directed the CGWA and state GWAs to expeditiously decide the pending NOC applications by the cricket stadia. The directions were issued while hearing a plea against

the use of ground water for the maintenance of cricket stadia alleging they neither utilised the alternate sewage treatment plant (STP) water, nor installed rainwater harvesting systems for storing and replenishing the ground water. In a report dated November 20, the CGWA noted it had informed the green body that the BCCI provided a list of 26 stadia, of which 14 were regulated by the CGWA and the remaining by the SGWA. Among the 14 stadia, three -- Barabati Cricket Stadium in Cuttack, Sawai Mansingh Stadium in Jaipur and Shaheed Veer Narayan Singh International Stadium, in Raipur -- hadn't applied for the NOCs. Regarding the present status of NOCs, it said the Barabati

Stadium was issued the certificate on November 13. But the Jaipur and Raipur stadia did not apply for NOCs, it said. "Despite repeated reminders through letters and emails, the Rajasthan Cricket Association (RCA) has not applied for NOC for the extraction of groundwater by Sawai Mansingh Cricket Stadium," the report said. It said the CGWA of the western region requested the district collector (DC) or district magistrate (DM) of Jaipur to take action against the stadium but "despite repeated reminders" no action was taken and on November 11, the authority directed the DC to seal the stadium's borewells and submit an action taken report by November 16.

Andaman drug smugglers called Indian contact

Days after the nearly 6,000 kg of methamphetamine were seized from a trawler in Andaman and Nicobar Islands, investigators found that the smugglers had made multiple calls to their contacts in South East Asian countries, including one person in north India, a top police officer said on Friday. They also entered navigational coordinates for Neil Island in South Andaman and Rangat in Middle Andaman into their systems. Andaman and Nicobar Police collaborated with the Indian Coast Guard to arrest six international narco cartel members of Burmese origin and seize their boat customised for Narco transhipment. Dhalwal said, "Apart from making calls to people in South East Asian countries, the smugglers also contacted a person in North India. We have alerted the agencies concerned and are looking into details about this person." As part of the investigation, the police are trying to find out who bought the Starlink internet device the smugglers were using and its usage history, he said.

Birsa Munda's great grandson passes away

Tribal icon Birsa Munda's great-grandson Mangal Munda, who was undergoing treatment at a hospital here after being injured in a road accident, died of "cardiovascular failure" on Friday, an official of the health facility said. He was 45. Mangal Munda breathed his last at 12.30 am at the state's apex health facility - Rajendra Institute of Medical Sciences (RIMS). Birsa Munda's great grandson had sustained severe head injuries after he fell from the roof of a passenger vehicle in Jharkhand's Khunti district on November 25. "Birsa Munda's kin Mangal Munda died of cardiovascular failure around 12.30 am. He was on a ventilator after being critically injured. We tried our best to save him but failed," RIMS Medical Superintendent Dr Hiren Birua told PTI. Mangal Munda was referred to RIMS on Tuesday from Khunti's Sadar Hospital. Prime Minister Narendra Modi termed Munda's demise as a loss to Jharkhand tribal society. "I am deeply saddened by the demise of Mangal Munda Ji, a descendant of Lord Birsa Munda Ji. His demise is an

irreparable loss for his family as well as the tribal society of Jharkhand. May God give strength to his family in this hour of grief," PM posted on X. Jharkhand Chief Minister Hemant Soren and Governor Santosh Gangwar also condoled the death of Mangal Munda. "I am deeply saddened by the news of the demise of Shri Mangal Munda Ji, a descendant of Lord Birsa Munda, who was undergoing treatment at RIMS. May Marang Buru (supreme tribal deity) grant peace to the departed soul and give strength to the bereaved family to bear this difficult time of grief," Soren posted on the microblogging site. He along with senior officials visited RIMS and met the family members of Munda. "Mangal Munda ji suffered

serious injuries. Doctors tried their best. We tried hard. We were keeping an eye on his treatment. We were ready to shift him to any other state if required but he was on a ventilator. We did not get time. We will extend all possible support to his family," Soren told reporters after placing a wreath on Munda's mortal remains. Gangwar, in a message on the social media site, said, "The news of the demise of Mangal Munda, a descendant of Dharti Aaba Bhagwan Birsa Munda is extremely sad. My deepest condolences to the bereaved family. May God give strength to the bereaved family to bear this sorrow." Meanwhile, the last rites of Mangal Munda are likely to be performed at his ancestral village Ulihatu, around 65 km from Jharkhand's capital Ranchi.

Festival of festivals, Hornbill to kickoff in Kisama on December 1

The 25th edition of the 10-day-long Hornbill Festival in Nagaland is set to begin on December 1. This year, the festival will feature four country partners--Wales, the US, Japan, and Peru--along with two state partners, Sikkim and Telangana. Tourism Minister Temjen Imna Along said at a press conference here on Friday. The festival is a flagship tourism event designed to promote, preserve and showcase the state's rich cultural heritage. The Hornbill Festival is held at the picturesque Naga Heritage Village in Kisama, 12 km from the state capital

on the Kohima-Imphal National Highway, with structures erected depicting the map of Nagaland. "The festival, which kicks off in just two days, will mark a significant milestone in Nagaland's history," the minister said. Known as the festival of festivals, the event attracts visitors from across the world to witness the state's vibrant traditions, food, arts and crafts, he said. These partners will participate in various events, including business roundtables, cultural exhibitions, and tourism promotions, he said. The inaugural ceremony will take place at 4 pm on December 1, in the presence



of the dignitaries of the partner countries as honoured guests, Governor La Ganesan as chief host and Chief Minister Neiphiu Rio

as host. The economic impact of the festival is expected to be significant, with the state government's investments reaching over Rs 100 crore for various infrastructure development and also upgrading the seating capacity of the main arena of the festival to 5,000 people with prefab structures, he said. As part of the 25th edition's celebrations, the Hornbill Parade will return, merging with the Kohima Night Bazaar for a vibrant carnival atmosphere on December 7, said the advisor to the chief minister Abu Metha. Multiple districts across Nagaland, including Dimapur, Wokha, and Zunheboto, will also host a variety of music and cultural events throughout the festival, he said. Metha said that the festival

generates around 200 crore in economic activity, benefiting local businesses, hoteliers, and even ecotourism efforts. Environmental sustainability is a key focus this year, with the government striving to make the festival a "green event," he said, adding that efforts to reduce plastic waste and promote eco-friendly practices are central to the festival's planning. When asked about the flow of IMFL at the main festival venue in Kisama despite Nagaland being a dry state, Minister Along said the government has allowed the sale of Indian-made liquor exclusively at Kisama during the event, adhering to the state's prohibition laws. With a budget of Rs 6.5 crore

for the 2024 edition, the Hornbill Festival is not only a celebration of Nagaland's culture but also a platform for global dialogue and economic opportunity, Along said. The festival, which began as a tourism initiative, now stands as a testament to the collective efforts of the Naga people, offering a chance to showcase their culture and hospitality to the world, said Metha. The 10-day music festival to be hosted by Task Force for Music & Arts will mark the evening celebrations of the Hornbill festival with bands and artists from the partnering countries and also famed Indian bands taking the stage, he said.

Unjust arrest

The arrest of Chinmoy Krishna Das in Bangladesh underscores the persistent challenges faced by its religious minorities

The recent arrest of Chinmoy Krishna Das, a prominent Hindu monk and spokesperson for the Bangladesh Sammilit Sanatan Jagran Jote, has spotlighted the precarious situation of religious minorities in Bangladesh. Das, known for his advocacy on behalf of Hindu communities, was apprehended on sedition charges after a religious flag was reportedly hoisted above the Bangladeshi national flag during a rally in Chittagong. This incident has sparked heated debates, both domestically and internationally, about the treatment of minorities in Bangladesh and its implications for regional stability.

Chinmoy Krishna Das, a senior figure within ISKCON and leader of the 'Sanatan Jagaran Mancha,' has been vocal about the rights of Hindus in Bangladesh. His arrest follows an incident on October 25, when the ISKCON flag was placed above the Bangladeshi national flag at a protest. The act, perceived by authorities as a threat to national sovereignty, led to sedition charges under Bangladeshi law. While the government views the flag incident as an affront to national integrity, critics argue that the charges are politically motivated, aiming to suppress minority voices. Das and the 'Sanatan Jagaran Mancha' have articulated an eight-point agenda, emphasising structural reforms to protect minorities in Bangladesh. They are demanding a dedicated ministry for minority affairs and establishment of a tribunal to expedite justice for crimes against minorities and other safeguards for preserving their identity. Their demands reflect a long-standing plea for systemic changes to safeguard minority communities, which constitute approximately 10 per cent of Bangladesh's population. The arrest has triggered widespread criticism. Former Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina condemned the government's action, calling for the monk's immediate release and emphasising the importance of religious freedom. The incident also drew attention to recent waves of violence against minorities, including the burning of a Hindu temple in Chittagong and attacks on other religious groups. This episode has exposed the interim government's struggle to maintain law and order, with opposition leaders accusing it of targeting minorities to divert attention from economic mismanagement and political instability. While New Delhi often raises concerns about the safety of Hindus in Bangladesh, it must tread cautiously to avoid exacerbating tensions. India's position must be consistent. While advocating for minority rights abroad, India must also reflect on its domestic challenges. Rising incidents of communal violence and rhetoric against minorities in India undermine its credibility on the global stage. By ensuring that its own minorities feel secure and respected, India can lead by example and strengthen its moral authority when engaging with Bangladesh. For Bangladesh, the way forward lies in embracing its pluralistic heritage and ensuring that all its citizens, regardless of faith, feel safe and valued. Only then can it achieve sustainable stability and international respect it deserves.

Save India's elephants from multiple threats

Encroachments on migration corridors, poaching and deadly interactions with humans and infrastructure are creating a precarious future for these gentle giants

According to the report, "The Status of Elephants in India 2022-23", there has been a nearly 20 per cent decline in India's elephant population between 2017 and 2022. Authorities have dubbed the printed version, compiled by the Wildlife Institute of India, which is under the Union Ministry of Environment, Forests and Climate Change, as an interim report because census data from the country's north-eastern part have yet to be completed. The final report will be released by the end of June, 2025.

The final figures from the north-eastern part are unlikely to make a significant difference to the percentage of decline. This is because of the pattern of development in the region where, according to the report, elephant populations are scattered in a mosaic dominated by human habitations, tea plantations, mines, oil refineries and linear infrastructure (roads and railway lines), which makes their movements and lives precarious. Poaching for ivory is another menace.

While efforts have been made to ensure safe passage by building over-bridges for elephants to cross railway lines, most elephants do not use them and cross roads and railway lines on foot. Not surprisingly, over 200 of them have perished in train accidents over the last 10 years. Their habitats being encroached upon, and movements under pressure, elephants are migrating to new areas abutting human settlements. Human-elephant conflicts have consequently increased steeply, with the number of people killed increasing from 457 in 2018-19 to 605 in 2022-23. Three hundred elephants have been killed in the last three years. They



also suffer casualties as offshoots of wider human-animal conflict. The killings are often done with appalling cruelty. On August 15, 2024, a cow elephant died in agony in Jhargram, West Bengal, after being pierced by a flaming spear by a band of about 35 men forming a "hulla" (loud noise) party—the nomenclature given to groups, armed with mashaals (flaming torches) and tasked by state forest departments with driving wild elephants away from human habitations. In this case, the party was reportedly mobilised by West Bengal's Forest department to chase away a herd of six elephants which had entered a human habitation and killed a senior citizen. The cow elephant continued to be hit even after she was wounded. Moving forward, dragging her hind feet and writhing in agony, she finally collapsed and died eight hours later despite the forest department's efforts to treat her.

A report by Jayashree Nandi and Joydeep Thakur in 'The Hindustan Times' dated August 20, 2024, quoted a representative of the Human & Environment Alliance League (HEAL), a Kolkata-based non-profit organisation, as saying, "Hulla drives happen in mob

situations... The elephants suffer emotional trauma because of these invasive measures, in addition to physical distress. There is an urgent need to completely stop the use of mashaals by state authorities to drive [out] elephants." The report quoted an environmentalist, who had asked not to be named, as saying, that the whole idea behind having a hulla party was to chase elephants away by using light. "We know that animals are instinctively scared of fire. But we have seen in the past that hulla groups, employed by the forest department, are in [an] inebriated condition and resort to all kinds of horrific torture. Locals are extremely disturbed about this. Moreover, all corridors that can help these elephants escape are now encroached upon so conflict is rising."

Sometimes, death is a collateral development. On May 27, 2020, a pregnant elephant collapsed in Velliya river in Kerala's Palakkad district and died, after having stood there since May 25. According to the post-mortem report on the tragedy, the immediate cause of her death was drowning. On May 12, 2020, she had tried to eat a coconut that had been stuffed with explosives to kill wild boars that ate up crops.

The result was serious, incapacitating wounds in her oral cavity. "This", the post-mortem report continued, "resulted in excruciating pain and distress in the region and prevented the animal from taking food and water for nearly two weeks. Severe debility and weakness, in turn, resulted in a final collapse in water that led to drowning." According to a report by Sujit Bisoyi in 'The Indian Express' (dated November 18, 2024), three elephants, including a calf, died after falling into an electrified trap, laid by poachers for killing wild boars, in Odisha's Sambalpur district. The question is: should wild boars be killed in this terrible way? The human-animal conflict is making demons out of people. Meanwhile, there is good news from across the border. Under the auspices of Four Paws, a global animal welfare organisation, Madhubala, an African elephant, was shifted on November 26, 2024, from the Karachi Zoo to Karachi Safari Park, to join her two sisters, Malika and Sonia, in open air. Antimicrobial resistance: An invisible risk for women health

With AMR deaths projected to exceed 10 million annually by 2050, a gender-sensitive, intersectional approach is critical to tackling this silent epidemic

When antibiotics or antimicrobials, impactful the first few times, lose their efficacy as their intake increases, sometimes unthinkingly and unnecessarily, it indicates that the bacteria, fungi, viruses and parasites it was being used to treat have become resistant to these drugs. Prevention and treatment of infections then become increasingly difficult and can lead to fatal consequences. While this antimicrobial resistance (AMR) is invisible, the people affected by it are not. In 2021, deaths linked to AMR numbered a staggering 4.7 million and approximately 1.5 million were directly caused by it. Worryingly, India has one of the world's highest AMR rates. Equally worrying is that the impacts of AMR are not the same for everyone. Since the drivers of AMR in India include lack of access to clean water, sanitation and hygiene (WASH), and limited access to healthcare facilities among others, AMR disproportionately affects certain groups compared with others. Thus, marginalised and vulnerable communities, espe-



cially women, face a higher risk of acquiring bacterial infections, including drug-resistant infections and AMR. It is a good fact that women face more barriers to accessing health information than men. Limited mobility prevents them from attending public health awareness events and learning about the safe use of antibiotics. Low levels of education lead to ignorance on the use and misuse of antibiotics not just for themselves, but for their children also. Studies have found that misuse of antibiotics while breastfeeding can contribute to the development of AMR, particularly in intestinal microbiota in a child, through breast milk transfer. They are more prone to seeking antibiotics to get better as fast as possible, to

work. Medicines used for self-medication are often purchased without prescriptions from unlicensed local shops as limited financial resources often dictate whether it is worth paying a visit to a health facility. It has been proven that treating viral infections with antibiotics, not buying the full course of treatment, interrupting treatment and sharing medicines can lead to an increased risk of AMR with the emergence of resistant strains of bacteria. Sexual orientation and associated sexual behaviours among individuals also contribute to the risks of acquiring AMR. Laws that criminalise homosexual relationships coupled with stigma are deterrents to health-seeking behaviour by key populations such as men having sex with men (MSM), lesbian, gay, bi, trans, queer and other identities (LGBTQ+) individuals. This enhances their exposure to pathogens, such as an increased risk of sexually transmitted infections (STIs) and antimicrobial drug resistance. Gender-based violence also plays a significant role in AMR among women.

Multiple studies have shown that women, including married women, are at a higher risk than men of being exposed to STIs through sexual violence, having a spouse with multiple partners, male resistance to condom use and women's low ability to negotiate safe sex. This increases women's risk of contracting STIs, particularly gonorrhoea, one of the most transmitted STIs which has the potential for drug resistance. The more frequent the UTIs, the greater the use of ciprofloxacin and the higher the risk of AMR. With the possibility of deaths associated with AMR rising to over 10 million annually by 2050, there is an urgent need to adopt a robust intersectional approach. Greater data disaggregated by sex, gender, disability, geographical location, occupation, sexual orientation and socio-economic status is urgently needed to implement policies to prevent AMR, especially among women, LGBTQ, people living with HIV and other vulnerable groups.

a virtual denouncing of all other sports. Sakshi Malik, Olympic bronze medalist works with the Northern Railway and the first woman Olympic silver medalist, PV Sindhu's father is the sports officer of South-Central Railway. The mindsets of these women of substance were akin to Ajatashatru as they turned around gruelling situations into triumphant ones.

These mindsets indicate the indomitable spirit which should be embraced by all sportspersons. The mindset and approach of the Ministry of Sports need to be altered radically. The administration of this department needs a vigorous overhaul. Indian Railways and Indian Defence Forces should be actively involved in revamping the moribund organisation along with the participation of the private sector to provide an adequate corpus of funds through their Corporate Social Responsibility programme. However, doubts should not arise in the corners of the minds of the administrators. They should be willing to take the risks. Their minds too should be flexible in approach and become Ajatashatru. Most sportspersons find relaxation with the latest gizmos and listening to music and in the entertainment industry. Perhaps it will be a profitable exercise to begin the rigorous schedule by practising yoga, and pranayama and then resume their normal routine. The day should end with the practice of *Sudarshan Kriya* and meditation. This will make the bodies and minds supple. Several East Asian countries and China follow a regimen of spiritual teachings like Vipassana to enhance the quality of performance of their athletes. China takes several pages from the works of Tsung Tzu to learn the craft of war to train the minds of their sportspersons. This dynamic approach produces champions. "Endurance is one of the most difficult disciplines, but it is to the one who endures that the final victory comes," said Buddha. It is a matter of honour to climb the podium. Let us begin our preparations yesterday with earnestness and train our sportspersons to become truly Ajatashatru.

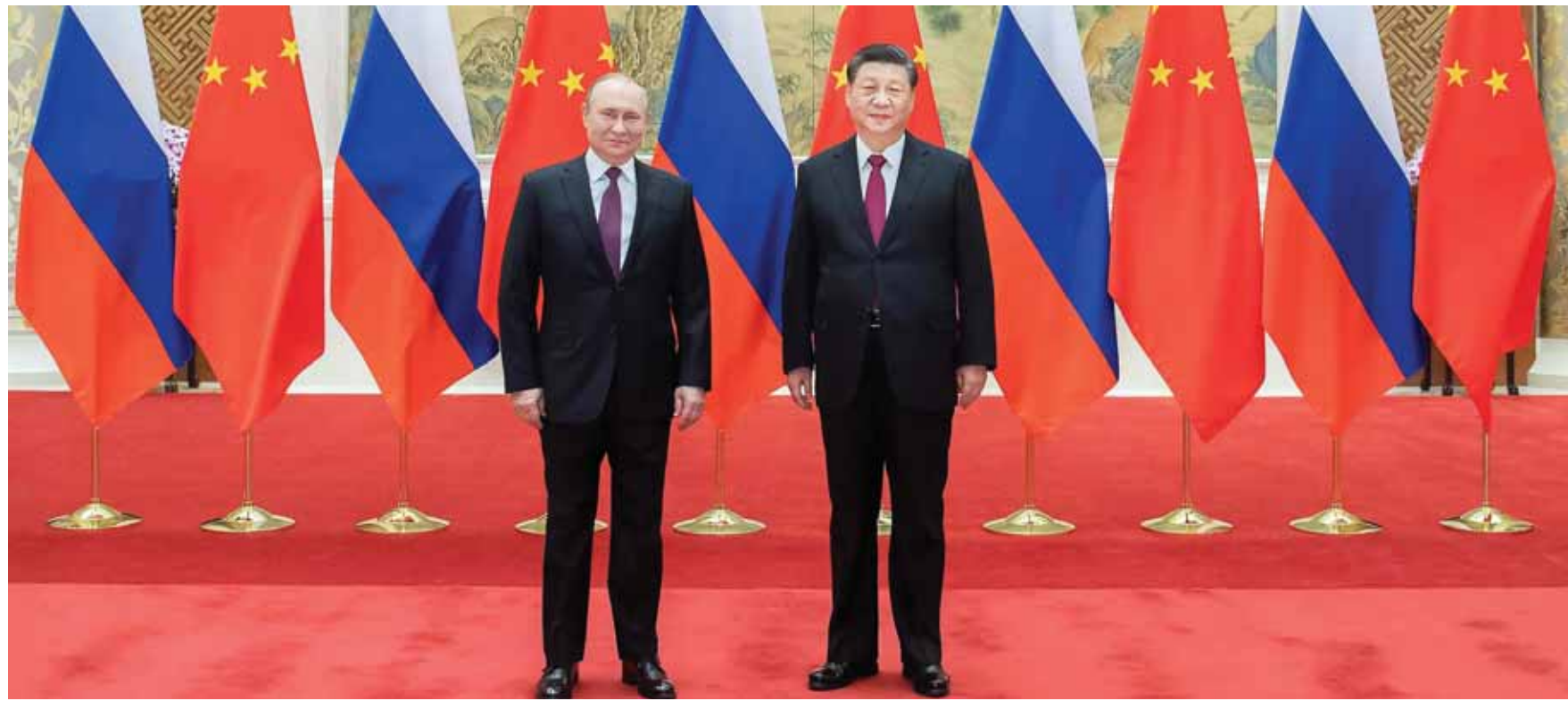

The Eastern challenge to Western supremacy

As alliances between Eastern nations grow stronger, the American-led global order faces an existential challenge—one that could redefine the world's balance of power



What if everything you've been told about global conflicts is a carefully crafted narrative, designed to obscure the true motives behind the wars shaping our world? What if the West, in its pursuit of global dominance, has been engineering not only conflicts but also economic crises to maintain an order that ensures its supremacy? From secret military operations to covert sabotage of vital infrastructure, the unsettling reality is far darker and more strategic than we're led to believe.

Take, for example, the US Space Force's secret X-37B spacecraft, a classified project performing manoeuvres unknown to the public. Officially seen as a technological marvel for testing new military systems, the X-37B reveals the West's obsession with space as the final frontier of warfare—a new realm for control, surveillance, and preparation for conflict beyond terrestrial borders. In Europe, Germany is quietly preparing for a war that might never be fought, but whose consequences will be felt across generations. The German government has begun drawing up plans for the construction and expansion of bunkers, turning buildings—metro stations, and underground car parks—into fortified shelters in case of conflict. The reasons for these preparations are not openly discussed, but anyone with a cursory knowledge of geopolitics can understand the strategic intent. At the heart of this is the fear of Russia, a fear that has taken root despite decades of diplomatic agreements and economic cooperation. But the true motive behind these moves, hidden beneath the veil of defence, is not just survival. It's about keeping Europe within the American orbit—controlling the narrative and preventing the rise of any bloc that might dare to challenge the order established in the aftermath of the Cold War. As the West tightens its grip on the war

in Ukraine, a much larger game is unfolding—one rooted in economic sabotage, echoing dark chapters from WWI and WWII. During WWI, the British naval blockade led to over 750,000 German deaths from starvation, while in WWII, both Axis and Allied powers exploited occupied economies.

The US used sanctions and trade embargoes to cripple Germany, Japan, and Italy, before later pushing the Marshall Plan to prevent Soviet expansion. WWII's hidden agenda was to establish a new global economic order, cemented by institutions like the IMF and World Bank. Today, the destruction of the Nord Stream pipelines, a symbol of the West's desperation, exemplifies the lengths to which the West will go to control European energy resources. While it harms the German public and European markets, the US and its allies benefit from the uncertainty and dependence on their energy exports. This isn't a mere accident; it's economic warfare to weaken Russia and prevent Germany from growing too independent.

A fragmented Europe is far easier to control than a self-sufficient one. But the true target of the West's fear is not merely Russia. It is the potential unity between China, India and Russia. These nations, once seen as geopolitical rivals, are now forging alliances that threaten to upend the balance of power in a way that the West cannot tolerate. The prospect of India, the world's most populous country, rising to become the third-largest economy in the world in the next few years is a nightmare for the West. India, with its growing manufac-

turing sector, burgeoning technological innovation, and rapidly expanding middle class, represents an existential threat to the economic order that has been so carefully crafted by the West over the last century.

But there's something even more dangerous: the potential for India, China, and Russia to align themselves strategically, creating a bloc that could challenge the very foundations of the American-led global system. This is not mere conjecture. The relationship between these nations is growing stronger by the day, driven by mutual interests in trade, energy, and security.

India's role as a bridge between the East and West has already made it a key player in the global economy, and its rise is inevitable—unless, of course, the West can sabotage it. From the ongoing conflict with Pakistan to the subtle manoeuvring within India's border countries, the West's tactics are clear: prevent India from becoming too powerful, too independent. The rise of India would disrupt the existing order, unseating the US dollar's global dominance, challenging the West's monopoly over technological innovation, and upsetting the very structure of global trade.

For years, the West has maintained a delicate balance by keeping China, India, and Russia in a state of disunity, playing them off each other whenever possible. This disunity has been the foundation of Western power in the modern world, preventing the rise of any one nation that could unite the East and threaten the West's economic hegemony. The more these nations grow closer, the more the West fears

losing its control over global affairs.

A united East is the ultimate nightmare, and the West will stop at nothing to ensure it never happens. Economic sanctions, covert operations, and political manipulation are but tools in the West's arsenal, deployed to divide and conquer, ensuring that peace between China, Russia, and India remains an unthinkable prospect. But what if India, China, and Russia do unite?

What if they form a powerful bloc, in addition to BRICS but similar to Five Eyes or AUKUS, one that can rival the economic and military might of the West? The very notion of peace in this region—the idea that these nations could cooperate, trade, and build mutual trust—strikes at the heart of Western strategy. Peace in the East is the West's greatest fear, and the possibility of such a peace emerging in the wake of current geopolitical turmoil is something the West cannot allow. It is the very foundation of the Western empire that stands on the brink of collapse, should this unity ever come to pass.

If unity is ensured, the East may finally break free from the chains of Western manipulation, and the world may look very different from how it does today. The question remains: can the West survive in a world where it no longer controls the narrative, the economy, or the very fate of nations? Only time will tell, but the signs are already clear—if the West doesn't change its course, it will be its actions that lead to its downfall.

Trump re-elected as the US President: Nationalism rises amid global shifts

His re-election is set to influence US immigration, trade and foreign policies while creating ripple effects across the globe

Donald Trump has been re-elected as President of the United States, defeating Kamala Harris in a closely watched election. His return to power has sparked global speculation about potential shifts in US economic and social policies. Trump's previous tenure was marked by transformative changes, and his "America First" doctrine remains central to his administration. The Rise of Nationalism Globally, nationalism is surging amid challenges like globalisation, terrorism, religious extremism and economic upheaval. Trump's victory reflects this trend. During his first term, Trump emphasised reviving American manufacturing, limiting Chinese imports, and reform-

ing immigration policies to protect American jobs. His proposal to build a US-Mexico border wall became symbolic of his immigration stance. Trump also advocated reducing costly military interventions abroad and fostered a controversial friendship with Russian President Vladimir Putin, breaking traditional US-Russia dynamics. These policies resonated with a significant portion of the

electorate, reinforcing Trump's popularity. Nationalism is also gaining traction in Europe. Post-World War II liberalism and globalisation have given way to a nationalist wave, driven by economic concerns and fears of societal erosion. Britain's Brexit epitomised this shift, and several European nations, including Italy, Finland and Hungary, now have nationalist governments. Even traditionally liberal countries like Germany and France are witnessing growing influence from nationalist parties. Rising extremism, as seen in recent violent incidents in France and England, has further fueled public discontent with liberal immigration policies, rein-

forcing nationalist sentiments. Implications of victory of Nationalism Trump's win represents a significant setback for liberal ideologies, including Wokeism and leftist movements. His administration's emphasis on American nationalism underscores a rejection of policies perceived as prioritising minority appeasement or extremism. While Trump has praised the contributions of Hindus in America, he has also vowed to take a hardline stance against extremism, including deporting Muslim immigrants linked to groups like Hamas. The Biden administration's perceived support for liberal and leftist ideologies con-



trasts with Trump's firm nationalist agenda. His "America First" slogan signifies a broader rejection of extremism and a commitment to protecting US interests. This ideological divide is emblematic of a global realignment favoring nationalism.

Elon Musk's Role Elon Musk, a billionaire industrialist, played a pivotal role in the elections. Musk, a former critic of Trump, became a vocal supporter due to his personal experiences with Wokeism, particularly involving his family. California's Woke-influenced education policies led to a gender transition for Musk's son, causing a rift within his family. Disillusioned, Musk resolved to challenge Wokeism. After acquiring Twitter (now X), Musk reinstated Trump's account and actively supported his campaign. Musk's actions symbolise a broader cultural battle against Woke ideologies, aligning with Trump's nationalist narrative.

Trump's Victory and Its Impact on India Trump's presidency has significant implications for India. His tough stance on China aligns with India's interests, potentially encouraging global firms to view India as a manufacturing alternative. This could bolster India's Atmanirbhar Bharat initiative. However, Trump's protectionist policies, such as potential tariff hikes and restrictions on H-1B visas, might pose challenges for Indian exporters and IT firms. Trump's administration may also bring geopolitical benefits for India. Strengthening ties with both the US and Russia could enhance India's global positioning. While Trump's climate change stance might

hinder global environmental goals, his leadership could contribute to reducing extremism and terrorism, fostering stability. Conclusion Trump's re-election reflects a global shift toward nationalism, driven by dissatisfaction with liberal policies and rising concerns about extremism. His presidency promises significant changes in US domestic and foreign policies, emphasising economic protectionism, immigration reform, and geopolitical realignments. For India, Trump's leadership presents both opportunities and challenges, shaping its role in the evolving global landscape. 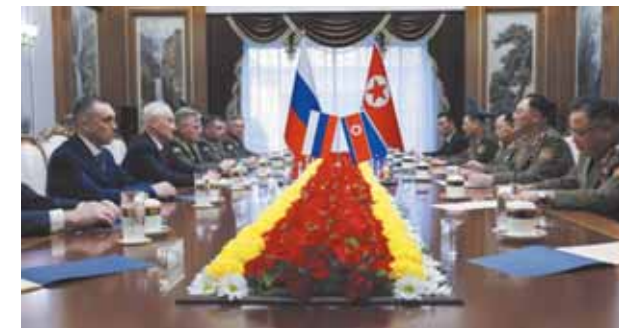
Negotiators get closer to agreeing on plastic pollution treaty

Negotiators working on a treaty to address the global crisis of plastic pollution inched closer to an agreement Friday, with more countries saying they want to address the total plastic on Earth. The most contentious issue of the talks is whether there will be a limit on the amount of plastic that companies are allowed to produce. Panama proposed text for the treaty to address plastic production on Thursday. Juan Carlos Monterrey, head of Panama's delegation, said it's a compromise proposal to build consensus because it does not include a numerical target or production cap. Instead, it says countries would adopt a global target at a later conference of the parties meeting. Support for Panama's proposal quickly grew to over 100 countries. Some plastic-producing and oil and gas countries, including Saudi Arabia, vigorously oppose including plastic production in the treaty, calling it a red line. Russia's delegation has said if the world is serious about this treaty, negotiators must concentrate on provisions acceptable for all delegations. On Friday afternoon, Luis Vayas Valdivieso, the committee chair from Ecuador, issued a paper with draft treaty text, condensing the views expressed by negotiators during the week. The treaty article on production has Panama's proposal. The other option is to strike that article. "This is great! This is great,"

Monterrey said as he read the document on his cellphone just after it was issued. "It is a big show of force, of muscle, for those countries that are ambitious. And also this shows that consensus is still possible," he said in an interview. Global plastics production is set to reach 736 million tons by 2040, up 70% from 2020, without policy changes, according to the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development. Environmental organizations demonstrated with signs outside the convention center Friday morning, demanding that negotiators show courage. Negotiators began meeting Monday in Busan. They split into groups to consider text for treaty articles. By the midpoint of the negotiations, none had agreed to anything. They were having long discussions over topics where there's more agreement, such as the need to manage plastic waste better. And they hadn't settled on some of the basics of the treaty, such as the scope and definitions. Valdivieso told them Wednesday night their progress was too slow and they had to speed up significantly. The delegations will now discuss Valdivieso's paper and decide whether to agree to the articles. The meeting ends late Sunday or early Monday. UN Environment Program Executive Director Inger Andersen said there's still enough time to land an agreement, "if we work hard."



Russian defence minister in N Korea for talks

Russian Defence Minister Andrei Belousov arrived in North Korea on Friday for talks with North Korean military and political leaders as the countries deepen their cooperation over Russia's war in Ukraine. In announcing the visit, Russia's Defence Ministry didn't say whom Belousov would meet or the purpose of the talks. North Korean state media didn't immediately confirm the visit. Belousov, a former economist, replaced Sergei Shoigu as defence minister in May after Russian President Vladimir Putin started a fifth term in power. Photos released by the Defense Ministry showed Belousov walking alongside North Korean Defence Minister No Kwang Chol on a red carpet at a Pyongyang airport. North Korean military officials were seen clapping under a banner that read, "Complete support and solidarity with the fighting Russian army and people." Belousov noted after his arrival that military cooperation between the countries is expanding. He applauded a strategic partnership agreement signed by Putin and North Korean leader Kim Jong Un following their June meeting in Pyongyang, which he said is aimed at reducing tensions by maintaining a "balance of power" in the region and lowering the risk of war, including with nuclear weapons. The June meeting demonstrated the "highest level of mutual trust" between the leaders, Belousov said, and "also the mutual desire of our countries to further expand mutually beneficial cooperation in a complex international environment." North Korean Defence Minister No also praised the expanding cooperation between the countries' militaries and reiterated North Korea's support for

Russia's war in Ukraine, describing it as a "just struggle to protect the country's sovereign rights and security interests." The visit comes days after South Korean President Yoon Suk Yeol met with a Ukrainian delegation led by Defence Minister Rustem Umerov in the South Korean capital of Seoul and called for the two countries to formulate countermeasures in response to North Korea's dispatch of thousands of troops to Russia to help its fight against Ukraine. Kim in recent months has prioritized relations with Russia as he tries to break out of isolation and strengthen his international footing, embracing the idea of a "new Cold War." The United States and its allies have said North Korea has sent more than 10,000 soldiers to Russia in recent weeks and that some of those troops were engaging in combat. North Korea has also been accused of supplying artillery systems, missiles and other military equipment to Russia that may help Putin further extend an almost three-year war. There are also concerns in Seoul that North Korea, in exchange for its troops and arms supplies, could receive Russian technology transfers that could improve its nuclear weapons and missile programmes. Yoon's national security adviser, Shin Wonsik, said in a TV interview last week that Seoul believes that Russia has provided air defence missile systems to North Korea in exchange for sending its troops. Shin said Russia also appears to have given economic assistance to North Korea and various military technologies, including those needed for the North's efforts to build a reliable space-based surveillance system, which Kim has stressed is crucial for enhancing the threat of nuclear-capable missiles targeting South Korea.

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GDP growth slows to two-year low of 5.4 per cent in Q2

India's economic growth slowed to near two-year low of 5.4 per cent in the July-September quarter of this fiscal due to poor performance of manufacturing and mining sectors, but the country continued to remain the fastest-growing large economy, data showed on Friday.

The gross domestic product (GDP) had expanded by 8.1 per cent in the July-September quarter of 2023-24 fiscal.

The previous low level of GDP growth at 4.3 per cent was recorded in the third quarter (October-December 2022) of financial year 2022-23.

However, India remained the fastest-growing major economy as China's GDP growth in the July-September quarter this year was at 4.6 per cent.

According to the National Statistical Office (NSO) data, the growth of agriculture sector GVA (Gross Value Added) accelerated to 3.5 per cent in the latest July-September quarter from 1.7 per cent a year ago.

The GVA in the manufacturing sector slowed to 2.2 per cent in the second quarter of the current fiscal compared to an expansion of 14.3 per cent in the year-ago period.

As per the data, the output (GVA) in the 'mining and quarrying' contracted to 0.01 per cent in the second quarter against a growth of 11.1 per cent a year ago.

The expansion in financial, real estate and professional services' GVA was 6.7 per cent, up from 6.2 per cent in the year-ago quarter.

Electricity, gas, water supply and other utility services grew by 3.3 per cent, slower than 10.5 per cent a year ago.

The construction sector recorded a growth of 7.7 per cent in the second quarter, down from 13.6 per cent year on year.

The growth in gross domestic product (GDP) during the April-June quarter of 2024-25 remained unchanged at 6.7 per cent.

"Real GDP or GDP at constant prices in Q2 of 2024-25 is estimated at Rs 44.10 lakh crore, against Rs 41.86 lakh crore in Q2 of 2023-24, showing a growth rate of 5.4 per cent," the NSO said in a statement.

Nominal GDP or GDP at current prices in Q2 of 2024-25 is estimated at Rs 76.60 lakh crore, against Rs 70.90 lakh crore in Q2 of 2023-24, showing a growth rate of 8.0 per cent, it added.

On half-yearly basis, the statement said the real GDP or GDP at constant prices in April-September of 2024-25 (H1 FY25) is estimated at Rs 87.74 lakh crore, against Rs 82.77 lakh crore in the first half of 2023-24, showing a growth rate of 6 per cent.

Nominal GDP or GDP at current prices in H1, 2024-25 is estimated at Rs 153.91 lakh crore, against Rs 141.40 lakh crore in H1 of 2023-24, showing a growth rate of 8.9 per cent, it stated.

Meanwhile, the government data showed that the Centre's fiscal deficit at the end of the first seven months of the current financial year touched 46.5 per cent of the full-year target.

In absolute terms, the fiscal deficit -- the gap between government's expenditure and revenue -- was at Rs 7,50,824 crore during April-October period, according to data released by the Controller General of Accounts (CGA).

The deficit stood at 45 per cent of the Budget Estimates (BE) in the corresponding period of 2023-24.

Sensex rebounds 759 points, Nifty ends above 24,100

Benchmark Sensex rallied 759 points while Nifty closed above 24,100 on Friday following buying in frontline stocks Bharti Airtel and Reliance Industries.

The 30-share BSE Sensex jumped 759.05 points or 0.96 per cent to settle at 79,802.79. During the day, it soared 880.16 points or 1.11 per cent to 79,923.90.

The NSE Nifty climbed 216.95 points or 0.91 per cent to 24,131.10.

From the 30-share Sensex pack, Bharti Airtel, Mahindra & Mahindra, UltraTech Cement, Adani Ports, Reliance Industries, Larsen & Toubro, JSW Steel, Hindustan Unilever, Titan and Tata Motors were the biggest gainers.

Power Grid, Nestle, State Bank of India and Infosys were the laggards.

Majority of Adani Group firms ended higher, with Adani Green Energy soaring 21.72 per cent and Adani Energy Solutions surging 15.56 per cent on the BSE.

The BSE smallcap gauge climbed 0.76 per cent and midcap index went up by 0.31 per cent.

"A large-cap-driven, broad-based rally ensued in the domestic market. The anticipated slowdown in India's Q2 GDP to 6.5% has already been reflected in Q2

corporate earnings, which the market appears to have discounted," Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Financial Services said.

Official data released after the market hours showed the Indian economy growing at a slower rate of 5.4 per cent in the July-September period of 2024-25 from 8.1 per cent in the year-ago period.

Among sectoral indices, BSE healthcare jumped the most 2.05 per cent, followed by telecommunication (1.53 per cent), utilities (1.46 per cent), energy (1.09 per cent), commodities (1.04 per cent) and teck (1.02 per cent).

Realty emerged as the only laggard.

As many as 2,347 stocks advanced while 1,606 declined and 97 remained unchanged on the BSE.

On the weekly front, the BSE benchmark jumped 685.68 points or 0.86 per cent and the Nifty climbed 223.85 points or 0.93 per cent.

Gill returns to nets after thumb injury

Shubman Gill returned to the India nets on Friday, showing enough signs of a full recovery from a thumb injury that ruled him out of the series opener against Australia in Perth. Gill's absence was not felt in Perth as India won the game by 295 runs but considering his impressive run on the previous tour, the visitors need him at his best over the course of the five-match series. The top-order batter was seen facing Yash Dayal and Akash Deep in the nets ahead of the pink-ball warm-up game against Australian PM's XI starting Saturday. "I was just trying to get a feel to be honest, see how the injury is reacting, if any kind of soreness is there but it went much better than what I and Kamlesh bhai (Kamlesh Jain, physio) expected. Very happy with that," Gill said in a video posted by BCCI on X after the training session here. Gill was naturally disappointed about getting injured ahead of the first Test but India's special



performance put him back in a positive frame of mind. "Any ball when it hits the middle of the bat, the feeling that you get, that is the feeling I play for. When I got to know about my injury, first couple of days I was quite low and disappointed. "Perth is the only venue we did not play last time around (2020-21). It is such an iconic venue. But the way we played at the end of it, I was very happy," the batter added. In Gill's absence, Devdutt Padikkal came at number three for India but could not deliver. However, it is not a given that Gill will return to his usual batting position as K L Rahul excelled as an opener in Perth in skipper Rohit Sharma's absence. While Rohit is expected to open alongside Yashasvi Jaiswal, Rahul could come in at three pushing Gill to number 5. It remains to be seen if India experiment in the batting order in the warm-up game as all batters would be allowed a hit in the middle considering it is not a first-class game.

India look to make most of pink ball warm-up

India would aim to figure out their batting combination for next week's day-night Test in Adelaide when they face Australia Prime Minister's XI in a two-day tour game at the Manuka Oval here on Saturday. India have played four day-night Tests thus far with their only loss coming at Adelaide four years ago when they were bowled out for 36 before making a winning comeback in the four-match Test series. The pink ball does a lot more compare to the red cherry, especially in the twilight period. Considering it is not a first-class game, majority of the Indian batters would like to get a feel of the ball in the middle. Coming from their most dominant win in Australia in the opening Test in Perth, the Indian dressing room is in high spirits. However, the

arrival of Rohit Sharma, who missed the first Test due to the birth of his second child and expected return of a fit again Shubman Gill will force the think tank to rejig the batting order for the match beginning December 6. Rohit and Yashasvi Jaiswal are the designated openers but with the latter and K L Rahul excelling at the top in Perth, there is a case for the Indian skipper to drop himself down the order. If that does happen, Gill's position will also need to be adjusted. India will have to make those calls in the practice game before reaching Adelaide with full clarity. As it is only a two-day game, India would be hoping to get a lot more time with the bat than the ball. The likes of Sarfaraz Khan, who are unlikely to be considered unless there is an injury, would also be hoping for some game time.

Australia let Kohli roll on to a hundred in Perth: Allan Border

Former Australia captain Allan Border has expressed his disappointment over the team's inability to contain Virat Kohli during the first Test in Perth and feels that can potentially cost the hosts the five-match series. Kohli, who had not scored a Test century in 18 months, roared back to form with an unbeaten 100 in the second innings as India secured a thumping 295-run victory over the hosts. "I was really disappointed in the way we let Kohli roll on to a hundred without much resistance," Border told SEN radio on Friday morning. "We don't want this guy full of confidence for the rest of the series." Border also questioned the tactics of skipper Pat Cummins, suggesting they allowed Kohli to regain his rhythm after his struggles against New Zealand in the recent home series. Kohli's

century marked his seventh ton on Australian soil. Former opener Matthew Hayden also took aim at Cummins, criticising the field placements after Kohli's arrival in the middle. "They missed a few tricks with Virat Kohli in the early part of his innings. Nathan Lyon had mid-on back, one on the off-side catching and a mid-wicket. I felt like it was so easy for him to get off strike," Hayden had told Channel 7 after India's win. "You can't cut a sucker an even break when a bloke is under pressure as he was. The field we actually finished with - two slips, no point, a man straight - it offered up the outside edge of his bat as well. He found it a little more frustrating. When he got the bit between the teeth, it was too late. Hayden also pointed to tactical lapses during India's earlier partnership, noting the delayed use of short-ball strategies. "Jaiswal looked vulnerable

against it. Maybe tiny things with Pat Cummins, the ability to think through these decisions. They were shell-shocked from the average batting performance (in the first innings) and we see now, again, bombs are going," he said.

KL should continue to open with Jaiswal, Rohit can come in at 3: Pujara

Cheteshwar Pujara wants K L Rahul to open the batting alongside Yashasvi Jaiswal in the second Test against Australia despite the arrival of skipper Rohit Sharma. Rohit's absence in the series opener in Perth allowed India to move Rahul to the top of the order from the middle order. Pujara, the rock of Indian batting on the previous two tours of Australia, feels the opening combination should not be tinkered with after a 295-run win in the series opener. Jaiswal scored a memorable hundred while Rahul too was impressive, collecting 26 and 77 in the two innings in Perth. "I think, for some reason if we can carry on with the same batting order, like KL and Yashasvi to open, Rohit could come in at three, and Shubman could come in at five," Pujara said in a chat with ESPNcricinfo. "If Rohit wants to open, KL should bat at No. 3. Nothing later than that. I think he has to bat top of the order, because it suits his game really well. I hope we don't tinker around with that." Gill, who missed the first Test due to a thumb injury, is also expected to feature in the playing eleven in the day-night Test beginning December 6. "Ideally No. 5 (for Gill). Because it allows him to come

in at a time, even if we lose two wickets early, he is someone who can negotiate the new ball," Pujara said.
