In a significant move to revolutionise the tourism sector, Andhra Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu on Saturday inaugurated a seaplane demonstration at Punnami Ghat, Prakasam Barrage, in Vijayawada.

Minister for Civil Aviation K Ram Mohan Naidu, Ministers BC Janardhan Reddy, Kandula Durgesh, MP Kesineni Sivanath, Secretary GoAP S Suresh Kumar, Ajay Singh, Chairman and Managing Director, SpiceJet, and other dignitaries were present.

The occasion marks the beginning of India's first-ever seaplane service for tourists, set to offer a new and innovative way to explore the State's scenic beauty and religious landmarks.

Illegal ganja cultivation found near health institutions; three held

PNS VISAKHAPATNAM

The city police arrested three individuals, including a minor, for cultivating cannabis in the heart of Visakhapatnam, specifically on the premises of King George Hospital (KGH). This unexpected discovery comes as a serious breach of safety, given that KGH serves as a critical healthcare facility for five surrounding districts.

On Saturday, the police conducted a raid on the premises, leading to the destruction of several ganja plants and the seizure of an additional two kilograms of cannabis from nearby locations.

"Our investigations reveal that similar cultivation activities have been reported near Andhra Medical College as well," noted a senior police officer involved in the case. "What's particularly concerning is that these illegal activities appear to have been ongoing for the past 18 months."

Local residents are adamant that change must happen swiftly. "This is not just about enforcement; it's about protecting our community's well-being," expressed Arjun Patil, a con-



cerned local. "We're shocked that this has gone on for so long in such vital areas of our city. We're calling upon the authorities to take swift action.

The report has ignited discussions about the necessity for enhanced safety measures and oversight for public institutions. In response to the public's outcry, police officials are pledging a thorough crackdown on any further illegal cannabis cultivation within the city. APTIDCO plans housing project in 200 acres in Kothuru Tadepalli

The Andhra Pradesh Township and Infrastructure Development Corporation (APTIDCO) is planning to construct houses for economically disadvantaged and middle-class individuals in the NTR district. To facilitate this,

APTIDCO officials are in discussions with Revenue officials to identify suitable land for acquisition in the area. APTIDCO aims to build houses on approximately 200 acres in the district.

Currently, the Revenue officials are focusing on land located in Kothuru Tadepalli, within the Vijayawada Rural mandal, near Vijayawada. They have already prepared a report concerning 60 acres of land and are actively searching for an additional 150 acres. The officials plan to acquire land at a price of Rs. 1.20 crore per acre. "Every month, my husband's

A contrived smile can conceal many bitter emotions, but a picture or a clip can speak a thousand words. During AICC leader Rahul Gandhi's recent visit to Telangana, the interactions between the two leaders appeared formal to a fault, lacking the warmth typically associated with bonds that obviously go beyond intra-party political connections. Another spouse, whose husband is employed in the CMS Department, expressed deep frustration over the oppressive silence surrounding their plight. "We're too afraid to speak out directly due to the government's restrictions on employee protests. The situation is getting worse by the day, and our families are suffering. We felt we had no choice but to take to the streets to draw attention to this unbearable situation," she lamented.

The urgency of the crisis has prompted the CITUaffiliated RINL-VSP trade union to announce a massive protest scheduled for November 10, which will involve employees and their families. Trade union leader J Ayodhyaram noted, "For the first time in history, spouses are protesting due to the nonpayment of salaries. As of November 9, 12,600 regular employees haven't received a staggering 45 days' salary, totaling Rs 86 crore. On top of that, 14,000 contractual workers stand unpaid for four to five months. PAV urges AP Govt to increase health budget

The Praja Arogya Vedika (PAV), a prominent health advocacy group, has appealed to the Andhra Pradesh governget to six per cent of the State's Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP). This call comes with an emphasis on enhancing healthcare infrastructure, increasing the number of healthcare personnel, and ensuring a steady supply of essential medicines. Such steps, PAV argues, are vital for creating a healthier and more productive future for the State's citizens.

In a letter addressed to Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu, PAV leaders T Kameswara Rao and MV Ramanaiah shared findings from recent medical camps across rural, urban, and tribal areas.

The camps revealed widespread health challenges, particularly a high prevalence of anaemia among children and women, viral infections, joint pains, skin diseases, and lifestyle-related conditions like hypertension and diabetes. Additionally, Andhra Pradesh's rates of infant, maternal, and under-five mortality were notably higher than those in other south- Ramanaiah.

ern States, signaling a pressing need for targeted health interventions.

"Anaemia has reached an alarming level, impacting 63 per cent of children between months and five year stated Rao. This figure marks an increase from the 59 per cent prevalence reported in previous health surveys, and it underscores the urgent need for state-led action to improve nutrition and health services for young children.

PAV's letter also highlighted a recent diarrhoea outbreak linked to contaminated water, underscoring the urgent need for safe drinking water. The group recommended that the state government create a comprehensive plan to ensure clean water access, which could prevent similar health crises in the future. The organisation further

urged the government to establish specialised hospitals in Andhra Pradesh, similar to Telangana's Government Cancer Hospital and MNI Children's Hospital, to provide essential care for complex health issues. The DLC system has seen significant advancements since its inception in 2014. The JeevanPramaan platform, introduced in 2021, further streamlined the process. The latest addition, Face authentication technology takes convenience to the next level. The 2023 campaign successfully covered 100 locations, facilitating the submission of over 1.47 crore DLCs. The current campaign expands to 800 locations nationwide, ensuring wider accessibility for pensioners across the country.

APFERWA launches large-scale rainwater harvesting initiative

To boost groundwater levels and conserve valuable rainwater

500-bed ESIC super specialty hospital in Amaravati soon

Proposed COC project at KGH delayed

Union Ministry of Tribal Welfare reportedly plans to establish COC at AIIMS now

PNS VISAKHAPATNAM

The proposed Centre for Comprehensive Care (COC) project intended for King George Hospital (KGH) in Visakhapatnam has been delayed, sparking calls for reconsideration from hospital authorities and patients. Initially, KGH was chosen to house the COC to serve healthcare needs across North Andhra districts. However, recent updates reveal that the Union Ministry of Tribal Welfare now plans to establish the COC at the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS) in Vijayawada, prompting concerns from experts and locals.

Healthcare professionals argue that Visakhapatnam, given its proximity to the North Andhra and Godavari regions,



is better suited to meet local healthcare demands. "Bringing the COC to Visakhapatnam will allow more immediate care to an underserved tribal population," stated a senior

KGH medical officer, noting that the current plan creates logistical challenges for patients needing critical care. Dr Anitha, a General physician at KGH, highlighted that the hos-

pital regularly treats around 100 tribal patients monthly for conditions like sickle cell anaemia. "These communities rely on accessible diagnostic tests and treatment nearby," she emphasised, underscoring the strain caused by travel to dis-

The government has allocated Rs. 6.50 crore for LAN support and Rs 50 lakh for diagnostic equipment, with KGH ready to set up a lab within its blood bank. "KGH has the infrastructure and skilled personnel to make the COC successful," noted the hospital's project coordinator, explaining that only equipment setup

remains. The Union Tribal Ministry's COC initiative aims to support sickle cell anaemia patients across India. In its report to the Ministry, KGH highlighted the urgent need for a COC in Visakhapatnam due to the high prevalence of the disease in ocal tribal areas, where regular transfusions are often necessary. "In tribal regions, sickle cell anaemia is widespread, and KGH is a crucial resource for these patients," explained Dr. Sivananda, Superintendent of KGH, adding that State support often falls short for comprehensive treatment.

Despite KGH's readiness, authorities have confirmed that the initial phase of COC centres will begin at AIIMS Vijayawada. This decision has disappointed KGH officials and locals who argue that establishing the centre in Visakhapatnam would address the unique healthcare challenges of the region. "We hope this decision will be reconsidered for the benefit of our patients," Dr. Sivananda expressed. The delay has intensified concerns about meeting the healthcare needs of North Andhra's underserved communities

1 lakh houses will be handed over to beneficiaries by end of Dec: Minister

Schools have also been instructed to collaborate with local police and cybersecurity experts to organise educational sessions. "These sessions will help students understand essential topics such as recognising and reporting cyberbullying, protecting personal information online, the importance of strong passwords and privacy settings, and identifying scams and phishing attempts," the circular read.

'Effects of premature birth could persist into adulthood'

Effects of being born prematurely could continue to affect an individual till they turn nearly 30 years of age -- 17 per cent could be less likely to enroll in a university, while 16 per cent less likely to graduate with a university degree, a new

study has found. Premature or preterm birth is said to affect about 10 per cent of all births globally and could account for one in every five child deaths.

The researchers, including those at The Hospital for Sick Children, Canada, looked at all live births in the country between 1990 and 1996, and followed the children for over two decades. About seven per cent of the births were preterm. Data on 24 lakh individuals was analysed.



born before 37 weeks of gestation -- preterm infants -were found to have lower levels of education and earn lower incomes through 28 years of age.

On an average, people prematurely born individuals at age 18-28 years was six per cent lower compared to those born at term




My first stop was the *Sun Temple*, an incredible historic site under the Archaeological Survey of India, which required an entry ticket for Rs. 35. Thankfully,

Tripura to start rationing petrol from today

The minister said two-wheeler owners will get petrol worth Rs 200 petrol per day from Sunday, while threewheelers will get Rs 400 worth of petrol and fourwheelers Rs 1000 worth of petrol per day. "Due to derailment of track between Lumding and Badar, there has been a steep reduction in the state's fuel stock. Therefore, the state will impose restriction on selling of fuel especially petrol from Sunday", he said in a Facebook post. Around 5 km of railway track was affected due to the derailment of a fuel tanker between Lumding and Badarpur section on October 31 which has impacted normal fuel supply to Tripura.

Trump's presidency may benefit India: Moody's

Donald Trump's presidency may see trade and investment flows diverting away from China as the US tightens investments in strategic sectors but this shift might benefit India and ASEAN countries, Moody's Ratings said. The November 5 election of

Trump as the next US President will likely materially shift its policies from those of the current Joe Biden administration. In a second Trump administration, Moody's expects large fiscal deficits, protectionist trade actions, climate-measure rollbacks, a stricter stance on immigration, and easing reg-

Trump is likely to pursue more aggressive immigration policies, including increased deportations, the construction of additional border bar-



riers, stricter visa regulations and reduced asylum grants. "Although aimed at reduc-

ing unauthorised immigration and prioritising legal immigration based on merit, they could lead to labour shortages in sectors that rely heavily on immigrant labour, such as agriculture, retail, hospitality, construction and healthcare," Moody's said in its comment on US presidential

About Trump's foreign policy, Moody's said in the Asia-Pacific region, trade and investment flows might be further diverted away from China as the US tightens investments in strategic sectors, which would negatively affect China's economy and consequently dampen region-

bating geopolitical divisions in the region, increasing risks of disruption to the global supply of semiconductors," it added.

It also aims to fly to a total of 55 destinations by the end of March 2025 and has also rationalised its network as part of Air India Group strategy. Apart from adding domestic routes, the Tata

CCI probe finds Zomato, Swiggy violating competition norms

PNS NEW DELHI

A Competition Commission probe has found that food delivery platforms Zomato and Swiggy indulged in unfair business practices, including alleged preferential treatment to some restaurant partners, according to sources.

The detailed investigation was ordered by the Competition Commission of India (CCI) in April 2022 and the probe report was submitted to the regulator earlier this

Under the norms, CCI Director General's report has been shared with the parties concerned and later, they will be called for hearings by the watchdog. After gathering all the views and explanations, the regulator will pass the final order. The decision to probe the two entities

had come on a complaint filed by the National Restaurant Association of India The sources said the probe has found that the two entities indulged in anti-com-

petitive practices, including allegedly extending preferential treatment to some restaurant partners. The report was submitted to the regulator earlier this year, they added.

Query sent on e mail to Swiggy remained unanswered while Zomato declined to comment.

'In order to properly protect the interests of the market, we have petitioned the High Court very recently in November 2024 to request CCI to grant us access to the report in its entirety," the association said in a statement. The total dispatch from captive, commercial coal mines during the period rose to 107.81 MT from 80.23 MT, it said. "The coal ministry is optimistic about reaching a production target of more than 170 million tonnes from captive and commercial coal blocks in 2024-25," the statement said.

hen we take antibiotics to treat infections, we generally focus on the benefits—clearing up bacteria and helping us recover. However, a growing body of research and firsthand experiences from patients suggest that these powerful medications might also have a hidden side effect: they could contribute to mood changes, including depression.

Take, for example, a patient recovering from a routine dental procedure who is prescribed antibiotics like clindamycin to prevent infection. While the procedure itself was straightforward, a few days into the antibiotic treatment, the individual begins to notice feelings of sadness, anxiety, and a sense of detachment emotions that are out of character for them. Initially, they chalk it up to the stress of recovery, but as the symptoms persist, they start to wonder whether the antibiotics might be to blame.

Dr. Rahul Rai Kakkar, Consultant Psychiatrist & Psychotherapist, Narayana Hospital, highlights, "Antibiotics, though critical for treating bacterial infections, have been linked to potential side effects on mental health, including depression. This connection is often surprising to patients, who may not realise that their gut and brain are intricately connected through what's called the gut-brain axis. The gut hosts trillions of bacteria, which not only aid digestion but also play a role in regulating mood and cognitive functions."

Certain medications have been connected to depression, points out Dr. Sushma Dharavath, mental health expert and psychiatrist.

According to research, she explains to us, "Taking one course of antibiotics from the penicillin group is linked to a 23% increased chance of developing depression. The risk increases by 40% after two sessions of penicillin and by 56% after five or more courses. The connection comes from the fact that altering gut flora has been linked to sadness.

Antibiotics, while eliminating harmful bacteria, also disrupt the balance of these beneficial bacteria in the gut microbiome, leading to what we call dysbiosis. Dysbiosis can impair the production of neurotransmitters like serotonin, dopamine, and GABA—chemicals that help regulate mood, sleep and stress responses. Low levels of these neurotransmitters are associated

with an increased risk of mood disorders, including depression. Meanwhile, Dr. Irfan KJ, Senior Consultant, Internal Medicine, SPARSH Hospital, highlights, "It is often observed that there is a complex interplay between our immune system, gut health, and mental well-being. While antibiotics are vital in fighting infections and bacterial diseases, their impact on the nervous system can be multifaceted. Antibiotics can alter the gut microbiome, which plays a critical role in regulating mood and cognitive functions through the gut-brain axis. One of the most concerning effects of antibiotics is their potential to contribute to depres-

However, his talents go beyond just upbeat tracks—his soulful compositions like *Main* Rahoon Ya Na Rahoon demonstrate his versatility in striking emotional chords. Amaal's musical journey began at a young age, assisting industry legends and then stepping into the limelight as a solo composer with *Jai Ho* in 2014.

His track record speaks volumes: whether it's an adrenaline-pumping anthem or a reflective melody, he knows how to craft songs that resonate with listeners across ages. His work isn't just about catchy tunes; it's about creating music that evokes real feelings. He has a knack for blending old-school musical influences with modern sounds, making each song feel both fresh and nostalgic. With every composition, he

doesn't just create music—he crafts the soundtrack to our lives, proving that a good melody can transcend time and trends.

The dynamic composer who's been behind some of Bollywood's most infectious dance anthems and heart-melting ballads has taken his music career to a whole new level with his latest track, Ami Je Tomar, for Bhool Bhulaiyaa 3. Known for creating hits that blend modern sensibilities with a nostalgic touch, Amaal is now venturing into a space he's never explored before—Indian classical music. In this candid chat, Amaal reflects on how Ami Je Tomar marks a turning point in his career, not just as a composer but as an artist who is constantly evolving.

For him, working on *Ami Je Tomar 3.0* was a monumental challenge. "This is a huge deal for me," he admits, excited yet reflective. His vision for this track was to honour its classical roots while still making it his own—a balancing act that he has always strived for in his decade-long career.

What's even more fascinating is how fate played a part in Amaal's involvement with this iconic song. He reveals that during the making of *Bhool Bhulaiyaa 2*, he casually played around with the melody of Ami Je Tomar, just as an experiment. "One evening, I wondered, 'What if I were to reimagine this song?' It was more of a 'what if' than a serious attempt," Amaal laughs. He never expected it to go anywhere, but when Preet Amda, the original composer, had to step aside due to prior commitments, Amaal found himself entrusted with the song-a serendipitous moment that turned into a musical milestone.

The responsibility of reinterpreting a Bollywood classic for *Bhool Bhulaiyaa 3* was no small feat, especially with the likes of Vidya Balan and Madhuri Dixit bringing their powerhouse performances to the screen. He explains, "The song is integral to the story—it's not just background music. It plays during key emotional moments, including a high-stakes dance-off and the climactic sequence. With such powerful actresses leading the scene, I knew I had to get it just right." His nine-month creative journey to breathe new life into Ami Je Tomar 3.0 shows

just how seriously he took this responsibility. "I don't often recreate songs, but when I do, I make sure to respect the original. I added a new stanza, but the soul of the song is untouched," Amaal says, proud of his delicate balance between staying true to the original and infusing his own signature style.

What makes this version of *Ami Je Tomar* stand out is not

just its classical elements but its timeless appeal. He has an uncanny ability to marry the old with the new, and it's a skill he's perfected over the years. "I'm lucky to be an 'old soul," he laughs, referencing his deep connection to melody and meaningful lyrics. His approach to music is one of continuity—preserving
the magic of timeless classics while adapting

them for modern ears. This duality is at the heart of his philosophy: melody and lyrics come first, always. "The goal is to create something that lasts," Amaal asserts. "Whether it's a new song or a recreation, I don't want my work to fizzle out after the promotional cycle.

His work on Ami Je Tomar 3.0 is a continuation of this love of creating songs that endure. It's a track that appeals to both young audiences and those who grew up with the original. His versatility is on full display in *Ami Je Tomar 3.0*, where he infused darker, deeper tones into the raags, aligning them with the horror elements of *Bhool Bhulaiyaa* 3. "The melody needed to carry the emotional weight of the film," he explains. This darker interpretation was not without its challenges, but director Anees Bazmee understood the vision and allowed him the creative freedom to experiment. He worked tirelessly with live instruments-tabla, dholak and strings—to give the track a warmth and authenticity that stands apart in an age of digital and AI-driven music production. "Eighty percent

of what you hear is real musicianship," he proudly notes. And this will to live, organic sound is something Amaal is eager to continue in his future work. "I'm working on an EP, something fresh and independent, the first of its kind for me," he teases, hinting at more surprises in store for his fans. In the meantime, Ami Je Tomar 3.0 is already making waves, with Shreya Ghoshal and Sonu Nigam's renditions adding a new layer of charm to the track. "The reaction has been amazing," Amaal says, pleased with the positive feedback from both the audience and critics.



While antibiotics are essential for treating infections, emerging research suggests they may have an unexpected side effect: mood changes, including depression. When antibiotics disrupt the balance of beneficial bacteria in the gut, this can lead to reduced production of these essential neurotransmitters. Consequently, the altered gut flora may con-

tribute to feelings of depression or anxiety in some patients. However, according to Dr. Kakkar, not all antibiotics affect

mental health to the same extent. Broad-spectrum antibiotics, such as fluoroquinolones (like ciprofloxacin) and macrolides (such as azithromycin), are particularly impactful because they target a wide range of bacteria, including both harmful and beneficial

types. With broad-spectrum antibiotics, the degree of microbial disruption in the gut is more pronounced, which can lead to more significant changes in mood and cognitive health. There is also evidence that long-term or frequent antibiotic use can lead to cumulative effects on the microbiome. This means that repeated courses of antibiotics over time could potentially increase the risk of depressive symptoms.

The side effects of antibiotics themselves—such as fatigue, gastrointestinal discomfort and general malaise—can also mimic or exacerbate depressive symptoms. "It's essential to recognize that the psychological effects of taking antibiotics may not only stem from the chemical changes in the body but also from the illness being treated and the treatment's physical toll. Patients often report feeling low or unwell during recovery from infections, leading to a temporary dip in mood," shares Dr. Irfan.

However, it's important to remember that the risk of depression and other mental health effects varies widely from person to person and depends on factors like age, lifestyle, pre-existing mental health conditions, and individual microbiome composition. For patients who must take antibiotics, there are wavs to mitigate these risks. Probiotics and fermented foods can help replenish healthy bacteria during and after antibiotic treatment, potentially reducing the mental health impact. Patients must talk with their doctor or pharmacist about using probiotics alongside antibiotic therapy. If you experience mood changes or depressive symptoms during or after antibiotic treatment, don't hesitate to speak to your doctor. Sometimes, small adjustments in diet, lifestyle, and probiotic support can make a significant

The importance of monitoring mood changes in patients undergoing antibiotic treatment should be more emphasised. Collaborative care involving primary care providers, psychiatrists, and nutritionists is crucial in managing these potential side effects effectively. Moreover, while antibiotics serve as a powerful tool against bacterial infections, we must remain vigilant about their broader implications, particularly concerning mental health. A holistic approach that considers both physical and psychological well-being is vital for optimal patient outcomes.

Should you avoid using antibiotics if you have depression?

Dr. Sushma, enunciating on the above, says, "It's best to discuss these concerns with a healthcare provider if you have a family history of depression, have experienced depression in the past, are currently experiencing depression or its symptoms, or are concerned about the risks of antibiotics because of a family history of depression (especially before you begin taking antibiotics). Telling a healthcare professional about your concern is an important safety measure for safeguarding your mental health while treating your physical health, even though it is likely that the consequences of not treating an infection will be worse than those of the treatment itself if your risk of depression is high."

HUMBLE BEGINNINGS IN HYDERABAD

Far from that, when I was born, my father, Anjan Kumar Yadav, had just started his political journey with the Congress party. We did not have a background in politics; my father was the first in our family to step into this field. Before he took that path, we were a family deeply rooted in traditional values, while engaged in dairy farming. I am the eldest one among four siblings; I have two sisters and a brother. My childhood was about hard work, dreams, and values—not the luxury or fame that people might imagine. Academics were never my strong suit; I was drawn more to sports and physical challenges, which I think came naturally to me because of phelwaans in the family.

CONTESTING AGAINST STATE BJP CHIEF

My first major contest was against the then-state president of the BJP Dr K Laxman in Musheerabad. When I contested, the situation was bad and the party was in not a good shape then. Despite putting in my best efforts, I did not secure a victory. I always thought my contest was with the BJP Telangana chief, but BRS won surprisingly. I lost to TRS but was ahead of BJP but I did give very good fight. Because of voting pattern, I lost. That defeat taught me resilience and reinforced my belief that setbacks are part of a larger journey. Each challenge brings new lessons and perspectives, making me more committed to my goals.

In my political journey, I have experienced both triumphs and setbacks. I have many police cases against me for doing political dharnas, protests among others.

I attended Ivy League Academy, a boarding school in Shamirpet, starting from the first grade. This experience taught me independence early on. Though I was not a top student, I always leaned towards sports and extracurricular activities, finding joy and purpose in the physical challenges they presented.
