NO PANACEA FOR COMMONERS AT AIIMS, DELHI

2018: A four-month-old infant whose parents brought her to the All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Delhi, for urgent surgery for a hole in her heart was given a slot for the corrective surgery operation in 2023, resulting in a five-year wait.

Fast forward to June, 2024: A six-year-old from Begusarai, Bihar, has been left waiting for a heart operation at the premier health institute for the past six years due to "dates changed thrice."

Despite the best efforts of his father, Ankit Kumar, who had been running from pillar to post gathering funds and blood, it was a long wait for treatment. However, it was only after the issue was highlighted in the media and the NHRC took suo motu cognisance that the hospital formed a panel to investigate the delays.

These are likely some of the longest waiting periods for patients at AIIMS Delhi and have been reported as such.

Welcome to India's most prestigious medical institution, established as the country's foremost centre of medical excellence. The bustling scene outside the hospital, with relatives of the patients lying by the roadside waiting for their turn outside the emergency wards, is a telling example of the stark disparity in healthcare access in the country.



While this flagship hospital draws thousands daily, it also highlights a critical shortage of specialist doctors and medical facilities both at the hospital and in rural areas, where the majority of India's 1.4 billion people struggle with the challenge of reaching distant healthcare facilities.

On Thursday, *The Pioneer* visited AIIMS Delhi and spoke with the relatives of ailing patients, most of whom were suffering from serious conditions like blood cancer, some of them admitted in the emergency departments while a few were waiting for their turn. The hospital is visited by around 20,000 patients daily from across various states, particularly populous ones like Bihar, Uttar Pradesh and Odisha, and even far-off States of North-East.

Take the case of 45-year-old Jagan Ram from Kanpur. He has been running from pillar to post to arrange blood for his ailing relative, Radha Gupta (24), who is suffering from blood cancer. "We came here yesterday. Radha has been in an emergency, and her blood counts have gone down. The doctors said they have arranged one unit of blood, and since she will need blood transfusions whenever it is low, we are now arranging donors."

Jagan Ram who lost his 18-year-old son to blood cancer a few years ago has a better understanding of the condition. "The doctors back home in Kanpur did not disclose the disease my son was suffering from. But now I have learned a lot about this health condition and what may come, I will ensure that this girl (Radha) does not meet the same fate."

People come here seeking advanced medical care, specialised treatment, and expert consultations that might not be available in their local hospitals. The reputation of AIIMS for its high-quality healthcare services, cutting-edge research, and a wide range of specialties contribute to its status as a go-to destination for many seeking comprehensive medical care.

But for Mammu, a 20-year-old youth from Jaganpura Kauch, Jalon in Uttar Pradesh, it has been a restless day as he silently writes in pain on a stretcher in the open with the weather behaving nastily. His attendant said he's having thick blood problem. "The concerned doctor is not here. So we have been asked to wait outside," said 40-year-old Jagat Singh, attending to the patient. The medical report showed that Mammu's hemoglobin level has shot up to 25, contrary to the normal 14-15 hb. He might be suffering from a disorder that causes the body to produce too many red blood cells. Yet another relative of a patient with co-morbidity such as TB and diabetes outside the emergency ward said he is trying for a 'recommendation' so that his ward could get a bed. This hospital has its own reputation, with doctors dedicated to their profession. This is what makes patients flock to this hospital, he said matter-of-factly.



SC reserves order on Arvind Kejriwal

The Supreme Court on Thursday reserved order on Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's separate pleas seeking bail and challenging arrest by Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) in the excise policy "scam". After concluding arguments from both sides, a bench of Justices Surya Kant and Ujjal Bhuyan said, "Thank you for the assistance. Judgment reserved."

Additional Solicitor General SV Raju represented the CBI and Senior Advocate Abhishek Singhvi appeared for the AAP chief. The apex court was hearing two separate petitions challenging his arrest by the CBI and the denial of bail in the corruption case filed by the agency.

The AAP convenor has challenged the August 5 order of the Delhi High Court dismissing his plea against his arrest by the agency. He has also filed a Special Leave Petition against the High Court's refusal to consider his bail plea. The CBI had arrested Kejriwal on June 26.

Questioning the maintainability of Kejriwal's pleas seeking bail and challenging his arrest, the CBI told the Supreme Court that he should have first approached the trial court for bail in the corruption case linked to the alleged excise policy scam. "He has approached Delhi High Court directly without going to sessions court. Under Section 439 of the Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC), both have concurrent jurisdiction. My preliminary objection is he must first go to trial court," ASJ Raju said.

The CBI did not issue a notice to Kejriwal under section 41A of the CrPC as he was already in judicial custody, he said. Raju said if the Supreme Court which grants bail to Kejriwal, it will demoralise the Delhi High Court, which had upheld his arrest. "Don't say that. Whatever order we pass, we will ensure nothing like that happens," the bench assured Raju.

REBEL TROUBLE FOR THE BJP IN HARYANA

A day after the BJP released its first list of 67 candidates for the October 5 Haryana Assembly elections, discontent among party leaders, including Ministers in the Nayab Saini Cabinet, flared up. Several leaders expressed their dissatisfaction, with several resigning from their posts on Thursday.

Among them were Haryana Energy Minister Ranjit Singh Chautala, Minister of State Bishamber Singh Balmiki, Ratia MLA Laxman Napa, former Ministers Karan Dev Kamboj, Kavita Jain, MP Savitri Jindal, MLA Lakshman Napa who had raised the banner of revolt. The rebel trouble for BJP started shortly after it came out with the first list of candidates as it left many sulking. Interestingly, the BJP has named former prison official Sunil Sangwan — who recommended parole for Dera Sacha Sauda chief and rape convict Ram Rahim six times — on its list of candidates for next month's Haryana Assembly election.

Sangwan will contest the Dabri seat which former BJP leader Somveer Sangwan won as an Independent in 2019 that was after the party favoured wrestler Babita Phogat over him. Energy and Jail Minister Ranjit Singh Chautala (79), son of former Deputy



Prime Minister Devi Lal said he took a decision after a meeting with his supporters and will now enter the fray as an Independent. Ranjit Chautala called a meeting of his supporters after the party ignored his candidature from Rania segment in Sirsa district. "I had good relations with them (BJP). They gave me the Lok Sabha ticket (from Hisar, which he fought unsuccessfully). But don't know on whose advice they have acted. I will say anyone who has given them this advice has caused damage to the party," Chautala said. "I am Chaudhary Devi Lal's son. I have some stature... I have decided to contest as an Independent," he said, while adding he has resigned as a Minister and quit the BJP. Chautala was hoping to contest from Rania seat but the BJP fielded Shishpal Kamboj instead.

Dhaka issues warning of discomfort with Delhi, if Sheikh Hasina speaks

Muhammad Yunus, the head of Bangladesh's interim Government, has said former Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina making political remarks from India is an "unfriendly gesture", asserting that she must remain silent to prevent the discomfort to both countries until Dhaka requests her extradition.

"If India wants to keep her until the time Bangladesh (Government) wants her back, the condition would be that she has to keep quiet," he said. In an interview with PTI at his official residence in Dhaka, Yunus, who was appointed the country's Chief Adviser after Hasina's ouster, stressed that while Bangladesh values strong ties with India, New Delhi must move "beyond the narrative that portrays every other political party except Awami League as Islamist and that the country will turn into Afghanistan without Sheikh Hasina."



try her. She is there in India and at times she is talking, which is problematic. Had she been quiet, we would have also forgotten it as she would have been in her own world. But sitting in India, she is speaking and giving instructions. No one likes it," he said. "It is not good for us or for India. There is discomfort regarding it," he told PTI. Yunus was apparently referring to Hasina's statement on August 13 in which she demanded "justice", saying those involved in recent "terror acts", killings and

vandalism must be investigated, identified and punished. This has been the only statement made by Hasina after she fled. It was posted on her US-based son Sajeb Wazed Joy's X handle. Following unprecedented anti-Government protests that peaked on August 5, Hasina resigned as Prime Minister and fled to India. Her presence in India for nearly four weeks has fuelled speculation in Bangladesh. When asked whether Bangladesh has communicated its stance to India, Yunus said it has been conveyed verbally and quite

firmly that she should keep quiet. "Everyone understands it. We have said quite firmly that she should keep quiet. This is an unfriendly gesture towards us; she has been given shelter there and she is campaigning from there. It is not that she has gone there on a normal course. She has fled following a people's uprising and public anger," he said. Yunus stated that the interim Government is committed to ensuring justice for the people of Bangladesh against the atrocities, and justice requires that she be brought back to the country. "Yes, she has to be brought back or else the people of Bangladesh won't be at peace. The kind of atrocities she has committed, she has to be tried in front of everyone here," he emphasised. Discussing the future of the India-Bangladesh relationship, Yunus expressed a desire for good ties with India but insisted that New Delhi must abandon the narrative that only Hasina's leadership ensures the country's stability.

Rural collides with urban Delhi over Lal Dora

The Delhi High Court has taken suo motu cognisance of the challenges faced by residents of Delhi's urbanised villages when it comes to the mutation (entry in revenue records) of their land. This development comes after Supreme Court judge, Justice Sanjiv Khanna, along with Acting Chief Justice, Manmohan, visited Jaunti village in North-West Delhi pursuant to an event organised by Delhi State Legal Services Authority (DSLISA) on August 10 focused upon addressing the multifaceted challenges faced by the remote and underdeveloped areas of Delhi.

During interaction with the judges, the villagers voiced concerns regarding the difficulties faced by them pertaining to mutation in the land records. They said they wished to get their immovable properties inherited from ancestors mutated in their names in the land records as per law, but mutation applications with all the necessary documents attached gather dust endlessly in the concerned departments despite persistent efforts over the years, the aggrieved villagers complained. Mutation is the process of changing the title of a property in the records of the local authorities. A Division Bench of Acting Chief Justice Manmohan and Justice Tushar Rao Gedela noted that the problem regarding the mutation of properties in Delhi's urbanised villages has persisted for the last two decades after these villages turned into urban



settlements. The bench has issued notices to the Land & Development Officer (L&DO) of the Ministry of Urban Development, Commissioner, Municipal Corporation of Delhi, Vice Chairman, Delhi Development Authority, Secretary (Revenue)/Development Commissioner, Delhi Government and Member-

Secretary, Delhi State Legal Services Authority. As against today's complex mutation process, a simple method known as Lal Dora was used in the past to demarcate the jurisdiction of a village on lands where populations resided. When the population increased and villagers got a homestead plot against their scattered agricultural land holdings under the

'chakbandi' scheme, the concept of extended Lal Dora was introduced. As a result, thousands of people living in the Capital city's villages, both rural and urban, do not have clear ownership rights to their properties since the 'abadi' area (the part of a village with residential structures when the rest is farmland) was earlier considered as one khasra, or plot of land. To add to their woes, despite the division of land among the members of extended families, the names of the next generation inheritors were never entered in the revenue records. In its order, the bench said "The absence of a documentation mechanism by land-owning agencies post-urbanisation disproportionately affects the urban poor."

Putin seeks Modi's intervention in Ukraine

He conveyed to Zelenskyy that both Ukraine and Russia should sit together without wasting time to end the ongoing war and that India was ready to play an "active role" to restore peace in the region.

Make flat possession hassle-free: LG to DDA

In an effort to make process of buying and taking possession of a Delhi Development Authority (DDA) flat a hassle free experience, it has started providing a plush folder containing all relevant papers printed out in a thicker bond. Earlier, the flat buyers would only get a piece of loose paper as 'possession letter' upon buying their flats, a statement officials said here on said.

It also said this initiative was taken by Delhi Lt Governor (LG) V K Saxena. The Lt. Governor, in his varied interactions, found the lack of 'papers' — their non-availability, them being disputed, them having got lost, etc. as one of the prime woes afflicting various individuals, groups and processes of DDA. He had accordingly



invited attention of the officials to the practice being followed by renowned builders in this regard. Accordingly, DDA has now decided to hand over the flat documents in a customized folder. The folder will contain all relevant documents that include demand-cum-allotment letter (DAL), payment receipt, possession letter (PL), NOC for water and electricity, possession Slip, RERA registration certificate and layout plan. This will facilitate getting all documents at one place rather than approaching various departments of DDA.

On directions of the Lt. Governor, the DDA has also introduced a new format of Possession Slip that has the picture of the flat buyer / allottee being handed over the possession letter at the site, printed on it.

directed DDA to prepare a folder containing not only possession letter but all relevant documents to be handed over to the buyers. While directly supervising the roll out of the DDA Housing Schemes since last year, Saxena had directed DDA to address this issue in a suitable manner. He has underlined that buying a house or property was an important, once in a life time occasion for most of the buyers and the same should be dealt as a special and memorable occasion for the buyer by the DDA. Heavy rain lashes city, commuters face knee-deep water

Heavy rains battered parts of Delhi and adjoining areas of Noida and Gurugram leading to waterlogging and traffic congestion in the city even as commuters struggled to wade through knee deep waters.

The incessant downpour led to waterlogging in the arterial junctions of the city. Areas including Mundka, Dhaura Kuan, Moti Bagh, Mehrauli-Badarpur road, Lajpat Nagar, Karol Bagh, Punjabi Bagh, Khanpur, ITO, Jahangirpuri, Safdarjung, Kashmere Gate ISBT and Okhla Estate were left inundated after the showers causing slow traffic movement.

According to the India Meteorological Department, city's primary weather station Safdarjung recorded 11 mm of rainfall, Ayanagar 53 mm of rainfall, Delhi University 23.5 mm of rainfall, Lodi road 7.8 mm of rainfall,



Narela 36 mm of rainfall, Palam 8 mm of rainfall, Ridge 17 mm of rainfall, Pitampura 6.5 mm of rainfall, Pragati Maidan 15.9 mm of rainfall, Pusa 0.5 mm of rainfall, Rajghat 15.9 mm of rainfall and Mayur Vihar's Salwan public school 6.5 mm of rainfall in the last 24 hours till 8 am on Thursday.

While commuters appreciated relief from humid weather and better air quality due to rains, they complained about huge traffic jams witnessed in different parts of the city. Delhiites travelling in the evening from their office back home said that they were left frustrated with civic infrastructure that they said collapses within minutes of rainfall in the national capital.

"Rain brings relief from heat and humidity but traffic jams spoil the mood. It spoils the fun of enjoying the weather completely, especially in Delhi," a commuter said.

Another one complained of potholes and waterlogging on

the roads while holding the government accountable for not solving the problems of the normal citizens. He said, "Repairing of existing high-ways, colonies, city roads are more necessary than making a new delhi- Mumbai highway costing 1,00 lakh crore. Public is already suffering due to heavy rain even as big potholes make daily life more risky. The government is not looking towards these problems. Delhi Noida traffic is the worst."

A commuter said that he covered five kilometers of stretch in an hour due to the rain. "Slight rain and everything falls apart. Total chaos, unruly behaviour, no traffic police to control and we talk about India's decade. All gimmicks. This is the capital of India," she said, adding that what was once smooth, well-maintained streets are now flooded after every rain, eroding the road surface and leaving behind a mess that the authorities have failed to address.

BJP slams AAP for politicising Teacher's Day by inviting Sisodia as chief guest

Former Delhi Education Minister and senior AAP leader Manish Sisodia on Thursday said a teacher's salary should be more than that of an IAS officer if India wants to evolve into a developed country by 2047. Meanwhile the Delhi BJP criticised the AAP for politicising the event by inviting former Deputy Chief Minister as a chief guest.

He made the remarks while addressing a 'Shikshak Samman Samaroh', organised by the Municipal Corporation of Delhi (MCD) on the occasion of Teachers' Day where 90 teachers were honored at Kedarnath Sahani Auditorium in Civic Center.

"Today, there is a lot of talk about India of 2047. The teachers who are sitting here today, the children you have with you are very important for 2047. The India of 2047 depends on these children. But even policy makers have to do something for them," Sisodia said.

Citing examples of Germany, Switzerland and a few other countries, he said, "In most developed countries, the



salary of teachers is more than the bureaucrats there. A teacher with five years of experience draws more salary than an IAS officer with five years of posting."

Talking about his incarceration in Tihar jail for 17 months in an excise policy-linked money laundering case, Sisodia said he spent eight to 10 hours every day reading books and learning about the education system of

different countries. "The last 1.5 years I was in difficult circumstances of my life. When we are in difficult circumstances, the lessons learnt by teachers are most useful. I studied a lot during this time. I used to read books for eight to 10 hours. Most of all, I read about education, India's education system, the world's education system," he said. Mayor Dr. Shelly Oberoi said that our intention is to

bring an education revolution in corporation schools on the lines of the Delhi government. "The dream of former Education Minister of Delhi Manish Sisodia was that corporation schools should also be on the lines of Delhi government schools. We sent the principals of corporation schools to prestigious institutes like IIM for training. Now we will send principals and teachers abroad for train-

ing, for which we have also passed a resolution from the House," she said.

Meanwhile the Delhi BJP Spokesperson Praveen Shankar Kapoor strongly condemned the AAP for politicizing the event by inviting Sisodia as the chief guest and accused AAP for breaking the sanctity of Teacher's Day. "Traditionally, the Education Minister in office, the Mayor, or some other high-ranking dignitary has graced the Teacher's Day ceremony of the Delhi Municipal Corporation as the Chief Guest. In 2023 as well, Education Minister Atishi was the Chief Guest of the Municipal Corporation's program," Kapoor claimed.

However, it is regrettable that this year, the Mayor politicized the Teacher's Day event by appointing AAP leader Manish Sisodia as the Chief Guest for the Delhi Municipal Corporation's Teacher's Day event," he alleged.

The Delhi BJP Spokesperson remarked that this is the first time in 47 years, since 1977, that Teacher's Day is being misused for political purposes in such a manner.

AAP Govt only one prioritising sending educators abroad: Atishi

Delhi Education Minister Atishi on Thursday said that the Kejriwal-led Government is the only one that prioritises sending principals and teachers abroad for advanced training, rather than ministers and officers.

Atishi, while addressing the audience at the Delhi State Teachers Awards on Teacher's Day, said that the Kejriwal government is the only one that sends principals and teachers abroad for training, rather than ministers and officers. She highlighted that over 400 principals and teachers have received training at prestigious institutions like Cambridge University, while 950 teachers have been trained at the National Institute of Education in Singapore and 1,700 teachers at IIM Ahmedabad.

"In 2015, when Arvind Kejriwal became the Chief Minister of Delhi, education was never the priority of any government. Government schools were in a bad condition. Every family used to think that even if we have to sacrifice our livelihood, we will take our children out of government schools and educate them in private schools," said Atishi.

The Education Minister said that when Arvind Kejriwal became the Chief Minister of Delhi in 2015, he took a pledge that whether a child is from a rich family or a poor family, every child of Delhi will get world class education.

"The result of this is that the Delhi government became the first government in the



country to double the education budget in the first year itself. The budget of Rs 5000 crore was increased to Rs 10,000 crore. Delhi became the first government in the country to consistently spend the largest part of its budget, almost a quarter, on education. Which no other government in the country has done till date," she said.

Reflecting on her own background, the minister said, "Both of my parents were teachers at Delhi University. I have a personal connection to this profession and understand the value of quality education."

She also emphasised the importance of respecting teachers and said, "We have elevated teachers to the position of gurus and they are key to shaping future generations."

Govt to focus on 21-point Winter Action Plan to combat pollution: Rai

Delhi Environment Minister Gopal Rai on Thursday said that the Government will focus on the 21-point Winter Action Plan, as pollution levels in the city peak during the cold months.

In a press conference, Rai said, "Like last year, the government is committed to addressing pollution, especially during the winter months when it peaks. This time, we will focus on new measures as part of the 21-point Winter Action Plan."

The 2024 Winter Action Plan will focus on different issues including hotspots, vehicle and dust pollution, work from home, stubble and garbage burning, industrial pollution, upgrading the war room and green app, dialogue with the central government and neighboring states, and preparation for odd-even and artificial rain as emergency measures.

"For the first time, drone monitoring will be done to reduce pollution at 13 hotspots. Also, a special task force will be formed. The departments con-



cerned have been instructed to submit their action plan on the winter action plan by September 12," Rai said.

A joint meeting was held with 35 key departments, including the Delhi Pollution Control Committee (DPCC), Delhi Police, Delhi Transport Corporation (DTC), Public Works Department (PWD), and Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC), among others. During the meeting, the officials discussed strategies to implement a more robust plan this year, Rai said.

He added that the Environment Department,

DPCC, MCD, Delhi Traffic Police, DDA and DSIIDC have been appointed as nodal agencies to do the monitoring work on hot spots.

"In preparation for the upcoming winter, the government has begun working on an enhanced version of its winter action plan. Last year, the government implemented a comprehensive 15-point action plan to reduce pollution," the minister said, adding that ever since the Kejriwal government came into power, there has been a noticeable reduction in pollution levels across the capital.

Minister only issuing statements on pollution instead of talking with Punjab Government, says BJP

Delhi BJP president Virendra Sachdeva on Thursday criticised the state Environment Minister and senior AAP leader Gopal Rai and alleged that he is only issuing statements on pollution instead of talking to the Punjab Government to stop stubble burning.

"It is clear that during the upcoming Delhi Assembly elections in January, winter pollution will be at its peak, and Minister Gopal Rai wants to portray that he made significant efforts," Sachdeva said. He added that the senior AAP leader is making statements every other day but is not revealing what discussions he has had

with neighboring states to control pollution. He said, "Any effort by the Delhi government to control winter pollution will only be meaningful if they work in coordination with the Punjab government to prevent stubble burning."

The Delhi BJP chief claimed that it is unfortunate that despite their repeated inquiries, Rai is not disclosing what discussions have taken place with the Punjab government regarding pollution and how they plan to stop stubble burning in Punjab.

"Gopal Rai should explain his action plan to control dust pollution on the roads, as this is also a major contributor to winter pollution," he asserted.

DoE instructs Govt schools to promote use of metro among teachers, students

The Directorate of Education has instructed Delhi Government schools to promote the use of Delhi Metro among students and teachers.

Heads of schools have been instructed to conduct activities such as guided tours to nearby metro stations and short metro rides to educate the students about benefits of public transport.

"All the heads of schools are directed to cooperate with the Delhi Metro Rail Corporation (DMRC) to educate students about the benefits of public transportation in fostering a sustainable future and promote the use of Delhi Metro services among school students and staff members," the Directorate of Education said in a circular on Thursday.

The schools have been advised to conduct 30-minute presentations or interactive



sessions on the benefits and use of metro services, either during morning assembly or as deemed fit.

The daily activities and classroom teaching should not be hindered during these activities, the circular said and noted that the privacy of the students and staff members should not be affected in the process.

A Kia Seltos car was found abandoned on the Geeta Colony flyover on Thursday morning with the police suspecting that its driver jumped into the Yamuna River.

According to the police, police are taking the help of divers to search for the car's driver. DCP North Manoj Kumar Meena said, "A PCR call was received at Kotwali police station at around 11:15 pm regarding a Kia Seltos car found abandoned on Geeta Colony flyover, heading towards Rajghat."

He added that it was found that the vehicle was of 46 years old Pawan Shah, a manager at



Indraprastha Power Generation Co. Ltd., who has been reported missing. "One of the car's windows was found shattered by a brick," Meena said.

On enquiry, it has been found that Shah left his office around 2:30 to 3 PM in his car without informing colleagues or family. "Calls from both his family and colleagues went unanswered after 7:20 PM. His last

known location was traced to Geeta Colony Flyover near his car," the DCP stated.

He added that a team of divers have been put in place to search the river. Further, the police also stated that a few eyewitnesses have seen a person jumping into the river. "Further enquiry is underway and legal action would be taken accordingly," he said.

Teams formed to nab bike-borne miscreants involved in fatal shooting

The Delhi police on Thursday formed several teams to nab the bike-borne miscreants who allegedly killed a property dealer and injured two others after opening fire in Outer Delhi's Narela area.

According to the police, the deceased has been identified as Manish, the owner of the Veer Properties, and the injured as Praveen and Kulbir. After the incident that took place on Wednesday night, the accused fled from the spot after opening fire indiscriminately.

A senior police officer said, "In the initial investigation, the motive behind the crime could be money and land

He added that the search for them is going on and said that Ashish is the owner of Shri

whom they fired several bullets. The miscreants knew who all were sitting in the office.

The police are trying to take statements of the injured. "Police have seized the footage of CCTV cameras from the crime scene, through which efforts are being made to identify the accused. Police have registered a case against the accused. Local police and special staff teams have been entrusted with the task of arresting the accused," another police officer said.

According to the information, Narela Police received a PCR call about firing on Gonda Road in Swatantra Nagar at around 8.15 pm. "Police reached the spot. Three injured were immedi-

ately admitted to the nearest hospital. Doctors declared one of them dead and said that the condition of his two companions was critical. They were shot from close range," he said.

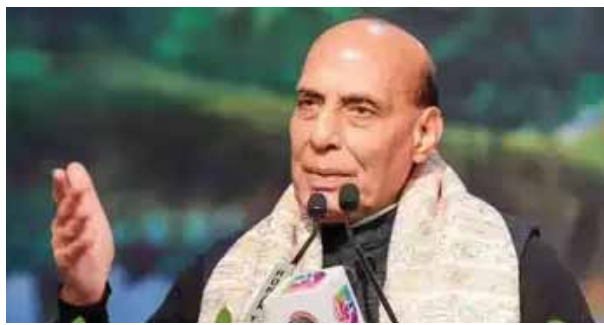
Further, the police added that according to the preliminary investigation, there was a heated argument between the victims and the accused over some money pending with the deceased.

India's move to build toilets has saved up to 70,000 infant lives annually: Study

India's initiative focused on building toilets has potentially saved up to 70,000 infant lives annually, a recent study published in the British journal 'Nature' has revealed, in a testament to the impact of the Prime Minister Narendra Modi's pet project, the Swachh Bharat Mission (SBM). The report was shared by the Prime Minister on Thursday stating that access to proper toilets plays a crucial role in reducing infant and child mortality. "The Mission is a country-wide campaign initiated by the Central Government on October 2, 2014, to eliminate open defecation and improve solid waste management. In a social media X, the Prime Minister posted saying that improved sanitation has



become a "game-changer" for public health in India. "Happy to see research highlighting the impact of efforts like the Swachh Bharat Mission. Access to proper toilets plays a crucial role in reducing infant and child mortality," Modi said. "Clean, safe sanitation has become a game-changer for public health. And, I am glad India has taken the lead in this," he added. The report "Toilet construction under the Swachh Bharat Mission and infant mortality in

India", said toilet construction increased dramatically across India following the implementation of the SBM in 2014 adding that the post-mission period in India exhibited accelerated reductions in infant and child mortality compared to the pre-SBM years. Researchers had analysed infant and under-5 mortality data from 35 states in 640 districts and came to the conclusion that "based on regression estimates, the provision of toilets at scale may have contributed to avert-

ing approximately 60,000 to 70,000 infant deaths annually." It added that the implementation of transformative sanitation programmes can deliver population health benefits in low and middle-income countries. This significant impact underscores the crucial role of improved sanitation in reducing infant and child mortality rates, highlighting the success of the program. The research delves into data spanning two decades, uncovering a significant link between improved sanitation and reduced child mortality. By examining changes in toilet access across the states, the study demonstrates how each 10-percentage-point increase in district-level sanitation correlates with marked declines in both infant and under-5 death rates, highlighting the mission's crucial role in advancing public health and saving lives.

Parliamentary Panel apprised of Waqf properties belonging to Ministries of Road Transport

The Parliamentary panel examining the Waqf (Amendment) Bill was on Thursday apprised of the Waqf properties in the National Capital Region and those on the land parcels belonging to the Ministries of Road Transport and Railways. Urban Affairs and Road Transport Secretary Anurag Jain and Anil Kumar Khandelwal, Member Infrastructure, Railway Board, along with the officials from the respective Ministries made presentations to the Joint Committee on the Waqf (Amendment) Bill. "The officials of the Urban Affairs Ministry briefed the panel on the land acquisition process undertaken by the then British Government in 1911 to build the city of Delhi. "Parliamentary sources said there were heated moments during the meeting when the

officials of the Urban Affairs Ministry were unable to respond to questions from members on the land acquisition process undertaken by the British administration. "There were also attempts to suppress certain information," claimed an Opposition member of the Committee chaired by BJP member Jagadambika Pal. Parliamentary sources said DMK member A Raja pointed out that a Waqf Act was passed in 1913 and there was no mention of it in the presentation by the Urban Affairs Ministry about it. "According to the presentation by the Ministry, the Waqf Board made claims between 1970 and 1977 on 138 properties that were acquired for building New Delhi by the British Government. "A total of 341 sq km of land was acquired to build the National Capital region and due compensation was paid to the affected persons, a claim that was contested by the members.

India takes part in heads of Asia Coast Guards meet

Indian Coast Guard (ICG) participated in the 20th Heads of Asian Coast Guard Agencies Meeting (HACGAM) from September three to four at Incheon, South Korea. During the meeting, various issues of significance, such as maritime law enforcement, safety and security of life at sea, marine environment protection, illicit trafficking of drugs, weapons and humans and future cooperation were discussed, Defence Ministry said here on Thursday. On the sidelines of the HACGAM, the 12th annual bilateral meeting between ICG and the Korea Coast Guard was also held on Wednesday under the provisions of the MoU signed between the two agencies in March 2006. "The meeting focused on augmenting operational-level interaction and capacity building in the areas of maritime search and rescue, pollution

response and law enforcement. "The HACGAM primarily focuses on fostering cooperation between the Coast Guards of the member Asian states to ensure and promote safe, secure and clean seas in the region. It is an independent forum with 23-member Coast Guard Agencies and also two associate members in the form of Regional Cooperation Agreement on Combating Piracy and Armed Robbery against Ships in Asia (ReCAAP) and United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC). "It comprises four Working Groups to enable a focused and goal-oriented approach towards coordinated response & synergy towards common maritime issues.



India, Saudi Arabia hold 6th defence cooperation meet

In an effort to further strengthen their bilateral defence ties, India and Saudi Arabia conducted the sixth edition of Joint Committee on Defence Cooperation (JCDC) meeting in Riyadh, Saudi Arabia on Wednesday, defence ministry said here on Thursday. The MoU on Defence Cooperation provides a framework for defence collaboration between the two countries. Joint Defence Cooperation Committee is an institutional mechanism under the MoU to promote the objectives of defence cooperation. "The Indian delegation, led by Joint Secretary Amitabh Prasad, included officials from the Ministry of Defence. The meeting was co-chaired by Major General Salman Bin Awadh Al-Harbi from the Saudi Arabia delegation.

Meghalaya bans two-finger test to confirm rape

The Meghalaya Government has informed the Supreme Court that it has prohibited the 'two-finger test' which was conducted to determine whether a survivor of rape or sexual assault was habituated to sexual intercourse. The State Government told the apex court that a circular dated June 27, 2024, was issued by the Health and Family Welfare Department of Meghalaya prohibiting the test and disciplinary action will be taken for non-compliance. A bench of Justices J B Pardiwala and Sanjay Karol, which referred to a top court's order passed on May 7, noted that the apex court had strongly deprecated the practice of conducting a 'two-finger test'. "Amit Kumar, the Advocate General appearing for Meghalaya, has tendered a circular dated June 27, 2024, issued by the Government of Meghalaya, Health and Family Welfare Department. This circular has been issued prohibiting the 'two-finger test' and also disciplinary action for its non-compliance," the bench said in its September 3 order. The bench passed the order while dismissing a petition filed by a convict who had challenged the Meghalaya High Court's verdict delivered on March 23 last year. The high court had affirmed his conviction for the offences punishable under the provision of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act. The bench noted that the convict was sentenced to 10 years for the offence. In a judgement delivered in October 2022, the apex court deprecated the "regressive" and "invasive" practice of the 'two-finger test' on rape survivors and said it has no scientific basis and instead re-victimises

women who may have been sexually assaulted, and was an affront to their dignity. In its order passed on September 3, the top court referred to the circular issued by the Meghalaya Government. "The Supreme Court of India and the Ministry of Health and Family Welfare have prohibited the practice of conducting the two-finger test (TFT) on survivors of sexual assault. This practice is scientifically baseless, traumatising, and violates the survivor's dignity and rights," the circular said. "All Government doctors and medical practitioners in the State of Meghalaya are hereby directed not to conduct the two-finger test on survivors of sexual assault. Adherence to this directive is mandatory for all Government medical personnel," it said. The circular further said any doctor found conducting the test will be held guilty of misconduct and strict disciplinary action will be initiated in accordance with the Meghalaya Discipline and Appeal Rules, 2019. It said the survivors of sexual assault must receive compassionate, respectful and sensitive care, including psychological support and counselling services. "We hope and trust that the circular referred to above issued by the State of Meghalaya is implemented and abided in its letter and spirit. We hope that in future we may not have to once again condemn the State of Meghalaya for such a serious lapse," the bench said.

Frequent mobile phone use linked to increased risk of cardiovascular diseases: Study

Do you spend hours glued to your smartphone, whether for social media or work? It's better if you reassess your habits. For, a new study published in Canadian Journal of Cardiology has suggested that frequent mobile phone use is linked to an increased risk of cardiovascular diseases (CVD), particularly among current smokers and individuals with diabetes. The study is particularly relevant for India, where, as of January 2024, there were 1.12 billion mobile connections, encompassing 78 per cent of the country's population. Study author Dr Yanjun Zhang from Nanfang Hospital,

Southern Medical University, China, warned that, "Given the pervasive nature of mobile phone use, understanding its health impacts is crucial. Radio-frequency electromagnetic fields (RF-EMF) from these devices can disrupt the hypothalamic-pituitary-adrenal axis, cause inflammation, and induce oxidative stress. This can affect heart health and blood vessels. However, the precise connection between mobile phone use and CVD remains uncertain." His colleague and co-investigator Dr. Ziliang Ye echoed similar views. "We found that regular users face a significantly higher risk of developing these conditions compared to those who use their phones less frequently."



The research, which analysed data from 444,027 individuals in the UK Biobank with reported mobile phone use from 2006 to 2010, defined regular use as making at least one call per week. Over a median follow-up period of 12.3 years, the study assessed incidences of stroke, coronary heart disease, atrial fibrillation, and heart failure, while also exploring the

role of sleep patterns, psychological distress, and neuroticism. Co-investigator Xianhui Qin, MD, emphasised that poor sleep patterns and mental health issues could exacerbate the risk of cardiovascular diseases through disrupted circadian rhythms, endocrine and metabolic disturbances, and increased inflammation. "Chronic RF-EMF exposure from mobile phones, combined with smoking and diabetes, may further amplify this risk," Dr Vivek Shama, Associate consultant cardiologist, Fortis Greater Noida who though not connected with the study, agreed. "Yes, we do agree that mobile phone usage can adversely

affect heart health. Excessive use of mobile phones, particularly during long conversations, exposes the body to high-frequency magnetic field waves. These waves can interfere with the heart's function, leading to symptoms such as palpitations, dizziness, headaches, and even heart arrhythmias in some cases. We've particularly observed this in individuals who frequently use devices like EarPods. Although companies claim that these devices are safe, excessive usage can still result in complications for both the heart and brain," he said. Additionally, sleeping with your phone nearby can lead to headaches, migraines, and potentially other health issues.

It is essential to minimize screen time, especially before bed, Sama warned and cautioned that excessive phone use, especially among the younger generation, can lead to insomnia, anxiety, and stress. "This is largely due to the constant engagement with virtual platforms, which can result in unhealthy comparisons with others, leading to mental health issues. Prolonged screen time also reduces physical activity, contributing to obesity, particularly in children who are often given phones as distractions," he said. "Phones should be kept away while sleeping, and screen time should be minimized, particularly first thing in the morning," he suggested.

After Mollywood, MeToo surfaces in Kerala politics

The Me Too fusillade that has literally sent actors and movie makers in Kerala for cover has tightened its hold over politics. A woman senior Congress leader Simi Rosebell John who alleged that she did not get prominence in the party because of her refusal to yield to the demands of Leader of Opposition V D Satheesan finds herself expelled from the primary membership of the party. But Simi disclosed the names of a group of women leaders including Padmaja Venugopal who left the party or suffer silently by continuing in the GOP as victims of Me Too phenomenon in the State's Congress party. This is the first such disclosure that shook the Congress party in Kerala though senior leaders like K C Venugopal and Haiby Eden have been named by the solar scam accused Sarita Nair as persons who have tormented her. In the case of Venugopal, she has reportedly used harsh words while Eden has been portrayed as a chocolate hero



by the lady. Similarly, Shobhana George, a two-time MLA of the Congress party was eased out by the leadership and she had no other way but to embrace the CPI(M). The CPI(M) stands out as the party with maximum number of Casanovas and this has been stated by none other than late V B Cherian, who had served as the all India secretary of the party's trade union wing CITU. P K Sasi, the former MLA from Shornur whom the media describes as a modern day Romeo in the party is "famous" for his escapades. Many party insiders have demanded the ouster of Sasi from the post of Kerala State Tourism Development Corporation as his name figures regularly in cases of

sexual abuse. This could be the result of the Nair v Eezhava fight in the party," said a source close to P K Sasi. K M Shajahan, who had served as secretary to former chief minister V S Achuthanandan, told The Pioneer that film actor Mukesh, who is an accused in sexual abuse case filed by actresses is a notorious character. "His first wife Sarita, herself a lead artist in South India, has said in a TV interview how Mukesh had kicked her regularly when she was pregnant with his child. "Saritha was weeping uncontrollably while recounting her experiences as Mukesh's wife and she was chased out of her house by Mukesh. I feel pity for the CPI(M) leaders who could not find an effective candidate to

fight the assembly election," said Shajahan. The disclosure by Simi Rosebell is sure to dampen the prospectus of Satheesan's chance of becoming the next chief minister of the State that goes to the polls in 2026. There are strong contenders like Ramesh Chennithala, Sasi Tharoor, K Muraliedharan, Venugopal and K Sudhakaran. The 2001-2006 UDF Government led by A K Antony and Oommen Chandi suffered a major setback as the then Industries Minister and Muslim League leader P K Kunhalikutty came under attack for allegedly molesting a woman hailing from Kozhikode. Even BJP leaders in the State are not free from allegations of misdemeanor against young and middle-aged women. Politics and cinema make strange bedfellows but in matters of man's age old instinct, they are the same one. Former Prime Minister P V Narasimha Rao had mentioned this aspect in his novel The Insider (1998), based on real life incidents faced by Rao in his political career.

Central team begins tour of flood-hit districts in Andhra

An inter-ministerial team from the Central government on Thursday began its visit of the flood-affected districts in Andhra Pradesh. The team headed by Sanjeev Kumar Jindal visited Vijayawada, the worst affected place, to estimate the losses and destruction, said an official press release. The Central team visited the State Emergency Operations Centre in the Andhra Pradesh State Disaster Management Authority (APSDMA) office in Tadepalli, where officials explained about the torrential rains and floods. Later, the officials also visited Prakasam Barrage, which was recently hit by three large drifting boats, damaging a concrete beam. As the flood waters began to recede at many places here, personnel of the Vijayawada civic body are busily engaged in sanitation work and also restoring water supply, an official said on Thursday. However, Vijayawada Municipal Commissioner HM Dhyanchandra said people must refrain from drinking the restored



municipal tap water at the moment as it was not in a potable. "Today, we are focusing on municipal water resumption and sanitation. By today evening, the water supply will be restored. But they (people) cannot drink water because there will be a lot of silt," Dhyanchandra told PTI. He said the civic body will launch a campaign to dissuade people from drinking tap water. On Wednesday, Chief Minister N Chandrababu Naidu said water supplied by the municipality should not be used for the first two days at least as it has to be tested

for quality, considering its muddied nature due to the unprecedented deluge. He said the authorities will inform people after carrying out tests but hinted that it 'could' be used for bathing purposes. Meanwhile, drinking water is also being supplied to the flood-hit areas through water tankers and several people were seen collecting it in containers. Around 200 tankers are supplying drinking water. Further, the municipal Commissioner noted that flood water had 'receded largely' and 80 per cent of the flood-affected areas were

accessible, except some wards in and around Nunna area. "There is no more information that (water level) Budameru will increase...The Irrigation Department is also trying to close the Budameru breach," he said, adding that civil supplies could begin distribution of provisions from Friday. A resident of Ajit Singh Nagar, the worst-affected area, told PTI that many people returned to their homes as flood water had receded. As several neighbourhoods have become accessible, Dhyanchandra said sanitation work is underway at a brisk pace, supplemented by 6,000 workers from about eight districts to bolster the local effort. Excise Minister K Ravindra on Thursday visited Jakkulanekkalam village in Gannavaram mandal of Krishna district, where the swollen Budameru rivulet inundated thousands of acres. Along with Gannavaram MLA Y Venkata Rao, he toured the flooded areas on boats and tractors. Flood waters reached up to 4-ft on the road there, said an official statement.

Haryana Assembly elections: Several leaders unhappy with ticket denial

After BJP released its first list of 67 candidates for the Haryana Assembly elections on Wednesday, dissatisfaction has intensified across the State. Some party leaders quit the party after being denied tickets. BJP State Vice President GL Sharma, along with his supporters on September 6, quits the party, claimed that only one person was distributing tickets in Haryana. Sharma is likely to join Congress along with supporters. While speaking to The Pioneer Sharma said, "Only one person in the party is distributing the ticket. I have met Congress MP from Rohtak Deepender Hooda and will soon join Congress without any promise." Sharma became angry after he failed to get a ticket as BJP had fielded Mukesh Sharma from the Gurgaon seat. Another BJP leader, Naveen Goyal, BJP's business cell's state convener along with his support, has also resigned



from all the party posts with immediate effect. Mukesh Sharma was declared as the candidate from the Gurgaon constituency, after which Naveen Goyal took a rebellious stance and announced to contest the election as an independent. Naveen Goyal said that this was not his own decision but the voice of the people of Gurgaon. While addressing a press conference on Thursday, Naveen Goyal said, "He has engaged in the service of the party since the beginning. For seven years, he has been engaged day and night to serve the people of Gurgaon and propagate the party's policies but the party ignored his services." "The voters of Gurgaon constituency love me a lot. On

October 5 poll day, the people of Gurgaon constituency will cast their vote in my favour and allow me to Chandigarh," he told The Pioneer. Naveen Goyal said that only the love of the people will make me win and take me to Chandigarh. The party has fielded Mukesh Sharma from the Gurgaon constituency, replacing sitting MLA Sudhir Singla. The saffron party declared tickets for 67 of the 90 seats, including 3 constituencies in the Gurugram district, denying nominations to two sitting MLAs — Kunwar Sanjay Singh from Sohna and Sudhir Singla from Gurgaon. The BJP has nominated former minister Rao Narbir Singh from Badshahpur seat, Mukesh Sharma from Gurgaon, and former MLA Tejpal Tanwar from Sohna, Pataudi (SC reserve), is yet to be decided. Satya Prakash Jrawata is a sitting MLA from Patudi's seat. Meanwhile, the Congress is yet to release its list for the upcoming Haryana Assembly election.

Ramanathaswamy temple will help realise vision of Ek Bharat: CM Yogi

19-year-old woman raped, murdered in Bidar district, three people arrested

A case of rape and murder has been registered after the body of a 19-year-old woman was found with multiple injuries days after she went missing from her home at Gunateerthawadi village in this district of Karnataka, police said on Thursday. Three people have been arrested in connection with the incident which allegedly happened on August 29, they said. She was allegedly killed after being hit on her head with a stone and later her body was dumped in the bushes, police said, adding, they suspect she was sexually assaulted. However, investigators are awaiting medical reports for confirmation. The victim was missing since August 29 and her parents lodged a complaint at Basavakalyana police station two days later, police said. "We registered a missing case and we started investigating. On September one, her body was recovered with multiple



injuries on her body including head. We registered a case of murder initially and the accused were unknown. Then based on the technical evidence, we started searching for the accused and we found three people who were in contact with her on the day of her disappearance," a senior police officer said. One of them, who also hails from the same village, was in direct contact with her. "So, we picked the accused and during interrogation, he

confessed to murdering her. During interrogation, he said that he went along with two others who were guarding him from far away during the incident," he said. "All three accused involved in the incident have been arrested. We are waiting for the medical reports of the victim. She sustained head injuries among other injuries. On suspicion of sexual assault and based on interrogation, we have added sections of rape in the FIR," he said.

Ensure leave applications of prisoners processed scrupulously as per rules: HC to TN DGP

The Madras High Court has directed the Director General of Prisons to issue consolidated instructions to all the subordinate prison authorities to ensure that the leave applications filed by or on behalf of the prisoners were processed scrupulously in accordance with the rules and decisions were taken within a period of 28 days as contemplated under Rule 24(5) of the Tamil Nadu Suspension of Sentence Rules, 1982. In a recent order, a division bench comprising Justices S M Subramaniam and N Senthil Kumar said failure in complying with the Tamil Nadu Suspension of Sentence Rules, 1982 regarding adherence of time limit contemplated was to be construed as lapse, dereliction of duty or negligence, as the case may be and appropriate disciplinary actions were to be initiated against the officials who all were responsible for such misconduct. The bench said the writ petitions filed prematurely before expiry of the statutory time limit of 28 days as contemplated under the Tamil Nadu Suspension of Sentence Rules, 1982 were not entertainable for grant of ordinary leave. Applications for emergency leave were to be considered forthwith by the competent authority

without causing any delay. An order of rejection of leave application would provide a cause for instituting the writ petition challenging the same, the bench added. The bench gave the above directives while disposing of a petition filed by Usha, wife of Karthi, a convict prisoner confined in Vellore Prison, seeking a direction to the authorities to grant 28 days ordinary leave to her husband. The bench said in the present case, the petitioner filed an application seeking leave on June 27, 2024. The writ petition was filed on July 15, 2024, even before the date of expiry of the statutory period as per the rules to dispose of the leave petition by the competent authority under the Tamil Nadu Suspension of Sentence Rules, 1982. Thus, the present writ petition was premature on the date of filing. "However, we are inclined to take an exception in the present case, since during the pendency of the present writ petition, the statutory period expired and again remanding the matter became unnecessary", the bench added. Pointing out the submission of the Additional Public Prosecutor that the prisoner was eligible for ordinary leave for 21 days, the bench granted ordinary leave for 21 days commencing from September 6, 2024 with certain conditions to the convict prisoner.

Lightning strikes claim 1,625 lives in Odisha in last 5 years: Minister

Odisha reported 1,625 deaths due to lightning strikes in last five years, state Revenue and Disaster Management minister Suresh Pujari told the state Assembly on Thursday. Replying to a question by BJP legislator Tankadhar Tripathy, the minister said a total of 1,625 people have been killed by lightning strikes across the state during 2019-20 and 2023-24. While 372 persons were killed due to lightning strikes during the financial year 2019-20, 338 such death cases were reported



in 2020-21 and 294 during 2021-22. The state has reported 334 lightning death cases in 2022-23 and another 287 such death cases during 2023-24, Pujari said in a written reply to the House. During the discussion on the question, the minister said the

state recorded the highest lightning-related fatalities in the country during the period, adding that states with higher mineral deposits tend to record more lightning fatalities because minerals are good conductors of electricity. As per the statement of the minister, the lightning death cases were registered in all 30 districts of Odisha. A maximum of 151 people were killed due to lightning strikes in tribal-dominated Mayurbhanj district, followed by Ganjam district, where 114 people lost their lives due to the natural disaster.

Keonjhar, the home district of Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi and Balasore district each reported 111 lightning deaths during these five years while Boudh district witnessed 14 such death cases, which is the lowest in the state, he stated.

Photo emerges showing Renukaswamy pleading for life before murder

A day after police filed a chargesheet against Kannada actor Darshan Thoogudeepa and other accused in the Renukaswamy murder case, a photograph of the victim pleading for life emerged on social media on Thursday. "Fear writ large on a shirtless Renukaswamy's face as he stared at the camera, the image is a tell-tale about the trauma he endured as he was given a torturous death," a police official said, adding, several injury marks are also seen all over his body. In another picture, the victim is seen lying on the ground



near a parked truck. According to police sources, he was beaten up with clubs, given electric shock in his private parts, and thrown against the wall leading to multiple fractures. The chargesheet filed on Wednesday has the forensic

report which confirms that Renukaswamy's blood stains were found on Darshan's clothes, the sources said. Darshan along with his friend Pavithra Gowda and 15 others, who are accused in the case, are currently under judicial custody in different prisons in the state. According to police sources, 33-year-old Renukaswamy, a fan of the actor, had sent obscene messages to Pavithra, which enraged Darshan, allegedly leading to his murder. His body was found near a stormwater drain next to an apartment in Sumanahalli here on June nine.

IC-814: Lessons beyond the binary

The web series 'IC-184: The Kandahar Hijack' has reignited debate over the moral and strategic dilemmas faced during hostage crises

Web series IC-184: The Kandahar Hijack, has triggered debate on the complexities and 'greys' that accompany such incidents. Beyond obvious things like the lack of coordination, responsiveness or even allowing the flight to take off from Amritsar — one important query is if India did wrong in negotiating with terrorists. Given the handiwork of these released terrorists in the subsequent terror attacks, the question acquires even gravity. However, beyond the simplistic and binary 'yes' or 'no' position that is often postulated in the argument, lies the necessity of nuance in attempting to answer the same. It is universally agreed that negotiations with terrorists are a bad idea, however, sometimes, the consequences of not negotiating can have far more debilitating and costly consequences.

Sifting the wheat from the chaff of the supposed 'no-negotiation' stance of some countries (as often banded) is important. It is frequently argued that countries like Israel or the United States of America do not negotiate with terrorists. It is further claimed that because of such an unbending posture, the Israelis and Americans avoided being taken as hostages. But such beliefs are untrue, misplaced, and belie the wheels-within-wheels of the American or Israeli reality, beyond the publicly stated position of 'no-negotiation'.

It is the worst-kept secret that such countries have funnelled money through proxies, 'friendly countries', or even masked the same as 'aid' to secure their citizens, whilst maintaining the official stance. The Iran-Contra affair (1981-86) during the Reagan era wherein American hostages held by the Lebanese group, Hezbollah, were exchanged for weapons for Hezbollah itself, exemplifying the deals cut beyond the public gaze. As recently as 2014, the Americans had released five Taliban prisoners from Guantanamo, to secure an American hostage.

Last August, the United States is believed to have unfrozen \$6 bil-



lion of Iranian funds in South Korean banks to secure the release of five US citizens. It is now argued that the same money could have been invaluable for the cash-strapped Iranians (widely believed benefactors of Hamas) in launching the subsequent '7th Oct' attack on Israel. Israelis themselves are the masters of the backdoor negotiations, irrespective of the belligerent stand adopted for public consumption. In the Gilat Shalit (Israeli prisoner) exchange of 2011, it is believed that Israelis released 1027 prisoners who were held in jails. Even now as the bludgeoning of the Gaza Strip continues, the Israelis in parallel (and in support of the Biden administration) are still negotiating with Hamas for the release of their citizens held hostage. Often, the aggrieved government can end up losing a lot of leverage and lives when they refuse to engage with bad actors. Negotiations help immediate outcomes, buy crucial time for alternate reactions, and most importantly, help establish critical information and 'leads' about the captors that could be invoked, productively. Lastly, a well-managed ransom payoff (with 'marked' bills and telltale trails) can also lead to discovering broader networks and bases to take down the terror infrastructure, subsequent-

ly. Negotiations or engagement does not have to be tantamount to surrender or even a 'bad deal', necessarily. From the post-released activities of the three terrorists in the IC-814 case, it was a costly 'deal' — but was there an alternative? The hijacked plane was parked in the backyard of Pakistani ISI's supported Afghan base (at least then) with 158 precious lives (not including the 5 terrorists). The terrorists in this case (under the direct supervision of the ISI and Taliban) were not exactly known to be reasonable, and if anything, had given a glimpse of their intent with the brutal and fatal stabbing of passenger, Rupin Katyal. Even an Entebbe-like commando operation using Indian Special Forces was impractical and fraught with additional risks. With the clear intention of harming Indian interests without an iota of any fear of getting caught (given the location) — the risk to the lives of all passengers and crew of IC-814 was not possible, but imminent. The calculation and opportunities would have been far more creative with possible solutions, had IC-814 been held up in Amritsar, as opposed to Kandahar. Could India have forsaken the lives of its citizens? Has any other country ever forsaken lives in similar circumstances? Did the USA attempt negotiating with the Iranian

authorities when its Embassy staff was held hostage or did it steadfastly hold to the 'no-negotiation' posture? The 'no-negotiation' is more of an ideal, but a fuzzy line, practically. It is a deterring policy but has never been an ironclad law, anywhere in the world. However, countries like Israel (or even India) do convey behaviorally is the guarantee of serious reprisals and redeeming their losses.

For example, 'Operation Hot Pursuit', the cross-border operation against NSCN-IM in Myanmar 'normalised' the expectation for bad actors, hereinafter — this, when done systematically, surgically and purposefully conveys solid sovereign intent. So, there is no silver bullet or inviolable guardrails in tackling terror, except adapting and responding according to the situation, whilst ensuring the overall objectives are not lost to inflexibility, weakness, or indecision. IC-814 was indeed a lapse of immense proportion but the complexities of the eight-day ordeal necessitated negotiations in that specific case, as insisting any other way is easier said than done, as instructed by history anywhere in the world. 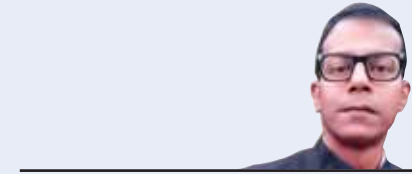

INDIA BOLSTERS 'ACT EAST' POLICY

PM Modi's Brunei visit highlights India's commitment to strengthening ties in Southeast Asia

Prime Minister Modi is wasting no time in walking the talk as far as his foreign policy goals are concerned. This week, with a clear focus on Look East policy the Indian PM was in Brunei and Singapore. The Brunei visit was the first state visit by an Indian PM, after establishing diplomatic relations in 1984. The Indian Mission in Brunei came nearly a decade later in 1993. PM Manmohan Singh had visited Brunei Darussalam in 2013 to attend multilateral meetings of ASEAN and East Asia Summit. Highlighting the importance of the first bilateral visit to Brunei, India's High Commissioner Alok Amitabh Dimri, told news agency ANI "In our four decades of diplomatic relationship, this is the first bilateral official visit by the Prime Minister of India to Brunei Darussalam. It is a historic moment in our bilateral relationship and also for the Indian community in Brunei Darussalam that high-level bilateral engagement between Prime Minister Shri Modi and His Majesty the King is going to take place. This visit is historic in many ways that Brunei and India have been civilizational neighbours as you know that India shares deep historical roots and bonds with Southeast Asia. The Malayan tradition of this geography which is located in the Borneo Island of Southeast Asian Seas derives deep linkages be it, linguistic, anthropological, ethnic, architectural, religious motives, customs and traditions, norms from India, South India." Defence relations between the two countries have been on an upward trajectory since the establishment of formal diplomatic ties.



There have been several official-level defence exchanges and visits of navy, coast guard ships and joint exercises. India has MoU in defence sector with Brunei till 2026. Several Indian Navy ships and coast guard ships such as INS Rana, INS Airavat, INS Shivalik & INS Kadmat, and Samudra Pahereda to name a few, have been in Brunei waters, given the maritime security concerns. The trade relations between the two countries are not what one can boast of, however, it is of strategic importance.

The recently concluded Brunei trip by the Indian PM has enhanced and deepened the partnership between the two countries. The joint statement issued after the leader's meeting stated "Both leaders held discussions for enhancing cooperation on a wide range of issues including defence, connectivity, trade and investment, energy including renewables, space, ICT, health and pharmaceuticals, education and capacity building, culture, tourism, youth and people-to-people exchanges, as well as regional and international issues of mutual interest." However, the real area of cooperation would be in maintaining international rules of law deep in the Indian Ocean. Brunei is located in the South China Sea region, where China has a significant presence and has been increasingly threatening the bordering countries with its coercive tactics. These issues were raised by the Indian PM in his meeting with his Counterpart in Darussalam. The joint statement read, "Both leaders reiterated their commitment to work closely together in mutually beneficial areas to further strengthen the ASEAN - India Comprehensive Strategic Partnership. Both leaders reiterated their commitment to maintaining and promoting peace, stability, maritime safety and security, as well as respecting freedom of navigation and overflight and unimpeded lawful commerce, consistent with international law, notably the United Nations Convention on the Law of the Sea (UNCLOS) 1982. The leaders also urged all parties to resolve disputes through peaceful means in accordance with international law, particularly UNCLOS 1982."

The first state visit by an Indian PM to Brunei just months after taking charge for a third time is a long-term strategic move to secure India's interests for the future.

Unified pension scheme: Balancing the old and new

Modi Government unveils unified pension scheme to bridge old and new, aiming to satisfy Central and State employees



On August 24, 2024, the Union government announced the new Unified Pension Scheme (UPS) for central government employees. In fact, what looked like a well-orchestrated action plan, on the following day the BJP-led government in Maharashtra approved the implementation of the Scheme for its employees. Madhya Pradesh government is likely to implement the UPS soon. The above announcements are in response to the earlier decisions of Opposition-ruled States, including Rajasthan, Chhattisgarh (before the November 2023 elections), Jharkhand, Himachal Pradesh (HP) and Punjab to revert to the old pension system (OPS) which it felt tilted the electoral pendulum towards those parties, particularly in HP. Fearing a repeat during the upcoming elections and Congress having already announced its intent to revert to OPS in Maharashtra, Modi seems to have gone for a preemptory move. Generally, employees of both the central and State governments who joined service after January 1, 2004, and are covered under the national pension scheme (NPS) have been uncomfortable with it. They have been demanding the restoration of the OPS which opposition-ruled states promised. Now, the Centre and BJP-ruled states have come up with the UPS hoping this will satisfy them. Will it? Under the OPS, retired employees received 50 per cent of their last drawn salary as a monthly pension. Just as the government offers its employees an adjustment in dearness allowance or DA to offset the increase in the cost of living, the monthly payouts of pensioners also increase to provide for DA. A government employee under OPS could not have got anything better. He was entitled to a decent 'pre-determined' monthly amount; the pension was fully protected against inflation and got it as long as he lived. After death, his wife gets the same amount for seven years and thereafter the family pension is around 60 per cent of this amount till she is alive. However, from the perspective of the government, the arrangement could not have been worse. Under OPS, there was an inherent tendency for pension liabilities to balloon

due to the addition to the pensioners' club every year, higher salaries of those joining, inflation indexation, increased longevity and so on. In 1990-91, the Centre's pension bill was Rs 3,272 crore. By 2020-21, it had jumped 58 times to Rs 190,886 crore. For all states, it shot up from Rs 3,131 crore in 1990-91 to Rs 386,001 crore in 2020-21 or 125 times.

Financial prudence requires that every year, the government set aside capital which together with return accruing thereon would create a growing corpus sufficient to pay for the pension liabilities on a sustainable basis thus avoiding any stress on the budget. But, that was never done. Instead, both the Centre and states have followed what in jargon is known as 'pay-as-you-go'. This has made the present generation of taxpayers bear the continuously rising burden of pensioners.

To deal with these pitfalls, the then UPA dispensation introduced the NPS for government employees joining service from January 1, 2004. Unlike OPS where the employee doesn't contribute anything, NPS is a contributory pension scheme under which employees contribute 10 per cent of their salary (Basic + DA). The government also contributes 14 per cent towards the employees' NPS accounts. The money is invested in multiple investment avenues i.e. equity, government bonds etc where it grows into a sizeable corpus by the time an employee reaches retirement age. On retirement, she is allowed to withdraw 60 per cent of the corpus (this is tax-free), and buy an annuity from the remaining 40 per cent. NPS offers a self-financing and fully funded arrangement for discharging pension liabilities in which the state knows 'how much it has to contribute'.

There won't be any major stress on the budget even as the employ-

ee gets a good pension depending on the contribution made, the age of joining, the type of investment, and the income accruing from that investment. The NPS is good for the fiscal health of the government. However, from the pensioner's angle, it doesn't match the OPS. Modi has brought a new UPS to bridge the gap between the two. Does it? Under UPS, which kicks in from April 1, 2025, employees who joined the service after January 1, 2004, and have worked for 25 years or more, after retirement, will be given 50 per cent of their basic average salary of the last 12 months as pension every month. However, employees who have served less than 25 years will get proportionately less or Rs. 10,000 per month minimum pension to employees who have served for a minimum of 10 years. If an employee dies on or before retirement, then the husband or wife will be given a pension, but the pension amount will be 60 per cent of the pension received by the employee immediately before her or his demise. Employees who have already retired or retiring on or before 31 March 2025, with arrears, will be eligible under UPS. The Scheme offers an adjustment in DA on assured pension, assured family pension and assured minimum pension. The DA will be calculated based on the All India Consumer Price Index for Industrial Workers (AICPI-IW) as in the case of service employees. How will the government fund it? It will build a pension corpus out of the employee contribution of 10 per cent (of basic pay plus DA) and the government's contribution of 18.5 per cent. The pension corpus will be divided into two portions: an individual pension fund (IPF) to which the employee's contribution of 10 per cent and matching government contribution will be credited; and a pool corpus created out of the

remaining 8.5 per cent contribution of the government.

The employee can exercise an investment choice for the IPF alone. The employees looking for higher pensions will have the option to get their pension monies (from IPF alone) invested in high-risk instruments for better returns. However, they will have to forego the UPS guarantees viz. monthly pension payouts of 50 per cent of the final service year's monthly pay, with full inflation adjustment. UPS guarantees will only be for those who opt for the "default investment option" which means an employee should leave it entirely to the government to manage the IPF besides the 'pool corpus'. The former has anyway no claim. Needless to say, the 'pool corpus' will be used to make up for the shortfall in the returns generated from the investment of the IPF to ensure a 50 per cent pension.

Under UPS, there is no provision for the return of capital to the heirs of the pensioner in the event of her death. This makes perfect sense as one can't have the cake and eat it too. The shift to UPS is a good move. It gives what the OPS gave even while preserving the good features of NPS like self-financing for discharging pension liabilities. It puts a little extra burden on the taxpayers being the extra 4.5 per cent of the government's contribution (18.5 per cent under UPS against 14 per cent under NPS). One wonders whether this will fully satisfy the employees. The answer is 'Yes' if they see reason. It will be 'No' if they don't. For instance, they could still argue under OPS, they were getting a 50 per cent pension without having to contribute even a Rupee whereas under UPS, an employee has to contribute 10 per cent of basic pay plus DA every month.

Cloud seeding, climate change, and agriculture: A call to action

While cloud seeding holds promise for supporting agricultural livelihood, this intervention also raises questions about its sustainability

The increasing severity of climate change makes it all the more urgent to consider creative ways to lessen its effect, particularly in vulnerable sectors like agriculture. One of the current alternatives is cloud seeding, a technical intervention designed to increase precipitation. While cloud seeding has the potential to alleviate drought, it also raises important considerations about sustainability, effectiveness, and long-term influence on agriculture. It is now up to us to investigate this developing practice and decide whether or not to incorporate it into our fight against climate change. Cloud seeding, which involves introducing compounds such as silver iodide or even plain salt into the sky

to increase cloud condensation and thus precipitation, is becoming a more popular practice in water-scarce places. The highest ideal that cloud seeding can achieve is increasing rainfall to replenish reservoirs and rivers, as well as soil moisture, all of which feed agriculture. However, cloud seeding has shown to be a vital weapon in combatting long-term droughts, rescuing crops, and

sustaining livelihoods in agriculture-dependent countries such as the United States, China, and the United Arab Emirates. Yet, cloud seeding will provide short relief, so climate change and its far-reaching effects on agriculture require a comprehensive adaptation and resilience strategy. Climate change is more than just a temperature rise; it includes changes in precipitation patterns, increasing frequency and severity of meteorological events, and variations in growing seasons. These changes pose serious threats to global food security, necessitating an integrated approach to adaptation and resilience building. This is where the challenge of relying on cloud seeding for

a solution arises. Though it seems like a quick answer for severe water shortages, its long-term viability and environmental impact are unknown. If not properly managed, the chemicals used in cloud seeding can hurt soil fertility, water quality, and even human health. This approach is unpredictable and dependent on meteorological circumstances, therefore it is not a fixed cure. Furthermore, cloud seeding doesn't address the underlying reasons for climate change.

Agriculture is one area that is deeply connected with climate systems and cannot be solved just through technological means. Other key modalities for achieving climate change resistance



include sustainable farming, which can be improved by effective irrigation systems, soil conservation, crop diversification, and the introduction of drought-resistant crop types. Furthermore, the topic of cloud seeding must address a variety of ethical concerns.

Who gets to pick where and when the clouds are seeded? What are the geopolitical consequences of influencing the weather? Seeding clouds over one location may inadvertently create adverse circumstances in another. Determining these multifar-

ious problems will necessitate a free and open worldwide conversation to ensure that this technology is used equitably and by justice values. Negotiating the tumultuous currents of climate change, and cloud seeding serves as both a beacon of hope and a warning lesson.

It demonstrates our ingenuity—the ability to think up something new when confronted with a challenge—while also conveying a message about our need to proceed with caution and planning. Agriculture is the lifeline of many communities around the world, particularly in developing countries, and its resilience is crucial to our shared future.

While cloud seeding may serve as a temporary solution

to the impending problem of water scarcity and its impact on agriculture, it cannot replace truly effective techniques for combating the bigger challenge posed by global warming.

If we want to ensure a future in which the Earth and all of its people thrive, we must make prudent investments in long-term mitigation methods centred on resilience, sustainability, and international collaboration. Let it be viewed as a severe challenge that requires immediate attention; it should raise consciousness and move us beyond symptomatic solutions to create a world that is robust and sustainable.

Foreign inflows lift markets high

Benchmark equity indices Sensex and Nifty surrendered early gains to close lower for the second straight day on Thursday, tracking losses in the most valuable firm Reliance Industries, Bharati Airtel and L&T amid a sluggish trend in global markets.

The 30-share BSE Sensex failed to hold on to initial gains and declined 151.48 points or 0.18 per cent to settle at 82,237.29. During the day, it dropped 222.2 points or 0.26 per cent to 82,130.44. The NSE Nifty dipped 53.60 points or 0.21 per cent to 25,145.10 despite a positive beginning of the trade.

"Markets ended weak in a volatile trading session led by profit-taking in Reliance Industries. Globally, most of the equity indices were sluggish to mixed and are awaiting key US data on Friday, which would provide some hint on the Federal Reserve chief's likely stance on the interest rate in this month's policy announcement," Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP (Research), Mehta Equities Ltd, said.



Among the 30 Sensex firms, Reliance Industries declined over 1 per cent. Tata Motors, Nestle, Bharti Airtel, Bajaj Finance, Larsen & Toubro, JSW Steel and Mahindra & Mahindra were other big laggards. In contrast, Titan, ITC, Infosys, HCL Technologies, Tata Steel and State Bank of India were among the biggest gainers.

declined 0.95 per cent, capital goods (0.61 per cent), industrials (0.38 per cent), power (0.37 per cent) and oil & gas (0.30 per cent). Healthcare, commodities, consumer discretionary, telecommunications, consumer durables, IT and tech were the gainers.

"Global stocks were largely muted on Tuesday as traders prepared for data releases that will offer insight about the health of the US economy and the Federal Reserve's interest rate path," Deepak Jasani, Head of Retail Research, HDFC Securities, said.

Asian markets, Seoul, Tokyo and Hong Kong settled lower, while Shanghai ended higher. European markets were trading mostly lower in mid-session deals. The US markets ended on a mixed note on Wednesday.

"The benchmark indices continued to trade with minor losses due to concerns of a slowdown in the US and Chinese economy.

Rupee rises four paise against US dollar

The rupee traded in a narrow range and settled for the day higher by 4 paise at 83.97 (provisional) against the US dollar on Thursday, on weakening of the American currency in the overseas market and an overall drop in crude oil prices.

Forex traders said the domestic unit witnessed a slight negative bias on weak global equities and concerns over global economic growth. Moreover, dollar demand from importers also dented investor sentiments.

At the interbank foreign exchange market, the local unit opened at 83.98 and witnessed an intraday high of 83.97 against the American currency.

The domestic unit finally settled for the day at 83.97 (provisional), higher by 4 paise over its previous close. On Wednesday, the rupee breached the crucial 84-mark for the second time within a



month and settled 3 paise lower at 84.01 against the American currency.

"The Indian rupee which continued to drop to a record low witnessed a range-bound trading session as it stayed wedged between negative global cues and intervention from the central bank," said Maneesh Sharma, AVP - Commodities & Currencies, Anand Rathi Shares and Stock Brokers.

Sharma further noted that the rupee was pressured by dollar demand from importers for meeting their immediate and futures payments. There have been several instances since last month wherein the Reserve Bank defended the rupee near 84 levels.

According to Sharma, data from RBI also showed foreign exchange reserves hit a record high of USD 681.69 billion at the end of last month revealing the central bank has been buying dollars amid expectations of rate cuts by the US Federal Reserve.

With rising interest rate differentials from the US due to rate cuts to take place starting the current month, Indian rupee is expected to strengthen further in coming months. Overall we anticipate rupee to slightly strengthen in tomorrow trade to 83.90 - 83.85 sub levels amid expectations of rate cut to persist ahead of crucial non-

farm payrolls due to be released on Friday," Sharma said.

Meanwhile, the dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was down 0.15 per cent to 101.20 points.

Brent crude, the international benchmark, gained 0.74 per cent to USD 73.24 per barrel in futures trade. Forex traders said crude oil levels of USD 73 per barrel will act as a support for the domestic unit as India, the world's third-largest oil importer, stands to benefit from cheaper oil. In the domestic equity market, the 30-share BSE Sensex declined 151.48 points, or 0.18 per cent, to close at 82,201.16 points, while the Nifty was down 53.60 points, or 0.21 per cent, to 25,145.10 points.

Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) were net buyers in the capital markets on Wednesday, as they purchased shares worth Rs 975.46 crore, according to exchange data.

Raymond Lifestyle shares slump on market debut

Shares of Raymond Lifestyle Ltd got listed on the stock exchanges on Thursday following the demerger of retail and lifestyle businesses. The stock got listed at Rs 3,000 on the BSE. Later, it climbed 3.33 per cent to Rs 3,100 from its opening price. At the NSE, shares of the firm began the trade at Rs 3,020. However, the stock later hit the lower circuit level at Rs 2,850, down 5 per cent on the BSE.

At the NSE also, it hit the lower circuit limit of Rs 2,869, down 5 per cent.

The company's market valuation stood at Rs 17,363.23 crore during the morning deals. In a release on Tuesday, the company said it will get listed on the stock exchanges on September 5.

Following the demerger of its retail and lifestyle businesses, Raymond will have two listed entities.

The company plans to add 900 new outlets over three years. The Raymond Group's lifestyle business entity is eyeing a 15 per cent CAGR (Compound Annual Growth Rate) to attain around 7 per cent market share in the fast growing men's-wear wedding market by 2027, the release said.

"The demerger aims at unlocking shareholder value by creating a focussed lifestyle business entity. Raymond Lifestyle will sharpen strategic focus in this fast-growing sector to become among the top three global fabric suppliers by the end of this year.

"The global scenario presents significant opportunities, particularly the challenges in China and Bangladesh and trade agreements with the UK, EU and Australia," Raymond Group Chairman and Managing Director Gautam Singhania said.

SAIL offers support for Critical Mineral Mission

SAIL, the country's largest steel player, is willing to participate in the Critical Mineral Mission, which aims to secure the country's critical mineral supply chain by ensuring mineral availability from domestic and foreign sources, the company's Chairman Amarendu Prakash said on Thursday.

The Union Budget 2024-25 had proposed launching a Critical Mineral Mission for domestic production, recycling of critical minerals, and overseas acquisition of critical mineral assets.

"FM Nirmala Sitharaman announced the Critical Mineral Mission. In that mission a lot of things will be discussed, all possibilities will be discussed. So we will be watching this and seeing what opportunities are there.

"As the Critical Mineral Mission expands and things get discussed, we will be watching and seeing if there are opportunities for exploring something on SAIL's part," the Chairman

told reporters on the sidelines of ISA Steel Conclave.

The Critical Mineral Mission aims to secure the country's critical mineral supply chain by ensuring mineral availability from domestic and foreign sources.

It also aims at strengthening the value chains by enhancing technological, regulatory, and financial ecosystems to foster innovation, skill development, and global competitiveness in mineral exploration, mining, beneficiation, processing, and recycling.

So far, SAIL has been looking at minerals which are used for steel making, the Chairman said, adding that the critical minerals segment is a separate area. "We are not into that space (critical mineral) till now but since the government has announced a Critical Mineral Mission, we will just explore. We will look at it," he said.

Critical minerals, such as cobalt, copper, lithium, nickel and rare earths, play a crucial

role in the production of clean energy technologies, from wind turbines to electric cars.

The government had earlier said that it plans to provide financial incentives for development of critical minerals, including lithium.

There will also be an emphasis on securing loans from multilateral financial institutions for the development of the sector.

The government will focus on global R&D collaboration across the critical minerals value chain.

To encourage the participation of Indian public and private sector companies in the acquisition of assets abroad, the government will provide targeted subsidies for mining, and for setting up evacuation infrastructure.

Besides, there are plans to ramp up the capacity of ICVIL from current 2 million tonnes per annum (MTPA) to 4.5 MTPA in three to four years.

Mozambique-based ICVIL is a special purpose vehicle of SAIL, RINL, NMDCL, CIL and NTPC for acquiring coal mines and assets overseas.

Meesho hires 8.5 lakh for festive season

Gold, silver prices surge

Gold prices climbed by Rs 500 to Rs 74,100 per 10 grams in the national capital on Thursday due to fresh demand by jewellers amid a strong trend in the overseas markets.

The precious metal had closed at Rs 73,600 per 10 grams in the previous close on Wednesday.

Tracking gold, silver also rallied by Rs 1,000 to Rs 84,600 per kilogram on Thursday due to increased offtake from industrial units and coin makers, according to the All India Sarafa Association.

It had finished at Rs 83,600 per kg in the previous trade.

In addition, gold of 99.5 per cent purity jumped by Rs 500 to Rs 73,750 per 10 grams from Rs 73,250.

Domestically, traders

attributed the rise in gold prices to a strong trend in the international markets, which influenced the market sentiment to an increased buying from local jewellers.

On the overseas front, Comex gold rose 0.82 per cent higher to USD 2,546.80 per ounce.

"The bullion advanced on Thursday following weaker-than-expected US job data,

which bolstered bets on steep rate cuts that provided support for non-yielding metals like gold," Saamil Gandhi, Senior Analyst of Commodities at HDFC Securities, said.

According to Manav Modi, Senior Analyst, Commodity Research, Motilal Oswal Financial Securities, Post the jobs data, market participants have raised the odds of a Fed rate cut on September 18.

The ADP employment report, a reading on the US services industry, and jobless claims data due later on Thursday are also on the radar, Modi added.

Silver also trading higher at USD 29.07 per ounce in the international markets.

"Beige book survey released overnight on Wednesday showed economic activity was flat or declining across most regions in the US in recent weeks dousing any recession worries in the near term," Maneesh Sharma, AVP of Commodities & Currencies at Anand Rathi Shares and Stock Brokers, said.

Traders are placing their bets cautiously amid the upcoming non-farm payrolls report on Friday, which could provide more clarity on the size of interest rate cuts, Sharma added.

India-EFTA trade deal moves forward

Switzerland's federal cabinet has adopted the ambitious trade pact between India and the European Free Trade Association (EFTA) and placed it before Parliament as part of the ratification process.

The ambitious trade pact, signed in March between India and the European bloc comprising Norway, Switzerland, Iceland and Liechtenstein, aims at expanding trade across a range of areas, including pharmaceuticals, manufacturing, new technologies and machinery.

Under the mega trade deal, the four European countries are looking at making an investment of USD 100 billion in India over the next 15 years. Each of the signatory countries will have to ratify the pact for its roll out.

On Wednesday, the Federal Council adopted a dispatch on the free-trade agreement between the EFTA states and India, the Swiss government said in a statement.

The Federal Council, which is the Swiss federal cabinet, is the highest executive authority in the country.

The Swiss Parliament is expected to debate the dispatch in the upcoming winter or spring sessions, according to the statement.

"The agreement strengthens the competitiveness of Swiss exports in the world's most populous country," it said, describing the firming up of the trade pact with India as a significant milestone in Swiss trade policy.

In its dispatch, the Federal Council commends and sets out the content of the agreement and places it in the overall context of Switzerland's relations with India. It also explained the



significance of the trade pact. "India is now the world's most populous country. In particular, the growing middle class means that there is significant potential for growth. However, India still levies very high import duties on most products," it said.

The trade deal provides for eliminating custom duties for almost 98 per cent of the imports from India.

"After 16 years of negotiations, Switzerland and the other EFTA states have succeeded in becoming the first European partners to conclude an FTA with India," the Swiss readout said.

"When the agreement comes into force, 94.7 per cent of Switzerland's current exports to India will enjoy tariff relief, in some cases with transitional periods. This will strengthen the competitiveness of Swiss exports in India," it said.

The agreement includes a

chapter on investment promotion and cooperation.

"For the first time in a free-trade agreement, the EFTA states are committing themselves to various promotional activities with the aim of increasing investment in India and thereby creating jobs," the readout said.

"India, for its part, is endeavouring to ensure a favourable investment climate," it added.

The statement said the EFTA is also the first partner with which India has agreed on a comprehensive and legally-binding chapter on trade and sustainable development.

"This chapter includes, among other things, a commitment not to deviate from applicable environmental and labour standards. It also establishes a specific sub-committee on trade and sustainable development," it said.



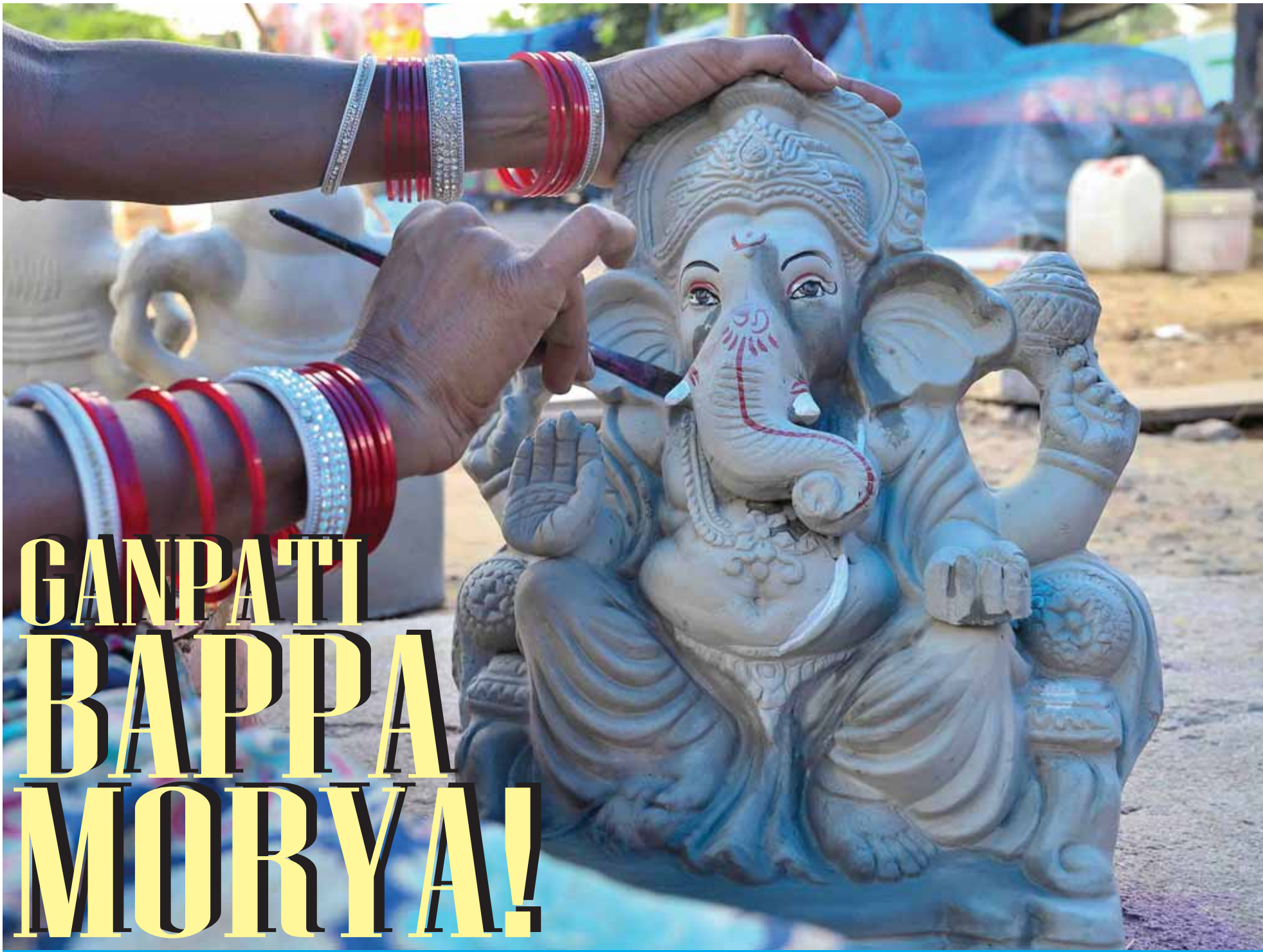
Suresh Prabhu nominated to WAF Board

Ganpati Bappa Morya! Ganpati Bappa Morya! The joyous chant fills the air, marking the arrival of Ganesh Chaturthi. This festival, dedicated to our beloved Lord Ganesha, transforms every corner into a lively celebration of devotion and creativity. Ganesh Chaturthi is a cherished Hindu festival that celebrates the birth of Lord Ganesha, the revered deity known for his wisdom and ability to remove obstacles. Observed with great enthusiasm across India, it turns streets and homes into vibrant centres of devotion.

FESTIVAL PREPARATIONS

Taking place in the Hindu month of Bhadrapada, usually in August or September, the festival's preparations begin well before the actual day. Homes are thoroughly cleaned and beautifully decorated and pandals are set up to welcome Lord Ganesha. These pandals, often adorned with colourful decorations, become the heart of the celebrations. Tomorrow, as the celebrations officially begin, the city will once again echo with the joyous chants of "Ganpati Bappa Morya!" On the day of Ganesh Chaturthi, people bring home clay idols of Lord Ganesha. These idols vary in size and style, from small, simple ones to large, elaborate figures. Each idol is carefully placed on an altar and decorated with flowers, fruits and other offerings, creating a sacred and festive atmosphere. A key part of the celebration is the daily puja or worship performed by devotees. This involves chanting prayers, offering modaks and flowers and seeking blessings from Lord Ganesha. The air is filled with the sounds of devotional songs, the scent of incense and the colours of vibrant decorations, all contributing to a sense of joy and community. As Ganesh Chaturthi draws near, Delhi's streets, especially in Pratap Bagh, come alive with joyous and vibrant energy. Street vendors and stalls overflow with intricately designed idols of Lord Ganesha, along with festive decorations and offerings. The air is filled with excitement as the community prepares for the celebration. In the heart of Pratap Bagh, preparing for Ganesh Chaturthi is not just a task but a heartfelt tradition. For months, artisans have dedicated themselves to crafting exquisite murtis (idols), each one a



labour of love and devotion.

In Pratap Bagh, the preparation for Ganesh Chaturthi is nothing short of a labour of love. For months, skilled artisans have poured their heart and soul into creating the most beautiful murtis of Lord Ganesha. Each idol is more than just a statue; it symbolises the devotion and creativity of its maker, embodying the rich cultural heritage of this cherished festival. The process begins with moulding clay into the shape of Lord Ganesha, a task requiring both skill and patience. Artisans like Mohini and Rekha have dedicated themselves to this craft, ensuring that every detail - from the delicate folds of Ganesha's trunk to the intricate patterns on his attire - is perfect. The clay idols are left to dry, a crucial step demanding precision, especially during the monsoon season when high humidity can pose a challenge. Once the base of the idol is ready, the real artistry begins. The idols are painted with vibrant colours and adorned with elaborate designs. Each brushstroke and embellishment

reflects the deep reverence the artisans hold for Lord Ganesha. The final touches, including beads and decorative fabrics, bring the idols to life, making them a feast for the eyes and a joy for the soul.

THE ARTISAN'S DEDICATION

The artisans of Pratap Bagh, like Mohini, Rekha, Sonu and Kamla, bring a unique blend of dedication, skill and devotion to their craft. Despite facing challenges such as rising costs of materials, intricate designs and financial uncertainties, they continue to pour their hearts into creating beautiful idols of Lord Ganesha. Their passion is truly inspiring, driven by both their love for their work and their deep devotion to the deity. Mohini's approach to her work is remarkable. She sources plain murtis from Kolkata and transforms them with her own hands, turning them into vibrant, beautifully decorated idols. "I personally select the pearl necklaces from Chandni Chowk," she explains, and her years of experience

allow her to complete each one in just 15 minutes. The transformation from a plain clay figure to a colourful deity, embellished with pearls and intricate designs, is a tribute to her expertise and devotion. Mohini's work reflects not just artistic skill but also a deep spiritual connection, infusing each idol with a unique sense of reverence and love. The prices of her creations range from as little as ₹300 to as much as ₹30,000 with most people opting for smaller idols for their homes, while larger ones are chosen for community pandals.

Rekha, an artisan from Pratap Bagh, has been dedicated to idol-making for many years, a tradition she proudly continues. She explains that it takes them about "4 to 5 months" to prepare these beautiful idols, highlighting the dedication and effort involved in each piece. "Everything is done by hand," she emphasises. From moulding the clay to carefully painting and decorating each idol, the entire process is meticulous and labour-intensive.

Walking through the lanes of Pratap Bagh, one cannot help but feel a deep sense of admiration seeing women like Mohini and Rekha leading their stalls. Every stall is filled with the bustling energy of women hard at work, their hands moving with practiced precision as they shape and paint the idols. It is a powerful sight, reflecting not just the artistry involved but also the empowerment of these women who bring beauty and devotion to life through their craft. The dedication of these artisans stands out as a remarkable example of resilience. They face many hardships, yet their pride and joy in their work remain evident. Their craft is more than just a job; it is a calling, a deep-rooted part of their identity that connects them to the community and the divine. Their work becomes a symbol of hope and strength, capturing the very essence of Ganesh Chaturthi - the celebration of new beginnings, perseverance and devotion.

THE BUSINESS AND THE CHALLENGES

For many artisans, Ganesh Chaturthi is not just a period of celebration but also a crucial time for their business. Crafting idols is a complex and costly process and the financial pressures can be intense. One artisan remarks, "The cost of materials and the time

invested in creating each idol is significant. We hope that the sales will cover these expenses and bring some profit." Sonu adds, "We often face challenges in selling the larger and more elaborate idols. Most customers prefer smaller ones, which are more affordable." Despite these financial hurdles, the artisans of Pratap Bagh persist, driven by their passion and commitment to their craft.

Dharambir smashes Asian record for gold, Pranav takes silver in Paralympic

Dharambir shattered the Asian record to win the gold medal while compatriot Pranav Soorma clinched the silver as Indian club throwers dominated the men's F51 event at the Paralympics here. After four fouled attempts, the 35-year-old world champion's bronze medalist from Sonepat, Dharambir hurled the club to a distance of 34.92m in his fifth attempt to claim the top spot on the podium on Wednesday. Soorma, who injured his spinal chord at 16 when a cement sheet fell on his head, then produced a throw of 34.59m in his first attempt but the 29-year-old from Faridabad couldn't better and

get past Dharambir as India completed a one-two. The third Indian in the fray, 2017 world championship silver medallist, trailblazing Indian para-athlete and Dharambir's menton Amit Kumar Saroha, however, finished last with a best effort of 23.96m. Serbia's Filip Graovac bagged the bronze, courtesy a 34.18m throw in his second attempt. The F51 club throw event is for athletes who have movement affected to a high degree in the trunk, legs and hands. All the competitors compete while seated and rely on their shoulders and arm to generate power. From paralysis to Paralympic glory Dharambir faced a life-altering accident when a misjudged



dive into a canal left him paralyzed from the waist down. Para-sports gave him a new direction in life when he was introduced to it by fellow para-athlete Amit Kumar Saroha. Within two years, Dharambir qualified for the 2016 Rio Paralympics, marking the beginning of a successful career. He has since earned multiple medals for India, including a silver at the 2022 Asian Para Games. A cricket and roller hockey enthusiast, Soorma too was just another teenager when a cement sheet fell on his head when he was 16, leaving him paralyzed after causing a severe spinal cord injury. Support of his family and a

positive mindset helped him to turn to meditation and academics, where he excelled with 91.2 per cent in his 12th board exams. He then pursued a postgraduate degree from the Delhi School of Economics and secured a job as an Assistant Manager at the Bank of Baroda. Pranav rediscovered his love for sports through para-athletics and soon received success as he won a silver medal at the 2019 Beijing Grand Prix, a gold medal at the Serbia Open 2023, and both gold and silver medals at the Tunisia Grand Prix 2022. He also produced a record-setting throw at the Asian Para Games 2023, where he won gold in the men's club throw F51 event.

India's focus will be on self improvement: Rishabh Pant

Wicketkeeper-batter Rishabh Pant warned against taking Bangladesh lightly in the upcoming two-Test series, and stressed on the need for India to keep improving themselves to stay ahead of the competition. Bangladesh, who recently blanked Pakistan 2-0 at Rawalpindi, will face Rohit Sharma's side in the first Test at Chennai from September 19 before moving to Kanpur. India will play a total of 10 Tests within the next five months as the series against Bangladesh will be followed by three Tests against New Zealand at home in October-November before moving to Australia for the five-Test Border-Gavaskar Trophy. "Asian countries like Pakistan, Bangladesh, and Sri Lanka perform well in Asian conditions because they are accustomed to the wickets," Pant told Jio Cinema. "As the Indian cricket team, we focus solely on our own standards and how we can improve. Regardless of the opposition, we strive to play with the same intensity and give our 100 percent every single day," he said. Pant said no series can be taken lightly with the margins between the teams decreasing in international cricket. "Pressure will always be there because in international cricket, you can't take any series lightly. The margin between winning and losing is very small, and nowadays, the gap between international teams isn't much either," he said. Pant said playing in the

Duleep Trophy ahead of a long season of Test cricket will give the players quality match practice while young cricketers at domestic level will benefit from the presence of international stars. The opening round Duleep matches got underway here at the M Chinnaswamy Stadium and at Anantapur on Thursday. "It is very important for us to play domestic cricket because as a cricketer, match practice is always very important," he said. "Especially coming back to domestic cricket, the youngsters also learn a lot of things from us - they see you playing here even after playing international cricket. There is a lot to give back to domestic cricket." "It also gives us the opportunity to share all the learning and experiences from international cricket with our colleagues, especially with the young players and newcomers; it gives them a huge boost since we all have reached here from playing domestic cricket," Pant added. Pant, who is playing for Team B in Duleep Trophy, said he was looking forward to getting back into domestic cricket as this is his first red-ball game after December 2022. "It is an amazing feeling for me, also because when I met with the accident two years ago, I used to always think about when I will be able to play for India again," he said. "In the last six months I (have) played IPL and we (have) also won the World Cup. It's a great feeling as I had always dreamt of winning the World Cup since I was a kid.

Jannik Sinner beats Daniil Medvedev to reach the semifinals

Top-ranked Jannik Sinner reached the U.S. Open semifinals for the first time by getting past 2021 champion Daniil Medvedev 6-2, 1-6, 6-1, 6-4 on Wednesday night. Sinner, who took over as the title favorite after Week 1 exits by Novak Djokovic and Carlos Alcaraz, is the only man remaining in the field with a Grand Slam trophy. He won his first at the Australian Open in January by beating Medvedev in the final in five sets after dropping the first two. As reflected by the accurate-as-can-be score, this matchup was unusually topsy-turvy as they took turns dominating a set at a time. First, it was Sinner who



was superior. Then that role was played Medvedev. Then Sinner regained the upper

hand in the third. In the fourth, from 3-all, Sinner surged, saving a pair of

break points, then breaking Medvedev to lead 5-3. Sinner - a 23-year-old from Italy who was cleared in a doping case less than a week before the U.S. Open started after testing positive twice for trace amounts of an anabolic steroid in March - will go up against No. 25 Jack Draper of Britain on Friday for a berth in the title match. That day's other semifinal will be No. 12 Taylor Fritz vs. No. 20 Frances Tiafoe in the first all-American men's matchup at this stage at a major in 19 years. The women's semifinals Thursday night are Jessica Pegula vs. Karolina Muchova, and Aryna Sabalenka vs. Emma Navarro. Pegula eliminated No. 1 Iga Swiatek 6-2, 6-4 on Wednesday. The 22-year-old

Draper reached his first Grand Slam semifinal - and became the first British man to get that far at Flushing Meadows since Andy Murray won the 2012 trophy - by overwhelming No. 10 Alex de Minaur 6-3, 7-5, 6-2. Draper has won all 15 sets he's played so far, but things figure to get tougher against Sinner. This is not kind of like an overnight thing for me. I've believed for a long time that I've been putting in the work and doing the right things, and I knew that my time would come," said Draper, whose upper right leg was taped by a trainer after he felt something at the end of the first set. "I didn't know when it would be, but hopefully from here, I can do a lot of amazing things.

Kapil Parmar to compete for bronze in judo

India's Kapil Parmar lost to Iran's S Banitaba Khorram Abadi in the 60kg (J1) men's para judo semifinals of the Paralympics and will now compete for the bronze medal, here on Thursday. The 24-year-old Parmar was beaten 0-10 in semifinals A by his Iranian opponent here at the Champs-de-mart arena. The J1 class in para judo is for the athletes who suffer from no to very low visual activity. Athletes in this category wear red circles to indicate that they may need guided support before, during and after a contest. Parmar, who won the silver medal at the 2022 Asian Games in the same category, had ear-

lier beaten Venezuela's Marco Dennis Blanco 10-0 in the quarterfinal. Parmar was, however, handed a yellow card in each of the two contests on Thursday. Meanwhile, India's Kokila suffered a defeat to Kazakhstan's Akmaral Nauatbek 0-10 in her women's 48kg J2 class quarterfinals. Later, Kokila was beaten by Ukraine's Yuliya Ivanyska 0-10 in her J2 Final of Repechage A, a contest wherein she was handed three yellow cards while her opponent got two. Yellow cards in judo are given for minor violations such as passivity or using a technique that might hinder the opponent or cause injury. In J2 category, the competing athletes have partial eyesight.

New Zealand arrive in India for one-off Test against Afghanistan

New Zealand arrived here on Thursday ahead of their one-off Test against Afghanistan, scheduled to be played in Greater Noida from September 9. The one-off Test, the first red-ball fixture between the two nations, will be held at the Greater Noida Sports Complex Ground. The BlackCaps have named a strong side for the Test against Afghanistan. Veteran pacer Tim Southee will lead the team which includes the likes of former

skipper Kane Williamson, who opted out of a central contract earlier this year, Devon Conway, Glenn Phillips and Rachin Ravindra, while Tom Latham continues to be the vice-captain. The BlackCaps have included five spin bowling options in Michael Bracewell, Mitchell Santner, Ajaz Patel and part-timers Phillips and Ravindra for the Test. They will hold their first practice session on Friday. The Test against Afghanistan will serve as a preparation for

a two-match series against Sri Lanka, which is part of the World Test Championship. After the tour of Sri Lanka, New Zealand will return to India as they take on Rohit Sharma and his men in a three-match Test series, also a part of the WTC calendar. The three games will be played in Bengaluru, Pune and Mumbai in October and November. New Zealand currently occupy the third spot in the ICC WTC points table behind last edition's finalists, India and Australia.

I was trying to play close to my body to counter swing and cut: Centurion Musheer

After underscoring his talent with a robust hundred, Musheer Khan on Thursday said he centred his batting strategy around playing close to the body to nullify the pronounced movement of the ball in overcast conditions. Musheer's unbeaten 105 rescued India B after India A bowlers reduced them to 94 for seven on the first day of the Duleep Trophy match at the Chinnaswamy Stadium. India B finished the day at 202 for seven.

"I wanted to play as many balls as possible without thinking too much about runs. I wanted to bat the whole day, and I was taking it session by session. The ball was swinging and cutting when I came to bat," Musheer said in the post-day press meet. "So, I was trying to play the ball as close to my body as possible, and was looking to avoid those risky shots. I knew runs would eventually come," he added. But Musheer was not alone in his rescue mission as late-order batter Navdeep Saini helped him add 108 runs for the unbro-



ken eighth wicket alliance. "When wickets were falling at the other end, I told myself to play intelligently and look for a partnership. Then Saini bhai gave me a lot of confidence saying he will play whether it is two balls or six balls in an over, and just keep faith in him.

"He was also able to match my thinking and approach while batting. But generally, I was trying to defend the first three or four balls and then take a single," he elaborated. Another salient feature of his batting was the way he handled Kuldeep Yadav as five of his 10 fours came off the left-arm wrist spinner, including two successive biffs down the V. Musheer said conversations with senior batters in his side like Shubman Gill and Rishabh Pant helped him prepare against Kuldeep.

Dealing with the unexpected, whether in archery or life in general, is no big deal for Harvinder Singh. He has aced the anticipation game thanks to the hard lessons that came his way. The 33-year-old from Haryana, who scripted history by becoming the first Indian archer to win a Paralympic gold, has impaired legs owing to a dengue treatment gone wrong when he was just one year old but instead of lamenting his fate, he chose to become bigger than his circumstances. Harvinder's journey to Paralympic glory began with a bronze three years back in Tokyo, which made him the first Indian to finish on the Games podium.

On Wednesday, he showed neither fatigue nor nerves to secure five back-to-back wins in a day to bag his second successive Paralympic medal in recurve open category, bettering the previous performance by quite a margin. All his achievements are a first in Indian archery. And when he is not shooting down medals, Harvinder is busy pursuing a Ph.D in economics. "In the last few months, I was shooting very well in practice, more than the world record in qualification. Here, I finished

ninth (in the ranking round), and my confidence went a little bit down. Anyway, I focused on the matches because anything could happen," Harvinder was quoted as saying by 'World Archery'. "Archery is a game of unexpected. Everything can happen. I focused on every arrow. Only the next arrow counts," said Harvinder, who reserved his best for the final, nailing three 10s in his last four arrows to knock out his 44-year-old opponent from Poland Lukasz Ciszek 6-0 (28-



24, 28-27, 29-25). His was India's second medal in archery at the ongoing Games after Sheetal Devi and Rakesh Kumar combined for the compound mixed team bronze. Harvinder what works best for him is to stay in the moment and think too far ahead. "I was just focusing on my next match. Only that way, I could move to the next round, and one by one, I moved to the final. And eventually won gold," he broke down the process. Three years back in Tokyo, Harvinder who hails from

Ajitnagar in Kaithal district of Haryana, could not realise his dream of a gold. He said his teammates had a role to play in instilling belief in him that he could aim for the top podium finish. "In Tokyo, I won bronze, so I'm happy I could change the colour of my medal. Before the (Paris) Games, everybody told me I had a chance to reach gold, and I'm happy I was able to," said Harvinder, who comes from a farming family. Harvinder's consistency and his monk-like

demeanour ensured that he lost no more than three points in each of his matches. The archer, who started taking interest in the sport after watching the action on TV during London Olympics, said that he felt "blessed". "It feels fantastic. I'm just blessed to achieve this fold for India," he said after the medal ceremony. Harvinder's mantra is to always aim for a '10' with his final arrow, something he says, helped him achieve his goal in Paris. If you have confidence, you can learn the arrow. Sometimes it can slip to nine, but you always have to finish with a 10, because it's your last arrow. In my matches and many situations, I landed my last arrow in a 10. I focused on my last arrow," he said.
