



SECOND DEPORTATION FLIGHT ARRIVES

A plane carrying 119 illegal immigrants from the US landed at the Amritsar airport on Saturday night, the second such batch of Indians to be deported by the Donald Trump administration as part of its promised crackdown on illegal migration. Before the arrival and another scheduled deportee flight for Sunday created a lot of furore and controversy across the country with political parties crossing swords.

Punjab Chief Minister Bhagwant Mann questioned the move to land another plane at the Amritsar airport, as he accused the Centre of trying to defame Punjab as part of a conspiracy and sought to know under which criteria the Amritsar airport was chosen to land the second aircraft, BJP hit back accusing the AAP leader of playing politics over the matter.

Among the 119 deportees, 100 are from Punjab and Haryana alone. While 67 are from

Punjab, 33 are from Haryana, eight from Gujarat, three from Uttar Pradesh, two each from Goa, Maharashtra and Rajasthan, and one each from Himachal Pradesh and Jammu and Kashmir. The second batch of illegal Indian immigrants includes four women and two minors, including a six-year-old girl. Most of the deportees are in the age group of 18 to 30, sources said. A third plane carrying 157 deportees is also expected to land on February 16. On February 5, a US military aircraft carrying 104 illegal Indian immigrants landed at the Amritsar airport. Of them, 33 each were from Haryana and Gujarat, and 30 from Punjab.

Mann visited the airport on Saturday and said his government has made arrangements to take the residents of Punjab from among the second batch of deportees to their hometowns. The deportees who hail from other states will head to Delhi from Amritsar in a flight on Sunday morning and then they will be taken to their respective

places. Talking to reporters at the airport, Mann continued his attack on the Centre and said, "Do not make our holy city (Amritsar) a deport centre."

Hitting back at Mann, BJP leader Tarun Chugh said on Saturday, "Bhagwant Mann sahab, people of Punjab want to know how the innocent youths went out, why they had to go, who were those who spoiled their lives. Why they had to go adopting illegal routes, who sent them, and who were the fraudulent agents who spoiled their lives." "The youths were forced to sell their land, houses. Rather than catching the culprits and acting against those who spoiled the lives of these youths, the 'AAP-da' party leader is doing politics over the issue," Chugh, who is also BJP's general secretary, said.

BJP's national spokesperson R P Singh also took a dig at Mann, and told him to stop politicising the issue. "Amritsar is the closest international airport for flights entering India from the US. That's why the plane carrying illegal

immigrants is landing there. Stop politicising the issue and promoting conspiracy theories due to your lack of knowledge," Singh said in a social media post. Senior BJP leader and former Union minister Uma Bharti lashed out at the US government for the "cruel and extremely shameful manner" in which it deported the illegal Indian immigrants recently. In a post on social media platform, Uma Bharti said, "The manner in which the illegal Indian immigrants were sent back from America in handcuffs and shackles is extremely shameful and a blot on humanity."

"The American governments have shown this cruel and violent attitude towards Red Indians and people of African origin living there many times, she alleged. "When they (deportees) were being sent by a plane, keeping them in handcuffs and shackles shows the cruelty and inhumanity of the American administration. Entering a country illegally is a crime, every country has provisions for its punishment as per the law, but such cruelty is a great sin," the BJP leader said.

The North American Punjabi Association expressed serious concern over human trafficking, saying the government must take immediate action to prevent youths from taking illegal and dangerous routes to reach foreign shores. Satnam Singh Chahal, the Executive Director of the North American Punjabi Association (NAPA) alleged that despite repeated warnings and several tragic incidents, the government has failed to implement effective measures to curb illegal migration.

Destiny plays cruel at Maha Kumbh, again

A devastating road accident in Prayagraj on Friday and a fire in the mela grounds on Saturday marred the festivities in Kumbh as the week came to a close. A fire broke out at the storeroom of a camp in the Maha Kumbh Mela area on Saturday evening, gutting seven tents and destroying some items, including blankets and foodgrains, officials said.

No person was injured, they said. Chief Fire Officer (Kumbh) Pramod Sharma said the fire broke out at a camp in Sector 19 of the Maha Kumbh area and it engulfed seven tents.

"As soon as we received the fire alert, firefighting motorcycles reached the spot within two minutes, followed by four fire tender trucks," he said. DIG of Maha Kumbh Vaibhav Krishna told PTI that the fire broke out at the camp of Luv Kush Seva Mandal around 6:15 pm. Police and the fire brigade responded swiftly and brought the blaze under control within about five minutes, he said.

"The camp also housed Kalpavasis (pilgrims who stay for an extended period during the Kumbh). Items such as blankets and

foodgrains stored in the room were damaged in the fire," the DIG said. The chief fire officer said the cause of the fire was being ascertained.

Accident claims 10 lives in Prayagraj

A late Friday night accident claimed the lives of 10 pilgrims and left 19 others injured. The incident occurred on the Prayagraj-Mirzapur highway in Meja. According to police reports, a Bolero carrying pilgrims collided head-on with a bus. All 10 occupants of the Bolero died on the spot.

The deceased were residents of Korba district in Chhattisgarh and were on their way to the Sangam for a holy dip.

The bus, carrying pilgrims from Rajgarh district in Madhya Pradesh, was returning from the Sangam and heading toward Varanasi when the accident took place. Nineteen passengers onboard sustained injuries and were rushed to the Community Health Center (CHC) in Ramnagar for treatment.

Upon receiving information, local authorities and police reached the site, took control of the situation, and sent the bodies for post-mortem examination. Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath took note of the road accident in Prayagraj and directed the officials to reach the spot and expedite the relief work.

The Chief Minister also directed proper treatment of the injured.

This is not the first instance that such accidents involving Maha Kumbh devotees occurred.

AAP appointments under scrutiny

In order to crackdown on the tentacles of the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) within the Delhi government, Delhi Chief Secretary Dharmendra has asked all Secretaries and Heads of Department to compile a list of appointments of chairpersons and members made by the previous AAP government. The move may spark controversy as the AAP government had faced allegations of appointing party members and close aides of ministers to various non-official posts, allegedly bypassing established laws and government regulations.

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The Chief Secretary had previously discussed the matter in a meeting with HoDs and Secretaries, instructing them to prepare detailed records of all non-official

appointments of chairpersons and members made by the AAP government.

As per the minutes of the meeting, "All departments and their organizations shall submit a list of non-official appointments made under various Acts and Rules pertaining to their respective departments."

Departments have been directed to submit their lists by February 13, after which further decisions will be made regarding these appointments. Sources indicate that hundreds of AAP workers and supporters have been appointed to key positions in various Delhi government departments over the past decade. Many of these appointments were reportedly made in Mohalla Clinics,

governing bodies of educational institutions, and state public undertakings. Insiders claim that these appointments were primarily given to party volunteers, raising concerns about favoritism and possible violations of government procedures. The review ordered by the Chief Secretary is expected to examine whether these selections were made following due process or if they were politically motivated. In July 2023, the Delhi Services Department had ordered that 437 private persons appointed as advisers, fellows and consultants via "back door entry" by the Aam Aadmi Party government are "void ab initio" (void from the beginning) and directed the departments concerned to stop their services.

The 437 appointments include 140 fellows and associate fellows appointed at the Delhi Assembly Research Centre (DARC) since 2019. The Services department had compiled the information received from 23 departments and agencies of the Delhi government that engaged private persons as "specialists". During the scrutiny by the Services department, it was found that 69 persons were engaged in five departments of Archaeology, Environment, Delhi Archives, Women and Child Development and Industries without the approval of the competent authority. Also, 13 Boards, autonomous bodies which engaged 155 persons, did not take the necessary approval.

New GCC Policy to boost investment and innovation

Bengaluru airport to have train connectivity to city

To beat the chronic traffic problem in silicon city Bengaluru, the Indian Railways in a first of its kind has announced to connect the metropolitan to the Bengaluru Airport. Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnav said that, in addition to road, metro rail, and suburban railway services provided by the State government, Indian Railways will also introduce a train travel option from Kempegowda International Airport to Bengaluru city.

However, he noted that a few technical challenges need to be addressed before this can be implemented and the Railway team is working on resolving



them. Addressing media, Vaishnav said that people currently have access to Bengaluru airport via Metro Rail, road, and the suburban railway project managed by the Rail Infrastructure Development Company (Karnataka) (K-RIDE). K-RIDE, a joint venture between the Centre and the

state, is under construction and aims to enhance urban rail connectivity. "Apart from Metro Rail, road and K-RIDE, we are also creating a railway connectivity option to the airport," Vaishnav said. He recalled that during his last visit, he travelled by train from the airport to the city.

"I realised it was a

comfortable 40 to 45-minute ride. However, there were some technical issues, particularly the need to construct a rail flyover. The team has now completed the necessary work and they presented the concept to me today. I will share it with you soon. This will bring significant relief to the people," the Minister said. He also emphasised the importance of suburban and metro projects for Bengaluru, a city with a population of 1.5 crore. "It's a very large city, and we need to rapidly expand metro and suburban rail networks. The state and Centre must work in a synchronised manner," he pointed out.

Biryani, chicken curry included in Singapore's emergency meal kits

Curry chicken with biryani rice is among the five meal options prepared by SATS Ltd, or Singapore Airport Terminal Services, ready-to-eat foods for public consumption during national emergencies.

SATS, a Singapore-headquartered solutions company, has spent four to six months on research and development before finalising five meal options. Besides biryani - a popular Indian dish in the city-state, the other meal options are chicken bolognese pasta, fish porridge with sweet potato and pumpkin, sweet spicy tomato fish with basmati rice, and vegetable marinara pasta. The meals are prepared in a SATS halal-certified kitchen in Singapore, reported

Channel News Asia on Saturday. The report said these meals require no refrigeration, can be eaten at room temperature without reheating and have a shelf life of up to eight months.

Leveraging its experience in producing army combat rations, food caterer SATS has developed these products. "As with any ambient product, we have to do a real-time shelf-life study... once we are assured of the quality, then we launch the commercial production," said Jean Sin, head of innovation and product development at SATS. About 150,000 of these meals will be distributed between Saturday (February 15) and February 28 as part of this year's Exercise SG Ready, a component of Singapore's Total Defence campaign. The exercise allows people in Singapore to

experience simulated power outages and disruptions to food supplies, among other scenarios. More than 100,000 students and teachers from over 90 schools, and three Institute of Technical Education colleges, along with over 8,000 seniors from 111 Active Ageing Centres, will be able to try these meals.

While long-shelf-life meals are often assumed to be unappetising, a taste test revealed otherwise. The texture of the meals also closely resembled freshly cooked food, with the chicken, fish and rice maintaining a natural mouthfeel.

Nutritional value is another key consideration. Sin said the meals provide essential energy and nutrients, including carbohydrates, protein, fibre and fat.

AIIMS doctors remove live parasite from eye

 The AIIMS Bhopal has once again proven its excellence in the field of medical research and patient care. Recently, the Ophthalmology Department of AIIMS Bhopal successfully performed an extremely complex and rare surgical procedure, removing a one-inch-long parasitic worm from a patient's retina. This achievement highlights AIIMS Bhopal's expertise in advanced ophthalmic surgery and strengthens its commitment to providing world-class medical services to people across Madhya Pradesh and the entire country. A 35-year-old male patient from Rusali, Madhya Pradesh, was experiencing recurrent redness in his eyes and weakened vision. Despite consulting multiple doctors and using steroid eye drops and tablets, he only experienced

temporary relief. As his vision deteriorated further, he approached AIIMS Bhopal, where a live parasitic worm was discovered in the vitreous gel of his eye. Dr. Samendra Karkhur, the lead retina surgeon for this procedure, explained the complexity of the surgery, stating that removing a large, live parasite from the eye is extremely challenging. The worm actively tries to evade capture, making the surgery even more difficult. To safely extract it, the team employed a high-precision laser-fire technique to immobilize the parasite without damaging the delicate retinal structures. Once neutralized, the worm was successfully removed using vitreo-retinal surgical techniques. The parasite was identified as Gnathostoma spinigerum, which is very rarely found inside the eye. So far, only 3-4 cases have been

reported worldwide documenting this larva in the vitreous cavity of the eye. This parasite enters the human body through the consumption of raw or undercooked meat and can migrate to various organs, including the skin, brain, and eyes, causing severe health complications. Dr. Karkhur confirmed that the patient is now recovering well and is expected to regain vision soon. He also mentioned that in his 15-year career, this was the first time he had encountered and successfully managed such a case. Prof. Singh congratulated the medical team on this achievement, stating, "This case exemplifies AIIMS Bhopal's medical excellence and dedication to patient care. Successfully handling such rare and complex surgical cases showcases our expertise in ophthalmic surgery and strengthens our efforts."

Woman's life saved at Bhopal railway station

 A major accident was narrowly averted at Bhopal railway station on Friday when a woman fell between the platform and a moving train while attempting to disembark. Thanks to the quick response of Head Constable Ravindra Kumar Yadav, the passenger was rescued safely. The incident took place around 5 pm on platform number four when Megha Ahirwar, a resident of Damoh, mistakenly boarded the wrong train. Upon realizing her mistake, she panicked and attempted to get off while the train was still in motion. In the process, she lost her balance and slipped into the gap between the platform and the train. Head Constable Yadav, who was stationed at the platform, immediately rushed to her aid and pulled her to safety. His prompt action prevented a potential tragedy, leaving passengers in shock but relieved at the successful rescue. Following the incident, the Railway Administration urged passengers to board and alight only after trains have come to a complete stop to avoid such accidents. Authorities also commended Yadav for his bravery and presence of mind in saving the passenger's life. This incident serves as a stark reminder of the dangers of hurriedly boarding or exiting moving trains. Passengers are advised to exercise caution and patience for their own safety.

BMC aims to collect Rs 600 cr in revenues by March 31

 The Bhopal Municipal Corporation (BMC) on Saturday issued a stern warning to property owners who fail to pay their property tax for the year 2024-25 by February 28. The corporation has announced that defaulters will face a steep penalty, with property tax amounts doubling for those who miss the deadline. Under the current provisions, property owners who use their properties for residential purposes can avail themselves of a 50% discount on their property tax, provided they make the payment within the financial year. However, if the payment is delayed beyond this period, the rebate will be revoked. Instead, the tax will be calculated based on the full annual rental value of the property, and defaulters will be required to pay double the original amount. To further drive the point home, the civic body has also highlighted that if property owners miss the February deadline, the surcharge on property tax will increase from 6% to 9%. This means an additional 3% surcharge will be levied on the outstanding amount. In addition to these measures, the corporation has appealed to all property owners to ensure the payment of their 2024-25 property tax by March 31. Failing to do so will not only result in the removal of the 50% rebate but will also require defaulters to pay the full tax amount without any deductions. To facilitate taxpayers, the urban body has announced that all ward offices will remain open on Sundays and public holidays, ensuring that citizens have ample opportunity to make payments. Furthermore, residents can also pay their taxes online at their convenience. With the deadline fast approaching, the BMC urges all taxpayers to settle their dues on time and avoid any penalties or increased charges. An additional Commissioner Ekta Agarwal says that the cumulative target set for the revenue collection this year is Rs 600 crore. This includes Rs 500 crore for property tax and Rs 100 crore for water cess and other levies.

Weather to change again in MP from Feb 18

 After a brief respite from chilly winds, Madhya Pradesh is witnessing a gradual rise in temperature across various districts. However, meteorologists have predicted another shift in weather conditions from February 18, as disturbances in northern hilly regions may once again bring cold winds and a drop in temperatures across the state. According to weather experts, February often experiences seasonal fluctuations, and this year is no exception. The temperature, which had been rising steadily, has already started dipping in several districts, including the state capital, Bhopal. While the Malwanimar region is currently witnessing warmer temperatures, it is expected to see a decline in the coming days due to changing weather patterns in North India. Cold Winds to Make a Comeback

At present, the intensity of cold winds has reduced across Madhya Pradesh, leading to a warm spell in several regions. Many people have started considering this as the farewell of winter. However, meteorologists suggest that while severe cold conditions are unlikely to return, any fresh snowfall in the hilly areas could have a direct impact on the plains. This means that cold winds may pick up speed again, bringing a temporary dip in temperatures. With this shift, parts of the state may experience cloud cover and even light rainfall. Experts predict that cold conditions will persist until February 14, after which the weather is expected to return to normal. However, another round of temperature fluctuations is likely between February 12 and 20, with some regions witnessing drizzle or scattered showers. Farmers Advised to Stay Alert

The sudden change in weather conditions, expected between February 11 and 14, could bring light rain to some areas, prompting meteorologists to advise wheat farmers to take necessary precautions. While some districts may see the return of cold winds, others may experience minimal impact. According to experts, the weather will begin to stabilize after February 20, leading to a gradual increase in both day and night temperatures. However, the ongoing influence of icy winds from the northern states continues to keep temperatures fluctuating, causing unpredictable weather patterns across Madhya Pradesh. Authorities have urged residents to stay updated on weather forecasts and prepare for possible temperature drops and sporadic rainfall in the coming days.

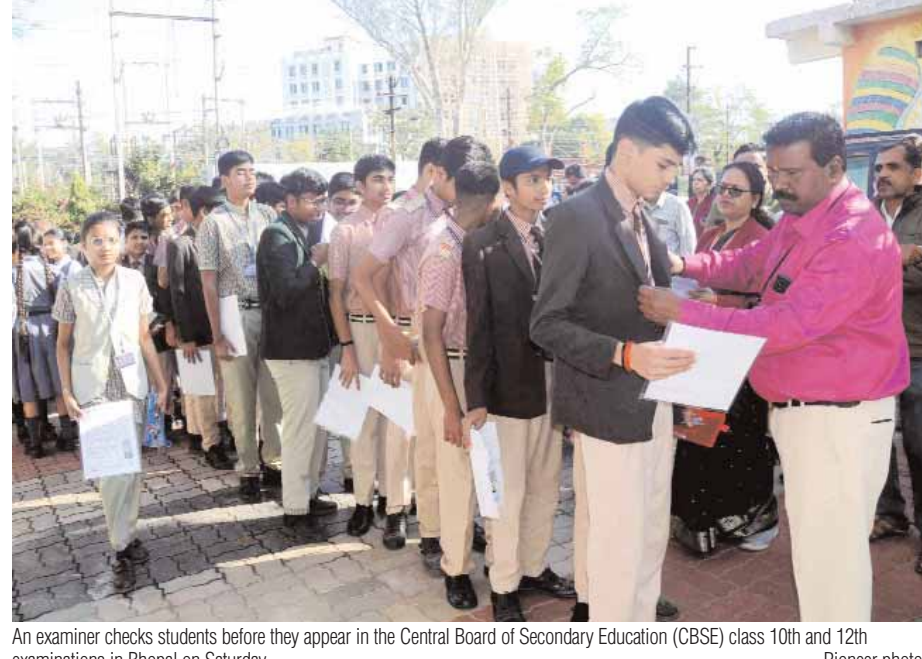
Cops suspended for mentioning 'Habitual complainant'

Bomb threat at Piplani school sparks panic, police probe on

 A school in Piplani, received a bomb threat on Saturday morning, causing panic among staff and visitors. The threat, sent via email to the official school ID at 10:30 am, warned of an IED blast at Harman Minor School. Although the school was closed for the day, some staff members and family members of students were present for a meeting. Upon receiving the threat, they immediately evacuated the premises and alerted the police. Police teams, including the Bomb Disposal (BD) unit, Dog Squad (DS), and Anti-Terror Squad (ATS), arrived promptly and conducted a thorough search of the school. Thana Incharge (TI) Anurag Lal confirmed that no suspicious objects were found during the inspection. However, during the investigation, police learned that a parcel of books had been delivered to the school from Delhi two days earlier. Suspecting its contents, the BD and DS teams opened and examined the parcel

but found only books inside. The threatening email was written in Telugu, a language understood by one of the school staff members, who translated it and alerted others. Approximately 50 people were present at the time, and the school was evacuated immediately as a precaution. Security at the school has since been heightened. Cyber experts are now working to trace the IP address of the sender to identify and locate the individual responsible for the threat. The incident has raised concerns, and authorities are taking all necessary measures to ensure the safety of the school and its occupants. Investigations are ongoing, and further updates are awaited.

Singhar accuses govt of silence over scams in MP

Umang Singhar, while addressing a press conference, criticized the Madhya Pradesh government for its silence on ongoing scandals in the state. He stated that while Prime Minister Narendra Modi speaks of "zero tolerance" for corruption, multiple scams continue to surface in Madhya Pradesh without any discussion in the state assembly. Singhar specifically pointed to the transport scam, alleging that ministers, officials, and contractors were involved in an illegal collection of Rs 1,500 crore annually. He accused the BJP government of attempting to cover up the scam, as no con-

crete action has been taken so far. He further alleged that key documents recovered from Saurabh Sharma have not been investigated, and his arrest was delayed by 41 days. Additionally, the call detail records (CDR) of Sharma's phone have not been released, which could potentially expose links to senior officials and politicians. According to Singhar, Govind Rajput was at the center of this racket, with all dealings being conducted from his office. He claimed that between 2019 and 2024, Rajput amassed properties worth over Rs 600 crore under the names of his wife, children, and relatives. In 2023, Rajput allegedly concealed assets worth Rs 134 crore in his affidavit. He

was also accused of misusing the Gyan Veer Committee for land transactions under the guise of donations. Further, Singhar alleged that Rajput and his business partners purchased properties in Delhi's Defence Colony and that a Union Minister received Rs 2 crore monthly from the transport department. Singhar demanded an impartial investigation into the scam and strict action against those involved. He also announced that the Congress would formally present a complaint regarding the matter to Prime Minister Narendra Modi in Bhopal. The Madhya Pradesh Congress has called for a high-level probe into the scam and stringent action against all corrupt officials and politicians.

ASHA workers being trained to provide doorstep palliative care

In a humanitarian effort aimed at alleviating the pain of those suffering from life-threatening diseases, the district health administration has decided to train ASHA workers to provide doorstep services to patients. The health workers are receiving five-day training to equip them with knowledge about elderly healthcare and palliative care, enabling them to deliver these services more efficiently at the community level. Doctors, nursing officers, and community health officers have already been trained. ASHA workers are a crucial part of the community. Through them, patients will receive physical, mental, social, and spiritu-

al counselling services. Additionally, they will provide guidance on managing pain, breathlessness, bleeding, nausea, vomiting, constipation, diarrhoea, wound care, bedsores, and perineal care. Patients and their families will also receive counselling and awareness on patient care and medication use. Palliative care is primarily needed for patients suffering from heart disease, cancer, severe respiratory diseases, AIDS, and diabetes. It is also essential for conditions such as kidney failure, chronic liver disease, rheumatoid arthritis, neurological disorders, dementia, congenital anomalies, and drug-resistant tuberculosis. Palliative care improves the quality of life for patients with severe illnesses, as well as for their families and caregivers.

BJP slams Singhar for false allegations

Bhopal: BJP state media in-charge Ashish Usha Agarwal responded to the press conference held by Leader of Opposition Umang Singhar, accusing him of once again resorting to baseless allegations. Agarwal stated that Singhar's claims were both laughable and contradictory, given that he himself has been surrounded by various accusations. He pointed out that during the 15-month tenure of the Kamal Nath-led Congress government, Singhar faced allegations of corruption related to purchases, transfers, and postings in his own ministry. Furthermore, when Singhar was appointed Congress in-charge for Jharkhand, even his own party leaders accused him of selling election tickets.

Agarwal further criticized Singhar's inconsistency, stating that he was the same leader who once called former Chief Minister Digvijaya Singh a liquor mafia, sand mafia, and blackmailer, yet now shares the stage with him. He challenged Singhar to first respond to the allegations of corruption and misconduct leveled against him before making accusations against others. He stated that the Congress party is synonymous with corruption. "C for Congress, C for Corruption," he remarked. He alleged that every member of Congress's first family—Rahul Gandhi, Sonia Gandhi, Priyanka Gandhi, and Robert Vadra—is either out on bail or frequently visiting courts and investigative agencies in connection with serious corruption cases.

of pressure. Bhaiya, talk later—just know that we are getting paid ₹700, and there's no fixed schedule." Additionally, people are being hired for hotel cleaning and other related work. Currently, in the capital city, several tasks such as road repairs, painting stripes, wall paintings, cleaning, installing signboards, waste disposal, and signal and streetlight repairs are creating numerous employment opportunities. The summit, scheduled for the last week of February, will see participation from PM Modi, top business minds, and over 10,000 attendees. Twin surgeries save abandoned newborn

Bhopal: A newborn girl, abandoned in a dustbin with her throat allegedly slit by her maternal grandmother in Rajgarh district last month, has been saved through timely twin surgeries and round-the-clock medical care at a government hospital in Bhopal. The infant, just a day old when she was found, suffered severe injuries to her neck muscles. A team of paediatric surgeons at Kamla Nehru Hospital in Bhopal performed two life-saving surgeries last month, followed by continuous medical supervision. The hospital staff, moved by her resilience, named her 'Pihu.' Dr Dharendra Shrivastava, head of the paediatrics department at Kamla Nehru Hospital, said, "Though we've successfully treated abandoned newborns in the past, this case was particularly critical. The wounds weren't superficial but very deep, causing damage to the neck muscles.

Wasted spaces beneath flyovers, metro links demand urgent attention

With flyovers and elevated metro rail links creating miles of dark, redundant spaces beneath them, now may be the last chance for city administrators to repurpose them into places that add to the urban aesthetic. Urban planners and researchers opposed to flyovers argue that road and rail linkages are detrimental to urban settlements, as they create vast stretches of negative space that soon degenerate into eyesores. As a living example of their concerns, the city has lost miles of premium urban land to these infrastructure projects, which seem to consider these

negative spaces as the collateral residents must pay for the 'modernisation' of their neighbourhoods. The latest example is the poorly lit, bumpy stretch under the Ambekar Flyover and the parallel elevated metro rail corridor at MP Nagar. With the majority of commuters now opting for the newly opened elevated road, vehicular traffic below the flyover has thinned out considerably, with motorists choosing to steer clear of the poorly planned space, which resembles a tunnel-like maze of metro and flyover pillars. Dozens of accidents, including several fatalities, during the long construction process did little to push urban planners and Public Works Department

(PWD) officials to improve the design of the flyover, which has cost the city over Rs 150 crore. Though the latest and most expensive, the Ambekar Flyover is not the only urban planning misadventure in the city. Over the last couple of decades, the state capital has been beset by several similar projects that residents say are driven by populism rather than a cohesive urban vision. The space beneath the Royal Market Flyover has been taken over by the homeless, stray cattle, and abandoned cars. One end of this flyover has been 'allotted' to a liquor vend, while the other serves as an open urinal for passersby. The situation at Karond flyover

is even worse. Civic authorities have yet to remove construction debris that has simply settled into lumps on the road beneath the flyover, turning the area into a nightmare for commuters. At the Arif Nagar flyover, squatters and ubiquitous pan shops have sprung up, and a part of the space has also been turned into a makeshift shanty. The neglect is only natural, as flyover projects, as of now, do not include the planning of spaces underneath them, which could so easily be turned into badminton courts or even adorned with plantations to its counter urban pollution. Those in the know say that part of this neglect is inherent in the process followed by the PWD during the pre-construction

stages of any project. They claim that even if stringent pre-qualifications are laid down for companies bidding for these construction contracts, the department has no transparent mechanism to assess the experience of officials managing these multi-crore projects. As a result of this shortcoming in the process, city residents are often left with no option but to learn to live with this megawastage of hard-earned public money. At a time when the city is desperately trying to attract investors to participate in its growth story, we hope urban planners are listening and will soon respond with a cohesive plan for these negative spaces in our midst.

CBSE exams for Classes 10, 12 begin

The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) exams for Classes 10 and 12 began on Saturday, with more than 42 Lakh students set to take the tests at over 7,800 centres across the country and abroad. According to board officials, a total of 24.12 Lakh Class-10 students will take the test in 84 subjects, while more than 17.88 Lakh students will appear in the Class-12 exams across 120 subjects. The exams are scheduled to be conducted at 7,842 centres in India and 26 abroad. On the first day of the exams, the Class 10 students appeared for the English (Communicative) and English (Language and Literature) papers, while the Class-12 students appeared in the Entrepreneurship exam. "The CBSE board exams for Classes 10 and 12 have started. Today, the Class-10 English and Class-12 Entrepreneurship exams were



held. The Class-10 exam took place at 7,780 centres, with over 23.86 Lakh students appearing, while the Class-12 exam was conducted at 995 centres with around 23,000 students," CBSE Examination Controller Sanyam Bhardwaj said.

"The exams were organised smoothly. I hope all the students reached their exam centres with enthusiasm and were able to take the tests in a positive environment," he added. Bhardwaj said the CBSE has ensured that all necessary guidelines and

security measures are in place to maintain the integrity of the examination process. "Schools and exam centres have been briefed on strict protocols to facilitate a fair and seamless examination experience. The CBSE had organised a live webcast on

Friday in the presence of school principals from Delhi-NCR, outlining the essential exam guidelines for the schools and stakeholders," he added. The Class-10 exams are scheduled to end on March 18, while the Class-12 exams will conclude on April 4. The CBSE started its annual counselling service ahead of the board exams to alleviate examination-related stress and support the students as they prepare for their theory exams. "A team of 66 trained professionals, principals, counsellors, special educators from CBSE-affiliated schools and psychologists will offer voluntary support to the students. The services are available from 9:30 am to 5:30 pm from Monday to Saturday," Bhardwaj said. "Fifty-one counsellors are based in India while 15 counsellors will connect from Nepal, Japan, Qatar, Oman and the United Arab Emirates to guide the students," he added.

Congress questions India's need for F35 fighter jets

Congress general secretary Randeep Surjewala on Saturday raised several questions on whether the country required expensive fighter jets like F35 aircraft from the US and if security experts and armed forces were consulted in the national interest. During Prime Minister Narendra Modi's recent visit, India and the US unveiled an ambitious plan to sign a new 10-year defence partnership and pursue co-production of key weapons and platforms with President Donald Trump announcing that Washington would increase sales of military hardware to New Delhi by millions of dollars including possible supply of F-35 stealth fighter jets. In multiple posts on X, Surjewala claimed there are many flaws in the F 35 aircraft and many accidents have happened, with some calling



them "junk" and others "useless". "There is a lot of discussion about Prime Minister Modi buying F 35 fighter aircraft from America, but did the Modi government consider these aspects in the interest of the country," he asked. The cost of flying an F 35 fighter aircraft is \$35,000 per hour, i.e. ₹28,00,000 per hour, he said, adding F 35 is the most expensive fighter aircraft in the world and the cost of one aircraft is approximately USD 110 million, or ₹968 Crore. "Does the Modi government think that the cost of Rs 28 lakh per hour is right for India and was the opinion of the Indian Air Force and defence experts taken in this regard," Surjewala asked. "Prime Minister Modi is buying F 35 fighter aircraft from America, but did the Modi government consider these aspects in national interest before taking a unilateral decision to buy F 35 aircraft at the behest of President Trump. Does the Indian Air Force want to buy F 35 fighter aircraft in accordance with the country's defence interests? Was the Air Force's opinion taken?" the Congress leader asked in another post in Hindi.

Kerala nurses council to bar ragging accused from continuing their studies

Amid widespread outrage over the brutal ragging incident at the Government Nursing College, the Kerala Nurses and Midwives Council (KNMC) on Saturday decided to bar all five accused students from continuing their studies. A council meeting convened here observed that the accused did not deserve to complete their studies or enter the service profession. The council further noted that those entering the nursing profession should be humane and compassionate—whereas the accused displayed cruelty toward their juniors—behaviour that is unacceptable in any circumstance. "We will never justify the incident. What we want to emphasise is



that allowing such individuals into the nursing profession would be a disaster," said Usha Devi, a council member. She said the Council would soon inform the concerned authorities of its decision. With this decision, the accused students can no longer continue their studies in Kerala, she added. The Council's ruling came a day after the state Health Minister indicated that strict action would be taken against those involved in the brutal incident. On Friday, the department suspended Principal Sulekha A T and Assistant

Professor/Assistant Warden-in-Charge of the student hostel, Ajeesh P Mani, pending an inquiry for allegedly failing to prevent ragging and effectively intervene in the matter. The hostel's housekeeper-cum-security staff was also ordered to be removed immediately, according to a statement issued by the Health Minister's office late Friday night. The action was taken following an inquiry conducted by the Director of Medical Education, as per the instructions of Health Minister Veena George, the statement added.

Delhi HC seeks CBIC's stand on betel nuts for customs

The Delhi High Court has sought the stand of Central Board of Indirect Taxes and Customs (CBIC) on a plea for resolving the issue of alleged mis-classification of betel nuts for the purpose of customs duty. The petitioner, a customs house agent, claimed the ambiguity on whether betel nuts would attract 100 per cent or 50 per cent basic customs duty has allegedly resulted in large-scale mis-classification, enabling duty evasion and causing significant financial harm to the government. The court was informed by the petitioner's advocate that complaints have also been filed with the Central Vigilance Commission (CVC) and other higher government authorities for action to be taken against the officers who are allegedly engaging in large scale duty evasion on the basis of this ambiguity in spite the



clarification provided by the Supreme Court. A bench of Justices Prathiba M Singh and Dharmesh Sharma noted that despite advance copies of petition being served to the authorities, their counsel have not been given any instructions. The court granted time to the counsel for the respondents to take instructions in the matter and listed it for further hearing on February 27.

The court said if no decision has already been taken on the complaints, it should be taken on an "early date". Advocate Kamini Lau, representing petitioner Bajrang Lal Sharma, said the issue has created enormous difficulties for customs house agents like the petitioner as no decision has been taken despite repeated complaints against the senior officials. The plea said the petitioner, along with several customs

house agents, are facing repeated harassment from a group of customs officers, even as the National Customs Targeting Centre (NCTC) received multiple complaints regarding the alleged mis-declaration and mis-classification of imported betel nuts under various names such as "boiled supari, API supari, chikni supari, and flavoured supari", being wrongly classified. It claimed this mis-

classification allowed importers to evade the 100 per cent basic customs duty (BCD) by paying only 50 per cent, and also bypass the Minimum Import Price conditions set by the Directorate General of Foreign Trade. The plea said the petitioner submitted a complaint to the CVC in March 2022, seeking urgent intervention against senior custom officer for his alleged involvement in duty evasion in collusion with others as the ongoing clearance of goods through mis-classification was causing significant revenue loss. However, the respondent departments failed to take any effective action, thereby allowing the duty evasion scam to continue unchecked, it claimed. The petition has arrayed the Centre through Ministry of Finance, CBIC, CVC and the Directorate General of Vigilance, Customs and Central Excise as respondents.

CIABC urges government to curb dumping of imported spirits

The Confederation of Indian Alcoholic Beverage Companies (CIABC) on Saturday urged the government to impose stringent measures to curb dumping of imported spirits and ensure greater market access for domestic products. The Confederation of Indian Alcoholic Beverage Companies (CIABC) said the Indian liquor manufacturers are not against reduction in import duty, though they have sought the import duty cuts in a phased manner. India on February 13 slashed import duty on bourbon whiskey to 100 per cent. It is mainly imported from the US. The confederation "has urged the government to address the concerns of the Indian companies and ensure a level-playing field in FTA (free



trade agreement) negotiations and set in stringent effective measures to check and curb dumping of imported spirits and seeking better international access for Indian alcoholic products which face several non-tariff restrictions at present," it said in a statement. It has also requested the states to withdraw excise duty concessions given to imported liquor in view of reduction in customs duty.

The government needs to safeguard the interests of Indian liquor manufacturers while deciding on issues related to customs duty cuts and other concessions under FTAs, CIABC Director General Anant S Iyer said. "Though we have already recommended to the government to cut basic customs duty on spirits over a period of 10 years, we also want the government to ensure better international

market access especially the Western countries and safeguard interests of Indian companies against any dumping of products through transfer price mechanism at lower prices specifically for India," Iyer said. He added non-tariff barriers imposed by other countries prevent a vast majority of Indian products being sold in the Western markets. "We also want these markets to recognise Indian whiskies at par with other global products," he said, adding the industry needs to be protected as there is always the fear of cheap imports in spirits and wines eroding the domestic industry. The alcoholic beverage industry contributes over Rs 3 lakh crore to the exchequer of states apart from adding central government's revenue in terms of customs duty and GST on a host of inputs.

India needs strong production base, not empty words: Rahul Gandhi

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi on Saturday said while India has the talent, it needs a strong production base, and not empty words, to build industrial prowess in new technology to give its youth jobs. In a post on X, Gandhi highlighted how China has started producing drones which are revolutionising warfare across the world, saying India needs to develop a strategy to become competitive in this area. "Drones have revolutionised warfare, combining batteries, motors and optics to manoeuvre and communicate on the battlefield in unprecedented ways. But drones are not just one technology -- they are bottom-up innovations produced by a strong industrial system. "Unfortunately, PM Modi has



failed to grasp this. While he delivers 'teleprompter' speeches on AI, our competitors are mastering new technologies. India needs a strong production base, not empty words," he said in the post, taking a swipe at Prime Minister Narendra Modi. "India has immense talent, scale and drive. We must have a clear vision and build real industrial prowess to give our youth jobs and lead India into the future," Gandhi added.

The Congress leader also tagged a nine-minute video on drone technology with the post, saying India has the talent and engineering skills to develop such technology for the future. He also referred to his speech in the Lok Sabha while speaking on the Motion of Thanks to the president's address, where he talked about new technology. In the video, Gandhi is heard saying that drones have

completely transformed the way wars are fought. "But drones are not just a technology -- they are a grassroots and small-scale innovation being produced by a robust industrial system. "Drones have diminished the importance of tanks, artillery and even aircraft carriers, bringing air power to the platoon level and reshaping intelligence and precision on the battlefield. But this revolution is not just limited to warfare -- it is also about industry, AI and next-generation technology," he said. "Unfortunately, PM Modi has failed to understand this. While he is busy giving speeches on AI by simply reading from a 'teleprompter', our competitors are mastering new technologies. India needs a strong production base, not empty speeches," Gandhi said.

Textbooks not challenge for intelligence, be smarter than smartphone: Sadhguru

Textbooks are not a challenge for intelligence and stress means the brain is not being oiled enough, spiritual leader Sadhguru Jaggi Vasudev said, as he shared mantras for playful learning and avoiding stress ahead of exams with students as part of the prime minister's latest 'Pariksha Pe Charcha' episode aired on Saturday. Sadhguru told students that they have to be smarter than their smartphones. He also shared tips on how to avoid overthinking during a special session of 'Pariksha Pe Charcha' -- an annual event in which Prime Minister Narendra Modi interacts with students appearing for board

examinations. In a shift from the traditional town hall format, Modi preferred a more informal setting this time and took students to Delhi's iconic Sunder Nursery for his annual interaction. Eminent personalities such as boxer MC Mary Kom and Bollywood actress Deepika Padukone have also shared their experiences and knowledge on key aspects of life and learning in different episodes of 'Pariksha Pe Charcha'. Next in the series are Bollywood actors Vikrant Massey and Bhumi Pednekar sharing tips on cultivating positivity, managing negative thoughts, and tackling exam stress with confidence. "For #ExamWarriors, among the biggest allies during

exam time is positivity. Tomorrow's 'Pariksha Pe Charcha' episode delves into this topic and we have @VikrantMassey and @bhumipednekar share their insights," PM Modi wrote on X. Teaching students how to practise meditation, Sadhguru said intelligence is not about usefulness. "Intelligence creates a profundeness of experience of life. If you feel stressed, it means the brain is not being oiled well," he said. "Your textbook is not a challenge for your intelligence, no matter who you are. No matter if you have not done well in school till now, I'm telling you for your intelligence that textbooks are not a challenge.



"You're unnecessarily making it difficult for yourself by approaching it in a certain way. Why can't you learn playfully? If you make it playful, your textbook will not be a challenge," Sadhguru added. The Isha Foundation chief

told students that they have to be smarter than their smartphones, while urging them to not treat exams as a "challenge to their intelligence." "If you look at the grass or that motorcycle, you should think what is the physics,

math and chemistry of it. Education gives you fundamentals and eventually an access to life. To find this access, one aspect is active dynamic intelligence," he said. Responding to a student's query on addiction to social media and phone, he said that a person should decide how to use a smartphone, not the other way round. He also said that there is no such thing as overthinking, as one must think beyond to be able to do something worthwhile. "You may call it stress or anxiety, but the problem is that you don't know how to keep your mind aligned. What is not well aligned will cause friction, further causing stress," Sadhguru said. Emphasising the power of

meditation, the spiritual leader said studies have shown that when the 'Shambhavi Mahamudra' is practised, a large part of the brain lights up. "This is what needs to happen, that everything is lit up. The more you activate your intelligence, the more access you have to everything that you see. If your body is well-exercised, you can function better. Then why is that not true with your mental faculties?" he asked. Sadhguru also warned against comparing the intelligence of people. "Am I as intelligent as this person or that person? There is no such thing. It's a farce that's been spread in the world. Everybody can sparkle and do things that others cannot imagine. Only

thing is, because there is no striving, that sparkle doesn't happen," he told students. Nutrition and health experts Shonali Sabherwal, Rujuta Diwekar and Revant Himatsingka; YouTuber Gaurav Chaudhary popularly known as 'TechGuruji' and Radhika Gupta, MD and CEO, Edelweiss Mutual Fund are among the other guests who have been part of the programme so far. The first edition of the interactive programme with school and college students was held at Delhi's Talkatora Stadium in 2018. Its seventh edition was held in a town hall format at the Bharat Mandapam last year, involving participants from around the country and abroad.

Digital lost and found centers reunite 20,000 at Mahakumbh

Akhilesh urges UP government to extend Maha Kumbh duration

Samajwadi Party (SP) chief Akhilesh Yadav has urged the Uttar Pradesh government to extend the duration of the ongoing Maha Kumbh, citing the overwhelming influx of devotees still hoping to participate. Yadav claimed that in previous years, the Maha Kumbh and Kumbh Mela spanned 75 days, whereas the current schedule is significantly shorter. "Even now, many people wish to visit the Maha Kumbh but are unable to do so. In such a situation, the government should extend its duration," Yadav said. Visuals circulating on social media depict overcrowded trains, congested roads, and massive crowds making their way to the pilgrimage site. Earlier this week, roads leading to the Maha Kumbh Mela witnessed severe traffic congestion stretching for kilometers, while the Prayagraj Sangam railway station was temporarily shut down due to the overwhelming rush of pilgrims. Yadav also accused the state

government of concealing the true number of deaths caused by a stampede at the Maha Kumbh last month. However, government officials have not yet responded to his allegations. The Maha Kumbh, considered the world's largest spiritual gathering, commenced on January 13 and is scheduled to conclude on February 26, coinciding with Maha Shivaratri. According to state government data, over 50.14 crore devotees have taken a holy dip at the

Sangam as of Saturday evening. Akhilesh Yadav also took aim at the BJP-led central government, alleging that the Waqf (Amendment) Bill tabled in Parliament was an attempt to divert public attention from pressing issues and mask the government's economic failures. "The government has introduced this legislation to engage people in unnecessary debates and distract them from real issues," he alleged.

J and K government fires three for terror links

The Union Territory administration on Saturday terminated the services of three government employees including a jailed policeman for their alleged involvement in terror-related activities. So far services of 79 government employees have been terminated by the Lieutenant Governor (LG) in the Union Territory for their terror links in the past few years. The sacked employees have been identified as police constable Firdous Ahmad Bhat, government school teacher Mohammad Ashraf Bhat, and orderly in the forest department Nisar Ahmad Khan who was earlier arrested in connection with the killing of a National Conference minister in 2000. Reacting strongly to the fresh termination orders of government employees Chief Minister Omar Abdullah said the law says everyone is innocent until anything is proven. "They should be given a chance to speak in the court and

if they cannot prove their innocence, only then appropriate action should be taken." The officials said the Lieutenant Governor invoked Article 311 (2) (c) of the Constitution to terminate the services of the three employees after an investigation by law enforcement and intelligence agencies established their terror links. According to official sources, the dismissed policeman, who was arrested in May last year, was initially appointed as a Special Police Officer (SPO) in 2005 and subsequently promoted to constable in 2011. Currently lodged in Kot Bhalwal Jail, Bhat was posted at a sensitive position in the Electronic Surveillance Unit in the J-K Police but started working for terror outfit Lashkar-e-Taiba (LeT). However, he got exposed when two terrorists - Waseem Shah and Adnan Beigh - were arrested in Anantnag with a pistol and a hand grenade as they were planning to attack non-local civilians and tourists, the officials said. During the interrogation, Bhat

revealed his sinister design and led to the recovery of a sizable quantity of arms including pistols, ammunition and explosives from his residential quarter in Police Housing Colony in Srinagar and a newly constructed house in Mattan, Anantnag. According to the official sources, Firdous Ahmad Bhat used his police constable cover, to transport arms, ammunition, and explosives for terrorists and investigation also revealed that he was also working for Hizbul Mujahideen's Commander Khurshed Dar and LeT terrorist Hamza Bhai and Abu Zarrar besides Jutt. "He not only provided classified information about security forces movement, collection, storage and delivery of arms ammunition but also guided terror attacks," the officials said. They said he was also found involved in an attack on a police party in 2020 which led to the killing of sub-inspector Ashraf Bhat, an attack on a group of tourists in Pahalgam on May 18 last year that left two persons

injured. Ashraf Bhat, a resident of Reasi who was appointed as 'Rehbar-e-Taleem' Teacher in 2008 and later regularised in June 2013, was affiliated with LeT. "For many years his activities were undetected but eventually came to light in 2022 and he was arrested and currently lodged in district jail, Reasi," the officials said. During the course of investigation, it was revealed that Bhat's handler was the most wanted LeT terrorist Mohd Qasim, who is based in Pakistan. "LeT found him to be very useful because as a teacher Bhat was best placed to radicalise youth and carry out terror activities. He helped LeT to raise finances for terror activities and coordinated transport of arms, ammunition and explosives," they said. Khan, who joined the forest department in 1996 as a helper and currently posted as an orderly at the forest range office, Verinag (Anantnag), was found working for Hizbul Mujahideen, the officials said.

Travel advisory against Assam hinders foreign investment: Himanta

Assam Chief Minister Himanta Biswa Sarma on Saturday said that travel advisory against the northeastern region by several countries is a major challenge in attracting investments, even as the state gears up for a mega business summit here later this month. Sarma said he has requested the countries to view Assam in isolation and not club all the North Eastern states together. He said talks are already underway with Japan, Australia and other nations to persuade them to withdraw the adverse advisory as the local government is pushing for viewing Assam "in isolation" from the other states of the region. Addressing a press conference in the run-up to Advantage Assam 2.0 Investment and Infrastructure Summit, Sarma said, "Most embassies have marked Assam in

'grey' and have a statutory warning for its citizens against visiting Assam, as the state is clubbed together as 'North East'. Removing these advisories is topmost priority for us." He said countries like Japan and Australia are being persuaded to change this advisory, with a team from the Asian country

already here to look into the matter while an Australian delegation is scheduled to reach shortly. There is no adverse situation in Assam, and all stakeholders, including government, media and public, have to be together to drive home this point, he asserted. "As Chief Minister of Assam, I

cannot influence other states. What I am doing is asking them (foreign nations), to view Assam in isolation," he added. "To attract foreign investment, the travel advisory has to be withdrawn. And at the same time, we also have to show them our strengths, like skilling options for our human resources, peace and stability - politically, economically and in law and order," he said. Non-availability of vast tracts of land needed for setting up big industries is also a problem for the state, which the government is working on to address, the CM added. "In spite of these limitations, we are in the process of ensuring foreign investment this time. And if we can address these issues, more investment will come. The people have a major role in taking forward the spade work being done by the government through the upcoming Summit," he maintained.

Telangana Congress slams claim on Reddy Government's collapse

BJP backs new faces for Municipal elections

The Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) has expressed confidence in new faces while selecting candidates for upcoming Municipal Elections. Talking about the former councillors of the BJP, only five have secured tickets. Out of a total of 36 wards, new candidates will contest in 31 wards. Earlier in the day, the BJP announced the names of ward councillor candidates for the MCG elections. Rajrani Malhotra will fight on the party's mayor ticket which was announced on Friday night. According to the list, among the former councillors, Brahm Yadav from Ward 9, Kuldeep Yadav from Ward 11, Aarti Yadav from Ward 24, Anoop Singh from Ward 25 and Dharambir from Ward 28 have BJP tickets.

At the same time, many old faces contested the 2017 elections as independents and this time BJP has given them tickets. Madhu Batra, wife of former senior deputy mayor Yashpal Batra from Ward 30, won the 2017 corporation election as an independent candidate. Dilip Kumar Sahni has got a ticket from Ward 31. In the 2017 elections, his wife Rajni contested as an independent candidate and defeated Geeta Rani of BJP by 2,984 votes. Sheetal Bagdi from Ward 33 and Rekha Saini, wife of former councillor Dinesh Saini from Ward 36, have been given tickets by the BJP. Dinesh Saini contested the 2017 corporation election as an independent candidate from Ward 8 and won by 98 votes. Sheetal Bagdi also contested as an independent and won. In the 2017, MC elections, 14 candidates won on BJP tickets. But this time the tickets of

many have been refused. Shankutala Yadav contested the election from Ward 2 on a BJP ticket and won by 2010 votes. But this time the party did not give her a ticket. Similarly, Ravinder Yadav from Ward 3 secured his victory by 1249 votes on a BJP ticket, but this time he lagged in the race for the ticket. Former Mayor Vimal Yadav's wife, Rimple Yadav, got a ticket from Ward 5, and she won by 906 votes. This time she did not get a BJP ticket. Ashwini Sharma from Ward 23 and Sunita from Ward 33 were victorious on BJP tickets, but this time they could not get the ticket. In the 2017 elections, BJP won 14 out of a total of 35 seats. Congress did not contest the election on its symbol, due to which several independent candidates won. Many of them later joined the BJP. After this, the BJP got a total of 27 members in the corporation house.

SC's Justice Oka pulls up Maharashtra government for poor infrastructure

Supreme Court (SC) Justice Abhay Oka on Saturday criticised the Maharashtra government for lack of basic infrastructure for the judiciary, while asserting the situation in neighbouring Karnataka was different. Justice Oka was a judge in Bombay High Court before he was appointed as Chief Justice of Karnataka High Court, from where he was elevated to the apex court. Speaking at the Ashok Desai Memorial Lecture on the topic 'What ails our criminal justice system - some thoughts', Justice Oka said, "We struggle to get infrastructure from Maharashtra government. We lack basic infrastructure. It is very difficult to get infrastructure from Maharashtra government." He said judges of the civil court complex in Pune do not even have separate chambers. He, however, was quick to add that there has been change in the last five years. "It is very very different in Karnataka. There whatever the judiciary asks the Government gives.

rule and jail the exception. Referring to Section 41 of Code of Criminal Procedure (CrPC), he said it was not necessary or mandatory for the police to arrest each and every accused even in cases where the offence is punishable with a jail term of more than seven years. "Presence of accused for investigation can be secured by issuing summons. But the ground level reality is very different. There is lot of pressure exerted on police machinery by citizens, NGOs, political leaders and media. Political leaders make statements that they will ensure the accused is arrested and put behind bars," the apex court judge said. "This is the sad reflection of the retributive tendency which still exists in our society. People still believe that once a person is arrested he is guilty," he said while criticising the ongoing trend of trial on social media. "Every citizen has right to criticise judgements. But it has to be constructive criticism. But this media trial or trial on social media platforms is not correct. People lack basic elementary knowledge of our criminal justice system. They do not know the difference between bail and acquittal. As judges we

cannot go by perceptions - what people say, what social media says. We have to go by evidence," he asserted. Justice Oka said two or three decades back, courts used to grant bail without going into the merits of the case but the same cannot be done now. With restrictions imposed on bail in new legislations like Unlawful Activities Prevention Act (UAPA), Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) and Narcotic Drugs and Psychotropic Substances Act (NDPS), courts are forced to, prima facie, go into the facts of the case even while deciding bail pleas, Justice Oka pointed out. "Courts burdened with these cases are not able to hear regular bail matters. If you see very old cases, the HC used to just say bail granted. And no one used to say anything. But nowadays, the high courts and the Supreme Court have to do very tightrope walking," he said. "We need to go into details. Sometimes we say why so much details, sometimes we say why such short cryptic orders. Judges face criticism for not giving bail to people in some cases," Justice Oka remarked.

How many travel agents booked for human trafficking, Bajwa asks CM Mann

Punjab Congress leader Partap Singh Bajwa on Saturday alleged that the Bhagwant Mann government in the state has "failed" in curbing human trafficking. His remarks came on a day when a second plane carrying 119 Indian deportees from the US will land at Amritsar airport. Bajwa, Leader of the Opposition in the Punjab Assembly, asked CM Mann how many travel agents were booked for human trafficking in the last three years. He said the Punjab Prevention of Human Smuggling Act 2012 regulates the profession of travel agents to check and curb illegal activities. "Can CM Bhagwant Mann, who also holds the Home portfolio, let the Punjabis know how many travel agents have been booked under the same law in the last three years," Bajwa asked. "Mann said that illegal immigra-

tion is not only a problem in Punjab but a national problem. True, but, is his government not responsible if any illegality happens in the state? He seems to have been running away from his responsibilities," the Congress leader said in a statement. It was AAP's one of the main

election planks to stop the brain drain by motivating youngsters to explore careers in the home state, he added. Bajwa said it has been 10 days since the first flight carrying 104 deportees including 30 Punjabis arrived in Amritsar. But the Mann government "failed" miserably to provide a

helping hand and announce any rehabilitation programme for deportees hailing from Punjab, he alleged. Mann has not announced any compensation for them, he further said. The AAP government has not assured them that the government would help them get their

money refunded by the illegal travel agents, said Bajwa. "Mann says he is going to receive the 119 deportees arriving today in Amritsar. In the absence of a rehabilitation programme and compensation, this act of Mann is nothing more than a publicity stunt," he said. A plane carrying 119 illegal immigrants from the US will land at the Amritsar airport on Saturday, the second such batch of Indians to be deported by the Donald Trump administration as part of its crackdown on illegal migration. The flight is expected to land at the airport around 10 pm on Saturday, official sources said. Among the 119 deportees, 67 are from Punjab alone. Of the rest 52 deportees, 33 are from Haryana, eight from Gujarat, three from Uttar Pradesh, two each from Goa, Maharashtra and Rajasthan, and one each from Himachal Pradesh and Jammu and Kashmir.

Zelensky, Scholz toughen stands

TRUMP'S UNSETTLING POLICIES

Two top European leaders stiffened their spines on Saturday over unsettling new policies from Washington under President Donald Trump, as Ukraine's president urged creation of an "armed forces of Europe" and the leader of Germany denounced meddling in its election after US Vice President JD Vance met

with a German far-right leader. Strident speeches from Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky and German Chancellor Olaf Scholz on Day 2 of the Munich Security Conference testified to the impact of a blizzard of Trump decisions that have resonated at home and in Europe,

notably his hopes to end the Russia-Ukraine war and nurture perceived allies on the continent. Ramping up his desire for a more muscular and mighty Europe, Zelensky said Ukraine's three-year fight against an invading Russian army has proved that a founda-

tion exists for the creation of a European army that has long been discussed among some continental leaders. "I really believe that time has come," he said. "The armed forces of Europe must be created." It's unclear whether the idea will catch on with European leaders. Zelensky has sought greater military and economic support from the European Union for years and repeatedly warned

that other parts of Europe could be vulnerable to Russia's expansionist ambitions too. While the bloc — along with the United States — has been one of Kyiv's strongest backers, pockets of political disagreement in EU over its approach to Moscow and economic realities, including national debt levels that have crimped defence spending, have gotten in the way of greater support. Earlier, German Chancellor Olaf Scholz said he was "pleased" at what he called a shared commitment with the United States to the "preserving the sovereign independence of Ukraine," and agreed with Trump that the Russia-Ukraine war must end.

But also Scholz took aim at the new political tack from Washington, affirming his strong stance against the far-right and said his country won't accept people who "intervene in our democracy" — alluding to remarks by US Vice President JD Vance who scolded European leaders over their approach to democracy. Ahead of February 23 elections in Germany, polls show the far-right Alternative for Germany (AfD) party — whose co-leader met with Vance on Friday — currently in second, ahead of Scholz's own Social Democrats.

Hamas frees 3 hostages, Israel releases hundreds of prisoners

Hamas-led militants released three male Israeli hostages on Saturday and Israeli forces freed hundreds of prisoners in return, in the latest indication that a fragile ceasefire that had teetered in recent days is holding. Militants in the southern Gaza Strip paraded the three hostages — Iair Horn, 46, a dual citizen of Israel and Argentina; American-Israeli Sagui Dekel Chen, 36; and Russian-Israeli Alexander (Sasha) Troufanov, 29 — before a crowd before releasing them. They were transported to Israel to be reunited with their families and to receive medical evaluation in a hospital. All had been abducted from Kibbutz Nir Oz, a community that was hard-hit in the October 7, 2023, attack that ignited the war. They appeared pale and worn, but seemed in better physical condition than the three men released last Saturday, who emerged emaciated from 16 months of captivity. A tense dispute had jeopardised the nearly four-week-old truce in recent days and threatened to renew the fighting.

US President Donald Trump's controversial proposal to remove more than 2 million Palestinians from Gaza and settle them elsewhere in the region has cast even more doubt on the future of the ceasefire. But Hamas said on Thursday it would move ahead with the release of more hostages after talks with Egyptian and Qatari officials. The group said the mediators had pledged to "remove all hurdles" to ensure Israel would allow more tents, medical supplies and other essentials into Gaza. As with previous exchanges, the hostage release was heavily choreographed, with the captives made to walk onto a stage and speak into microphones before the crowd. Dozens of masked, armed Hamas fighters lined up near the stage festooned with Palestinian flags and banners of militant factions. In Tel Aviv's Hostages Square, a huge cheer went up as the hostages were transferred to the Red Cross. "Iair, Sagui and Sasha are on their way home!" an announcer said. In return for the hostages' release, Israel began releasing 369 Palestinian prisoners and detainees. A bus carrying the first

released prisoners arrived in the occupied West Bank town of Beitunia and were greeted by a cheering crowd of relatives and supporters. Some appeared gaunt, and the Palestinian Red Crescent emergency service said four were immediately taken for medical treatment. Most of those released were transported to Gaza, where a large crowd greeted them in Khan Younis, the same town where the hostages had been released hours earlier. It is the sixth swap since the ceasefire took effect on January 19. Before Saturday, 21 hostages and over 730 Palestinian prisoners were freed during the first phase of the truce. Horn was abducted along with his brother, Eitan Horn, who had been staying with him at the time. Eitan, 37, remains in captivity and is not on the list of hostages expected to be released in the ceasefire's first stage. "Now, we can breathe a little. Our Iair is home after surviving hell in Gaza," his family said in a statement. "Now, we need to bring Eitan back so our family can truly breathe." Dekel Chen had been working outside when militants stormed the kibbutz. His pregnant wife, Avital Dekel Chen, hid in a safe room with their two daughters. She gave birth to their third daughter two months later. Speaking to Israeli media Saturday, she said she was overwhelmed with happiness to see Sagui back in Israel, where he will meet his youngest daughter, Shachar, for the first time. Troufanov, whose father was killed during the October 7 attack, was taken hostage along with his grandmother, mother and girlfriend. The three women were released during a brief ceasefire in November 2023. Troufanov was informed of his father's death after his release, shortly before being reunited with his family, who said they were "overwhelmed with emotion and gratitude" as he crossed into Israeli territory.

Dressed natively in a white T-shirt and black tracks, Rohit Sharma got down from his car, and walked towards his teammates at the departure lounge amid loud calls of 'Rohit bhai' and 'Rohit sir' by fans waiting near the Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj International Airport entrance. Most of the squad members arrived in the team bus including head coach Gautam Gambhir, vice-captain Shubman Gill and star batter Virat Kohli and the stars obliged some fans by signing autographs or waving at a few of them. Soon, the team boarded an afternoon flight to Dubai for the upcoming Champions Trophy amid heightened optimism of netting another global trophy after winning the T20 World Cup last June. A Jasprit Bumrah-less India will open their campaign



against Bangladesh on February 20 in Dubai before the much-anticipated blockbuster against traditional rivals Pakistan February 23, and then the Men in Blue will take on New Zealand on March 2 to round off their league engagements. The confidence - of the fans and the team - has been boosted by India's recent 3-0

ODI series whitewash at home over England. Those supporters assembled at the Mumbai airport will be hoping that the icons led by Rohit and Kohli will pull off another triumph like they did in the West Indies last year. One last opportunity for greatness? Few months ago, Hardik Pandya had walked out with the T20 World Cup trophy hoisted on his shoulders to join a sea of passionate fans on the streets near the Wankhede Stadium for an open bus parade. If those scenes are to be repeated next month, then India will need some runs from Rohit and Kohli, who have copped heavy criticism after repeated failures in Test cricket. But they replied in kind, as Rohit made a characteristically fluent hundred - a 90-ball 119 in Cuttack ODI against England - and Kohli his 73rd fifty in Ahmedabad.

Aditi Ashok was the lone Indian to make the cut after she carded an even-par 72 in the penultimate round of the PIF Saudi Ladies International held at Riyadh Golf Club. She shot an even par 72 to be 3-under for 36 holes. At T-33, she was among the top 60 and ties who qualified for the final round. Among the other Indians Pranavi Urs (70-73) was 1-under but missed the cut which fell at 2-under 142, Diksha Dagar (75-69) also exited as did Tvesa Malik (73-73). Thailand's Jeeno Thitikul fired a round of 8-under 64 to move to the top of the leaderboard at 13-under-par. She holds a three-shot lead heading into the final day. The world number four rolled in back-to-back birdies on the first two holes before adding

another on the fifth, Thitikul then rolled in three birdies on the trot on holes seven to nine. Another birdie came on the 12th before the 21-year-old's only dropped shot of the day on the 15th but the 2021 Race to Costa del Sol champion finished with a flourish with birdies on 17 and 18 to be in pole position. England's Annabel Fuller and Korea's Somi Lee sit in second place on the leaderboard on 10-under-par. Switzerland's Chiara Tamburlini and Austria's Emma's Spitz are in a share of fourth place on nine-under-par after 36 holes. Seven players are in a tie for sixth place with Thailand's Ariya Jutanugarn, Denmark's Nanna Koerstz Madsen, Germany's Esther Henseleit, China's Muni He, Korea's Minsun Kim, Australia's Steph Kyriacou and Germany's Olivia Cowan all on eight-under-par.

Wrestlers appeal for Albania Ranking Series approval

Asian champion Sunil Kumar, U-23 Asian Championship gold winner Minakshi and several other Indian wrestlers gathered at Sports Minister Mansukh Mandaviya's residence on Saturday, seeking his intervention to secure approval for their participation in the upcoming Ranking Series in Albania. The ministry has withheld approval for the wrestlers to participate in the second Ranking Series of the year scheduled to take place in Tirana, Albania, from February 26 to March 2. "We are unable to participate in the tournament and hence we came to the minister's residence to request him to let us participate in the tournament," Kumar said. "It will help us in the Asian Championship in Amman in March (as points will decide) the draws and first-round bouts," he added. However, the minister was travelling and unavailable. The gathered bunch of 8-10 wrestlers waited till about 2pm outside his residence before dispersing. "Earlier, we were not allowed to participate in World Ranking Championship in Croatia, and now we are not allowed to go to Albania. We came here to request, we don't know the reason," Minakshi said. "We are 30 wrestlers, there is no response. We came here and got to know that the minister is not here." The ministry has cited the

Wrestling Federation of India's (WFI) failure to submit the necessary recommendations on time as the reason for withholding the approval. WFI had sent the proposal to the Sports Authority of India (SAI) on January 30, almost a month before the start of the tournament, a WFI source had told PTI on Friday. Due to the ongoing tussle between the ministry and the suspended WFI, the wrestlers had also missed the first Ranking Series in Zagreb, Croatia. Although the WFI was suspended by the ministry in December 2023, it remains recognised by the international wrestling body (UWW). The event will be followed by the Senior Asian Championships in Amman, Jordan, from March 25-30, the third Ranking Series in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia, from May 29-June 1, and the fourth Ranking Series in Budapest, Hungary, from July 17-20. Competing in Ranking Series is

very important for Indian wrestlers. By doing well there, they earn points and that helps them get seedings at World Championship.

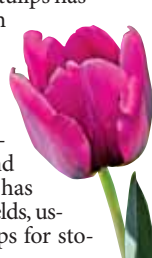
value soaring beyond gold. Though the frenzy eventually collapsed, the Dutch devotion to tulips never waned.

A SKY FULL OF WINGS

Discover a world untouched by noise, where only the wings of birds break the silence, says **SAKSHI PRIYA**

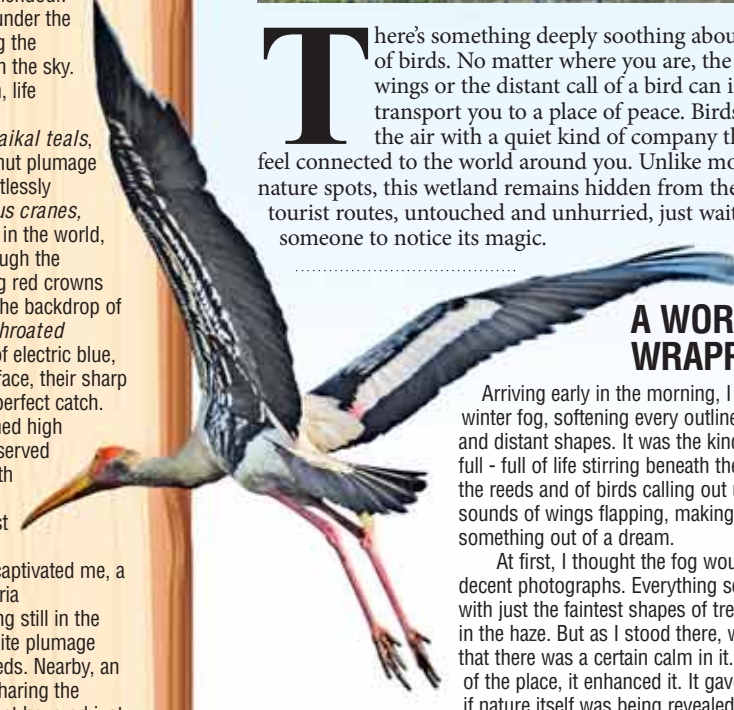


WHEN THE SKY COMES TO LIFE

Around 11 AM, the sun began to work its magic. The first rays of sunlight began to filter through, slowly dissolving the fog. The *Dhanauri Wetlands* were finally revealed in all their splendour. The lake shimmered under the golden light, mirroring the movements of birds in the sky.

In every direction, life unfolded in the most mesmerising ways. *Baikal teals*, their green and chestnut plumage gleaming, glided effortlessly across the water. *Sarus cranes*, the tallest flying birds in the world, waded gracefully through the shallows, their striking red crowns standing out against the backdrop of endless blue. *White-throated kingfishers*, streaks of electric blue, darted across the surface, their sharp beaks poised for the perfect catch. *Black drongos*, perched high on bare branches, observed their surroundings with quiet confidence.

Then, in the midst of it all, I spotted something that truly captivated me, a *Painted stork* (*Mycteria leucocephala*), standing still in the water, its pink and white plumage vibrant against the reeds. Nearby, an *Ibis* sat motionless, sharing the space with an egret that hovered just above. They did not interact, nor did they compete. They simply coexisted, bound by the same stillness that surrounded them. It was a reminder that nature does not rush, nor does it seek control, simply is.



A WORLD WRAPPED IN FOG

There's something deeply soothing about the presence of birds. No matter where you are, the soft flutter of wings or the distant call of a bird can instantly transport you to a place of peace. Birds seem to fill the air with a quiet kind of company that makes you feel connected to the world around you. Unlike most popular nature spots, this wetland remains hidden from the typical tourist routes, untouched and unhurried, just waiting for someone to notice its magic.

I found this solace in the *Dhanauri Wetlands*, near *Thasrana* in *Uttar Pradesh*, a place that feels like a hidden sanctuary untouched by the noise of modern life. Unlike crowded nature reserves, it does not call out for attention. Instead, it waits patiently, its beauty unfolding only for those willing to step into its stillness. It was in this mist-laden landscape that I discovered the true magic of being among birds, where silence speaks, and nature embraces you without asking for anything in return.

A FRAGILE HAVEN WORTH PROTECTING

Yet, as untouched as it seems, the *Dhanauri Wetlands* are not invincible. Like many natural spaces, they face growing threats from habitat destruction, pollution and human encroachment. It's easy to assume that places like this will always exist, remaining undisturbed and waiting for the next visitor to discover them. However, the truth is, without conscious effort to protect them, they may not. For those who have ever found comfort in nature, who have stood still just to listen to the world breathe, places like *Dhanauri* are not simply landscapes. They are living sanctuaries, home to thousands of species, each playing its part in the delicate balance of life.

A PLACE THAT DEMANDS NOTHING BUT PRESENCE

One of the most striking things about *Dhanauri Wetlands* is not just its visual beauty but its quietness. In a world constantly buzzing with movement and noise, finding a place that does not demand attention, but instead rewards those who choose to be present, is rare. There were no distractions here, no honking cars, no flashing screens, just the simple, unbroken sounds of water lapping against the shore, wings flapping overhead and birds calling out to one another.

It is a place that does not overwhelm but instead invites you to slow down. Whether you're there to watch the birds, capture the beauty through your camera or just enjoy a moment of peace, it offers more than a pretty sight, it gives you a sense of connection to something much bigger than yourself.

A SANCTUARY ON THE BRINK

The *Dhanauri Wetlands* are at risk, once a sanctuary for birds like the *Sarus Crane* and *Painted Stork*, now threatened by encroachment and neglect. With land repurposed for construction, the ecosystem is shrinking and disrupting its delicate balance. Water pollution and disappearing green buffers worsen the crisis. Without urgent protection, this vital habitat, which supports biodiversity, flood control and climate regulation, may soon be lost, leaving behind only memories of its once-thriving wildlife.



Recognised as an Important Bird Area (IBA) by BirdLife International and extensively studied by the Bombay Natural History Society (BNHS), *Dhanauri* plays a pivotal role in global bird conservation. Each year, between November and March, the wetland transforms into a sanctuary for over 50,000 migratory waterfowl, reinforcing its importance as a breeding and nesting ground

A MOMENT WITH NATURE

At *Dhanauri Wetlands*, you'll find yourself surrounded by the beauty of nature. Expect to spot the striking *Baikal Teal*, the towering *Sarus Crane* and the graceful *White-throated Kingfisher*. The *Black Drongo* and *Citrine Wagtail* add charm to the scenery, while the *Painted Storks* and *Ibis* soar across the sky, truly making you feel one with the wilderness. The *Bull-headed Shrike* perches quietly, surveying the land, while flocks of birds move in perfect harmony, painting the wetlands with life.

The *Sarus Crane*, the world's tallest flying bird, glides through wetlands with elegance, its vivid red head and long legs creating a breathtaking sight in nature's tranquillity

At a time when rapid urbanisation threatens natural ecosystems, *Dhanauri Wetlands* stands as a critical stronghold for avian biodiversity. Home to over 150 *Sarus cranes*, the state bird of *Uttar Pradesh* and sheltering 217 bird species, including 23 endangered and vulnerable ones, this wetland is an ecological necessity.

waterfowl, but the push for conservation has yet to gain the urgency it deserves. With habitat loss accelerating, the fate of *Dhanauri* is about the larger battle to protect our natural heritage before it is too late.

A JOURNEY WORTH TAKING

If you decide to visit, go early in the morning, before the mist lifts completely. Walk quietly along the lake's edge, listen to the calls of unseen birds and let yourself be immersed in the stillness. Watch as the fog dissolves into golden light, revealing a world teeming with life. *Dhanauri Wetlands* is an experience, a reminder that, in the presence of birds, you are never truly alone.

The restaurant industry has long been a playground for seasoned professionals, but a new wave of young entrepreneurs is rewriting the rules. These are not just ambitious dreamers banking on Instagrammable décor and buzzy themes, they are deeply invested in the food itself. Menu planning, ingredient sourcing, and tastings are their daily bread, and their knowledge surpasses even some chefs I have met.

Take, for instance, Tusheeta Khanna and Anant Bali, the young duo behind *Encanto*, a newly opened Mexican restaurant in Gurgaon. Their passion for authenticity is evident, not just in the food, which is impressive, but in their understanding of every dish, its origins, and the nuances of each ingredient. Too often, I have seen chefs operate with a superficial grasp of their own menu, but these two could school many in the trade.

Then there is Vanshika Wadhwa, carrying forward her family's legacy in the food business. Daughter of renowned restaurateur Vineet Wadhwa of *Fio*, she has launched *Kamei*, an Asian

restaurant that has already won over some of the most discerning food critics. Though I have yet to visit her outlets, the praise from trusted voices makes me confident she is onto something remarkable.

And let us talk about Bhagyesh Tekriwal and Utkarsh Khandelia, the brains behind *Sorbo*, a Mediterranean restaurant that speaks volumes of their dedication. While not as young as the others, their work reflects the

same meticulous approach, one where the food is the hero, not just the ambiance.

Moving beyond the NCR, Jaipur has its own rising star in Sagar Naggal, the force behind *Swinton House*. Built within an old haveli once owned by a British architect, the restaurant curates a menu inspired by his favourite dishes from around the world. The charm of the setting, combined with a well-thought-out culinary selection, makes it a standout in the Pink City's ever-growing food scene.

Further north, in Mohali, Arpit Singh is making waves with *Prey*, an avant-garde concept built over a dam.

With open-air dining lit by kerosene lamps, the space exudes a dreamy, romantic charm, setting the stage for an unforgettable dining experience. His vision proves that ambience and cuisine can come together to create something truly special.

Just today, I met Muskan Katyal, the niece of Porus

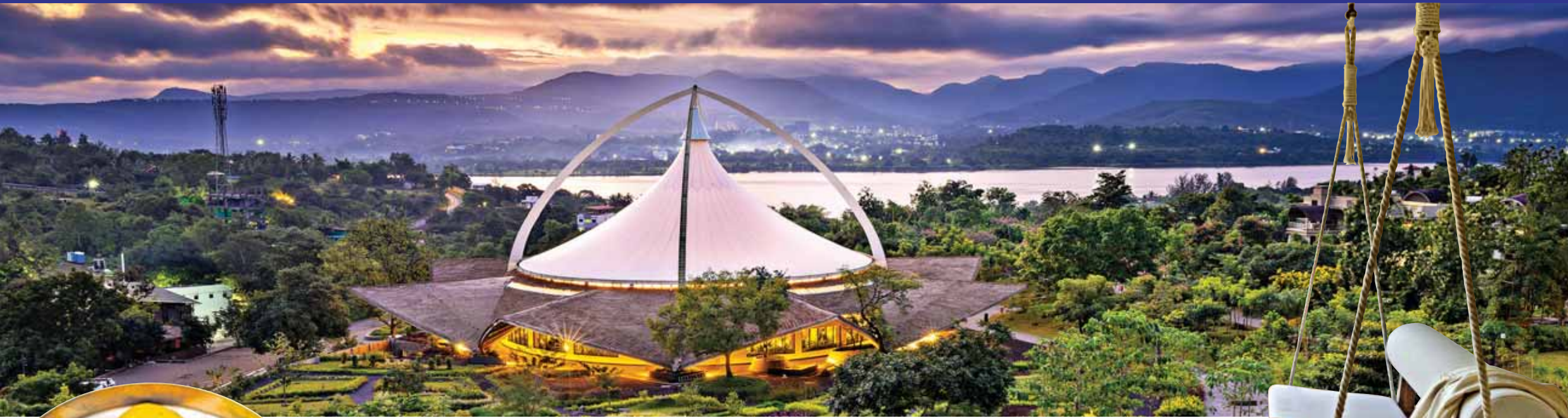


Arora, the name behind *Sticky Rice, Enoki*, and more. She is the same age as Tusheeta and Anant and is already making waves with *Mala Project*, a Gurgaon-based restaurant dedicated to the fiery flavours of Chinese Mala cuisine. Her involvement in the project along with Porus and Tanvi Arora is not just token ownership, she is hands-on, ensuring the authenticity of every bite.

If these young restaurateurs are any indication, the future of dining in India is in excellent hands. Their enthusiasm, knowledge, and commitment to quality are setting new standards. This is not just a generational shift, it is a culinary revolution, and I, for one, am eager to see what they cook up next. —Pawan Soni

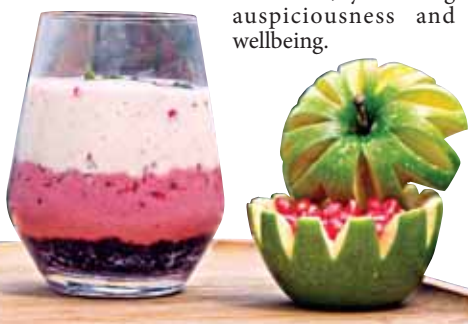

Chettinad: Unleashing the Ghosts of Imagination

Though known for its stunning architecture, rich cultural heritage, and unforgettable cuisine, Chettinad hides a deeper mystery, the kind that stirs the imagination

ground spices from a Chettinad kitchen.

And so, here I am, in *Chettinad*, on a journey to unravel its mysteries. It is not merely a destination, it is an experience, an ongoing unravelling that draws you in deeper with every step.

When speaking of South India, it is impossible to ignore the region's vibrant culture and magnificent architecture. The interplay of bright colours, lush greenery, and the salty air gives this part of India its unique character, attracting visitors from all corners of the globe. One such captivating destination is *Chettinad*, the homeland of the Nattukottai Chettiars (also known as Nagarathars), a prosperous banking and business community. The name "Chettinad" refers to a region comprising 56 villages in the Sivagang district and 20 in the Pudukkottai district. Historically, this area was part of the Ramnad kingdom of Pandya Nadu.

Despite lacking typical tourist attractions like beaches or lofty hill stations, *Chettinad* captivates visitors with its majestic mansions, architectural masterpieces that stand in stark contrast to the arid landscape. These grand homes, some more

than 300 years old, whisper stories of the generations who once lived under their roofs. The *Chettiar* community, originally merchants and traders dealing in salt, gems, textiles and jewellery, controlled much of India's banking economy in the 19th century. Their legacy is written in the stunning mansions that still stand today, some meticulously preserved as heritage properties, while others gradually succumb to the ravages of time.

The Athangudi Palace is one such treasure, showcasing the finest elements of *Chettiar* architecture. For a modest fee of INR 50, visitors can explore its open courtyards, elegant verandahs, and the seamless blend of European and Indian architectural styles. Built in the early 20th century, the palace boasts imported wood, marble, tiles, and mirrors from around the world. Its interiors, maintained with painstaking care, offer a rare glimpse into the grandeur of the Chettiars' past.

For those with a spiritual inclination, *Chettinad* is home to some remarkable temples. A visit here would be incomplete without exploring the Ariyakkudi Thiruvangadamudaiyan Temple, dedicated to Lord

Srinivasa. Built in the 17th century by Sevugan *Chettiar*, a devout Saivite, this temple was constructed after the divine Lord Venkateswara appeared to *Chettiar* in a dream, instructing him to build a temple in his village. The temple's Dravidian architecture is awe-inspiring, reflecting the community's deep devotion.

Chettinad also holds its share of ancient fortifications. The Thirumayam Fort, built in 1687 by Raja Raghunatha Thevar of Ramanathapuram, sits atop a hillock. It encompasses temples, caves, a jail, and even a mysterious pond. As my guide, Kavita, excitedly narrated the fort's history, I was particularly drawn to a natural water pond at the summit, whose water level remains unchanged year-round, a phenomenon that adds to the fort's allure. From the highest point, I was rewarded with a stunning 360-degree view of the region, a moment of pure enchantment.

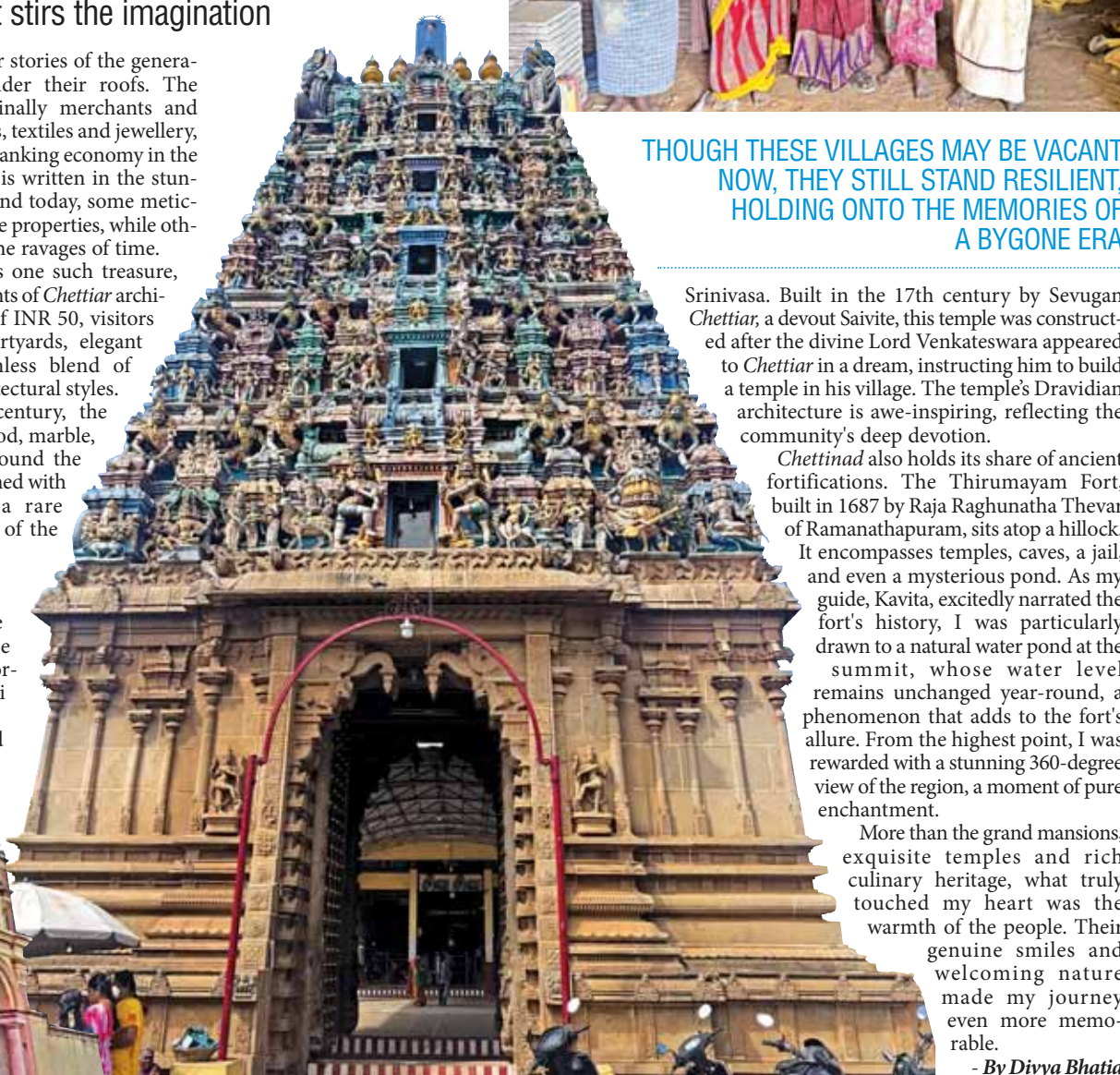

Sacred Confluences: Reflections on Kumbh and Spirituality

On this quiet evening, as I sat with my friend while the sun painted the sky in gentle hues, memories of my recent visit to Kumbh Mela flooded back, sparking a deep conversation about spirituality and human nature. The cooling evening air seemed to sharpen our thoughts as we recalled the extraordinary scenes witnessed at Prayagraj.

The vivid images remained crystal clear in my mind – the swirling smoke from countless sacred fires, the endless sea of humanity moving like waves toward the Triveni Sangam, and the fascinating sight of sadhus wielding smartphones alongside their traditional implements. Each memory carried its own weight of meaning, prompting us to contemplate the unique blend of ancient and modern that defines today's spiritual gatherings.

As the evening shadows lengthened, I found myself describing the remarkable atmosphere at Kumbh – how the air seemed charged with collective faith and anticipation. The memory of millions of devotees waiting patiently, some for years, to take their sacred dip at the confluence sparked an interesting discussion about human psychology and spiritual seeking. What particularly struck us both was the contemporary evolution of this ancient gathering. I shared stories of seeing sadhus actively engaged with social media, posting their spiritual journeys online, their orange robes bright against the glow of mobile screens. This observation led us to ponder



how technology has transformed even the most traditional spiritual practices, creating a new kind of sacred space that exists both in the physical and digital realms.

Our conversation naturally flowed to broader questions about mental well-being in modern times. We discussed how the mind, like the converging rivers at Sangam, seeks its own confluences – between tradition and modernity, between spiritual seeking and everyday life, between individual practice and communal experience.

The evening's discussion reminded me of the various factors affecting mental health that I had observed during my visit. While

obvious threats like substance abuse were visible, we found ourselves more intrigued by the subtle, everyday habits that can gradually erode mental well-being. The irony of seeing people seeking spiritual awakening while simultaneously being tethered to their devices sparked a thoughtful dialogue about digital detachment and mindful engagement.

We explored how seemingly innocent modern habits can impact our cognitive health – from insufficient sleep to excessive solitude, from sedentary lifestyles to mindless overconsumption. The contrast with the disciplined lives of traditional sadhus pro-

vided an interesting perspective on balance and well-being.

As dusk settled around us, our conversation turned to the role of community and connection. The Kumbh experience highlighted how human beings naturally seek confluence – with others, with higher meaning, with themselves. Yet modern life often pulls us toward isolation, even as our devices promise greater connectivity.

The memory of watching countless devotees take their sacred dip led us to reflect on transformation – how people seek it, whether through traditional spiritual practices or modern means. We pondered

whether the sacred waters of Sangam truly awakened everyone who bathed there, or if the real awakening came from the intention and belief they carried within.

As our evening of reflection drew to a close, we realised that the Kumbh had offered us more than just spiritual spectacle – it provided a powerful lens through which to examine our own relationship with tradition, technology, and mental well-being. The smoke from the sacred fires, which had seemed so prevalent during my visit, now felt like a metaphor for the way old and new intermingle in our quest for meaning and mental peace.

Our twilight discussion revealed that while the tools and expressions of spiritual seeking may evolve, the fundamental human desire for connection, meaning, and well-being remains unchanged. Whether through ancient ritual or modern practice, we all seek our own version of the sacred confluence, where the rivers of tradition, innovation, and personal growth meet to form something greater than their individual streams.

As the first stars began to appear in the darkening sky, the insights gained from examining these memories of Kumbh through the lens of our conversation felt both profound and practical – a reminder that sometimes the greatest understanding comes not from the experience itself, but from the thoughtful reflection that follows.
