Samanta asked to appear before probe panel

Min assures action against anyone found guilty

The State Government-appointed high-level committee probing the KIIT Nepali girl student's suicide, on Thursday summoned KIIT founder Achyuta Samanta to appear before it at 6 pm on Friday.

Skill Development and Technical Education Minister Sampad Swain criticised the KIIT University authorities for making 'arbitrary decisions' in the hours following the death of Nepal student Prakriti Lamsal in the

university's hostel. The minister assured that stringent action would be taken against those found guilty. "The manner in which the KIIT authorities behaved with the students is highly condemnable. Students are the future of this country and such conduct against them is unacceptable," he said.

Swain referred to the hasty and controversial orders issued by the KIIT administration after large-scale protests on campus over Lamsal's death as well as students claiming her death resulted from the inaction of the KIIT International Relations Office (IRO).

The alleged mishandling of the incident by KIIT included the use of force by campus security personnel, forcing students from Nepal to vacate the campus and leave immediately, and a delay in apology, among others.

Notably, on Monday, KIIT authorities allegedly asked all students from Nepal to leave for their homes and shifted them to Cuttack railway station without any prior notice. The matter held grave consequences with the Prime Minister of Nepal expressing his concern and Odisha Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi eventually appealing to the students to return to the campus.

KIIT girl student death Voice spectrography of viral audios to be done

Accused taken on 3-day remand by police

The Commissionerate police have taken Advik Srivastava, the key accused in the suicide of KIIT Nepali student Prakriti Lamsal, on a three-day remand for further probe into the case.

The State Government-appointed high-level inquiry committee which is probing the case said on Thursday that it would conduct a voice spectrography to ascertain the truth behind multiple voice messages being circulated online and alleged to be call and voice message records between Srivastava and Lamsal.

The high-level fact-finding committee comprising senior officials led by Additional Chief Secretary of the Home



Department Satyabrata Sahu is conducting the probe into the death of Lamsal, a KIIT University B. Tech third-year student who had allegedly ended her life on Sunday.

The claimed voice notes were released by peers of Lamsal and featured a barrage of abuses and derogatory remarks, allegedly made by Advik

Further, at multiple points in the voice clippings, the deceased could be heard break-

ing down over remarks made by the accused, which her peers have claimed was a result of extreme mental pressure brought upon by abuses, harassment and blackmail by Advik.

The high-level committee visited the campus for the second consecutive day and questioned students and staffs. The gathered information would be compiled into a report and submitted to the State Government, said Home Secretary Satyabrata Sahu. He also said that discussions have taken place with Nepalese representatives regarding the case.

Additionally, Commissioner of Police S Devadutta Singh visited the KIIT campus and said the area is now under police control. The seized mobile phones and laptops of both the victim and the accused have been sent to the forensic laboratory for analysis.

Outrage in city Youths dance with swords in public

A viral video showing youths wielding swords while dancing on a busy road in Bhubaneswar has sparked outrage. The footage raises safety concerns and criticism of the police's inaction.

The video shows a group of young men brandishing swords while dancing dangerously to DJ music.

The footage has been widely shared across mobile devices and is being uploaded on social media platforms. Follow-

ing its rapid spread, the video has led to mounting criticism of the police force, with many questioning their apparent absence or inaction during this incident.

Citizens question the authorities' absence during such a conspicuous violation of public conduct. Concerns are being raised about the apparent public safety risk and the potential for such displays to escalate into more serious incidents.

As of now, the local police authorities have not made any

VLTD operations Efforts to rope in blacklisted manufacturers questioned

Experts say transparency, efficiency will be compromised

A State like Odisha, which is leading in the crime rates against women as per the NCRB data and the number of fatal road accidents, the Vehicle Location Tracking Device (VLTD) is a game-changer and acts as a third-eye for the law enforcement agencies.

So, the State Transport Authority (STA) had started the 'Moyatra Suraksha' programme with its VLTD command and control centre

at the RTO-II in Bhubaneswar which had a target to install VLTDs in 6.64 lakh goods carriers, two lakh light motor passenger vehicles and 1.76 lakh taxis and passenger vehicles.

The Central and State Governments had provided funds to start the project with matching grants of Rs 5 crore each.

But of late, efforts are on by some vested interests to hand over the entire operations to some VLTD manufacturers, who have been blacklisted in neighbouring West Bengal and against whom the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) has lodged a case for their dubious activities in Rajasthan. However, road safety expert



Subrat Kumar Nanda said the VLTD manufacturers operating the control and command centre and other operations are in severe conflict of interest. It would completely compromise transparency in the entire process and it would sabotage the main aim of passenger safety and security. It would in the long run lead to the installation of cheap quality VLTDs with questionable performance.

with a questionable track record," Nanda said.

Besides, the money spent by Centre and the State Governments would go down the drain, he added.

He further said the VLTD tracks all the moments of the driver. Most importantly, it will track down whether the driver is indulged in rash driving or over speeding. The device acts as a third-eye and it is monitored 24/7 by the VLTD command and control centre.

The unique feature about the VLTD is that it cannot be tampered with. This device records the moment of a vehicle in no network areas. It sends the data to the command centre, once it gets into

the network coverage area.

Explaining the advantages of VLTD, Nanda said, "If anything happens, the first alert message will go to the owner of the vehicle, then to the Emergency Response System (ERS) and the State command centre. Besides, the nearest police station also receives the alert message," he added.

Notably, in 2012, after the Nirbhaya case, the Central Government had sanctioned money to the Odisha Government from the Nirbhaya Fund to implement the VLTD system. However, it was not implemented in 2023, more than a decade after the Supreme Court made it mandatory to install VLTDs in vehicles.

'Odisha Budget silent on 1 cr migrant workers'

INTUC State president and former Rajya Sabha MP Dr Rama Chandra Khuntia said the Odisha Budget of 2025 has no provision for 1 crore Odia migrant labourers working outside the State and 1.76 crore unorganised workers.

Migrant workers basically go out of State for seeking better job and better wages. If job, wage and other facilities are available in State they will be in Odisha, he said.

The Odisha State Budget,

however, has no provision for employment opportunity for the migrant labourers to come back, he lamented.

Regarding the unorganised sectors, he said that the workers are neither getting employment nor medical care nor social security. The State Government is not making adequate budgetary allocations for the unorganised sector welfare board which is functioning in Odisha, although the number of unorganized workers is 92% of the total workforce of Odisha, which is 1.76 crore, said Dr Khuntia.

Besides he said the State Government has no budget provision to give wages to the MGNREGA workers equivalent to minimum wage of Rs 500 per day. The Telengana State is giving Rs 5 lakh to the migrant workers who die out of the State. On the contrary, the Odisha Government has not made any such provision to give compensation to 406 Odia migrant workers who died outside the State, he said.

"Therefore, we strongly condemn the apathy and demand adequate budget provision for the workers," said Dr Khuntia.

In Mayurbhanj Miscreants thrash SBI staffs, loot money at gunpoint

In a plot straight out of a bank heist movie, robbers decamped with lakhs of rupees from a branch of State Bank of India (SBI) in Mayurbhanj district in broad daylight on Thursday.

The robbers brutally beat up the bank officials before making off with the money.

Interestingly, the bank is just 200 meters away from the local police station. The audacious robbery took place at the SBI branch in Bahalda.

Five masked robbers stormed into the busy branch at approximately 11 am, brandishing firearms and executing their heist with precision.

The criminals made off with the cash after instilling fear among customers and assaulting bank employees. The

entire heist was executed within a swift 30-minute timeframe, leaving the employees on edge.

The robbers assaulted the bank's branch manager and several other staff members. Customers who were also present in the bank at the time faced intimidation by the armed men.

The incident has raised concerns regarding the banking sector's security protocols and the efficiency of local law enforcement, prompting calls for increased vigilance in financial institutions throughout the region.

Authorities launched a thorough investigation to track down and nab the criminals. A police said, "We are utilising every resource at our disposal to ensure these criminals are brought to justice."

SOCIAL CANVAS Odisha Budget fails to address regional, sectoral imbalances

Odisha Budget fails to address regional, sectoral imbalances

The budget is an annual financial statement of the State under Article 202 of the Constitution of India. It shows the approach of the government towards overall development of the State. Mostly, the direction to budget comes from the economic survey report that reflects the status of the economy through various indicators. So while going through the budget allocation the findings of the economic survey must not be overlooked.

The total outlay of the Odisha Budget 2025-26 is Rs 2,90,000 crore. Out of the total sum, Rs 2,32,000 crore is revenue and Rs 58,000 crore is from loan and other sources. Out of total revenue, State's own tax is Rs 1,26,000 crore that includes both tax and non tax revenue where mining lease revenue is 85 percent of the total non-tax revenue. The share in Central tax and Central grant is Rs 1,05,000 crore. So it is found that loan, Central tax share and grant, and mining revenue dependency is a major

feature of the budget of Odisha.

The SGDP of Odisha for the year 2024-25 is Rs 9.5 lakh crore. The vision of Odisha is to become a 500 billion dollar economy by 2036. India will be a 1.5 trillion dollar economy by 2047. Odisha is one of the backward States of India and the gap between national average income and the State per capita

income continues. The average per capita income of India is Rs 2,00,166 (2025) whereas it is Rs 1,82,548 for Odisha. The income tax -return during the year 2022-23 shows that total 12,90,397 persons have filed return but 8,90,889 persons have filed with zero tax liabilities for the same year. It shows only 3,95,508 persons out of a population of more than 4 crore have paid income tax. The percentage of population who paid income tax in 2022-23 was 1.6 percent in India and it was 0.89 % for Odisha. The data reaffirms that Odisha continues to be a backward State with a vast majority of poor population. But the double engine has not reflected in addressing that backwardness while the people of Odisha voted to see the double engine impact in both Union and State budgets.

The Union Budget 2025-26 has no provision for investment in infrastructure development and special package for Odisha whereas special allocation has been made

for other States such as Bihar and AP. The annual survey of industries shows TN, Maharashtra, Gujarat, UP and AP are the five most industrialized States having 60 percent of the factories of the country. There is a huge imbalance among the States in terms of income and opportunities. This has been created due to policy decisions of the Union government but that process has been continuing as a result of which the backward States such as Odisha get less priority in terms of infrastructure development and industrialisation.

The minerals of the State have been used for national and private corporate growth and the low paid labour forces of Odisha have been used as migrant workers in other States. The double engine budget has not guided the State to address such issues in the long run. The Odisha budget could have focused more on industrialisation and infrastructure development of the State to generate income and employment with an increase in the

capital investment of Rs 65, 012 crore. The investment mobilization by the State government as reported is about 593 projects in over 20 sectors totalling an investment intent of Rs 16.73 lakh crore with the potential to create 13 lakh employment for youth. But the sector wise plans, outcome and output are not reflected in the budget document linking to employment generation.

The plan for land bank and allocation of Rs 106 crore in budget to acquire 5 thousand acre of land (about 1 thousand acre land each year) has no sector wise indication. This is primarily to help the companies not for industrialisation. The industrialisation in Odisha should be inclusive of all sectors of the economy, not just promotion of extractive industries such as mining. The potentialities in agriculture, forest, fishing, coast and tourism etc must be equally promoted. It is good that the budget has made good allocation in agriculture but a major portion of it goes to subsidies to land owning

farmers who are mostly absent landlords, not the real farmers. The investment could have more on irrigation, electricity, cold storage, rural connectivity and other agricultural infrastructure development as a long term plan. There is no emphasis on promotion of agriculture based industry, food processing and marketing of agriculture and forest products with value addition.

In the social security and skill development side there is no allocation such as pension for farmers, farm labourers and others employed in agriculture. There is no allocation for land reform such as ensuring tenancy rights of sharecroppers which is vital to agricultural growth. The wage and social security issues of farm labourers have been ignored which are pushing distress migration from the rural agrarian sector. Currently about 40 lakh migrant workers are outside Odisha but the budget has not announced any scheme for the migrant workers' rehabilitation

through local employment generation, skill development in agriculture, industry and service sector.

It is expected that the budget must address regional imbalances within the State for a holistic and inclusive growth. The resources allocation must be distributive and decentralized with more resources to local self government bodies. The recommendation of the State Finance Commission must be carried out while allocating funds. But a careful observation shows the allocation to development councils such as western, south and north Odisha and Kondhamal and Gajapati development is very nominal. There should be a dedicated development council for coastal areas also, specially to address the issues of coastal poor agricultural workers and fisher folk and others who are facing livelihood issues. The persistent natural disaster and climate change impacts mostly affect the coastal poor which need special attention.

Performance Audit on Regulation and Supply of Liquor in Delhi for 2017-18 to 2021-22, Public Health Infrastructure and Management of Health Services for 2023 and Performance Audit Report on Children in Need of Care and Protection for 2018-19 to 2020-21 are among 14 pending CAG reports. The implementation of the ABY for medical insurance had become a major flashpoint between the AAP and the BJP. MPs from the BJP had also filed a petition in the Delhi High Court, seeking that the scheme be made available to people in the national capital. Notably, the previous AAP government, led by former chief minister Arvind Kejriwal, had opposed the implementation of the Centre's Ayushman Bharat scheme in Delhi, saying that it would "amount to downgrading the healthcare initiatives already in place." The AAP government in Delhi had several run-ins with lieutenant governors over various issues in the past decade. However, with the BJP coming to power in the city after more than 26 years, many expect the relationship to improve, paving the way for smooth governance. After chairing the first Cabinet meeting on Thursday, Gupta announced the distribution of portfolios among her ministers, keeping with her finance, services, vigilance, revenue, women and child development among other departments.

amid expectations of major announcements, the newly formed Delhi Cabinet headed by Chief Minister Rekha Gupta in her first cabinet meeting on Thursday approved a proposal reinstating the implementation of Ayushman Bharat Yojna (ABY) with Rs 5 Lakhs top-up and tabling of 14 Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) reports in the first sitting of the Assembly. The cabinet also discussed the financial assistance scheme, which provides Rs 2,500 to women, aiming to support their welfare and empowerment. Speaking to reporters after the meeting, Gupta said in Hindi, "During the Cabinet meeting, we have taken two big decisions. The ABY, whose implementation had been held back by the previous government, will be implemented in Delhi with a top-up of Rs 5 Lakh from the state government. PM Narendra Modi had announced the scheme for the whole nation, but Delhi could not get its benefits because of the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP). This will be done at the earliest after the formalities are completed." "There are 14 CAG reports pending, which were not tabled by the previous government. They will be tabled during the first session of the Assembly. These decisions were taken today. We will take up our other commitments, give shape to each one of them and present them

First time MLA Rekha Gupta on Thursday was sworn in as Chief Minister of Delhi at Ramliya Maidan in the presence of Prime Minister Narendra Modi, his Cabinet colleagues and chief ministers of National Democratic Alliance-governed states, among others. Along with Gupta, leaders including Parvesh Verma, Ashish Sood, Manjinder Singh Sirsa, Ravinder Indraj Singh, Kapil Mishra and Pankaj Kumar Singh also took oath as ministers. Verma was the first MLA to take oath as the minister, followed by Sood, Sirsa, Mishra, Indraj and Singh. Mishra, the newly-elected legislator from Karawal Nagar, was a minister in the first Arvind Kejriwal-led Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) Government. All the ministers took oath in Hindi, except for Sirsa who did so in Punjabi.

The seasoned, affable, BJP leader holding the fort successfully for the party in Delhi Assembly, municipal corporation, as head of the State unit free from any controversies, Vijender Gupta, was named as Speaker of the new Vidhan Sabha on Thursday. Vijender will preside from the same chair which on several occasions had got him marshalled out of the proceedings of the Assembly under the chief ministership of AAP supremo Arvind Kejriwal. Vijender won in 2015 and 2020 from Rohini constituency even as Kejriwal's wave swept Delhi assembly polls. Incidentally, Kejriwal and erstwhile speaker Ram Niwas Goel are no longer members of the new assembly. As soon as Vijender was named as Speaker dramatic visuals of him being marshalled or dragged out of the Delhi Assembly went viral. He was previously also the leader of Opposition. Ten years ago, he was marshalled out of the Delhi Assembly amid much fury over allegedly derogatory remarks by a party colleague, OP Sharma, against then-AAP MLA Alka Lamba. Visuals from within the Assembly showed Vijender Gupta, dressed in a pristine white kurta-pyjama set - being lifted, shouting and twisting, by half-a-dozen marshals. The BJP leader even held tightly onto the furniture, fighting and resisting all the way out the exit. Vijender return is likely spell more trouble for a battered AAP. After his election win last week, he promised that 14 pending reports on the Delhi government by the Comptroller and Auditor General of India would be tabled in the House.

Delhi Lieutenant Governor Vinai Kumar Saxena administered the oath of office to Rekha Gupta elected from Shalimar Bagh in noether Delhi area and her council of ministers. Her appointment makes her the fourth woman to hold the position in Delhi, following BJP's Sushma Swaraj, Congress' Sheila Dikshit, and AAP's Atishi and also the fourth BJP chief minister of Delhi after Madan Lal Khurana, Sahib Singh Verma and Sushma Swaraj. The 50-year-old MLA, who took charge of her office at the Delhi Secretariat in the afternoon, is also the only woman in the NDA team of chief ministers and the second in the country after TMC supremo Mamata Banerjee in West Bengal. Congratulating the new chief minister, Modi expressed confidence that she will work for the city's development with full vigour.

16 dam, 15 barrage projects planned for Mahanadi

Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi informed the State Assembly on Thursday that 16 dam and 15 barrage projects have been planned to ensure sustainable and equitable water development for the Mahanadi river, safeguarding the State's interests. In a written response to a query by BJD legislator Ranendra Pratap Swain, the CM stated that unplanned excessive use of Mahanadi water in the upstream catchment by Chhattisgarh has led to a gradual reduction in water flow downstream in Odisha. This decline is particularly evident at the Hirkud Dam, which is located near the Odisha-Chhattisgarh border. To address this issue, the Odisha Government has sought legal recourse through the Mahanadi Water Dispute Tribunal, filing multiple claims. The matter remains sub-judice, Majhi added. Additionally, Majhi, in another written statement, informed that the government plans to construct 41 in-stream storage structures along the Mahanadi river. During Question Hour, BJD Deputy Leader in the Assembly Prasanna Acharya raised concerns regarding Chhattisgarh's construction of 8 to 9 barrages in the upper basin of the Mahanadi. He highlighted that these structures have significantly reduced the river's water flow in Odisha, especially during summer months. Acharya also pointed out that the previous BJD government had planned several in-stream storage projects and had initiated the tender process. However, he claimed that these tenders have now been cancelled. Responding on behalf of the Chief Minister, Parliamentary Affairs Minister Mukesh Mahaling stated that the BJP government has been in power for only eight months, which is insufficient time for the construction of a dam. Regarding the tender cancellations, Mahaling assured that the matter would be examined.

Burglary Niranjn's house Police recreate crime scene with 'Spider Satish'

The Commissionerate police on Thursday conducted a detailed crime scene recreation to ascertain how notorious 'Spider Satish' carried out a burglary at the residence of former OPCC president Niranjn Patnaik. Satish, known for his building-scaling abilities and for committing high-profile thefts, is currently under police remand for three days. Police brought Satish to Patnaik's house at IRC Village to reconstruct the break-in, shedding light on his theft and subsequent escape. Satish was brought for the scene recreation during his three-day custody period as part of the investigation. Satish Reddy, known as 'Spider Satish', employed sophisticated techniques in his burglaries. He used Google and YouTube to research wealthy targets, focusing on houses with sliding windows for easy access. Satish wore gloves, shoes and masks to avoid leaving finger prints or being captured on CCTV.

Centre cracks whip on OTT platforms

A row over vulgar jokes on social media, the Centre has cracked the whip and warned OTT platforms against transmitting content that is prohibited by the law. In an advisory to over-the-top (OTT) platforms and self-regulatory bodies, the Ministry of Information and Broadcasting also asked them to strictly adhere to the Code of Ethics prescribed under the IT Rules-2021 while publishing content, including stricter adherence to the age-based classification of content. I&B Ministry's advisory also asked self-regulatory bodies of OTT platforms to take appropriate proactive action for violation of the Code of Ethics by the platforms. The Ministry said it has received complaints from Members of Parliament, statutory organisations and public grievances regarding the alleged spread of obscene, pornographic and vulgar content published by certain publishers of online curated content (OTT platforms) and social media. "In view of the above it is advised that the OTT platforms adhere to the various provisions of applicable laws, and the Code of Ethics prescribed under IT Rules, 2021 while publishing content on their platforms, including stricter adherence to the age-based classification of content prescribed under the Code of Ethics," the advisory said. It said the Code of Ethics, inter-alia, require OTT platforms not to transmit any content that is prohibited by law, undertake age-based classification of content, based on general guidelines provided in the Schedule to the Rules, implement access control mechanism for 'A' rated content to restrict access to such content by a child, and also exercise due caution and discretion. The advisory also comes in the wake of the Supreme Court suggesting regulation on content on social media platforms. The apex court had flagged the "vacuum" in law when it comes to sharing content on platforms such as YouTube and said "all kinds of things were going on." The court's suggestion came following a row involving YouTuber Ranveer Allahbadia on the show India's Got Latent. The court was hearing a plea filed by him, where he sought clubbing multiple FIRs against him in the matter. The plea also sought protection from arrest. The court issued notices to the states of Assam and Maharashtra over Allahbadia's remarks and stayed his arrest in the Guwahati and Thane FIR. Additionally, the court ruled that no further FIRs should be filed against him in the same matter.

Tradition, legacy and ancestry will meet Digital India

Adding another feather to the Digital India movement, the Government has envisioned a unique way to digitise the century old multi-generation ancestry records commonly known as 'pothe' in custody of genealogy priests at various pilgrimage centres in India. For instance next time a pilgrim visit Kashi Vishwanath temple in Varanasi, they may track the record of past visit to the temple by their ancestors or family members at the flip of their finger or click of a mouse. For this, National Archives of India has envisioned a project to digitise multi-generation ancestry records seeking to harvest traditional knowledge and community repositories and preserve them as a cultural heritage. "NIA has approached these priests and the project will begin with Madhya Pradesh's Ujjain," said NAI Director General (DG) Arun Singhal in his address at opening session of the meeting of the South and West Asian Regional Branch of the International Council on Archives (SWARBICA) here. India is hosting a meeting of SWARBICA after a long time, currently in the position of the treasurer of this regional body of the Paris-based International Council on Archives (ICA). In his address, Singhal also shared some details and figures related to the NAI's "ambitious programme" of digitising 300 million pages in a period of two years, as part of its project that began last year. "Before we started the project, our portal, Abhilekh Patal, was displaying about 10 million pages. In the past 7-8 months, the number has grown from 10 million to 84 million pages.. Every day, we are scanning about 400,000 pages. It is a process going well," said the National Archives of India (NAI) DG. "Shortly, we are hoping we will complete 100 million pages, perhaps by end of April," he added.



Singhal said it was found during the course of this project that many documents had been left "untouched" in last 50-60 years and nobody had looked at them. "And, we realised these are in urgent need of repair, and conservation was required. So, we had to spruce up our conservation efforts simultaneously," he added. Another project taken up by the NAI is "harvesting of traditional knowledge and community archives". "In India, if you go to Gaya, Kashi, Allahabad (now Prayagraj), Badrinath, Kedarnath, Jagannath Puri, Dwarka, there are priests there who document every

visit by every pilgrim. These documents are available with them. So, if you go there and tell them about your father's name, your grandfather's name, the place you belong to, they are able to come out with some documents, some 'pothis' (registers), which will contain genealogical records of such families," Singhal said. He underlined that these ancestry records may even have archival information related to ten generations of many families. "This is traditional knowledge which has been put together in some 'pothis'. And, these 'pothis' can get destroyed. In a major flood in Kedarnath, some of these 'pothis' were wiped out," the NAI chief ruded. Singhal emphasised that children of many of these priests have taken up other career streams and even moved out of these old cities and, therefore, are "not interested in continuing this family tradition". These 'pothis' in all probability could end up getting locked up in some boxes and perhaps could go

waste, he cautioned. "So, we said, we will try to digitise all these information. And, we approached these priests. And, I am happy to inform, the priests in Ujjain have agreed. So, we will start with Ujjain, we will digitise their records," Singhal said. "There are "more than 25 places" in India where such records exist, he underlined. "If we can digitise all of them, collate and compare the information contained in these records, it can become a very valuable database," the NAI DG said. Many people from India and broad travel to religious sites like Gaya in Bihar or Haridwar in Uttarakhand to perform rituals for attainment of salvation for souls of their deceased ancestors. In Gaya, the 'Pitra Paksha Mela' is held annually on the bank of the Saryu River and 'Gayawal Pandas' (genealogy priests) maintain records of multiple generations of people about their ancestors such as year of birth, pilgrimage, caste, and year of death and perhaps

even cause of death. Similarly, in Ujjain and Haridwar, two of the four sites of Kumbh Mela in India, the other being Prayagraj in Uttar Pradesh and Nasik in Maharashtra, such priests diligently maintain ancestry records in 'pothis', stacks of which are stored physically in rooms and cupboards. "Harnessing traditional knowledge and such community archives is another thing, we have discussed with SWARBICA. Perhaps, a blueprint for future collaboration could be discussed," Singhal said. Union Culture and Tourism Minister Gajendra Singh Shekhawat in his address said the venue of the event - India International Centre (IIC) was also significant that allows space to voice different strands of opinions, as he welcomed participants from different counties who are attending the meeting of SWARBICA. This occasion should be used "to learn from each other and share best practices", he said.

'Liberate State from mining syndicate'

Says Srikant Jena in letter to CM

Congress leader and former Union Minister Srikant Jena in a letter to Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi on Thursday urged him to "free the State from the clutches of the mining syndicate".

Jena stated that the State Government has presented the 2025-26 annual Budget of Rs 2.9 lakh crore. Had the government enforced the Supreme Court's ruling on cess and taxes on minerals and mineral-bearing land, it could have been raised to Rs 3.9 lakh crore. This extra Rs 1 lakh crore benefits only the mining syndicate. (More than 50,000 crore annually by imposing cess and tax plus corrected

market price would add another Rs 20,000 to 30,000 crores and the retrospective dues from backlog would together make 1 lakh crore)

The apex court's judgment on July 25, 2024 and August 14, 2024 enables Odisha to generate more than Rs 50,000 crore annually. Apart from that, the State would get an additional Rs 1.5 lakh crore as "earlier dues" from mining operators, stated Jena and expressed surprised why the government is not acting on the judgment of the Supreme Court.

Another major issue is the State Government's long-term linkage policy, which favours selected mining operators by significantly compromising market prices. A prime example is bauxite pricing sold at just Rs 465 per tonne to Vedanta while the global rate is Rs 6,000 to Rs 7,000 per

tonne, handing nearly Rs 2,000 crore in annual profits to Vedanta. The same is the case with other companies as well.

On top of this, the Odisha Government's decision to auction 10 mineral blocks at the Centre's behest would lead to significant revenue loss, especially given the recession in the metal market. Why is the state opting for an auction instead of allocating these mines to the OMC for better revenue generation and resource management, he questioned.

Jena further said Odisha contributes approximately 50% of India's minerals but suffers from unchecked exploitation. Despite promises by the Chief Minister to act on the Justice Shah Commission's findings on illegal mining, no concrete steps have been taken yet, he added.

Seawater to sweet water

Ganjam coastal villages to get pipe water supply

In a major step towards resolving the drinking water crisis, seawater will be converted into fresh water and supplied to villages through pipelines in Ganjam district.

This initiative has taken shape following a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) signed between Indian Rare Earths Limited (IREL) and Ganjam district Rural Water Supply and Sanitation (RWSS) department on Tuesday.

Under the project, the desalination plant at IREL will treat saline seawater and convert it into potable water. The treated water will then be supplied to nearby Aryapalli and Matikhal villages through a pipeline network.

The MoU was formalized at



the office of the Ganjam Collector in the presence of IREL officials and RWSS representatives. The project is set to commence within a year, aiming to provide clean drinking water to the villages.

The desalination plant will process approximately 5 MLD (million liters per day) of seawater. Out of this, IREL

will use 3.5 MLD for its operations, and the remaining 1.5 MLD of treated fresh water will be distributed to the villages.

The project will cost an estimated Rs 4.2 crore, which will be fully funded by IREL. The desalination process will be executed using technology developed by the Atomic Re-

search Center. This is the first such initiative in Odisha's coastal region, according to the General Manager of IREL. Work has already begun following the MoU signing, with a target of completing the project within a year and supplying water to the designated villages.

Ganjam Collector Dibya

Jyoti Parida stated, "Through the initiative, 1.5 MLD of potable water will be provided to Aryapalli and nearby villages for drinking and other household uses. IREL will contribute its technical expertise, while RWSS will manage the water distribution system. In the first phase, 1,500 to 2,000 families will benefit from the project."

The project includes designing a distribution network, constructing storage tanks, and setting up pump houses. Existing pipelines will be used to streamline the process. Once completed, the initiative is expected to significantly reduce water scarcity in the coastal villages and serve as a model for future investments in advanced water treatment technologies.

Hirakud fish sale under mafia control; fishers exploited



Majority of catch exported to Kolkata, locals left with Andhra supply

Despite the high demand for fresh fish from the Hirakud reservoir, the residents of Jharsuguda who are living near the dam are largely deprived of it, as most of the catch is being transported to Kolkata.

Meanwhile, local markets are flooded with fish from Andhra Pradesh, often mislabelled as Hirakud fish to mislead the consumers.

According to sources, a powerful fish mafia controls the trade, exploiting local fishermen and dictating prices. Fishermen, who depend on Hirakud's waters for their livelihood, are forced to sell their catch at significantly lower rates, while traders make hefty profits. Large fish varieties like Rohu and Bhakuda are bought from them at just Rs 100-Rs 120 per kg but are later sold at Rs 280-Rs 350 per kg in the markets.

Senior advocate Mohammed Rauf highlighted the plight of thousands of fish-

ermen who struggle to make ends meet despite their dependence on Hirakud's resources. He also pointed out that illegal fishing continues unchecked, even during the government-imposed breeding season ban, threatening fish populations.

Fishermen have repeatedly urged the government to provide alternative livelihood opportunities to ease their financial struggles.

Budianchal Sangram Samiti secretary Gopinath Majhi criticized the Odisha government for failing to support fishermen through Primary Fishermen Cooperative Societies. He stated that these cooperatives exist mostly on paper, failing to collect royalties from fish sales or protect fishermen from exploitation.

Many fishermen also lack essential equipment like nets and boats, which are instead provided by the mafia, further tightening their grip over the trade.

Local fishermen have called for immediate government intervention to curb these illegal activities, ensure fair pricing, and dismantle the fish mafia. They demand stronger enforcement of fishing regulations and revival of cooperative societies to safeguard their interests.

Illegal sand mining rampant in Kendrapada dist

Mafia in nexus with mining, police, local admn officials

Illegal sand mining has become rampant in Kendrapada district which is crisscrossed by several rivers.

The sand mafia by making an unholy nexus with the Mining Department officials, police and local administration has been lifting sand from river beds, albeit undeterred.

If sources are to be believed, sand mining has been going on at not less than 40 places across the district. In the last few months, sand mining has increased considerably with the mafia throwing the rules to wind with impunity.

According to District Mining Department, only two sand Sariahs got licence for sand mining while the others are functioning illegally. As sand is a minor mineral, the State government has granted



permission to the District Mining Department for regulating the grant of quarry leases, mining leases and other mineral concessions in respect of minor minerals and for purposes connected therewith.

In order to curb illegal sand quarrying at river beds, it's the duty of the district Mining Department, police and the district administration to make combined efforts. But as these agencies are salck or are hands in glove, the sand mafia has nothing to worry about in carrying out the illegal work, alleged the locals. There is no denying that crackdown mea-

asures have been initiated against the sand smugglers, but these have been sporadic and inadequate, they added.

According to sources, Kendrapada Sub Collector Arun Nayak, acting on reliable inputs, conducted a raid at Chitrotpola river bed at Bichana village under Garadapur tehsil on Saturday night and seized 19 trucks and two poclair excavators engaged in illegal sand mining.

It is known that the illegal sand mining has been going on at Bichana, which is hand shaking distance from Patkura police station, since

last November. But the police department has failed to restrict it. Senior officials moved on the main road regularly, but hardly they attempt to stop the illegal sand lifting.

While District Mining Officer says he is working 18 hours per day and visiting several river beds to stop illegal sand lifting, it seems the result is zero.

"It is yet to be ascertained, who has been operating illegal sand quarrying at Bichana and other places. Why the local police or mining department failed to conduct raids in the last three months? Is there any ulterior motives of the District Mining Department or local police? Does the duo departments remain a mute spectator and encourage the sand mafia to operate the illegal sand quarrying by filling their pockets?" asked the locals.

When contacted district Collector Smruti Ranjan Pradhan informed that he is going to look into the matter seriously.

'SOA among 4 institutions in India'

The Siksha 'O' Anusandhan Deemed to be University (SOA) here has attained a significant achievement by finding a place among four institutions in India in the Times Higher Education (THE) World Reputation Rankings 2025.

The list, which includes Indian Institute of Science, Bengaluru, Indian Institute of

It has been conferred with Category-I Graded Autonomy Status by the University Grants Commission (UGC) in 2022. The university has also been globally placed in the QS and THE world university rankings.

Scenic Kapilash hill gearing up for Mahashivaratri

The scenic hill ranges of Kapilash in Dhenkanal are gearing up to celebrate the Mahashivaratri and Jagarmela on February 26.

The unique hill ranges stand witness to many puranic and historical stories. The Shiv temple of Lord Chandrasekhar was constructed by the Ganga dynasty king Langula Narasingh Deb in 1246. The 60 feet high temple perches on middle of the hill at around 457 meters high from the sea level.

Because of its height, density of forests and availability of perennial spring, Kapilash is considered as the hill station of Odisha in summer. Ganga Vanshi Prince Ananga Bhima Deb first traced the Linga covered in Bel leaves on the hill in a dream. Deb first of all named the Linga as Sikhaeswar which was later worshipped as Lord



Chandrasekhar. Worshipping the Lord, Deb was released from the sin of Bhramaha hatya (murder of a Brahmin).

In the beginning, the devotees had to face many hurdles to climb the hill range and reach the temple. But by 1950-60 the king of Dhenkanal constructed twelve curved roads which were converted to concrete roads later. The 1,352 concrete roads on public donations now have been significantly developed by the government.

To catch the eyes of tourists, a deer park has been set up at

the foot of the hill. It was converted to a zoo by the Zoo Authority of India. The science park and other available open spaces were upgraded to picnic spots.

As part of the beautification works, an idol of Lord Shiva was installed in a water pool, where water is being sprayed with colorful lights.

Even today there is no accessible facility to the hill top where Sita nka Enturisala, Debasabha and Shreedhar Goswami cave are available. The hill ranges are full of monkeys and snakes.

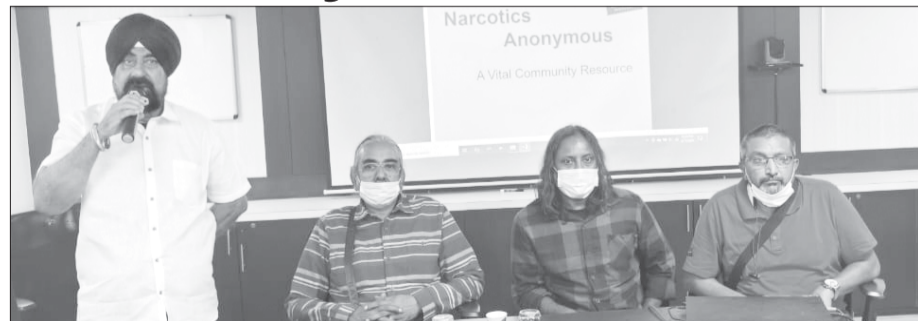
Narcotics Anonymous shows the way

Over years, NA community has achieved great feat in Odisha

The Society of Service of Narcotics Anonymous (SOSONA) works with a motto that an addict can stop using drugs, lose the desire to use drugs and find a new way to live.

With an elaborate programme, it said no addict seeking recovery need ever suffer or die from the horrors of addiction without a chance to know that there is a way out.

Narcotics Anonymous (NA) began its journey in Odisha in 1993, with the first meeting held in Bhubaneswar. The first group to be formed was the "Sweet Den" group. Over time, the message of recovery spread across the State, and NA began to grow steadily. Today, more than 30



meetings are held every week in various cities and towns. In addition to the official groups, several other unofficial meetings take place, further extending the reach of NA's message of recovery.

Currently, there are over 3,000 members who are part of the NA community in Odisha. These individuals attend meetings regularly and stay clean with the support of the NA programme.

To ensure structured growth and coordination, the Area Service Committee (ASC) was formed. The ASC meets on the last Sunday of every month to address chal-

lenges faced in service. The organised approach helps spread the message of recovery across Odisha, bringing hope and healing to more people in need.

The non-profit worldwide campaign started in July 1953 with its first meeting in Southern California. Within a few years, NA groups spread across the globe. Its books and information pamphlets are currently available in 77 languages including Hindi, Tamil, Kannada, Bengali, Punjabi, Urdu and Nepali. Today there are more than 72,215 weekly meetings in over 144 countries.

NA's primary approach to recovery is its belief in the therapeutic value of one addict helping another. Anyone who wants to stop using drugs may become a member of Narcotics Anonymous. Membership is not limited to addicts using any particular drug. Those who feel they may have a problem with drugs, legal or illegal, including alcohol, are welcome in NA.

Recovery in NA focuses on the problem of addiction, not on any particular drug. The basic premises of anonymity allows addicts to attend meetings without fear of legal or social repercussions. Ano-

nymity also supports an atmosphere of equality in meetings. Members take part in NA meetings by talking about their experiences and recovery from drug addiction. NA meetings are informally structured, held in space rented by the group, and are led by members who take turns opening and closing the meeting. NA meetings and other services are funded entirely by member's voluntary contributions and the sale of recovery literature. Financial contributions from non-members are not accepted.

Recovery in NA is not a miracle cure that happens within a given period of time. It is a process, ongoing and personal. Members make an individual decision to join and recover at their own pace.

A perilous challenge for India's soft diplomacy

The fate of Nimisha Priya, accused of murder in Yemen, hangs in balance. Her case tests India's diplomatic resolve to protect its citizens abroad

In the volatile heart of Yemen's capital, Sanaa, an Indian national, Nimisha Priya, faces dire circumstances, accused of killing a Yemeni citizen. The charges are serious, but the true gravity of the situation lies in the potential consequences. Nimisha's case is not just about the allegation; it is a call for India to step forward decisively to protect one of its own. The environment in Houthi-controlled Sanaa is precarious, with little hope of a fair trial or a peaceful resolution. The proposal to launch a Nuclear Energy Mission will promote domestic capabilities, private sector participation, and enhanced deployment of advanced nuclear technologies such as small modular reactors.

With an outlay of Rs 20,000 crore for promoting research and development of SMRs, the government targets developing at least five indigenously designed and operational SMRs by 2033. The government will also bring in necessary amendments to the

Atomic Energy Act and Civil Liability for Nuclear Damage Act to facilitate the Mission and encourage private sector participation in nuclear power projects. This is a great initiative! The Budget proposal to incentivise electricity reforms and augmentation of inter-state transmission capacity by states will advance power distribution companies' financial health and capacity. Upon meeting the reforms initiated under the revamped distribution system scheme, states can borrow an additional 0.5 per cent of their gross domestic product over and above what they get under the FRBM Act. This will significantly improve the efficiency of the power sector. These reform measures are part of the government's plans to support clean technology. The government also intends to promote clean tech manufacturing to improve domestic value addition and build a local ecosystem for solar cells, electrolyzers, wind turbines, high-voltage transmission equipment, and grid-scale batteries, among other technologies. The Budget marks a transformative step for India's renew-

able energy sector. The government's commitment to the 'Make in India' initiative and the new clean tech manufacturing policy will augment the development of solar PV cells, batteries, and other sustainable technologies locally in India. These moves will contribute to the nation's clean energy journey while fostering sustainable economic growth. The full BCD exemption of the scrap of lithium-ion batteries, Lead, Zinc, and 12 more critical minerals will help boost battery manufacturing in India and promote more jobs for our youth. By reducing the BCD on solar panels by half to 20 per cent, the FM has provided animal spirits to the wind energy sector, which would further reduce the price of the panels and reduce India's imports by facilitating domestic production.

However, this needs to be distinguished from false bravado. Such an attitude will only be tantamount to mere filibustering or posturing. The brain is an organ and the mind is our intellect. The power of the mind needs to be magnified and enhanced to conquer fear. The mind is a movie theatre where the soap opera



of our life is enacted. We play, rewind and rerun an enormous number of movies. These are based on our idiosyncrasies and quality of thoughts. Thoughts are impacted by the kind of food we partake in (Tamasik, Rajasik, Sattvik), the company we keep and the amount of rest we take. The quality (guna) of food has a bearing on our disposition and approach to life. Tamasik food makes us sluggish, Rajasik food makes us feverish or anxious in disposition and Sattvik food makes us feel calm.

The first two lead us to fearful situations. If we are closeted to individuals who have a negative thought process, we imbibe such attributes and evince such a behavioural pattern. "Man is known by the company he keeps" is a very old adage and so is "man is born free but always is in chains". Suppose we have inspirational friends and achievers in our orbit, we will tread such a path. It is cardinal to have adequate physical and mental rest. If we are rested, then we are at peace and do not complain or quibble. Then we are physically and mentally alert and high-yielding. In our minds, we need to keep space to just dump the garbage that disappears into the recycle bin, never to appear again.

We need to pursue passions, hobbies, indulge in sports, participate in extracurricular activities, avoid negative company, take up initiatives, practice meditation, keep the mind occupied, footslog on the treadmill, go for long walks, go for treks, and read autobiographies of entrepreneurs and achievers. Others adopt the spiritual path by practising pranayama, learning yoga, undertaking the Art of Living course or observing the breath through the Vipassana technique.

A year of cinematic innovation, AI controversies and global synergy

The global film festival circuit in 2025 is set to redefine storytelling, balancing tradition with cutting-edge innovation

Every year, the international film festival circuit brings forth a renewed sense of energy, enthusiasm, innovation and cinematic craftsmanship to audiences across the globe. Each festival curates a unique paradigm shift in content, programming, outreach and presentation, making every year distinct yet interconnected through the shared language of cinema.

The year 2025 is no exception. With the Berlinale 2025 already setting the tone, the world is getting a glimpse into the new formats, styles, and narratives that will dominate global screens this year. The Berlinale 2025 has kicked off the festival season, giving cinephiles a head start in understanding the emerging trends in storytelling. This year, the jury is presided over by acclaimed American filmmaker Todd Haynes, known for his originality, thematic focus, and innovative cinematic techniques that have spanned four decades.

I never imagined that, 40 years later, I would return as the President of the Jury," Binoche holds the rare distinction of winning the Best Actress Award at Cannes in 2010, Venice in 1994, and Berlin in 1995, along with a BAFTA and an Oscar, which she shared with Julianne Moore. Cannes 2025 is expected to continue its tradition of blending mainstream and experimental films, with AI-driven narratives anticipated to make a significant impact. The 82nd Venice International Film Festival, set to run from August 27 to September 6, 2025, will feature a dedicated section on the restoration of cinematic classics.

This addition acknowledges the importance of preserving the past while exploring the future of cinema. Venice remains a unique experience where audiences do not merely watch films but immerse themselves in living art and culture against the backdrop of one of the world's most extraordinary cities. As with Berlinale and Cannes, the Venice jury will face the challenge of evaluating films that push traditional boundaries. Will they reward those that adhere to classic storytelling structures, or will films leveraging AI tools for scriptwriting, editing, and visual effects find greater recognition?

The challenge will be to balance the classical, contemporary and tech-driven

tools of storytelling on the celluloid screen. AI's increasing role in filmmaking has sparked a debate across festival juries. Should AI-generated content be evaluated on par with traditionally crafted films? Festivals in 2025 are contemplating introducing new categories to accommodate AI-assisted storytelling.

The interplay between human creativity and technological advancement is becoming a critical aspect of jury deliberations, pushing the boundaries of what defines authentic storytelling. India is set to initiate a new platform within the global cinematic landscape with the inaugural edition of the World Audio Visual & Entertainment Summit (WAVES) scheduled to be held in Mumbai from May 1 to 5, 2025. WAVES 2025 aims to bring together the global media and entertainment (M&E) industry with global talent, fostering collaborations, business opportunities, and cross-cultural dialogue. It is an initiative of the Government to highlight and present India as a juggernaut of creative excellence, encourage co-productions, and promote film tourism and management holistically.

This summit is expected to catalyse growth by attracting international investments, sharing global best practices, and enabling policy discussions.

The four-day event curated along the four broad pillars of Broadcasting and Entertainment, AVGC-XR, Digital Media and Films is expected to create an unprecedented buzz and collaborative partnership amongst key stakeholders leading to a much-

needed global media dialogue, involving key stakeholders from B2B, B2C and B2G verticals. WAVES 2025 also aims to encourage the sharing of ideas and resources, positioning India as an attractive destination for media investments, partnerships, and collaborations and establishing India as a global content hub. Beyond the celebration of cinema, international film festivals have increasingly become instruments of soft power diplomacy.

These festivals act as avenues for cross-cultural dialogue, collaborations, and international partnerships. For countries like India, participating in such festivals goes beyond screenings and accolades; it is about leveraging the medium of cinema to strengthen diplomatic ties and cultural exchange. The insights gained from WAVES 2025 will be crucial for the 56th International Film Festival of India (IFFI) later in the year. IFFI must focus on curating an international jury that mirrors the diversity seen in Berlinale and Venice.

The festival can also benefit from introducing categories that acknowledge AI-generated content, thus staying in step with global trends. Moreover, IFFI 2025 has the potential to strengthen India's position as a hub for filming destinations, partnerships and collaboration. By promoting India's e-visa facility for filmmakers and highlighting scenic and culturally rich locations across the country, the festival can attract global filmmakers and producers.

The festival's role in soft power diplomacy can be further ampli-

SC stays Lokpal order on complaints against HC judges

The Supreme Court on Thursday stayed the Lokpal order on entertaining complaints against sitting high court judges saying it was "something very, very disturbing" and concerned the independence of the judiciary. A bench of Justices BR Gavai, Surya Kant and Abhay S Oka issued notice and sought responses from the Centre, the Lokpal registrar and the person who filed complaints against a sitting High Court judge.

"Issue notice to the Union of India, Registrar, Lokpal of India and the complainant, returnable on March 18 at 10.30 am," the bench said. Solicitor General Tushar Mehta, appearing for the Centre, said a High Court judge would never fall within the ambit of the Lokpal and Lokayuktas Act, 2013. Dealing with Lokpal's order on

two specific complaints against the sitting High Court judge, the bench, issued an injunction to prevent the complainant from disclosing the name of the judge and directed him to keep the complaint confidential. The top court was dealing with a suo motu case initiated after the Lokpal passed the order on January 27.

The bench directed the registrar concerned to mark the identity of the complainant and serve notice upon him at his residence through the registrar (judicial) of the High Court. "In the meantime there shall be stay of the order dated January 27, 2025 passed by the Lokpal of India..." it added.

The top court went on to hold, "We injunct the complainant from disclosing the name of the judge against whom he has filed the complaint. The complainant is further directed to keep the complaint strictly confidential."

When the bench assembled, Justice Gavai told Mehta, "We propose to issue notice to the Union of India." Senior advocate Kapil Sibal, who also appeared in the matter, offered to assist the bench in dealing with the matter. "Something very very disturbing," said Justice Gavai. It is fraught with danger, Sibal said and sought a stay on the

Lokpal's order. "I think a law should be laid down," he added. The bench noted that Sibal and senior advocate BH Marlapalle had "graciously offered" to assist the court, as the matter was of "great significance" and concerned the independence of the judiciary. "Once the finding that the Lokpal has a jurisdiction stands stayed, I think they are aware what are the ramifi-

cations of this order. If they don't understand this, then we are here," said Justice Gavai. The bench has asked for the written submission to be filed in the meantime.

The Lokpal passed the order on two complaints filed against a sitting additional judge of the High Court. The complaints allege that he influenced an additional district judge in the state and a judge of the same High Court slated to deal with a suit filed against the complainant by a private company to favour the firm. The private company, it was alleged, was earlier a client of the high court judge in question while he was practising as an advocate at the Bar.

In its order, the Lokpal directed the complaints and relevant materials received in its registry in two matters be forwarded to the office of the CJI for his kind consideration. "Awaiting the guidance of the Chief Justice of

India, consideration of these complaints, for the time being, is deferred until four weeks from today, keeping in mind the statutory time frame to dispose of the complaint in terms of Section 20 (4) of the Act of 2013," said the Lokpal bench headed by Justice AM Khanwilkar on January 27.

The Lokpal added, "We make it amply clear that by this order we have decided a singular issue finally — as to whether the judges of the high court established by an Act of Parliament come within the ambit of Section 14 of the Act of 2013, in the affirmative. No more and no less. In that, we have not looked into or examined the merits of the allegations at all." The order noted it would be "too naive" to argue that a High Court judge would not come within the ambit of expression "any person" in clause (f) of section 14 (1) of the 2013 Act.

Kirti Azad writes to Agriculture Minister over fertiliser shortage

Trinamool Congress MP Kirti Azad has written to Union Agriculture and Farmers' Welfare Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan, stating that reports from several states are indicating towards a shortfall in supply of fertilisers, and drew his attention to a written reply in the Lok Sabha in December last year that denied any shortage.

In a letter dated February 11, Azad quoted a written reply given in the Lok Sabha by Chemical and Fertilizer Minister JP Nadda regarding the shortage of Di-Ammonium Phosphate (DAP) fertiliser during the ongoing Rabi season 2024-25.

The ministry in its reply, claimed that against a pro-rata requirement of 35.52 LMT from October 1, 2024, to December 3, 2024, a total of 38.27 LMT of DAP had been made available across states, with a closing stock of 9.05 LMT as of December 3.

"This response is not only evasive but also factually misleading. Reports from multiple states, including West Bengal, clearly indicate that there was a severe shortfall in the supply of fertilisers, directly contradicting the Ministry's assertion of adequate availability," Azad said.

He said the Chief Secretary of West Bengal, in an official communication dated October 29, 2024, explicitly stated that despite repeated requests and approved allocations, the state received only 57,510 MT of DAP, which he said is less than one-third of its sanctioned requirement for the Rabi season.

"This is an alarming gap that has severely impacted farmers at a crucial juncture in the agricultural cycle. Moreover, while the Ministry insists that sufficient stocks were available, ground reports reveal a grim reality. Farmers in various

regions struggled to procure fertilisers at critical sowing times, with many forced to stand in long queues or pay exorbitant prices in the black market," he said.

He added that even more concerning is the ministry's selective silence on the inadequate supply of other fertilisers. He said in November 2024, West Bengal requested 2 lakh MT of NPK (nitrogen, phosphorus, and potassium), but received only 1.16 lakh MT — a mere 58 per cent of what it demanded.

"This is despite the fact that West Bengal produces over 20 lakh MT of chemical fertilizers annually. If a fertilizer-producing state itself faces such dire shortages, one can only imagine the plight of farmers in states that rely entirely on external supplies," he said.

He urged the agriculture minister to take action in this regard.

"Given the gravity of the situation, I urge the Ministry to take immediate corrective measures. This includes ensuring adequate and timely supplies of fertilisers, addressing logistical bottlenecks, and most importantly, acknowledging the existing shortages rather than evading responsibility," Azad said.

"Any further delay will not only hurt farmers but also jeopardise the overall food security of the nation," he added.

Delhi High Court refuses to quash 2016 FIR against Maliwal

The Delhi High Court has refused to quash an FIR against AAP MP Swati Maliwal for allegedly disclosing the identity of a 14-year-old rape victim who succumbed to injuries.

Justice Neena Bansal Krishna said Maliwal's claim that she was protected from prosecution as her actions were in good faith would have to be proved at an appropriate stage and there was no ground for closing the proceedings in the present plea.

Delhi Police registered the FIR against Maliwal in 2016 when she was the chairperson of Delhi Commission for Women, and said there was a blatant violation of provisions of Juvenile Justice Act, which protect the identity of a minor victim of sexual offence.

"Prima facie, offence under Section 74 read with Section 86 of the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 is clearly disclosed. Insofar as the petitioner's claim that she has protection under Section 100 of the Juvenile Justice (Care and Protection of Children) Act, 2015 for her actions done in good faith is concerned, it is her defence which is required to be proved in accordance with law at the appropriate stage," the court said on February 13.

The judge added, "Therefore, there is no ground for quashing of the FIR and the proceedings..." Maliwal sought a court-monitored probe in the matter, saying despite the minor's death, the police did not invoke the murder charge in the FIR.

The court said the prayer was infructuous as a chargesheet was filed in the two cases in relation to the incident and the cases were pending trial.

It is now for the trial court to consider them and no fruitful purpose would be served by referring further investigation to an SIT, the court said.

Plans to enhance facilities for pilgrims at Ram temple

The Ram temple trust in Ayodhya is working on plans to improve facilities to cater to the ever-increasing number of devotees visiting the shrine, officials said on Thursday.

Shri Ram Janmabhoomi Teerth Kshetra Trust secretary Champat Rai said that a serious discussion about enhancing facilities for pilgrims was held during a construction committee meeting.

Rai also said that the temple will soon be illuminated with vibrant multi-coloured lights at night. A detailed discussion on this project also took place during the meeting.

Considering the rising number of devotees and the large crowds expected during the upcoming Ram Navami festival, there was a serious discussion about expanding facilities, he said.

The need for micro-management in areas such as providing drinking water and shade during the summer were discussed in the meeting, Rai said. He said that currently, four to five lakh devotees visit the temple daily.

"As a result, the Lord Ram has to remain awake for 18 hours as the temple opens open for longer durations," he said, adding that a decision regarding the enhancement of facilities will be made soon.

Delhi court convicts ex-MLA Kishore Samrite

Delhi court has convicted a former Madhya Pradesh MLA Kishore Samrite for threatening to blow up Parliament in September 2022 if his demands were not met. Special judge Vishal Gogne, however, acquitted him of charges for possession of explosives and endangering life or causing injury through it.

The court said upon examination of the substance found in a parcel he reportedly sent to the office of the Secretary General of the Rajya Sabha turned out to be "harmless in terms of their capability to cause an explosion". "While the articles of charge under Section 5(a) of Explosive Substances Act (endangering life through explosive substance), and Section 9B(1)(b) of Explosives Act (manufacturing, importing or exporting any explosive), remained not proved, it is nevertheless established that the accused

sent a letter with the threat to blow up the Parliament of India if his demands were not met," the court's February 18 verdict said.

The court convicted him under Section 506 Part II (threat to kill or grievously hurt) of IPC which attracts a maximum punishment of seven years. The judge would hear arguments on the quantum of punishment on February 27. Samrite, a former MLA from Lanji in Madhya

Pradesh's Balaghat district, threatened to blow up Parliament and sent a letter of threat, containing certain demands, and a suspicious substance to the Rajya Sabha official on September 16, 2022. The judge said the articles sent to by Samrite contained a letter, a suspicious substance aside from a copy of the Constitution and the Indian flag. "The letter was explicit in expressing the intention to blow up the Parliament, using dynamite, on a specific date and time, ie, 11 o'clock on September 30, 2022 if the demands expressed in the letter by the accused were not met," the judge observed.

Kishore Samrite was earlier with Samajwadi Party and filed complaint against Rahul Gandhi accusing him of rape and abducting of a woman from Amethi in 2008. But later in Supreme Court, he changed the stand and said he just signed in the complaint on the instructions of his party bosses.

ED attaches assets of pharma firm for 'illegal' export of drugs to Pak

The Enforcement Directorate on Thursday said it has attached assets worth a few crores of a Telangana-based pharmaceutical company under the anti-money laundering law on charges of illegally exporting over 18,000 kg of pharma drugs to Pakistan.

A provisional order under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) was issued on Wednesday against the company Lucent Drugs Pvt Ltd Based in the Sangareddy district of the state. The attached assets include land, building and factory premises of the company and these are valued at Rs 5.67 crore, the federal probe agency said in a statement. The company or its directors could not be contacted immediately for their response to the ED action.

The money laundering case stems from a complaint filed by the Narcotics Control Bureau (NCB) against the company for "contravention" of psychotropic substances regulation laws, illegal export of Tramadol drug and forgery of documents relating to various export authorisations, the ED said. Tramadol is a synthetic opioid-like drug used as a painkiller.

However, global anti-narcotics agencies have found that its shipments originating from India and other countries were being illegally diverted for use by ISIS terrorists operating in Syria and other locations apart from other terror groups like the Boko Haram of Nigeria. It was declared a "psychotropic substance" by India in 2018 and its sale in the country is regulated and monitored by the NCB.

The ED said Lucent Drugs Pvt. Ltd. Has been in the business of manufacturing and export-

ing Tramadol to its overseas clients, including those based in Pakistan. It claimed that an investigation found that the company initially got a no-objection certificate (NOC) from the Central Bureau of Narcotics (CBN) to export Tramadol to Pakistan but later this authorisation was revoked. However, the promoters and directors of Lucent Drugs Pvt. Ltd. "illegally" re-exported 13,800 kg of Tramadol valued at Rs 4.12 crore to Pakistan through Denmark-based company CHR Olesen Pharmaceuticals and a second consignment of 5,000 kgs of Tramadol valued at Rs 1.33 crore through a Malaysia-based firm SM Biomed, the ED said.

The company received export funds or proceeds of crime of Rs 5.46 crore in its bank accounts as a result of these "illegal" exports of Tramadol to Pakistan, it added.

Modi government putting India's national security at risk: Kharge

Congress president Mallikarjun Kharge on Thursday criticised the Modi government over reports that the China was settling 90 new villages along the Arunachal Pradesh border and accused it of putting India's national security, territorial integrity and sovereignty at risk.

In a social media post, Kharge alleged that the priorities of the government headed by the Prime Minister Narendra Modi were "PR stunts" and "false advertisements" and "not national security".

"Narendra Modi ji, you are adopting the policy of giving a 'red salute' to China instead of showing 'red eyes'. India's national security, territorial sovereignty and integrity are

villages need to be improved, the Modi government at the Centre has given almost no funds for it.

Kharge claimed that in December 2024, China announced plans to build the 'world's largest dam' on the Brahmaputra River, which could prove disastrous for our national security, environment and the north-eastern states. The Brahmaputra River, he

said, accounts for 30 per cent of India's freshwater resources, making its flow vital to India. The Congress president said according to a reply by the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) in the Rajya Sabha in 2022, your government said that "in March 2021, China adopted its 14th Five-Year Plan, which mentions plans for hydropower projects in the lower reaches of the Brahmaputra River".

"This means that the Modi government was aware of this matter since 2021, but still, your government remained absolutely silent. It is clear Modiji, your Government's priority is PR stunts and false advertisements for itself, not the national security of India," Kharge said citing news reports of China building 90 new villages along the border in Arunachal Pradesh.

Bangladesh border force chief seeks to downplay attacks on minorities

Chief of Bangladesh's border guarding force on Thursday here sought to downplay the attacks on minorities in his country that took place after the fall of the Sheikh Hasina government, saying such reports were "exaggerated".

Border Guard Bangladesh (BGB) director general (DG) Major General Mohammad Ashrafuzzaman Siddiqui also said "many new issues" under the common heads were discussed during his high-level talks with an Indian delegation headed by BSF DG Daljit Singh Chawdhary here.

The BSF chief, however, said the agenda points "more or less were the same with few changes here and there" as the Indo-Bangla border was a very "dynamic and active" border. This was the first high-level meeting of the two forces after the regime change in Bangladesh in August last year. Siddiqui, while speaking to reporters during a joint press conference with Chawdhary, asserted that authorities of his country took steps for the protection of the minorities as he

gave example of his force "personally" extending security cover to Durga Puja pandals within eight km of their jurisdiction along the international border.

The BGB DG also said they raised "objections" and "flagged here a number of cases" during the bi-annual DG-level talks with regard to the fencing being done by India along the International Border and has requested for a "joint inspection" before the work is done. "The attacks on minorities in the recent past, I would say, that this is an exaggeration and to be honest such attacks on minorities per se did not happen." He played down these

instances saying the "overall the law and order situation was not against the minorities, it was, may be, some bit of political problem but definitely that was not on the minorities."

A recent report of the UN Human Rights Office had said "widespread attacks were reported against Hindu homes, businesses, and places of worship, especially in rural and historically tense areas such as Thakurgaon, Lalmonirhat, and Dinajpur, as well as other places such as Sylhet, Khulna, and Rangpur" following the fall of the Hasina government last year.

The report said this destruction was especially prevalent in

areas perceived to be sympathetic to the Awami League as Hindus have often been stereotypically associated with this political faction.

The Union home ministry, soon after the regime change in Bangladesh, had constituted a committee under the ADG BSF (eastern command) to "ensure safety of Indian citizens and people belonging to minority communities in Bangladesh."

The BSF DG said the Indian side "urged" BGB during the meeting to ensure that the border remains absolutely secure and no infiltration happens on the border so that such incidents of Bangladeshi criminals attacking BSF personnel and local Indians do not happen.

"The point on attacks on BSF and civilians by Bangladeshi miscreants was taken up...The government of India follows a non-lethal strategy (using non-lethal weapons first at the border)...At times taking advantage of night cover and breaching the fence some miscreants try to enter our territory and try to overwhelm or overpower the BSF personnel," Chawdhary said.

On the issues related to fencing discussed during the three-

day talks that concluded on Thursday at the BSF headquarters, the BGB DG said they have "highlighted the number of potential cases" where the construction of development works close to the IB were being done and this was the "most focussed" agenda during the latest talks.

He said 150 yards on either side of the zero line is considered a "no man's land" and both sides are not allowed to construct any permanent structure or any structure that has "defence potential", without the consent of the other party.

"The communication gap occurs when the fencing is required within the 150 yards...Beyond 150 yards we don't mind at all how long, how heavy or how high the fence is made," Siddiqui said.

Both he and the BSF DG said that they "hope to resolve these issues in the future" with the BGB DG saying a joint inspection will be carried out in such areas.

Asked about the instances of illegal infiltration from Bangladesh into India, both the chiefs said such instances had actually gone down across the 4,096 km long IB, post August five of last year.

'Enthiran' plagiarism case: ED attaches director's assets over ₹10 Crore

Assets worth more than ₹10 crore of the director of 2010 movie 'Enthiran' facing charges of plagiarism and copyright violations have been attached under the anti-money laundering law, the Enforcement Directorate said on Thursday.

This is possibly the first attachment of assets in the country under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), on grounds of plagiarism or copyright violation while making a movie, as per officials.

A provisional order was issued on February 17 under the PMLA attaching three immovable properties of the director, S Shankar, the ED said in a statement. The total value of these assets is ₹10.11 crore, it said.

The money laundering case stems from a complaint filed by Aaur Tamilnadan, author of a story titled 'Jiguba', against Shankar before a court at Egmore in Chennai on May 19, 2011.

The complaint alleges that the storyline of the Tamil movie



'Enthiran' (Robot), directed by Shankar, was copied from 'Jiguba' thereby rendering Shankar liable for violations under the Copyright Act, 1957 and some sections of the Indian Penal Code (IPC), the ED said. 'Enthiran' was released in 2010 and featured Rajinikanth and Aishwarya Rai as the main lead. It grossed ₹290 crore world-wide, making it an all-time blockbuster at the time, the ED said.

The federal probe agency said its investigation found that Shankar received a "substantial" remuneration of ₹11.5 crore for his "multi-faceted" contributions to 'Enthiran', including story development, screenplay, dialogues, and direction.

Further, an independent report by the Film and Television Institute of India (FTII) identified "striking" similarities between the story 'Jiguba' and the movie 'Enthiran'. This report, which examined narrative structure, character development, and thematic elements, lends significant support to the plagiarism allegations against Shankar, the agency said.

"Based on the substantial evidence and records in hand, it has been determined that S Shankar has violated Section 63 of the Copyright Act, 1957; a violation now classified as a scheduled offence under the PMLA," the ED said.

Five high court judges challenge recent transfers in Pakistan's Supreme Court

The controversy over the appointment of judges in the Islamabad High Court deepened on Thursday after five judges of the court challenged the recent transfers in Pakistan's Supreme Court.

Pakistan authorities last month appointed three judges to the IHC by transferring them from other high courts and shortly after appointed Justice Sarfraz Dogar as the chief justice. Dogar made headlines when he was transferred to the IHC from the Lahore High Court (LHC). The move drew the ire of judges, lawyers and opposition parties as he was 13th on the seniority list of the judges but rose to the second position in IHC.

He rose to the top and was appointed as acting chief justice after the elevation of his predecessor, Aamer Farooq, to the Supreme Court. His transfer to IHC and subsequent elevation was contested by five judges, including justices Mohsin Akhtar Kayani, Babar Sattar, Tariq Mehmood Jahangiri, Saman Rafat Imtiaz, and Sardar Ejaz Ishaq Khan, who claimed that they were senior to him and his appointment as chief justice was a violation of rules.

They filed a 49-page constitutional petition under Article 184(3) through senior lawyers Munir A. Malik and Barrister Salahuddin, arguing that the recent transfer of judges violated relevant rules. The petition contends that judicial transfers cannot be made without public interest

and should not affect the seniority list. It further states that Article 200 only allows transfers, and the current process violates Article 175(A) of the Constitution. The judges have urged the Supreme Court to invalidate the Islamabad High Court's current seniority list, citing its inconsistency with Article 194 and the Constitution's Third Schedule. The petition specifically challenges the appointment of

Justice Dogar as acting Chief Justice of IHC, stating that he had only served two weeks in the high court before assuming administrative control. It also calls for Justices Khalid Soomro and Muhammad Asif to be barred from judicial work. The challenge comes following last week's appointment of Dogar as acting chief justice of the IHC, a move that sparked reservations among some judges over seniority. It is alleged that the authorities transferred three

judges, including justices Dogar, Soomro and Asif from Lahore, Sindh and Balochistan high courts, respectively, to the IHC to stop the appointment of any of the five judges as the chief justice. The legal fraternity and opposition Pakistan Tehreek-e-Insaf had opposed the move, with the PTI alleging that the transfers aimed to influence the cases of Imran Khan and his wife Bushra Bibi.

China begins repatriation of over 1,000 online scam workers rescued from Myanmar

An airlift carrying more than 1,000 Chinese nationals had worked at online scam centres in eastern Myanmar began Thursday, after the rescued workers were taken across the border to Thailand and put on chartered flights to China. Thailand, China and Myanmar have coordinated efforts over the past month to shut down the scam centres that bilked victims around the world out of billions of dollars through false romantic ploys, bogus investment

itches and illegal gambling schemes. Hundreds of thousands of people from Southeast Asia and elsewhere are estimated to have worked at such centres in Myanmar, Cambodia and Laos, with many who were recruited under false pretenses for other jobs found themselves trapped in virtual slavery. Thai officials said recently that as many as 10,000 people may be repatriated from Myanmar from the online scam centres. So far, 16 flights, or about four a day, have been scheduled to

repatriate the Chinese nationals, accompanied by police. Because of the large number of Chinese — the projected number so far is 1,041 — Thailand is allowing Beijing to handle most of their processing and investigations on their return to China. Thai officials told reporters on Thursday the rescued workers were being taken in batches of 50 across a bridge from Myanmar's Myawaddy to Thailand's Mae Sot, where they were processed — including with biometric scans — and sent on by bus to Mae Sot's airport.

There they boarded China Southern Airlines planes, and about 200 Chinese citizens "suspected of involvement in fraud" were flown to an airport in the city of Nanjing, China's official Xinhua news agency said. Thai authorities are overseeing the evacuation and processing of scam centre workers from other nations. Last week, some 260 people from 20 nations, including many from Africa, crossed from Myanmar into Thai custody after they were reportedly rescued from scam centres.

SEBI considers fast track offers for REITs, InvITs

PTI ■ NEW DELHI

Markets regulator, Securities and Exchange Board of India (SEBI) on Thursday proposed a framework for undertaking fast-track follow-on offers by Real Estate Investment Trusts (REITs) and Infrastructure Investment Trusts (InvITs) to make fundraising more efficient.

Additionally, the regulator has proposed a lock-in provision of three years for preferential issue of units of REITs and InvITs allotted to sponsors.

The SEBI has sought public comments by March 13 on the proposals.

In its consultation process, SEBI proposed that 15 per cent of the units allotted to sponsors and sponsor group will be locked-in for a period of three years from the date of trading approval granted for the units.

Further, the remaining units allotted to them will be

locked-in for a period of one year from the date of trading approval granted for the units.

With regards to follow-on offer, SEBI said that the FPO is one of the mechanisms for raising funds subsequent to issue of units after initial public offer.

SEBI proposed that REIT and InvIT making an FPO needs to ensure that they made an application to all stock exchanges on which their units are listed and seek an in-principle approval for listing of their units on such exchanges. They need to choose one of them as the designated stock exchange.

The manager and the merchant bankers should be responsible for obtaining in-principle approval and final listing and trading approvals from the stock exchanges. The minimum public unit holding should be at least 25 per cent of the total outstanding units of the REIT on a post issue basis.

"A REIT or InvIT shall not undertake any further issue of units in any manner whether by way of public issue, rights issue, preferential issue, institutional placement or otherwise, except pursuant to a unit based employee benefit scheme (if any) during the period between the date of filing of the draft follow-on offer document/follow-on offer document for follow-on offer and the listing of the units or refund of application money," SEBI proposed.

Further, REIT or InvIT should file the draft follow-on offer document, through the merchant banker with the Board, for its observations. The follow-on offer document, after incorporating the observations of SEBI, will be filed with the regulator and recognised stock exchanges. The merchant banker should, along with the filing of the draft follow on offer document, furnish due diligence certificate to SEBI.

Centre extends tenure of CEA V Nageswaran

The government on Thursday extended the tenure of Chief Economic Adviser (CEA) V Anantha Nageswaran for two years till March 2027.

Appointments Committee of the Cabinet headed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi approved the tenure of Nageswaran on contract basis up to March 31, 2027, sources said.

Nageswaran assumed charge of the CEA on January 28, 2022 by the government. The office of CEA is responsible for giving advice to the government on various economic policies, and drafting of economic survey that is tabled in Parliament a day ahead of the Union Budget.

Nageswaran, an academic and former executive with Credit Suisse Group AG and Julius Baer Group, succeeded K V Subramanian. His extension comes weeks after Economic Survey 2024-

25 projected a growth of 6.3-6.8 per cent for the next financial year amid Asia's third-largest economy showing signs of moderation.

As per the government's advance estimates, the economy is expected to grow at 6.4 per cent in the current financial year. Prior to taking over as CEA, Nageswaran worked as an author, teacher and consultant. He has also been a part-time member of the Economic Advisory Council to the Prime Minister from 2019 to 2021.

Besides, he has taught at several business schools and institutes of management in India and Singapore and has published extensively.

Nageswaran holds a Post-Graduate Diploma in Management (MBA) degree from the Indian Institute of Management, Ahmedabad. He obtained a doctoral degree in Finance from the University of Massachusetts in 1994 for his work on the empirical behaviour of exchange rates.

Adani touts cash, double-digit EBITDA growth to reassure investors

Adani Group on Thursday said it has enough cash to service debt obligations and that its business achieved record pre-tax profits in the 12 months ending December 2024 as it looked to reassure creditors and investors of a robust business profile.

Cash balances exceed long-term debt repayments for the next 28 months, while portfolio-level cash balances were at ₹53,024 Crore, the port-to-power conglomerate said in a report for the first nine months of the financial year ending March 2025 released on Thursday.

"Sufficient liquidity is maintained across portfolio companies to cover debt servicing requirements for at least the next 12 months," it said.

The cash balance as of September 30, 2024, compared with the ₹59,791 Crore balance generated in the full 2023-24 financial year (April 2023 to

March 2024 or FY24 fiscal). Cash balance represents 20.5 per cent of gross debt.

"These expanding cash flows have enabled consistent investments while keeping the leverage at an all-time low. As on September 30, 2024, FFO or cash after tax for the trailing 12 months was at ₹58,908 Crore," it said.

The group has a strong asset base of ₹5.53 Lakh Crore built over three decades, according to the report.

Adani said its gross assets to net debt ratio improved to 2.7 times during the first half of the current fiscal year compared to 2.63 times in the previous year.

Gross debt stood at ₹2.58 Lakh Crore, up from ₹2.41 Lakh Crore at the end of FY24. After accounting for cash balance, net debt was ₹2.05 Lakh Crore, up from ₹1.81 Lakh Crore net debt at the end of March 2024. For the 12-month period ending December 2024, EBITDA touched ₹86,789 Crore, marking a 10.1 per cent

year-on-year growth. Adjusted for prior income, the growth stands at 21.3 per cent. In the December quarter alone, EBITDA rose 17.2 per cent to ₹22,823 Crore.

According to the report, key to this growth are the emerging businesses under Adani Enterprises (AEL), including solar and wind manufacturing and airports. These businesses, part of AEL's infrastructure division, grew 45 per cent YoY in the December quarter and 33.3 per cent in the trailing 12-month period. Since FY19, the Adani Portfolio has shown strong growth, with EBITDA expanding at a CAGR of 25 per cent, despite challenges such as the Hindenburg report and the ongoing US indictment.

Around 85 per cent of the group's profits come from its infrastructure businesses, particularly utilities and transport. The infrastructure sector globally is recognised as the sector that lends a high level of predictability for cashflows.

UP unveils ₹8.08 Lakh Crore budget

Uttar Pradesh Finance Minister Suresh Kumar Khanna on Thursday presented the state budget for the financial year 2025-26, totalling ₹8,08,736 Crore, with a strong push toward research, technology, and infrastructure development.

The budget, which marks a 9.8 per cent increase over the previous year's outlay, allocates significant funds for key sectors, including education, healthcare, and agriculture.

Highlighting the government's vision, Khanna emphasized that 22 per cent of the total budget has been earmarked for development projects, 13 per cent for education, 11 per cent for agriculture and allied activities, and six per cent for the health sector.

"We have prioritised research, development, and IT to drive economic growth and technological innovation in the state," said Khanna during his budget speech.

Welfare measures and economic growth

As part of its commitment to social welfare, the government plans to build new labor hubs at district headquarters, equipped with essential amenities such as canteens, drinking water, and sanitation facilities for construction workers. Aimed at tackling poverty, the 'Zero Poverty Abhiyan'-launched on Gandhi Jayanti in October 2024-continues to be a key initiative. Under this campaign, the government is working to identify the poorest families in each Gram Panchayat and help raise their annual income to at least ₹1.25 Lakh through targeted welfare programs.

Financial stability and economic expansion

Khanna underlined the state's improving financial health, noting that Uttar Pradesh has been recognised as a "front runner" by NITI Aayog for its progress in healthcare, capital expenditure, and economic development. The state's fiscal deficit remains under control, while efforts to increase development

expenditure and reduce debt have shown positive results. According to a Reserve Bank of India (RBI) report, Uttar Pradesh ranks among the highest states in tax revenue collection, reflecting sound financial management. The state's economy, which faced challenges in 2017, has now doubled, with the Gross State Domestic Product (GSDP) projected to reach ₹27.51 Lakh crore for 2024-25. Additionally, per capita income has surged from ₹52,671 in 2016-17 to ₹93,514 in 2023-24.

Healthcare and education enhancements

The budget includes allocations for the establishment of six new forensic science laboratories in Ayodhya, Basti, Banda, Azamgarh, Mirzapur, and Saharanpur to strengthen crime investigation capabilities. In medical education, the government has earmarked ₹27 Crore for an autonomous medical college in Ballia and ₹25 Crore for a similar institution in Balrampur, aimed at expanding healthcare

services and medical training facilities in the state. For education, the state plans to introduce a new initiative offering free scooters to meritorious female students to promote higher education among women. In addition, investments will be made to enhance Science City, Science Parks, and Planetariums to encourage scientific awareness.

Commitment to growth and development

Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, speaking after the budget presentation, said, "This budget is a blueprint for Uttar Pradesh's sustainable development. We are focusing on infrastructure, technology, education, and social welfare to ensure inclusive growth and economic progress for all sections of society."

With its ambitious plans, the Uttar Pradesh government is positioning the state for accelerated growth, leveraging technology and strategic investments to build a robust and future-ready economy.

Musk's India Tesla factory would be 'very unfair' to US: Trump

United States (US) President Donald Trump has said if Elon Musk's Tesla built a factory in India to avoid that country's tariffs, it would be unfair to the US.

Trump's comments came amid moves by him to increase tariffs significantly. On February 13, hours before Prime Minister Narendra Modi's bilateral meeting with Trump at the White House, the US President announced reciprocal tariffs.

Trump in a recent interview said during their meeting he told Prime Minister Modi that India charges the highest tariffs in the world.

Trump said it is "impossible" for Musk to sell a car in India. "Every country in the world takes advantage of us, and they do it with tariffs. It is impossible to sell a car, practically, in, as an example, India," he said.

"If he (Musk) built the factory in India, that's okay, but that's unfair to us. It's very unfair," Trump said in the interview.

Musk, who heads the Department of Government Efficiency, was also present during the interview. A few days back, electric carmaker Tesla opened recruitment for

various roles in India, including business operations analyst and customer support specialist.

The move is viewed as a sign of the company's entry into the country. As per the job postings on the company's website, the posts are for the 'Mumbai Suburban' area.

Trump during the interview

said he discussed the issue of tariffs with Modi. "I told Prime Minister Modi. Here's what you do. We are going to be very fair with you." When asked if the tariffs India charged were 36 per cent. Trump said, "Much much higher."

Musk said, "It's 100 per cent on

- auto imports are 100 per cent." "Here's what we're going to do: reciprocal. Whatever you charge, I'm charging," President Trump said. "He (Modi) goes, 'No, no, I don't like that.' 'No, no, whatever you charge, I'm going to charge.' I'm doing that with every country."

Rupee rises 33 paise against USD

The rupee appreciated 33 paise to close at 86.65 (provisional) against the US dollar on Thursday, supported by the weakening of the American currency in the overseas market.

Forex traders said there is a negative bias for the USD and INR pair amid a muted trend in domestic equities and the unabated foreign fund outflow is weighing on investor sentiments.

At the interbank foreign exchange, the rupee opened at 86.88 and touched the high of 86.58 and a low of 86.88 against the greenback during intraday.

It ended the session at 86.65 (provisional) against the dollar, logging a gain of 33 paise from previous close. On Tuesday, the rupee depreciated

10 paise to close at 86.98 against US dollar.

The forex market was closed on Wednesday on account of 'Chhatrapati Shivaji Maharaj Jayanti'.

"The Indian rupee gained strength after lingering within a confined range for the past five days. This ascent was propelled by foreign banks dollar selling and the persistent unwinding of long positions by market players," said Dilip Parmar, Research Analyst, HDFC Securities.

The market dynamics for the rupee are progressively enhancing as the US dollar falters against both major and regional currencies.

In the short term, the spot USD and INR has support between 86.30 and 86.20, while 87.40 remains a strong resistance level to overcome. Meanwhile, the US dollar

index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, was trading 0.21 per cent lower at 106.95. Brent crude, the global oil benchmark, rose 0.04 per cent to USD 76.07 per barrel in futures trade.

Forex traders said on the domestic front, India's economy is expected to demonstrate a strong momentum in the second half of the year but the rupee is battling global headwinds.

According to an article on 'State of the Economy' published in RBI's February bulletin, high frequency indicators, like vehicles sales, air traffic, steel consumption and GST E-way bills, point towards a sequential pickup in momentum of economic activity during the second half of the fiscal 2024-25 and sustain moving forward.

Sensex, Nifty fall for third day on selling in blue-chips

Benchmark indices Sensex and Nifty declined for the third day on Thursday as fresh tariff threats, weak Asian markets and foreign fund outflows hurt investor sentiment.

The 30-share BSE Sensex dropped 203.22 points or 0.27 per cent to settle at 75,735.96.

During the day, it tanked 476.17 points or 0.62 per cent to 75,463.01.

The NSE Nifty dipped 19.75 points or 0.09 per cent to 22,913.15.

Selling in frontline stocks HDFC Bank, ICICI Bank, ITC and the Maruti dragged down the key indices.

Broader markets, however, bucked the trend with midcap and smallcap indices gaining more than one per cent.

From the Sensex pack, HDFC Bank fell the most by

2.35 per cent. Maruti, Tech Mahindra, HCL Tech, ITC, ICICI Bank, Kotak Mahindra Bank and Bajaj Finance were among the major laggards.

NTPC, Adani Ports, Mahindra and Mahindra, Tata Steel and IndusInd Bank were among the gainers.

Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth ₹1,881.30 Crore on Wednesday after a day's breather, according to exchange data.

"Domestic equity indices experienced minor losses as rising concerns over potential US tariffs on Indian goods led to capital outflows.

Additionally, the proposed trade policy is expected to exert inflationary pressures, with the latest Fed Minutes indicating that an interest rate cut may be delayed," Vinod Nair, Head of

Research, Geojit Financial Services, said.

"Benchmark indices closed slightly lower on expiry day after a rangebound and volatile session. The FOMC minutes hinted that the US Federal Reserve might pause rate cuts due to inflation concerns," Satish Chandra Aluri, analyst, Lemonn Markets Desk, said.

Among BSE sectoral indices, bankex dropped 0.50 per cent, followed by financial services (0.25 per cent), BSE Focused IT (0.10 per cent) and FMCG (0.04 per cent).

Power jumped the most 2.19 per cent, followed by utilities (2.17 per cent), metal (2.02 per cent), services (1.86 per cent), oil and gas (1.66 per cent) and industrials (1.55 per cent).

The BSE smallcap gauge jumped 1.32 per cent and midcap index climbed 1.18 per cent.

"Weak Asian market cues kept the mood sluggish with a negative bias through the session in the domestic market as investors continue to trade with caution. FIIs exiting Indian equities in droves over past few months have been making investors jittery, thus leading to risk averseness," Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP (Research), Mehta Equities Ltd, said.

Among Asian markets, Seoul, Tokyo, Shanghai and Hong Kong settled in the negative territory.

European markets were trading mostly higher.

US markets ended in positive territory on Wednesday.

Global oil benchmark Brent crude went up 0.08 per cent to USD 76.10 a barrel.

In the three straight days to Thursday, Sensex dipped 260 points while Nifty skidded 46 points.

Vedanta gets demerger nod

Vedanta Limited on Thursday said its shareholders and lenders have approved the splitting of the metals to oil conglomerate into five independent, sector-focused entities.

In a stock exchange filing, Vedanta said 99.99 per cent of shareholders who voted for the demerger scheme, supported the move.

Parallely, 99.59 per cent of the secured creditors, and 99.95 per cent of unsecured creditors of Vedanta Ltd voted in favour of the demerger.

Mining tycoon Anil Agarwal launched the plan to overhaul the business in 2023 after failing to take Vedanta private in 2020.

The five entities being created from the split would include Vedanta Ltd, which

would house the company's base metals. According to Vedanta's demerger scheme, every Vedanta shareholder will receive one additional share in each of the four newly demerged companies on the completion of the demerger process.

The other companies that will be created out of the demerger are Vedanta Aluminium, one of the world's largest producers of aluminium, Vedanta Oil and Gas, India's largest private-sector crude oil producer, Vedanta Power, one of India's largest generators of power, Vedanta Iron and Steel - a company with a highly scalable ferrous portfolio; and Vedanta Limited - which will include the world's second largest integrated zinc producer and third largest silver producer - in Hindustan Zinc.

Vedanta Ltd will also act as an

incubator for new businesses, including Vedanta's technology verticals.

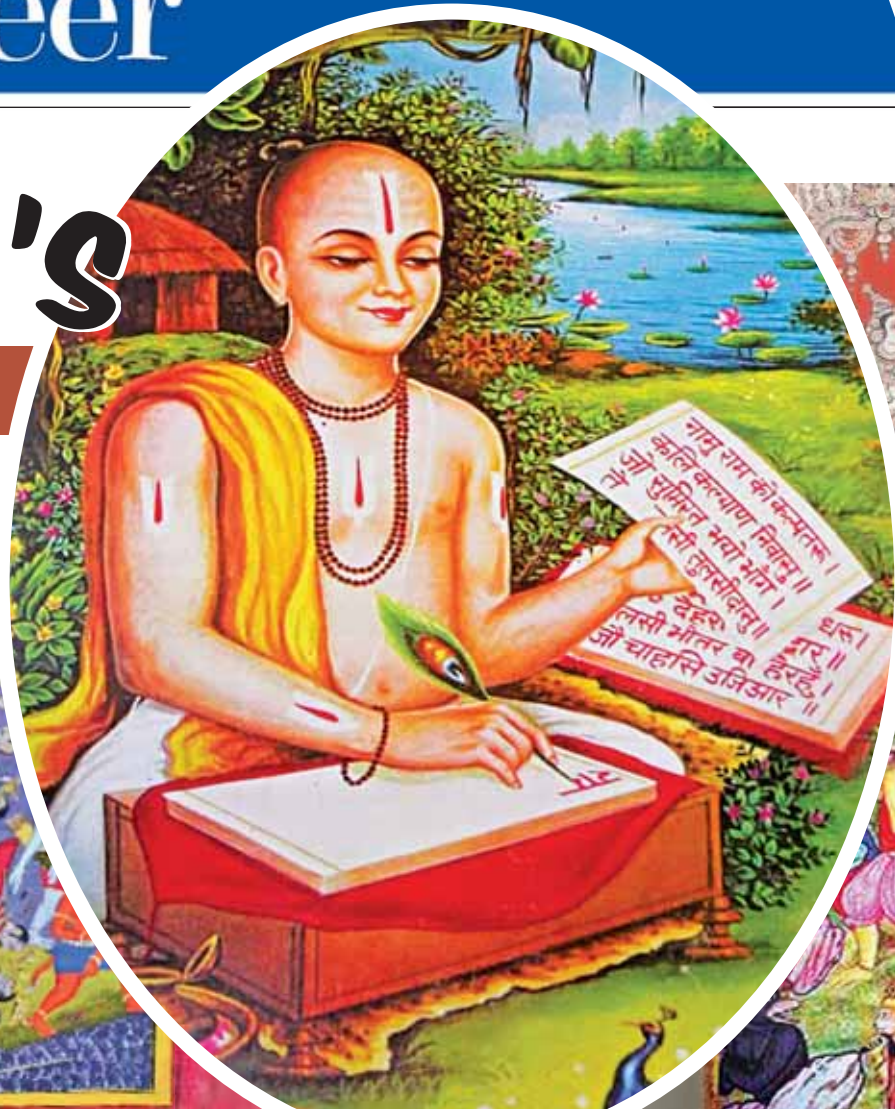
Of the 391.03 Crore shares of the company, 324.58 Crore or 83 per cent, voted on the demerger scheme. Of these, all but 42,186 shares were polled in favour of the demerger, according to the filing.

As per Vedanta's demerger scheme, the demerger will create five independent companies of a global scale focussed on the mining, production or supply of aluminium, iron-ore, copper, oil and gas, and on generation and distribution of power.

It will enable greater focus of the Vedanta management on the relevant businesses thereby allowing further streamlining of operations and more efficient usage of assets and leveraging of opportunities.

Plight of 1950s Tamil Nadu Weavers

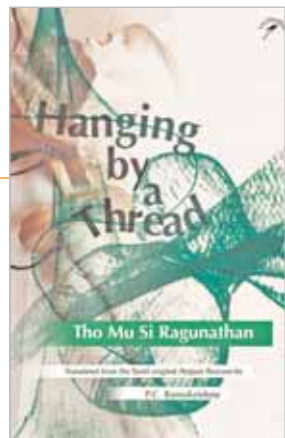
Hanging by a Thread talks about the struggles of weavers caught in the throes of social change, says ABHI SINGHAL



The English adaptation of *Tho Mu Si Ragunathan's* Tamil novel "Panjum Pasiyum," *Hanging by a Thread*, is a realistic account of the hardships that Tamil Nadu's handloom weavers endured in the 1950s. Due to a complicated web of political and economic constraints, this was a particularly difficult moment for these artisans. *Ragunathan's* work stands as a significant document of its time, vividly illustrating the weavers' plight and their resilience in the face of adversity.

Mbappé's stellar trio of goals in the fourth, 33rd and 61st minutes in a 3-1 win gave Madrid a 6-3 victory on aggregate over the 2023 champion in their two-leg knockout playoff.
"This has been the complete performance — attack, defense, with the ball and without the ball, we showed such high levels of quality," Madrid coach Carlo Ancelotti said. "Almost the perfect night."
One superstar striker was watched by another from the sidelines. Haaland was not fit to start for an ultimately overmatched Man City because of a knee injury sustained late in a Premier League game Saturday.
Paris Saint-Germain beat French rival Brest 7-0, to run up a 10-0 aggregate score, and will play either Liverpool or Barcelona in the round of 16.
PSV Eindhoven ousted Juventus in the only one of the eight playoffs this week that went to extra time.



City players toward encircling him. "I have always said I didn't come here simply to complete a dream," said Mbappé, a boyhood Madrid fan who never won a Champions League at Monaco and PSG. "I want to play well, I want to mark an era." Coach Pep Guardiola's injury-hit side — with Ballon d'Or winner Rodri out since September and Kevin De Bruyne now rarely starting — has looked like a shadow of the heavyweight rival that met Madrid in each of the past three seasons, when each time the winner went on to lift the trophy. Paris Saint-Germain hits 10 PSG has not lost anywhere since a Champions League defeat at

Bayern Munich three months ago, and the playoff against Brest proved a total mismatch. Brest had impressed in its first European season but went out with a whimper at Parc des Princes, after a 3-0 loss in the home leg.

Dortmund also fired a coach midseason and newly hired Niko Kovac now has two wins on the European stage to offset two straight losses in the German league.
Still, Sporting's prospects to be in the Champions League next season look better than Dortmund's.
Portugal's champion advances direct to the next league phase and Sporting currently is top, two points clear of Benfica. Dortmund is 11th in the Bundesliga and could need to win this Champions League title to earn a place in the next edition.
Round of 16 draw
Real Madrid, PSG, Dortmund and PSV join Bayern Munich, Benfica, Club Brugge and Feyenoord, which all advanced Tuesday, as playoff round winners who will be unseeded teams in Friday's draw. They will host the first-leg games on March 4-5.
The top eight in the 36-team standings three weeks ago — Liverpool, Barcelona, Arsenal, Inter Milan, Atletico Madrid, Bayer Leverkusen, Lille, Aston Villa — skipped the playoffs round and are seeded in the round of 16 draw. They host second legs on March 11-12. The round of 16 is in a new, tennis-like seeded bracket for the knockout stage in the expanded competition format.
Madrid, as the 11th-place team in the standings and No. 11 seed already knew its next opponent would be Atletico or Leverkusen, who respectively placed fifth and sixth.



Having smile solves half the problem: MS Dhoni

Even if it's tough to do... Just forgive and move on." Mahendra Singh Dhoni became a life coach for once to share his secrets for a stress-free existence, describing himself as a carefree person who would not give up on a good night's sleep by paying attention to what others think of him.

"I think, keep life simple. Be honest to yourself, have gratitude towards people for whatever they have been doing for you. Don't always think, 'this is my birthright' and ask for more," the enigmatic big-hitter said here on Wednesday



evening during the launch of his app 'DHONI' powered by Single. Id where injured India keeper-batter Sanju Samson was also present.
"I know the whole app (DHONI) says 'thoda aur' (a little more), but the whole thing is to have that gratitude, to say thank you, to respect the elders (and) to give love to the younger ones," he added.
He then went on to stress on the need to have a forgiving attitude, which he feels is in short-supply right now.
"I always felt having a smile on your face solves half the problem. Even if you're not in a comfortable position, even if it's tough to do, have the power to forgive. That is one thing that not many of us have," said the cricketer who has never responded to the personal attacks on him by anyone, including former teammates or critics, some of whom have even accused him of hurting careers.
"We have become a very revengeful people. Inse mujhe aisa bola, main aisa bola (He said something to me, I said something back)... Just forgive, move on, be happy in life, because whatever we do... When we're growing up, we always wanted to be happy in life," he further stated.
Dhoni said being careless towards a few things helps in balancing the pressure of day-to-day life.
"We all feel the pressure. We always say the grass is greener

on the other side. We always feel that his or her life is better, but what is important is how you manage that stress, how prepared you are," he said.

While skipper Temba Bavuma, Tony de Zorba, Rassie van der Dussen, and Aiden Markram will anchor the top order, the big-hitting trio of Heinrich Klaasen, David Miller and Tristan Stubbs are well-equipped to provide the final flourish.



South Africa's biggest challenge heading into the tournament is their depleted bowling attack as key pacers Anrich Nortje, Nandre Burger, and Gerald Coetzee ruled out due to injuries.
Known for his pace, aggression, and the knack of striking at crucial moments, Kagiso Rabada will be the Proteas' key weapon in both the powerplay and death overs.
Marco Jansen, too, will be expected to step up significantly. His ability to build pressure and deliver

field a full strength team in any of these games due to multiple reasons.
Clubbed alongside an off-colour England, injury-plagued Australia and Afghanistan, South Africa have a good chance of advancing to the knockout stage. But the Afghans could prove to be the proverbial banana peel.

Their impressive performances in recent ICC events include dominant wins over England, Pakistan, and Sri Lanka in the 2023 ODI World Cup and reaching the semifinals of the T20 World Cup last year.
They have proved more than once that they are no longer underdogs but a force to be reckoned with.
The Afghans have won four of their five bilateral series since the ODI World Cup, including one against South Africa in the UAE.
Their biggest strength

expectedly remains their spin attack comprising the redoubtable Rashid Khan, Mohammad Nabi and left-armers Noor Ahmad and Nangeyala Kharote.
They will play all three group matches in Pakistan where spin will be a decisive factor.
Pacer Azmatullah Omarzai has been a key figure in Afghanistan's ODI success, with his ability to swing the new ball providing them the powerplay edge.
Fazalqar Farooqi will be another crucial weapon with ability to provide early breakthroughs and effective variations at the death.
In the batting department, Rahmanullah Gurbaz and Ibrahim Zadran will once again be expected to provide a solid start.
Their weakness, however, lies in their middle order, which has often struggled to maintain momentum. This inconsistency has been a concern, and addressing it will be crucial for their success in the tournament.
