TRUMP AND HIS TRUMPET ENGULF INDIA

US President Donald Trump has once again raised USAID's purported \$21-million grant for 'voter turnout' in India, which his administration has purportedly cancelled, and linked it to Prime Minister Narendra Modi. Trump, as usual, also questioned why such a significant amount was spent abroad when a similar sum could have been used to boost voter turnout in the US. "And \$21 million going to my friend, Prime Minister Modi in India, for voter turnout. We are giving 21 million for voter turnout in India. What about us? I want voter turnout too," Trump said at the Governors

Working Session. "\$29 million to strengthen the political landscape in Bangladesh went to a firm that nobody ever heard of. Got 29 million. They got a check. Can you imagine? You have a little firm, you get 10,000 here, 10,000 there, and then you get 29 million from the United States government. There are two people working in that firm. Two people. I think they're very happy, they're very rich. They'll be on the cover of a very good business magazine pretty soon for being great," he added. Meanwhile, a federal judge has cleared the way for the Trump administration to pull thousands of US Agency for International Development

staffers off the job. US District Judge Carl Nichols on Friday removed his temporary block on the effort to remove all but a small fraction of USAID staffers from their posts and give those abroad a 30-day deadline to move back to the US at government expense. His ruling comes in a lawsuit filed by unions on behalf of workers. They say the rush to dismantle the agency had cut off some staffers overseas from emergency communications systems, including some in danger of political violence in Congo. Nichols found that the unions' challenge must be dealt with under federal employment laws rather than in district court.

BJP, Congress slugfest over USAID

Trump Administration raising the issue of USAID funding has created massive political ramifications, allegations and counter allegations amongst the Centre, ruling party BJP and Opposition Congress. Trump's remark has evoked a sharp response from the Congress which urged Prime Minister Narendra Modi to "talk to his friend" and strongly refute the allegation. The Opposition party has demanded a white paper on the funds received in India from developmental agencies, aid mechanisms and multilateral forums. Minister of External Affairs S Jaishankar called the accusations "worrisome" and said that "if there's something to it, then the country should know who the people are involved in it." BJP IT Cell Chief Amit Malviya shared Trump's remarks in a social media post on X and took a swipe at the Opposition which later posted the complete statement of Trump where he called Modi his friend. "For the third day in a row, US President Donald Trump reiterates his claim about USAID funding efforts to promote voter turnout in India. He says, 'We're giving \$21 million for voter turnout in India. What about us? I want voter turnout too. But what does he know about his own country's spending,'" Malviya said. Malviya faced wrath of Congress Media and Publicity Head Pawan Khera who said perhaps Malviya erred in sharing the video of Trump

who has clearly named PM Modi yet he tries to defend and implicate Congress aimlessly. Congress also sought legal action against the RSS-BJP and "their ecosystem" for making wild allegations against credible civil society members, NGOs and political parties. Jaishankar on Saturday for the first time spoke about the allegations levied by former US President Donald Trump against USAID's \$21 million funding for 'voter turnout' in India. While speaking at the Delhi University Literature Festival, EAM Jaishankar said, "Some information has been put out there by the Trump administration people, and obviously, that is concerning... I think, as a government, we're looking into it. My sense is that the facts will come out... USAID was allowed here in good faith, to do good faith activities; now, suggestions are being laid out from America that there are activities which are in bad faith. It's worrisome, and if

there's something to it, then the country should know who the people are involved in it." Khera said the Modi government, its ministers, its economic advisor, BJP's IT department head, its ecosystem and "one-fourth media," which acts as cheerleaders for the BJP are desperately tying themselves in knots to somehow prove their allegation of 'deep state' and 'foreign intervention' with regards to 'USD 21 million USAID funds narrative.' "The white paper should not only focus on USAID funding, but all such agencies which fund both governments, individuals and all other entities under Indian law," Congress' media and publicity department head Pawan Khera told a press conference. Khera pointed at "three significant developments," including Trump's remark about "my friend Prime Minister Modi." "More Indian news media outlets have fact-checked the claim by BJP and Modi

government's minister as untrue. Funds went to Bangladesh, not India; although India received USAID funds, but not for increasing voter turnout," he said. Now, an American newspaper, Washington Post, has come up with a fact check and "found no evidence that USD 21 million was due to be spent for voter turnout in India or for any other purpose," even as the MEA spokesperson called this "very deeply troubling" and announced that "relevant departments and agencies are looking into this matter," he said. Khera alleged that the RSS-BJP and its ilk are "habitual offenders" in two aspects - crafting fake narratives and propagating lies and seeking external assistance to destabilise the Indian state, democracy and the Constitution. Khera alleged that there is no record of a Consortium for Elections and Political Process Strengthening (CEPPS) programme matching US government's description in India. CEPPS did have a USD 21 million USAID contract - not for India, but for neighboring Bangladesh, he said. "During 2012, the Anna Hazare movement was at its peak, Arvind Kejriwal was forming his own party, Chief Minister Narendra Modi was gearing to be BJP's PM candidate. So, who benefitted from these funds? Who got 282 seats in Lok Sabha? The remaining amount started pouring in between US FY2020 and US FY2024," Khera said.

Need new legal framework on OTT platforms: I&B

The Information and Broadcasting Ministry is examining the existing statutory provisions and the need for a new legal framework to regulate "harmful" content amid complaints of "obscenity and violence" being shown on digital platforms. In its reply to a parliamentary panel, the ministry said there is a growing concern in the society that the constitutional right of "freedom of expression is being misused to showcase obscene and violent content on digital platforms". It told the Standing Committee on Communications and Information Technology headed by BJP MP Nishikant Dubey that while certain provisions exist under the current laws, there is a growing demand for a stricter and effective legal framework to regulate such harmful content. "This ministry has taken note of these developments and is in process of examining current statutory provisions and need for a new legal framework," it said. The ministry said that many high courts and the Supreme Court, MPs and statutory bodies like the National Commission of Women have spoken on the issue.

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Flight turbulence: Shivraj Singh Chouhan vs Air India

The DGCA has asked for a reply within a day. Union Civil Aviation Minister Ram Mohan Naidu has spoken to Chouhan regarding his "uncomfortable" flight experience with Air India

KIIT incident. The government is also making all efforts to restore academic atmosphere at the university. The two Nepal officials expressed satisfaction over the steps taken by the Odisha Government and said the relations between the two countries are historic and would not be affected.

Organisers leave brides in lurch at event

For more than 50 prospective brides and grooms, a mass wedding ceremony in Rajkot was going to be etched in lifelong memories, instead, their emotions swung from hope to despair and finally into anger after the unscrupulous organisers gave the event a miss. Moved by the plight of the marriage hopefuls, police took the initiative to make arrangements for marrying off at least six couples on the spot on Saturday, officials said. When the families of 28 pairs of brides and bridegrooms arrived at the venue, they were shocked to find that no arrangement was made for the function and organisers were missing with

their mobile phones switched off, said Assistant Commissioner of Police Radhika Bharai. The families, who came from different parts of Rajkot and other districts, created a ruckus, prompting the police to intervene. Police took up the responsibility for completing the wedding ceremony and called up the grooms who had left. "Six couples tied the knot following arrangements made by the police," the ACP said. While many couples had already left the venue to get married at nearby temples and elsewhere, arrangements were made for six couples present at the spot, the police officer said. Bharai said a case would be registered against the

organisers after family members of marriage hopefuls claimed that organisers had collected Rs 15,000 each from them for arranging the function. The organisers had promised to arrange everything along with gifts for the newly-married couples, family members claimed. Shilpaben Bagtharia, who attended the wedding of her relative's daughter, said the organisers had taken Rs 15,000 each from both the parties and also promised to give dowry. "No arrangements were made. And since none of the organisers was present, the crowd left the venue, dashing everyone's hopes. Priests who had come to arrange the wedding also went back," she said.

First session of new Delhi Assembly to begin Monday

The Delhi BJP on Sunday convened a meeting of newly elected MLAs on Sunday, ahead of the first session of the eighth Legislative Assembly of Delhi, beginning from Monday with newly elected members taking oath at 11 am. Delhi Lieutenant Governor Vinai Kumar Saxena has appointed senior BJP leader and MLA from Gandhi Nagar Arvinder Singh Lovely as the pro-tem Speaker of the Delhi Assembly to chair the proceedings during the first sitting of the legislature on Monday. The appointment came ahead of the first sitting of the new 70-member Assembly that will take place on February 24. According to a list by the Delhi Assembly, the three-day session will see the election of the House, Speaker and Deputy Speaker as well as the tabling of the 14 pending CAG reports on the performance of the previous AAP government. The oath/affirmation of the newly elected members will take place at 11 am on February 24. The election of the Speaker will be held at 2 pm. Four-time MLA Arvinder Singh will perform the duties of the Office of the Speaker till the new Speaker is elected. The new members of the House will take oath before the pro-tem speaker," according to the bulletin. Senior BJP MLA and former Delhi BJP president Vijender Gupta will be the

Delhi Assembly Speaker and Mohan Singh Bisht will be his deputy. On February 26, the discussion on the motion of thanks on LG's address will commence at 11:00 am, after which the Deputy Speaker of the Delhi assembly will be elected. "Being the first sitting of the Eighth

Legislative Assembly of NCT of Delhi constituted after the General Election held in February in 2025, the Members shall observe two minutes silence to mark the solemnity of the occasion. First, Chief Minister & other Ministers shall make or subscribe to oath or affirmation and thereafter other Hon'ble Members, constituency wise, shall make or subscribe to oath or affirmation. "Notice of motion for the election of the speaker can be given up to Saturday, February 22, before noon to the secretary, legislative assembly," the bulletin read.

'Probing all angles in IRS officer death'

"With AIIMS Bhubaneswar gearing up to commence liver transplantation services, the need for a dedicated clinic to evaluate and list patients suf-



fering from End-Stage Liver Disease (ESLD) is paramount," said Dr Biswas.

The clinic will be jointly managed by the Departments of Surgical Gastroenterology, Gastroenterology, Paediatric Surgery and Paediatrics.

The clinic will cater to patients from Odisha and neighbouring States.

Its primary functions include evaluating ESLD pa-

tients for liver transplantation, listing patients for transplantation, pre-operative optimization for both donors and recipients, nutritional and transplant counseling and providing information on risks and benefits of liver transplantation.

The clinic will operate every Tuesday from 2:30 pm to 4:30 pm at Room No. 222, Gastro OPD Complex.

'Bikashita Gaon': Vision for rural transformation

Development today is often measured through the lens of technological advancements and urban progress. However, true progress must include rural development. Because village is the heart of India where a significant portion of the population resides and they should not be left behind. Mahatma Gandhi's vision of Gram Swaraj or village self-sufficiency remains relevant in this era of globalisation. Emphasising decentralised governance, self-reliance and sustainable infrastructure, Gandhi's oceanic circle model placed individuals and communities at the heart of progress. In alignment with this philosophy, Odisha's Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi launched an ambitious Bikashita Gaon Bikashita Odisha (BGBO) scheme on February 5, 2025 with a dedicated budget of ₹5,000 crore over five years.

Ensuring holistic development, BGBO aims to revolutionise rural Odisha by enhancing connectivity, education and employability and livelihood opportunities. This ini-

tiative also focuses on infrastructure, community empowerment and sustainability. Fostering a self-sustaining rural economy, BGBO intends to improve sports facilities, tourism projects and other community welfare initiatives. Mirroring Gandhi's principles, the programme encourages villages to use locally-available resources for development. This sustainable model aligns with Odisha's broader vision of achieving a developed State status by 2036, contributing to the national aspiration of Viksit Bharat by 2047.

For any rural development initiative to succeed, governance must be transparent, accountable and people-centric. The BGBO scheme incorporates district Collectors for overseeing, regular reviews and social audits to maintain transparency. Learning from past initiatives like Ama Gaon Ama Bikash (2018) and Ama Odisha Naveen Odisha (2023), the new programme ensures better financial stability, local governance participation and execution.

To empower rural populations, governance must be accessible and digital-friendly. Digital literacy campaigns can equip villagers with skills to navigate government portals like DigiLocker, Aadhaar, Bhulekh (land records) and online grievance redressal systems. Additionally, training programmes on Jan DhanYojana, UPI payments and cyber security awareness will help villagers protect their financial assets and avoid fraud. Mo Seva Kendras are intended as a bridge

between citizens and the government, but now it must be monitored to ensure efficiency and prevent malpractice. So, BGBO must inculcate the above digital literacy as one of the components to empower rural communities in local governance.

The Gram Sabha serves as the foundation of grassroots democracy, but irony is that participation remains low due to a limited awareness. BGBO aims to strengthen local governance by integrating Gram Panchayat Development Plans (GPDP), ensuring transparent fund allocation and greater public participation. Further to this, the People's Plan Campaign (PPC), which encourages inclusive decision-making, should be promoted through sustainable development workshops and community consultations.

Rural Odisha must evolve into dynamic knowledge hubs by providing access to digital education, skill development and entrepreneurship training. Many rural students face economic hardships, and

a lack of quality education widens the urban-rural divide. By incorporating solar-powered facilities, high-speed internet and smart classrooms, the newly-proposed rural reading rooms under BGBO can facilitate online learning and competitive exam preparation. Similarly, courses in graphic design, coding, video editing and financial literacy will help rural youth acquire marketable skills. Additionally, incubation centres in every block should be introduced to nurture young entrepreneurs through mentorship, funding assistance and training.

As we understand, well-connected villages have better access to markets and healthcare, and employment opportunities are the key components to drive economic and social development. BGBO prioritises all-weather roads using sustainable materials ensuring durability and cost-effectiveness. Eliminating accessibility challenges under this scheme, Chakka roads (small village roads) and farming roads will connect remote

hamlets or farmland to main roads. In order to make rural road connectivity more people-centric and sustainable, innovative approaches such as public-private partnerships (PPPs) and community-driven road maintenance should be encouraged more. Further, solar-powered lights and rainwater harvesting along roads for infrastructure resilience and AI-based monitoring and GPS tracking for needing urgent repairs should be promoted under BGBO.

Odisha farmers regularly face unpredictable weather patterns that devastate their lives, crops and livestock. By integrating panchayats, Krishi Vigyan Kendras (KVKs) and digital platforms, BGBO should ensure that a weather intelligence centre is accessible to all farmers.

Despite being a rich heritage of traditional crafts and rural industries, many artisans in Odisha struggle due to a lack of market access. Reviving traditional skills and indigenous enterprises through BGBO can be achieved by intro-

duction of rural indigenous skill centres. It will help revive hereditary professions by integrating modern technology, green business models and financial support mechanisms under BGBO. These centres will provide marketing training, digital exposure and funding assistance along with creating employment opportunities and preserving cultural traditions. Finally, by promoting rural tourism at the panchayat and block levels, rural employment opportunities will expand and economic development will be decentralised.

A self-reliant Odisha is not a distant dream; rather, it is an achievable reality when villages are empowered with the right resources, infrastructure and governance. Through the Bikashita Gaon Bikashita Odisha initiative, the State is laying the foundation for an inclusive, progressive and prosperous future.

7 held for Barbil mining firm VP kidnap

Jharkhand gang involved in crime in nexus with victim's driver

The Keonjhar police arrested 7 persons in connection with kidnapping of Nimananda Pradhan, vice president of Grewal Metals and Minerals company, and also recovered Rs 59, 90,000 from the kidnappers. This was disclosed by police in a Press conference held here on Saturday.

DIG Brijesh Kumar Ray who was briefing the media said that in the evening of February 12, Nimananda was returning his residence from office by car but Feroj, who was driving the car, mischievously took him to his own



home where Sadam Khan alias Babu, a Ranchi based notorious criminal, was waiting. Then the gang of Sadam took Nimananda at gun point and also assaulted the driver to show his innocence in the kidnapping episode. They took him to Ranchi and held him captive there.

However, after the FIR of Sujata Pradhan, wife of the victim, Keonjhar police led by SP Nitin Kushaleswar formed 12 special teams who were dispatched to different parts of the neighbouring districts and States outside Odisha to collect intelligence and started

investigation in coordination with different agencies and lastly focussed their investigation on and around Ranchi as the centre of the crime.

During the time the kidnappers had demanded Rs 2 crore ransom and threatened to kill him if their demands were not met. However, due to terror tactics used by the kidnappers, the victim's family members paid Rs 60 lakh and got Nimananda released. Then police basing on the statement of Nimananda conducted raids at different hideouts and arrested 7 accused and recovered Rs 59.90 lakh from them.

In this regard more interesting was the role of driver Feroj who was initially claiming that he and the victim were overpowered by four criminals while he was taking the victim to his home. However, later his statements were found contradictory to the statements of other witnesses and he confessed to his involvement in the crime. It was Feroj, who was sharing every details of the victim including his financial status to the kidnappers.

SP Kushaleswar and other senior officials were present during the Press meet.

Police have arrested two persons in connection with the rape and murder of a married woman at Nandinipali village of Seegarh gram panchayat under the Pallahara police station in Angul district on Friday night.

The arrested were identified Aju Naik and Goa Mohakul, who had called the victim from her home on some pretext. They lured her to the local Anganwadi Centre and took turns in raping her. Later, they allegedly killed her by bulldozing her with a heavy stone.

The victim's body was found by the Anganwadi teacher,

who informed her family. A Pallahara police team led by IIC Pradeep Mohanta rushed to the spot and seized the body. After a probe, they arrested the two accused and forwarded them to court.

In another incident, the Pallahara police arrested the owner of a coaching centre for allegedly sexually exploiting a Class-IX girl student. The arrested accused was identified as Mukesh Behera, the owner of 'Mukesh Sir Coaching Classes'.

The family of the victim had lodged a case against Behera after a video of the girl and Behera went viral on social media. After conducting a medical test of the accused and the victim, police arrested Behera and forwarded him to court on Friday. As the court rejected his bail plea, Behera was sent to judicial custody.

Property dispute in Jajpur Driver gets lifer for running truck over cousin

A Jajpur district court on Thursday sentenced a truck driver to life imprisonment for deliberately running over his cousin in 2021 due to a property dispute.

Justice Amruta Ranjan Nanda found Susant Mallick (34) guilty under Section 302 of the IPC for the murder of his cousin Akshya Mallick (30). The court also imposed a fine of Rs 20,000 on the convict, with an additional six-month imprisonment if he fails to pay the amount.

The incident occurred on March 24, 2021, when Akshya was standing on a road near his house in Balisahi village under Jenapur police station.

Susant, driving a lorry at high speed, intentionally ran over Akshya, killing him instantly. While the case was initially registered as an accident, subsequent investigation revealed it was a pre-meditated murder.

"The accused attempted to disguise the murder as an accident, but eyewitness accounts proved otherwise," said public prosecutor Samarendra Dash.

The prosecution's case was strengthened by the testimonies of 20 witnesses who confirmed that Susant deliberately ran over the victim. Investigation revealed that a long-standing property dispute between the cousins led to the crime.

A doctor working at the Baripada-based Pandit Raghunath Murmu Medical College Hospital has been invited by the Rashtrapati Bhavan to receive an award for her selflessness and bravery.

As per reports, a fire had broken out at the PRM Hospital on August 18, 2023. Dr



Ranjana Bhandare, a specialist in obstetrics and gynaecology, saved her patient and a newborn child, demonstrating extraordinary profes-

sionalism and dedication.

Dr Bhandare had just completed five surgeries and was in the process of performing a sixth when the emergency unfolded. She immediately moved the mother and the newborn to a safer location. She independently pushed a 70-kg stretcher. She performed the necessary stitches and ensured the safety of both lives before relocating them to a secure area.

Recounting the incident, she said, "It was right at the mo-

ment when I had pulled the child out of the mother's womb when black smoke started coming out from a corner of the operation theatre; and before I could comprehend anything, fire engulfed almost everything in the room including the ceiling."

"I could not have lived peacefully with myself had I left the patient back in the OT and saved myself that day. As a doctor as well, I could have never left her there to fend for herself," she added.

Instead of taking him to the hospital for treatment, the school authorities, with the help of a waiter, took Govinda to his home in Shagadia village and dropped him off. Govinda's mother took Govinda to Manjusha Medical College in

Andhra Pradesh on Thursday for treatment and brought him home. On February 15, his health further deteriorated and Govinda died on the way to the hospital. Govinda's mother questioned the negligence of the school authorities for sending her son home without providing him immediate treatment.

Taking the incident seriously, DIO Sahu ordered an investigation into the matter.

Shantikanta Das appointed Principal Secretary to PM

Former Reserve Bank of India (RBI) governor Shantikanta Das was on Saturday appointed the second Principal Secretary to Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

P K Mishra, a retired IAS officer of the Gujarat cadre, is currently serving as the Principal Secretary to the prime minister.

According to an official order, the tenure of Das, a retired IAS officer of the Tamil Nadu cadre, will be "co-terminus" with the term of the prime minister or until further orders, whichever is earlier.

This is the first time that two persons will simultaneously serve as principal secretaries to the prime minister. Both Mishra and Das are from Odisha.

"The Appointments Committee of the Cabinet has approved the appointment of Shri Shantikanta Das, IAS (Retired), as Principal Secretary-2 to Prime Minister with effect from the date he assumes the office. His appointment will be co-terminus with the term of the Prime Minister or until further orders, whichever is earlier," the order said.

Sixty-eight-year old Das has been a career civil servant with over 44 years of

distinguished service, primarily in the areas of finance, taxation, investment and infrastructure.

He was the central government's revenue secretary. During his tenure as economic affairs secretary in 2016, the Modi government had announced the demonetisation.

Das played a key role when multiple indirect taxes were merged into one GST, which came into effect on July 1, 2017. Post-retirement, he was appointed as a member of the 15th Finance Commission and G20 Sherpa of India.

Das became the 25th governor of the RBI in 2018 after Urjit Patel resigned. Initially appointed for three years, his tenure was extended for a further period of three years in 2021. He demitted office in December 2024 when Sanjay Malhotra was appointed as RBI governor.

Das was the second longest serving governor of the RBI in its 90-year history after Benegal Rama Rau, who had a seven-and-a-half-year tenure in the 1950s.

Das, a 1980-batch IAS officer, holds a Master's degree in history from Delhi's St Stephen's College and a postgraduate degree in public administration from the University of Birmingham.

As the RBI governor, he focused on maintaining financial stability, curbing inflation and promoting economic growth. He took several measures to address the liquidity crunch in the non-banking financial sector and took steps to strengthen the regulatory framework for banks and non-banking financial companies.

Das is credited with navigating the RBI's economic policies through the Covid pandemic. As a key economic policymaker, he faced challenging times in managing the disruptions caused by the lockdown. He chose to cut the policy repo rate to a historic low of 4 per cent, continuing with the low-interest rate regime for almost two years to help the economy hit badly by the lockdown.

During his tenure, the RBI handed over the highest-ever dividend of Rs 2.11 lakh crore to the Centre for 2023-24. He was also conferred with the 'Central Bank Governor of the Year' award by Central Banking, UK.

Das had also served as India's Alternate Governor in the World Bank, Asian Development Bank (ADB), New Development Bank (NDB) and Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB).

Health central to to global cooperation: EAM

India envisages health as central to development, and development as key to international cooperation, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said on Saturday as he cited the 'Vaccine Maitri' initiative of the Centre during the Covid period, and the medical aid extended to people in Ukraine, Afghanistan and other countries in recent years.

Addressing the 12th International Patient Safety Conference being hosted here by the Apollo healthcare group, Jaishankar said the private health industry in India has also contributed to facilities and capacities in different geographies, and "we value this industry as a partner".

"We in India envisage health as central to development, and development as key to international cooperation. In recent years, many of our global initiatives have revolved around health security. This is a domain where India has been the first responder, a development partner, a supply chain link, a health solution provider, and in many ways, an

exemplar over the last decade," Jaishankar said.

He underlined that India today has delivered more than 600 significant development projects to 78 nations across the world and many of those are in the health sector.

"Recently, we dispatched 66.5 tonnes of medical supplies to deal with the humanitarian crisis in Gaza. A little before that, a consignment of 1,400 kg of anti-cancer medicine were sent to strengthen the medical capabilities of hospitals in Syria.

"Even in Afghanistan, India has stepped forward with 300 tonnes of medicines in the last few years, as well as the despatch of specialists to a hospital that we built in Kabul." Jaishankar also cited the instance of aid provided to Sri Lankan hospitals during the 2022 economic crisis in the island nation, to Ukraine as the casualties in the conflict with Russia spiked, or to Myanmar when it was struck by Typhoon Yagi.

"In this pursuit, Indian diplomacy has worked with Indian partners, big and small, islands and landlocked, close and distant, but united in their

desire to ensure better lives for their citizens," he said.

Jaishankar also recalled India's role during the Covid-19 pandemic, and its 'Vaccine Maitri' initiative.

"When the Covid pandemic started engulfing the world, the initial deliberations, and I myself was present at some of them, envisaged India as potentially the biggest concern. Ironically, India ended up not only looking after its own needs, but actually stepped

forward to contribute to the world," Jaishankar said.

At that time, India provided medicines to 150 nations, vaccines to 99 countries and two international organisations as well masks, PPE kits, gloves and ventilators, among others, Jaishankar said.

"Equally important is the fact that India chose to do this when its own vaccination programme was still unfolding. A large number of

developing nations received Made-in-India vaccine either through our Vaccine Maitri initiative or through other global programmes," the minister said.

"This was in contrast to many developed countries which stockpiled vaccines to the multiples of their population, he said.

"Indian medical teams also went out in the Indian Ocean Region to deal with the pressing situations in some smaller countries. And this was not just an exception made during the Covid era. It is part of our approach to the world, both before and after (the pandemic)," Jaishankar said.

He also mentioned that through the 'Heal in India' initiative, the Centre is committed to promoting medical value travel and making it easier for foreign patients to avail treatment in India.

And, "as we seek to balance tradition and technology as the twin forces of national progress, it is also natural that we will explore the relevance of our own heritage and culture, to the health of our people," he underlined.

Army to boost air defence with guns, radars

With drones and other disruptive technologies impacting the dynamics of warfare as demonstrated in recent conflicts, the Army Air Defence has drawn a roadmap to boost its capabilities through replacement of two of its old platforms, induction of new fragmentation ammunition for existing air defence guns, and deployment of more potent radars.

Besides, the army is also hoping to place a contract for the indigenously developed Quick Reaction Surface to Air Missile (QRSAM) system within 4-5 months, a top official said on Friday.

The Corps of Army Air Defence holds a large variety of missile systems and guns in its inventory such as the L70, Zu-23mm, Schilka, Tanguska and Osa-AK missile system.

"The fashion of guns is back. The army sustained them for good reason and these guns can be effectively used with fragmentation ammunition," Director General of Army Air Defence (AAD), Lt Gen Sumer Ivan D'Cunha, said.

Asserting the need for modernisation with an emphasis on 'Aatmanirbhar Bharat', Lt Gen D'Cunha also cautioned that the Indian industry must offer "reduced timelines" when it comes to delivery.

The AAD, initially part of the Territorial Army, was later separated

from the Artillery in 1994 as a separate corps that looks after destruction of air threat "before it manifests", officials said.

The army is planning to replace the L70 and ZU-23mm with "successor" platforms. However, as of now, it is not looking to import, as far as guns are concerned, they said.

The first trials of the indigenous successor platform to replace the old L70 guns is likely to be carried out in July, the officials said, adding that an RFP (request for proposal) is already out for the procurement of 220 such guns.

The L70 guns were originally manufactured by Swedish defence firm Bofors AB in 1950s, and India started inducting over 1,000 of them in the 1960s.

On QRSAM, the AAD DG said, "We are hoping to place a contract within 4-5 months. And once it is done, the First of Prototype Model (FoPM) will be there over a period of several months."

In September 2022, the defence ministry in a statement said that the Defence Research and Development Organisation (DRDO) and the Indian Army had successfully completed six flight-tests of the QRSAM system from the Integrated Test Range (ITR) in Chandipur off the Odisha coast.

The flight tests were conducted as part of evaluation trials by the Indian

Army.

The While Schilka and Tanguska are planned to be replaced by indigenous successor platforms, while Osa-AK missile system is planned to be replaced by QRSAM, thus boosting the air defence capabilities of the Corps, the officials said.

On February 1, the ministry said the DRDO has successfully conducted three successive flight-trials of Very Short-Range Air Defence System (VSHORADS) from Chandipur.

These tests were carried out against high-speed targets flying at very low altitude.

VSHORADS is a man-portable air defence system designed and developed indigenously by the Research Center Imarat in collaboration with other DRDO laboratories and development-cum-production partners.

The missile system has the capability to meet the needs of all the three services of the armed forces -- the army, navy and air force -- it said.

"As you look at higher variety of drones, we have VSHORADS, we need to carry out a cost-benefit analysis and it would be cost prohibitive to use missiles against all drones. So, fragmentation ammunition is the way forward," Lt Gen D'Cunha said.

The AAD is also in the process of acquiring radars such as the Low-

Level Light Weight (LLLR) radar.

"We had bought LLLR radars as part of an emergency procurement which is capable of picking up Mavic drone without grenade, and can definitely pick up with grenade. Nano drones beyond this size may be able to carry out surveillance but can't carry weapons. So, we are looking at increasing the density of these radars," he said.

Greater density is required for mountains and valley, the senior officer said.

Lt Gen D'Cunha also cited the Russia-Ukraine conflict and other recent conflicts to emphasise the importance and growing threat of drones, counter-drones and other disruptive technologies.

The employment of drones as a concept manifested in a different way in the Russia-Ukraine conflict. Both drones and counter-drone systems came up in a "big way", he said.

The development of this capability was so "escalatory in matrix" that every day there is new technology coming in, which becomes a challenge for air power, the AAD DG said.

"Integrated with proper surveillance grid of radars, it ensured that Russian started flying higher and their vulnerability increased. This has allowed Ukraine to maintain control over its airspace and support its ground forces more effectively," Lt Gen D'Cunha said.

Dialogue and diplomacy way forward: India on Russia-Ukraine

In the backdrop of the US-Russia talks held in Riyadh, India said on Friday that its position on the Ukraine-Russia conflict is "consistent" and New Delhi maintains that dialogue and diplomacy are the way forward.

Top officials from Washington and Moscow met in the Saudi capital recently to discuss ways to bring an end to the prolonged conflict that began in February 2022.

Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) spokesperson Randhir Jaiswal was asked at his weekly briefing about India's position on the conflict amid the changing global political dynamics.

"Our position on this particular issue is very clear. We have maintained consistently that we want both parties involved to resort to dialogue and diplomacy and take this process forward," Jaiswal said.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, when he was addressing a press conference in Washington recently, yet again made it clear that this is not an era of war, and that there is no solution for any conflict on the battlefield, the MEA spokesperson said.

"So, our position has been consistent that dialogue and diplomacy are the way forward," Jaiswal said, when asked if India has re-calibrated its position.

After his wide-ranging talks with US President Donald Trump in Washington, Modi had said India has not been neutral on the war and that it is on the side of peace.

Modi also welcomed Trump's efforts to end the war in Ukraine.

During the briefing, Jaiswal was also asked for the MEA's response on recent reports alleging sexual assault of a minor by a Kenyan student here.

"We have requested the Kenyan government to waive diplomatic immunity of the person concerned, so that the investigation in the matter can go forward. We are pursuing this matter with the Kenyan government," he said.

Jaiswal was also asked whether the GE F404 engine delivery issue was taken up during PM Modi's US visit.

"The delayed delivery of GE engines was taken up during Prime Minister's visit. We remain engaged with the US side on all aspects relating to contracted defence articles, including their timely delivery.

"The two sides have also agreed to conclude a new 10-year framework for the US-India major defence partnership in the 21st century. This was also reflected in the joint statement. So yes, to answer your question, this particular issue was discussed during the prime minister's visit."

Bank employee held in ₹ 4.97 crore cyber fraud case

Two people, including a business development manager of a private bank in Delhi, were arrested for cyber fraud worth Rs 4.97 crore under the pretext of investment in stock market, police said.

The accused IndusInd bank employee facilitated bank accounts for cyber criminals, officials said.

Police said a complaint was received on November 30, 2024, regarding fraud of approximately Rs 4.87 crore. A case was registered at the Cyber Crime East police station under relevant sections.

During investigation a team arrested Avinash Sharma and Aditya Chaturvedi -- from Delhi on Thursday, police said.

Government to revise draft Advocates (Amendment) Bill

Amid opposition to its various provisions from bar bodies, the government on Saturday said it will revise the draft Advocates (Amendment) Bill as it ended the public consultations on it that started earlier this month.

The Department of Legal Affairs in the Union law ministry floated the draft bill on February 13 for public consultations.

The government plans to amend the Advocates Act, 1961.

The draft bill, which faced criticism, proposed sweeping changes in the definitions of a "legal practitioner" and a "law graduate".

According to the draft Advocates (Amendment) Bill, 2025, a law graduate is a person who has obtained a bachelor's degree after completing a course of three or five years or such other duration as prescribed by any centre of legal education or university established by law or a college affiliated to any

university and recognised by the Bar Council of India.

In a statement, the law ministry said the bill was put in the public domain, demonstrating the government's commitment to transparency and broader engagement with

stakeholders and the public.

"However, considering the number of suggestions and concerns received, it has been decided to conclude the consultation process now," it said.

Based on the feedback received, the draft bill, "as

revised", will be processed afresh for consultations with stakeholders, the ministry said.

Several bar bodies had opposed certain provisions of the draft bill.

The opposition Congress had also backed the protesting lawyers, saying the bill was

not only "poorly drafted", but it also failed to address pertinent issues facing the legal fraternity.

The draft bill defines a legal practitioner as an advocate or a law graduate engaged in the practice of law before courts, tribunals or quasi-judicial forums or doing legal work in any private or public organisation, including but not limited to statutory and autonomous bodies, domestic and foreign law firms and corporate entities.

As of now, a legal practitioner means an advocate or a "vakil" of any high court, a pleader, a "mukhtar" or revenue agent.

While putting the draft bill in the public domain, the ministry had said these amendments aimed at aligning the legal profession and legal education with global best practices.

The reforms will focus on improving legal education, equipping lawyers to meet the demands of a rapidly-changing world and raising professional standards, it had said.

Working on measures to restrict distress crop sale: Agriculture minister

Union Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan on Saturday said the government is working on measures to ensure that farmers do not have to sell their produce, especially fruits and vegetables, at throwaway prices.

Speaking after inaugurating the 'Pusa Krishi Vigyan Mela' 2025 -- being held in the national capital from February 22-24 -- he emphasised the need to take new seeds varieties and farm technologies from labs to agriculture filed at the

earliest.

Chouhan said the government is holding discussions with farmers directly as well as through their organisations to understand the problems and then making schemes to address the issues.

"Jahan-Jahan takleefein dekh rahe hain, hum yojana bana rahe hain (wherever we are seeing problems, we are making schemes to address those)", the minister said, listing out steps taken by the government in the last few years to protect the interest of farmers.

Chouhan said the government has removed exports restrictions on rice and onions while raising import duties on edible oils.

He said the Centre has taken steps to help tomato farmers in view of price crash and will take measures for red chilli farmers of Andhra Pradesh as well.

"I want to assure our farming community, we will take all important decisions that are required for the welfare of farmers. Do not worry," he said, while asserting that the government is committed to this.

"There are some issues which are under consideration. Prices are low at farm gate level and consumers are paying high rates. Who takes the profit in middle? Profit margins should reduce. The difference between the farm gate price and consumer price for fruits and vegetables should come down," he said.

The minister added, "We are working out (a way) to ensure that farmers do not have to sell their produce at throwaway prices."

Lauding efforts of scientists at Indian Council of Agricultural Research

(ICAR) for its efforts in making India self-sufficient in foodgrains production, Chouhan said there is a need to take new seed varieties and technology to the field quickly so that farmers can benefit.

"Availability of good varieties of seeds is important. Farmers require it. ICAR is developing them... We need to ensure these seeds reach farmers quickly," he said.

The minister also asked the ICAR to handle 'Modern Agriculture Chaupal' programme where scientists will tell farmers about recent

technological breakthrough, besides solving their problems. The programme will be telecast across India.

Chouhan said he does not sit in Krishi Bhawan in Delhi and rather go to fields to understand farmers' problems. He asked officers in his ministry and ICAR scientists to do the same.

The minister reiterated that the government is focusing on increasing farm production through yield improvements, reducing cost of production and ensuring that farmers get the right price for their produce.

Six arrested in Manipur for extortion

Six cadres of a banned outfit were arrested from Manipur's Imphal West district, and two members of a group were apprehended for allegedly being involved in extortion in Imphal East, police said on Saturday. Six members of the proscribed Kangleipak Communist Party (Ibungo Ngangom) were apprehended from Koutruk Makha Leikai Church in Imphal West on Friday, a senior officer said. The police also arrested two members of G5 Organisation from Achanbigei Maning Leikai in Imphal East district for allegedly being involved in extortion from sand-laden

trucks in Sekmai, Iriblung, Koirengi and Patsoi areas. They were also allegedly involved in incidents of snatching keys from truck drivers in Sekmai area. They have been identified as Ningthoujam Yamba Singh (43) and Usham Netaji Singh (35), the officer added. Arms and ammunition were also surrendered in Churachandpur district on Saturday after joint efforts in public awareness by the local police, Assam Rifles and CRPF, another officer said. "This is the first step towards de-weaponising the society and creating a safe and secure atmosphere where regular activities can be boosted," Churachandpur SP Prakhar

Pandey said in a statement. The Manipur Police also said at least two firearms and ammunition were handed over to the administrations in Kakching and Kangpokpi districts. The surrender of arms and ammunition comes after Governor Ajay Kumar Bhalla appealed to the people to surrender illegal arms and ammunition. Security forces also recovered at least 12 firearms from Kakching Wairi area and handed them over to the Kakching Police Station, another officer said. During an operation in Maojang village under the Moreh Police Station limits in Tengnoup district, Security forces recovered two impro-

vised explosive devices weighing 22 kg with detonators, one 7 kg IED, one bomb of 6 kg with detonators and one bomb of 4 kg. "The IEDs, suspected to be unstable, had to be destroyed at the spot by a bomb disposal team," police said, adding that an FIR has been registered in this connection. The Manipur Police along with central forces have been conducting search operations after ethnic violence broke out in the state in May 2023. More than 250 people have been killed and thousands rendered homeless in ethnic violence between Imphal Valley-based Meiteis and adjoining hills-based Kuki-Zo groups since May two years ago.

Odisha CM assures safety, respect of Nepali students

Chief Minister Mohan Charan Majhi on Saturday asserted that Nepalese students studying in Odisha are children of the state and they will continue to pursue their education with full respect and dignity, an official release said. Majhi made the assertion during a telephonic conversation with Nepal's Foreign Minister Dr Arzu Rana Deuba, the statement issued by the chief minister's office said. He assured Deuba that the state government will ensure strict action against those involved in the alleged suicide of a 20-year-old engineering student and subsequent attack on Nepalese pupils at Kalinga Institute of Industrial Technology (KIIT). "The state government is keeping a close watch on the developments (at KIIT) and all steps will be taken to restore hope and confidence of the students. The Nepal foreign minister thanked Majhi and expressed satisfaction over the steps taken by the state government," the release said.

Majhi met Nepal Embassy officials Sanjeev Das Sharma and Naveen Raj Adhikari at his chamber at Lok Seva Bhawan and informed them that 10 people have been arrested in connection with the incident of attack on the Nepalese students. "Strict action will be taken against all those involved in the incident. All arrangements have been made by the government to restore the academic atmosphere on KIIT campus," Majhi told the embassy officials. According to the CMO, the

Nepalese officials said that the state government has taken prompt steps in this incident. Due to this, the students coming from Nepal and their guardians have felt reassured. For this, they thanked the Odisha government, especially the chief minister, on behalf of the Nepalese government, the release said. The two embassy officials have been camping in the Odisha capital for the last five days following instructions of Nepal Prime Minister K P Sharma Oli.

60 crore took holy dip at Maha Kumbh, claims UP government

The Uttar Pradesh government on Saturday said an unprecedented 60 Crore devotees at the Maha Kumbh Mela have taken a holy dip in the Triveni Sangam. The Kumbh Mela which started on January 13 will continue till February 26 on the occasion of Maha Shivratri. Over half of India's 110 Crore Sanatan followers have bathed in the holy confluence, and this number is expected to surpass 65 Crore by the final 'amrit snan' on February 26, an official statement said. This Maha Kumbh has seen the largest participation in any religious, cultural, or social event, it said. According to the World Population Review, Pew Research, India's population is approximately 143 Crore (1.43 Billion), with 110 Crore (1.10 Billion) followers of Sanatan Dharma, the statement said.

TMC alleges BJP, EC colluding to inflate voter lists

Trinamool Congress on Saturday accused a section of Election Commission (EC) officials of conspiring with the BJP to add names of outsiders to the voter list in various Assembly segments of West Bengal. TMC state general secretary Kunal Ghosh told reporters that a section of EC officials are incorporating names without proper physical verification, particularly in the border areas of the state. He said stopping infiltration is the responsibility of the Border Security Force (BSF), and any reports of unauthorised outsiders being added to the voter list should be handled by the Centre, as it controls the BSF and "remote controls" the EC, which has

apparently relaxed the verification process. Ghosh, who was referring to reports about alleged rise in the number of electors in the voter list in Champahati area under Baruipur assembly of South 24 Parganas district, said,

"If that is the situation, the credit goes to the local administration and police for tracking the unauthorised voters and not the EC, which had allowed inclusion of the names without proper physical verification."

"Instead of pointing fingers at the state and ruling party, the BJP and those raising hue and cry over the issue should take up the issue of checking infiltration with the Centre," he added. He reminded that West Bengal chief minister and TMC supreme Mamata Banerjee had recently cautioned against the attempts by BJP in collusion with EC to induct bogus names in the electoral list to change the vote ratio in favour of the saffron party, as they had repeatedly failed to secure power in assembly polls. BJP Rajya Sabha MP and spokesperson Samik Bhattacharya said, "TMC's gameplan to include ghost voters has been exposed as the ruling party leaders have been involved in providing fake Aadhaar and voter ID cards to win elections."

Puri hints at reduced fuel prices, inflation

Union Petroleum and Natural Gas Minister Hardeep S Puri has said with more oil coming up in the global market including from the USA, energy prices are likely to come down which would help tame inflation. Addressing a Press conference, exuding confidence that India has established contacts with the new US administration led by President Donald Trump, Puri said the Indo-American relationship on the energy front will deepen. According to him India imports oil from as many as 40 countries, including Argentina and since there is enough oil in the world, even oil producing nations which are implementing cutbacks will be compelled to reconsider their decisions. He also said de-dollarisation of oil purchases was never the objective, emphasising that "most transactions are in dollars and always have been". "Inside the United States, he (Trump) said, 'Drill, baby, drill,' which is a signal to drill more

and extract more oil. He has been on record stating that he wants to bring international oil prices down," said the Oil Minister. "So, I think the global energy situation will improve. More energy will enter the market, and hopefully, that will help bring prices down. When energy is available in sufficient quantities at lower prices, it also helps in managing inflation," he further said. He clarified that India's primary objective is to procure sufficient oil "at lower prices" to help control inflation. "De-dollarisation is not an objective at all. Most of these (oil) transactions are in dollars and always have been. We had one transaction in rupees, but I think it was a very small one. Transactions in rupees are a good thing, but it takes two to tango," Puri told reporters. According to the Union Minister, India is already purchasing energy worth up to \$20 Billion from the US, emphasising that Prime Minister Narendra Modi recently had a very successful round of discussions with US President Donald

Trump. Observing that there has never been a shortage of energy in the global market, the former diplomat highlighted that more oil is entering global markets than ever before, especially from the Western Hemisphere. "Brazil used to produce 3 Million barrels of crude per day. They (Brazil) have now started producing an additional 140,000 to 150,000 barrels per day. More oil is coming, much of it from Guyana, Suriname, and Canada. The United States is the world's largest producer of crude, at 13 Million barrels per day. I think they are going to produce 1.6 Million barrels more," he said. Likewise, he said Venezuelan oil will also flow into global markets as 'the situation' between the US and the Latin American country is easing. President Trump, not only during his first tenure in office but also in the run-up to his second election, has been very clear that he wants to bring more energy into the global market, said Puri. Responding to questions about the fuel costs, he said India is the only country where petrol prices have decreased in the past three

years, citing excise tax cuts by the Centre in November 2021 and May 2022. "And BJP-ruled states reduced their VAT. Now, when it comes to benefits, governments don't benefit. First of all, governments don't import oil. It is private sector players or oil marketing companies (OMCs) that import oil. And what does the government do with the revenue it collects? It provides 80 crore people with three meals of dry rations a day," he said. According to Puri, petrol prices rose across several countries between February 2022 and February 2025-by approximately 48 per cent in Pakistan, 14.7 per cent in Bangladesh, 37 per cent in Sri Lanka, 16.2 per cent in Nepal, 14.2 per cent in the USA, 4.8 per cent in Italy, 4.2 per cent in Spain, 2 per cent in Germany, 4.2 per cent in France, while in India, they declined by 0.7 per cent. Highlighting that petrol prices have decreased both relatively and absolutely, Puri added that diesel prices in India rose at the lowest rate-1.15 per cent-during that period, while they increased across various other countries.

Six trapped in Telangana roof collapse

At least six workers were feared trapped when a section of a roof collapsed in the under construction stretch of the Srisailem Left Bank Canal (SLBC) in Nagarkurnool district of Telangana on Saturday. A 19-member team from state owned coal mining firm, Singareni Collieries Company Ltd., has left for Srisailem Left Bank Canal in Nagarkurnool district on Saturday to join rescue operations to extract workers who are feared trapped when a portion of a roof collapsed in the under construction stretch of the SLBC. According to a top official of the company, SCCL has the expertise in rescuing people in such incidents and also has necessary equipment. The

rescue team from the company is headed by a general manager level officer. "SCCL has the necessary expertise to handle critical situations such as roof collapses. And also we have necessary equipment imported from Australia, USA and Poland. The machinery and rock cutters are so advanced that they can cut huge rocks and boulders within minutes," said. The construction company's team has gone inside for assessment and it is verifying, they said. Six to eight workers are feared trapped as per information given by the company engaged in the work, a senior police official said. "The roof collapsed when some workers had gone inside as part of the work at 12-13 kms inside the tunnel," the official said. Irrigation Minister N Uttam

Kumar Reddy and senior officials are overseeing relief operations. The incident happened in the ongoing construction of SLBC tunnel work on the inlet side from Srisailem, official sources said. As per information there was an influx of water when the work was being carried out, they said. Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy directed the district Collector, Superintendent of Police and other officials to reach the place of accident to carry out relief measures, it said. Expressing concern over the accident, Union Coal Minister G Kishan Reddy enquired about the reasons for the collapse and asked officials to bring out those feared trapped to safety. He also told the officials to provide treatment to the injured (if any), a release from his office said.

CAG flags mismanagement of afforestation funds in Uttarakhand

The Comptroller and Auditor General of India (CAG) has cited many loopholes in the management of compensatory afforestation funds in the forest divisions of Uttarakhand, including their diversion to inadmissible activities and delayed submission of annual plan of operations to the Centre leading to cost escalations in various cases. The CAG's latest audit report on Compensatory Afforestation Fund Management and Planning Authority (CAMPA) laid recently in Uttarakhand Assembly during its ongoing budget session said ₹ 13.86 Crore was diverted at the

divisional level to inadmissible activities like state scheme Harela, tiger safari work, renovation of existing buildings, expenses on personage visits, court cases, purchases of I-phones, laptops, fridges, coolers and stationery. The state authority did not control the diversion or inadmissible expenditure from the State Compensatory Afforestation Fund, it said. The audit report on the functioning of CAMPA covers a period of 2019-2022. According to CAMPA rules, commensurate compensatory afforestation is mandatory in case of allocation of forest land for non-forest activities like infrastructural or industrial development. It points out that in 52 cases 188.62

hectares of forest land was diverted to user agencies for non-forest purposes where in-principle approvals were granted but permission to start work was not granted by the competent authority. However, the user agencies started the road construction in the forest areas without permission, it said, adding that the forest divisions did not take any cognisance of the unauthorised use of forest land and booked these as cases of forest offence. According to CAMPA guidelines of 2009, after receipt of money, the state CAMPA shall accomplish the afforestation for which money is deposited in the Compensatory Afforestation Fund within a year or two growing seasons.

However, scrutiny of records in divisions revealed that in 37 cases, compensatory afforestation work was executed after more than eight years of getting final clearance. This resulted in a cost escalation of ₹ 11.54 Crore in raising compensatory afforestation, the report said. The implementation of compensatory afforestation activities suffered due to delayed submission of the annual plan of operations to the government of India for approval and defective planning, the audit report said. There were instances of dysfunctional bottom-up planning and adoption of ad hoc or arbitrary approaches for the inclusion of irregular items in the Annual Plan of Operation

(APO). The release of funds was unrealistic and not commensurate with the approved APO. The state authority failed to ensure equitable and need-based funding of activities in all the implementing agencies. There was inefficiency in funds release, not adopting of accounting procedure as per Compensatory Afforestation Fund rules, and not discharging of interest liability, the CAG report said. The CAG has recommended that the state authority must exercise internal control and institute proper budgetary control checks for robust financial management so that misutilisation or diversion of CAMPA funds can be prevented.

HP BJP MLA alleges step-motherly treatment from state

Sitting BJP MLA from Jhanduta assembly in Himachal Pradesh J R Katwal on Saturday alleged that the ongoing works in the constituencies of opposition legislators in the Bilaspur district were being stalled and obstructed, leading to resentment among the people. There are 40 Congress and 28 BJP MLAs in the 68-member Himachal Pradesh Assembly. Addressing various meetings in his Jhanduta constituency on Friday evening and Saturday, he alleged that the Congress government in the state is giving step-motherly treatment to the constituencies of the BJP MLAs. "Forget about making provi-

sions in the budget for new development works in their areas, even the ongoing works are being obstructed," Katwal, a former IAS officer who has served the state in various capacities, said. He said roads play an important role in the development of any area. In a hilly state like Himachal, the importance of roads increases even more, he added. Katwal said Prime Minister Narendra Modi on the other hand has pledged to make India a developed nation. This pledge can be fulfilled only when all the villages are connected by roads. In view of this, the PM has turned the focus of the budget and the direction of development towards villages, he said.

With this, along with strengthening the network of roads in rural areas, people are also getting all the necessary basic facilities, he added. Kaltwal said in the BJP, any worker can reach any post with ability and hard work, and Rekha Gupta, the newly appointed chief minister of Delhi, is a recent example. On the contrary, he said, nepotism is dominant in many other opposition parties, including the Congress. This is why the people of the country are rejecting them and joining the BJP, the MLA said. He assured the people of the Jhanduta assembly constituency that besides solving all their problems, no stone will be left unturned in providing all the necessary facilities in the area.

Fresh talks between farmers Centre held

A fresh round of talks between protesting farmers and the Centre will be held here on Saturday evening centred around the legal guarantee of minimum support price on crops, among other demands. The meeting between the central team and farmer leaders will take place at the Mahatma Gandhi Institute of Public Administration in Chandigarh at 6 pm. In the last meeting held on February 14, Union minister Pralhad Joshi had said that Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan would lead the central team for the February 22 meeting with the protesting farmers. Farmer leader Sarwan Singh Pandher on Saturday said a delegation of the Samyukta Kisan Morcha (Non-Political) and Kisan Mazdoor Morcha will take part in the meeting with a

positive mind. Farmers expect from the government to resolve their issues at the earliest, he said. Farmers had earlier asked for the next meeting to be held in Delhi but the government scheduled it in Chandigarh. "Today the sixth round of talks with the Centre will take place. We have informa-

tion that the Union Agriculture Minister and other ministers will be part of the meeting. The KMM and SKM (Non-Political) delegation will take part in the meeting," said Pandher. Farmers leaders said that the 28-member delegation of the farmers would put forth their side

strongly in the meeting. They said that the protests for various demands, including a legal guarantee on MSP, has been going on for the past one year. In a February 19 letter to Jagjit Singh Dallewal and Sarwan Singh Pandher, Agriculture Ministry Joint Secretary Purna Chandra Kishan said, "This is in continuation of the previous meeting with the leaders of SKM (Non-Political) and Kisan Mazdoor Morcha (KMM) which was held on February 14 in Chandigarh." "In this sequence, a meeting with the ministers of the Government of India and the Government of Punjab regarding the demands of farmers' unions has been organised on February 22 at Mahatma Gandhi Institute of Public Administration in Chandigarh. You are cordially invited to the meeting..." the letter in Hindi stated. Both sides said the February 14 meeting went cordially. Dallewal, who is on an indefinite fast over

the farmers' demands, also took part in last week's meeting. The discussion came after a year-long protest by farmers, centred mainly around the demand for a legal guarantee of MSP on farm produce. After the meeting, Joshi had said the next meeting will be held with Union Agriculture Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan leading the central team. Joshi had said he would also be part of that meeting. Prior to the February 14 meeting, four rounds of meetings took place between central ministers and the protesting farmers in February 2024 but the talks remained inconclusive. Farmers, under the banner of the SKM (Non-Political) and the KMM, have been camping at the Shambhu and the Khanuri border points between Punjab and Haryana since February 13 last year after security forces did not allow them to march to Delhi to press for their various demands.

Hamas frees 6 more hostages

Hamas freed all six hostages in the latest exchange on Saturday, even as heightened tension between the adversaries clouded the future of the fragile ceasefire deal.

The six included three Israeli men seized from the Nova music festival and another abducted while visiting his family in southern Israel when militants stormed across the border in the October 7, 2023, attacks that triggered Israel's nearly 16-month campaign in the Gaza Strip.

Two of the hostages had been held by Hamas for around a decade since they each entered Gaza on their own.

Five of the captives were handed over in staged ceremonies that the Red Cross and Israel have condemned in the past — brought out by masked, armed Hamas fighters in front of hundreds of Palestinians before being transferred to Red Cross vehicles.

In the central town of Nuseirat, Omer Wenkert, Omer Shem Tov, and Eliya Cohen were posed alongside Hamas fighters on the stage. A beaming Shem Tov even kissed two

militants next to him on the head and blew kisses to the crowd. Hamas has come under heavy criticism for such public displays, with Israel, the UN and the Red Cross saying they are cruel and do not respect the dignity of the hostages.

Watching the release, Cohens

family and friends in Israel chanted "Eliya! Eliya! Eliya!" and cheered when they saw him for the first time. Shem Tov's grandmother ululated in joy, shrieking, "Omer, my joy! My life!" as she saw him.

The Israeli military says the final hostage was released by

Hamas later Saturday. He was not immediately identified but is expected to be Hisham Al-Sayed, 36, a Bedouin Israeli, who crossed on his own into Gaza in 2015 and had been held since. His family has told Israeli media Al-Sayed was previously diagnosed with

schizophrenia.

The latest releases, to be followed by the freeing of hundreds of Palestinians imprisoned by Israel, went ahead after tensions mounted over a grisly and heart-wrenching dispute triggered this week when Hamas initially handed over the wrong body for Shiri Bibas, an Israeli mother of two young boys abducted by the militants. The remains that Hamas transferred with her sons' bodies on Thursday were later determined to be those of an unidentified Palestinian woman. In response, Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu vowed revenge for "a cruel and malicious violation," while Hamas suggested it had been a mistake.

On Friday night, the small militant group believed to have been holding Bibas and her sons — the Palestinian Mujahedeen Brigades — handed over a second body. Bibas' family said Israeli forensic authorities had confirmed the remains were hers.

"For 16 months we sought certainty, and now that it's here, it brings no comfort, though we hope it marks the beginning of closure," the family said.

Difficult negotiations likely over ceasefire's next phase

The ceasefire deal has paused the war but is nearing the end of its first phase. Negotiations over a second phase, in which Hamas would release dozens more hostages in exchange for a lasting ceasefire and an Israeli withdrawal, are likely to be even more difficult.

The six hostages being freed Saturday are the last living ones to be released under the first phase. Cohen, Shem Tov and Wenkert, all in their 20s, were abducted by Hamas fighters at the Nova music festival. During their release, they were brought out wearing fake army uniforms, though they were not soldiers when they were kidnapped.

Earlier Saturday, two other hostages — Tal Shoham, 40, and Avera Mengistu, 38 — were freed in the southern Gaza city of Rafah. Arriving back in Israel, both were taken to medical centres for examination.

"This is an unforgettable moment, where all emotions are rapidly mixing together. Our Tal is with us," Shoham's family said in a statement, calling for a deal to free all those still captive. "There is a window of opportunity; we must not miss it."

Shoham, who also holds Austrian citizenship, was visiting his family in Kibbutz Beeri when Hamas militants stormed into the community during the October 7, 2023 attacks. Shoham's wife, two young children, and three other relatives who were abducted with him were freed in a November 2023 exchange.

Mengistu, an Ethiopian-Israeli, had been held in Gaza since entering on his own in 2014.

Watching the handover on Israeli media, Mengistu's family and friends broke out into a Hebrew song, "Here is the Light," as they saw him for the first time in more than a decade. "Do you remember me?" one of his brothers asks as they embraced at the hospital.

Hundreds of Palestinian prisoners set for release: Later Saturday, Israel is to release 620 imprisoned Palestinians.

They include 151 who were serving life or other sentences, around 100 of whom will be deported to other countries, according to the Palestinian prisoners media office.

They also include 445 men as well as 18 children between the ages of 15 and 17, five aged between 18-19, and a woman, all of whom were seized by Israeli troops in Gaza during the current war, according to the media office.

Hamas has said it will also release four more bodies next week, completing the first phase of the ceasefire. If that plan is carried out, Hamas would retain about 60 hostages, about half of whom are believed to be alive.

Hamas has said it won't release the remaining captives without a lasting ceasefire and a full Israeli withdrawal. Netanyahu, with the full backing of the Trump administration, says he's committed to destroying Hamas' military and governing capacities and returning all the hostages, goals widely seen as mutually exclusive.

Israel's military offensive killed more than 48,000 Palestinians, mostly women and children, according to Gaza's Health Ministry, which doesn't distinguish between civilians and combatants. Israel says it has killed more than 17,000 fighters, without providing evidence.

Preparations underway for Trump-Putin summit

Preparations are underway for a face-to-face meeting between US President Donald Trump and Russia's Vladimir Putin, Russia's deputy foreign minister said Saturday, marking a dramatic shift away from Western isolation of Moscow over its war in Ukraine.

Speaking to Russian state media, Sergei Ryabkov said a possible

Putin-Trump summit could involve broad talks on global issues, not just the war in Ukraine.

"The question is about starting to move towards normalising relations between our countries, finding ways to resolve the most acute and potentially very, very dangerous situations, of which there are many, Ukraine among them," he said.

But he said efforts to organise such a meeting are at an early stage, and that making it happen will require "the most intensive preparatory work."

Ryabkov added that US and Russian envoys could meet

"within the next two weeks," to pave the way for further talks between senior officials.

Russian and US representatives on Tuesday agreed to start working toward ending the war in Ukraine and improving their diplomatic and economic ties, according to the two countries' top diplomats, at a high-level meeting in Saudi Arabia that marked an extraordinary about-face in US foreign policy under President Trump.

After the meeting, US Secretary of State Marco Rubio told the AP that the two sides agreed broadly to pursue three goals: to restore staffing at their respective embassies in Washington and Moscow; to create a high-level team to support Ukraine peace talks; and to explore closer relations and economic cooperation.

He stressed, however, that the talks — which were attended by his Russian counterpart, Sergey Lavrov, and other senior Russian and US officials — marked the beginning of a conversation, and more work needs to be done.

Mallya pursues annulment of UK bankruptcy order

Embattled businessman Vijay Mallya believes Indian banks pursuing bankruptcy proceedings against him in the English courts have assumed an "unreal quality" in the wake of Union Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman's recent statement in Parliament and has instructed his lawyers to pursue an annulment application.

It emerged as Justice Anthony Mann reserved judgment, to be handed down at a later date after hearings of three interlinked appeals related to Mallya's bankruptcy order concluded at the High Court in London this week.

The judge heard a set of complicated arguments involving a

consortium of banks led by the State Bank of India (SBI) seeking repayment of an estimated judgment debt of around GBP 1.05 billion owed by the 69-year-old businessman's now-defunct Kingfisher Airlines.

"From Dr Mallya's perspective, these English bankruptcy proceedings have an unreal quality," Leigh Crestohl, Managing Partner of Zaiwalla and Co—Mallya's recently appointed lawyers, told PTI.

"Evidence has now come to light that shows that the banks' debt has not only been paid but, moreover, the banks have recovered in excess of what was due from Dr Mallya. This was confirmed by the Honourable Finance Minister of India, Shrimati Nirmala Sitharaman, in a statement she made in the



Indian Parliament on 17 December 2024, in which she confirmed that a sum of INR 14,131.6 crore has been collected and restored to the banks," he said.

Crestohl stressed that "it must be presumed" that the public sec-

tor banks will accept the accuracy of the minister's statement made in Parliament.

"This is why immediately after instructing Zaiwalla and Co. in place of his previous lawyer Reynolds Porter Chamberlain last week, Mallya has now applied to annul the Bankruptcy Order on that basis. He intends to pursue that application regardless of what the court may decide on the appeals that were heard this week," added Crestohl.

Separately wanted in India on fraud and money laundering charges, Mallya took to social media a day after Sitharaman's Lok Sabha statement to claim he was "entitled to relief" in the matter.

In a post on X dated December 18 last year, he said: "Unless the

ED (Enforcement Directorate) and banks can legally justify how they have taken more than two times the debt, I am entitled to the relief which I will pursue." Meanwhile this week, Justice Mann heard appeals related to a decision of Chief Insolvency and Companies Court (ICC) Judge Michael Briggs made in the context of bankruptcy proceedings initiated by the banks against Mallya around six years ago.

The first appeal, referred to as the security appeal, challenges Judge Briggs' conclusion that the banks — represented by TLT LLP and barrister Tony Beswetherick — were "estopped because of an Indian court judgment" from denying that they hold security over certain of Mallya's assets.

Chinese virologists warn of new Covid-19 type virus

A Chinese team of virologists have found a new bat coronavirus that carries the risk of animal-to-human transmission because it uses the same human receptor as the virus that causes Covid-19, a media report said.

The study was led by Shi Zhengli, Chinese virologist from the controversial Wuhan Institute of Virology (WIV), where the COVID-19 virus was alleged to have emanated from. Shi, who is known as the Bat Woman for her research on viruses from the Bats, as well as the Chinese government deny that the virus was leaked from the Wuhan lab.

The latest discovery is a new lineage of the HKU5 coronavirus first identified in the Japanese pipistrelle bat in Hong Kong.

The new virus comes from the merbecovirus subgenus, which also includes the virus that causes Middle East respiratory syndrome (MERS), the Hong Kong based South China Morning Post reported.

The virus is able to bind to the human angiotensin-converting enzyme (ACE2), the same receptor used by the Sars-CoV-2 virus, which causes Covid-19, to infect cells.

"We report the discovery and isolation of a distinct lineage (lineage 2) of HKU5-CoV, which can utilise not only bat ACE2 but also human ACE2 and various mammalian ACE2 orthologs [— genes found in different species with a common origin]," the team of virologists headed by Shi wrote in a paper published in the peer-reviewed journal Cell on Tuesday, according to the Post report.

The researchers found that when the virus was isolated from bat samples it could infect human cells as well as artificially grown masses of cell or tissue that resembled miniaturised respiratory or intestinal organs.

Earlier this month, China said its bio-lab in Wuhan which faced allegations linking the COVID-19 causing the global pandemic has never engaged in "gain-of-function studies" on coronavirus amid allegations that USAID has funded the study of the infectious disease.

Trump fires chairman of Joint Chiefs of Staff

President Donald Trump abruptly fired Air Force Gen CQ Brown Jr as chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff on Friday, sidelining a history-making fighter pilot and respected officer as part of a campaign led by his defence secretary to rid the military of leaders who support diversity and equity in the ranks.

The ouster of Brown, only the second Black general to serve as chairman, is sure to send shock waves through the Pentagon. His 16 months in the job had been consumed with the war in Ukraine and the expanded conflict in the Middle East.

"I want to thank General Charles CQ" Brown for his over 40 years of service to our country, including as our current Chairman of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. He is a fine gentleman and an outstanding leader, and I wish a great future for him and his family," Trump posted on social media.

Brown's public support of Black Lives Matter after the police killing of George Floyd had made him fodder for the administration's wars against "wokeism" in the military.

India aim for semifinal, Pakistan eye survival in Champions Trophy

Hyped as a marquee showdown but mostly lopsided on the field, India and Pakistan lock horns in the ICC Champions Trophy here on Sunday with Rohit Sharma's men aiming to seal a semifinal spot and Mohammad Rizwan's team desperate to avoid early elimination from the tournament.

While India are on a high after claiming a measured six-wicket win over a spirited Bangladesh, Pakistan are evidently tense after the 60-run loss in the tournament-opener against New Zealand. The sub-continental rivals' last Champion Trophy clash was the 2017 final in which Pakistan walked away with the win and the trophy. Rizwan and Co would look to draw inspiration from that triumph in London but would also need to scale up their performance in every department.

Though the buzz surrounding the match is nowhere close to being what it used to be at the peak of diplomatic tensions

between the two countries, there is an air of quiet anticipation for the Group A clash at the Dubai International Cricket Stadium. India will have a distinct advantage in every aspect. The side has settled in nicely while Pakistan have flown in a couple of days ago after the drubbing handed by the Black Caps in Karachi. More often than not, an India-Pakistan clash is as much a battle of nerves as cricketing abilities and India would be in a much better space on both counts come Sunday afternoon.

For starters, skipper Rohit, whose form was a major concern in the run-up to the tournament, seems to be getting back to his best if the lucid stroke-making against Bangladesh was anything to go by.

His 41-run cameo was a crucial contribution in the tricky chase of 229 which was masterfully anchored by Shubman Gill with his eighth ODI hundred.

In contrast, Pakistan would be fretting over the form and approach of their biggest star Babar Azam. The 90-ball 64 against New Zealand in a chase

of 320 has been roundly criticised for being too slow.

Azam's inability to accelerate even when the asking rate kept climbing has come under scrutiny and he would be under

tremendous pressure against India. Adding to their woes is the injury-forced ouster of game-changing opener Fakhar Zaman from the squad. Imam ul Haq has replaced him in the side and has

joined the squad here. However, middle-order batter Khushdil Shah's counter-attacking 69 in the tournament-opener is a positive. Shah has amusingly stated that he has no

idea how he made the squad given his lean run in the recent past but Pakistan would be happy that the punt has paid off. Pakistan would also be hoping to prove a point by getting the better

of India, who refused to travel across the border for the tournament which is otherwise wholly scheduled in Karachi, Lahore and Rawalpindi.

The man who is feeling the heat in the Indian team right now is Virat Kohli after yet again failing to convert a fairly decent start. His focus hasn't looked the same for a while but Kohli does have the knack of coming up with special efforts against Pakistan.

However, in the larger scheme of things, it could well boil down to key defining moments from the bowlers and here too Pakistan have lots to ponder after the hammering that the Shaheen Afridi-led attack took from the Kiwis. On the other hand, India have a fit-again and in-form Mohammed Shami, who is being brilliantly backed up by Harshit Rana. Shami's fifer against Bangladesh ensured that India did not miss injured talisman Jasprit Bumrah just yet.

All-rounder Hardik Pandya has always turned up with his best against Pakistan in major ICC tournaments. He will be hoping to make up for the 2017

Champions Trophy final disappointment where he fought as a lone warrior for India but failed to take his team over the line. India is likely to continue with their winning combination and remain unchanged.

The spin trio of Kuldeep Yadav, Ravindra Jadeja, and Axar Patel will be included once again on the tweaker-friendly surface to exploit the conditions.

Kohli focuses on spin play before Pakistan clash

Indian superstar Virat Kohli meant business a day before the marquee clash against Pakistan in the Champions Trophy as he arrived at the International Cricket Council

(ICC) Academy two hours before scheduled practice time to iron out his issues against spin. Kohli, who was troubled by the ball outside off-stump from the pacers on the Test tour of Australia, has been found vulnerable against spin in the

recent ODIs he has played. The 36-year-old fell to leg-spinner Rishad Hossain in India's opening Champions Trophy game against Bangladesh on Thursday, his sixth dismissal in a row against spinners in ODIs.

He was caught at backward point while trying to cut Hossain. In the preceding series against England at home, leg spinner Adil Rashid had got the better of Kohli.

The former India captain will have to deal with the likes of Abrar Ahmed when India takes on Pakistan at the Dubai International Stadium on Sunday. Irrespective of his form, Kohli's commitment to the game remains unquestionable, and his exemplary work ethic was on full display as he arrived for training well before his teammates, who also showed up an hour earlier than the scheduled time, and was the last to leave.

It was not a surprise that the majority of the net bowlers he faced were spinners, including a couple of leg-break bowlers, as

many off-spinners and a left-arm spinner. Pakistan have a part time left-arm spinner in Khushdil Shah, while Salman Agha bowls off-spin.

With due respect to the opposition, Indian batters would be fancying themselves against the Pakistan spin attack.

The main challenge for them will come from the pace trio of Shaheen Afridi, Haris Rauf and Naseem Shah who all are under pressure after an underwhelming opening game against New Zealand. While India are sitting comfortably after the win over Bangladesh, Pakistan find themselves in a must-win situation.

The wicket is expected to be on the slower side, bringing a battery of Indian spinners into the game.

India have five spinners in the squad, including two specialists in Kuldeep Yadav and Varun Chakravarthy, while the all-rounders who bowl spin are Ravindra Jadeja, Axar Patel and Washington Sundar.

Babar prioritised personal preferences over bench strength: Umar Akmal

Discarded Test batsman Umar Akmal has placed the blame for the current state of the Pakistan cricket team squarely on Babar Azam's shoulders, saying the former captain failed to build bench strength during his nearly five-year tenure at the helm.

Defending champions Pakistan, hosting a major global tournament for the first time in nearly three decades, made a disappointing start to their Champions Trophy campaign, losing to New Zealand in the opening match and jeopardizing their chances of qualifying for the semifinals.

The 34-year-old Umar, who has been out of the national side since 2019, did not hold back in criticising Babar's leadership, accusing him of lacking vision. "Babar was captain for nearly five years most of the time in all formats and he never tried to build up the bench strength due to his likes and dislikes," Umar told a TV channel.

Babar served as Pakistan's captain from late 2019 until late 2023 before stepping down following the 2023 World Cup. He was reinstated as captain in 2024 for white-ball formats but relinquished the role after a disappointing World T20 Cup campaign last year.

Umar said that during a period when he was in good form and scoring runs in domestic cricket, he had approached Babar, asking for a chance to make a comeback.

"I told Babar that look give me a fair chance. You are doing well in the top order and I can be your finisher and we can win matches regularly and it will be good for Pakistan cricket," he said.

However, Umar said his request was ignored. "He didn't listen to me and for five years when he was captain he never bothered to try to build a strong bench because only teams with good back up players do consistently well in all formats," he added.

Umar, who is Babar's cousin,

represented Pakistan in 16 Tests, 121 ODIs, and 84 T20Is before being dropped from the national team in 2019.

He stated that the Pakistan team has stagnated because talented players, who have performed consistently in domestic cricket, have not been given a fair

chance under Babar's leadership. Babar has been facing a lot of heat since Pakistan's loss in the final of the three-nation event on February 14 and his poor performance in the opening match of the Champions Trophy has only intensified the pressure.

Aldrich Potgieter powers to four-shot lead in Mexico Open

Aldrich Potgieter showed his ability to shoot low in the Mexico Open, powering and putting his way to a 10-under 61 that gave the big-hitting South African a four-shot lead going into the weekend at Vidanta Vallarta.

Potgieter chipped in for par after a tee shot into the water on the 10th hole. He failed to birdie two of the shorter par fives on the back nine. He still had an outside chance at another sub-60 round, having shot 59 on the Korn Ferry Tour a year ago.

Those hopes ended with a tee shot into the bunker on the par-5 18th hole, and an approach that came up short into a bunker. The ball stayed near the lip, making it difficult for him to get the 20-yard bunker shot close. He two-putted from 25 feet for par.

"But it was OK," he said of the par. "I knew I made a lot of extra birdies throughout the day where that wasn't going to hurt me."

Potgieter tied the course record and was at 16-under 126, four shots ahead of Stephan Jaeger (64) and Brian Campbell, who birdied his last hole for a second straight 65.

It was superb display for Potgieter,

who won the 2022 British Amateur at age 17 and last year became the youngest player (19) to win on the Korn Ferry Tour. "I love the golf course. It definitely suits my game, I think, in a lot of aspects," Potgieter said. "If I can keep putting well, I think it should be pretty good."

His power and ball-striking stand out. His putter is what led to the 61, with Potgieter holing seven putts from the 10-foot range or

longer. That doesn't include the 10th, where his tee shot found the green and chipped in from 20 feet for par. He reached the 661-yard 12th hole in two by hitting driver off the fairway to just over 20 feet. "I've been practicing, doing a drill on the driving range with teeing it really low and hitting it really good with the driver that way," Potgieter said. "I was telling my caddie, Let's just do the same

thing.' It was a perfect number, so yeah, hit the perfect shot." Seven of his drives went 325 yards or longer.

Jaeger had another bogey on one of the five par 5s, this time by hitting wedge over the green at number 12, and still managed a 64 to stay in the mix. He had six birdies on his last 10 holes.

"It's one of those golf courses I feel like if you hit it nicely and you give yourself a lot of chances, the greens are so good it's nice to make some putts," he said.

Aaron Rai of England, the highest-ranked player in the field at No. 29, had a 64 and was five shots behind. Antoine Rozner came to his final hole needing birdie to move the cut line and knock out 12 players. Rozner had to make a 10-foot par to avoid missing the cut himself.

Two Masters-bound amateurs were among the 77 players who made the cut at three-under 138. Latin America Amateur champion Justin Hastings of the Cayman Islands birdied three of his last four holes for a 67 and was at 136. US Amateur champion Jose Luis Ballester shot another 69 and was at 138.

Also making the cut was Blades Brown, the 17-year-old who turned pro this year.

I only eat one meal a day: Shami

Giving an insight into how he keeps match-fit even at the age of 34, Indian bowling stalwart Mohammed Shami says he prefers to eat only one meal a day and avoids sweets.

Shami has been the standout bowler for India in the ongoing Champions Trophy with the pace spearhead grabbing five wickets against Bangladesh in the marquee event in Dubai, thus becoming the fastest Indian bowler to take 200 ODI

wickets. "After 2015, I only have one meal a day. I only have dinner; no breakfast, no lunch. It is very difficult to do such a thing but once you get used to it then it becomes very easy," said Shami during an interaction with cricketer-turned-commentator Navjot Singh Sidhu on Star Sports.

He had been sidelined from international cricket for 14 months due to an ankle injury sustained during the 2023 ODI World Cup final against

Australia, which interrupted a remarkable run where he topped the tournament's wicket-taker's chart with 24 scalps.

The injury required surgery, and his recovery was further delayed by swelling on his left knee, keeping him out of international action for more than a year.

Shami said he gained quite a bit of weight during the recovery phase and had to shed nearly nine kgs to get back into shape. "I have lost nine kgs (during rehabilitation). The most difficult thing is you have to challenge yourself. When you are in this condition. When I was at the NCA, it was a very difficult phase," he said.

"My weight was touching 90kgs. The best thing about me is that I do not crave for delicacies. I stay away from sweets. I stay away from a lot of things, things that generally one shouldn't eat. So, I stay away from them," said Shami, who will have to shoulder a lot of responsibility in India's clash against arch-rivals Pakistan in the Champions Trophy here on Sunday.

PCB asks ICC on Pakistan's omission from broadcast

The Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) has expressed its displeasure to the sport's governing body International Cricket Council (ICC) over the absence of country's name from the tournament logo shown during the live broadcast of India versus Bangladesh clash in the Champions Trophy. The match was played in Dubai on Thursday.

According to PCB sources, the ICC has admitted the error and assured that it will use the three-line logo with Pakistan name in all matches in Dubai - the same broadcast graphic which has been shown in matches in the host country. India are playing all their games in Dubai as part of the hybrid model agreed by the concerned stakeholders. "Yes, it's confirmed that PCB has written to ICC, and the ICC has assured the PCB that they will use the three-line horizontal logo with Pakistan name in all Dubai matches - the same broadcast logo graphic which was used in Karachi matches on February 19 and 21," a PCB source said.

Manu Bhaker to lead 35-member team for SA World Cups

Ace pistol shooter Manu Bhaker will lead a 35-member Indian team in the season-opening International Shooting Sport Federation (ISSF) World Cups in April in South America with almost all the shooters who featured in the Paris Olympics making the cut.

A notable member of the team is air pistol ace Saurabh Chaudhary, who returns to the national side after more than three years. Saurabh, who battled a shoulder injury and poor form following the Tokyo Olympics in 2021, recently shot a national record score in 10m air pistol qualification besides impressing in the trials.

He had paired with Manu in the 10m air pistol mixed team event in Tokyo.

The international shooting season will begin with a double-leg South American sojourn,

with the first World Cup (rifle or pistol or shotgun) scheduled in Buenos Aires, Argentina from April 1-11, which will be followed by a second combined World Cup in Lima, Peru from April 13-22. Manu, who was recently awarded the Dhyana Chand Khel Ratna award for her two bronze medals at the Paris Olympics in 10m women's air pistol and 10m air pistol mixed team event with Sarabjot Singh, will compete in the South American competitions in two individual events - women's air pistol and 25m pistol. She will be accompanied by other Paris Olympians like Anish Bhanwala and Vijayveer Sidhu (men's 25m rapid-fire pistol), Esha Singh (women's 25m pistol), Aishwary Pratap Singh Tomar (men's 50m rifle three positions), Sift Kaur Samra and Shriyanka Sadangi (women's 50m rifle 3 positions), Arjun Babuta (men's 10m air rifle), Prithviraj Tondaiman

(men's trap), Anant Jeet Singh Naruka (men's skeet) and Raiza Dhillion (women's skeet). Ahead of the team's departure, the National Rifle Association of India (NRAI) will organise a training camp at the Karni Singh Range here from March 14.

The biggest draw on the ISSF calendar this year will be the World Championships scheduled in October (shotgun) and November (rifle or pistol). "There will be a total of three World Cup stages for each discipline while two junior World Cups, the second among them in New Delhi in September, are also scheduled. Also on the international roster this year is the 16th Asian Championships in Kazakhstan in August," said NRAI in a statement.

NRAI secretary-general Sultan Singh said it was time for the Indian shooters to raise the bar further following their success at the Paris Olympics, where the 21-

member contingent bagged three bronze medals. "A new responsibility rests on the entire shooting fraternity to raise the bar even higher. We are confident that those selected for the international season openers will come out with flying colours," said Singh.

NRAI recently announced a long list of coaches and experts to guide the Indian shooters on their journey to the 2028 LA Games with Manu's coach Jaspal Rana heading the chart.

Rana was brought back into the Indian shooting's mainstream with the NRAI making him the high-performance coach for 25m pistol, while picking the decorated Jitu Rai for the 10m air pistol coaching job.

Also appointed as head coach (rifle) was the latest Dronacharya award recipient Deepali Deshpande, who guided rifle shooter Swapnil Kusale to bronze in Paris.

Ahlawat makes cut with birdie-birdie finish in Kenya

This time Ahlawat produced two great birdies on the closing holes to move from three-over to one-over and give himself a chance to make the cut.

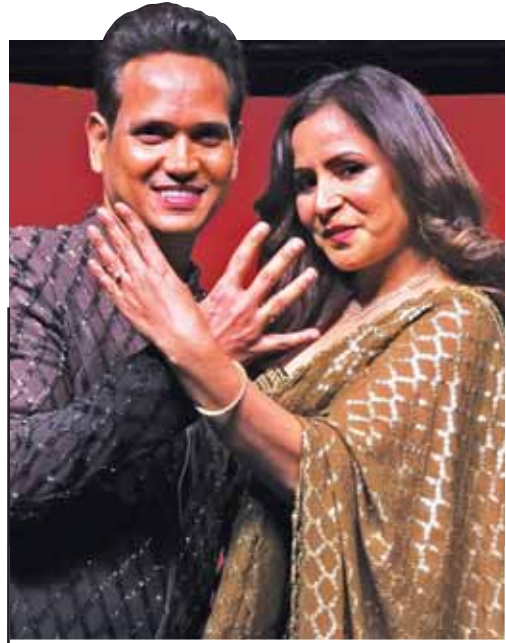
Meanwhile, fellow Indian Shubhankar Sharma, endured another tough week as he carded 71-72 and missed the cut by one.

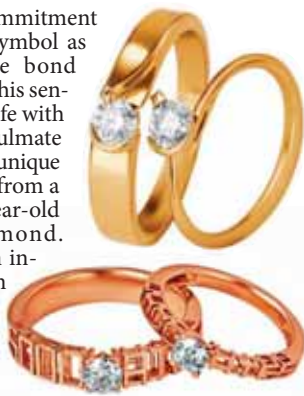

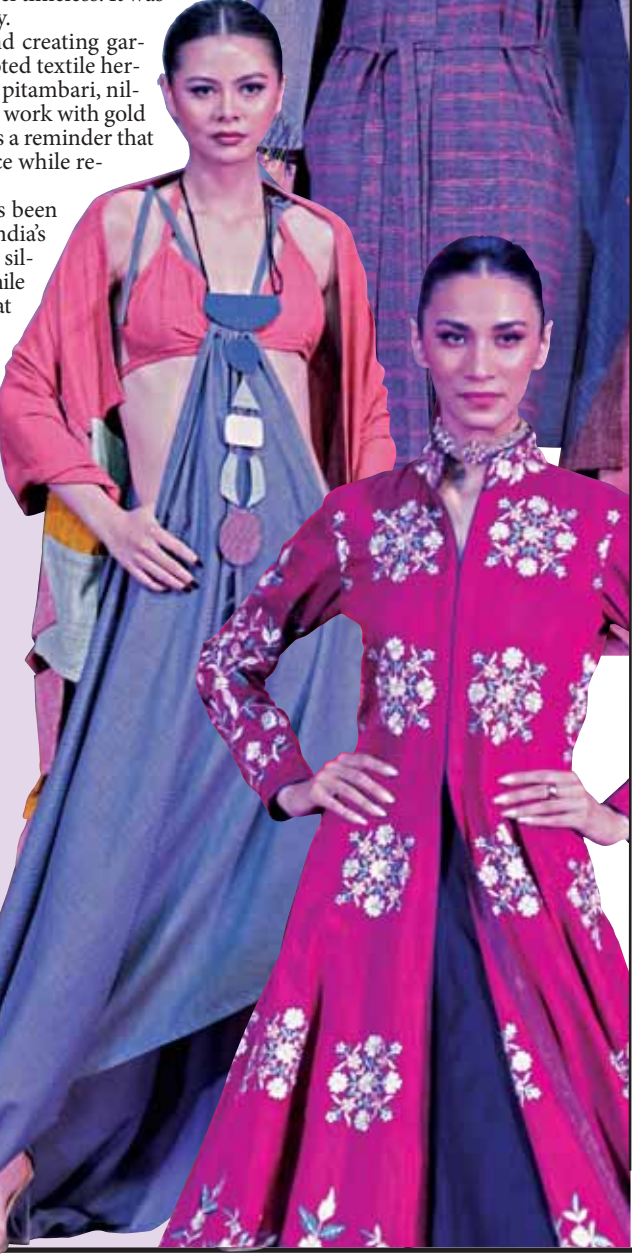

The 38th Surajkund International Crafts Mela, taking place in Faridabad, Haryana, at Surajkund Mela Grounds, is a grand celebration of art, culture and heritage, featuring over 1,000 stalls, vibrant performances and a special Rajasthan-themed showcase. Every corner of the mela offers a glimpse into the past. It is a place where cultures converge, creativity flourishes and every turn unveils a new treasure waiting to be explored.

HANDCRAFTED TREASURES
Walking through the fair feels like stepping into a marketplace where every item has a story. The Department of Archaeology and Museum, Haryana, showcases artefacts from different periods of history. Odisha's stall is lined with handloom textiles, intricate Sambalpuri sarees and delicate silver jewellery. Banaras displays its famous silk sarees, their golden threads catching the light. Madhya Pradesh presents handcrafted lamps and umbrellas embroidered with elephant designs. Each stall holds something unique, drawing visitors eager to take home a piece of heritage.

"I have been coming here for years," says an artist from Madhya Pradesh. "People appreciate handmade crafts here and that gives us hope that our work will live on."

People walk around holding boards with messages spread across the mela. Among the many stalls, Bhutan's artisans display handcrafted meditation items. "These are used for meditation," says a vendor as a visitor calls their partner over to take a look. A wooden birdhouse sits at another stall, a symbol of the sustainable crafts that continue to be passed down through generations.

The crockery section at Surajkund Mela is a visual delight, showcasing exquisite vintage and aesthetic tea sets from Iran and different parts of the world. Delicate porcelain, hand-painted kettles, and intricately designed cups transport visitors to another era. The Iranian sets, adorned with fine patterns and gold accents, stand out for their elegance. Each stall feels like a time capsule, drawing people in as they admire the charm of old-world tea traditions.



DANCE AND MUSIC
The sound of dhols leads the crowd towards the Odisha dance performance. Dancers dressed in traditional attire move with grace, their anklets jingling in sync. A group of visitors stands around them, making videos, clicking photos and cheering. Children try to copy the steps, laughing as they stumble. College students and professionals move through the fair, capturing performances and interactions for their projects. "We're covering the mela for our college assignment," says a media student. "There's so much to learn from this experience."



A CULTURAL MELTING POT
Surajkund is a place where cultures meet, where an artist from Tunisia can sit next to a designer from Bangladesh and exchange ideas. It is where a student can witness centuries-old crafting techniques and imagine a future in design. It is where a photographer captures the joy of a child dancing to a tune she has never heard before. "This place has everything," says a vlogger recording the event. "If you love art, culture, photography or just good food, there's no place better than this."

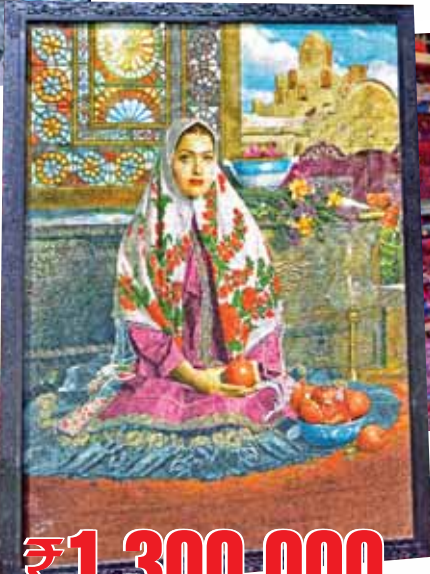
From authentic crafts and mesmerising folk performances to global flavours, every moment is a celebration of colours, creativity, and culture. Experience Lucknow's legendary flavours with live cooking, rich kebabs, aromatic biryanis and decadent desserts, says SAKSHI PRIYA

The Royal Taste of Awadh

Lucknow is a city where history and flavour walk hand in hand. Known for its tehzeeb, rich culinary traditions, and slow-cooked delicacies, every bite tells a story of Nawabs and royal kitchens. The aroma of saffron and kebabs fills its streets, the sound of clinking glasses and quiet conversations adding to its charm.

Now, this experience finds a new home in Noida at *Chica Loca* by Sunny Leone. A space where every detail reflects a love for food and culture. The atmosphere feels personal, as though the restaurant itself is telling you a secret. Here, *Zaika-e-Lucknow* is an experience that unfolds before your eyes.

A Feast for the Senses

There's something mesmerising about watching food being prepared right in front of you. The sizzle, the aroma, the way each ingredient is carefully added. At *Chica Loca* by *Zaika-e-Lucknow* is an experience.

Every dish carries the heart of Lucknow's legendary cuisine, steeped in history and rich in flavour. The chefs perform, turning centuries-old recipes into moments worth savouring.



The Chaat Experience

At the chaat counter, the experience begins with a flourish. A delicate kataifi basket is placed before you, crisp and golden.

A freshly fried aloo tikki is placed inside, followed by a drizzle of thick tamarind and jaggery sauce, its deep sweetness balanced by the tang of yoghurt. A spoonful of *Arala Galka chutney*, deep green, fragrant, bursting with spice, is added, the final flourish to a masterpiece of textures and tastes.

This chaat is layers of flavour, a balance of crisp, soft, sweet, and spicy. The first bite is a revelation, crunchy, creamy, tangy and warming, all at once. It's street food elevated to an art form.

Gulati Kebab & Katal Delight

On the live grill, the *Gulati Kebab* sizzles gently, its rich aroma of ghee, saffron, and warming spices filling the air. A delicate blend of khoya, lentils and paneer, infused with cashew paste and *Lazzat-e-Taam* masala, makes it irresistibly soft. Served with saffron-infused Sheermal and bold panch-phoron chutney, it melts on the tongue, releasing layers of spice and smoke.

Never thought of *Katal* as something this indulgent but here it was, stealing the spotlight. Slow-cooked in Lucknowi spices, the raw jackfruit transformed into a rich meaty delight. Paired with warm *Rumali Roti*, it absorbed the deep smokiness of cloves, cardamom and ghee, each bite a revelation.

The Non-Veg Secrets

For those who crave the richness of Lucknow's meat dishes, the live kitchen offers a spectacle of its own. The legendary *Chowk Ke Galawati Kebab*, soft, smoky, spiced to perfection, is prepared right before your eyes, each portion hand-minced with precision. Beside it, a pot of *Abu Bakar Ki Biryani* is gently stirred, the fragrance of saffron and rose water rising with the steam. The *Rann Mussallam*, slow-cooked to perfection with rich Lucknowi spices, makes a grand entrance, the meat tender, falling off the bone.

Pan-Asian Flair

While the heart of *Zaika-e-Lucknow* lies in its heritage, there's an unexpected twist, a live Pan-Asian station. The contrast is striking. Here, the preparation is fast, dynamic. Flames leap as a chef tosses fresh vegetables in a hot wok, the aroma of basil and soy hitting the air.

A dish of *Sticky Rice* with Vegetables in *Basil Sauce* comes together in mere minutes. The chef glances up, asking, "More spice?" A nod, and in goes a handful of

fresh chilli, the deep red cutting through the glossy sauce. Spice is adjusted on request. The final dish is bold and full of character, every grain of rice coated in a rich, aromatic sauce. It's a theatrical contrast to the slow, deliberate artistry of Lucknow's kebabs and chaats, yet equally hypnotic to watch.

A Sweet Mystery

Khushnuma Begum Ki Kulfi, what a name for a dessert. The story goes that a young chef once found an old spoon engraved with "Khushnuma" in the bustling bartan bazaar, and it changed his fate forever. This dessert carries that same magic. A saffron and almond kulfi, layered with falooda and dry fruits, served with a paan-infused rabri blended with betel leaf and gulkand. Each bite is a journey through Lucknow's rich culinary history, a perfect ending to an unforgettable meal.

Dining at *Chica Loca* is about feeling connected, to the past, to the craft, to the very moment when something beautiful is created. Watching the hands that shape the food, hearing the stories behind the dishes, inhaling the scents that fill the air, it all makes each bite more meaningful. At *Zaika-e-Lucknow*, tradition is alive, food is theatre and every meal is a story waiting to be told.

For five days, the quiet, dusty town of Ramgarh Shekhawati transformed into a vibrant spectacle of music, dance, colors, and captivating performances that left audiences enthralled. Welcome to VHAH FEST 2025—a celebration that goes beyond mere entertainment. VHAH is a dedicated effort to rekindle tourism in Ramgarh Shekhawati, serving a greater purpose: reviving the town's rich heritage. This eagerly awaited event every year promises an immersive journey into the rich tapestry of heritage, music, dance, wellness, and artistic splendor, all set against the breathtaking backdrop of Rajasthan's architectural grandeur.

But how do these two elements – A cultural festival and Heritage conservation – come together? A silent yet a profound revolution is taking shape in a small town in Rajasthan' Sikar district – Ramgarh Shekhawati. Known for its exquisitely carved havelis and frescos, it is now one of the finest examples of how to protect and conserve the heritage. And more than money you need passion and dedication to do so; money follows. What began as an effort to restore an ancestral haveli by Shruti Poddar, now the convenor of INTACH Shekhawati chapter, has grown into a full-blown revival of the town and an effort to put it on the world map of tourism. Indeed, it has been a long and arduous journey but is worth the pain and the



effort. Shruti tells us that when she returned from the UK, searching for her roots, she was amazed to see the heritage her ancestors left and was in tears that her own folk had abandoned such a rich heritage to settle in big towns.

She began brick by brick reviving the haveli that belonged to her. She lived with bats and bare minimum basics. Her dedication inspired people around and they gradually started taking interest in the revival of more havelis. Most of these havelis are over two hundred years and done in limestone, bricks and stones, carved with exquisite designs and painted with frescos on their facades with wet colours on limestone plaster.

But then for everything you need money, people with deep pockets need to be interested in visiting it so that money pours into once the richest place on the planet in terms of per capita income. Ruiyas, Khetans, Khemkas Poddars—the big Marwari business families have their genesis in Ramgarh and it shows. It is writ large in the Havelis they lived; Frescos done in gold, Belgium glasses on the wall and silk smooth flooring done in limestone and seashells—all tell you what the town is all about.

For the VHAH Festival 2025, the guests came from across the world. They came to be part of this immersive experience, a rare treat. Gajendra Singh Shekhawat, Minister for Culture and Tourism spent a day to understand the town and what it would take to revive it. He promised government support to provide infrastructure, like airport link and train halt of fast trains at Ramgarh station.

The festival has grown bigger in size, both in terms of numbers and scope and has been adding newer elements to it. This year's theme was love – *Shringar rasa*. One major highlight of VHAH FEST 2025 was a heartfelt tribute to the legendary filmmaker Guru Dutt on his 100th birth anniversary. This special commemoration also brought together film enthusiasts and scholars for screenings, discussions, and live performances celebrating his unparalleled contributions to Indian cinema. 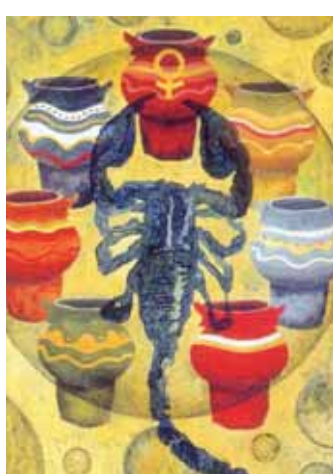

Dawn's Sacred Whispers: A Lesson in Devotion of Hanuman

As the first light kissed the ancient stones of Haridwar, vapours rose from our mouths like silent prayers into the crisp January air. The Ganges flowed with a gentle murmur, carrying centuries of devotion past Har ki Pauri's weathered steps. In this pre-dawn stillness, my friend and I stood among hundreds of devotees. The morning Aarti began with the soft tinkling of bells, swelling into a symphony that seemed to make the very air vibrate with divine energy. Around us, devotees raised their hands in unified prayer, their collective faith creating an invisible warmth that defied the winter chill. The brass diyas cast flickering shadows on faces transformed by devotion, each flame a beacon in the lingering darkness. Through the corner of my eye, I saw my usually talkative friend transformed into a pillar of silence. His eyes, fixed on the ceremony, held a depth I had never seen before. Even when our shoulders touched in the swaying crowd, he remained immersed in a connection that transcended physical awareness. Before us, the sacred waters carried their own ceremony—brave souls descending into the freezing embrace of Mother Ganga, their gasps turning into smiles of blessed contentment as the icy water touched their skin. As we walked away from the Aarti, the familiar verses of the Hanuman Chalisa floated through the air from a

nearby temple. The moment took me back to a profound lecture delivered at the Indian Institute of Public Administration (IIPA) by Director General Surendra Nath Tripathi. A retired Indian Administrative Service (IAS) officer of the 1985 Odisha cadre. During his lecture, Shri Tripathi had eloquently drawn parallels between Hanuman's qualities and the attributes of an ideal public servant. His deep reverence for Hanuman was evident—not just as a deity but as a timeless embodiment of dedication, wisdom, and service. I nudged my friend's elbow, but he remained lost in contemplation. Finally, he broke his silence, his voice tinged with reverence. "Hanuman's power was not in his physical strength but in his absolute devotion to Rama. His service was his power." The words hung in the crisp morning air as we settled on the riverbank, watching pilgrims change into dry clothes after their sacred dip. Their movements created ripples in the water that caught the growing daylight. It reminded me of Shri Tripathi's insights—how Hanuman's unwavering focus, his ability to listen deeply, and his strategic acumen were qualities that modern leaders must embody. Hanuman exemplifies deep listening through his complete devotion to understanding Ram's mission. He doesn't just hear instructions but comprehends the deeper purpose, demonstrating active engagement and complete understanding.



Like Hanuman, who carried an entire mountain when he could not identify a single herb, today's public servants must often find creative solutions to complex problems. As Hanuman leaped across the ocean in search of Sita, undeterred by challenges, so must those in governance navigate obstacles with resilience and agility. Shri Tripathi had emphasised that a true leader, much like Hanuman, must build bridges—connecting communities, fostering inclusivity, and ensuring that no one is left unheard. Hanuman's service to Rama was marked by humility despite his immense power—he never sought personal glory, only the fulfillment of his duty. Shri Tripathi had spoken about how governance, at its core, is not about authority but about selfless service. A public servant, he stressed, must wield power with humility, ensuring that policies and initiatives are executed with integrity and a deep sense of responsibility.

In his service to Rama, Hanuman exemplified inspirational leadership, his very presence uplifting those around him. He encouraged and motivated, reminding his fellow warriors of their strength. A true public servant, Shri Tripathi had noted, must similarly lead by example, inspiring change through action rather than mere words. Yet Hanuman was not just a warrior—he was a strategist, an innovator. His creativity shone when he set Lanka ablaze with his burning tail, turning adversity into an advantage. In governance, as Shri Tripathi highlighted, problem-solving requires a similar inventive spirit, where obstacles are met with ingenuity rather than hesitation. His emotional intelligence was just as remarkable—when he met Sita in Ashok Vatika, he comforted her, offering hope and reassurance. Understanding emotions, building trust, and resolving conflicts are just as crucial in governance today as they were in his time. Shri Tripathi's keen analytical thinking and his ability to balance empathy with strategy have been central to his leadership across ministries and institutions. Through every mission, Hanuman remained grounded in humility. Despite his immense strength and intelligence, he never wavered from his core purpose—serving Rama. This, Shri Tripathi had pointed out, is the hallmark of true leadership: to serve without expectation of reward, to

work tirelessly for the greater good, and to uphold integrity in every action. This morning in Haridwar had revealed a profound truth—that true service, whether to the divine or to society, stems from the same source: unwavering dedication. Just as Hanuman's devotion to Rama transformed him from a powerful being into an immortal symbol of selfless service, public servants have the opportunity to transform their official duties into acts of sacred service to society. Their power lies not in their position but in their dedication to service, their willingness to work tirelessly for the greater good, and their ability to remain humble despite their authority. The morning's experience had deepened our understanding of both divine and public service. As we left Har ki Pauri, the sound of the Ganges followed us—a constant reminder that like her eternal flows. As we walked away from the riverbank, the golden morning light reflected off the waters, casting a shimmering path ahead. Just as Hanuman once leaped across the ocean to fulfil his duty, each step taken in service—whether in governance, society, or personal life—creates ripples that extend far beyond what the eye can see.
