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AAP WIPED DELHI'S MONEY: CAG

Exposing a string of wrong decisions and omissions, a report by the Comptroller and Auditor General (CAG) has revealed the Delhi government incurred a massive loss of ₹2,026.91 Crore because of alleged irregularities in the implementation of the now-scrapped excise policy in 2021-22.

Titled 'Performance Audit on Regulation and Supply of Liquor in Delhi', (Audit Report No 1 of the year 2024)", the CAG report is one of 14 on the previous Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) government's performance, which was tabled in the Delhi Assembly by the new Rekha Gupta-led dispensation. The report also flagged violations in the process of issuing licences. AAP leaders, including then chief minister Arvind Kejriwal and former deputy chief minister Manish Sisodia, were arrested in the case lodged by the Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and the Enforcement Directorate (ED).

The report estimated a revenue loss of ₹941.53 Crore, citing failure to obtain timely permissions for opening liquor vents in non-conforming municipal wards — areas not designated for liquor sales under zoning laws. This led to a significant financial impact on the Delhi government's earnings. Additionally, the Excise Department lost ₹890.15 Crore due to surrender of licences and the department's failure to re-tender liquor zones. The report also flagged an irregular waiver of ₹144

Crone granted to licence holders, citing COVID-19 restrictions, a decision personally approved by Sisodia despite finance department objections. The department also failed to collect proper security deposits from zonal licences to the tune of ₹27 Crore. Overall, implementation issues of the new policy led to a loss of revenue of approximately ₹2,026.68 Crore.

The CAG report sparked fresh war of words between AAP and the BJP. While AAP stood firm in support of the discontinued new liquor policy, the BJP asserted that the report demonstrated how AAP had deceived and defrauded Delhi residents. The BJP has alleged that the CAG reports will reveal the

'black deeds' of the previous AAP government in the national capital. The CAG Audit has covered a period of four years from 2017-18 to 2020-21 to examine Regulation and Supply of Indian Made Foreign Liquor and Foreign Liquor in Delhi, in detail. Audit observed several discrepancies in the way Excise Department monitored and regulated the supply of Liquor in NCT of Delhi.

The liquor policy was an albatross around the neck of the previous AAP government and had led to several of its leaders, including then chief minister Arvind Kejriwal and deputy chief minister Manish Sisodia, landing behind bars. The corruption allegations

surrounding the policy are also seen as having played a key role in the AAP being defeated in this month's Assembly elections and the BJP forming a government in Delhi after a gap of 27 years. The report on the alleged liquor scam, a hot button issue in the run-up to the elections, claimed a loss of revenue to the tune of ₹941.53 Crore, saying timely permissions were not taken for opening the liquor vents in "non-conforming municipal wards". Non-conforming areas are areas which do not conform to land use norms for opening of liquor vents. "The excise department suffered a loss of approximately ₹890.15 Crore on account of licence fee from these zones owing to their surrender and failure of the

department in re-tendering," the report, tabled by the chief minister, added.

The CAG report also points to serious violations in policy implementation. It highlights the Delhi Excise Department's failure to enforce Rule 35 of the Delhi Excise Rules, 2010, which prohibits a single entity from holding multiple liquor licences across different categories such as wholesale, retail, and HCR (hotels, clubs, and restaurants). Sources indicate that this lapse benefited select individuals. An increase of wholesaler margin from 5 per cent to 12 per cent was justified as necessary to compensate for a quality checking system involving setting up government-approved labs at warehouses. However, no labs were set up. Thus, the profit margin of wholesale licences increased, while revenue went down, the report noted.

The AAP government awarded retail liquor licences without proper checks on solvency, financial statements, and criminal records, the report observed. Running a liquor zone required an initial investment of over ₹100 crore, yet no qualifying financial criteria was set. Thus licences were given to financially weak entities, with multiple bidders reporting minimal to zero income in the last three years. These measures suggest proxy ownership, raising questions about political favouritism and backdoor deals. The AAP government disregarded recommendations of its own Expert Committee while drafting the 2021-22 Excise Policy, with no justification recorded.

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Stalin accuses Centre fuelling language war

DMK president and Tamil Nadu Chief Minister MK Stalin on Tuesday accused the Centre of 'sowing the seeds of language war' by thrusting Hindi upon the State and said the domination of that language will not be allowed. Addressing media, Stalin said that DMK is ready for another language war.

Though the state was not against any language in particular and would not come in the way of anyone desiring to learn any language, it was determined not to allow any other language to dominate and destroy the mother tongue Tamil, he said. "This is the reason why we are adhering to the bilingual policy (of Tamil and English)," said Stalin in a letter addressed to his party workers.

Many states in India including the neighbouring states have realised the path laid down by Tamil Nadu on language policy and its firm stance, and they started to express

their concerns, he claimed. Assuring that the struggle against the domination of Hindi would continue until it was ended, Stalin said. "We are descendants of a movement with a principled army that sacrificed its life to protect Tamil."

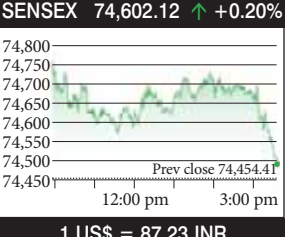
The DMK has a history of defending the mother tongue from Hindi through numerous sacrifices since 1965. In 1971, at the anti-Hindi conference organised by the DMK students' wing in Coimbatore, he had stated that he was ready to make sacrifices. "Opposing dominance and protecting the mother tongue is a feeling ingrained in the blood of DMK members. That feeling will not subside until the end of my life," Stalin said.

Recalling his visit to Cuddalore on February 21 and 22, the Chief Minister said while addressing a parents-teachers conference, he had said that the state would not accept the National Education Policy (NEP) even if the Centre offered to give ₹10,000 crore funds to Tamil Nadu. At this, a little girl from Cuddalore, Nanmukhi, had said, "What if the Union Government does not provide funds? Then I will give it," the CM said and added that the girl sent her savings of ₹10,000.

Like her there were one crore young Nanmukhis in Tamil Nadu who were willing to defend their mother tongue, he said accusing the Union Government of sowing seeds of language war. "We are ready for it... We will not allow the domination of any other language," Stalin said. Meanwhile, the DMK members continued their agitation against the imposition of Hindi through the NEP. A few party cadres defaced the Hindi letters on the name board of the Ulundurpet railway station. Reacting to the DMK protest, BJP state chief K Annamalai sought to know from the Chief Minister why the opportunity to learn the third language, provided to students of CBSE and Matriculation schools, was being denied to government school students. "There is no ban on learning the third language. But if you want to learn, is Mr. Stalin saying that you should enroll your children in CBSE or Matriculation schools run by the DMK?" Annamalai asked in a post on the social media platform X.

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Sajjan Kumar convicted for life

Former Congress MP Sajjan Kumar has been sentenced to life imprisonment in connection with 1984 anti-Sikh riots. Kumar was convicted in the murder of Jaswant Singh and his son Tarundeep Singh in November 1984 anti-Sikh riots in Delhi's Saraswati Vihar. This marks the second life sentence for Kumar, who is already serving time for his involvement in the Delhi Cantonment riots case. The three-time parliamentarian was found guilty of leading and inciting a mob that targeted Jaswant Singh and his family. Last week, the public prosecutor submitted that the death penalty should be imposed, citing Nirbhaya case and similar rulings.

"From the evidence on record, it has been established that the victims in the present case not only witnessed the brutal killings of their family members at the hands of the rioting mob which the Convict was a part of, but they were also witness to the burning and destruction of their dwelling house and looting of their belongings. The helplessness of the victims and the lack of any support whatsoever from the neighbours and also the police has also been established from their uncontroverted depositions. In these circumstances, I am of the considered opinion that this is a fit case where the Convict must also be awarded life imprisonment for the

offence punishable under Section 436 I PC r/w Section 149 IPC in addition to fine," special judge Kaveri Baweja said in the 20 pages order. Pronouncing the order, the judge said his (Kumar) old age and illness weighed in favour of a lesser sentence instead of death penalty. The minimum punishment for murder is life imprisonment whereas the maximum is death. The judge said the offences committed by Kumar were undoubtedly brutal and reprehensible but underscored certain mitigating factors, including his age of 80 years and illnesses that "weigh in favour of imposing a lesser sentence, instead of death penalty."

The judge said, though the killings of two innocent persons in the present case is no less an offence, however, the above noted circumstances, in my opinion, do not make this a 'rarest of rare case' warranting imposition of death penalty for the offence punishable under Section 302 r/w Section 149 IPC. The offence of murder attracts a maximum of death penalty whereas the minimum punishment is life imprisonment. The court's verdict came amid intense protests by members of the Sikh community, who gathered outside the court demanding the death penalty for Kumar. Calling the 1984 riots one of the "darkest and most shameful" episodes in India's history, the protesters emphasised the need for justice and accountability. The riots had erupted following the assassination of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi by her Sikh bodyguards on October 31, 1984, leading to widespread violence against Sikhs across the country. The Rouse Avenue Court had reserved its verdict on January 31 after hearing additional arguments from Public Prosecutor Manish Rawat.

The court on February 12 convicted Kumar for the offence and sought a report from Tihar Central Jail authorities on his psychiatric and psychological evaluation in view of a Supreme Court order asking for such a report in cases attracting capital punishment.

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Centre seeks time to deport undocumented Assam migrants

Appearing before Justices Abhay S Oka and Ujjal Bhuyan, Solicitor General Tushar Mehta said a decision on deporting the identified foreigners was likely by March 21 and the matter is under consideration at the "highest executive level".

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Crowds swell into night at Kumbh on Shivratri eve

Around 1.30 am on Tuesday, when much of the country was sleeping, the ghats facing the Sangam nose, where the Yamuna, Ganga and the mythical Saraswati meet, and near the spot were buzzing with life with a surge of humanity rushing in with just one purpose — 'Kumbh Snan'. The crowd swelled hour after hour. Pilgrims jostled with each other to reach the river bank, and those having taken the holy dip struggled to find a spot to change their clothes. The banks were literally choked with devotees, young and old, rural and urban, men and women.

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CBSE approves norms for biannual Class 10 exams

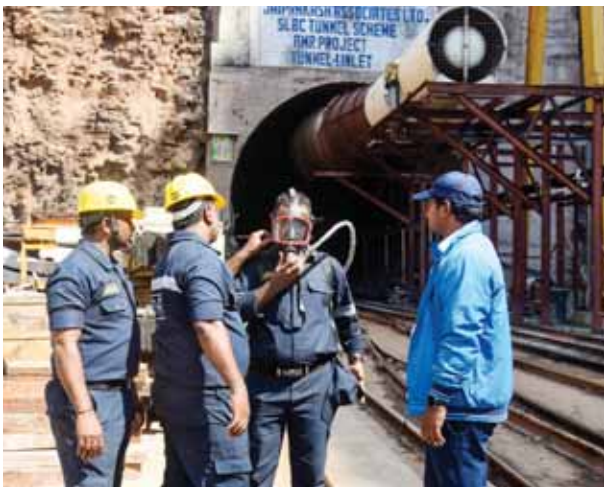

The Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) on Tuesday approved draft norms for conducting Class-10 board exams twice a year from 2026, officials said. The draft norms will now be put in the public domain and the stakeholders can submit their feedback till March 9 following which the policy will be finalised, they said. As per the draft norms, the first phase of the exams will be conducted from February 17 to March 6, while the second phase will be conducted from May 5 to 20. "Both the examinations will be conducted on full syllabus and the candidates will be

allotted the same examination centres in the two editions. Exam fees will be enhanced and collected for both exams at the time of application filing," a senior board official said. "The first and second editions of the board exams will also act as supplementary exams, and no special exams will be conducted in any circumstances," the official added. The new National Education Policy (NEP) had recommended that to eliminate the "high stakes" aspect of the board exams, all students will be allowed to take the exams on up to two occasions during any given school year.

Tunnel collapse: Water poses threat to rescuers' lives, says Minister

As there is a continuous flow of silt and water in the partially collapsed SLBC tunnel where eight people have been trapped for over three days, experts warned that the lives of the rescue teams could also be in danger if they attempt to venture inside, Irrigation Minister Uttam Kumar Reddy said on Tuesday. Addressing media persons, Reddy cited experts, who described this as the most complex and difficult tunnel accident in the world or at least in India as there is only one entry or exit to the SLBC tunnel. He opined that the collapse might have taken place due to a slight tectonic shift and as some geological fault lines have given way. "There is one problem. The flow of silt and water into the tunnel at a very high speed continues. So there was one opinion expressed by some experts that the people going into the rescue, even their lives could be endangered. So, we are a responsible government, we are taking the best expert opinion, and we will take a final call on that (on how to go about it)," he said. The Minister noted that experts from 10 agencies such as Indian Army, the Marine Commando Force (MARCOS) of Navy, NDRF, SDRF, GSI, Rat Miners and Singareni Collieries Company Ltd are working round the clock to save the eight lives. He further said a unified command control has been set up which is constantly being monitored by

Special Chief Secretary Arvind Kumar. "People are relentlessly working in the tunnel. We are getting videos and pictures. They are being assessed by the experts. We will take a combined collective decision," he replied when asked what the current situation is. There was no contact with the trapped persons though oxygen is being pumped into the tunnel continuously. Reddy said the state government is dedicated to saving the lives of the trapped persons and has been using the best possible talent in India and anywhere in the world. Reacting to BRS' criticism that Chief Minister Revanth Reddy, who has visited Delhi 36 times, does not have the time to visit those trapped in the SLBC tunnel even after 72 hours, Uttam Reddy termed it as "disgraceful

politics". "Anybody who is criticising, please remember, there cannot be more disgraceful politics. It is shameful that somebody talks about it," he hit back. Recalling that eight people died during a fire accident at Srisailem Left Bank Power Plant and seven were killed at Kaleshwaram Project when BRS was in power, the minister said they never criticised the then government. Despite relentless efforts by several agencies, no breakthrough has been achieved so far in the rescue operations, as thick muck, tangled iron rods, and cement blocks continue to impede the efforts to extricate the trapped persons from the partially collapsed tunnel of the Srisailem Left Bank Canal (SLBC) project in since Saturday morning.

SC questions Delhi's stand on Nitish Katara murder accused

The Supreme Court has questioned the Delhi government's submission that it would not release Sukhdev Yadav alias Pehalwan, serving a 20-year jail term without remission for murder of business executive Nitish Katara in 2002, despite the completion of his actual sentence. A bench of Justices Abhay S Oka and Ujjal Bhuyan directed the secretary of the Delhi government's home department to file an affidavit stating on oath that even after the completion 20 years of actual jail term, Yadav would not be released. "Our question is, is it your case that even after completion of 20 years of actual imprisonment, the state will not release the petitioner (Yadav)?" the bench asked the Delhi government

The counsel responded in the affirmative and said Yadav was sentenced to life imprisonment. The apex court noted the high court, in its verdict delivered on February 6, 2015, sentenced Yadav to "life imprisonment which shall be 20 years of actual imprisonment without consideration of remission" and fined him with Rs 10,000. On Monday, the bench was informed that Yadav would soon complete his 20 years of actual sentence. The bench asked the Delhi government's counsel if a state would read verdicts delivered by the courts this way. The home department secretary was therefore ordered to file the affidavit by February 28 by the bench, which would hear the matter on March 3. Yadav's plea challenged a November 2024 order of the Delhi High Court, which

dismissed his petition for releasing him on furlough for three weeks. On October 3, 2016, the Supreme Court awarded a 25-year jail term without the benefit of remission to Vikas Yadav and his cousin Vishal for their role in the sensational kidnapping and killing of Katara. Co-convict Sukhdev Yadav alias Pehalwan was handed down a 20-year jail term in the case. They were convicted and sentenced for kidnapping Katara from a marriage party on the intervening night of February 16-17, 2002 and then killing him for his alleged affair with Vikas' sister Bharti Yadav. Bharti was the daughter of Uttar Pradesh politician D P Yadav. The trial court observed Katara was murdered as Vishal and Vikas Yadav did not approve of his affair with Bharti as they were from different castes.

Decision on Surjewala's plea for electoral rolls in three months: ECI to DHC

The Delhi High Court was on Tuesday informed by

the Election Commission of India that it would decide within three months a representation of Congress MP Randeep Singh

Surjewala seeking the electoral rolls for elections held in Haryana and Maharashtra between 2009 and 2024.

Justice Jyoti Singh recorded the submission of the Election Commission of India (ECI) counsel who said since the details related to 2009, it would not be possible to logistically take an immediate decision and sought three months. "Accordingly, this writ petition is disposed of without entering into the merits of the case by taking the stand of the ECI on record that the representation dated

December 29, 2024 will be decided as expeditiously as possible and not later than three months from today," the court said. Senior advocate Abhishek Singhvi, appearing for Surjewala, submitted the ECI hadn't decide the December 29, 2024 representation seeking supply of electoral rolls for the Lok Sabha and Vidhan Sabha elections conducted in Haryana and Maharashtra between 2009 and 2024.

"Jai Ganga Maiyya, I had my 'snan' and it feels reinvigorating. This is my first time at any Kumbh Mela, I am glad I could be part of it," said a pilgrim from Jharkhand's Sahibganj, who took a dip along with his wife and son at around 2 am. As the crowds continued to grow, many just sitting down at and near the Triveni Sangam, police personnel in uniform walked near the banks instructing people to not put any bags on ground near the edges of the ghats, and not jostle for space. "Aage badhiye, aage badhiye" (move forward, move forward)," shouted a policeman on duty to people and told them not to push and shove, repeatedly blowing his whistle to manage the crowd. The rush kept increasing. Many got separated from their loved ones and friends either at the banks or at other parts of the Mela area. The 'Lost and Found' Centre at Sector 3, Akshay Vat Road was abuzz with activity even at 3 am. Ramesh Kaidan from Madhya

Pradesh had lost his wife waited at the centre anxiously. So did Munnill Thakur from Bihar's West Chandigarh district who looked out for his brother, sister-in-law and grandson. A flurry of announcements were made on loudspeakers in the Mela area while a digital screen at the centre displayed names (mostly with photos) of persons lost or found by authorities. The Triveni Marg connecting Naya Pul near Minto Park and the Maha Kumbh Mela area was an ocean of people, some going to the ghats and others getting back. Around 3.45 am, a group of 34 pilgrims — friends and family members — from Kangra in Himachal Pradesh were on their way out. And a huge batch of 100 devotees from Maharashtra, sporting matching saffron vests, was on its way for a dip straight from the Prayagraj station. Dhanraj Wasadekar, one of the pilgrims from Maharashtra, said he was attending Kumbh Mela for the first time. "We are all from different parts of Maharashtra, who converged at Mumbai and

then from there we took a train to reach Prayagraj," he told PTI while walking the Triveni Marg. The 45-day religious congregation, which began on January 13, culminates on February 26. Over 60 crore people have taken a holy dip in the Triveni Sangam since it started, according to the Uttar Pradesh government. Vendors selling 'shivling' rudraksha garlands, water containers to carry river water, and ceremonial threads could be seen doing business the whole night. "This place gets crowd of pilgrims throughout the day, the ghats are choked all night too. Sangam is always abuzz with life and constant movement of people," said Manisha, a ceremonial threads seller from Rajasthan. A food court just outside Maha Kumbh Mela area, and located along Triveni Marg, was open for business even close to 4 am as were many street-side eateries and stalls, feeding exhausted pilgrims and giving them the energy to carry on their journey, faith in their heart and a prayer on their lips.

The top court on February 4 slammed the Assam government for keeping persons declared foreigners in detention centers indefinitely and not deporting them saying if it was waiting for "some muhurat". Observing Assam was suppressing facts, the court said once the detainees were identified as foreigners, they ought to be deported immediately. The top court expressed surprise at the State Government's explanation that it was not sending nationality verification forms to the Ministry of External Affairs as detainees' addresses in the foreign country were unknown. Calling it a "defective" affidavit, the top court on January 22 slammed the Assam government for not stipulating reasons for

detaining 270 foreigners at the Matia transit camp. The top court directed Assam State Legal Services Authority to conduct surprise visits at the camp to check on the facility's hygiene and food quality. The bench was hearing a plea concerning the aspect of deportation and facilities at the detention centres in Assam. While hearing the matter on May 16, 2024, the apex court said the Centre must take immediate steps for deporting 17 foreigners at the detention centre in Matia and asked to prioritise the deportation of those who had spent more than two years in the camp. The plea further sought a direction to the Assam Government to not detain any person declared a foreigner by the tribunal until it could show proof of a possible deportation in near future.

Bogie of passenger train derails in Haryana

The bogie of a passenger train derailed at Nilokheri in Haryana's Karnal district on Tuesday though all the passengers were reported safe, officials said. The passenger train was headed from Kurukshetra to Delhi when the incident took

place, a Government Railway Police (GRP) official said over phone from Karnal, adding that no report of injury to passengers has been received. "When the train travelled barely 100 metres after halting at the Nilokheri railway station, a wheel of the fourth bogie from the rear came off the tracks. The train was stopped immediately,"

the GRP official said. When asked what could be the reason behind the incident, the official said, "It could be a technical issue. The technical team of the Railways will be able to tell the exact cause after a probe." Rail traffic on the affected line has been impacted by the incident, which would be restored soon, he added.

Maharashtra considering deploying security in Karnataka-bound buses

Maharashtra Transport Minister Pratap Sarnaik on Tuesday said they were mulling to deploy security marshals or police personnel in the state transport buses going to neighbouring Karnataka, in wake of an attack on its staff. Maharashtra Minister of State for Home Yogesh Kadam said it is even the Karnataka government's responsibility to provide security to passengers and if they don't do it, then the (Maharashtra) state government will. The state government ordered the suspension of Maharashtra State Road Transport Corporation (MSRTC) buses to Karnataka on Saturday after an attack on a vehicle of the undertaking and its driver in Chitradurga

on Friday night allegedly by pro-Kannada activists. On the same day, a conductor of the state-owned transport corporation bus of Karnataka was allegedly assaulted in Belagavi, bordering Maharashtra, for not replying to a girl in Marathi. Both the incidents have since heightened tension in the border areas of the two states. Belagavi has a substantial Marathi population and a section among them often demands that this border district of Karnataka be merged with Maharashtra, which is opposed by pro-Kannada activists. "Marathi is our pride and we need to look after the security of our passengers," Sarnaik told PTI Videos. He also stressed that passengers should not face difficulties due to the

suspension of bus services by both the states. Senior officials of the transport department were talking to their Karnataka counterparts to resolve the issue, the minister said. "As transport minister, I have to think about the security of our passengers. If there are some anti-social elements, then we need to think about deploying security marshals or police personnel in our state-run buses which go to Karnataka," Sarnaik said. "Marathi is our pride and we need to look after the security of our passengers, and the issue will be discussed in the state cabinet meeting too," he said. The minister said Maharashtra has its "pride" and will not tolerate if people of the neighbouring state bully "our people".

Nothing "adverse was reported about Kumar's behaviour" and his conduct was "satisfactory" according to a jail report, the court added. "The 'satisfactory' conduct of the convict as per the report of the jail authorities, the ailments from which he is reportedly suffering, the fact that the convict has roots in the society and the possibility of his reformation and rehabilitation are material considerations which, in my opinion, tilt the scales in favour of sentence for life imprisonment instead of death penalty," the order said. Referring to the jail report, the judge observed Kumar was unable to carry out his daily routine properly owing to poor health. The judge noted the psychiatric and psychological evaluation report of the convict, which revealed that he was under the treatment of the Department of Medicine, Urology and

Neurology at Safdarjung Hospital and was prescribed anti depressive and sleep medicines. The judge went on to add that the case at hand was part of the same incident and could be seen in continuity of the incident for which the Kumar was sentenced to life imprisonment by the Delhi High Court on December 17, 2018. He was then found guilty of having caused the death of five persons during a similar incident of rioting post the assassination of former Prime Minister Indira Gandhi. "Though the killings of two innocent persons in the present case is no less an offence, however, the above noted circumstances, in my opinion, do not make this a 'rarest of rare case' warranting imposition of death penalty," the court said. The judge therefore awarded life imprisonment to Kumar for being part of the mob which set afire the house of the

victims and "brutally killed" the two victims aside from looting their belongings. Referring to the jail report, the judge observed Kumar was unable to carry out his daily routine properly owing to poor health. The judge noted the psychiatric and psychological evaluation report of the convict, which revealed that he was under the treatment of the Department of Medicine, Urology and Neurology at Safdarjung Hospital and was prescribed anti depressive and sleep medicines. Kumar otherwise did not show any signs and symptoms of mental illness or requiring any psychiatric intervention at present, the judge noted. The judge fined Rs 2.4 lakh. All the sentences were ordered by the court to run concurrently. Reacting to the verdict, Delhi Sikh Gurudwara Management Committee (DSGMC) general secretary Jagdip Singh Kahlon said they are not happy with

the punishment awarded to Sajjan Kumar. "We are upset that someone like Sajjan Kumar was not given the death penalty. I believe if he had been given a death sentence, it would have been better, and we would have felt satisfied...After 41 years, even if he got life imprisonment, justice has prevailed. I respect the verdict of the court," Kahlon said. The 1984 anti-Sikh riots were triggered by the assassination of the then Prime Minister Indira Gandhi on October 31, 1984, by her Sikh bodyguards, Beant Singh and Satwant Singh. The assassination occurred in the wake of Operation Blue Star, a military operation that year in June, which was undertaken to remove Sikh militants, including Jarnail Singh Bhindranwale, who were holed up in the Golden Temple, a holy shrine for Sikhs in Punjab's Amritsar. According to a report of Nanavati Commission,

constituted to probe the violence and its aftermath, there were 587 FIRs filed in Delhi in relation to the riots that saw killings of 2733 people. Of the total, about 240 FIRs were closed by police as "untraced" and 250 cases resulted in acquittal. Only 28 cases of 587 FIRs resulted in convictions, in which about 400 persons were convicted. About 50 were convicted for murder, including Kumar. Kumar, an influential Congress leader and an MP at the time, was accused in a case over the killings of five persons in Delhi's Palam Colony on November 1 and 2 in 1984. He was awarded life imprisonment by the Delhi High Court in the case and his appeal challenging the punishment is pending before the Supreme Court. Two other appeals are pending before Delhi high court and the Supreme Court against Kumar's acquittal and life imprisonment in two other cases respectively.

The policy further permitted a single applicant to operate up to 54 liquor vends, (previous limit was two), paving the way for monopolies and cartelisation. Earlier, government corporations operated 377 retail vends, while 262 were run by private individuals. The new policy created 32 retail zones with 849 vends, but licenses were given to only 22 private entities - reducing transparency and fairness. The CAG also noted that the Excise Department allowed L1 licenses to set their own Ex-Distillery Price (EDP) for high-priced liquor, leading to price manipulation. The report also highlighted that the AAP's Excise Department approved liquor vends in nonconforming (residential/mixed land use) areas without mandatory approval from MCD or DDA. - Inspection teams falsely declared 4 vends in Zone 23

as being in commercial areas, in some cases applicants themselves admitted that the vends were in residential/mixed land use areas, yet licenses were issued. Due to these violations, all four illegal liquor vends were sealed by MCD in early 2022. This proves that due process was bypassed. The report also pointed out key exemptions and relaxations with significant revenue impact were granted without Cabinet approval or consulting the LG, violating legal procedures. According to CAG, violating L1 licenses has put public at risk. The Excise Department issued licenses even when quality test reports were missing or non-compliant with Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS) norms. Some test reports submitted by licensees were from labs not accredited by the National Accreditation Board for Testing and Calibration Laboratories

(NABL), violating FSSAI guidelines. "In 51 per cent of foreign liquor test cases, reports were either older than one year, missing, or had no date - indicating QC negligence. Reports on harmful substances like heavy metals, methyl alcohol etc were absent or ignored, raising serious safety concerns," it said. The CAG stated that Excise Intelligence Bureau (EIB) failed to take proactive action against smuggling, especially of country liquor which made up 65 per cent of seized stock. They merely recorded seizures instead of taking proactive action. "It was observed that licenses were issued without ensuring solvency, submission of audited financial statements, submission of data regarding sales and wholesale price declared in other states and across the year, verification of criminal antecedents from the competent authority etc as required under the Rules," it added.

Oppn walks out over deaths due to 'spurious' liquor

Opposition Congress members on Tuesday staged a walk out in the Chhattisgarh State Assembly over deaths of nine persons after allegedly consuming hand-made 'spurious' liquor in Bilaspur's Lofandi village.

The matter was raised in the House by Leader of Opposition Charandas Mahant, legislators Vikram Mandavi, and Sheshraj Harwansh through a call attention motion.

Congress legislator and former Chief Minister Bhupesh Baghel alleged government's inaction in the matter and said the state



government was still investigating the matter even after 20 days of the incident whereas the culprits were at large till now. The Opposition members claimed that at least nine persons died in the incident, which were used to consume

hand-made Mahua liquor illegally sold in the area.

Deputy Chief Minister and Minister for Home Affairs, Vijay Sharma, answered that after learning about the deaths in Lofandi village, under the jurisdiction of Koni police station in Bilaspur, a team of administration and police officials visited the area and post mortem was done after seizing the bodies from cremation ground.

A magisterial probe has been ordered and the report was yet to come, the Minister said.

Dissatisfied with the Minister's answer, the Opposition members staged a walk out.

Nine Maoists surrender in Bijapur

Khuto carried a bounty of Rs 8 lakh whereas Tara, Bhime and Karam carried a reward of Rs 5 lakh each on their heads.

So far, 40 Maoists have laid down their arms, 56 cadres have been gunned down and 101 left-wing radicals have been apprehended this year in Bijapur.

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India-China relationship entering 'phase of recovery': Chinese envoy

India-China ties are entering the "phase of recovery" and the relationship between the two nations is "one of the most important" bilateral engagement globally, Chinese ambassador Xu Feihong said on Tuesday.

In an address at an event, Xu also said that the recent Special Representatives (SR) dialogue and the talks under "Foreign Secretary-Vice Minister" mechanism between the two sides produced common understandings on the boundary question and created an opportunity to reboot the ties.

New Delhi and Beijing are in the process of normalising bilateral ties following an understanding last year to end the face-off on the Line of Actual Control (LAC) in

eastern Ladakh. National Security Advisor Ajit Doval and Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi held the 23rd Special Representative dialogue in Beijing on December 18.

Weeks later, Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri travelled to the Chinese capital and held talks with his Chinese counterpart Sun Weidong under the framework of "Foreign Secretary-Vice Minister" mechanism.

"The 23rd Special Representatives meeting on China-India boundary question and Vice Foreign Minister-Foreign Secretary dialogue were successfully held in Beijing, and reached a series of common understandings on the boundary question and practical cooperation," Xu said.

"This creates an important opportunity for the reboot of China-India relations and

provides a broader platform for exchanges and cooperation between the youth of our two countries," he said.

The ambassador, speaking at the third China-India Youth Dialogue, however did not elaborate on specific outcomes of the talks.

"The China-India relationship is one of the most important bilateral relationships in the world. A sound and stable China-India relationship meets the expectations of the two peoples and the international community," he said.

Xu said both sides should implement the important consensus reached by the leaders of the two countries, mutually respect each other's core interests and view each other's development as an opportunity besides encouraging exchanges and

visits in various fields. The ambassador added: "China-India relations are entering the phase of recovery. We will celebrate the 75th anniversary of the establishment of diplomatic relations this year."

India and China completed the disengagement process late last year after firming up a pact for withdrawal of troops from Depsang and Demchok, the last two friction points in eastern Ladakh.

Two days after finalisation of the pact, Prime Minister Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping held talks in Kazan on October 23.

In the meeting, the two sides decided to revive the various dialogue mechanisms. India has been maintaining that its ties with China cannot be normal unless there is peace in the border areas.

Land-for-jobs 'scam': Delhi court summons Lalu, family members

A Delhi court on Tuesday summoned former rail minister Lalu Prasad and some of his family members, including his wife, two sons and two daughters, in connection with the land-for-jobs 'scam'.

Special Judge Vishal Gogne summoned the Rashtriya Janata Dal (RJD) supreme wife and former Bihar chief minister Rabri Devi, two sons — ex-Bihar deputy chief minister Tejashwi Prasad Yadav and former state minister Tej Pratap Yadav — and daughters Misha Bharti, a member of Parliament, and Hema Yadav, in connection with the case.

The accused have been directed to appear before the court on March 11.

The judge said the allegations and material cited in the chargesheet with respect to the role of Lalu Prasad Yadav, "with the active participation

of his aides Bhola Yadav and RK Mahajan, the transfer of parcels of land in favour of Lalu Prasad's family members — Rabri Devi, Hema Yadav and Tej Pratap Yadav — and the appointment of candidates, who were also arrayed as accused, upon the recommendation of railway officials, also named as accused in the chargesheet, form cogent prima-facie indication of the role of all 76 accused persons in the allegations crystallised in the concluding chargesheet."

"In view of the above allegations and the sanction for prosecution of Lalu Prasad Yadav, Bhola Yadav, RK Mahajan and the railway officials having been granted, the cognisance of the offences in question is taken by the court. The court finds sufficient grounds to summon all the accused," the judge said.

He further noted that "substantial time" was taken

by the CBI in investigating the allegations, and about two years were "consumed" in filing of the multiple chargesheets and supplementary chargesheets, and directed the central probe agency to ensure that the service of the summons be effected expeditiously and by utilising adequate man power.

The case is related to Group D appointments made in the West Central Zone of the Indian Railways based in Jabalpur, Madhya Pradesh, during Lalu Prasad's tenure as the rail minister between 2004 and 2009 in return for land parcels gifted or transferred by the recruits in the name of the RJD supreme's family or associates, officials said.

A case was registered on May 18, 2022, against Lalu Prasad and others, including his wife, two daughters, unidentified public officials and private persons.

Kharge slams government over 'declining' scholarships for SCs, STs

Army's DGMO reviews security dynamics on visit to Manipur

Indian Army's Director General Military Operations (DGMO) Lt Gen Rajiv Ghai carried out a comprehensive review of the security dynamics in Manipur as well as the situation along the Indo-Myanmar border during a two-day visit to the strife-torn state. Lt Gen Ghai met Governor Ajay Kumar Bhatta and several top officials including the state security advisor, the chief secretary and the director general of police, the Army said.

The DGMO's visit highlighted the collaborative approach between the military and state officials to implement strategic initiatives aimed at promoting stability and the welfare of the people of Manipur, it said in a readout of Lt Gen Ghai's visit to the state on February 24 and 25. Days after the resignation of Manipur Chief Minister N Biren Singh on February 9, the state was brought under President's Rule.

The Army said the DGMO visited Manipur to gain a comprehensive understanding of the situation along the Indo-Myanmar Border (IMB) and

insights into the status of ongoing border infrastructure developments in the state. Manipur's two ethnic groups — the Meitei community and the Kukis — have been locked in a deadly conflict since May, 2023, that killed over 200 people and displaced thousands.

There have been mounting concerns in New Delhi over security implications arising out of fighting between Myanmar's military and rebel forces in areas close to the country's border with India.

"The DGMO focused on the operational preparedness of the Indian Army, carried out an assessment of the security situation along the IMB, and the current security dynamics in the state, including fringe areas," it said in the readout.

"He also emphasised on a 'whole of government approach' during interactions with key stakeholders," it said. The discussions centred around the normalisation of prevailing security situation in the state, particularly the need to enhance border management and strengthen security infrastructure along the IMB, it said.

Myanmar is one of India's strategic neighbours and it shares a 1,640 km-long border with a number of northeastern states including militancy-hit Nagaland and Manipur.

In view of the violence and instability in border areas of Myanmar, Union Home Minister Amit Shah in January last year announced a plan to fence the border.

Railways to run more than 350 trains from Prayagraj on Mahashivratri: Ministry

Elaborate plans have been put in place for the safe return of pilgrims who have gathered at Prayagraj Maha Kumbh from various parts of the country for the final Amrit Snan on Mahashivratri, the Railway Ministry said on Tuesday.

"As the final Amrit Snan of Maha Kumbh 2025 is scheduled for February 26, a large number of pilgrims from various states, including Uttar Pradesh, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh, Jharkhand, West Bengal have gathered in Prayagraj to bathe at the Sangam, the confluence of the Ganga, Yamuna, and Saraswati rivers," a press statement from the Ministry said. A total of 350 trains have been planned to run for the safe and comfortable return of pilgrims. According to the Ministry, for the past two days, Sunday and Monday, there were a high number of passengers at stations in Bihar, Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, and Jharkhand etc who travelled to Prayagraj for final Amrit Snan.

"After the Amrit Snan, a large number of people are expected to return to their hometowns, which will likely lead to a heavy crowd at railway stations," the Ministry said. It added, "Keeping this in mind, North Central Railway, North Eastern Railway, and Northern Railway have made extensive preparations, and all officials and staff have been directed to remain vigilant at their workstations." The Ministry is expecting a huge rush of pilgrims similar to Mouni Amavasya day for which over 360 trains were run, transporting more than 20 lakh people to their destinations.

"Similarly, special arrangements have been made to run additional trains after the Maha Shivaratri Snan, and extra rakes have been stationed near Prayagraj for use as needed," the Ministry said. The press note said that the entire railway operation is being closely monitored by Railway Minister Ashwini Vaishnaw and the Chairman and CEO of the Railway Board, Satish Kumar along with other senior railway officials.

India will always advocate 'zero tolerance' for terrorism: Jaishankar

There is a clear and urgent need for a new multilateral system that reflects contemporary global realities as past few years "exposed" the "stark inadequacies" of the existing structures, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar has said.

In a virtual address at the 58th Session of the UN Human Rights Council in Geneva, he also asserted that India will always advocate "zero tolerance" for terrorism and call out any effort to normalise it.

Delving into geo-political turmoil in various geographies, Jaishankar said the world continues to grapple with conflicts and it is growing more fractured, uncertain, and unstable in the face of emerging challenges.

"There is a clear and urgent need for a multilateral system that reflects contemporary global realities, one that is better equipped to respond to modern challenges, and, in essence, one that is fit for purpose," he said.

"The past few years have exposed the stark inadequacies of existing multilateral

structures. When the world needed them the most, they were found wanting," he said. Jaishankar said India has always played an active role in the global promotion and protection of human rights.

"Our approach has been centered on building capacity and strengthening human resources and infrastructure in alignment with the priorities of our partners — always upholding the principles of fiscal responsibility, transparency, and sustainability," he said. The Jaishankar said India's development partnerships with countries across the world reflects this commitment.

"At the same time, we have been firm and uncompromising in combating terrorism. India will always advocate zero tolerance for terrorism and call out any effort to normalize it," he said.

"We do not merely speak of Vasudhaiva Kutumbakam — the world as one family; we live by it. And today, more than ever, this perspective is urgently needed," he said. "The world continues to grapple with conflicts and crises, growing more fractured, uncertain, and unstable in the face of emerging challenges, even as it struggles to recover from the recent ones," he added.

Trust opposes SC over Centre's stand on Halal certification

The Jamiat Ulama-I-Hind Halal Trust has opposed in the Supreme Court on the Centre's submission over halal certification of non-meat products such as iron bars and cement, calling it "vexatious and scandalous". In a rejoinder filed in the top court, the Muslim certification body said the concept of halal was considered a basic requirement of "behaviour and lifestyle", which included eating habits and consumption in general of a very large community. It said halal certification related to the religious belief and practice of a large section of Indian citizenry and was protected under Articles 25 and 26 of the Constitution. While Article 25 deals with freedom of conscience and free profession, practice and propagation of religion, Article 26 prescribes freedom to manage religious affairs.

On January 20, the Centre raised the issue of halal certification of non-meat products such as iron bars and cement, asking why non-believers should be made to pay a higher cost for halal-certified products. Denying any such certification, the trust said, "It is submitted, in clear terms, that the petitioner (trust) has not issued any halal certification to iron bars or cement."

The trust further argued the choice of food, components used in preparing it, was the right of an individual or group of people protected by Articles 25 and 26 of the Constitution. "The state,

whether it is Central government or state government, cannot take away this liberty of an individual as to what material somebody is eating," it said.

It was a matter of an individual's right to be informed about the component used in edible products whether vegetarian or a non-vegetarian food, the trust said. "For instance, Tulsi water, or lipstick or biscuits with or without chocolate, packaged water bottles are projected to be as ridiculous expansion of halal certifications. The said criticism of ridicule is baseless and due to ignorance of fact in general public," the rejoinder added.

The trust said halal certification was also related to international trade and commerce. "As far as the allegation that certifying agencies charging the total collection in few lakh crores is concerned, this allegation again has been reported very widely, the source of which is the baseless oral instruction of the Central Government," it said.

The Centre, the rejoinder said, was aware of the financial statements of the trust as it was filed with the Income Tax and GST authorities. The matter related to the pleas challenging a notification prohibiting the manufacturing, storage, sale and distribution of food products with halal certification within Uttar Pradesh, except for items produced for export. The matter would come up in the week commencing March 24.

Cong slams Centre over US 'F-16 maintenance plan' for Pakistan

In the wake of US President Donald Trump reportedly allocating USD 397 million for Pakistan's F-16 fleet maintenance, the Congress on Tuesday questioned the Modi government's diplomatic strategy and called for a reassessment of India's foreign policy priorities to safeguard national interests.

Congress media and publicity department head Pawan Khera said the recent decision by President Trump to allocate USD 397 million for Pakistan's F-16 fleet maintenance raises critical questions about the Modi government's diplomatic efficacy. This move, reminiscent of the 2022 Biden administration's USD 450 million package for the same purpose, highlights a pattern of US military support to Pakistan, he said in a post on X.

Such actions potentially

compromise India's security interests, especially given the historical use of F-16s by Pakistan against India, Khera said. During the UPA years (2004-2014), India and the United States significantly deepened their strategic and defence cooperation across multiple domains, including military modernisation, technology transfer, nuclear energy, and counter-terrorism, he pointed out.

The robust diplomatic and strategic initiatives taken during the UPA years deepened India-US relations, strengthening India's defense capabilities and global influence, Khera asserted. Historically, the Congress has championed a balanced and proactive foreign policy, fostering non-alignment along with strategic autonomy, he said.

"Furthermore, recent defense negotiations have raised concerns. The proposal to acquire F-35 fighter jets from

the US has been met with criticism due to high costs and operational challenges. Elon Musk, for instance, has labelled the F-35 as 'junk', questioning its efficacy. "Additionally, Russia has offered to produce its advanced Su-57 jets in India, presenting a potentially more viable alternative," the Congress leader said. In light of these developments, it is imperative to question the Modi government's diplomatic strategy, Khera said.

Is there a comprehensive plan to address the implications of US military aid to Pakistan, he asked. How the Government intends to ensure that India's security concerns are not sidelined in the pursuit of high-value defence procurements, Khera further asked.

A reassessment of our foreign policy priorities, drawing from the Congress party's legacy of strategic foresight, is essential to safeguard national

interests, Khera asserted. In another post, Khera also posed five questions to the Modi government on reciprocal tariffs by the US. How the government plans to protect the interests of domestic farmers, who make up 45.76 per cent of the workforce, in light of potential increased imports from the US, he asked. "Will the government now consider changes in domestic policy, particularly the legalisation of MSP, to provide basic income support to Indian farmers? What assurances will the Indian government secure to prevent India from becoming a dumping ground for cheap US agricultural imports?" Khera said.

How does the government plan to safeguard the MSME sector, whose production will be severely impacted by costly exports and increased competition from foreign products, Khera further asked.

Centre extends concessions, incentives for Kashmir Valley employees for three years

The Centre has extended the package of concession and incentives for its employees working in the Kashmir Valley by three years, according to a personnel ministry order. The Valley comprises 10 districts — Anantnag, Baramulla, Budgam, Kupwara, Pulwama, Srinagar, Kulgam, Shopian, Ganderbal and Bandipora. It has been decided by the competent authority to extend the package of concessions/incentives to Central government employees working in the Kashmir Valley for a further period of three years with effect from August 1, 2024, the order issued by the ministry on Monday said. The package of incentives is uniformly applicable to all ministries, departments and public sector undertakings under the government of India, and they should

ensure strict adherence to the rates prescribed in the package, it said. The employees posted in the Valley have an option to move their families to a selected place of their choice in India at government expense, and transport allowance for the families is allowed as admissible in permanent transfer inclusive of the composite transfer grant at the rate of 80 per cent of last month's basic pay, the order said. Those employees who do not wish to move their families to a selected place of residence are paid per diem allowance of ₹141 per day for each day of attendance to compensate for any additional expense in transportation to and from office etc., it said. Department arrangements will be made for stay, security and transportation to the place of work for the employees, it said.

'Changed circumstances' may see better implementation of plans for Yamuna: SC

The Supreme Court on Tuesday observed that there might be better implementation of plans, such as cleaning of Yamuna river, in view of the "changed circumstances". The observation by a bench of Justices BR Gavai and Augustine George Masih assumes significance in the wake of the BJP unseating the Aam Aadmi Party government in Delhi in the recently-concluded assembly elections. The top court is hearing a suo motu case titled 'Remediation of polluted rivers' in which it

is dealing with the issue of contamination of Yamuna river. "I think with the changed circumstances now, there may be better implementation of plans," Justice Gavai said during the hearing. Senior advocate Meenakshi Arora, who's assisting the apex court as an amicus curiae, said earlier that the National Green Tribunal (NGT) was monitoring the issue concerning Yamuna river through a committee. She said after the top court took suo motu cognisance of the matter in January 2021, the tribunal disbanded the

committee. The bench observed that it appeared there were some other petitions concerning pollution in Yamuna river, which were pending before another bench of the apex court. It asked additional solicitor

general Aishwarya Bhati, who appeared for the Centre, to find out from the authorities as to whether there were any other petitions pending with regard to the same issue. The bench posted the matter for hearing after the Holi vacation.

The amicus said the NGT had passed several orders, giving directions from time to time regarding various compliances to be met with regard to Yamuna river. She said the monitoring committee constituted by the tribunal was supervising what was being done between Haryana and Delhi regarding the setting up of sewage treatment plants and common effluent treatment plants. "Should we send it back to the NGT," the bench asked. The amicus suggested this might be better monitored by the NGT. The bench observed that all

these matters can be consolidated. "You take instructions if the NGT can monitor it or we can get it monitored through a CEC (central empowered committee), if you all agree on that," the bench said. On January 13, 2021, the apex court took cognisance of contamination of rivers by sewage effluent and observed that pollution-free water forms a basic right under the Constitutional framework and a welfare state is "bound" to ensure the same. The top court had said it would first take up the issue of contamination of Yamuna river.

French firm accuses MMRDA officials of graft

French firm Systra which provides consultancy services to metro projects has accused officials of the Mumbai Metropolitan Region Development Authority (MMRDA) of corruption, even as the Bombay High Court on Tuesday quashed MMRDA's notice terminating the contract of its Indian subsidiary. On November 12, 2024, the French Embassy wrote a letter to Rupinder Singh, Resident Commissioner of Maharashtra in Delhi, requesting the government to study the issue "in depth" and "resolve the situation", while citing Systra's complaint to the embassy about "severe harassment and challenges being faced while working as a general consultant on projects with MMRDA." While senior officials of MMRDA, the planning and development agency of the state government, were not available for commenting on the issue, Shiv Sena (UBT) leader Aaditya Thackeray demanded that Chief Minister Devendra Fadnis order an

inquiry. The multinational engineering firm accused MMRDA officials of seeking "undue favours", as well as delaying payments, pressuring the firm to inflate orders to contractors, stalling approvals for key staff, and imposing arbitrary penalties. On Tuesday, a bench of Chief Justice Alok Aradhe and Justice Arif Doctor of the high court noted that the MMRDA did not give reasons while discontinuing the services of Systra MVA Consulting (India) Private Ltd on January 3, 2025. As per Systra's complaint that the Embassy sent to the Maharashtra government, "major harassment began in August 2023 after the change of some senior MMRDA officials, who summoned the company and asked for undue favours in the form of monetary benefits on the pretext that MMRDA is demanding it." Systra "politely informed" them that it would not comply, the letter said. Systra is working as a general consultant for various metro projects executed by MMRDA in Mumbai's metropolitan region including Metro

Lines 5, 6, 7A, 9, 10, and 12, in addition to providing detailed design consultancy services for Metro Lines 2A and 7, Mandale Depot, Kashi Depot, and branding guidelines for all Metro Lines of MMRDA. The MMRDA issued a notice of suspension of payments in January 2024, alleging various deficiencies related to old issues that had already been resolved concerning general consultancy services for Metro Lines 5, 6, 7A, and 9, the letter said. "Furthermore, Systra has been put under pressure to recommend an inflated variation order for one of the major contractors working on Line 9 of the project. Since we are not complying with this, we believe MMRDA is continuing the suspension of payments for General Consultancy Services for Lines 5, 9, and 7A (civil projects)," the letter alleged. MMRDA had "stopped making payments," with the pending payments accumulating to ₹30 Crore, the complaint said, alleging pressure to certify payments for petty contractors appointed directly by MMRDA. Despite repeated attempts, the

MMRDA spokesperson did not provide any comment on the issue. As per the petition filed by Systra MVA Consulting (India) Private Limited in the Bombay High Court challenging the termination of its contract, it was appointed a general consultant for design, assistance in procurement, construction, management and supervision of three routes of Mumbai Metro - Thane-Bhiwandi-Kalyan, Andheri-CSIA and Mira Bhayander - in 2021. While the initial contract was to expire on November 2024, it was extended till December 2026. But on January 3, 2025, the MMRDA issued the company a notice, stating it had decided to discontinue its services. The firm then moved the HC. "We find that the action of the MMRDA in discontinuation of the terms of the contract, which was extended up to December 2026, without assigning any reasons, is arbitrary, unfair and unreasonable," the HC said in the order on Tuesday. "The general conditions of the

contract cannot be read to mean that the MMRDA has a license to act unfairly, arbitrarily or unreasonably in the contractual field without assigning reasons," the court said, asking the MMRDA to take a fresh decision after hearing the company. Sena (UBT) leader and former minister Aaditya Thackeray targeted Deputy Chief Minister Eknath Shinde - who heads the rival Shiv Sena - over the issue. The MMRDA comes under Shinde's Urban Development department. "The mind the regime scams are coming out. We have been raising many since 2022 mid. While India and France get closer diplomatically, the @MMRDAOfficial run by Eknath Shinde's Urban Development department, rubbishes concerns of corruption raised by the French consultant," he said. "I urge @CMOMaharashtra to launch an open, free and fair inquiry into this issue. Find out the source of corruption- which character close to corrupt mantri indulged in this?" Thackeray added.

Kerala youth slaughters family, lover

Most horrific scenes unfolded as police entered the crime scenes in three locations in and around Venjaramoodu in Thiruvananthapuram district, where a 23-year-old man allegedly killed five people - his brother, grandmother, paternal uncle, aunt, and a young woman said to be his lover, on Monday. The body of Farsana, a post-graduate student at a college in Kollam and reportedly the girlfriend of Afan, the accused in the Venjaramoodu mass murder case, was found sitting on a chair, with a pool of blood on the floor beneath her head. According to visuals from the crime scene, she had a massive injury on her forehead, reportedly caused by a heavy hammer blow, and she may have been killed by that single blow, without even having time to slump down from the chair. He appeared to have struck her several more times with the hammer, as her face was disfigured. A beautiful photograph of Afan can be seen in the background, placed on the table beside where Farsana's body was found, with several blood droplets splattered on it. Police officials said what they witnessed was one of the most brutal assaults Kerala has seen in recent years. Afan, who always had a very close bond with his younger brother Afsan (13), allegedly

struck him multiple times on the head with a hammer, killing his beloved brother on the spot, police said. Afan's paternal uncle Latheef was the most cruelly attacked. According to the police, Afan allegedly struck Latheef on the head with a hammer more than 20 times, literally shattering his skull. Latheef's body was found on a chair in the drawing room. Latheef's wife, Sajitha, who was in the kitchen preparing tea for Afan, was allegedly attacked from behind with multiple blows from a hammer. Her body was found lying near the kitchen, police said. "It was difficult to identify the victims as they were all covered in blood. When we lifted Latheef, someone's fingers went inside his head through a huge hole at the back of his skull," a neighbour, recounting the horrifying scenes at the murder site said. Afan's murderous streak displayed psychotic patterns as he scattered several ₹500 notes around the body of his younger brother, Afsan, after hammering him to death. Afan had taken Afsan home, telling him that he had brought Kuzhimanthi, an Arabian meat-rice dish, for him. Their mother, Shemi (55), who was pulled to the floor and attacked with a hammer, is undergoing treatment at a medical college hospital. Although the police have not officially revealed the sequence of events, sources within the force suspect that

Afan began his killing spree with his paternal grandmother, Salma Beevi (88), at her house in Pangode near Venjaramoodu. Police sources believe that Afan took a hammer with him when he went to Salma Beevi's house. He killed her and then proceeded to the house of Latheef and Sajitha in Chullalam. They suspect that after murdering Latheef and Sajitha, the accused took his brother Afsan home from school. Police sources also believe that he had earlier picked up Farsana and dropped her at his home. He then allegedly attacked his mother first, followed by his brother and his girlfriend. Before heading to the police station, Afan left the LPG valve open, intending to cause an explosion if anyone entered the house at night, police said. Locals who saw Afan between the murders told the police that he appeared unfazed and showed no signs of distress. After committing all these murders, Afan calmly walked to the police station and informed officers that he had assaulted six people in three locations, adding that they would all be dead by now. Investigating officials say that Afan was a drug abuser and have obtained evidence to support this. However, the specific drug he used and whether he was under its influence during the massacres are yet to be confirmed.

Akhilesh slams Centre on stock markets collapse

Samajwadi Party chief Akhilesh Yadav on Tuesday launched a scathing attack on the BJP-led Centre over the continuous decline in Indian stock markets, claiming investments of the middle class had been wiped out. The Kannauj MP also accused the government of "misleading people" while failing to protect domestic investors. Yadav said in a post on X, "The ongoing decline in the Indian stock markets has devoured the investments of the middle class. The 'double-engine' governments, which are in a race to invite investors from across the world, should first ensure the safety of their own investors before hosting 'deceptive events' to reassure others." Due to the continuous poor performance of the Nifty over the past few months, reports have emerged that the Indian

stock markets have become the third weakest among emerging markets after Thailand and the Philippines this year, he said in Hindi. "On one hand, 80 Crore people are forced to survive on government ration and, on the other, those who invested their savings in stocks have been left bankrupt. Even in such dire conditions, the BJP government continues to mislead and manipulate people with false claims. This economic fraud must stop," the former Uttar Pradesh chief minister said. "Investors are saying today: No more BJP!" Yadav added. Yadav's comments come amid concerns over the performance of the Indian stock markets, which have seen fluctuations in recent months. The Sensex tanked 1.14 per cent to settle at 74,454.41 points on Monday while the Nifty fell 1.06 per cent to 22,553.35 points.

BJP expels 58 leaders in Haryana

Most of the outgoing councillors of the BJP were upset after they were denied the party's ticket for elections. Many of them have come into the fray as indepen-

dents and have contested. "The candidates contesting as rebels are calling themselves party candidates. We received complaints related to the matter. People should not be fooled by them. Such people are spreading confusion. The one who contests elections on the party symbol is the party candidate," Kamal Yadav, BJP district president said. The list, released by the BJP, featured names including former mayor Vimal Yadav his wife and former councillor Rimple Yadav, former deputy mayor Parminder Kataria, Avnish Raghav Khandas, (district secretary), Rakesh Yadav Fazilpur, Praveen Mohan Lal Kaushik ji, the following BJP workers who are contesting elections against the party and are involved in anti-party activities, are expelled from the BJP for six years and their primary membership is terminated with immediate effect. Other names in the list were Sahab Ram (Lilu Sarpanch), Inderjeet Yadav, Rakesh Yadav,

Gurugram police finds bullet-ridden bodies in hotel room

In a shocking incident, the Gurugram police found bullet-ridden bodies of a man and woman in a hotel room located on the Delhi-Jaipur Expressway on Tuesday, police said. However, police preliminary investigation suggests that it could be a case of suicide. The victims were identified as Komal (21), a resident of Shikohpur village in Gurugram, and Nikhil (23), a resident of Lokri village in the Pataudi area. Police received information about the bodies lying in a room of Hotel Haveli, Manesar and immediately rushed to the spot. The bodies were sent to post-mortem after they were discovered in the hotel room. Police said on Tuesday, an Emergency Response Vehicle (ERV) of the Gurugram police received information that Komal on Monday had gone to give an exam but did not return home till night. The girl was later located in Hotel Haveli. Upon information, the ERV police team reached the spot, where the girl's family members were also present. The ERV team immediately informed the police team of police station Manesar about the incident. Meanwhile, the hotel staff said that one boy and one girl were staying in room number 303 on the second floor. The ERV team and police station team, along with the hotel staff and the girl's family, found the girl and a boy lying dead on the bed inside a locked room number 303 of the hotel. "They both had one bullet wound on their chest, and one country-made pistol 315 bore was also found in the room. The police team called the police teams of scene-of-crime, FSL, dog-squad, fingerprint to the spot and got the spot inspected," Sandeep Kumar, spokesperson of the Gurugram police said.

Bihar Chief Minister Nitish Kumar's son Nishant on Tuesday hoped that the JD(U), headed by his father, would improve its performance in the Assembly polls due later this year, as compared with 2020, when it lost the status of senior NDA partner in the state. In his most candid conversation with the press so far, the reclusive 47-year-old urged the people to vote for the party and asked the cadre to pull up its socks, while keeping cards close to the chest on speculations about his own entry into politics. He was mobbed by journalists at the memorial of his mother Manju Sinha, where he had come with his father to pay tributes on her birth anniversary. The normally reticent Nishant broke into a wide grin when asked about the use of the word "laadla" (dear) for his father by Prime Minister Narendra Modi the day before. "Of course, he would say so. Both of them are alliance partners," said the CM's son,

unfazed by the contention of many opposition leaders here that the PM had belittled the JD(U) supremo by using a colloquial expression normally reserved for children. "I want to appeal to the people of the state, especially the youth, to vote in greater numbers for the party this time. In 2020, the JD(U) got only 43 seats, still development work continued under my father. To ensure that progress continues with the same speed, the tally should improve," he added. Notably,

memories of the assembly polls of 2020 have been like a proverbial sore thumb for the JD(U) which saw its tally crash in the 243-strong assembly, for which the blame was pinned on the revolt of Chirag Paswan, the then LJP president. Paswan had fielded candidates, many of them BJP rebels, in all seats contested by the JD(U). While the BJP tried to mend fences by insisting that Kumar continue as CM despite his party winning fewer seats, relations between the two alliance part-

ners continued to sour, culminating in the JD(U) supremo's exit from the NDA in 2022. Kumar thereafter went on to forge a nationwide "opposition unity", vowing to dislodge the BJP from power, which resulted in the formation of the INDIA bloc, but did yet another volte-face last year just ahead of the Lok Sabha elections when he returned to the NDA. Short of a majority in the Lok Sabha, the BJP is now dependent on JD(U) and Andhra Pradesh Chief Minister Chandrababu Naidu's TDP to survive in power and Nishant hoped his father "would be declared the chief ministerial candidate by the NDA" and continue to occupy the top post after the elections. He also, "I would urge members of our party that they fan out and apprise the people of the efforts made by my father in the last 19 years." He also laughed off the suggestion of Tej Pratap Yadav, the elder son of RJD supremo Lalu Prasad, that he join the opposition party, saying, "It is for the people to decide who should be on which side."

TMC leader removed from local body over fake identity

Lovely Khatun, a Bangladeshi woman who had infiltrated into Indian territory, before faking her identity to eventually become an elected representative from the Trinamool Congress in Malda district of North Bengal, has been stripped off her post, district administration has reported. The Sub-divisional Officer of Chanchal has removed Khatun from her post and for the time being deputy Pradhan will discharge her responsibilities, officials said. The incident further bolsters BJP's infiltration claim and changing demographic pattern of the State, party leaders said. Lovely Khatun alias Nasia Sheikh who was elected as the Panchayat Pradhan - considered hugely powerful position in Bengal's grassroots level of Rashidabad gram panchayat in Harishchandrapur block of Malda district in 2023 rural elections slipped into India some eight years back, sources said adding once in India she quickly faked her name and that of her parents and joined the TMC.

She managed Indian documents within months thanks to a group of local party men, insiders said. She not only managed Indian Aadhar, and voter cards but also secured an OBC certificate to file her nomination. "Her oratory and other skills got into the closest coterie of the district leadership wherefrom she managed to get a party ticket," a block level party leader requesting anonymity said. Even as Lovely witnessed a meteoric rise both politically and financially Rehana Sultana a contesting candidate who had lost out to the Khatun filed a petition in the Calcutta High Court questioning her credentials. Sources said Rehana was the official nominee of the TMC but lost to Lovely's manipulating skills. According to Rehana, "The election was rigged out and out, signatures were forged and shewas allowed to obtain the winning certificate with the help of some TMC leaders and a section of the district administration. This is why I was forced to move the Court." What made the matter significant that despite repeated summons Khatun managed to avoid appearance in the High

Court. A local CPI(M) leader said, "She is not the only one. At least two hundred other infiltrators who had come to India between 2015 and 2023 are still moving around with fake identity cards. Let alone the locals even the political workers like others would not raise the issue lest we are murdered. The administration is just looking the other way." Curiously however TMC sources said that Khatun had initially won on a Congress ticket backed by the Left and soon after winning the elections she joined the TMC. Referring to the Tuesday's development BJP State leader Jagannath Sarkar said that "Lovely Khatun's case only goes on to bolster the BJP's infiltration claims. She is not the only one. There are thousands of similar people who have infiltrated India and have been living here obtaining fake documents. They are changing the demographic pattern of the region and the Government is sitting idle. My question is whether after her removal the Government will act and identify the people that helped her in getting fake documents and Indian citizenship."

Earthquake rocks Kolkata

The Kolkata on Tuesday morning woke up to a reasonable jolt after an earthquake measuring 5.1 hit southern Bengal and adjoining areas at about 6.10 am, IMD sources said. Though the epicenter of the quake was more than 300 km away and about 91 km beneath the bed of Bay of Bengal its tremors were felt in large parts of Odisha and southern Bengal, sources said. Tremors triggered panic in Kolkata though there were no reports of immediate damage in the city and its surrounding areas. "I felt a tremor and watched the ceiling fan sway, and was off balanced a bit. My head was reeling and initially I thought it could be because of migraine. But then I got alerts of an earthquake from my

friends," Basanti a homemaker from Tollygunge said. Kolkata traditionally falls under seismic zone three and has been gradually progressing towards seismic zone four on account of huge drawing of subsoil water and unplanned urbanisation, Jadavpur University professor said. A fault passes beneath and through Kolkata but that was not the cause of the earthquake, sources said. There are four seismic zones with zone five being the most and zone two the least active. Around 11 per cent of the country falls in zone five, 18 per cent in zone four, 30 per cent in zone three, and the remaining in zone two. While zone five marks maximum susceptibility being in zone four too is of concern. Zone three and zone two are relatively of moderate rate in terms of tremors.

Kumbh Mela area turned to no vehicle zone

The Maha Kumbh mela area will be a no-vehicle zone from 4 pm on Tuesday, with the entire Prayagraj following suit from 6 pm onwards in view of the massive influx of devotees for the last special bathing date coinciding with Mahashivratri on February 26. Authorities have imposed these restrictions to ensure smooth crowd movement. However, vehicles carrying essentials will be exempted, according to an official statement. The administration has urged all visitors to comply with the guidelines and cooperate with officials, according to the statement issued by the Mela Police. "Devotees should bathe only at the nearest designated ghats based on their entry points. Those arriving from the Dakshini Jhansi route should

use Arail Ghat, while those from the Uttari Jhansi route should head to Harishchandra Ghat and Old GT Ghat. Pande Kshetra entrants have been directed to Bharadwaj Ghat, Nagavasu Ghat, Mori Ghat, Kali Ghat, Ram Ghat, and Hanuman Ghat. Devotees coming through the Arail sector should use Arail Ghat for bathing," it stated. "Essential services, including the transport of milk, vegetables, medicines, fuel, and emergency vehicles, will not be restricted. Government personnel such as doctors, police officers, and administrative staff will also have free movement," it added. February 26 marks both the concluding snan of the Maha Kumbh mela and the festival of Mahashivratri. In view of this, devotees are advised to bathe at their nearest ghats and offer prayers at

local Shiva temples to prevent overcrowding at major pilgrimage sites, the statement read. "To control the massive gathering, pontoon bridges will be managed based on crowd density. Officials have urged devotees to avoid unnecessary movement and return to their destinations promptly after completing rituals," it stated. The mela police administration has appealed to all visitors to follow these instructions and help maintain order during the grand religious event. Being held after 12 years, this Maha Kumbh mela started on January 13 and culminates on February 26. The mega fair has recorded a footfall of over 63 Crore pilgrims and visitors, according to the Uttar Pradesh government.

Liberty is sacrosanct

The Supreme Court's directive affirming bail as the norm and emphasising liberty is a welcome step

The Supreme Court in a recent ruling and observation made a very pertinent precedence that could have far-reaching implications in the functioning of the democracy. The Supreme Court in the case of Kailash Kumar vs State of Himachal Pradesh wherein it set aside a High Court order cancelling the bail of an accused has rooted for individual's liberty. This ruling underscore the judiciary's commitment to protect personal liberty and ensuring that courts do not meddle with individual's right to freedom. Liberty is a cornerstone of the Indian Constitution, protected under Article 21, which states that no person shall be deprived of life or personal liberty except according to the procedure established by law. Bail, in this context, serves as a safeguard against arbitrary detention and ensures that an accused remains free unless proven guilty. The Supreme Court has consistently held that bail should be the norm and jail the exception, especially when the accused does not pose a threat to the legal process. The Supreme Court, while overturning the High Court's decision, made critical observations regarding the protection of personal liberty.

The Supreme Court's ruling aligns with a broader judicial philosophy that bail is a right and should not be treated as a privilege granted at the discretion of the courts. The idea is that pre-trial detention should not be punitive but rather a measure to ensure the accused's presence at trial. In numerous judgements, the Court has clarified that unless there is compelling evidence of misconduct, denying bail would violate an individual's fundamental rights. However, courts must balance the rights of the accused with the interests of justice and the safety of society. The Supreme Court's reaffirmation that bail is a fundamental right serves as a significant reminder to lower courts to uphold personal liberty. The judiciary must ensure that bail decisions are guided by legal principles rather than subjective interpretations of the accused's culpability. The growing threat of radicalisation of Central Asia

The rise of extremist ideologies among Central Asian youth has become a critical security concern, exacerbated by economic hardship and geopolitical conflicts

In recent years, the increasing attraction of Central Asian youth to extremist and Takfiri groups has become a significant security concern for regional governments and international experts. The ongoing Russia-Ukraine conflict has only intensified these concerns, with reports indicating that young migrant workers are being recruited for extremist activities, a pattern reminiscent of the recruitment seen during the conflicts in Syria and Iraq.

The emergence of the Turan Battalion, a group of Turkic-speaking Central Asians fighting alongside Ukrainian forces against Russia, highlights the pressing need to address radicalisation among young people. At the same time, extremist propaganda spread by figures such as Idas Sadeghovich has contributed to the rising tide of radicalism, further complicating the region's security landscape.

The radicalisation of Central Asian youth stems from a combination of social, economic and political factors that make them vulnerable to extremist narratives. Economic hardship is one of the most significant drivers, particularly in countries like Kyrgyzstan and Tajikistan, where persistent poverty, high unemployment, and limited socio-economic opportunities push young people toward alternative ideologies. Over three decades of independence, Kyrgyzstan has experienced multiple coups, widespread corruption, and growing dissatisfaction with the secular governance model.

Many young people, disillusioned with their governments, seek a sense of purpose and community in extremist ideologies that not only provide identity but often come with financial incentives. Migration also plays a critical role in this radicalisation process. Millions of Central Asians migrate to Russia for work, where they frequently face exploitation, legal difficulties and social alienation. The absence of integration programs and social support leaves them vulnerable to extremist recruiters who exploit their grievances and isolation. These recruiters present extremist ideology as a means of empowerment and justice, a dangerous proposition that finds traction



among individuals struggling to navigate foreign environments with little institutional support. Religious education, or the lack thereof, is another crucial factor in the rise of extremism. In countries like Tajikistan, where Islamic teachings are heavily restricted and even prohibited for individuals under 18, a significant knowledge vacuum has emerged.

This vacuum is quickly filled by extremist propaganda, often disseminated via social media. Many young Tajik migrant workers in Russia rely on online content to shape their religious understanding, unknowingly consuming distorted interpretations of Islam that align with extremist beliefs. This unchecked exposure to radical ideologies fuels the rapid spread of extremist sentiment within vulnerable communities. Kazakhstan presents a unique case where extremist ideologies have infiltrated even the highest levels of power.

Salafi groups, for instance, gained traction with backing from influential figures such as General Kairat Satybaldy, making the fight against radicalisation more challenging. The entrenchment of these ideologies within powerful circles emboldens extremist sympathisers and complicates government efforts to dismantle radical networks. The rise of social media has dramatically accelerated the spread of extremist propa-

ganda. Extremist groups have mastered the use of digital platforms to reach and recruit young people, leveraging engaging content that is often more accessible and persuasive than state-backed religious teachings. Many of these online materials promise a sense of belonging, purpose, and spiritual rewards, making the path to radicalisation dangerously appealing. Experts emphasise that without a strong digital counter-narrative, governments and moderate religious leaders will continue to struggle in preventing the indoctrination of young minds.

The psychological manipulation employed by extremist groups goes beyond simple recruitment, leading some individuals to commit acts of violence, including suicide attacks. The belief that martyrdom ensures a direct path to heaven is a powerful motivator, and extremist groups exploit feelings of injustice, social exclusion, and spiritual ignorance to persuade young people to sacrifice themselves for a perceived greater cause. By manipulating these vulnerabilities, these groups create a mindset in which violence is not only justified but seen as a divine mission.

Governments in Central Asia have responded to this growing threat with various strategies, though with mixed success. Initial measures included mass arrests and harsh prison sentences, particularly in

Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan, and Uzbekistan. However, this approach has often backfired, as prisons have become breeding grounds for further radicalisation. Inmates exposed to extremist ideologies behind bars frequently emerge more radicalised than before, exacerbating the problem rather than solving it. Recognising the limitations of purely repressive measures, some governments have turned to religious reforms as a more effective means of combating extremism. Uzbekistan, for example, has eased restrictions on religious practices, allowing the call to prayer from loudspeakers and providing greater freedom for Islamic education. These initiatives have had a noticeable impact, significantly reducing extremist recruitment within the country by offering legitimate avenues for religious expression. Education is widely regarded as one of the most effective tools in preventing radicalisation. Experts stress the importance of integrating religious education into school curricula to provide young people with a correct understanding of Islamic principles. Only through a holistic and sustained effort can Central Asian nations protect their youth from extremist influences and work toward a more stable and peaceful future.

Our generation's greatest contribution might be our ability to bridge opposing worldviews. We're creating a new paradigm of family dynamics, blending the two

Remember when we trembled at the sound of our father clearing his throat? When "because I said so" was an unassailable argument, and questioning authority was as foreign as the smartphones that would one day rule our lives? We, the Generation X, find ourselves in an extraordinary position today - delicately balanced between reverential traditions and revolutionary change, between "yes, papa" and "ok, dude." Our generation has witnessed perhaps the most dramatic transformation in human history. We are the last ones who know what it feels like to run home to catch a TV show, to memorise phone numbers, to write letters that took weeks to reach their destination. We're also the first to navigate the brave new world of social media, digital parenting and a workplace that transforms faster than we can update our LinkedIn profiles. The contrast is stark. We grew up in homes where children were to be seen, not heard. Today, we raise children who not only want to be heard but expect to be consulted on family decisions,



from dinner choices to vacation plans. We find ourselves caught in an amusing dance - instinctively reaching for the authoritarian patterns we inherited, then quickly pivoting to accommodate the more egalitarian expectations of modern parenting. This balancing act becomes even more complex as we care for our aging parents while raising our children. Our parents, products of an era where respect was non-negotiable and tradition was sacrosanct, often struggle to understand why their grandchildren question everything, from religious practices to gender roles. We become translators of sorts, explaining to our parents why their grandchildren need mental health days, while simultaneously trying to teach our children why touching their grandmother's

feet isn't just an empty ritual. The technological revolution has added another layer to this generational sandwich. While we pride ourselves on mastering email and Facebook, our children roll their eyes at our confused attempts to understand TikTok algorithms or cryptocurrency. Meanwhile, we spend weekends teaching our parents how to make video calls or use digital payment apps. We are the bridge generation, fluent in both analog and digital, traditional and modern, hierarchy and equality.

Our generation has had to rewrite the rulebook of life multiple times. The career advice we received - "join a good company and stay loyal" - seems quaint in an age where our children talk about side hustles and personal branding. The values we were taught - sacrifice, stability, saving for tomorrow - clash with the modern emphasis on self-care, work-life balance, and living in the moment. Perhaps the most challenging aspect is managing the emotional landscape. We were raised to believe that mental health issues were character

flaws, that anxiety was just weakness, and that depression could be cured by "going out for a walk." Now, we find ourselves unlearning these notions, supporting our children's therapy journeys, while also gently helping our parents understand that their grandchild's panic attacks are not just "attention-seeking behaviour."

The irony isn't lost on us. The same generation that was told "log kya kahenge" (what will people say) now has to defend their children's right to be themselves, regardless of what people say. We who learned to suppress our emotions now have to validate our children's feelings while managing our parents' disapproval of this "oversensitive" approach. Yet, there's a unique strength in being this sandwich generation. We understand both worlds intimately. We can appreciate our parents' wisdom while embracing our children's progressive ideas. We can see how tradition provides roots while change enables growth.

Shiv is an experience. This experience begins at the feet of the Guru and unfolds as per the capacity of the sadhak. Ravan composed the Shiv Tandav Stotram to describe it. Adi Shankaracharya said 'na paapam, na punyam, na saukham, na daukham...' to describe what it's not. These were the Shiv sadhaks of finest quality, a rare phenomenon. What they described was their experience of Shiv; Shiv however is beyond description, for what is limitless cannot be bound in words and meanings. So no amount of reading and writing can grant you the experience, to get that experience you need to tread the path of sadhana, under a Guru.

The first experience of Shiv is the Shakti of Guru. As you walk the path shown by Guru, something that you want manifests in your life. It could be health, relationship, job etc. That becomes your experience of the Shiv tatva - that which has manifested the un-manifested. There are as many examples of such manifestations at Dhyana Ashram in present times as there are narratives from the past of sadhaks who were able to get the boon they desired.

That 'boon' or manifested desire, however, is only an aspect of Shiv. 90 per cent of the people were satisfied with the experience and their focus shifted from Shiv to that 'thing' that they wanted. So the experience of Shiv for them gets limited to that. A thousand names of Shiv, stem from here. Those who don't let their focus shift, move further into the dimension of Shiv. Next, the subtler siddhis of yog start manifesting - clairvoyance, clairaudience, premonition, extrasensory perceptions etc. Many take this to be the ultimate and end their experience here. They immerse themselves in the siddhis and powers so acquired and forget that this too is just an aspect.



The finer sadhaks progress ahead where they start interacting with the energies that run creation, aiding and assisting them in the process of Creation. Mentioned above are just some siddhis, the domain of Shiv however is endless. The key to accessing it is vairagya (detachment). The moment one gets attached to any aspect of Shiv or Siddhi that it bestows, the upward progression stops. Vairagya is possible only when one has the gyan of reality and gyan is possible only when one can sit in dhyana. Dhyana happens only when one has accumulated good karmas, which are acquired from seva or service. Seva is the first step. It is through seva that one increases the size of their container or the experience of Shiv that one can hold.

This Shivratri, embark on the journey to increasing the size of your container... to experience Shiv. Shiv is real, not a myth. Shiv is all-encompassing. All are accepted in the abode of Shiv - bhoot, pret, pisach, yaksh, kinnar, naag, dev, danav and humans. You don't have to be of a special caste to experience the various dimensions of Shiv. Shivratri is the night of Shiv and Shakti, the night of merger, the night of completeness. Guru, on the night of Shivratri, awakens the power of Shiv and Shakti in each and everyone who follows the path shown, without exceptions. In my journey of 25 years,

I have yet to come across a sadhak who under Guru Sanidhya has not experienced Shiv. The seva and sadhana performed on this night grant one the experiences and siddhis of many lifetimes, in just one night. It is a 100 per cent science, not a religion. Try and test it for yourself.

Maha Kumbh 2025: A grand confluence of tradition, technology and transformation

IIT Kanpur research highlights how government initiatives are shaping the Mela—blending ancient traditions with modern infrastructure to enhance accessibility and efficiency

The Maha Kumbh Mela in Prayagraj draws millions of pilgrims worldwide to the sacred confluence of the Ganga, Yamuna and Saraswati rivers. As this grand spiritual event unfolds, an ongoing IIT Kanpur study provides real-time insights into stakeholder experiences. This research examines how government initiatives shape pilgrim experiences, blending ancient traditions with modern technology.

For devotees, the Mela remains a deeply spiritual journey, with bathing in the Triveni Sangam seen as a path to salvation. While age-old rituals and processions inspire awe, an extensive logistical network operates behind the scenes to manage massive crowds. A key focus of the study is

transportation. With pilgrims arriving from across India and abroad, the government's commitment to improving accessibility is evident. Nearly 40 per cent of attendees rely on public transportation, primarily trains and buses. Despite expanded shuttle services and improved parking facilities, feedback is mixed. While most find transportation satisfactory,

some report overcrowding and delays during peak hours. A hallmark of Maha Kumbh 2025 is its technological integration, earning it the title "Digital Maha Kumbh." Mobile apps, e-wallets, and real-time crowd monitoring enhance the experience for pilgrims and organisers. Many appreciate online registration, virtual darshan booking, and real-time updates on crowd density, transport, and amenities.

These tools streamline accessibility, particularly for international visitors and those from remote areas. However, bridging the digital divide remains a challenge. While tech-savvy pilgrims adapt easily, older attendees and those from rural regions often struggle with digital platforms.

Some report difficulties using smartphones or accessing the internet, highlighting the need for alternative engagement methods. Feedback underscores the importance of inclusive communication strategies blending digital and traditional approaches.

Security and crowd management are also key concerns. Managing millions of attendees in Kumbh Mela is a massive undertaking. The government has deployed extensive security personnel, CCTV surveillance, and designated safe zones, including lifeguard-staffed bathing areas. Nearly 93 per cent of respondents feel secure within the Mela's vast grounds, affirming these measures' effectiveness. However, congestion near ghats causes anxiety among some pilgrims,



emphasizing the need for refined crowd management as the event progresses. Health and sanitation remain top priorities. Overall, 81 per cent of respondents find sanitation facilities adequate, reflecting high satisfaction with cleanliness. Temporary medical camps and mobile health units ensure pilgrims' wellbeing, yet restroom overcrowding persists during peak

hours. Despite thousands of cleaning staff and waste management facilities, additional measures are needed to maintain hygiene during busy periods. These findings highlight commendable efforts while emphasising the need for continued improvements.

Inclusivity is also a focus, with the government enhancing accessibility for differently-abled individuals and senior citizens. Dedicated pathways, toilets, and designated spaces reflect a commitment to inclusive participation. The widely appreciated 'Lost and Found' services further ease concerns, helping separated families navigate the crowd more efficiently. Environmental impact remains a major concern. The government has introduced eco-friendly initiatives, includ-

ing waste segregation, solar-powered lighting and over 25,000 trash bins to reduce the ecological footprint.

Despite these efforts, concerns persist over plastic use and non-biodegradable waste. While 62 per cent of respondents recognise sustainability progress, stronger awareness campaigns and stricter enforcement of eco-friendly practices are needed.

The ongoing study suggests green initiatives must be reinforced through greater public education on waste management and sustainability. As the IIT Kanpur study continues to document stakeholder experiences, the Maha Kumbh Mela 2025 is a testament to the evolving nature of large-scale spiritual events. Government initiatives have improved effi-

ciency, security, and inclusivity. Stakeholder feedback highlights the need to refine transportation, expand digital inclusion, enhance crowd management, and address environmental concerns.

The success of the Mela hinges not only on preserving spiritual traditions but also on integrating modern infrastructure, technology, and inclusive governance. More than a massive gathering, the Maha Kumbh exemplifies how government initiatives can transform spiritual events into safer, more efficient, and enriching experiences. As it unfolds, it remains a dynamic confluence of tradition, technology and inclusive governance.

Desperation grows in northern Gaza

Palestinians struggle to rebuild homes

When night falls over northern Gaza, much of the cityscape of collapsed buildings and piled wreckage turns pitch black. Living inside the ruins of their home, Rawia Tambora's young sons get afraid of the dark, so she turns on a flashlight and her phone's light to comfort them, for as long as the batteries last. Displaced for most of the 16-month-long war, Tambora is back in her house. But it is still a frustrating shell of a life, she says: There is no running water, electricity, heat or services, and no tools to clear the rubble around them. Nearly 6,00,000 Palestinians flooded back into northern Gaza under the now month-old ceasefire in Gaza, according to the United Nations. After initial relief and joy at being back at their homes — even if damaged or destroyed — they now face the reality of living in the wreckage for the foreseeable future. "Some people wish the war had never ended, feeling it would have been better to be killed," Tambora said. "I don't know what we'll do long-term. My

brain stopped planning for the future." The six-week ceasefire is due to end Saturday, and it's uncertain what will happen next. There are efforts to extend the calm as the next phase is negotiated. If fighting erupts again, those who returned to the north could find themselves once again in the middle of it. **A massive rebuilding job has no way to start:** A report last week by the World Bank, UN and European Union estimated it will cost some USD 53 billion to rebuild Gaza after entire neighbourhoods were decimated by Israel's bombardment and offensives against Hamas militants. At the moment, there is almost no capacity or funding to start significant rebuilding. A priority is making Gaza immediately livable. Earlier in February, Hamas threatened to hold up hostage releases unless more tents and temporary shelters were allowed into Gaza. It then reversed and accelerated hostage releases after Israel agreed to let in mobile homes and construction equipment. Humanitarian agencies have stepped up services, setting up free kitchens and water delivery stations, and distributing tents and tarps to hundreds of thousands across Gaza, according to the UN. President Donald Trump turned up the pressure by call-

ing for the entire population of Gaza to be removed permanently so the US can take over the territory and redevelop it for others. Rejecting the proposal, Palestinians say they want help to rebuild for themselves. Gaza City's municipality started fixing some water lines and clearing rubble from streets, said a spokesperson, Asem Alnabih. But it lacks heavy equipment. Only a few of its 40 bulldozers and five dump trucks still work, he said. Gaza is filled with over 50 million tons of rubble that would take 100 trucks working at full capacity over 15 years to clear away, the UN estimates. **Families try to get by day by day:** Tambora's house in the northern town of Beit Lahiya was destroyed by an airstrike early in the war, so she and her family lived in the nearby Indonesian Hospital, where she worked as a nurse. After the ceasefire, they moved back into the only room in her house that was semi-intact. The ceiling is partially collapsed, the walls are cracked; the surviving fridge and sink are useless with no water or electricity. They stack their sheets and blankets in a corner. Tambora said her 12-year-old son lugs heavy containers of water twice a day from distribution stations. They also have to find firewood for cooking. The influx of aid means there

is food in the markets and prices went down, but it remains expensive, she said. With the Indonesian Hospital too damaged to function, Tambora walks an hour each day to work at the Kamal Adwan Hospital. She charges her and her husband's phones using the hospital generator. Many of Tambora's relatives returned to find nothing left of their homes, so they live in tents on or next to the rubble that gets blown away by winter winds or flooded during rains, she said. Asmaa Dwaima and her family returned to Gaza City but had to rent an apartment because their home in the Tel al-Hawa neighbourhood was destroyed. It was only weeks after returning that she went to visit their four-story house, now a pile of flattened and burned wreckage. "I couldn't come here because I was afraid. I had an image of my house in my mind — its beauty, and warmth. ... I was afraid to face this truth," the 25-year-old dentist said. "They don't just destroy stone, they are destroying us and our identity." Her family had to rebuild the house once before, when it was levelled by airstrikes during a round of fighting between Israel and Hamas in 2014, she said. For the time being, they have no means to rebuild now. "We need to remove the rub-

ble because we want to pull out clothes and some of our belongings," she said. "We need heavy equipment ... There are no bricks or other construction tools and, if available, it's extremely expensive." **Desperation is growing:** Tess Ingram, a spokesperson with UNICEF who visited northern Gaza since the ceasefire, said the families she met are "grieving the lives that they used to live as they begin to rebuild." Their desperation, she said, "is becoming more intense." Huda Skaik, a 20-year-old student, is sharing a room with her three siblings and parents at her grandparents' house in Gaza City. It's an improvement from life in the tent camps of central Gaza where they were displaced for much of the war, she said. There, they had to live among strangers, and their tent was washed away by rain. At least here they have walls and are with family, she said. Before the war interrupted, Skaik had just started studying English literature at Gaza's Islamic University. She is now enrolled in online classes the university is organizing. But the internet is feeble, and her electricity relies on solar panels that don't always work. "The worst part is that we're just now grasping that we lost it all," she said. "The destruction is massive, but I'm trying to remain positive."

At least 6 infants in Gaza die from hypothermia

Palestinian medics say at least six infants have died from hypothermia in the last two weeks in the Gaza Strip, as a UN official warned that the Trump administration's suspension of funding to the World Health Organisation withheld money for critical operations in the territory. A fragile ceasefire that took hold last month paused 15 months of war between Israel and the Hamas militant group. But hundreds of thousands of people are still living in squalid tent camps or bombed-out buildings with little shelter from the cold, and temperatures have plunged in recent days. Dr Rik Peepkorn, the WHO representative for Occupied Palestinian Territories, said the funds suspension leaves six areas underfunded, including EMT operations, rehabilitation of health facilities, coordination with partner organisations and medical evacuations. Dr Ahmed al-Farah, head of the paediatric department at the Nasser Hospital in Khan Younis, told The Associated Press that it received the body of a two-month-old girl on Tuesday. He said another two infants were treated for frostbite, with one of them discharged. Saeed Saleh, of the

Patient's Friends Hospital in Gaza City, said five infants aged one month or younger have died from the cold over the last two weeks. Zaher al-Wahedi, head of the Gaza Health Ministry's records department, said it has recorded 15 deaths from hypothermia this winter. The territory on the Mediterranean coast experiences cold and wet winters, with temperatures dropping below 10 degrees Celsius (50 degrees Fahrenheit) at night. **Freed Israeli hostage says faith kept her going through Gaza captivity:** Agam Berger, a former hostage released by Hamas, said it was her Jewish faith that sustained her during her 16-month ordeal in the Gaza Strip. Berger was a military spotter who was captured during Hamas' October 7, 2023 attack that ignited the war. Berger told Israeli public radio Reshet Bet on Tuesday that she was held in tunnels and apartments with other female captives. She was given two meals a day, pita and rice, and had some access to media. In January 2024, Berger said her captors brought her and other hostages two Jewish prayer books, as well as other objects left behind by Israeli soldiers, such as a newspaper and military maps. She said around the first Hanukkah she spent in

captivity in December 2023, in a tunnel with four other hostages, they asked their captors for candles to mark the holiday, and they brought them one. **Lebanon's prime minister says only armed forces can defend the nation:** Lebanon's new prime minister has read his government policy statement stating that only the country's armed forces should defend the nation in case of war. Nawaf Salam was picked to form a new government last month after a devastating war between Israel and Hezbollah that killed over 4,000 people and caused widespread destruction. Hezbollah has kept its weapons over the past decades saying it is necessary to defend Lebanon against Israel. But many in Lebanon have been calling on the group to disarm, and such calls intensified during the latest war that stopped when a US-brokered ceasefire went into effect on November 27. Salam said Tuesday that the government asserts that Lebanon has the right to defend itself in case of "aggression" and only the state has the right to have weapons. He also said that the government takes measures to liberate land occupied by Israel "through its forces only."

Russia, Indonesia hold talks to strengthen ties on defence, security

Jakarta (PTI): Russia and Indonesia took steps on Tuesday to strengthen their defence ties with a meeting between a top Russian security official and Indonesia's defence minister in the capital of Jakarta as Moscow's war on Ukraine entered its fourth year. Ahead of the visit by Sergei Shoigu, secretary of the Russian Federation Security Council, the Russian news agency RIA Novosti said he would discuss ways to deepen a defense partnership with Indonesia's Defense Minister Sjafrrie Sjamsoeddin. The two officials would also discuss "cooperation in other areas of mutual interest", the agency said, citing a Russian government statement. Shoigu's visit, the first stop in a five-day Asia tour that also includes Malaysia, comes after Indonesia — the world's most populous Muslim-majority country and Southeast Asia's largest economy — was admitted as full member to the BRICS bloc of developing economies, an alliance where Russia is one of the founding members. Indonesian officials said ahead of Shoigu's arrival that the sides would exchange views on international and regional issues as Russia hopes to deepen its defense engagement with Southeast Asia countries. Shoigu will also pay a courtesy call on Indonesian President

Prabowo Subianto before departing for Malaysia on Wednesday. Shoigu declined to comment to the media after his meeting with Sjamsoeddin. Indonesia's Defence Ministry spokesperson Brig. Gen. Frega Wenas told reporters that Moscow and Jakarta "share an ambition to further broaden and deepen our defence relationship" and that Shoigu's visit reflected the highest level commitment to bilateral ties. Indonesia and the Russian navy held a joint drill last November in Indonesia's East Java Sea. Also, Jakarta has purchased Russian defense equipment, including Sukhoi fighter jets, BTR-80A military transport armoured and other combat vehicles, helicopters and assault rifles. Subianto, who has made strengthening Indonesia's military a priority, also wants to buy submarines, frigates and more fighter jets, and step up defence cooperation with other countries. Last August, as the country's president-elect, he met Russian President Vladimir Putin at the Kremlin. Indonesia has sought to maintain a neutral position since Russia's full-scale invasion of Ukraine on February 24, 2022. Subianto's predecessor, Joko Widodo, was the first Asian leader who visited both Moscow and Kyiv in July 2022, hoping to push for a ceasefire.

Pope meets Vatican No. 2 to discuss sainthood candidates

Pope Francis, hospitalised in critical condition with double pneumonia, was well enough to meet with the Vatican secretary of state to approve new decrees for saints and call a formal meeting to set the dates for their canonisation, the Vatican said on Tuesday. The audience, which occurred Monday, signalled that the machinery of the Vatican was still grinding on and looking ahead even with Francis, 88, hospitalised and doctors warning his prognosis is guarded. The Vatican's Tuesday noon bulletin announced that Francis had approved decrees for five people for beatification and two for canonisation during an audience with Cardinal Pietro Parolin and Archbishop Edgar Pena Parra, the so-called Vatican "substitute" or chief of staff. It was the first time the pope had met with Parolin, who is essentially the Vatican prime minister, since his February 14 hospitalisation. The Vatican statement said that during the audience, Francis had "decided to convene a consistory about the future canonisations." Such an audience and decision is par for the course when Francis is at the Vatican. He regularly approves decrees from the Vatican's saint-making office, albeit during audiences with the head of the office, not Parolin. But the forward-looking sense of the future consistory was significant, given his illness. The only other outsider who is known to have visited the pope, other than his personal secretaries and medical personnel, is Italian Premier Giorgia Meloni, who visited February 19. In a subsequent bulletin, the Vatican announced that Francis had additionally named a handful of new bishops for Brazil, named a new archbishop for Vancouver and modified the law for the Vatican City State to create a new hierarchy. **Pope slept well:** On Tuesday morning, the Vatican's typically brief morning update said: "The pope slept well, all night." The previous evening, doctors had said he remained in critical condition with double pneumonia but reported a "slight improvement" in some laboratory results. In the most upbeat bulletin in days, the Vatican said Francis had resumed work from his hospital room, calling a parish in Gaza City that he has kept in touch with since the war there began. The Argentine pope, who had part of one lung removed as a young man, has been hospitalised since February 14 at Rome's Gemelli hospital and doctors have said his condition is touch-and-go, given his age, fragility and pre-existing lung disease before the pneumonia set in. But in Monday's update, they said he hadn't had any more respiratory crises since Saturday, and the flow and concentration of supplemental oxygen has been slightly

reduced. The slight kidney insufficiency detected on Sunday was not causing alarm at the moment, doctors said, while saying his prognosis remained guarded. **Nightly prayer vigil begins at St Peter's:** After night fell, thousands of faithful gathered in a rain-soaked St Peter's Square for the first of a nightly ritual recitation of the Rosary. The prayer evoked the 2005 vigils when St John Paul II was dying in the Apostolic Palace, but many of those on

Allies and ordinary faithful hopeful: Francis' right-wing critics have been spreading dire rumours about his condition, but his allies have cheered him on and expressed hope that he will pull through. Many noted that from the very night of his election as pope, Francis had asked for the prayers of ordinary faithful, a request he repeats daily. "I'm a witness of everything he did for the church, with a great love of Jesus," Honduran Cardinal Oscar Rodriguez Maradiaga told La Repubblica. "Humanly speaking, I don't think it's time for him to go to Paradise." Maradiaga, a founding member of Francis' inner circle of cardinal advisers, said he himself had been near death with COVID-19, on high flows of oxygen like Francis. "I know the pope may be suffering and as a result I feel closer to him in prayer." At Gemelli on a rainy Tuesday morning, ordinary Romans and visitors alike were also praying for the pope and reflecting on the teachings he has imparted over nearly 12 years. Hoang Phuc Nguyen, who lives in Canada but was visiting Rome to participate in a Holy Year pilgrimage, took the time to come to Gemelli to say a special prayer for the pope at the statue of St John Paul II outside the main entrance. "We heard that he is in the hospital right now and we are very worried about his health," Nguyen said. "He is our father and it is our responsibility to pray for him."

Trump backs Musk as he roils federal workforce

President Donald Trump backed Elon Musk's demand that federal employees explain their recent accomplishments by the end of Monday or risk getting fired, even as government agency officials were told that compliance with Musk's edict was voluntary. Confusion and anger over the situation spawned new litigation and added to turmoil within the federal workforce. "What he's doing is saying, Are you actually working?" Trump said in the Oval Office during a meeting with French President Emmanuel Macron. "And then, if you don't answer, like, you're sort of semi-fired or you're fired, because a lot of people aren't answering because they don't even exist." The Republican president said Musk's Department of Government Efficiency has found "hundreds of billions of dollars in fraud" as he suggested that federal paychecks are going to nonexistent employees. He did not present evidence for his claims. Even as Trump and Musk pressed their case, the Office of Personnel Management

informed agency leaders that their workers were not required to respond by the deadline of 11:59 p.m. EST Monday, according to a person with knowledge of the conversation who requested anonymity to discuss internal matters. The conflicting directives led to varying advice for federal employees, depending on where they work. Some were told to answer the request for a list of five things that they did last week, others were informed that was optional, and others were directed not to answer at all. Musk bristled at resistance, saying federal workers "hate even the tiniest amount of accountability." He continued to threaten firings hours after employees were told that they didn't need to comply with his demands. "Subject to the discretion of the President, they will be given another chance," he posted on X, his social media platform. "Failure to respond a second time will result in termination." Attorneys representing unions, businesses, veterans and conservation organizations filed an updated lawsuit in federal court in California on Monday, arguing Musk had violated the law

by threatening mass firings. The lawsuit, spearheaded by the State Democracy Defenders Fund, called it "one of the most massive employment frauds in the history of this country." Anna Kelly, a White House deputy press secretary, criticized the litigation by saying "in the time it took these employees on taxpayer-funded salaries to file a frivolous lawsuit, they could have briefly recapped their accomplishments to their managers, as is common in the private sector, 100 times over." Musk is leading Trump's efforts to overhaul and downsize the federal government. They've urged employees to resign, directed agencies to lay off probationary workers and halted work at some agencies altogether. There has been pushback in protests around Washington and from within the government. The Office of Special Counsel, a watchdog for the federal workforce, said Monday that the firing of several probationary workers may be illegal. Trump is trying to fire the office's leader, Hampton Dellinger, in a case that has reached the US Supreme Court.

4 workers killed as elevated part of highway being built in South Korea collapses

Seoul (PTI): Elevated parts of a highway under construction collapsed in South Korea on Tuesday, killing four workers and injuring six others, officials said. Ten people were working on the site near the city of Cheonan, about 90 kilometers (55 miles) south of Seoul. They fell when it collapsed and were trapped in the rubble, the National Fire Agency said. One was found dead in the rubble. Eight injured workers were sent to hospitals before two of them were declared dead there later. The 10th

worker who was missing for hours was eventually discovered dead, according to fire agency officials. The fire agency said in a statement that five remained in serious condition. The cause of the collapse wasn't immediately known. Acting President Choi Sang-mok urged authorities to mobilise all available personnel and equipment to salvage the workers. About 50 fire trucks, three helicopters and some 150 personnel were mobilised for the rescue effort.

Unknown illness kills over 50 people in part of Congo

An unknown illness has killed over 50 people in northwestern Congo, according to doctors on the ground and the World Health Organisation on Monday. The interval between the onset of symptoms and death has been 48 hours in the majority of cases, and "that's what's really worrying," Serge Ngalebato, medical director of Bikoro Hospital, a regional monitoring centre, told The Associated Press. The latest disease outbreak in the Democratic Republic of

Congo began on January 21, and 419 cases have been recorded including 53 deaths. According to the WHO's Africa office, the first outbreak in the town of Boloko began after three children ate a bat and died within 48 hours following hemorrhagic fever symptoms. There have long been concerns about diseases jumping from animals to humans in places where wild animals are popularly eaten. The number of such outbreaks in Africa has surged by more than 60 per cent in the last decade, the WHO said in 2022. After the

second outbreak of the current mystery disease began in the town of Bomate on February 9, samples from 13 cases have been sent to the National Institute for Biomedical Research in Congo's capital, Kinshasa, for testing, the WHO said. All samples have been negative for Ebola or other common hemorrhagic fever diseases like Marburg. Some tested positive for malaria. Last year, another mystery flu-like illness that killed dozens of people in another part of Congo was determined to be likely malaria.

China not keen to join Trump's 50% defence cut proposal

Beijing (PTI): China on Tuesday appeared not keen to join US President Donald Trump's proposal for a 50 per cent cut in defence budget by the US, Russia and China saying that its "limited" defence spending is to protect its sovereignty, security and development interests. China's "limited defence spending is completely out of the need of safeguarding national sovereignty, security and development interests, and the need of maintaining world peace,"

Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Lin Jian said reacting to Trump's proposals floated earlier this month. Media reports had quoted Trump as saying on February 13 that "one of the first meetings I want to have is with President Xi of China, President Putin of Russia. And I want to say: 'Let's cut our military budget in half.'" "And we can do that. And I think we'll be able to do it," he said. Russian President Vladimir

Putin, in his reaction on Monday, termed it as a good idea. "I think it's a good idea. The US would cut by 50 per cent and we would cut by 50 per cent and then China would join, if it wanted," Putin was quoted as saying in a television interview. Asked for his reaction to Trump and Putin's comments, Lin told a media briefing here that China is committed to peaceful development but its "limited" defence spending is to defend its sovereignty and

development interests. "China upholds a self-defence strategy, pursues coordinated development between its economy and national defence, and never engages in any arms race with any country," he said adding that Beijing has worked for world peace through concrete actions and injected stability and certainty to the world. China, which is the second largest spender on defence after the US, last year increased its defence budget by 7.2 per cent to about USD 232 billion

(1.67 trillion Yuan) as it continues with the massive modernisation of its military of all its armed forces. Speculation is rife that Beijing may increase its defence spending this year to amid Trump's assertion to further ramp up the US military. China is due to unveil its annual budget, including the defence spending at the annual session of its Parliament, the National People's Congress, (NPC) which is scheduled to begin from March 5.

Morocco says it dismantled Islamic State cell that was planning attacks

Moroccan authorities this month arrested a dozen people they said were planning attacks on behalf of the Islamic State in the Sahel, a region south of the Sahara Desert, officials said on Monday. The discovery of the terrorist cell and what authorities called an "imminent dangerous terrorist plot" reflect the expanding ambitions of extremist groups in the region. Authorities did not provide details of the suspects' motives or their plot, beyond saying they planned to set off bombs remotely. They released photographs and videos showing officers raiding terrorist cells throughout the country. The images showed weapons stockpiles found during police raids, Islamic State flags drawn on walls, and thousands of dollars of cash. "Morocco remains a major target in the agenda of all terrorist organisations operating in the Sahel," Habboub

Cherkaoui, the head of Morocco's Central Bureau of Judicial Investigations, said at a news conference. Militant groups have been expanding their presence in the Sahel, capitalising on instability in countries including Mali, Burkina Faso and Niger. Since French troops began withdrawing almost two years ago, the Islamic State in the Sahel has launched deadly campaigns and taken control of lucrative transit routes. Groups like Islamic State in the Sahel have found support in impoverished communities that feel neglected by their governments. Their growth has destabilised and in several cases contributed to the overthrow of elected leaders. It has alarmed neighbouring states — including in North Africa and coastal west Africa — and worried western powers concerned about militant groups using their regional bases to orchestrate violence elsewhere. Authorities said the Morocco-

based cell called itself "the Lions of the Caliphate in the Maghreb" and took direction from Islamic State in the Sahel commanders. More than a year of tracking done by Morocco's General Directorate for Territorial Surveillance showed Islamic State in the Sahel commanders worked to recruit, arm and direct sympathisers to carry out attacks in Morocco. The weapons found include materials to make explosives including nail bombs, dynamite and gas cylinders as well as knives, rifles and hand guns whose serial numbers had been scratched off. Investigators said the 12 men arrested ranged from 18 to 40 years old and were apprehended in nine different cities, including Casablanca, Fez and Tangier. The majority were unmarried and had not finished high school. They have not yet been charged under Morocco's anti-terrorism laws. Based on materials gathered in raids last week, authorities

were able to locate a cache of weapons in the desert near Morocco's border with Algeria, including firearms and ammunition wrapped in newspapers printed in Mali in late January. Authorities said the suspects arrested this month had maintained ties to Adnan Abu Walid al-Sahrawi, a militant leader born in the Morocco-controlled Western Sahara who was killed by French forces in 2021. In the years since, they took direction from the Libyan commander Abderrahmane Sahrouri, who oversees the group's operations outside the Sahel. Episodes of violence would be particularly damaging in Morocco, where the economy relies heavily on tourism. More than 17 million people visited the North African Kingdom last year and the tourism industry makes up more than 7 per cent of its GDP. Morocco is the only in North Africa not to have experienced a major terrorist attack

for more than a decade. But its security services regularly underscore that the threat remains and claim attacks are regularly foiled when terrorist cells are dismantled. They have in recent years claimed to have dismantled 40 such cells, including one as recently as January. Cherkaoui said the operation revealed that Islamic State in the Sahel aimed to expand and establish operations in Morocco or recruit Moroccans to fight abroad, including most recently in Somalia. He said the groups "do not hide their desire to target Morocco through propaganda platforms" and said Morocco's aggressive counterterrorism posture made it a target. Morocco has worked to present itself as a regional leader in combatting violent extremism, forging deeper ties with new governments throughout the Sahel, including Mali, with which it signed a joint military cooperation agreement last month.

Bangladesh interim govt's key adviser resigns

Likely to lead new pol party

Bangladesh interim government's Information Adviser and one of the key leaders of the students' movement, Nahid Islam, Tuesday resigned from the cabinet, ahead of the launch of a new political party by the July uprising activists. "Given the current situation in the country, the rise of a new political force is necessary. I have resigned from the advisory council to remain on the streets to consolidate the mass uprising," Islam said in a media briefing after submitting his resignation letter to Chief Adviser Muhammad Yunus. One of the key coordinators of the July uprising that toppled the Awami League regime led by Sheikh Hasina, Nahid said his role on the street appeared more important than staying in government. He said he wanted to work for people's aspirations for a demo-

cratic change and thus resigned as an adviser, effectively a minister with two portfolios of Information & Broadcasting and Post and Telecommunications. Anti-Discrimination Student Movement led a mass uprising that toppled longtime prime minister Sheikh Hasina's government on August 5 last year. Three days later, Yunus took charge of the interim government. Islam was one of the three representatives of the Movement, who were inducted into the council of advisers. He resigned as the platform and its ally Jatiya Nagorik Committee or "national citizens committee", also led by students, earlier this month said they were set to form a new political party on Friday but did not announce its name. Islam is likely to join the new political party as its top leader. His resignation came amid criticisms from former prime minister Khaleda Zia's Bangladesh Nationalist Party (BNP) and several groups against forming a party with

their representatives staying in state power. Hasina's Awami League virtually remained silent on the development while most of her colleagues in the party and government were in jail and on the run on charges like crimes against humanity during the July-August Uprising last year. A UN fact-finding report earlier this month said the past regime wanted to ruthlessly crush the protesters, but the retaliatory violence continued even after its ouster while an estimated 1400 people were killed between July 15 and August 15. Two other comrades, Mahfuz Alam and Asif Mahmud, however, remained as advisers. Islam said, "The student advisers in the government will remain active in implementing the promises of justice and reform to which the government has committed". Yunus, earlier, said he encouraged the student movement-led party since they were ready to shed their blood for the country.

Syria's national dialogue conference begins

Battered country seeks to rebuild

Syria's new rulers kicked off a long-awaited national dialogue conference on Tuesday as a "rare historical opportunity" to rebuild the country after the fall of former President Bashar Assad and nearly 14 years of civil war. About 600 people from across Syria were invited to the gathering in Damascus, hosted by the new authorities led by the Islamist former insurgent group Hayat Tahrir al-Sham or HTS. The group led the offensive that ousted Assad in December. "Just as Syria has liberated itself by itself, it is appropriate for it to build itself by itself," interim President Ahmad al-Sharaa told the conference. "What we are experiencing today is an exceptional and rare historical opportunity in which we must use every moment to serve the interests of our people and our nation and honor the sacrifices of its children," he said. Syria's new rulers have promised an inclusive political transition. They will be closely watched by Syrians and the international community, including countries weighing whether to lift sanctions imposed during Assad's authoritarian rule. Syria faces major challenges, from rebuilding an economy and war-wrecked infrastructure to setting up a new constitution and justice mechanisms for those accused of war crimes. Although incidents of revenge and collective punishment have been far less widespread than expected, many in Syria's minority communities — including Kurds, Christians, Druze and members of Assad's

Alawite sect — are concerned for their future and not convinced by promises of inclusive governance. HTS was formerly affiliated with al-Qaeda, although it broke ties, and al-Sharaa has since preached coexistence. The organisers of the Damascus conference said all of Syria's communities were invited. Women and members of minority religious communities were among the attendees. The gathering is meant to come up with nonbinding recommendations on the country's interim rules before drafting a new constitution and forming a new government. Syria's new leaders also face the challenge of transforming former insurgent factions into a single national army they say should control all of the country's territory. Some armed groups — mainly the US-backed, Kurdish-led Syrian Democratic Forces, which holds sway in northeastern Syria — have refused to disarm and dissolve their units. SDF figures weren't invited to the conference, although the organisers said the Kurdish community would be represented. A group of mostly Kurdish political parties said in a statement on Tuesday that the conference did "not reflect the reality of the Syrian components" and warned that it would be "meaningless, worthless and ineffective and will not contribute to finding real solutions to the crisis that the country is suffering from".

Along with the internal frictions, Syria's new authorities face external threats. Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu said Sunday that Israel won't allow Syria's new army or HTS to "enter the area south of Damascus". He said that Israel aimed to protect Syria's Druze, a religious minority who live in southern Syria and in Israel's Golan Heights. After Assad's fall, Israeli forces moved into territory in southern Syria adjacent to the Israeli-annexed Golan Heights and have made clear they plan to stay indefinitely. Syria's new rulers haven't directly responded to Netanyahu's warning, but al-Sharaa told the Damascus conference that Syria must "firmly confront anyone who wants to tamper with our security and unity". Interim Foreign Minister Asaad al-Shibani said that Syria's new authorities "will not accept any violation of our sovereignty or the independence of our national decisions". He also touted the government's efforts to rebuild diplomatic ties with Arab and Western countries, and push for lifting sanctions. Also on Tuesday, hundreds of demonstrators gathered in the Druze heartland of Sweida and the southern city of Daraa to protest against Netanyahu's comments. Nour Alameddine, a university student, displayed a sign: "Syria is not for sale, Syria is united". "Sweida is part of Syria. We do not want it to be under Israeli occupation," she said. After Assad's fall, "we want to be part of a united Syria".

Pakistan SC to hear Imran Khan's pleas on Feb 28

Pakistan's Supreme Court will take up on Friday petitions filed by jailed former prime minister Imran Khan seeking a judicial probe into the May 9 violence and alleged rigging of last year's general elections, according to media reports on Tuesday. A five-member constitutional bench of the apex court led by Justice Aminuddin Khan will conduct the hearing. The Express Tribune newspaper reported. Khan's petition for the May 9 investigation was filed in December last year. On May 9, 2023, violent protests erupted after Khan's arrest by paramilitary Rangers

from the premises of the Islamabad High Court. His party workers vandalised a dozen military installations, including the Jinnah House (Lahore Corps Commander house) and the ISI building in Faisalabad. The PTI leadership alleges that May 9 was planned by its opponents. Khan had said he was implicated in the cases related to the violence as a result of a "well-orchestrated plan" to "harass" him for political reasons. In March 2024, Khan filed a

petition in the Supreme Court requesting the formation of a judicial commission to "inquire, audit and examine" the manner and process of the February 8 general elections held in the country, Geo News reported. China holds live-fire exercises in Gulf of Tonkin after Vietnam marks its territorial claims

Bangkok (PTI): Chinese authorities said they began live-fire exercises in the Gulf of Tonkin on Monday, only days after Vietnam announced a new line marking what it considers its territory in the body of water between the countries. China's Maritime Safety Administration said the exercises would be focused on the Beibu Gulf area, closer to the Chinese side of the Gulf of Tonkin, and would run through Thursday evening. It gave no further details, but the drills follow an announcement last week by Vietnam establishing a baseline used to calculate the width of its territorial waters in the Gulf of Tonkin. State-run Vietnam News reported that the baseline was in compliance with the UN Convention on the Law of the Sea and would provide "a robust legal basis for safeguarding and exercising Vietnam's sovereignty, sovereign rights and jurisdiction." Vietnam has not publicly responded to the Chinese drills. China and Vietnam have long had a maritime agreement governing the Gulf of Tonkin, but have been locked in competing claims in the nearby

South China Sea over the Spratly and Paracel Islands and maritime areas. China has been growing aggressive in pursuing those claims, and in October assaulted 10 Vietnamese fishermen near the Paracel Islands, three of whom suffered broken limbs. China claims almost the entire South China Sea as its own, though it has not publicly released exact coordinates of its claim other than a map with 10 dashed lines broadly demarcating what it calls its territory. In addition to Vietnam, China's claims overlap with those of the Philippines, Malaysia, Brunei and Taiwan, while Indonesia has also figured in violent confrontations with the Chinese coast guard and fishing fleets in the waters around the Natuna Islands. Tensions have been particularly high with the Philippines, with regular confrontations between the two countries. Most recently, a Chinese navy helicopter flew within 10 feet (3 meters) of a Philippine patrol plane last week over the South China Sea, near the hotly disputed Scarborough Shoal off the northwestern Philippines.

Starmmer commits to raise UK defence spending to 2.5% of GDP by 2027

Prime Minister Keir Starmer committed to raise UK defence spending to 2.5% of gross domestic product by 2027, saying Tuesday that Europe is in a new and insecure era. The UK spends 2.3% of gross domestic product on defence, and the government had previously set a 2.5% target, without setting a date. Starmer told lawmakers that the increase amounts to an additional 13.4 billion pounds (\$17 billion) a year. He said the goal is for defence spending to rise to 3% of GDP by 2035. The announcement comes as European countries scramble to bolster their collective defense as US President Donald Trump transforms American foreign policy, seemingly sidelining Europe as he looks to quickly end the war in Ukraine. Trump has long questioned the value of NATO and complained that the US provides security to European countries that don't pull their weight. Starmer is due to meet with Trump at the White House on Thursday. The prime minister has offered to send British troops to Ukraine as part of a force to safeguard a ceasefire, but says an American "backstop" will be needed to ensure a lasting peace. Trump hasn't committed to providing security guarantees for Ukraine.

India imported 49 Billion Euro worth of Russian oil in 2024

India, the world's third largest oil consuming and importing nation, bought crude oil worth 49 Billion Euros from Russia in the third year of Moscow's invasion of Ukraine, a global think tank said. India, which has traditionally sourced its oil from the Middle East, began importing a large volume of oil from Russia soon after the invasion of Ukraine in February 2022. This is primarily because Russian oil was available at a significant discount to other international benchmarks due to western sanctions and some European countries shunning purchases. This led to India's imports of Russian oil seeing a dramatic rise, growing from less than one per cent of its total crude oil imports to a staggering 40 per cent in a short period. "Russia's stronghold over new markets has solidified

in the third year of the invasion. The three biggest buyers, China (EUR 78 Billion), India (EUR 49 Billion) and Turkey (EUR 34 Billion) were responsible for 74 per cent of Russia's total revenues from fossil fuels in the third year of the invasion," Centre for Research on Energy and Clean Air said in its latest report (CREA). The value of India's import saw an eight per cent year-on-year increase, it said. Russia's total global fossil fuel earnings in the third year of the invasion reached 242 Billion Euro and have totalled 847 Billion Euro since the invasion of Ukraine. Some of the refineries in India turned Russian crude oil into fuels like petrol and diesel that were exported to Europe and other G7 countries. "In the third year of the invasion, G7+ countries imported EUR 18 Billion of oil products from six

refineries in India and Turkey that process Russian crude. An estimated EUR nine Billion of this was refined from Russian crude," the CREA report said. In the first three quarters of 2024, as refineries in India and Turkey increased their consumption of Russian crude, the volume of Russian crude used to create products for G7+ countries jumped by an estimated 10 per cent. Concurrently, this also contributed to a rise in the price of Russian oil, boosting the value of the crude used for these exports by an estimated 25 per cent, it said. The EU is the biggest importer of oil products from India's and Turkey's refineries. On average, 13 per cent of these refineries' total production is targeted towards exports for the bloc in the third year of the invasion. The top-five importers within the EU were the Netherlands (3.3 Billion

Euro), France (1.4 Billion Euro), Romania (1.2 Billion Euro), Spain (1.1 Billion Euro), and Italy (949 Million Euro). The single-biggest buyer was Australia, whose imports from these refineries totalled 3.38 Billion Euro in the third year of the invasion. In the third year of the invasion, 23 per cent of the oil transhipped in EU waters was destined for China, 11 per cent for India, 10 per cent for South Korea, and two per cent for Turkey, with the remainder distributed among other markets. "CREA's data shows that from February to September 2024, 331 shipments arriving in India's Sikka port (in Gujarat) averaged USD 90.8 per barrel," it said. In this period, 65 per cent of the tankers were subject to the cap. "Applying the price cap to cost, insurance and freight (CIF) price would have cut Russia's crude export revenues by 34 per cent —

about 5.8 Billion in 2024," it said. When Russia invaded Ukraine in February 2022, it triggered a series of sanctions from the US, the European Union, and other western nations, aimed at crippling Russia's economy. One of the main sanctions was on Russian oil exports, which significantly impacted Russia's ability to sell oil to European markets. As a result, Russia began offering crude oil at heavily discounted prices in an attempt to find new buyers for its oil. India, with its large energy needs and an economy sensitive to oil price fluctuations, found this offer too attractive to ignore. The price discount on Russian oil, sometimes as much as USD 18-20 per barrel lower than the market price of other oil, allowed India to procure oil at a much cheaper rate. The discounts have, however, shrunk in recent times to less than USD 3 a barrel.

Centre urge companies to set up skill centres in-house

The Centre has urged the corporate sector to set up skill centres in-house so that the employability of graduating youth is improved and the overall hiring scenario is boosted, an official said on Tuesday. Ministry of Corporate Affairs Secretary Deepthi Gaur Mukherjee said that there is a need to upscale the numbers of skilled youth in society. Under the Prime Minister Internship Scheme (PMIS) launched in 2024, the target is to provide skills to 1.25 lakh youth in the pilot phase and one crore over the next five years. Speaking at an event organised by CII here, Mukherjee said, "The response from companies is very encouraging and there is a need to upscale the numbers. The companies should set

up skill cells in-house so that the quantum of the employable workforce increases." The internship programme under PMIS has been made a part of corporate social responsibility (CSR) with the view to provide flexibility. "This internship programme is a part of CSR and not a normal HR function. This will provide flexibility to the programme. Under the scheme, the industry will benefit from getting employable workforce which will contribute to the society," she said. Mukherjee said that 50 per cent of the population in India is below the age of 28 years. "This is a huge demographic dividend. If the youth of the country are not skilled, the demographic dividend will turn into a demographic nightmare," the official said. She said the internship

programme will help the youth learn teamwork and improve communication skills. "The entire government scheme on internship is a three-way partnership between industry, government and the youth", Mukherjee said. Ambuja Neotia Group chairman Harshvardhan Neotia said the industry is facing an issue of employability of youth who are graduating. The internship programme provides a wonderful tool to boost employability and job creation, he said. Renowned corporate houses like ITC, Emami, Reliance and HDFC Bank are participating in the programme. Under PMIS, individuals, aged between 21 and 24 years, are given 12-month internship opportunities in the country's top 500 companies.

Enable MSMEs to grow through right policy, ADB to MP government

Madhya Pradesh must look to frame policies for MSMEs to enable them to grow into large companies, which can compete globally, a senior official of the Asian Development Bank said on Tuesday. Speaking at the Madhya Pradesh Global Investors Summit (MP GIS) 2025, Asian Development Bank (ADB) Deputy Country Director Aarti Mehra complimented the state for its achievements in tackling poverty and stand out performance in agriculture, specially in organic farming. "It (Madhya Pradesh) has also done really well in tackling poverty. It is among the fast improving states of the country. Multidimensional poverty (in the state) has declined between 2015 and 2021 at a dramatic rate of 15.9

per cent and that's really commendable when you compare it to the national average of 9.9 per cent," she said. On the MSME sector, Mehra noted that MP has enacted a number of policies to deal with challenges faced by these micro enterprises, including access to finance. "While every policy that supports MSMEs is fantastic, the state must keep its eye on getting these infants to grow into giants," she said. Pointing to a trend witnessed in a number of states in India, she said MSMEs continue to be MSMEs even 10 years after inception. "Given where the state (MP) is now, and having the benefit of the experience of other states, I would urge that policies be made to actually incentivise these MSMEs to grow into giants by connecting them to supply

chains by providing good access to financing and by good regulation," Mehra said. She cited examples from other states such as Rajasthan, where in 2015 THE MSME policy was tweaked resulting in the size of MSMEs in the state growing larger. There are many benefits of growing MSMEs into big corporations, she said. "They can benefit from economies of scale and most importantly, larger companies pay employees more. They are more resilient to economic downturns, and they are just more able to compete in the global landscape," Mehra said. The senior ADB official also highlighted that the multilateral lending body has been associated with MP since 1999 and it has worked across all sectors ranging from transport to urban governance and education.

Rupee plunges 47 paise to end at 87.19 against US dollar

The rupee fell sharply by 47 paise to settle at 87.19 against the US Dollar on Tuesday due to month-end Dollar demand by importers amid uncertainty over US trade tariffs. Elevated greenback against major crosses and sustained FII outflows also contributed to the decline in the domestic unit, forex traders said. At the interbank foreign exchange, the Rupee opened weak at 86.83 and kept losing ground through the day before settling at 87.19, lower by 47 paise over its previous close. The local unit had settled at 86.72 on Monday. Currency markets will remain closed on Wednesday for Mahashivratri. "The rupee fell sharply against the US dollar amid uncertainty over US trade tariffs and demand from importers towards the end of the month.

Covering of short positions due to the expiry of the futures contract, too, weighed on the rupee. "We expect the rupee to trade negative on the back of overall weakness in the domestic markets and persistent FII outflows. Any recovery in the US Dollar may also weigh on the Rupee. However, any intervention by the RBI and weakness in crude oil prices may support the Rupee at lower levels," Anuj Choudhary, Research Analyst at Mirae Asset Sharekhan, said. Meanwhile, at the domestic equity markets, Sensex climbed 147.71 points to settle at 74,602.12 to end a five-session losing run. However, Nifty continued the downward streak, falling 5.80 points to 22,547.55. The Dollar index, which gauges the greenback's strength against a basket of six currencies, rose 0.04 per cent to 106.64.

SEBI warns public against buying properties of HBN Dairies

Markets regulator SEBI has cautioned public against buying and dealing with any property belonging to HBN Dairies and Allied Limited. The cautionary statement comes after SEBI discovered that some individuals or entities are interfering with the auction process by spreading false rumours, pretending to be SEBI officials, and trespassing on HBN properties. These actions are not only misleading potential buyers but also obstructing SEBI's e-auction process, the regulator noted. In response, SEBI in a notice issued last week, cautioned public against 'buying/dealing with any properties wherein HBN, its directors or any of its associates, subsidiaries, sister companies have any interest, rights directly or indirectly'.

The regulator also said no person is allowed to take illegal possession of or interfere with the assets of HBN, its directors, or its related entities, including subsidiaries, associates, and sister companies. Any such unauthorised actions will result in legal consequences under applicable laws. Further, SEBI emphasised that as per Supreme Court orders, it has full authority to sell the assets of HBN, its directors, and its related companies, including properties where HBN has any direct or indirect interest. A Supreme Court order in May 2024 granted SEBI the authority to sell the assets of HBN with the involvement of a liquidator. A subsequent order in October 2024 further permitted SEBI to sell and dispose of assets and properties of HBN's sister

companies, which are currently in liquidation. Following the orders, the regulator in January stated that it will auction 26 properties of HBN Dairies and Allied Ltd for a reserve price of ₹83 Crore on February 27. Before this, the regulator had in August last year auctioned eight properties of HBN. The moves are part of the markets watchdog's effort to recover money raised by HBN through illicit collective investment schemes. The SEBI initiated the process for the sale of the assets after HBN and its directors — Harmender Singh Sran, Amandeep Singh Sran, Manjeet Kaur Sran and Jasbeer Kaur — failed to refund investors' money. The assets of HBN and its directors were attached by SEBI under recovery proceedings initiated via a prohibitory order in September 2017.

The broader Nifty of NSE, however, fell for the sixth day slipping by 5.80 points or 0.03 per cent to finish at 22,547.55 due to fag-end selling in pharma, metal and IT shares. Weak Asian and US markets along with foreign fund outflows made investors risk-averse, analysts said. Among Sensex shares, Mahindra and Mahindra, Bharti Airtel, Bajaj Finance, Zomato, Nestle, Bajaj Finserv, Maruti and Titan were the biggest gainers. Sun Pharma, Power Grid,

Tata Consultancy Services, Tech Mahindra, Asian Paints and Tata Motors were among the laggards. In the last five trading sessions, the BSE barometer lost 1,542.45 points or two per cent. Foreign institutional investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth ₹6,286.70 Crore on Monday, while DIIs bought equities worth ₹5,185.65 Crore, according to exchange data. In Asian markets, Seoul, Tokyo, Shanghai and Hong Kong settled lower. Equity markets in Europe were trading mostly higher. US markets ended mostly in the negative territory on Monday. "Benchmark indices ended mixed in a lacklustre trading session as weak Asian cues further cautioned investors. Investors continued to stay risk averse as global uncertainty coupled with strong FII selling kept the mood sluggish ahead of expiry this week," Prashanth Tapse, Senior VP (Research), Mehta Equities Ltd, said. Global oil benchmark Brent crude dipped 0.13 per cent to USD 74.68 a barrel. "The domestic market experienced a range-bound trading session in anticipation of key economic data releases this week, alongside the monthly expiry.

the ICC event. Tournament hosts Pakistan and Bangladesh were knocked out of the event on Monday after suffering two successive defeats. Both Australia and South Africa had won their opening game against England and Afghanistan respectively. Interestingly, it was Australia's fourth abandoned game in their last eight outings in the Champions Trophy. They next play Afghanistan in Lahore on February 28 while the Proteas face England in Karachi the following day. The semifinalists have already been decided in Group A with India and New Zealand progressing after two wins in as many games. Rain is predicted in Rawalpindi as well as Lahore and the Pakistan Cricket Board (PCB) will be hoping it doesn't play spoilsport in the coming days. Pakistan is hosting an ICC event for the first time in 29 years. With the host nation already out of the semifinal race, the PCB already faces a challenge in keeping the local fans interested in the tournament.

SC bars Karnataka police from taking steps against Lakshya Sen

The Supreme Court on Tuesday barred Karnataka Police from taking any coercive steps against badminton player Lakshya Sen, his family members, and coach over allegations of forging birth certificates.
A bench of Justices Sudhanshu Dhulia and K Vinod Chandran issued notice to the Karnataka government and the complainant M G Nagaraj who alleged birth certificates of Sen and his brother Chirag Sen were forged.
The top court was hearing a plea challenging February 19 order of the Karnataka High Court which rejected the petitions filed by Sen, his family members, and his coach U Vimal Kumar. The high court ruled there was prima facie evidence warranting an investigation into the case.
The case stems from a private complaint filed by Nagaraj, who alleged Sen's parents



Dhirendra and Nirmala Sen, along with his brother, coach, and an employee of the Karnataka Badminton Association, were involved in falsifying the birth records. According to the complaint, the accused allegedly manipulated the birth certificates of the Sen brothers, reducing their age by approximately two-and-a-half years. The alleged forgery was intended to allow them to participate in age-

restricted badminton tournaments and avail government benefits. Nagaraj supported his claims with documents obtained under RTI Act and requested the court to summon original records from the Sports Authority of India (SAI) and the Ministry of Youth Affairs and Sports in New Delhi. Based on this evidence, the court directed the High Grounds police station to conduct an investigation. Following the court's directive, the police registered an FIR under Sections 420 (cheating), 468 (forgery), and 471 (using forged documents as genuine) of IPC. However, the petitioners moved the Karnataka High Court in 2022, securing an interim order that stalled the investigation. The petitioners argued that the complaint and subsequent FIR were baseless, motivated, and intended to harass them. They alleged Nagaraj was acting out of personal vendetta, claiming his daughter had applied to join the Prakash Padukone Badminton Academy in 2020 but was not selected after the evaluation process. Kumar, a coach at the academy, was named in the complaint. The high court, while dismissing the petitions, observed that the petitioners' counsel did not present arguments despite being given sufficient opportunities and refused more time.

Ready to lead KKR if captaincy comes my way: Venkatesh Iyer

All-rounder Venkatesh Iyer says he is prepared to lead Kolkata Knight Riders (KKR) if given the opportunity in the IPL 2025 despite having no captaincy experience at any levels in competitive cricket. The reigning champions, who will take on Royal Challengers Bengaluru in the opening game this season at the Eden Gardens, are yet to announce their captain. Shreyas Iyer had led them to the title win in IPL 2024, but he was acquired by Punjab Kings in the mega auction and later named him as their skipper.
"Definitely, I'm ready. Again, I've always said this: captaincy is just a tag. I believe in leadership. That is a bigger role to play, being a leader," Venkatesh told ESPNcricinfo. "There's no ambiguity surrounding this. I'll definitely do it, if it comes my way. There is no reason not to do it," he added. Iyer said the captain needs to



"set an example" by being a "good role model". "You don't necessarily need the tag of a captain to be a leader in your dressing room. You need to set examples. You need to be a good role model, both on and off the field, which I am doing right now in Madhya Pradesh. "I'm not the captain of the MP team, but my opinions are respected and I really love to be in an atmosphere where every individual — new or experienced, Rs 20 lakh, Rs 20 crore, whatever — you just

Praggnanadhaa favourite to win Prague Masters

Fresh off his nail-biting victory at the Tata Steel Masters, Grandmaster R Praggnanandhaa will start as the hot favorite to win the Prague Masters, which gets underway here on Wednesday.
It was a gruelling first-place finish at the Tata Steel Masters, where Praggnanandhaa overcame world champion D Gukesh in a nerve-racking tiebreak battle and the Indian will now look to carry that momentum forward in this tournament. Grandmaster Aravindh Chithambaram makes his debut in elite chess, thanks to his consistent rise in both performance and rating throughout last year. Having elevated himself to 2730 points in live ratings, Aravindh is knocking on the door of the top 20 in the world rankings and is currently ranked fifth in the country, behind Gukesh, Arjun

Erigaisi, and five-time world champion Viswanathan Anand. The field, as usual, is an interesting mix. Chinese Grandmaster Wei Yi starts as the top seed, with Praggnanandhaa in second place based on ratings released on February 1. Le Quang Liem of Vietnam is seeded third, ahead of Vincent Keymer of Germany, while Aravindh is seeded fourth in the 10-player, 9-round all-play-all event. Dutch Grandmaster Anish Giri could draw attention here, thanks to his vast theoretical preparation, which might prove useful. The best Czech player, David Navara, along with Nguyen Thai Dai Van, Sam Shankland of the United States, and young talent Edil Gurezi, complete the lineup. For Praggnanandhaa, it would be a great opportunity as the Indian has the ability to outplay any opponent, giving him a distinct advantage over the others in the fray.

IPL: Matthew Mott appointed Delhi Capitals assistant coach

Former England white-ball coach Matthew Mott was on Tuesday appointed assistant coach of IPL franchise Delhi Capitals for the upcoming season. The 51-year-old Mott will assist former India cricketer Hemang Badani, who was named head coach in October last year. The Australian joins director of cricket Venugopal Rao and bowling coach Munaf Patel in the Delhi Capitals' support staff.
Mott, following an extremely successful stint with the Australian women's cricket team — he guided them to two T20 World Cups, one ODI World Cup and four Ashes series wins — over seven years, became the England men's team white-ball coach in 2022. The former first-class cricketer, with more than 3,500 runs under his belt in 66 games, stepped down as England coach in July last



year after guiding them to the T20 World Cup title in Australia in 2022. Mott had also served as assistant coach of Kolkata Knight Riders during the first two seasons of IPL. Delhi Capitals, who are still looking for their maiden IPL title, have made major changes to their coaching staff ahead of the new season. They brought in former India player Badani as head coach in place of legendary Australian cricketer Ricky Ponting, while also replacing Australia's James Hopes with ex-India pacer and member of the 2011 World Cup-winning squad, Munaf, as their bowling coach. Delhi Capitals will open their IPL campaign against Lucknow Super Giants (LSG) in Visakhapatnam on March 24.

I have not seen a better player than Kohli: Ponting

Former Australian skipper Ricky Ponting said he has not seen a "better player" than Virat Kohli in ODIs, and backed the Indian batting star to go past legendary Sachin Tendulkar as the highest run-getter in the 50-over format. Kohli made an exceptional unbeaten 100, his 51st in ODIs, to guide India to a six-wicket win over Pakistan in a Champions Trophy match here on Sunday.
"I don't think I've ever seen a better 50-over player than Virat Kohli. Now that he's gone past me (in run-maker's list) and only two (batters) ahead of him, I'm sure he would want to give himself the best chance to be remembered as the all-time leading run scorer in the game," Ponting told ICC Review. During the course of that



hundred, Kohli went past the 14000-run mark in one-dayers, joining former Sri Lankan captain Kumar Sangakkara and Tendulkar in a rare club. Kohli (14085 runs) is still 4,341 runs behind Tendulkar (18426) and at 36, the champion batter has limited time in his hand to overhaul the latter's mark. But Ponting did not see it as an impossible task for Kohli. "Obviously physical-wise, he's

never going to write him off (to overtake Tendulkar)," he added. Ponting said a match against Pakistan often brought the best in Kohli, and termed him as a big match player. "Yeah, 2022 (T20 WC) and now, he stood up against the team that he would probably steel himself the most to play against. When Pakistan had batted first on a tricky wicket, it needed someone at the top of the order to play a match-winning innings like that. "Once again, it was Kohli to get the job done. He's been a champion player for a long, long time. And particularly in the white-ball formats, where he's been an unbelievably good 50-over player," said the Aussie. Ponting said Kohli's hundred was the difference between India and Pakistan on that night. "You look at the two

scorecards, it's one, Virat making a 100, and lots of Pakistan starts without anyone going on and making a big score. "I've said forever, in any format of the game, a 50 never wins you or your team anything. You have to get big scores. And so the individual big scores weren't there, but the big partnerships weren't there either," Ponting noted. The Tasmanian said senior batters Babar Azam and Mohammed Rizwan were not able to serve Pakistan in a desired manner. "They haven't been able to give their best back to their team. Those two guys had to stand up," Ponting said. "They had to make big runs, and they haven't been able to do it in the first couple of games, and that might be the reason why Pakistan don't make it through to the semi-finals."

India have huge advantage playing at same ground, says Cummins

Injured Australia captain Pat Cummins believes India have a "huge advantage" to be based in Dubai for the ongoing Champions Trophy (CT) while other sides criss-cross Pakistan for their group games in the tournament being held under a 'hybrid model'. Rohit Sharma's men are playing all their matches in Dubai and even the final will be held there if the team goes the distance. This was done after India refused to travel to Pakistan, the original hosts of the event, citing security concerns. "I think it's good in that the tournament can go on, but obviously it does give them (India) a huge advantage



playing on the same ground. They already look very strong and they've got that obvious benefit of playing all their games there," Cummins told 'Yahoo Australia'. India have won both their games, against Bangladesh and Pakistan, comfortably so far and are through to the semifinal on March 4, to be held in Dubai. Their last group match is on Sunday against New Zealand, a team that has so far played in Pakistan, also winning both its games against the home side and Bangladesh. Cummins is watching the tournament from the sidelines owing to an ankle injury and is targeting a return to competitive cricket with the IPL next month. The break also coincided with the birth of his daughter.

Boxing Federation of India internal wars revealed amid IOA crackdown

Stripped of its administrative powers by Indian Olympic Association (IOA) for allegedly failing to conduct elections on time, accusations and counter-accusations are flying thick and fast within the Boxing Federation of India (BFI) on what is to be blamed for the mess that has been in the making for several months. Abuse of power, financial misconduct, and the never-ending turf wars are now coming to light as officials jostle to escape blame for the shocking turn of events. The Indian Olympic Association (IOA) formed a five-member ad-hoc committee on Monday to oversee the sport's affairs, citing the federation's failure to conduct elections on time.

The panel is headed by former Athletics Federation of India (AFI) treasurer Madhukant Pathak, and comprises long-serving boxing federation officials such as Rajesh Bhandari (vice-chairman), DP Bhatt, Virendra Singh Thakur and former Asian champion Shiva Thapa as the sole players' representative. The sport's fortunes have been on the decline for a while now but the internal tug of war had so far been under wraps. With the IOA's crackdown, it is now out in the open. Allegations of financial misconduct On December 28, the BFI received a complaint, a copy of which is in PTI's possession, accusing key officials, including Secretary General Hemanta Kalita and Treasurer Digvijay Singh, of "unauthorised fund



withdrawals, fraudulent billing, and abuse of power". They were also accused of tender process violations and it was claimed that contracts for the Multinational Training Camp in Rohtak and the Guwahati Talent Hunt were awarded without following the proper procedure. It was also alleged that non-boxing individuals were appointed as Technical Officials (NTOs) and there was unauthorised withdrawal of foreign currency and misuse of federation funds for personal expenses, among others. During the Executive Council meeting on January 12 attended by both the secretary and treasurer, it was decided that an inquiry will be conducted. To avoid conflict of interest, former Delhi High Court

judge, Sudhir Kumar Jain was appointed by the BFI to lead the investigation on January 21. Since then Jain has conducted several sittings. However, Digvijay wrote to BFI head Ajay Singh this week, objecting to the "unilateral appointment of a one-man inquiry committee" instead of referring the matter to the federation's internal Disciplinary and Dispute Committee. The complaints made in December specifically highlighted misappropriation of funds and protocol violations by the finance committee. It is to be noted that Digvijay also heads the BFI finance committee, which includes Meren Paul, a member of the Disciplinary

and Dispute Committee. In a letter dated February 3, the federation stated that a Special General Body Meeting (SGM) was scheduled for Tuesday, and assured the ministry that the election will be conducted by mid-March. However, the meeting was not held. "The National Games were going on and World Boxing is in the final stages to get recognition from the IOC and the president is closely involved in this, hence it was decided that the meeting will be held in March," a BFI official familiar with the development said. Opposition to IOA's ad-hoc committee Meanwhile, IOA Treasurer and Dispute and Affiliation Committee member Sahdev Yadav on Monday strongly opposed the appointment of

an ad-hoc committee to oversee the BFI. He criticised the decision as "arbitrary and without due authority," stating that no procedural steps were followed before making such a move. In a letter to IOA President PT Usha, Yadav wrote, "The issuance of this office order creates an impression that the decision has been taken by the IOA, whereas, in reality, it is your personal decision." He further stressed that National Sports Federations (NSFs) are autonomous bodies and that the IOA does not have the authority to interfere in their internal governance. However, there have been past precedents of IOA stepping in to manage a sport's affairs if the federation fails to conduct elections on time.



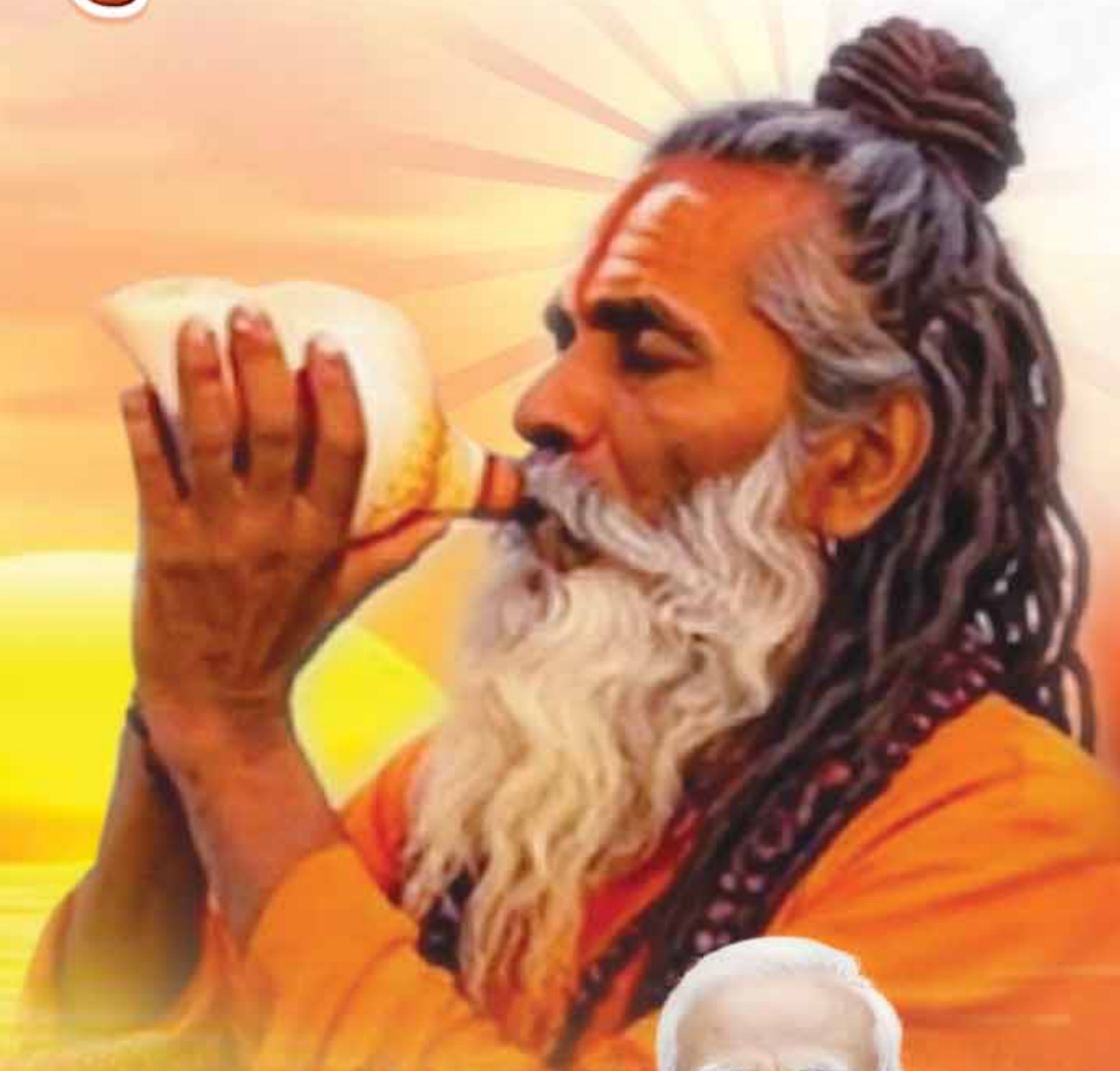
