

BJP CMs CORNER KEJRIWAL

The star campaigners of the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) have descended in the national Capital going full throttle against the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) ahead of the high-octane Delhi Assembly elections with its prominent leaders including party president and Union Minister Jagat Prakash Nadda, and three chief ministers—Uttar Pradesh (UP) Chief Minister (CM) Yogi Adityanath, Madhya Pradesh CM Mohanlal Yadav, and Uttarakhand CM Pushkar Singh Dhami—holding multiple rallies, road shows and public meetings across the length and breadth of the city.

In his maiden speech ahead of the polls, Adityanath accused the AAP of setting Bangladeshi and Rohingya nationals in Delhi and compromising national security while hitting out at the ruling party for being involved in the riots that took place in the national Capital in 2020.

Sounding the bugle, the senior BJP leader launched a scathing attack on the AAP and its supremo Arvind Kejriwal. "There is an Okhla industrial area in Delhi but there has been no trade there for the past 10 years. While the AAP took no interest in setting up industries there, they have undoubtedly settled Rohingyas and Bangladeshis there," he said.

Yogi claimed that AAP leaders are distributing Aadhar cards at homes to Rohingyas and Bangladeshi

Rahul Gandhi cancels two rallies on consecutive days

Congress leader Rahul Gandhi's rally in the national capital on Thursday was canceled due to his poor health and medical advice. He was scheduled to hold the rally in Mustafabad in northeast Delhi, but people familiar with him said he is suffering from chest congestion.

The Congress campaign for the Assembly elections was expected to get a big boost from Rahul's three daily rallies on three successive days, starting January 22, but two of these have now been canceled.

"As of now, Rahul Gandhi's election rally in Madipur on

Friday is on schedule, and he is likely to address a massive gathering," said Delhi Congress chief Devendra Yadav, a day after the Leader of Opposition in the Lok Sabha failed to show up for an election rally near Inderlok metro station in the Sadar Assembly constituency on Wednesday.

Dismissing speculation that the cancellation of Rahul's rallies was aimed at helping the AAP by preventing a division of Muslim voters—Yadav said, "These are rumors. We are fighting the election independently." "After Republic Day, the party leaders will step up the campaign in Delhi," he said.

infiltrators. "And on the other side you can see New Okhla [NOIDA]. Compare the roads of Delhi to Noida and Ghaziabad in Uttar Pradesh, there is a difference of sky and earth. There are world class educational institutions and medical colleges in UP while the educational institutions run by Delhi government are in a very bad condition," he alleged.

Calling it a 'well thought conspiracy,' the firebrand leader said, "They have not just kept the people of Delhi devoid of basic facilities, they have also compromised on national security through their actions. You must have seen the riots in Delhi in 2020 and how the AAP leaders and councillors were engaged in that. They are repeatedly messing with national security."

India-China continue border talks

Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri will travel to Beijing on a two-day visit starting Sunday to discuss next steps in improving ties between the two nations. This comes after armies of India and China in October last year agreed to disengage from friction points at Line of Actual Control (LAC) in Eastern Ladakh.

High level talks between the two countries gathered momentum following the pact. It will be the second top level meeting in the last one and half months between the two neighbours. National Security Advisor (NSA) Ajit Doval travelled to Beijing and held talks with Chinese Foreign Minister Wang under the framework of Special Representatives (SR) dialogue on the boundary dispute.

"Foreign Secretary Vikram Misri will be visiting Beijing on January 26 and 27 for a meeting of the Foreign Secretary-Vice Minister mechanism between India and China," Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said on Thursday.

"The resumption of this bilateral mechanism flows from the agreement at the leadership level to discuss the next steps for India-China relations, including in the political, economic, and people-to-people domains," it said in a brief statement. The decision to revive the SR dialogue mechanism and other such formats was taken at a meeting between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Chinese President Xi Jinping in Kazan on October 23.

In the nearly 50-minute meeting, Modi underscored



the importance of properly handling differences and disputes and not allowing them to disturb peace and tranquillity in border areas.

The Modi-Xi meeting came two days after India and China firmed up a disengagement pact for Depsang and Demchok, the last two friction points in eastern Ladakh.

In the SR dialogue, India pressed for a fair, reasonable and mutually acceptable settlement of the overall boundary dispute between the two countries. Doval and Wang also focused on "positive" direction for cross-border cooperation including resuming the Kailash Mansarovar Yatra, river data sharing and border trade.

Last week, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said the India-China relationship is trying to disentangle itself from the complications arising from the post-2020 border situation and more thought needs to be given to the longer-term evolution of the ties.

"At a time when most of its relationships are moving forward, India confronts a particular challenge in establishing an equilibrium with China. Much of that arises from the fact that both nations are on the rise," he had

said. The external affairs minister noted that as immediate neighbours and the only two societies with over a billion people, India-China dynamic could never have been easy.

"But it has been further sharpened by a boundary dispute, by some baggage of history and by differing socio-political systems. Misreadings by past policy-makers, whether driven by idealism or absence of realpolitik, has actually helped neither cooperation nor competition with China," he said.

"That has clearly changed in the last decade. Right now, the relationship is trying to disentangle itself from the complications arising from the post-2020 border situation," he added.

These meetings came after the two nations arrived at an agreement to resume patrolling along the LAC "leading to disengagement". The patrolling arrangement came four years after the Galwan Valley clash, signalling de-escalation in a region where both countries stationed tens of thousands of troops.

The disengagement agreement has facilitated the Indian military to resume patrolling up to the old stations in Depsang and Demchok -- the two major friction points that were left to be settled between the two nations.

The two sides also completed one round of patrolling in November and also agreed to carry out one coordinated patrol every week in the areas where tensions have persisted since 2020. India has maintained that its ties with China cannot be normal unless there is peace in the border areas.

MEA Jaishankar talks deportation of Indians in US

India has always been open to legitimate return of undocumented Indians to their country, External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar said on Wednesday, noting that New Delhi is still in the process of verifying those from the US who can be deported to India and the number of such individuals cannot be determined yet.

"As a government, we are obviously very much supportive of legal mobility because we do believe in a global workplace. We want Indian talent and Indian skills to have the maximum opportunity at the global level. At the same time, we are also very firmly opposed to illegal mobility and illegal migration," Jaishankar told a group of Indian reporters here.

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NRAI calls for CCI probe into Zomato, Swiggy

The National Restaurant Association of India (NRAI), which represents half a million eateries nationwide, said it will approach Competition Commission of India over "private labelling" by Zomato and Swiggy and their foray into quick commerce food delivery via Binstro by Blinkit and Snacc, respectively.

In an interview, NRAI President Sagar Daryani raised concerns over "anti-competitive" practices of food delivery aggregators, "data masking" and "deep discounting".

"We will be adding to our petition in CCI about them (Zomato, Swiggy) doing private labels through Binstro and Snacc," Daryani shared. He said NRAI will also request CCI to investigate complaints received from its member restaurants that Zomato and Swiggy were procuring from third party commercial kitchens for Zomato Everyday and Swiggy Daily.

Queries sent to Swiggy and Zomato remained unanswered.

Daryani said NRAI was "very concerned" as many restaurants were already shutting down with several workers losing their livelihoods. Addressing an NRAI townhall with restaurant industry stakeholders on Wednesday, Daryani suggested that restaurants need to look at a "third alternative" like ONDC and could replicate the success achieved through a pilot in Bengaluru, throughout India. During the townhall, top restaurateurs raised concerns over the entry of food delivery aggregators like Zomato and Swiggy into private labelling and dining-in, and stressed the need for alternatives in the market.

Differential pricing: Uber, Ola, Apple under scanner

Days after a Delhi-based entrepreneur shared his findings on differential pricing by two ride-hailing apps in a series of posts on X, comparing fares across different devices and battery levels, the Consumer Protection Authority (CPA) has issued notices to tech giant Apple Inc. and cab aggregators Ola and Uber, seeking clarification on reports of alleged differential pricing based on the type of mobile device used to book rides. This comes after reports that the two companies appeared to charge different fares for the same service, depending on whether the customer was using an iPhone or an Android device.

"As a follow-up to the earlier observation of apparent #DifferentialPricing based on the different models of mobiles (#iPhones/#Android) being used, the Department of Consumer Affairs, through the CPA, has issued notices to major cab aggregators #Ola and #Uber, seeking their responses," Union Minister for Consumers' Affairs Prahlad Joshi said in a social media post.

Apple has been asked to respond to technical issues reported by iPhone users after a recent software update. Apple has been releasing updates, including iOS 18.0.1 in October, to address screen and camera freezing issues, and the latest 18.2.1 update for bug fixes.

In its notice, the CPA asked the companies to explain their pricing methods and address concerns about potential discrimination. The ministry described the practice as "apparent differential pricing" and sought a detailed response to ensure transparency and fairness in fare calculations.



Recently, a survey by LocalCircles revealed that 60 percent of iPhone users experienced service problems, with call failures being the most significant issue. Nearly 90 percent of surveyed iPhone users attributed their difficulties directly to an iOS update, with no blame placed on Wi-Fi or mobile networks. Last month, the internet was abuzz with speculation that cab aggregators charged different fares - higher for those making bookings on iPhones - for the same ride. However, other social media users soon joined the chorus, alleging they were being charged different fares for identical rides when booking through Android and iOS devices.

Joshi had emphasized "zero tolerance for consumer exploitation" and asked the CPA to conduct a thorough inquiry into these allegations. He had described this practice as a "prima facie unfair trade practice" and a "blatant disregard" for consumers' right to transparency.

Poll chai-naastha fixed by EC

The poll watchdog is closely monitoring the rates of chai, pakora, even chole-kulche, and how much is spent on garlands and drones while campaigning in the assembly polls in the national capital. The Election Commission of India has specified rates such as Rs 35 for a plate of poori-sabzi, Rs 30 for kulche-chole, Rs 19 for a plate of pakoras, Rs 12 for a samosa or bread pakora, Rs 6 for a cup of tea, Rs 12 for a cup of coffee, Rs 20 for a sandwich, Rs 15 for a kachori, Rs 19 for a one-litre water bottle, and Rs 70 for lunch or dinner.

According to the rates chart approved by the EC, the rate for the use of drones is fixed at Rs 7,000 per day. A small garland cannot exceed Rs 20, while 10-foot garlands cannot cost more than Rs 1,500. Flowers used for stage decorations are priced at Rs 35 per square foot. A candidate can hire a horse at Rs 3,075 per day and an elephant at Rs 6,150 per day.

Candidates need to get the poll panel's approval to hire animals for campaigning. The daily wage rate ranges from Rs 692 for unskilled workers to Rs 913 for graduates and above. The EC has also set rates for accommodations in hotels and

for vehicles. The rates for vehicles like Tata Sumo, Toyota Innova, and Mahindra Scorpio, among others, are Rs 2,421 per day per vehicle. For a normal car, the limit is Rs 1,499 per day. The maximum cost for a two-wheeler is Rs 84 per day.

The rate list also specifies the maximum expenditure limit for tents, chairs, tables, podiums, and generators. For gatherings of up to 2,000 people, for example, the maximum rate, including all related expenses, is set at Rs 30,000 per event. For smaller gatherings of fewer than 250 people, the staging rate is Rs 6,150. A broom, the party symbol of the

ruling Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), used for maintaining party offices, event venues, or during campaigning, cannot cost more than Rs 25 each. There are also price limits for flags, posters, handbills, hoardings, cut-outs, and stickers.

Pens used in party election offices cannot exceed Rs 6 each. Among the musical instruments used at campaign events, drums are priced at Rs 500 per day.

According to officials, each returning officer prepares the rate list of services and materials used by the candidates. Officials said the itemized rate list is finalized by a committee, which includes

the electoral officer, in consultation with political parties, candidates, and traders, and is handed over to each person filing nomination papers. Though in a city like Delhi, which has 70 assembly constituencies with an average of 22-25 lakh voters each in an area of 1,483 square kilometers, the prices of most commodities are more or less the same but may vary occasionally.

Candidates are required to submit their expenditure report to the poll panel within 30 days of the completion of an election. The expenses are also monitored by the commission through video recording during the campaign.

The accounting of expenses is done from the date candidates file their nomination papers until the day of the results. In the event of a violation or incorrect claims, the candidacy of the person is canceled as per Election Commission rules. As a norm, the poll panel tracks candidates' expenses item-wise during election campaigns. The rates are fixed based on feedback from district election officials, market dealers, political parties, and the prevailing Consumer Price Index (CPI).

Doubts raised in Saif Ali attack case

There is still more than what meets the eye in matters relating to the recent attack on Bollywood actor Saif Ali Khan and the arrest of the accused Shariful Islam Shehzad Mohammad Amin Fakir for his alleged involvement in the incident. Or so it appears, going by the questions being raised in different quarters about the actor's rapid recovery and also the identity of the arrested Bangladeshi national.

On his part, Shariful's father Mohammed Ruhul Amin Fakir has questioned the authenticity of the of the CCTV footage used to make the arrest of his son did not match with that of the person in the CCTV footage taken from actor's building on the day of incident, in which the intruder to Saif's house is seen climbing down the stairs. The CCTV-based photograph which initially made it to social media has been featured widely in print and electronic media. Talking to a leading television, the accused's father Mohammed Fakir said:



"The person in the CCTV footage is not my son. But the police have used this footage as the basis to arrest my son (in connection with the Saif Ali Khan attack)". Mohammed Fakir also defended his son by saying his son had never kept his hair long, unlike the person in the video. Shariful was arrested by the Mumbai police from Hiranandani Estate at Thane

(west) on January 19. Police said Shariful hailed from Rajabariya village in Nalchity sub-region of Jhalokati district in southern Bangladesh.

When Shariful was produced before a holiday court on the same day, the accused's lawyer Sandeep D. Sherkhane had contested the claim made by the police that his client was a Bangladeshi who came to Mumbai six months ago.

"The accused has been living in Mumbai with his family for the past 7 years. I argued in court yesterday very clearly on this. The police are trying to make him a scapegoat as this case involves a Bollywood celebrity," Sherkhane had said.

It may be recalled that during the knife attack carried out on him allegedly by Shariful in the small hours of January 16, Saif had sustained six stab wounds, including the one in his spine while he was grappling an intruder in the actor's 12th floor apartment in posh "Satguru Sharan" building at Bandra (W) in north-west Mumbai.

Varied concerns influence people in Haridwar civic polls

People voted on issues ranging from infrastructural development, sanitation and education to livelihood in areas falling under the Municipal Corporation of Haridwar in the civic polls on Thursday. A number of first-time voters were also seen exercising their franchise in various parts of the city. While the possible impact of the Har Ki Paldi corridor was prominent for the voters in some areas, many also voted according to issues like cleanliness and development. Members of the business fraternity and those in the travel industry said that they were influenced by the issue of the Har Ki Paldi corridor. Kavita in the Ramnagar area said that she had voted on issues like clean water, electricity, development and women's safety. First-time voter Sadaf said, "My vote will go to the candidate who pro-



vides education to the girls in my society. The girls in my community are in need of education which should be facilitated for them." Another young voter Atif in the Ramnagar area opined that the people need change as development will naturally follow. Expressing his concern at the possible impact of the Har Ki Paldi

corridor, Deepak Kumar in the Brahmapuri area said that the corridor will negatively affect the businesses of many locals. "I kept this in mind while casting my vote," he said. Another voter Ajay Bisht said that he had accorded importance to the issue of cleanliness while casting his vote in the civic polls.

Mobile phone ban at polling stations causes hassles for voters

The strict implementation of the ban on mobile phones inside many polling stations left several voters, especially those who came alone, facing inconvenience on Thursday. At various polling booths across the city, voters were left frustrated as they struggled to find secure arrangements for their phones before casting their votes. A first-time voter Rajni Sharma (21) who came alone to a polling station in Adhoniwala said, "I did not know phones were not allowed. With no one to hand my phone to, the police officers also refused to keep it. Finally, I entrusted it to a woman who had already voted but it felt unsafe leaving my property with a stranger." Another voter, Kirti Mawal, shared her experience of holding phones for four strangers outside the polling station. "I didn't even know them, but everyone was in trouble, so I helped. There should have been designated booths to store phones for the convenience of voters," she said. The

ban also caused delays for many voters, with some returning home to drop off their phones, while others relied on the goodwill of strangers. Deepak Thapa, who attempted to vote during his lunch break, said, "I had to wait an extra 15 minutes to find someone willing to hold my phone. Some people left without voting because they did not want to entrust their phones to strangers. In the last Lok Sabha elections, the officials deployed at the polling station took our phone and returned it after we voted. If this was not allowed this time, temporary lockers or secure alternatives should have been provided to voters." The issue also led to crowding outside many polling stations, as relatives and acquaintances held phones while voters went inside to cast their ballots. Mohan Singh, who waited outside a Raipur Road polling station with his child, said, "I was holding my toddler and went to cast my vote once my wife finished and could take

care of our child and hold my phone." While some police officers refused to hold phones, fearing confusion and additional responsibility, there were reports of officials at certain booths assisting voters by holding their devices temporarily. However, the lack of a standardised solution left many voicing the need for designated phone storage facilities at polling stations. Many opined that mobile phone ban, though aimed at ensuring fair and secure voting, has highlighted the need for better logistical arrangements to prevent voter inconvenience in future elections. However, many also opined that leaving mobile phones at home is not a big deal and some people are just too attached to their phones. "How hard is it to leave your phone in your home for a maximum of 20 to 30 minutes? It is not just young adults but older people also act similarly," senior citizen Tej Singh Gusain said.

First-time voters flock to polling booths in Doon

A number of first-time voters flocked to polling booths in Dehradun on Thursday to cast votes in the civic body elections. Many opined that they had voted to bring about improvement and sustainable development in the city. Many accorded priority to women's safety and security, availability of public toilets, creation of playgrounds and the establishment of libraries, among other aspects. First-time voter Priyanka Chandra stated that she had voted for the first time in the ULB election with a focus on development which ultimately benefits the citizens. She stated that the elected candidates must prioritise the safety and security of women, ensure the availability of public toilets and playgrounds to promote physical activity among young adults. "I was very excited to vote for the first time. Regardless of who wins, the elected candidates must work with integrity and prioritise development initiatives that benefit the citizens. In my opinion, elected representatives should focus on providing public toilets and libraries for young adults," said another first-time voter, Kartavya Narang. Similarly, another first-time voter, Gauri Virmani, expressed her excitement at participating in the electoral process for the first time. She emphasised that the elected candidates should prioritise the city's development, viewing it as a crucial responsibility rather than a mere formality.

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Senior citizens cast vote with doubts over promised change in Doon

Senior citizens in Dehradun turned out to cast their votes in the urban local body elections on Thursday but many expressed apprehension about whether the newly elected representatives will bring any meaningful change. While they fulfilled their civic duty, they voiced frustration over the lack of basic amenities such as proper sanitation, garbage collection and garbage-free surroundings, which have been neglected for years, according to them. Retired army officer Kishan Singh Jeena (72), who traditionally supported either the Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) or Congress, said he decided

to vote for an independent candidate this time. "For years, BJP and Congress-backed candidates have failed to make any improvements in my area. I have not seen the councillor of my ward in the past five years, they only show up during elections. This time, I voted for an independent candidate, hoping that the right person wins," he said. Similarly, Ladpur Road resident Basanti Prajapati (62) expressed her dissatisfaction with the previous leadership, particularly the councillor. "I did not know much about the candidates, so I discussed them with my children. They recommended

a few names and I voted based on their suggestions. All I want is for my area to be garbage-free, including better management of cow dung disposal," she said. A resident of Sahasthradara Road, Surya Verma (78) said that his primary concern is illegal garbage dumping by commercial establishments. However, he remains doubtful about whether the new mayor or councillors will take effective action. "I have lost faith in elected representatives. They rarely deliver on their promises. Still, voting is the least we can do if we hope for change," he said. Another senior citizen, Rajat Payal,

highlighted the need for special parks or safe spaces for older people, as many feel unsafe walking on roads during the mornings and evenings in Dehradun. However, he opined that improving the city's sanitation should be the municipal corporation's immediate priority. "The sanitation system is in a terrible state in Dehradun and they must address this first," he added. Despite their concerns, senior citizens expressed a sense of responsibility in voting, hoping for a better future while remaining wary of the promises made by elected representatives.

CM holds two road shows in Delhi

Chief minister Pushkar Singh Dhama held two road shows in Delhi in support of BJP candidates for the upcoming Delhi Assembly elections. The CM held road shows in Palam in support of BJP candidate Kuldeep Solanki and at Motibagh in support of BJP candidate from Delhi Cantt. In these public meetings, Dhama exhorted the people of Delhi to throw the AAP government out of power. "The AAP government of Kejriwal was involved in a series of scams such as liquor scam, bus scam, medicine scam and Sheesh Mahal scam in the last 10 years. The scams resulted in jail for the CM, deputy CM, ministers and MLAs of AAP," he said.

Dhama said that the AAP government had promised to open 500 schools in Delhi but instead of schools it opened liquor shops in every nook and corner of the city. The Delhi government was not ashamed of opening liquor shops even near temples. The Uttarakhand CM said that the people should not be deceived by the promises of the Congress party as well. He said that the Congress party supported those who want to reinstate article 370 of the constitution in Kashmir. Dhama said that after coming to power in Delhi the BJP will constitute an SIT to investigate the deeds of the AAP government and all the scammers will be sent to jail.

BJP accuses MLA of voter list manipulation in Badkot municipality

The Bharatiya Janata Party's State media in-charge Manveer Singh Chauhan has accused Yamunotri MLA Sanjay Dobhal of tampering with the voter list in Badkot municipality. Chauhan alleged that fictitious names were added to the list, enabling outsiders to cast fake votes during Thursday's polling.

According to Chauhan, approximately 50 per cent of the votes cast were fraudulent. He claimed that about 4,000 to 5,000 fake votes were recorded in the municipality, whose total population is only 10,300. Chauhan further alleged that Dobhal orchestrated this manipulation to secure a victory for his brother, who is a candidate for the Badkot municipal council chairman. He accused the MLA of employing unethical tactics to influence the election outcome.

ED attaches Rs 70 crore land linked to ex-minister

DEHRADUN: The Enforcement Directorate (ED) has provisionally attached immovable property - about 101 bighas land in Dehradun district worth Rs 70 crore linked to former minister and Congress leader Harak Singh Rawat. The action was taken in the case of Birendra Singh Kandari and others under the provisions of Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA), 2002. The former cabinet minister had allegedly hatched a conspiracy along with his associates to usurp prime lands in Dehradun. The attachment was done on the basis of the FIR registered at Sahaspur, Dehradun.

Youth electrocuted while pulling down banner

DEHRADUN: A youth was electrocuted after coming into contact with a 33 KV high tension wire when he was pulling down a political party's banner. The accident occurred at Durga Chowk in Bhaniyawala in Dehradun around 10 AM on Thursday. The deceased was identified as Manoj Panwar (26), resident of Athurwala, Dehradun. Amrita Hospital to launch advanced OPD for serious ailment in Doon



BJP questions Rawat's voter awareness, accuses him of political drama

The Bharatiya Janata Party took a dig at former Uttarakhand chief minister Harish Rawat, questioning his voter awareness after he reportedly struggled to find his name on the electoral roll on polling day on Thursday. The BJP State president Mahendra Bhatt criticised Rawat, pointing out that his confusion over where he is registered to vote reflects poorly on his awareness as a citizen. Bhatt said that Rawat's frequent electoral ventures from different constituencies, be it Haridwar, Almora or Udham Singh Nagar, have left him unsure of whether he belongs to an urban or rural constituency. According to him, Rawat's apparent desperation and last minute search suggest an attempt to create unnecessary drama. Bhatt further said that such tactics are unbecoming of a senior leader and reflect poorly on the level of politics practiced by the Congress. He advised Rawat to take respon-

sibility as a voter and ensure his registration in advance. Drawing a comparison, Bhatt said that he, too, is a rural voter and due to circumstances, could not vote that day but ensured that his voter information was accurate beforehand. He suggested that Rawat should have done the same rather than engaging in what he called theatrics. Bhatt said that resorting to superficial displays and baseless allegations does not suit a leader of Rawat's stature. He urged Rawat to set a better example for his party members by being a responsible and informed voter instead of indulging in petty political drama. The BJP, confident of its victory, dismissed Rawat's actions as a sign of desperation and a distraction from the real issues at hand.

CEC sounds note of caution against fake narratives

Chief Election Commissioner (CEC) Rajiv Kumar on Thursday sounded a note of caution against fake narratives, saying they erode trust in electoral processes, and noted that the misinformation is typically timed to target the vitals of poll process.

Making this assertion at an international conference of election management bodies organised by Election Commission of India, he said while technology offers significant opportunities, it also brings challenges like cybersecurity threats and misinformation. He urged Election Management Bodies to streamline strategies for addressing these technological challenges to effectively mitigate the risks. Sounding a note of caution against fake narratives which erode trust in electoral processes,

he said that such fake narratives are typically timed at crucial junctures of the election process to target its very vitals. In his address, CEC Kumar also outlined key trends shaping the future of elections, including AI-driven processes, online and remote voting, biometric authentication and increased global collaboration. He urged the participating poll management bodies to explore the opportunities with technological advancements in making elections more transparent, inclusive and accessible. He underscored the role of election management bodies in not only safeguarding electoral processes globally but also expanding their reach and impact. Poll organisations from Uzbekistan, Sri Lanka, Mauritius, Indonesia and Kazakhstan placed their concerns on disinformation, misinformation and fake narratives on social media affecting elec-

toral integrity while making their presentations on their electoral experience in 2024. CEC of Mauritius Abdool Rahman also stressed on the menace of fake news, saying it undermines voters' trust in the poll bodies. Highlighting a particular case of fake online applications for recruitment of election staff, Rahman expressed concern over the use of technology and social media in intensifying the menace of misinformation and disinformation during elections. A representative of the Electoral Commission of Namibia, while expressing concern over the rising trend of fake news, sought suggestions on tackling fake news on social media. Commissioner, General Election Commission of Indonesia, Idhan Holik spoke about their experience of using a dedicated WhatsApp channel to tackle misinformation in real



time. The ECI is hosting the two-day international conference. It brings together representatives from Election Management Bodies (EMBs) of nearly 13 countries and international organisations for discussions on key issues of contemporary election management. The conference on the theme 'Global Election Year 2024: Reiteration of Democratic Spaces, Takeaway for EMBs' is hosted by the ECI based on the varied experiences of EMBs in conducting elections in 2024, in India and the other countries. Nearly 30 representatives from the Election Management Bodies (EMBs) of 13 countries including Bhutan, Georgia, Namibia, Uzbekistan, Sri Lanka, Indonesia, Kazakhstan, Ireland, Mauritius, Philippines, Russian Federation, Tunisia, and Nepal are attending. In his address, CEC Kumar also reflected that 2024 was a defining year as a test for EMBs for

reaffirmation of democratic values amidst challenging and complexities. He emphasized on the critical role of technology and digital innovations in enhancing efficiency, transparency and voter confidence. He underscored the role of EMBs in not only safeguarding electoral processes globally but also expanding their reach and impact. Highlighting India's historic general elections with a record participation of 647 million voters and over one million polling stations, CEC Kumar said the elections were also more inclusive with greater participation especially among women, elderly aged 85+, Persons with Disabilities (PwDs) and the third gender. CEC Kumar underscored the importance of collaborative efforts in capacity building and global cooperation as vital to safeguarding democratic processes and strengthening election management world-

wide. Bhutan's Chief election commissioner Dashi Sonam Topgay said the electronic voting machines provided by India have brought process efficiencies during polls in his country. He said the EVMs have won the trust of the people in Bhutan. Thanking India for providing the EVMs, he lauded the process efficiencies brought in by the machines since their use in the elections in that country. Speaking on digital IDs, Topgay said Bhutan has a biometric Unified National ID which is used for voter authentication. Bhutan is exploring the possibility of online voting in future elections, he told the gathering. Besides Bhutan, a limited number of Indian EVMs are used in Nepal and Namibia, EC functionaries said. Public undertakings BEL and ECIL produce EVMs for the Election Commission.

Keen on finding solution over disparity in High Court judges pension, says SC

The Supreme Court on Thursday said it was keen on finding a solution over the issue of disparity in pension to retired high court judges. A bench of Justices B R Gavai, Augustine George Masih and K Vinod Chandran said it wanted to settle the issue once and for all. "We have been telling it since the beginning that we are keen on finding a solution, not laying down a law," it said. The top court was hearing arguments on a batch of pleas raising the issue of different pension being payable to retired high court judges. "One of the key reasons highlighted before the top court was that the high court judges, who were elevated from the district judiciary, were covered under the New Pension Scheme. However, those elevated to



the high court from the Bar were the beneficiaries of the Old Pension Scheme leading to a mismatch in the pension payable to two sets of high court judges. "We know that when you are there, it will all be resolved," the bench told attorney general R Venkataramani on Thursday. The bench deliberated over uniformity in the pension to

retired high court judges for parity. "We want to settle these issues once and for all," it observed. The arguments in the matter would continue on January 28. In December 2024, the top court said it was "pitiable" that some retired high court judges were getting a pension ranging between Rs 10,000 and Rs 15,000. It asked authorities to have a

"humane approach" instead of adopting a "legal approach". The bench observed the matter would not be decided on individual cases and whatever the top court might lay down would be applicable to all the high court judges. The top court had also expressed "shock" that some retired high court judges were getting a meagre pension ranging between Rs 6,000 and Rs 15,000. While hearing a separate plea in March last year, the apex court said there cannot be any discrimination in computing the pensionary benefits of retired judges of high courts based on whether they were elevated from the bar or the district judiciary. Pensionary benefits of a retired high court judge, elevated from the district judiciary, should be computed based on his or her last drawn salary as a high court judge, it said.

Egyptian Foreign Minister to visit India

Egyptian Foreign Minister Badr Abdelatty is set to visit India in the first week of next month to review the overall trajectory of bilateral ties and explore ways to expand cooperation in areas of trade, investment, shipping and agriculture. Abdelatty will hold wide-ranging talks with External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar covering the entire gamut of bilateral ties as well as the evolving situation in the Middle East following the Israel-Hamas ceasefire deal. The two ministers are also set to take stock of implementation of the decisions firmed up during talks between Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Egyptian President Abdel Fattah El-Sisi in 2023, sources said here on Thursday. The two sides will look at shoring up cooperation in a number of areas including trade, investment and agriculture, they said. While the Egyptian President visited India in January 2023 to grace the Republic Day cele-



brations as the Chief Guest, Modi travelled to Egypt in June that year, reflecting growing intensity in the bilateral ties. India and Egypt elevated their ties to the level of strategic partnership and resolved to significantly broaden the bilateral engagement in areas of defence, security and trade during El-Sisi's visit to India. The two leaders also decided to take the volume of bilateral trade to USD 12 billion in the next five years from around USD seven billion recorded that year.


Egypt has traditionally been one of India's most important trading partners in the African continent. The India-Egypt bilateral trade agreement has been in operation since March 1978. The bilateral trade has increased more than five times in last 10 years. Around 50 Indian companies have invested in various sectors in Egypt with a combined investment exceeding USD 3.25 billion. A joint statement issued during El-Sisi's visit to India two years back mentioned that the Egyptian side is considering

the possibility of allocating a special area of land for the Indian industries in the Suez Canal Economic Zone (SCEZ). The Suez Canal, connecting the Mediterranean Sea with the Red Sea, is one of the world's busiest trade routes. About 12 percent of global trade passes through the canal each day. India and Egypt are also looking at deepening cooperation in the field of agriculture and allied services besides strengthening the supply chain of food articles. The defence and strategic cooperation between India and Egypt has been on an upswing in the last few years. The Indian and Egyptian Armies conducted the first ever joint exercise in January this year. Egypt had already shown interest in procuring Tejas light combat aircraft, radars, military helicopters and other platforms from India. In July 2022, the IAF participated in a month-long tactical leadership programme in Egypt with three Su-30 MKI jets and two C-17 transport aircraft.

Court refuses FIR over M F Husain paintings

Delhi court has refused to direct an FIR on a plea alleging two paintings of late artist and Padma awardee M F Husain hurt religious sentiments and said no further probe was required. Judicial magistrate first class Sahil Monga said all the facts and circumstances of the case were within the knowledge of the complainant, the CCTV footage of Delhi Art Gallery, and the paintings in question have already been seized. "No further investigation and collection of evidences is required on the part of investigating agency at this stage, as all the evidences are in the possession of complainant as well as on record," said the court. The matter, it went on, could proceed before the court as a complaint case and issued notice to Delhi Art Gallery Pvt. Ltd., its CEO and MD Ashish Anand, and Director Ashwani Anand for February 12.



The judge observed police in its action taken report said the paintings in question were seized. The report further said the commission of cognisable offence could not be ascertained, the judge noted. The judge on January 20 ordered the seizure of the paintings displayed at the art gallery and reserved the order

on FIR after hearing arguments. The paintings feature Hindu deities Hanuman and Ganesh. During the hearing on the plea, complainant and advocate Amita Sachdeva, said the most revered entities of Sanatan Dharma -- Hanuman and Ganesh -- were insulted in Husain's paintings.

"This is obscenity. Depicted most revered deities in obscene manner a deliberate and malicious insult. Husain may be the greatest artist in the world, but he has no right to insult my deities," she argued. She claimed there was an advertisement and thousands of people saw the painting of "deities being ridiculed".

"Prima facie case is made out for exhibiting such offensive paintings for public viewing and hurting religious sentiments," added Sachdeva. Ordering the seizure, Monga cited the police's action taken report, which said the investigating officer seized the security camera footage and the network video recorder of the art gallery. The report said the art exhibition was held privately and the paintings, including the two in question, were only to display the original work of Husain. "At this stage an application has been moved by complainant for direction to the IO to seize the painting in question. In light of the facts and circumstances mentioned in the said application, the said application is allowed and IO is directed to seize the said painting," the January 20 order said. Husain, a recipient of Padma Vibhushan, India's second-highest civilian award, died in 2011.



CBI closes case against DHFL in 'fake accounts' case

The CBI has closed the case against the DHFL and its directors pertaining to 2.60 lakh allegedly fictitious home loan accounts, some of which were used to claim interest subsidies under the Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojna, officials said. After over three years of probe, the agency could not find evidence suggesting a criminal conspiracy which could have led to the creation of such accounts, they said. The irregularities were pointed out in the report of auditor Grant Thornton, appointed by the new board of the scam-hit Dewan Housing Finance Limited (DHFL), they said. The agency has now submitted its final report before a special court in Delhi, which would take a call on whether to accept the closure report or order further



investigation into the matter. The CBI had booked promoters Kapil and Dheeraj Wadhawan along with the company. It was alleged that DHFL had opened a fictitious branch in Bandra and fake accounts worth Rs 14,046 crore of home-loan borrowers, who had already repaid their loans, were entered in the database, they said. A total of 2.60 lakh 'fake and fictitious' home loan accounts were created in the non-existent branch from 2007-19 for a total loan worth Rs 14,046 crore, out of which Rs 11,755.79 crore were deposited or routed to several fictitious firms known as Bandra Book firms, the CBI had alleged in the FIR.



Chinar trees of Jammu and Kashmir to be geo-tagged

A "Digital Tree Aadhaar" programme has been launched by the Jammu and Kashmir government for conservation of the majestic Chinars which will see creation of a comprehensive database of the tree facing threats due to rapid urbanisation. Under the initiative, the chinar trees – a cultural and ecological symbol of J-K – are being geo-tagged and equipped with QR codes that record information, including its geographical location, health, and growing patterns, enabling conservationists to track changes and address risk factors. The campaign involves use of modern technology, including Geographical Information System (GIS), to create a comprehensive database for conservation of the chinar trees. The initiative aims to safeguard chinar trees from threats such as urbanisation, deforestation, and habitat degradation. The project is being spearheaded by J-K Forest Research Institute (FRI) of J-K Forest Department. The QR-based digital plate is affixed to each surveyed Chinar tree using a specialised spring-enabled metal. Each tree is given a unique id like Aadhaar specifying the year the tree is surveyed, the district it is located and a serial number for easy identification. "Chinar is a part of our culture. We are doing a survey to know the total number of chinars, their status, their height, girth, etc. So, we have taken this initiative of tree geo-tagging," Project Coordinator, FRI, Syed Tariq, told PTI here. He said so far, around 28,500 chinar trees have been identified, surveyed and their data updated, and the process is going on. "We are preserving that data in the heritage registers of each district. Each district will have its own heritage register girth," he said. The official said the project has been named as "Digital Tree Aadhaar" with each tree having a tree number. "There is complete information about the specific chinar tree in the QR code. When the code is scanned, it will give instant information about the tree. "A person can get required information about the tree including its location with coordinates, physical characters, health status, height, girth, tree shape, number of main branches, whether the tree is a seed bearer or not, and whether the tree is diseased or not" he said. The district specific codes in the unique code have been taken from the RTO codes. Each tree is photographed and those are uploaded so that they are readily available at the click of a mouse. The official said the department lacked credible data about the number of chinar trees in the valley before this survey. "We had a rough estimate of 40,000 or 45,000 trees, but there was no exact number. The idea of a unique code came because once we go for a census, there is always an apprehension of duplication. To avoid this, we came up with this unique ID," Tariq said. He said the chinar tree, a symbol of cultural heritage, faces threats like urbanisation, deforestation and habitat loss. To ensure its survival, the J-K Forest Department and J-K FRI are leveraging digital tools, including geo-tagging and QR codes, for effective monitoring and conservation. These efforts aim to preserve chinars and their habitats, he said. The campaign has revealed that the highest number of chinar trees in the valley are found in Srinagar, followed by Ganderbal, Anantnag and Baramulla districts. The official said in the top 20 series of chinars in the World Monumental Trees, 11 are in from Kashmir.

Can suspending commodity derivatives rein in food price

The debate over whether speculative trading in futures commodity markets drives food price inflation remains unresolved in India and across Asia

While there are several concerns in India and across Asia, certain policy and key opinion circles that food price inflation is catalysed or influenced somehow by speculative trading in the futures commodity markets. Even while opinions are divided in policy circles and among economists who have studied and examined the nature of the relationship between food inflation and commodity and derivative futures trading contracts, and no empirical evidence hitherto seems to have been found despite numerous studies undertaken in India. It would be worth mentioning that a detailed empirical research study conducted by leading researchers from the Indian Institute of Management Udaipur specifically studied three suspension events in India of futures traded commodities, which led the researchers to firmly state that the counterfactual for each of the examined episodes confirms that even in the absence of trading suspensions, food prices or inflationary trends would have followed their dynamic path. Any upward price volatility could ostensibly be the effects or counter-effects of various extraneous domestic or global (especially geopolitical) factors. It is also equally understandable and natural for any governing policy institution to be both fully cognisant and mindful of food price inflationary trends, and the fact that rising food prices can have a cataclysmic effect on food security and thus, by extension could have substantive socio-economic impact.

Successive policy establishments and ecosystems have always been overly cautious, ever since futures trading commodity derivatives exchanges were established in the early 2000s. Despite the mandate of such commodity exchanges that futures trading contracts encourage effective and fair price discovery and risk hedging, which consequently safeguards the commodity value chain from price risk which is a result of a fundamental play between demand and supply the apprehensions concerning these market-driven tools continued to remain, manifesting itself the way of multiple instances of suspensions on certain commodity derivative contracts. While trading suspensions have been a constant feature since 2007-2008, under the advisement of the price monitoring mechanisms and agencies within the government policy ecosystem, there never has been an occasion when suspensions of commodity trading exceeded more than a year in a single stretch, barring the odd 'sensitive' food commodity. So as a commodity markets expert, with a domestic and world view of ongoing trading in global commodity markets, one begs to specifically ask - Do derivatives trading suspensions really rein in food price inflation? Researchers have constantly alluded to synthetic control methodologies to apply to their studies for studying specific suspensions, their findings fairly and comprehensively conclude and determine that there is no empirical evidence that derivatives suspension had any impact whatsoever on food prices. On the contrary, from specific instances studied, such as those of Bengal Gram (Chana)



in August 2021 and Mustard Seed Derivatives in October 2021, analysis from the said report from IIM Udaipur shows that prices of both commodities, Chana and mustard oil, would have continued on the same price trend path even without the suspension. To specifically quote a potent segment of the said study - it clearly articulates that the conducted research does not find any role of futures market trading on price changes, nor does it find any empirical evidence of the impact of suspension of trade on price behaviour in the period after suspension. Rather, the analysis shows that prices of commodities such as mustard oil would have had a similar trend even without the suspension. Furthermore, the study finds that before the suspension futures market had a dominant share of 64 per cent in discovering the true and fair price of the mustard seed commodity derivative. The study goes on further to articulate that commodity derivative suspensions hurt genuine participants discourage the growth of domestic agri-derivatives markets and resultantly impact the growth of price hedging prospects of the commodity value chain

including CBBOs (Cluster Business Organisations) and FPOs (Farmer Producer Organisations), while consequently hurting the value realisation and income levels of farmers. It also adversely impacts India's position in providing a global price benchmark, despite the country being a major producer and consumer of several agricultural commodities. Needless to say, as an active observer of the Indian agri-based commodity trading ecosystem, it behove advocacy and argument that summary commodity suspensions as a method to arrest or contain food price inflation should not be adopted and further the suspension of futures trading contracts of agricultural commodity derivatives must be revoked. In closure, one must say emphatically that the development of the agri-derivatives market is supported in India, which in turn will lead to fair price discovery and transparent hedging of price risks, eventually creating a positive socio-economic impact for farmers and the agri-ecosystem in India. In a tearing hurry to make America great again, Trump bombarded his country and the rest of the world with a slew of executive orders. He withdrew the US from the World Health Organisation, alleging that the global agency had mishandled the COVID-19 pandemic. INDIA'S FOREIGN POLICY: CHAMPIONING THE GLOBAL SOUTH

India's approach balances national priorities with global responsibilities

India's External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar attended the US presidential inauguration earlier this week. President Trump's inauguration by itself is an epochal moment for global international relations. India outlined its foreign policy approach a few days ago, during EAM's address at Nani Palkivala's memorial lecture. He mentioned that India's foreign policy in 2025 reflects a deepening commitment to multilateralism, but also recognises the competitive realities of a shifting global order. The nation has embraced issue-based partnerships with major groupings like the Quad, BRICS, and the India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor (IMEC). India's ability to balance multiple memberships and partnerships underscores its evolving diplomatic strategy, driven by a pragmatic approach to international relations.

At the heart of India's foreign policy is a strong solidarity with the Global South, rooted in post-colonial values of independence, sovereignty and resistance to external pressures. This unique perspective sets India apart from traditional alliance structures, as it champions the rights of developing nations while pursuing its strategic interests. While India continues to engage in global dialogues, it maintains its core principle of non-alignment and the freedom to choose partners based on national priorities. Recent shifts in India's domestic policies—across politics, economics and security—have influenced its foreign relations.



Notably, India's relationship with the United States has transformed, moving past historical hesitations to embrace a deeper strategic partnership. This cooperation spans security, technology, trade, and science, benefiting both nations. India's diaspora also plays a crucial role, acting as a living bridge to enhance bilateral ties. Despite occasional policy shifts in the US, the foundation for a robust relationship is now firmly established. However, India's engagement with China remains a complex challenge. As the two largest Asian nations with over a billion people each, their dynamic is shaped by historical disputes and differing political systems. The boundary issue, exacerbated by tensions since 2020, continues to complicate bilateral relations. The guiding principles for India's approach to China are mutual respect, sensitivity, and shared interests, with an emphasis on long-term stability and a multi-polar Asia. In the Indo-Pacific, India has extended its Act East policy, fostering deeper relationships with Japan, Australia and ASEAN countries, and strengthening the Quad alliance.

This partnership has progressed in areas such as climate action, maritime security, and digital connectivity. Similarly, India's collaboration with Russia remains a pillar of its foreign policy, with growing economic ties and shared strategic interests. India advocates for diplomacy in addressing global challenges, such as the Ukraine conflict, and seeks to provide solutions to global problems, including food security and climate change.

It has assisted smaller neighbours during crises, including the 2023 financial support to Sri Lanka, reinforcing its role as a regional leader. However, India's relationship with Pakistan remains strained due to ongoing cross-border terrorism. India is also engaged in strengthening ties with Myanmar and Afghanistan, maintaining its people-to-people connections despite political complexities. India's global ambitions are reflected in its increasing role in international organisations. As a proponent of multilateral reform, India has pushed for changes in the United Nations, advocating for greater representation of the Global South. It also leads initiatives such as the International Solar Alliance and Coalition for Disaster Resilient Infrastructure. These efforts highlight India's growing responsibility as a global power, dedicated to addressing pressing issues like climate change, digital governance, and humanitarian crises.

Budget 2025: A roadmap to empower farmers and reignite rural India

The Budget must go beyond promises—it must deliver feasible solutions to secure livelihoods, strengthen rural demand and bridge the rural-urban divide

Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman gears up to present the Union Budget 2025-26 on February 1, the nation stands at a pivotal crossroads. With GDP growth projected to dip to a four-year low of 6.4 per cent in FY 2024-25, the spotlight turns to revitalising the rural economy, a cornerstone of the country's consumption-driven progress.

The urgent call for agricultural reforms has grown louder, fueled by ongoing farmer protests, including the fast-unto-death by 70-year-old farmer leader Jagjit Singh Dallewal at Punjab's Khanauri border, which has captured national attention, demanding a legal guarantee for Minimum Support Price (MSP). Agriculture, which employs nearly 45 per cent of the country's workforce and sustains over 60 per cent of its rural population, is at a breaking point. Stagnant productivity, declining incomes, and policy neglect have left farmers in crisis. This Budget cannot be limited to lofty promises—it must deliver practical solutions to secure livelihoods, strengthen rural demand, and narrow the rural-urban divide. Revitalising agriculture is not just an economic necessity but a moral obligation to foster inclusive growth. Here's how Budget 2025 can introduce transformative measures to bolster the agricultural sector and ensure rural spending—currently contributing 60 per cent of total consumption—fuels India's economic resurgence.

1. Boost Agriculture Budget and Research

The allocation for agriculture and allied sectors constitutes only 3 per cent of the Union Budget, which needs to be raised to at least 7.5%. Unspent funds in this category should be carried forward to address critical gaps in research, education, and infrastructure for crop storage and processing. Investing in agricultural research institutions to develop climate-resilient crop varieties and sustainable farming techniques can enhance productivity. Encouraging public-private partnerships in agrarian innovation can further drive the sector's growth.

2. Provide Legal Backing to MSP

The persistent demand for Minimum Support Price (MSP) with legal guarantees highlights the sector's vulnerabilities. Implementing the MS Swaminathan Commission's recommendation of setting MSP at C2 (comprehensive cost of production) +50 per cent and granting it legal status can ensure private buyers do not exploit farmers. This reform would not put a significant financial strain on the government but could protect farmers from distress sales. Furthermore, creating a robust monitoring mechanism to enforce MSP and extending its coverage to more crops can improve farmers' incomes. Enhancing the transparency of procurement processes through digital platforms and integrating MSP enforcement with local market committees can also make the system more reliable.

3. Enhance PM-KISAN Support

The Rs 6,000 annual support to around 10 crore small and marginal farmers under PM-KISAN to help meet their working capital needs, unchanged since its launch in 2018, has not kept pace with inflation. However, with inflation averaging 6 per cent over the past six years. The government should consider doubling this support to Rs 12,000 annually to address farmers' growing financial needs. This increase could significantly impact



small-marginal farmers, who struggle to meet their expenses amid rising input costs for seeds, fertilisers, and irrigation.

4. Transform the Kisan Credit Card (KCC)

The KCC scheme provides short-term loans with an interest subsidy for up to Rs 3 lakh. However, the rigid repayment schedule often forces farmers to rely on private moneylenders to meet short-term cash requirements.

A more farmer-friendly approach would be to convert KCCs into running overdraft accounts, increase the credit limit to Rs 10 lakh, and cap interest rates at 4 per cent. Removing usage restrictions on loans would further empower farmers to make long-term agricultural investments. Additionally, simplifying the KCC application process and enhancing awareness through rural outreach programs can improve access to credit. Expanding the scheme to include sharecroppers, tenant farmers, and farm labourers can promote financial inclusion in agriculture.

5. Introduce a Pension Scheme for Small Farmers

India's farmers lack a robust social security net. A non-contributory pension of Rs3,000 per month for small and marginal farmers aged 60 and above, owning up to 2 hectares of land, could provide much-needed financial security. Contributions from state governments could further augment this scheme. Implementing such a pension system can alleviate poverty among elderly farmers and reduce their dependence on family support.

6. Strengthen Animal Husbandry and Dairy Sectors:

Livestock contributes over 25 per cent to agricultural GDP but suffers from fluctuating milk prices and restrictive cattle rearing and trade policies. A simple yet impactful step would

be legally mandating private dairies to match or exceed the milk procurement prices set by cooperatives like Amul. Additionally, incorporating milk and eggs into the mid-day meal scheme can improve farm incomes while tackling malnutrition among children. Promoting cattle insurance schemes and increasing budgetary allocation for veterinary services can enhance livestock productivity. Encouraging the adoption of modern technologies like artificial insemination and genetic improvement can further boost the sector's contribution to rural livelihoods.

7. Reform Fertiliser Subsidy Policies

The current system treats fertiliser subsidies as farmer benefits but deducts the subsidised amount while calculating MSP. This practice lowers farmers' actual remuneration. MSP calculations should instead consider the market price of inputs, ensuring fairer returns for farmers. The government could also promote balanced fertiliser use by incentivising organic farming practices and providing subsidies for bio-fertilisers. A shift towards a direct benefit transfer system for fertiliser subsidies can reduce leakages and ensure benefits reach the intended beneficiaries.

8. Simplify Crop Insurance

The PM Fasal Bima Yojana requires farmers to navigate complex procedures to claim compensation. The government should shoulder the entire premium initially, including the state's share, and simplify the claim process. This would reduce the administrative burden on farmers while ensuring timely compensation for crop losses.

Leveraging technology like satellite imagery and AI-driven risk assessment models can streamline the verification process and minimise disputes. Expanding insurance coverage to include post-har-

vest losses and natural calamities can make the scheme more comprehensive and farmer-friendly.

9. Reassess Inflation Control Policies

Policies like export bans, stock limits on agricultural produce, and the Food Corporation of India (FCI) dumping grains at below-market prices undermine farmers' profitability. These interventions should be re-evaluated to balance inflation control with fair returns for farmers. Encouraging exports of surplus produce and ensuring better storage infrastructure can reduce post-harvest losses. Developing a decentralised agricultural pricing system driven by real-time market data can align domestic policies with global demand trends. A Vision for Fairness and Growth India's agricultural sector has long been the backbone of its economy, yet farmers have faced systemic neglect and economic disparity.

Over the last decade, the government has written off Rs12.30 lakh crore in big corporate loans, while farmers continue to struggle under mounting debt (Rs 18 lakh crore) and policies that fail to guarantee fair prices for their produce. The 2025 Budget presents an opportunity to correct these imbalances. By addressing these critical issues, the government can improve farmers' lives, spur rural demand, catalyse GDP growth and lay the foundation for a more equitable and sustainable agricultural future. It's time to honour the farmers who feed the nation by delivering the support they deserve.

Trump threatens Russia with tariffs, sanctions

US President Donald Trump has warned his Russian counterpart Vladimir Putin to end the 'ridiculous war' in Ukraine or face high tariffs and further sanctions. Trump, who was sworn in as the 47th President of the United States on January 20, said this on Truth Social on Wednesday, a social media platform owned by him. Trump called out Russian President Putin by name in the social media post, arguing that he always had a good relationship with the leader, but that it was time to settle "this ridiculous war!" Asserting that he is looking to hurt Russia, Trump said he wants no more lives to be lost in the war. "Let's get this war, which never would have started if I were President, over with! We can do it the easy way, or the hard way - and the easy way is always better. It's time to 'MAKE A DEAL.' NO MORE LIVES SHOULD BE LOST!!!" Trump said. "I love the Russian people, and always had a very good relationship with President Putin - and this despite the Radical Left's Russia, Russia, Russia HOAX. We must never forget

that Russia helped us win the Second World War, losing almost 60,000,000 lives in the process," he said. He also warned that if there was not a ceasefire deal soon, he would "have no other choice" but to impose tariffs, taxes and sanctions on "anything being sold by Russia to the United States, and various other participating countries." "All of that being said, I'm going to do Russia, whose Economy is failing, and President Putin, a very big FAVOUR. Settle now, and STOP this ridiculous War! IT'S ONLY GOING TO GET WORSE. If we don't make a "deal," and soon, I have no other choice but to put high levels of Taxes, Tariffs, and Sanctions on anything being sold by Russia to the United States, and various other participating countries," Trump said making an open appeal to the Russian leader. The Biden administration has already imposed numerous sanctions on various Russian economic sectors, including its oil and energy sectors earlier this month, in an effort to cut off its revenues to fund the war in Ukraine. Trump has for months called for a ceasefire in Ukraine, urging both sides to negotiate.

Russian forces invaded Ukraine in early 2022, and both sides have sustained heavy losses in the nearly three years of fighting since. During his campaign, Trump repeatedly said he could settle the war between Russia and Ukraine in one day if he was elected president. He would go on to claim that Putin would never have invaded had Trump been president, the National Public Radio reported. On Tuesday, Trump said he is ready to meet Putin anytime, but at the same time, he warned that he would likely impose sanctions on Russia if the latter does not come to the negotiations table on the issue of Ukraine. "It sounds likely," Trump told reporters when asked if the US will impose additional sanctions on Russia if Putin does not come to the negotiation table. Trump also said that Ukraine's President Zelensky told him that he would like to have peace. "He's told me that he wants to have peace very strongly, but it takes two to tango. We'll see what happens. Anytime they want, I'll meet. I'd like to see that end. Millions of people are being killed. It's a vicious situation," he said.

House passes immigrant detention bill

The Republican-led House on Wednesday gave its final approval to a bill that requires the detention of unauthorised immigrants accused of theft and violent crimes, marking the first legislation that US President Donald Trump can sign as Congress, with some bipartisan support, swiftly moved in line with his plans to crackdown on illegal immigration. Passage of the Laken Riley Act, named after a Georgia nursing student who was murdered last year by a Venezuelan man, shows just how sharply the political debate over immigration has shifted to the right following Trump's election victory. Immigration policy has often been one of the most entrenched issues in Congress, but a crucial faction of 46 politically vulnerable Democrats joined with Republicans to lift the strict proposal to passage on a 263-156 vote tally. "For decades, it has been almost impossible for our government to agree on solutions

for the problems at our border and within our country," Senator Katie Britt, an Alabama Republican, said. She called the legislation "perhaps the most significant immigration enforcement bill" to be passed by Congress in nearly three decades. Still, the bill would require a massive ramp-up in US Immigration and Customs Enforcement's capabilities, but it does not include any new funding. Meanwhile, the new president has launched a slew of executive orders intended to seal off the border of Mexico to immigration and ultimately deport millions of immigrants without permanent legal status in the US. On Wednesday, Trump also cancelled refugee resettlement while his administration signalled intentions to prosecute local law enforcement officials who do not enforce his new immigration policies. Republican congressional leaders have made it clear they intend to follow suit, though their toughest challenge will be finding a way to approve the funding to actually implement

Trump's hard-line plans. "What he's doing is kick-starting what will ultimately be our legislative agenda," said House Speaker Mike Johnson. House Republicans initially passed the legislation last year with support from 37 Democrats in a move that was intended to deliver a political rebuke to then-President Joe Biden's handling of the southern border. It then languished in the Democratic-controlled Senate. This year, Republicans, now with control of both congressional chambers, have made it their top priority. When it came before the Senate, 12 Democrats voted in favour of passage, and when the House voted on a version of the bill earlier this month, 48 Democrats supported it. The vast majority of US adults favour deporting immigrants convicted of violent crimes, according to a recent survey by The Associated Press-NORC Center for Public Affairs Research. However, only about 37 per cent of US adults are in favour of deporting immigrants who have not been convicted of a

crime. "While the bill is not perfect, it sends a clear message that we think that criminals should be deported," said Rep Tom Suozzi, a New York Democrat who has called on his party to support tougher immigration enforcement. Under the legislation, federal authorities would be required to detain any migrant arrested or charged with crimes like shoplifting. The scope of the proposal was widened in the Senate to also include those accused of assaulting a police officer or crimes that injure or kill someone. The bill also gives legal standing to state attorneys general to sue the federal government for harm caused by federal immigration decisions. That gives states new power in setting immigration policy when they have already been trying to push back against presidential decisions under both the Trump and Biden administrations. Democrats unsuccessfully pushed to have that provision stripped from the bill in the Senate, saying it would inject even more uncertainty and

partisanship into immigration policy. Ultimately, even the Trump administration is likely to struggle to implement the new requirements unless Congress follows up later this year with funding. Republicans are currently strategising how to push their priorities through Congress through a party-line process known as budget reconciliation. They have put the cost of funding Trump's border and deportation priorities at roughly USD 100 billion. Trump has "laid out the largest domestic logistical undertaking of our lifetimes — that being the deportation of the vast majority of illegal aliens present in the United States", Ken Cuccinelli, who directed US Citizenship and Immigration Services during Trump's first presidency, recently told a Senate panel. Cuccinelli said it would require a surge of immigration judges, prosecutors and other staff, but Trump has also paved the way to use military troops, bases and other resources to carry out the mass deportations.

Firefighters struggle to control massive blaze north of LA

Firefighters fought to maintain the upper hand on a huge and rapidly moving wildfire that swept through rugged mountains north of Los Angeles and resulted in more than 50,000 people being put under evacuation orders or warnings. The Hughes Fire broke out late Wednesday morning and in less than a day had charred nearly 16 square miles (41 square kilometers) of trees and brush near Lake Castaic, a popular recreation area about 40 miles (64 kilometers) from the devastating Eaton and Palisades fires that are burning for a third week. Though the region was under a red flag warning for critical fire risk, winds were not as fast as they had been when those fires broke out, allowing for firefighting aircraft to dump tens of thousands of gallons of fire retardant on the latest blaze. By Wednesday night, about

14% of the Hughes Fire had been contained. "The situation that we're in today is very different from the situation we were in 16 days ago," Los

Angeles County Fire Chief Anthony Marrone said Wednesday evening. Red flag warnings were extended through 10 a.m. Friday in LA

and Ventura counties. Officials remained concerned that the Palisades and Eaton fires could break their containment lines as firefighters continue watching for hot spots. More than 31,000 people have been ordered to evacuate from the Hughes Fire, and another 23,000 are under evacuation warnings, LA County Sheriff Robert Luna said. There were no reports of homes or other structures burned. Parts of Interstate 5 near the Hughes Fire that had been closed reopened Wednesday evening. A 30-mile (48-kilometer) stretch of the major north-south artery had been closed for emergency vehicles, to move equipment and to prevent accidents due to smoke billowing across it. Crews on the ground and in water-dropping aircraft tried to prevent the wind-driven fire from moving across the interstate and toward Castaic.

Bid to block Trump's cancellation of birthright citizenship in federal court

Washington (PTI): A federal judge in Seattle is set to hear the first arguments on Thursday in a multi-state lawsuit seeking to block President Donald Trump's executive order ending the constitutional guarantee of birthright citizenship regardless of the parents' immigration status. US District Judge John Coughenour scheduled the session to consider the request from Arizona, Illinois, Oregon and Washington. The case is one of five lawsuits being brought by 22 states and a number of immigrants rights groups across the country. The suits include personal testimonies from attorneys general who are US citizens by birthright, and names pregnant women who are afraid their children won't become US citizens. The order, signed by Trump on Inauguration Day, is slated to take effect on February 19. It could impact hundreds of

thousands of people born in the country, according to one of the lawsuits. In 2022, there were about 255,000 births of citizen children to mothers living in the country illegally and about 153,000 births to two such parents, according to the four-state suit filed in Seattle. The US is among about 30 countries where birthright citizenship — the principle of jus soli or "right of the soil" — is applied. Most are in the Americas, and Canada and Mexico are among them. The lawsuits argue that the 14th Amendment to the US Constitution guarantees citizenship for people born and naturalised in the US, and states have been interpreting the amendment that way for a century. Ratified in 1868 in the aftermath of the Civil War, the amendment says: "All persons born or naturalised in the United States and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States and of the

State wherein they reside." Trump's order asserts that the children of noncitizens are not subject to the jurisdiction of the United States, and orders federal agencies to not recognise citizenship for children who don't have at least one parent who is a citizen. A key case involving birthright citizenship unfolded in 1898. The Supreme Court held that Wong Kim Ark, who was born in San Francisco to Chinese immigrants, was a US citizen because he was born in the country. After a trip abroad, he faced being denied reentry by the federal government on the grounds that he wasn't a citizen under the Chinese Exclusion Act. But some advocates of immigration restrictions have argued that case clearly applied to children born to parents who were both legal immigrants. They say it's less clear whether it applies to children born to parents living in the country illegally.

Pentagon sending active duty troops to help secure US-Mexico border

Washington (PTI): The Pentagon on Wednesday said it has begun deploying 1,500 active duty troops to help secure the southern border in the coming days, putting in motion plans US President Donald Trump laid out in executive orders shortly after he took office to crack down on immigration. Acting Defence Secretary Robert Salesses said the Pentagon will provide military aircraft to support Department of Homeland Security deportation flights for more than 5,000 detained migrants and the troops will assist in the construction of barriers. The number of troops and their mission may soon change, Salesses said in a statement. It remains to be seen if they will end up doing law enforcement, which would put American troops in a dramatically different role for the first time in decades. The active duty forces will join the roughly 2,500 US National Guard and Reserve forces already there. There are currently no active duty troops working along the roughly 3,219-km border. Personnel started moving to the border earlier Wednesday, according to a military official briefing reporters on the condition of anonymity to provide additional details on the deployment. The troops will include 500 Marines from Camp Pendleton in California, and the remainder will be army personnel. "Troops have done similar duties in support of Border Patrol agents in the past, when both Trump and former president Joe Biden sent active duty troops to the border. Troops are prohibited by law from doing law enforcement duties under the Posse Comitatus Act, but that may change. Trump has directed through executive order that the incoming secretary of defence and incoming homeland security chief report back within 90 days if they think an 1807 law called the Insurrection Act should be invoked.

Elon Musk clashes with OpenAI CEO

Elon Musk is clashing with OpenAI CEO Sam Altman over the Stargate artificial intelligence infrastructure project touted by President Donald Trump, the latest in a feud between the two tech billionaires that started on OpenAI's board and is now testing Musk's influence with the new president. Trump on Tuesday had talked up a joint venture investing up to \$500 billion through a new partnership formed by OpenAI, the maker of ChatGPT, alongside Oracle and SoftBank. The new entity, Stargate, is already starting to build out data centres and the electricity generation needed for the further development of fast-evolving AI technology. Trump declared it "a resounding declaration of confidence in America's potential" under his new administration, with an initial private investment of \$100 billion that could reach five times that sum. But Musk, a close Trump adviser

who helped bankroll his campaign and now leads a government cost-cutting initiative, questioned the value of the investment hours later. "They don't actually have the money," Musk wrote on his social platform X. "SoftBank has well under \$10B secured. I have that on good authority." Altman responded Wednesday to say Musk was "wrong, as you surely know" and inviting Musk to come visit the first site in Texas that is already under construction. "(T)his is great for the country. I realize what is great for the country isn't always what's optimal for your companies, but in your new role I hope you'll mostly put (America) first," Altman wrote, using a US flag emoji to represent America. The public clash over Stargate is part of a years-long dispute between Musk and Altman that began with a boardroom rivalry over who should run OpenAI, which both men helped found. Musk, an early OpenAI investor and board member, sued the

artificial intelligence company last year alleging it had betrayed its founding aims as a non-profit research lab benefiting the public good rather than pursuing profits. Musk has since escalated the dispute, adding new claims and asking for a court order that would stop OpenAI's plans to convert itself into a for-profit business more fully. A hearing is set for February in a California federal court. The world's richest man, whose companies include Tesla, SpaceX and X, last year started his own rival AI company, xAI, that is building its own big data center in Memphis, Tennessee. Musk says it faces unfair competition from OpenAI and its close business partner Microsoft, which has supplied the huge computing resources needed to build AI systems such as ChatGPT. Tech news outlet The Information first reported on an OpenAI data center project called Stargate in March 2024, indicating that it's been in the works long before Trump announced it.

Teen fatally shoots female student, self at Nashville high school: Police

A female student was killed and another student was wounded on Wednesday in a shooting at a Nashville high school cafeteria, police said. The 17-year-old shooter, who was also a student at Antioch High School, later shot and killed himself with a handgun, Metro Nashville Police spokesperson Don Aaron said during a news conference. Police identified him as Solomon Henderson. Police chief John Drake said the shooter "confronted" a 16-year-old female student in the cafeteria and opened fire, killing her. Police identified her as Josselin Corea Escalante. Drake said police are looking into a motive and whether the students who were shot were targeted. The male student who was

wounded suffered a graze, and was treated and released from the hospital, Drake said. Another student was taken to a hospital for treatment of a

facial injury that happened during a fall, Aaron said. There were two school resource officers in the building when the shooting happened around 11 am (local time), Aaron said. They were not in the immediate vicinity of the cafeteria and by the time they got down there the shooting was over and the gunman had killed himself, Aaron said. The school has about 2,000 students and is located in Antioch, a neighbourhood about 16 km southeast of downtown Nashville. At a family safety centre close to a hospital, officials were helping shocked parents to reunite with their children. Dajuan Bernard was waiting at a Mapco service station to reunite with his son, a 10th grader, who was being held in the auditorium with other students on Wednesday afternoon. He first heard of the shooting from his son who "was a little startled", Bernard said. His son was upstairs from the cafeteria but said he heard the gunfire.

Thousands line up for whiff of flower smelling like gym socks

The rare unfurling of an endangered plant that emits the smell of decaying flesh drew hundreds of devoted fans to a greenhouse in Sydney on Thursday where they joined three-hour lines to experience a momentous bloom — and a fragrance evoking gym socks and rotting garbage. Tall, pointed and smelly, the corpse flower is scientifically known as *Amorphophallus titanum* — or *bunga bangkai* in Indonesia, where the plants are found in the Sumatran rainforest. But to fans of this specimen, she's Patricia — a portmanteau of "putrid" and "Patricia" eagerly adopted by her followers who, naturally, call themselves

Putricians. For a week, she has graced a stately and gothic display in front of a purple curtain and wreathed in mist from a humidifier at the Royal Sydney Botanic Garden. Her rise to fame since has been rapid, with up to 20,000 admirers filing past for a moment in her increasingly pungent presence. No corpse flower has bloomed at the garden for 15 years. "The fact that they open very rarely, so they flower rarely, is obviously something that puts them at a little bit of a disadvantage in the wild," said garden spokesperson Sophie Daniel, who designed Patricia's kooky and funereal display. "When they open, they have to hope that another flower is open nearby, because they can't

self-pollinate." There are thought to be only 300 of the plants in the wild and fewer than 1,000 worldwide — including those in cultivation. Among them is Patricia, which arrived at the garden seven years ago. When her flower was spotted in December she was just 25 centimeters (10 inches) high. By Thursday, she was 1.6 metres (5 feet 3 inches) tall — and her flower spike was slowly opening like a pleated skirt around a majestic central tuber, the yellow-green outer curling to reveal a burgundy centre. As excitement grew in Sydney after the moment of her bloom, garden staff erected crowd barriers, giving the Victorian greenhouse the air of a rock concert. Fans trod a red

carpet to view Patricia from behind velvet ropes in a display inspired by Queen Victoria's funeral, the Rocky Horror Picture Show and the oeuvre of the late director David Lynch. Inside, fans took selfies and leaned in for a sniff — an increasingly perilous prospect as Patricia's odor developed. One young woman raised her hands and bowed as though in worship. On social media, garden staff performed a viral dance to Chappell Roan's summer hit HOT TO GO! against a backdrop of the stately plant. It was difficult to say why the regal, mysterious and stinky flower had attracted such a following — but perhaps the answer lay in the "reverence" viewers felt in the presence of "such an amazing living being,"

Daniel said. Along with her real-life visitors, Patricia's online fandom has been rapid, global and deeply strange — if much less smelly. A 24/7 live stream established by the botanic garden drew close to a million views in less than a week and a shared language of memes and inside jokes sprang up. Frequently deployed acronyms included WWTF, or we watch the flower, WDRNP — we do not rush Patricia — and BBTB, or blessed be the bloom. "Patricia is a metaphor for my life," wrote one poster, who did not elaborate. Commenters on social media made plans to hurry to the garden as the plant opened. In just 24 hours, Patricia's bloom — and her stench — would be gone.

Russian victory in Ukraine will hurt NATO's credibility'

NATO Secretary-General Mark Rutte warned on Thursday that a Russian victory over Ukraine would undermine the dissuasive force of the world's biggest military alliance and that its credibility could cost trillions to restore.



NATO has been ramping up its forces along its eastern flank with Russia, Belarus and Ukraine, deploying thousands of troops and equipment to deter Moscow from expanding its war into the territory of any of the organisation's 32 member countries.

Dutch prime minister said. "That would be geopolitically a big, big mistake. Polish Foreign Minister Radek Sikorski welcomed Trump's acknowledgement that it must be Russia which should make the first peace moves, but he cautioned that "this is not the Putin that President Trump knew in his first term".

S Korean investigators call for indictment of President Yoon

Seoul (PTI):

South Korean investigators asked prosecutors to indict the country's detained President Yoon Suk Yeol over his short-lived imposition of martial law last month, as it accused him of rebellion, abuse of power and obstruction of parliament on Thursday.

Yoon defended his actions again as he appeared at a court hearing for the second time Thursday, saying the December 3 martial law decree was only meant to inform the public of the danger of an opposition-controlled National Assembly.

Yoon was impeached and suspended by the assembly on December 14. The Constitutional Court is now deliberating to determine whether to formally throw Yoon out of office or reinstate him.

Growing geo-economic fragmentation can decrease global GDP by up to \$5.7 trillion, giving it a bigger blow than the financial crisis of 2008 or the COVID-19 pandemic, a new study showed on Thursday. India and some other emerging economies can bear the biggest burden in the most extreme fragmentation scenario, it cautioned. Countries are increasingly using the global financial and trading systems to advance geopolitical objectives through sanctions, industrial policies, and other economic measures, the World Economic Forum said while releasing the report here during its Annual Meeting 2025. The Navigating Global Financial System Fragmentation report estimated that fragmentation resulting from statecraft policies could cost the global economy \$0.6 trillion to \$5.7 trillion – up to 5 per cent of global GDP – due to reduced trade and cross-border capital flows as well as lost economic



efficiencies. It could also increase global inflation by more than 5 per cent in a very high fragmentation scenario, it added. The report, developed in collaboration with Oliver Wyman, showed that the economic impact of rising geo-economic fragmentation could surpass the disruptions caused by the 2008 financial crisis or the COVID-19 pandemic. Countries have been increasingly using the financial system to advance their geopolitical objectives –

evidenced by a 370 per cent rise in sanctions since 2017, along with subsidies, industrial policies and discussions about the creation of parallel financial architectures. The report called on policymakers to adopt economic statecraft that fosters cooperation, sustainable development and resilience in the global economy. The impact of fragmentation on inflation rates and GDP growth depends heavily on the policies adopted by global leaders, WEF said.

With a principled approach, policymakers can advance appropriate policies for their economies and societies while mitigating unintended effects on areas like cost of living and GDP growth, it added. In the most extreme fragmentation scenario, a full economic decoupling between Eastern and Western blocs would force unaligned countries to trade exclusively with their most significant economic partner, it cautioned. These nations could see GDP growth drop by over 10 per cent – nearly double the global average – with India, Brazil, Turkey, and emerging economies in Latin America, Africa and South-East Asia bearing the greatest burden. “Fragmentation not only fuels inflation but also negatively impacts economic growth prospects, particularly in emerging markets and developing economies that depend on an integrated financial system for their continued development,” said Matt Strahan, Private Markets Lead, World Economic Forum.

Sensex rises for second day on gains in IT

Stock markets extended gains for the second day on Thursday helped by buying in IT, consumer durables and commodity stocks amid a largely positive trend in global markets. In a volatile trade, the 30-share index rose by 115.39 points or 0.15 per cent to settle at 76,520.38. The barometer started on a negative note dropping by 202 points to a low of 76,202.12. The index pared losses later and climbed 338.55 points or 0.44 per cent to hit a high of 76,743.54. The broader NSE Nifty rose by 50 points or 0.22 per cent to end at 23,205.35. From the Sensex pack, UltraTech Cement, Mahindra & Mahindra, Sun Pharmaceutical, Zomato, Tech Mahindra, Tata Steel, Tata Motors, Titan, ITC and Bajaj Finance were the major gainers. In contrast, Kotak Mahindra Bank, HCL Technologies, PowerGrid, Reliance Industries, State Bank of India, Hindustan Unilever, IndusInd Bank, Nestle India and Axis Bank were among the laggards. “Uncertainty lingers whether the trade tariff measures will affect global trade, instigate



higher inflation, and currencies volatility. The trend holds a declining momentum YTD with a pause today contemplating the upcoming 2025 budget, which has a muted expectation,” Vinod Nair, Head of Research, Geojit Financial Services, said. Meanwhile in-line Q3 results showcasing QoQ growth to the indices suggesting that Q4 will be much better, Nair said. In broader markets, the BSE smallcap index rose 0.67 per cent and midcap gauge jumped 1.78 per cent. Among BSE sectoral indices, Consumer Durables rose the most by 1.95 per cent, Commodities by 1.86 per cent, Focused IT by 1.79 per cent, Information Technology by 1.51 per cent, Services 1.42 per cent and Consumer

Discretionary and Healthcare went up 1.28 per cent each. On the other hand, Energy, Bankex and Oil & Gas were the only laggards. Overall, the market breadth was positive as 2,119 stocks advanced while 1,842 declined and 106 remained unchanged on the BSE. The market capitalisation of BSE-listed companies rose by ₹2,75,359.24 crore to ₹4,24,63,686.80 crore or \$4.91 trillion. “Despite a tepid start during the day, the benchmark soon gave up its losses after a surge led by gains in IT helped the indices recover. The sector’s sentiments were further buoyed by optimism surrounding President Donald Trump’s private-sector investment plan for AI infrastructure.

“However, the gains experienced a holdback driven by concerns over moderation in earnings,” Ameya Ranadive, Chartered Market Technician, CFTe, Sr Technical Analyst, StoxBox, said. An overall positive trend was also seen throughout the broader market. Sectorally, IT remained the key gainer, led by a positive earnings outlook and optimistic sectoral view, Ranadive added. On the stock-specific front, UltraTech Cement gained approximately 6 per cent during the latter part of the trading session, led by positive earnings. In Asian markets, Tokyo, Shanghai and Hong Kong were trading in positive territory while Seoul was quoting in the negative. US markets ended higher in overnight deals on Wednesday. Global oil benchmark Brent crude fell 0.34 per cent to \$78.73 a barrel. Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) offloaded equities worth ₹4,026.25 crore on Wednesday, according to exchange data. On Wednesday, the 30-share BSE Sensex surged 566.63 points to close at 76,404.99 and the NSE Nifty climbed 130.70 points to settle at 23,155.35.

Indian Energy Exchange net profit rises nearly 17 per cent in Q3

Indian Energy Exchange (IEX) on Thursday posted a nearly 17 per cent rise in its consolidated net profit to Rs 107.29 crore, mainly driven by higher revenues. The company had reported a consolidated net profit of ₹91.80 crore for the quarter ended December 31, 2023, a BSE filing showed. Its total income rose to ₹160.53 crore in the quarter from ₹141.21 crore a year ago. The Board of Directors has also approved the payment of an interim dividend of ₹1.50 per equity share, having a face value of ₹1 each for 2024-25. The record date for ascertaining the name of members/beneficial owners entitled to receive the interim dividend is Friday, January 31, 2025. IEX, in a statement, said that during the quarter, IEX achieved an electricity traded volume of 30.5 billion units (BU), marking a 15.9 per cent year-on-year rise and traded 26.52 lakh Renewable Energy Certificates (RECs), recording a 31 per cent growth.



According to the statement, adequate availability of fuel in this quarter led to higher liquidity on the exchange platform, as the sell quantum increased by 62 per cent (year-on-year) in the day-ahead market, leading to softening prices. For Q3 FY25 (October-December 2024), prices in the day ahead market averaged ₹3.71/unit, a decline of nearly 26 per cent year-on-year. These prices presented an opportunity for discoms and commercial and industrial consumers to meet their demand at a competitive price and replace their costlier power by procuring through exchanges, it stated.

The company said its consolidated profit after tax (net profit) for 9M FY25 (April to December 2024) increased by 22.8 per cent to ₹312.1 crore from ₹254.1 crore in the year-ago period. On the gas market front, the Indian Gas Exchange (IGX) traded a total volume of 162 lakh MMBtu for Q3 FY25 compared to 84 lakh MMBtu in Q3 FY24, a growth of 93 per cent. The profit after tax for IGX for Q3 FY25 was ₹ 8.3 crore compared to ₹7.4 crore in Q3 FY24, a rise of 13 per cent. For the nine months till December FY25, IGX PAT rose 18 per cent year-on-year to ₹22 crore.

Significant progress in talks on India-EU FTA: Official

There is a significant progress in the negotiations for the proposed free trade agreement (FTA) between India and European Union (EU), an official said on Thursday. Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal was in Brussels last week to meet European Commissioner for Trade Maros Sefcovic to take stock of the progress of the negotiations. “Good progress is there on India-EU FTA. There is a significant progress in talks,” the official said, without divulging more details. During the meeting between Goyal and Sefcovic, the two sides agreed to build a commercially meaningful trade agenda and work towards a mutually beneficial trade pact. The two leaders have also outlined political directions for both the teams to develop a mutually beneficial agenda for trade and investment and a robust FTA in an expedited manner to meet global challenges. The meeting came ahead of the



10th round of talks between India and the EU, which is scheduled from March 10-14 in Brussels. In the ninth round, both sides discussed trade issues covering goods, services, investment and government procurement along with necessary rules such as rules of origin, SPS (sanitary and phytosanitary), and technical barriers to trade. In June 2022, India and the 27-nation EU bloc resumed the negotiations after a gap of over eight years. It was stalled in 2013 due to differences over several issues. The total trade stood at \$180 billion in 2023-24. India exported \$75.18 billion in goods and \$31.13 billion in services to the EU, while the EU exported \$63.44 billion in goods and \$31.35 billion in services to India.

Budget should announce tax cuts for individuals: Barclays

The government in FY26 Budget should announce an “effective” personal income tax cut to support consumption and demand, Barclays said on Thursday. In its FY25-26 Union Budget review, Barclays said the key ask from the Budget, to be presented on February 1, is to support growth while adhering to fiscal consolidation path. Barclays, India Chief Economist, Aastha Gudwani said in a quest to support consumption, the finance minister should provide an effective personal income tax rate cut by further tweaking the tax slabs. This is unlikely to have a sizable fiscal cost. “That said, improved tax buoyancy will likely make up for revenue foregone under this announcement. We think a boost to consumption is needed, especially with private investment also now awaiting the increase in demand growth,” Gudwani said. Barclays expects Finance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman to announce changes to the new tax regime, making it



lucrative for more and more taxpayers. In the last Budget, the government had increased standard deduction for salaried taxpayer to ₹75,000, and deduction on family pension for pensioners to Rs 25,000 under the new tax regime, which offers lower rate of taxes. The new tax regime exempts income up to ₹3 lakh. Those earning annually between ₹3-7 lakh pay 5 per cent tax, Rs 7-10 lakh (10 per cent), ₹10-12 lakh (15 per cent), ₹12-15 lakh (20 per cent) and above ₹15 lakh (30 per cent). Barclays said another potential option to boost disposable income and purchasing power while containing inflation, could be a reduction in excise duty for fuel. Retail prices for fuel have remained almost constant

since 2022 despite lower global crude prices. Barclays said customs duty announcements in Budget will be pivotal to understand government’s response to tariffs under Trump 2.0. Given the uncertainty that Trump 2.0 brings along with, slower global trade and a fragmented world order is a reality India needs to prepare for. “We thus expect multiple tweaks in customs duty structure, especially on items where dumping concerns from China are rising (eg, steel, glass, basic metals). We expect a modest increase in customs duty collections in FY25-26 vs FY24-25,” Gudwani said. Barclays expects the government to overachieve the fiscal deficit target for current fiscal by 20 basis points, at 4.7 per cent of GDP and 2025-26 deficit to be pegged at 4.5 per cent of GDP or about ₹16.3 lakh crore. Barclays said it awaits the debt consolidation roadmap from FY26-27 onwards to see by when the finance minister sees general government debt-to-GDP fall to the 60 per cent target.



Rupee falls 12 paise to settle at 86.47 against US dollar

The rupee declined 12 paise to settle at 86.47 (provisional) against the US dollar on Thursday amid the strengthening American currency and continuous outflow of foreign funds. However, positive domestic equity markets and lower crude oil prices supported the Indian currency at lower level, forex traders said. At the interbank foreign exchange, the rupee opened at 86.46 and moved between high of 86.38 and low of 86.52 against the greenback during the session. The local unit settled at 86.47 (provisional) against the US dollar, registering a loss of 12 paise from its previous close. On Wednesday, the rupee appreciated 23 paise to close at 86.35 against the dollar. Anuj Choudhary, Research Analyst at Mirae Asset Sharekhan, said the rupee declined on a strong US dollar and recovery in the US treasury yields. FII outflows too weighed down the local unit. However,

weak crude oil prices and positive domestic markets cushioned the downside. “Investors may remain cautious ahead of Bank of Japan’s monetary policy tomorrow. BoJ is expected to hike interest rates by 25 bps. USD-INR spot price is expected to trade in a range of ₹86.20-86.80,” he said. Meanwhile, the dollar index, which gauges the greenback’s strength against a basket of six currencies, was trading 0.07 per cent higher at 108.04. Brent crude, the global oil benchmark, was down 0.16 per cent to \$78.87 per barrel in futures trade. In the domestic equity market, the 30-share BSE Sensex climbed 115.39 points, or 0.15 per cent, to settle at 76,520.38, while the Nifty rose 50 points, or 0.22 per cent, to 23,205.35. Foreign Institutional Investors (FIIs) remained net sellers in the capital markets on Wednesday, offloading shares worth ₹4,026.25 crore, according to exchange data.

US sanctions hit Russian oil supply to India

The wide-ranging sanctions imposed by the US on the Russian oil sector have started to dent near-term oil flows to India with state-owned Bharat Petroleum Corporation Ltd (BPCL) saying not enough cargoes are available for March. The US on January 10 issued sweeping sanctions targeting the Russian energy sector. The measures include sanctions on Russian oil producers Gazprom Neft and Surgutneftegas, the blacklisting of 183 vessels involved in Russian energy exports, and curbs on dozens of oil traders, oilfield service providers, tanker owners and managers, insurance companies and energy officials. The sanctions were announced at a time when Indian refiners had started to negotiate for March cargoes. BPCL Director (Finance) Vetsa Ramakrishna Gupta told in an analyst call on Thursday that Russian oil had been booked for January and February in the previous two months but for March “we are not getting sufficient cargoes”. The company saw Russian oil in the overall basket of crude oil it processes into fuels like petrol and diesel, falling to 20 per cent in March from 31 per cent in the October-December quarter, he said. Russian oil made up for 34-35 per cent of all oil that BPCL processed at the start of the current financial year in April 2024. He said there is enough oil



available in the market and the company would look at alternatives such as the Middle East to replace the lost volumes from Russia. Russia made up for just 0.2 per cent of all oil imported by India in the year ended on March 31, 2022. India, however, became the second biggest buyer of Russian crude oil since Moscow invaded Ukraine in February 2022, with purchases rising to almost 40 per cent of the country’s total oil purchases. The rise was primarily because Russian crude oil was available at a discount to other internationally traded oil due to the price cap and the European nations shunning purchases from Moscow. In 2024, Russian crude imports to India averaged 1.7 million barrels per day, making the OPEC+ producer its largest supplier. Gupta said the discounts on Russian oil have shrunk to \$3-3.2 per barrel from \$3.5-4 at the start of the fiscal and \$8.5 in fiscal year 2023-24. This month, India has

decided to shun deliveries made by tankers that have been sanctioned by the US in the latest round. Russia used these tankers to ship oil to countries like India and China after the Group of Seven (G7) countries in 2022 imposed a \$60 a barrel price cap on exports by the Kremlin. This cap, introduced to limit Moscow’s revenues to fund its war in Ukraine, meant that Western shipping and insurance services were not available for any oil cargo that was priced more than \$60 per barrel. To circumvent that, Russia used the so-called shadow fleet, insured by its own companies. This fleet has now been sanctioned. There is a wind-down period until March 12, which will allow for existing contracts to finish. “For the first two months, there will be no disruption. Within two months we will probably see new arrangements emerging in terms of oil coming to India,” a senior government source

said. Sanctioned Russian tankers will not be allowed to dock at Indian ports, the source said, adding that the only exception would be for Russian oil cargoes booked before January 10, provided they unload by March 12. The sanctions sent global oil prices to \$83-84 a barrel but Gupta saw this as a temporary phenomenon and oil should settle in the \$75-80 range soon. In the worst-case scenario, Russian crude, which India was getting at a discount, will not be available at a discount, he added. In an attempt to restrict funds for Russia’s war machine, The Group of Seven rich nations, the European Union and Australia put an embargo on Russian crude and introduced a \$60 per barrel price cap in December 2022. Over the next 12 months, the price cap and embargo had a significant impact on revenues and forced Russia to find new markets and ways to transport its oil. Russia did this by offering deep discounts on its Urals grade crude. In the first year of the sanctions, Russia was losing, on an average, 23 per cent of its Urals crude export revenues every month due to the price cap and embargo. This figure has fallen sharply to a mere monthly average of 9 per cent in the second year of the cap. This is because Russia built a network of ‘shadow’ tankers, which could trade its oil above the cap to new markets in non-sanctioning countries.

Gold hits fresh all-time high of ₹82,900 per 10 grams

Gold prices rose ₹170 to hit a fresh record high of ₹82,900 per 10 grams in the national capital on Thursday amid a positive global trend, according to the All India Sarafa Association. The precious metal had closed at ₹82,730 per 10 grams on Wednesday. In about one year, the precious metal surged ₹20,180 or 32.17 per cent to ₹82,900 per 10 grams from ₹62,720 per 10 grams on February 23, 2024. Extending the gains for the seventh straight session, gold of 99.5 per cent purity appreciated by ₹170 to hit an all-time high level of ₹82,500 per 10 grams. The metal had finished at Rs 82,330 per 10 grams in the previous trading session. Gold of 99.9 and 99.5 per cent purity grew ₹2,320 each in the last seven trading sessions. However, silver prices declined ₹500 to ₹93,500 per kg from the previous close of ₹94,000 per kg on Wednesday. Bullion traders attributed the rise in precious metal prices to heightened demand by jewellers and retailers, along with a strong trend in the international markets. In futures trade on Thursday, gold contracts for February delivery rose ₹19 or 0.02 per cent to trade at ₹79,583 per 10 grams on the Multi Commodity Exchange (MCX). However, silver futures declined ₹222 or 0.46 per cent to ₹91,522 per kg from the previous close of ₹91,944 per



kg on Wednesday. In the overseas markets, Comex gold futures fell \$13.20 per ounce or 0.48 per cent to \$2,757.70 per ounce. “Gold prices traded flat-to-negative on Thursday, weighed down by a recovery in the US dollar and Treasury yields,” Saumil Gandhi, Senior Analyst - Commodities at HDFC Securities, said. The US Dollar index and Treasury yields traded up after the positive close in the previous session, which caps the further upside in gold and prompts some selling in the gold price on Thursday, Gandhi added. According to Augmont’s Head of Research, Renisha Chainani, Gold is on the verge of hitting record highs and could do so within the next day or two. The remarks made by newly elected US President Donald Trump on tariffs are driving the bullish momentum. Silver Comex futures quoted 1.03 per cent lower in the Asian market hours at \$31.10 per ounce. Further, Chainani, said, “Trump announced that his government was considering levying a 25 per cent tax on Canada and Mexico”.

STRENGTH OF POETRY







WOMEN’S FIGHT FOR IDENTITY

‘Becoming the Storm’ Stands Witness to India’s Tryst with Modernity, writes **DEEPAK KUMAR JHA**

At the age of 86 years, veteran journalist Rami Chhabra made a debut in novel writing with her book ‘Becoming the Storm’. She had been India’s one of the first few women journalists who broke the glass ceiling to straddle the media space in the national capital. Chhabra had also been a prominent face in women’s movements. She also led South Asian women’s movements. Her reports also formed the basis for some of the measures of the government for empowerment of women. Having spent decades in the women’s movements in South Asia, Chhabra aptly has given centre stage to a woman’s tryst with modernity. With Indu as the protagonist of the novel, Chhabra takes readers on a journey that saw women of India battling conflicts of traditions with modernity. Chhabra headed an NGO Streebal which worked against early marriages and dowry. In the 1970s, several women organisations had come together to fight against dowry. Her campaigns for empowerment of women find resonance in her fictional accounts of the conflicts between modernity and tradition. Importantly, Chhabra’s accounts of Indu’s fight for identity are set in the backdrop of India also gaining strength in the early years since Independence. Yet, the backdrop to Indu’s tales is also set by India’s three wars in quick succession – 1962 with China, 1965 with Pakistan, and the 1971 War of Independence of Bangladesh. Chhabra takes readers through the sombre mood in Delhi in the wake of the All India radio breaking the news that China attacked in NEFA (North East Frontier Area). The NEFA is now called Arunachal Pradesh. The author brings back memories of the outpouring of emotions all across the country in the wake of China attacking India. She states in the book that the people voluntarily flocked to the railway stations to offer their moral support to the personnel of the Indian army who were transiting to the eastern and the western sectors of the border with China. The final moments of India’s first Prime Minister Jawaharlal Nehru also find rich mention in the book. Having witnessed history from the close quarters, Chhabra gives accounts of the



passing away of Nehru and the subsequent scenes at his residence as the people queued up to pay their last respects to the departed leader. Chhabra recalls in the book Indira Gandhi “holding herself steadily while her eyes had turned red as she stood in one corner when the people paid their respects to the late Nehru”. The author’s accounts of Indu also essay India’s transformation in the 1960s and the 1970s. The industrialisation of India is also set in the backdrop as Indu deals with her marriage and new home where she suffers setbacks from her expectations through her in-laws. The people also rushed to partake in the industrialisation of India with the stock market tales also

finding space in the novels of the veteran journalist. In essence, the conflict between tradition and modernity has never ceased. The book spotlights a woman’s perspective on the issue. It is indeed true that the women have a lot more to gain to claim their rightful places in all walks of life. The fact that crimes against women still remain at worrisome levels testify to the concerns of Chhabra expressed in her debut novel. It’s indeed creditworthy that Chhabra made a debut into novel writing at an age of 86 years. The book brings alive the charm of Delhi in decades after India’s Independence. Chhabra has given vivid descriptions of the Delhi cantonment area where the protagonists lived and also of Chandni Chowk. Connoisseurs of Delhi’s history will find the book valuable, for it brings authentic first hand accounts of the national capital from decades when the city went into transformation in major ways. Besides, the book, which has been published by BluOne Ink, also sensitise readers to concerns of women. True, intra-family conflicts have several dimensions. A balance in tradition and modernity will be sane advice for one embarking on a married life. ‘Becoming the Storm’ is, thus, a story that is still playing out in the lives of many people.







INDIA’S SPIRITUAL ICONS

Swami Mukundananda’s *Nourish Your Soul* beautifully explores the inspiring lives and journeys of eleven Indian sages, says **KUMAR CHELLAPPAN**



as a corporate chieftain for a few years before renouncing materialistic life to become a disciple of Jagadguru Kripaluji Maharaj, a renowned spiritual leader. What makes Swami Mukundananda different from other authors is the ease and élan with which he communicates his thoughts to the readers without hurting anybody and taunting any religions. While evangelists and preachers proselytise people by addressing them as sinners and kafirs, Mukundananda does not discriminate against people based on their religion or ideology. For him, all are equal and his mission is to spread the real Good Word. The book *Nourishing Your Soul* is about the life and times of 11 great Indian sages and the sufferings undertaken by them in their journey while crossing the ocean of life. All of them are enslaved to the Supreme Being and never dreamt of any luxury or well-being for themselves


other than peace and prosperity throughout the universe. He has carefully selected the sages and monks who attained spirituality through their prayers, deeds, words and commitment. The chances of the present generation of Indians having heard about them are quite remote, as our ‘ace’ historians successfully succeeded in wiping out even the last vestiges of these great men and women from our academic curricula for obvious reasons like national integration and communal harmony. Meerabai, Adi Shankaracharya, Soordas, Tukaram, Kabirdas, Ravidas, Andal, Ramanjacharya, Purandara Dasa, Vallabhacharya and Tyagaraja are the sages and seers who have been featured in this collection. The author has presented a crisp and sharp account of these persons and the readers are moved to tears when they come across the sufferings and dedication experienced by



them in their path to eternal sainthood. According to Mukundananda, saints are the embodiment of purity and goodness, being endowed with God’s infinite love and grace. “Their mere presence makes a place holy. Elevated devotees transform wherever they go into a pilgrimage site, for they hold God in their heart,” says the author in the introduction to the book. “Eleven remarkable God-centred saints who graced the land of Bharat,” is how Mukundananda describes the characters he has selected to feature in this parade. The book begins with the life story of Meerabai, the bhakti-saint who lived in the 16th century. For our generation, Radha and Meera were the embodiment and epitomisation of love, dedication and devotion. Meera, popularly known as Meerabai, is unique in all respects as her love for her Giridhar Gopal is filled with selflessness. She knew very well that she would never be able to serve her

master and lover in human form. Despite this truth, she was committed in her devotion and love and she wrote hundreds of poems like *Payo Ji Maine Ram Ratan Dhan Payo...* a bhajan/hymn which retains its charm and lyrical beauty even today. Adi Shankaracharya, the Kaladi-born monk who held the famous *Shankara Digvijaya Yatra* along the length and breadth of the subcontinent and unified Bharat society through his teachings and lyrical compositions, should be a source of enlightenment and inspiration to ordinary mortals. Shankara taught the world that the science of mind management was the most useful skill in life. *The Kanakadhara Stotra*, composed by Acharya in praise of Goddess Lakshmi, and the *Ganesha Pancharatnam Stotra*, penned by the saint philosopher way back in the 8th century, remain unparalleled and take

listeners on a one-way flight to heaven. The lyrics by the mystic get life and emotion when they are rendered by the likes of M.S. Subbulakshmi and M.L. Vasanthakumari. The debate between Shankaracharya and Mandan Misra on the relative merits of Mimamsa and Advaita viewpoints, in which the former demolished the concept of the so-called Dravidian philosophy, is enthralling. *Bhaja Govindam* – described as a wake-up call to a soul in slumber. The exotic poetic beauty and perfection of composition elevate *Bhaja Govindam* to a state of devotional bliss. Space constraints prevent me from elaborating about all the saints who feature in this collection. But if I fail to mention *Saint Tyagaraja* (1767–1847), one of the Trinity of Carnatic Music, it would be an unconscionable sin. *Tyagaraja*, the saint and composer of Carnatic hymns and kritis (poems), a proof of his adoration and salutation to Lord Rama, should be heard to enjoy them. Born at Tiruvaiyaru on the banks of the River Kaveri, Tyagaraja is described as the most famous son of this landscape. His parents were *Rama Brahmam* and *Sitamma*. When Tyagaraja wrote and sang *Sitamma Mayamma*, *Sri Ramudu Matandri*, he was celebrating his earthly parents as well as proclaiming Sita and Rama to be his parents (It Happened Along the Kaveri by Padma Seshadri and Padma Malini Sundararaghavan – Niyogi Books). One gets the feeling that this world is a beautiful place because of the hymns and bhajans composed by the likes of Meera Bai and *Saint Tyagaraja*. *Nourishing Your Soul* is not an ordinary work; it is the much-needed energiser and nourisher of the mind and shows to the world that Bharat was a *Vishwa Guru* even before the advent of AI, satellites and the internet.

Gukesh becomes highest-ranked Indian in FIDE rankings, displaces Erigaisi

Continuing his rapid rise, world champion D Gukesh dethroned compatriot Arjun Erigaisi to become the highest-ranked Indian chess player, at fourth, in the latest FIDE rankings on Thursday. Gukesh, 18, achieved the feat when he logged his second victory in the Tata Steel Tournament in Wijk Aan Zee (Netherlands) defeating Vincent Keymer of Germany. Gukesh, who was awarded the Dhyana Chand Khel Ratna recently, has amassed 2784 rating points, while Erigaisi, who was the highest-ranked Indian for a long time, has slipped to fifth with 2779.5 rating points.

Norway's Magnus Carlsen continues to be the undisputed world No.1 with 2832.5 points, followed by United States' Grandmaster Hikaru Nakamura (2802) and



country-mate Fabiano Caruana (2798). Gukesh has been in sublime form ever since he beat China's Ding Liren to clinch

the world title in Singapore in December last year. He took a break from the game to attend to functions and festivities back home and

skipped the World Rapid and Blitz Championship in New York. On his return to the board, Gukesh has not lost a single

game in Wijk Aan Zee. He has two victories and three draws so far in the tournament with eight rounds still to go.

Erigaisi had become India's top-rated player in September last year and in December achieved his peak rating of 2801, which had made him the 15th-highest rated player in history and only the second Indian after five-time world champion Viswanathan Anand to breach the 2800 threshold.

Erigaisi, who was a part of India's triumphant journey in the Chess Olympiad in Budapest last year, had gone to the World Rapid and Blitz Championship in New York hoping to secure a Candidates berth but returned home disappointed.

The 21 year old is struggling in the ongoing Tata Steel Tournament, having garnered just one point so far, while Gukesh has 3.5.

U19 T20 Women's World Cup: India outclass Sri Lanka, enter Super Six

Opener G Trisha's composed 49 and pacers' excellent new ball spell fashioned India's lopsided 60-run win over Sri Lanka and their entry into the Super Six of the ICC U19 T20 Women's World Cup as Group A toppers here on Thursday.

On a spiteful pitch, Trisha's 44-ball knock (5x4, 1x6) was worth its weight in gold as it guided India to a competitive 118 for nine.

Pacers VJ Joshitha and Shabnam then tore through the Lankan top-order to reduce them to nine for four in 3.2 overs, and run out of skipper Manudi Nanayakkara an over later had them reeling at 12 for five.

Sri Lanka were eventually restricted to 58 for nine in 20 overs as India finished the group engagements with all-win record in three matches. There was not much life left



in Sri Lanka's chase once the spinners were introduced, and India's assortment of left-arm orthodox tweakers did the mopping up job to perfection.

Rashmika Sewwandi (15, 12b, 2x4) looked in good touch for the while she lasted, but mounting asking rate forced her to take chances against Parunika Sisodia, and got caught in the deep.

It was also the only double digit score in the Lankan

innings.

Sisodia (2/7) was the pick among spinners as she and her colleagues Ayushi Shukla and Vaishnavi Sharma, who picked up stunning figures of 5/5 against Malaysia in the previous match, dismantled the lower order without much ado.

Earlier, India's batting too went through stormy seas but Player of the Match Trisha held together the defending champions with exemplary maturity.

Irfan Pathan backs Shami's delayed return, says team will make right call

Former pace bowling all-rounder Irfan Pathan believes India made the right decision by delaying Mohammed Shami's international return following a prolonged injury lay-off by not fielding him in the first T20I against England here. Shami was not included in

India's playing XI for the first T20I against England here on Wednesday, despite proving his fitness in practice sessions and domestic cricket for Bengal.

All eyes were on Shami's return after a 14-month injury lay-off, but India opted for a three-pronged spin attack instead, a decision that paid off as they bowled out England for a

meagre 132 before cruising to the target in 12.5 overs with seven wickets in hand.

Irfan said Shami is experienced enough to take an honest assessment of his body.

"When you've been such a seasoned campaigner and are among India's top 10 bowlers, you understand your body's limits well," said Irfan at a promotional event here.

"Shami always provides honest feedback to the team management, and decisions are made through mutual communication. Recovery at the highest level takes time, especially after playing consistently. I believe he and the team management will make the right call at the right time."

Having undergone surgery and rehab following an ankle injury sustained during the 2023 ODI World Cup, where he finished as India's top wicket-taker, Shami had made an impressive

return in domestic cricket, representing Bengal across all three formats.

Shami has been chosen in India's white-ball rubber squad against England consisting five T20Is and three ODIs which will act as a build up to the Champions Trophy next month, where the team's pace spearhead Jasprit Bumrah's inclusion is subject to fitness. Bumrah suffered a back niggle in the gruelling five-match Test series in Australia and could not bowl in the second innings of the fifth Test in Sydney, and in this context Shami's availability for the Champions Trophy is crucial to India's prospects.

Irfan also expressed concerns over the lack of a pace-bowling backup in the Champions Trophy-bound squad, suggesting that Mohammed Siraj could have been included given Bumrah's uncertain fitness.

Young guns prove PSG can deliver in Champions League without Mbappé

Paris Saint-Germain finally showed it can shine in the Champions League without star Kylian Mbappé, rallying from 2-0 down in the second half to beat Manchester City 4-2 for a crucial victory Wednesday.

The win moved PSG out of the elimination zone in the competition's new-look format and dumped City in it with one game to play. PSG needs only a draw at Stuttgart next week to advance.

"I feel pride this evening, against such a team, against such a manager, against such good players," PSG coach Luis Enrique said. "It was a complete performance today."

PSG's re-designed attack finally clicked with four different scorers rather than relying too heavily on one to make the difference. Bradley Barcola, a 22-year-old winger, scored one goal and set up another for France

teammate Ousmane Dembélé, and 20-year-old midfielder Joao Neves headed in the third before striker Gonçalo Ramos rammed in the fourth in stoppage time.

"The more competition we have, the happier I am," Enrique said. "That means that no player can think of their position as untouchable."

A far cry from the Galacticos era when PSG was top-heavy with stars like Neymar, Lionel Messi and Mbappé but still fell short on the big stage. Still, the French team has struggled for goals in the competition since Mbappé's offseason departure for Real Madrid, netting just six in six games before City's visit and being blanked in defeats to Arsenal and Bayern Munich. Enrique said before facing City that the solution up front would come from more teamwork rather than hoping another player can emulate Mbappé, who scored 44 goals last season and helped PSG

reach the Champions League semifinals.

City manager Pep Guardiola acknowledged his team was outplayed.

"We have to accept it. In transitions we could not cope with them, they were faster," he said. "I give credit to PSG. When one team is better I have no problem to accept it. All of them they played really good. It's not a specific (player)."

Mbappé's move to Madrid forced Enrique to improvise with his lineups all season. This time, 19-year-old winger Désiré Doué played as a makeshift striker even though center forward Ramos was available for this game where both wealthy state-backed teams - the United Arab Emirates (City) and Qatar (PSG) - were at risk of failing to advance to the knockout stage. City led 2-0 after 53 minutes but PSG were level by the hour mark after some inspirational play down the left from Barcola.

Champions League: Ban on Feyenoord fans in France

Feyenoord supporters have been banned by French authorities from traveling to Lille for next week's final Champions League group game between the two clubs.

In an order published Wednesday, France's interior ministry said there was a "real and serious risk of confrontation" between fans of the two teams.

Lille hosts Feyenoord on January 29 at the Stade Pierre-Mauroy. The French authorities said Feyenoord's travels are often marred by "public order disturbances due to the violent behavior of certain supporters or individuals claiming to be supporters of this team," and they cited several examples of fan violence.

Justifying its decision, the ministry added that 3,600 fans - 500 of whom were identified as being dangerous - had planned to travel to Lille, although only 2,600 seats had been allocated to the Dutch club.

"Of the 1,000 supporters who have nevertheless planned to travel without a stadium admission ticket, it is feared that some will try to force their way into the stadium," it said. Later Wednesday, Feyenoord's match against Bayern Munich was stopped for seven minutes after kickoff because of poor visibility from clouds of smoke after fans lit flares and fireworks behind one of the goals.

In May 2022, there were violent clashes in France between Marseille and Feyenoord fans outside the Stade Velodrome stadium before the return leg of their Europa Conference League semifinal.

One video showed a Marseille supporter apparently unconscious on the ground as he was helped by fellow fans, while another showed two groups charging at each other shortly before kickoff just outside the stadium.

India's batting stars disappoint on Ranji return, Jadeja shines

The high-profile return of India's stars in Ranji Trophy ended up as a damp squib with the likes of Rohit Sharma, Rishabh Pant and Shubman Gill falling cheaply on Thursday, unable to click in the face of some hostile bowling on the opening day of their respective matches across different venues.

Veteran all-rounder Ravindra Jadeja was the only one who stood out among the battery of Indian stars as he took a five-wicket haul for Saurashtra to dismiss Pant's Delhi for 188 on a Rajkot turner.

However, it was a forgettable outing for the rest as they made the slow walk back to the hut following early dismissals.

Following a dismal run in Australia, Rohit returned to Ranji Trophy for defending champions Mumbai after a

decade, hoping to get some runs under his belt ahead of next month's Champions Trophy.

But it was not to be at least in Mumbai's first innings against Jammu and Kashmir at the BKC ground here.

Going for his trademark pull off Umar Nazir, Rohit (3) got a leading edge which was caught by J&K skipper Paras Dogra at mid-off.

His India opening partner Yashvi Jaiswal (4) too fell cheaply for Mumbai.

The southpaw was pinned in front of the wicket by Auqib Nabi, who made the most of the fresh wicket to move the new ball dangerously off the surface.

Named in the squad for the Champions Trophy, Shreyas Iyer (11) was caught at mid on off pacer Yudhvir Singh.

While the turnout to watch the India cricketing stars at the stadium was low, those in nearby buildings, who



were watching the action from their office floors, returned to work soon after the 37-year-old Rohit was dismissed.

Anticipating fan interest, the Mumbai Cricket Association had made temporary seating

arrangements for about 500 people at the BKC. The turnout, however, was not too high and some empty chairs could be seen.

Mumbai were eventually bowled out for a paltry 120 in 33.2 overs. The team left

out their in-form teenage opener Ayush Mhatre to accommodate the stars.

The 17-year-old Mhatre has struck two hundreds and a half century this season, including a 93-ball 148 in their previous game against

Saurashtra which Mumbai won by five wickets earlier this month.

This is the only Ranji game that Rohit, Jaiswal and Iyer are expected to play given the ODI series against England is due to start early next month and they would be joining the Indian ranks for it.

Pant fizzles; Jadeja shines In Rajkot, Pant showed up for Delhi in a first-class game for the first time since the 2017-2018 season and his stay in the middle did not last long.

The flamboyant left-hander was dismissed for 1 off 10 balls by veteran Saurashtra left-arm spinner Dharmendrasingh Jadeja. He attempted a sweep only to be caught at deep square leg.

India all-rounder Jadeja took no time to be in thick of things as he accounted for five of Delhi's batters in his

first Ranji game since 2023. No fireworks from Gill either

In Bengaluru, Punjab captain Shubman Gill (4) was caught behind in the game against Karnataka.

The team was skittled out for a mere 55 with the pace duo of Abhilash Shetty and Vasuki Koushik sharing seven wickets between them to destroy the visitors.

Gill fell to Shetty in the fourth over of the innings. The India stars made themselves available for Ranji Trophy after the BCCI made the contracted players' participation in domestic cricket mandatory, following the 1-3 series loss in Australia that opened a debate on the players' conduct and commitment to red-ball cricket.

The Board had to issue a 10-point disciplinary diktat, urging all cricketers to spare time for domestic cricket.

Man City takes spending this week to \$150 Million by signing Egypt's Omar Marmoush

Reeling from a damaging loss in the Champions League, Manchester City took its spending this week to around \$150 million by signing Egypt forward Omar Marmoush from Eintracht Frankfurt on Thursday in a move that provides some belated backup to star striker Erling Haaland.

The 25-year-old Marmoush joined City for a reported 70 million euros (\$73 million), following the arrivals of young defenders Abdoukodie Khusanov from Lens and Vitor Reis from Palmeiras for a combined \$77 million. City will hope the new signings can ignite its season, which was thrown back into turmoil when the team collapsed to a 4-2 loss at Paris Saint-Germain in the Champions League on Wednesday to plunge to the brink of elimination with one game left in the

revamped first stage.

Marmoush is second to Bayern Munich's Harry Kane in the list of top scorers in the German league this season, with 15 goals from 17 games for Frankfurt. He was not in the squad for the 2-0 win over Borussia Dortmund amid negotiations with City, and went on the field after the game for an apparent farewell in front of Frankfurt's fans.

The move to City caps a rapid rise to stardom for Marmoush, who signed from Frankfurt on a free transfer in 2023 from Wolfsburg, where he'd only scored five goals the season before.

It's not yet clear how Marmoush would fit into Pep Guardiola's tactics. His best performances this season have come as part of a two-striker formation alongside former Paris Saint-Germain forward Hugo Ekitiké, but Guardiola



prefers a lone striker in Haaland.

Marmoush can play in wide roles and has generally done so for Egypt's national team, but less successfully than in a central role. He has six goals and three assists in 35 games for his country.

In that sense, Marmoush seems a like-for-like replacement for Julian Alvarez, the versatile Argentina forward who left City for Atletico Madrid in August in a deal reportedly worth more than 103 million dollar after largely being in the shadow of Haaland over the last two years.

Marmoush is the latest in a string of Frankfurt strikers to make lucrative moves to top European clubs, but they haven't always settled. Frankfurt sold Luka Jovic to Real Madrid in 2019 but he was back on loan just 18 months later and is now at Milan. Randal Kolo Muani left Frankfurt in 2023 for

PSG, where he is mostly a bench player and might move this month.

Guardiola has said the club is looking to bring forward future signings to this current transfer window because of injury problems this season that have rocked his team's campaign.

The biggest of those is Rodri, the Spain midfielder and Ballon d'Or winner who is out for the season with an ACL injury.

City also has been hit with injury issues at centre back, with Ruben Dias, John Stones and Nathan Ake all having time out of action. That explains the moves for Khusanov and Reis, who Guardiola says are ready to come into the team immediately if required. Not only is City struggling in the Champions League, the team is in fifth place in its Premier League title defense - 12 points behind leader Liverpool having played one game more.
