

CM Revanth team strikes ground-breaking deals Nets Rs 1,78,950 crore investments, Rs 49,500 jobs Secures biggest Rs 60,000 crore investments from Amazon

The TelanganaRising delegation, led by Chief Minister A. Revanth Reddy, concluded its highly successful trip to Davos with a ground-breaking investment haul of Rs 1,78,950 crore, which is projected to create 49,500 jobs across multiple

sectors in Telangana.

The largest individual investments included Rs 60,000 crore from Amazon (AWS), Rs 45,500 crore from Sun Petrochemicals, Rs 15,000 crore each from Tilman Global Holdings and Megha Engineering, among others. These investments reflect a strong vote of confidence in the state's economic environment.

Tech giants played a pivotal role in the job creation surge, with Hyderabad emerging as a major hub. Software majors like HCL (5,000 jobs), Infosys (17,000 jobs), and Wipro (5,000 jobs) committed to expanding their presence in the state, further cementing Telangana's dominance in the IT sector.

Data centres were a key focus,



A highlight of the trip was Chief Minister Revanth Reddy's presentation of his TelanganaRising 2050 vision, which found strong endorsement among global investors, entrepreneurs, and policymakers. ### Telangana to expedite inter-state Lendi Project

### Focuses on early completion

PNS ■ HYDERABAD

The Telangana government has intensified its efforts to expedite the completion of the Lendi Project, an inter-state irrigation initiative that promises significant benefits for both Telangana and Maharashtra. Telangana's Irrigation and Civil Supplies Minister, Captain N. Uttam Kumar Reddy, emphasized the importance of the project during a review meeting with a Congress delegation from Maharashtra, led by Nanded MP Ravindra Chavan.

Speaking on the occasion, Uttam Kumar Reddy highlighted that the Lendi Project, initiated in 1984 with an estimated cost of Rs 2,183.88 crore, has the potential to bring 38,573.15 acres in Telangana and 27,710.39 acres in Maharashtra under cultivation. He reiterated the Telangana government of the second to the ernment's commitment to completing the project, which will benefit farmers in both states by enhancing irrigation facilities.

The minister outlined the current progress of the project, noting that Telangana and Maharashtra have collectively spent Rs 1,040.87 crore so far. About 70% of the earthen dam work and 80% of the spillway construction have been completed, while canal works are ongoing. Plans have also been prepared to supply water through underground pipelines to address local irrigation needs.

However, Reddy acknowledged that the project faced hurdles due to land acquisition issues, leading to its suspension in 2011. Efforts are now underway to resolve these challenges and resume construction. The Telangana government is formulating strategies to complete the earthwork within the riverbed and accel-

erate the project's progress. The minister assured that under the agreement between the two states, the project is expected to be completed by the end of next year. He stressed the importance of inter-state cooperation to ensure the project's timely completion for the benefit of farmers in both regions.

The delegation from Maharashtra, including former MLA Hanumanth Rao Patil and Congress leaders Suresh Panditwar, Subhash Bad, Vakidishwar, Dinesh Awaj, and Sandeep Patil, expressed their support for the project and discussed strategies to overcome existing chal-

### SC to take up Krishna Water dispute in Feb

PNS NEW DELHI

The Supreme Court has announced that it will take up the petition filed by the Andhra Pradesh government regarding the Krishna water allocation dispute between Andhra Pradesh and Telangana in February. A bench Justice Koteshwar Singh made this decision after the AP government raised the matter in the court. The issue stems from the Krishna Tribunal's distribution of water among the three states before the bifurcation of Andhra Pradesh in 2014. In October 2023, the Centre issued a notification to address the water-sharing dispute between Andhra Pradesh and Telangana. The TG government, citing the fact that the river flows predominantly through its territory, approached the Tribunal, requesting a 70% share of the river's waters.

### Slot system mooted in stamps, registration to tackle graft

In an effort to eliminate corruption and streamline operations, the Telangana government is set to ot booking sy the Stamps and Registration depart-

The government plans to implement the slot booking system to ensure transparency and efficiency. Under this system, citizens must book slots in advance, reducing the scope for corruption and easing the workload of sub-registrar offices.



Additionally, extra staff will be deployed in offices with high registration volumes.

Currently, Telangana has 141

sub-registrar offices handling nonagricultural property registrations and mandal revenue offices managing agricultural land registrations. On average, the department process-2,500 agricultural registrations daily. Each sub-registrar is expected to handle about 30 documents per day without pressure, but nearly 40 offices regularly exceed this limit. To address this, the government plans to allocate additional staff to highvolume offices.

## Ram Gopal Varma gets 3 months jail in

cheque bounce case; arrest warrant issued PNS MUMBAI

A court here has sentenced filmmaker Ram Gopal Varma to three months imprisonment in a cheque bounce case and issued a non-bailable arrest warrant against him.

Judicial Magistrate (First Class) in Andheri, Y P Pujari, on Tuesday convicted Varma for the offence punishable under the provisions of the Negotiable Instruments Act.

The court also directed the filmmaker to pay compensation of Rs 3,72,219 to the complainant within three months from the date of the order. The detailed order was not available vet.

Since Varma was not present before the court when the order was passed, it issued a standing nonbailable warrant against him for his as per the Code of Criminal account.

### BRS opposes UGC proposals

Accuses Revanth govt of neglecting higher education

PNS HYDERABAD

Former education minister P. Sabitha Indra Reddy and former MP B. Vinod Kumar strongly opposed the University Grants Commission (UGC) draft proposals during a press meet at Telangana Bhavan on Thursday. The BRS leaders criticized the state government for its inaction and neglect in addressing critical changes proposed by the UGC, which they claim infringe upon the autonomy of states and undermine the federal spirit. Sabitha Indra Reddy highlighted that the UGC has sought feedback on its draft proposals by January 30 but accused the state government of remaining silent on such a vital issue. "Despite having a week to respond, the state government has neither acted nor expressed its opinion. As the education minister, does-

n't Chief Minister Revanth Reddy have time to review such an important matter?" she questioned.

The former minister pointed out that the proposed UGC regulations if implemented, would transfer the power of appointing university Vice-Chancellors (VCs) entirely to the central government. "Until now, appointments are made through a search committee based on state government recommendations. The new rules would strip this power from states, placing it in the hands of the Governor. The BRS strongly opposes this move," she stated.

Sabitha also criticized the Revanth government for neglecting higher education and failing to stand up against the UGC's draft recommendations. "The BRS demands that the state government oppose the UGC proposals and protect the rights of the states," she asserted, adding that her party would not remain silent if the federal spirit is undermined.

Former MP B. Vinod Kumar revealed that the BRS held extensive discussions for over two and a half hours regarding the 11 clauses in the UGC draft. "Most of the clauses are against state interests," he said, adding that the party's detailed feedback would be uploaded on the UGC website tomorrow. "Once our feedback is submitted, we will hold another press meet to elaborate on our recommendations," Vinod Kumar stated. Both leaders accused the central government of eroding the federal structure and vowed to resist any attempts to centralize control over higher education. The BRS has made it clear that it will take a strong stand to safeguard the autonomy of universities and the rights of states.

Throughout the world, food prices went through the roof and I've taken immediate actions to control inflation in America, he said.

'United States has the largest amount of oil and gas in the world and I'm going to use it,"

"I promise to eliminate 10 old regulations for every new regulation... I am going to pass the largest tax cuts in the American history to help our people," he

At the same time, if a business doesn't manufacture its products in America, there would be tariffs to pay, he



Many companies globally have already announced billions of dollars worth of investments to set up their facilities in America, he said. "We will restore common sense among

"I will make America manufacturing superpower and the world capital of artificial intelligence and crypto," he said.

Americans," he added.

The president, who was worn-in on January 20, said a golden age of America has begun with his second term and the entire world would soon be more peaceful and prosperous.

Inauguration of his second presidency took place the same day when the five-day WEF Annual Meeting began. Trump also said his admin-

istration has accomplished in four days what other regimes could not get in four years.

### Kavitha seeks hike in BC quota to 42%

Writes letter to CM Revanth

PNS HYDERABAD

Bharat Rashtra Samithi (BRS) leader and MLC K Kavitha on Thursday sent a stronglyworded letter to Chief Minister A Revanth Reddy, demanding an increase in reservations for Backward Classes (BCs) to 42%, as promised in the Congress' Kamareddy BC Declaration ahead of the 2023 Assembly elections.

Criticizing the Congress for failing to deliver on its poll promises, Kavitha accused the government of undermining its declarations within the first year of coming to power. She pointed out the meagre allocation in the 2024-25 Budget for BC welfare, contrary to the party's promise of Rs 20,000 crore per year. "This is just one example that reinforces the Congress' history of unful-filled promises," Kavitha stated, adding that the BC community is being subjected to "severe injustice" under the Congress government.

Kavitha also lambasted Congress for not increasing the BC quota in local bodies to 42%, despite pledging to do so based on the caste census and

BC commission report within six months of coming to power. "Six months have passed, and now it has been a year, but there is no clarity on the fate of the BC quota. The government's delay tactics in the name of an unscientific caste census and a dedicated commission expose its lack of commitment to BC welfare," she said.

Calling for transparency, Kavitha urged the govern-ment to make public the details of the caste census and clarify the next steps. She questioned the Congress' indifference towards BC issues, asking why promises were not implemented even a year after claiming they would be fulfilled in six

The BRS MLC further highlighted that the tenure of gram panchayats and zilla parishads has lapsed, leaving villages under the administration of special officers instead of elected representatives. She criti-Professor cized the government for delaying elections and failing to increase reservations, describing it as a clear disregard for democracy at the grassroots level.

To book a slot, applicants will be required to upload relevant documents online. The system will automatically reject unauthorised layouts, restricted properties, and non-compliant assets under the LRS and BRS schemes. Only properties that meet all criteria will proceed to the slot booking stage. During the final registration process, sub-registrars will thoroughly verify documents, halting registrations if any discrepancies are found. Further scrutiny will be conducted before approval in such cases. The slot booking system

will be introduced in phases. In the first phase, the government plans to roll out the slot booking mechanism. In the second phase, integrated software will be deployed to enhance efficiency. The third phase will focus on granting licenses to eligible document writers as

service providers, with discussions ongoing about ensuring social equity in this process.


The department, which has faced significant allegations of corruption, has been marred by unauthorized registrations, including unapproved layouts, non-compliant properties under the BRS and LRS schemes, and irregular permissions for structures. Over the past five years, disciplinary action, including suspensions, has been taken against more than 70 officials for involvement in such activities.

Recent incidents, such as the registration of illegal layouts by a sub-registrar in Yadadri Bhuvanagiri and late-night registrations in erstwhile Khammam district, have prompted the government to take strict measures.

Presided over by Tahreek Muslim Shabban president Mohammed Mushtaq Mallik, the session aims to address critical issues threatening the survival of Urdu and its institutions in the State. The acute shortage of Urdu

teachers has left many Urdumedium schools on the verge of closure. Despite a seven-year wait since the last teacher recruitment notification in 2017, the latest DSC-2024 process filled only 517 of the 1,183 posts reserved for

tions vacant due to reserved category constraints. The government's inability to fill these posts has dealt a severe blow to the Urdu-medium education system, endangering its very existence and betraying the hopes of aspiring teachers and students.

Equally troubling is the gov-

ernment's failure to implement Urdu as the second official language, despite the Telangana Official Languages (Amendment) Bill, 2017. The bill, passed in recognition of the state's 12.69% Urdu-speaking population, has been reduced to little more than lip service. Official signboards are missing Urdu signage, press releases and communication are rarely issued in the language and the recruitment of only 66 Urdu translators since the bill's passage under-scores the lack of commitment to this cause.

The neglect of Urdu institutions and their assets has comorganisations like Idara-e-Adabiyat-e-Urdu are being exploited.

A prime land belonging to the society has been sold away to private parties at a throwaway price in a questionable compromise. Institutions such as the Urdu Arts College in Himayatnagar and Urdu Ghar in Moghalpura face similar threats, with inadequate funding and official indifference undermining their ability to serve as custodians of Úrdu's cultural and educational heritage. Prominent personalities, including leaders of religious and social organisations, writers, poets and journalists, will address the meeting to deliberate on these pressing issues. With the stakes higher than ever, the session is expected to ignite a collective effort to pre-serve the Urdu language, its institutions, and its legacy, which has been an integral part of Telangana's identity for cen-

### Three nabbed for circulating child sex abuse material

The Hyderabad City Cyber Crime unit has arrested three individuals for their involvement in cases related to the creation and circulation of Child Sexual Abuse Material (CSAM) on social media platforms, including Instagram and Snapchat. These cases were registered following alerts from the National Centre for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC), which monitors crimes against children globally. 

The workers, who travel from various villages to the mall on their own motorbikes, claimed that the mall management had failed to provide adequate security for their vehicles, leading to repeated thefts.

On Thursday, the protestors organised a lightning strike in front of the mall, highlighting the thefts of two motorbikes on January 11. The stolen bikes belonged to Srinivas from Eklas Khan Pet village and another employ-

Despite repeated requests from the workers to review the mall's CCTV footage and report the thefts to the police, they were met with indifference from the management, who repeatedly postponed action.

One of the stolen bikes was later found abandoned in Annaram, though it was severely damaged. The second bike remains untraced. Workers, frustrated by the lack of response from management, expressed concerns that the thefts could have been prevented had CCTV cameras or proper security measures been in place.

The protestors demanded that the mall management immediately install CCTV cameras and take necessary steps to prevent future thefts. They also questioned the management about the overall safety of workers at the facility.

The protest gained the support of local trade unions, including CITU District President N Raju and Agricultural Workers' Union District Vice President Srinu Nayak. The union leaders expressed their full backing for the workers' demands and criticized the management's negligence in handling the situation.

In response to the protest, the mall's HR manager assured the workers that the issues would be addressed by January 28. The workers also used the opportunity to demand a reduction in working hours and an increase in their salaries, which they hoped would be addressed in the near future.

After receiving the assurance from the HR manager, the workers ended their protest.

## 70% of TG population will be covered under PDS: Uttam



## Lawyers' names runs into 10 pages, order is few pages

### **SAYS SC ON MARKING APPEARANCES**

The Supreme Court on Thursday raised concern over a large numbers of lawyers marking their appearance in cases, and their names running into several pages, whereas an order was only a few pages.

A bench comprising Justices Bela M Trivedi and Satish Chandra Sharma said if a lawyer was assisting the court "effectively" it had no problem in adding the appearance.

"Names of lawyers go into 10 pages and the order will go into only a few pages. We are not passing any orders on how the names of advocates should be included in the order. Since you are representing the Bar, we are hearing out," it said.

The top court said though many lawyers appeared with the arguing counsel, nobody



argued when asked to.

"Or we would have clearly said you have no locus. Whoever is attached with the lawyer, their names are there. It cannot be done like that. When we see they are assisting vou effectively, their names are there. We will pass the orders," the bench told senior advocate Kapil Sibal, appearing for the Supreme Court Bar

Association (SCBA). Sibal submitted the SCBA and the Supreme Court Advocateson-Record Association would submit a proposal to regulate the issue.

"You are right; 30-40 names cannot be given. But some reasonable, fair procedure to ensure that genuine people who are here and their names should be added," he said.

## **Trump's ultimatum**

Trump's plain talk on the Ukraine war— 'end it or face sanctions'— could mark a turning point in the conflict

n a dramatic intervention, US President Donald Trump has asked Russian President Vladimir Putin to bring an immediate end to the ongoing Ukraine war. Labeling the conflict 'ridiculous,' Trump warned of severe economic sanctions and tariffs against Russia if Putin failed to negotiate peace. The threat marks a sharp escalation in Trump's rhetoric on a war that has already claimed the lives of over a million soldiers on both sides. Speaking on Truth Social platform, Trump reaffirmed his affinity for the Russian people and his respect for Putin but did not shy away from criticising the Russian leader for prolonging the bloody conflict. "We must never forget that Russia helped us win the Second World War, losing almost 60 million lives in the process," Trump said, highlighting historical ties while urging an end to the ongoing devastation. Trump's approach combines a mix of hardline economic threats and diplomatic overtures. In his straightforward message he suggested that the economic repercussions of prolonged conflict

would be catastrophic for Russia. He emphasised that his preference was for a peaceful resolution.

The Ukraine war, which began with Russia's invasion in February 2022, has dragged on for nearly three years. The conflict has claimed the lives of nearly a million Russian soldiers and 700,000 Ukrainian troops. These staggering figures underscore the war's devastating impact, making it one of the deadliest conflicts of the 21st century. Economic consequences have also been severe, particularly for Russia. International sanctions, coupled with the strain of prolonged military operations, have left the Russian economy struggling with inflation and stagnation. Trump pointed to these eco-

nomic pressures as a potential leverage point, suggesting that a peace deal is in Russia's best interest. Trump's ultimatum reflects a marked departure from his earlier, more ambiguous stance on the conflict. Trump administration is in direct talks with Ukrainian President Volodymyr Zelensky and Trump himself plans to engage with Putin directly. He appears intent on delivering on that promise with a mix of economic coercion and diplomatic engagement. Despite the grim reality of the war, Trump's comments offers a glimmer of hope for an early resolution. He has emphasised that both Zelensky and Putin should pursue a deal, suggesting that the leaders' willingness would be pivotal in ending the conflict. Trump's ultimatum to Putin could signal a turning point in the Ukraine war, but the path forward remains fraught with uncertainty. While the economic pressure could incentivise Russia to negotiate, the deep-seated political and territorial disputes fueling the conflict may prove challenging to resolve. As the world watches, Trump's next moves whether imposing sanctions, brokering a deal, or recalibrating military aid—will shape not only the future of the Ukraine war but also the broader geopolitical landscape. For now, one thing is clear: Trump is determined to make his mark on history by ending a war that has caused untold suffering and reshaped global politics.

## Can suspending commodity derivatives rein in food price



The debate over whether speculative trading in futures commodity markets drives food price inflation remains unresolved in India and across Asia

several concerns in India and across Asia, certain policy and key opinion circles that food price inflation is catalysed or influenced somehow by speculative trading in the futures commodity markets. Even while opinions are divided in policy circles and among economists who have studied and examined the nature of the relationship between food inflation and commodity and derivative futures trading contracts, and no empirical evidence hitherto seems to have been found despite numerous studies undertaken in India.

It would be worth mentioning that a detailed empirical research study conducted by leading researchers from the Indian Institute of Management Udaipur specifically studied three suspension events in India of futures traded commodities, which led the researchers to firmly state that the counterfactual for each of the examined episodes confirms that even in the absence of trading suspensions, food prices or inflationary trends would have followed their dynamic path.

Any upward price volatility could ostensibly be the effects or countereffects of various extraneous domestic or global (especially geopolitical) factors. It is also equally understandable and natural for any governing policy institution to be both fully cognisant and mindful of food price inflationary trends, and the fact that rising food prices can have a cataclysmic effect on food security and thus, by extension could have substantive socio-econom-

Successive policy establishments and ecosystems have always been overly cautious, ever since futures trading commodity derivatives exchanges were established in the early 2000s. Despite the mandate of such commodity exchanges fairly and comprehensively that futures trading contracts encourage effective and fair price discovery and risk hedging, which consequently safeguards the commodity value chain from price risk which is a result of a fundamental play between demand and supply the apprehensions

concerning these market-driven tools continued to remain, manifesting itself the way of multiple instances of suspensions on certain commodity derivative contracts.

While trading suspensions have been a constant feature since 2007-2008, under the advisement of the price monitoring mechanisms and agencies within the government policy ecosystem, there never has been an occasion when suspensions of commodity trading exceeded more than a year in a single stretch, barring the odd 'sensitive' food commodity. So as a commodity markets expert, with a domestic and world view of ongoing trading in global commodity markets, one begs to specifically ask - Do derivatives trading suspensions really rein in food price inflation?

Researchers have constantly alluded to synthetic control methodologies to apply to their studies for studying specific suspensions, their findings conclude and determine that there is no empirical evidence that derivatives suspension had any impact whatsoever on food prices.

On the contrary, from specific instances studied, such as those of Bengal Gram (Chana)

Seed Derivatives in October 2021, analysis from the said report from IIM Udaipur shows that prices of both commodities, Chana and mustard oil, would have continued on the same price trend path even without the suspension. It also adversely impacts India's position in providing a global price benchmark, despite the country being a major producer and consumer of several agricultural commodities. Needless to say, as an active observer of the Indian agribased commodity trading ecosystem, it behove advocacy and argument that summary commodity suspensions as a method to arrest or contain food price inflation should not be adopted and further the suspension of futures trading contracts of agricultural commodity derivatives must be revoked. In closure, one must say emphatically that the development of the agri-derivatives market is supported in India, which in turn will lead to fair price discovery and positive socio-economic impact for farmers and the agri-ecosystem in India.

### **INDIA'S FOREIGN POLICY: CHAMPIONING THE GLOBAL SOUTH**

India's approach balances national priorities with global responsibilities

ndia's External Affairs Minister S Jaishankar attended the US presidential inauguration earlier this week. President Trump's inauguration by itself is an epochal moment for global international relations. India outlined its foreign policy approach a few days ago, during EAM's address at Nani Palkivala's memorial lecture. He mentioned that India's foreign policy in 2025 reflects a deepening commitment to multilateralism, but also recognises the competitive realities of a shifting global order. The nation has embraced issue-based partnerships with major groupings like the Quad, BRICS, and the India-Middle East-Europe Economic Corridor (IMEC). India's ability to balance multiple memberships and partnerships underscores its evolving diplomatic strategy, driven by a pragmatic approach to international relations.

At the heart of India's foreign policy is a strong solidarity with the Global South, rooted in post-colonial values of independence, sovereignty and resistance to external pressures. This unique perspective sets India apart from traditional alliance structures, as it champions the rights of developing nations while pursuing its strategic interests. While India continues to engage in global dialogues, it maintains its core principle of nonalignment and the freedom to choose partners based on national priorities. Recent shifts in India's domestic policies—across politics, economics and security—have influenced its foreign relations.



Notably, India's relationship with the United States has transformed, moving past historical hesitations to embrace a deeper strategic partnership. This cooperation spans security, technology, trade, and science, benefiting both nations. India's diaspora also plays a crucial role, acting as a living bridge to enhance bilateral ties. Despite occasional policy shifts in the US, the foundation for a robust relationship is now firmly established. However, India's engagement with China remains a complex challenge. As the two largest Asian nations with over a billion people each, their dynamic is shaped by historical disputes and differing political systems. The boundary issue, exacerbated by tensions since 2020, continues to complicate bilateral relations. The guiding principles for India's approach to China are mutual respect, sensitivity, and shared interests, with an emphasis on long-term stability and a multi-polar Asia. In the Indo-Pacific, India has extended its Act East policy, fostering deeper relationships with Japan, Australia and ASEAN countries, and strengthening the Quad alliance.

This partnership has progressed in areas such as climate action, maritime security, and digital connectivity. Similarly, India's collaboration with Russia remains a pillar of its foreign policy, with growing economic ties and shared strategic interests. India advocates for diplomacy in addressing global challenges, such as the Ukraine conflict, and seeks to provide solutions to global problems, including food security and climate

It has assisted smaller neighbours during crises, including the 2023 financial support to Sri Lanka, reinforcing its role as a regional leader. However, India's relationship with Pakistan remains strained due to ongoing crossborder terrorism. India is also engaged in strengthening ties with Myanmar and Afghanistan, maintaining its people-to-people connections despite political complexities. ## Budget 2025: A roadmap to empower

## farmers and reignite rural India



The Budget must go beyond promises—it must deliver feasible solutions to secure livelihoods, strengthen rural demand and bridge the rural-urban divide

inance Minister Nirmala Sitharaman gears up to present the Union Budget 2025-26 on February 1, the nation stands at a pivotal crossroads. With GDP growth projected to dip to a four-year low of 6.4 per cent in FY 2024-25, the spotlight turns to revitalising the rural economy, a cornerstone of the country's consumption-

The urgent call for agricultural reforms has grown louder, fueled by ongoing farmer protests, including the fast-unto-death by 70-year-old farmer leader Jagjit Singh Dallewal at Punjab's Khanauri border, which has captured national attention, demanding a legal guarantee for Minimum Support Price (MSP). Agriculture, which employs nearly 45 per cent of the countries o try's workforce and sustains over 60 per cent of its rural population, is at a breaking point. Stagnant productivity, declining incomes, and policy neglect have left farmers in crisis. This Budget cannot be limited to lofty promises—it must deliver practical solutions to secure livelihoods, strengthen rural demand, and narrow the rural-urban divide. Revitalising agriculture is not just an economic necessity but a moral obligation to foster inclusive growth. Here's how Budget 2025 can introduce transformative measures to bolster the agricultural sector and ensure rural spending—currently contributing 60 per cent of total consumption —fuels India's economic resurgence.

#### 1. Boost Agriculture Budget and Research

The allocation for agriculture and allied sectors constitutes only 3 per cent of the Union Budget, which needs to be raised to at least 7.5%. Unspent funds in this category should be carried forward to address critical gaps in research, education, and infrastructure for crop storage and processing. Investing in agricultural research institutions to develop climate-resilient crop varieties and sustainable farming techniques can enhance productivity. Encouraging public-private partnerships in agrarian innovation can further drive

the sector's growth.

2. Provide Legal Backing to MSP

The persistent demand for Minimum Support Price (MSP) with legal guarantees highlights the sector's vulnerabilities. Implementing the MS Swaminathan Commission's recommendation of setting MSP at C2 (comprehensive cost of production) +50 per cent and granting it legal status can ensure private buyers do not exploit farmers. This reform would not put a significant financial strain on the government but could protect farmers from distress sales. Furthermore, creating a robust monitoring mechanism to enforce MSP and extending its coverage to more crops can improve farmers' incomes. Enhancing the transparency of procurement processes through digital platforms and integrating MSP enforcement with local market committees can also make the system more reliable.

3. Enhance PM-KISAN Support

The Rs 6,000 annual support to around 10 crore small and marginal farmers under NEEDED FINANCIAL ers' growing financial needs. This increase could significantly impact

#### **Retail inflation for farm,** rural workers eases

etail inflation for farm and rural workers eased to 5.01 per cent and 5.05 per cent in December from 5.35 per cent and 5.47 per cent, respectively, in November 2024. The All-India Consumer Price Index for Agricultural Labourers (CPI-AL) and Rural Labourers (CPI-RL) remained unchanged for December 2024 at 1,320 and 1,331 points, respectively, a labour ministry statement said.

According to the statement, the CPI-AL and CPI-RL were 1320 points and 1331 points, respectively, in November 2024. The year-on-year inflation rates based on CPI-AL and CPI-RL for December 2024 were recorded at 5.01 per cent and 5.05 per cent, respectively, compared to 7.71 per cent and 7.46 per cent in December 2023, it added. The corresponding figures for November 2024 were 5.35 per cent for CPI-AL and 5.47 per



#### Rupee falls 12 paise to settle at 86.47 against US dollar

he rupee declined 12 paise to settle at 86.47 (provisional) against the US dollar on Thursday amid the strengthening American currency and continuous outflow of foreign funds. However, positive domestic equity markets and lower crude oil prices supported the Indian currency at lower level, forex traders said. At the interbank foreign exchange, the rupee opened at 86.46 and moved between high of 86.38 and low of 86.52 against the greenback during the session. The local unit settled at 86.47 (provisional) against the US dollar, registering a loss of 12 paise from its previous close. On Wednesday, the rupee appreciated 23 paise to close at 86.35 against the dollar.

Anuj Choudhary, Research Analyst at Mirae Asset Sharekhan, said the rupee declined on a strong US dollar and recovery in the US treasury yields. FII outflows too weighed down the local unit. However, weak crude oil prices and positive domestic markets cushioned the downside

Consolidated net profit stood at Rs 2,543.65 crore in October-December 2024 the third quarter of April 2024 to March 2025 fiscal year (FY25) - compared with Rs 712.84 crore earning in the same period a year back, according to a stock exchange filing of the company. Profit was also up quarter-on-quarter when compared with Rs 142.67 crore earning in July-September 2024. ## talks on India-EU free trade pact: Official

There is a significant progress in the negotiations for the proposed free trade agreement (FTA) between India and European Union (EU), an official said on Thursday.

Commerce and Industry Minister Piyush Goyal was in Brussels last week to meet

During the meeting between Goyal and Sefcovic, the two sides agreed to build a commercially meaningful trade agenda and work towards a mutually beneficial trade pact. The two leaders have also

outlined political directions for both the teams to develop a mutually beneficial agenda for trade and investment and a robust FTA in an expedited manner to meet global chal-

The meeting came ahead of the 10th round of talks

between India and the EU, which is scheduled from March 10-14 in Brussels.

In the ninth round, both sides discussed trade issues covering goods, services, investment and government procurement along with necessary rules such as rules of origin, SPS (sanitary and phytosanitary), and technical bar-



riers to trade.

In June 2022, India and the 27-nation EU bloc resumed the negotiations after a gap of over eight years. It was stalled in 2013 due to differences over several issues.

The total trade stood at USD 180 billion in 2023-24. India exported USD 75.18 billion in goods and USD 31.13 billion in services to the EU, while the EU exported USD 63.44 billion in goods and USD 31.35 billion in services to India.

## When number uncovers corruption and justice prevails, Madhavan gets the Hisaab Barabar

isaab Barabar revolves around Radhe (R Madhavan), a senior ticket collector in the railways who has an obsession with numbers, balance and accounting. A failure in achieving his dream of becoming an accountant, Radhe applies his meticulous sense of balance not just to his work, but also to his personal life, often to a fault. As a charming yet somewhat reserved single dad, Radhe's life takes a dramatic turn when he discovers discrepancies in his bank account that lead discrepancies in his bank account that lead him to uncover a massive corruption scheme within the banking system. Now, what really happens and how the story unfolds, you need to give it a watch.

#### **ANALYSIS**

At its core, Hisaab Barabar is a simple story executed with charm and finesse. Writer-director Ashwani Dhir crafts a tale that avoids the usual pitfalls of preachy social dramas. The narrative is straightforward but layered, focusing on themes of honesty, morality and resilience while keeping the tone light and family-friendly. The story doesn't rely on convoluted twists or melodrama; instead, it draws the audience in with relatable characters,

crisp dialogues and a sense of earnestness.
While the film flits between genres romance, comedy, and thriller - it never loses sight of its heartwarming essence.

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

Hisaab Barabar distinguishes itself with its unconventional protagonist, Radhe, who is far from the larger-than-life heroes typically seen in similar narratives. Radhe's relatable quirks, including his obsession with balance sheets and accountability, make him an intriguing and authentic character. This tonal harmony ensures the story remains entertaining and family-friendly, avoiding the pitfalls of becoming overly intense or melodramatic.

The film's heartwarming and relatable to the control of t

themes also contribute to its appeal. Beyond the central plot of exposing corruption, the movie explores relationships, resilience, and the pursuit of justice in everyday life. Radhe's journey to balance everyday life. Radhe's journey to balance his personal and professional challenges resonates deeply, making the film emotion-ally enriching. The execution of Hisaab Barabar stands out for its refreshing sim-plicity. The movie avoids convoluted twists and unnecessary dramatics, opting instead for a self-aware and earnest approach. This straightforward execu-tion respects the intelligence of its audition respects the intelligence of its audience, offering a narrative that feels authentic and honest while still being engaging.

One of the noticeable drawbacks of Hisaab Barabar lies in its tonal inconsistencies. While the film admirably attempts to blend comedy, drama and suspense, the frequent shifts between these genres can sometimes feel disjointed. Moments of light-hearted humour or romance are occasionally interrupted by sudden tran-sitions to serious, high-stakes drama,

which can disrupt the narrative flow. This lack of tonal balance detracts from the film's overall coherence and makes it challenging for the audience to stay fully

Another area where the film falls short is in its underutilisation of certain characters. While the story revolves around Radhe's journey, pivotal supporting characters - especially Kirti Kulhari's role - is not given enough depth or screen time. Her character, which could have added an additional emotional layer to the story, feels underdeveloped, leaving viewers wanting more from her storyline. The film's tendency to indulge in over-the-top moments also detracts from its otherwise grounded approach. While the antagonist's exaggerated portrayal offers moments of enter-tainment, some of the scenes involving the villain feel out of sync with the movie's subtle and earnest tone. These overly dramatic sequences risk pulling the audience out of the story, as they clash with the film's

more realistic and heartfelt moments. The narrative sometimes leans on predictable tropes and clichéd plot points, which might feel overly familiar to sea-

soned viewers. Despite these drawbacks, Hisaab Barabar remains a largely enjoyable film. However, addressing these shortcomings could have made it an even more compelling and polished experience.

#### PERFORMANCE

R Madhavan's performance is undoubtedly the heart and soul of Hisaab Barabar. He brings a disarming charm and authenticket collector with a strong moral compass. Madhavan masterfully balances Radhe's quirks and vulnerabilities with his quiet determination, creating a character that is both relatable and inspiring. His ability to seamlessly navigate the film's tonal shifts - whether it's a comedic moment or a high-stakes confrontation - anchors the narrative and keeps the audience invested in his journey.

Neil Nitin Mukesh delivers a flamboyant and energetic performance as the film's antagonist. Playing the role of a corrupt banker, Mukesh leans into his character's over-the-top personality with gusto. While some scenes verge on caricature, his unhinged energy adds a layer of entertain-ment and creates a stark contrast with Madhavan's restrained approach. His exaggerated portrayal might not resonate with all viewers, but it undeniably adds drama

and a sense of unpredictability to the film. Kirti Kulhari, despite limited screen time, leaves a lasting impression with her nuanced performance. As Radhe's love inter-est and a pivotal character in the story, Kulhari brings subtlety and depth to her role. Her naturalistic acting style enhances her scenes, and her chemistry with Madhavan adds an emotional layer to the film. While her character could have been explored further, Kulhari makes the most of her role, elevating every moment she's on screen.

#### **TECHNICAL ASPECTS**

Ashwani Dhir impresses with his restrained and focused approach to storytelling in Hisaab Barabar. His direction ensures the narrative remains engaging without feeling bloated, with a pacing that avoids any dull moments. The film strikes a careful balance between its various tones - comedy, drama and suspense - while maintaining a sense of authenticity. Dhir's storytelling is straightforward yet impactful, allowing the emotional core of the film to allowing the emotional core of the film to resonate without resorting to melodrama. The writing is one of the film's strongest aspects, with a sharp and self-aware script that avoids common clichés. The crisp dialogues are both entertaining and meaningful, adding depth to the characters and their interactions. Dhir's ability to blend humour and serious themes seamlessly ensures that the story feels relatable and grounded. The writing also respects the audience's intelligence, delivering a narrative that is engaging without being overly complicated or predictable. 


English newspapers.

## **Gukesh becomes highest-ranked Indian** in FIDE rankings, displaces Erigaisi

Continuing his rapid rise, world champion D Gukesh dethroned compatriot Arjun Erigiasi to become the highest-ranked Indian chess player, at fourth, in the latest FIDE rankings on Thursday. Gukesh, 18, achieved the feat when he logged his second victory in the Tata Steel Tournament in Wijk Aan Zee (Netherlands) defeating defeating Vincent Keymer of Germany. Gukesh, who was awarded the Dhyan Chand Khel Ratna recently, has amassed 2784 rating points, while Erigaisi, who was the highest-ranked Indian for a long time, has slipped to fifth with 2779.5 rating points.

Norway's Magnus Carlsen continues to be the undisputed world No.1 with 2832.5 points, followed by United States' Grandmaster Hikaru Nakamura (2802) and

Wednesday, France's interior ministry said there was a "real and serious risk of confrontation" between fans of the two teams.

Lille hosts Feyenoord on January 29 at the Stade Pierre-Maurov.

The French authorities said Feyenoord's travels are often marred by "public order disturbances due to the violent behavior of certain supporters or individuals claiming to be supporters of this team," and they cited several examples of fan violence.

Justifying its decision, the ministry added that 3,600 fans - 500 of whom were identified as being dangerous - had planned to travel to Lille, although only 2,600 seats had been allocated to the Dutch

The 25-year-old Marmoush ioined City for a reported 70 million euros (\$73 million), following the arrivals of young defenders Abdukodir Khusanov from Lens and Vitor Reis from Palmeiras for a combined \$77 million. City will hope the new signings can ignite its season, which was thrown back into turmoil when the team collapsed to a 4-2 loss at Paris Saint-Germain in the Champions League on

revamped first stage. Marmoush is second to Bayern Munich's Harry

Kane in the list of top scorers in the German league this season, with 15 goals from 17 games for Frankfurt. He was not in the squad for the 2-0 win over Borussia Dortmund amid negotiations with City, and went on the field after the game for an apparent farewell in front of Frankfurt's fans.

The move to City caps a rapid rise to stardom for Marmoush, who signed from Frankfurt on a free transfer in 2023 from Wolfsburg, where he'd only scored five goals the season before.

It's not yet clear how Marmoush would fit into Pep Guardiola's tactics. His best performances this season have come as part of a two-striker formation Wednesday to plunge to the alongside former Paris brink of elimination with Saint-Germain forward one game left in the Hugo Ekitiké, but Guardiola

Haaland. Marmoush can play in wide roles and has generally done so for Egypt's national team, but less successfully than in a central role. He has six goals and three assists in 35 games for his country.
